Although the proceedings were confined to one day, Berkshire contrived, in the short time at their disposal, to score a memorable triumph over Devonshire, whom they also deteated at Exeter after Devon had declared. The match should have started on Monday, but a continual downpour rendered a commencement out of the question. On Tuesday, however, the sun shone brilliantly, and with the wicket in good condition, an interesting day's play, was looked forward to. No one, however, imagined that a decisive result would be reached or even that an immige each would be concluded. However, the anexpected happened, for Berkshire, after winning the toss, managed to knock up enough runs to force their opponents to follow on, and then, thanks to brilliant bowling by Hawksworth, again dismissed Dovonshire for a small score, leaving the home side only 10 runs to get for victory, a feat which they accomplished without the slightest trouble.

Berkshire opened in a fashion which boded ill for their chances of success, for three wickets tell for 32 runs. T. P. Norris and R. F. Morres temporarily stopped the rot, and raised the score to 70, but six wickets were down for 78. At this juncture S. H. Stevens and R. H. R. Palmer came to the rescue and by forceful hitting they raised the Borkshire total to the respectable figure of 195. Clarke and Light carried the score to 15, but with the departure of Light for a well-played 41, the Devon batting broke down and the whole side were out for 105. R. P. Morres was the most successful of the Berkshire bowlers, his analysis being: 8 overs, 0 maidens, 29 runs, 5 wickets. Dr. Woodburn took three wickets for 20, while Hawksworth, who bowled well but met with little luck, secured one for 30. Berkshire fielding was very fine, A. P. F. Chapman in particular distinguishing himself. At the close of the Devon innings some doubt existed as to the position, for the majority of those present, including the umpires and Devon players, were under the impression that no follow on could be enforced in a two-days match unless one team was over 100 runs ahead. Dr. Woodburn, however, was confident that a new rule had been passed dealing with a two-days match in which no play had taken place on the first day. A "Wisden" was nurriedly fetched, Dr. Woodburn found to be correct, and Devon followed on.

If was 4.30 p.m. when Devon commenced balting a second time, and for a time they looked like avoiding defeat, for 56 runs were on the board when the third wicket fell. From now onward, however, Hawksworth was practically unplayable, and thanks largely to his efforts Devonshire were all dismissed for 99, leaving Berks 10 to get for victory. These were obtained without loss, Hawksworth's figures deserve reproduction. They are as follows: 18.3 overs, 5 maidens, 33 runs, 9 wickets. Amongst those who watched the interesting play were Mr. W. Howard Palmer, the Rev. A. G. P. Baines, Captain J. St. L. Wheble, Major Turner and Mr. Barry Blagrare.

BERKS DEFEAT HERTS.

Following up their victory over Devonshire on Monday and Tuesday in the Minor Counties Cricket Championship, Berkshire gained a further victory over Herts on Wednesday and Thursday. COUNTY CRICKET.

Berks' Splendid Victory Over Bucks.

The return match in the Minor Counties Championship between Berks, and Bucks took place at Slough, when Berkshire, after having all the worst of the opening, made a plendid recovery, and won by 31 runs. Berkshire won the first match at Reading by 76 runs. This double victory is highly creditable, as Bucks have been performing well.

The wicket was on the slow side when the game started owing to the heavy dew over-night, and this largely accounts for the smallness of the score. It recovered, however, later, and runs, which had been so difficult to get earlier, came much more

Berkshire opened their innings with R.

J. Remnant and A. J. Croom, to the bewling of Hazelton and Sewell, but the former was caught at 21 by Franklin of J. Whiting, who had replaced Sewell. Norris and Captain Ellis were victims to the fast bowler, but Stone, the Hampshire "pro," who has not qualited for Berks, hit freely, though both Croom and Stone were eventually beaten by Whiting, who captured the first five wickets. With the tall of the fourth wicket there camo a quick change, and although Woodburn put together 14, the immings closed before luncheon for 95, three batsmen failing to score. J. Whiting obtained seven wickets for 39 runs and Hazelton three for 40.

Bucks made an even more disastrous start when the game recommenced, loang two Sead wickets for six runs. Durlacher (the Wellingtonian, a good bat and brilliant helds and Lee Gros took the score to 43, but F. Whiting and Kent were got rid of very cheaply, and six wickets were down for 9, Hazleton Given and Sowell, however, offered a stubborn defence, and the Betkshire score was passed before the tall or the eighth wicket, the innings realising 141, after just over two hours' play, giving Bucks a lead of 36. Hawksworth and Woodburn took three wickets each for 42 and 13 runs respectively, Norris two for 16, and Bailey one for 10.

Captain Illis, Norris, Stone and Palmer followed in quick succession, and six wickets had fallen when the telegraph recorded 38 runs, or only two runs beyond the opponents' total. It was at this point that P. F. Remnant, the old Eton boy, and Bailey made a most invaluable stand, which added 54 runs to the total, the professional being thrown out in attempting a short run, Durlacher, who was fielding very smartly and covering a lot of ground, making a smart return, which was eleverly taken by Hazelton. Woodburn assisted Remnant to add 36 without further loss, and when stumps were drawn Berks had totalled 125 for seven, Remnant having subscribed 43 and Woodburn M. Less than three-quarters of an hour the following morning was sufficient to close the Berkshire innings. Woodburn was caught by Hazelton off his own bowling when the score stood at 145, the eighth wicket having added 56, of which the outgoing hatsman was credited with 27. Hawksworth and A. B. Croom did not offer much resistance, but P. F. Remnant continued to bat with delightful freedom, and was still unbeaten at the close. His 66, which included five 4's, was an invaluable contribution to a total of 163. Sewell captured four wickets for 54 runs. Hazelton three for 36, but J. Whiting, who had met with such success in the first innings, had 53 scored off him for two wickets.
