There was an invisited incident in the Y.M.C.A. v. Sawaton match on Parker's Piece on Friday. I am well aware that a rule of crucket is against me, but I understand in Senior League this season a man has been allowed to bat under similar conditions. If that is cerret, then we were not wrong. The Cambridge cricket season practically tosed on Saturday with the final of the Junior sup Competition of the Cambs. Cricket Association. The Association is to be congratuated upon the success which has attended its competitions from the very commencement. The Senior Cup was acquired in 1889, and until 1907 was fought for under the knock-out system. During those 18 years many afterwards distinguished cricketers played for it, amongst them, I believe, was Ranjitisinhi, E. J. Diver, Watts, Tom Hayward and Hobbs. In 1907 the competition was changed to a league. competition was changed to a lengue.

It is interesting to note that in the first It is interesting to note that in the first final and the last match up-to-date a century was made by one of the players. F. W. French was the maker of the century in the memorable first final between the Casandra and the Anchor on the University Ground in 1850, when the Anchor won by one wicket, and in the final match of this season on Thursday, when St. Giles' were presented with the cup, Sarayananateus scored 107. It is notable that the Camden have been in the final match on nine occasions, and have qualified as holders four times. four times.

St. Giles', this year's winners, are a progressive club, of the right sort. They won the Junior Cup in 1900 and 1907, and the Senior Cup in 1911 and 1921, and are holding it for a second year in succession by their success this season. Only 10 clubs have carned the right to have their names inscribed on the cup during the 33 years the Association has been in existence. Papworth was voted to the chair. Others present included Commander S. P. Start, R.N., Captain R. S. Hicks, Dr. R. Ellis, and Messrs. H. C. Frohock, A. B. Diver, F. N. D. Digby, P. W. 1979, H. H. Hart (hon. secretary), W. Manning, R. H. Parker, H. C. Richford, G. Smith, A. C. Taylor, H. C. Tebbutt and W. V. Webb.

Letters of apology for absence were received from Viscount Clifden, Lord Queenborough, and Messrs. J. H. Widdicombe, C. E. Townley, C. B. Benstead, A. S. Ling and P. A. French.

COMMITTEE'S ANNUAL REPORT.

The annual report of the committee stated that the past season, although at the outset appearing bright, was somewhat disappointing, both from a playing and financial point of view. Eight matches were played, of which one was gon, five were lost, and two were drawn. The side felt the loss of Messrs. H. C.
