THE SUMMER GAME

COUNTY CRICKET REVIVAL

The revival of county cricket in Cornwall, after a lapse of five seasons, took the form of a trial match at Camborne, on Saturday, between Cornwall and "Colts XV." The county eleven included several stalwarts, and amongst the "Colts" were promising recruits.

Escott and Hawken opened for the county against the bowling of Veal and Carbis. Escott succumbed to Veal in the first over, and three wickets went down for 24. Leighton, the Camborne pro., made a stand with Blomfield (Penzance), the pair taking the score to 85 for the next wicket. Half the side were dismissed for 87, the amateur falling to Bentley, two runs after the professional had been caught. The lurch score was too for 5 wickets.

Tresawna and Dunstan resumed the innings, but the latter did not stay long, being beaten by Bentley, and Tresawna gave Paul a chance which he did not accept. Veale and Bentley continued to bowl well and Harvey was frequently in difficulty, but the county captain played admirably, before being beaten by Veale. Harvey shared a similar fate, being bowled by Veale. Eight wickets were down for 172. Beecher Williams hit freely and sent up the 200. Nicholls played on to his wicket, and after getting 50 Williams was bowled by Major Oate. The innings closed for 234. Veale took five wickets for 65. Bentley three for 34, Oats one for 6 and Carbis one for 35.

The "Colts" opened with C. Paul and T. Williams, and were opposed by E. Hawken and Escott, the former being sent back at 31. Williams, Cooke and Carbis were dismissed without any addition to the score. Cory and Kelly, following on, found run-getting difficult, and six wickets fell for 48. Escott performed the "hat-trick," disposing of Major Oate, Kelly, and Jennings. Whiting bowled Trebblecock in the next over, and Jasper fell in the following over. The innings closed for 69. Escott captured seven wickets for 6 runs, Whiting three for 21, and Leighton one for 5.

The "Colts" followed on 165 runs in arrears, Paul and T. Williams facing the deliveries of Leighton and B. Williams. T. Williams was caught in Leighton's first over, but Paul and Cooke made a fair stand until Paul was caught near the boundary off Harvey at 31.
