

"PICNIC CRICKET."

All Day Matches But No Competition Games.

NEW COUNTY CLUB FORMED.

A meeting was held at the Lion Hotel, Cambridge, on Saturday afternoon, for the purpose of forming a cricket club composed of amateurs from all parts of the County, with a view to arranging more all-day matches. After a lengthy discussion it was decided to form a club which will be known as "The Social Cricket Club," who will not play matches on Thursdays and Saturdays. Amongst those present were: Dr. Robert Ellis, Major O. Papworth, Messrs. H. C. Richford, H. B. Hart, Gordon Pratt, H. H. Tebbutt, A. C. Taylor, J. C. Tebbutt, W. Manning, T. Hayes, E. Smith, Newman, J. Nutter, C. Frohock, and S. E. Rowley, the last three being the conveners of the meeting.

Dr. Ellis was voted to the chair, and explained that residents in the County felt that they would like to have an organisation for the purpose of arranging cricket matches, irrespective of competition. This was in no way antagonistic to the Cambs. Cricket Association or the County Club. Many of them had played in some League matches, which commenced at three or four o'clock, and when a side was losing the members left the field about five o'clock to get a glass of beer and they did not see any more of them. In this way disputes arose.

Mr. Rowley said he was not the prime mover in the proposal, but he had been approached by other individuals, who had expressed a desire to have all-day cricket matches. He was sorry to see the proposal had brought forth a letter to the "Cambridge Daily News" from Mr. Richford, but he assured that gentleman and the secretary of the County Cricket Club that the new club was not run antagonistic to the other two bodies in any way. They did not aspire to anything like county cricket, but merely wanted to have a friendly game, and if they in their endeavours did bring to light some good talent they might be of assistance to the County Club. The idea of those who had approached him was that they should have no president or vice-presidents, and as most of them had got their own gear, the maximum subscription should be 5s.

IS IT NECESSARY?

Mr. Richford contended it was an unfair statement for the Chairman to make, that League matches were started between three and four o'clock, and that sometimes a side left at five to get a drink. In the first place the public-houses were not open at five o'clock, and the matches under the jurisdiction of the Cricket Association started at a definite time, and were concluded at a given time. He thought the Chairman was under a misapprehension to make a remark like he did. He would like to know what class of cricket the new club proposed to play. If it was picnic cricket, and from the previous remarks he understood that was so, then the Cricket Association or the County Club would make no attempt to interfere. But why call a public meeting and circularise secretaries of the Cricket Association and the County Club if they only intended playing picnic cricket? Unless they played cricket of the league standard he did not see how they were going to help the County Club.

Mr. Rowley assured Mr. Richford that there was no idea of being antagonistic to the Cricket Association or the County Club, and he had no idea they were reflecting upon either of those bodies. He pointed out that the circular letter was sent out to all interested in cricket, and the only way of forming a club was by getting those interested together. They did not wish to take people from either the Association or the County Club, and they would not do so, as they did not intend to play on Thursdays or Saturdays. It was quite a private club, and he did not think there was any need for Mr. Richford to take the view that the Association was being slighted in any way.

Mr. Richford said he did not wish his remarks to be taken as meaning that, but he thought they could have gone to either the Cricket Association or the County Club, who would have endeavoured to assist them in carrying out the programme. That would have been the simplest plan.

The Chairman said they had no idea of interfering with the activities of any organisation in any way. They wished to help them, and certainly not to hinder them.

Mr. Hart, asked to give his views, said he had had no opportunity of consulting his committee. He had certain views, but they were unofficial, and he would like to explain them when he had heard the views of others present. Personally he did not feel that that meeting had been called in opposition to the County Club or the Cricket Association.

Major Papworth stated that he had no doubt the Club would be able to obtain the use of Parker's Piece, but he understood that the Corporation, who were taking over control of the Piece for sport, would not undertake to erect marquees.

A COMPLAINT AND A REPLY.

Mr. Hart was prevailed upon to give his views concerning the proposal, but he wished it to be clearly understood that they were unofficial. The County Club had been struggling for several years to get going. It had just got going and that was all. Chiefly it had been a question of finance, and here was an excellent nucleus to put the County Club on a sounder basis than it was. The gentlemen present were the very people it had been desired to interest in the County Club. The appeals which had been made to gentlemen in the County had not been entirely successful. The appeals he had made during the past two years had generally been discouraging. Cricketers for whom that meeting was called with a view to form-

ing a new club were the very people whom the County Club desired to help them. It might be that the County Club could help them. He would like to see more all-day matches, and speaking unofficially he thought the County Club might be able to arrange all-day matches for the gentlemen present if they became members of the County Club. There were many reasons why it would be desirable in the interests of the members themselves to join the County Club, and have those matches arranged.

Mr. Frohock asked why the County Club had never shown any encouragement to arrange such matches and give those present a game. They knew they were not good enough for the County Club, but the County Club never offered to do anything for them in the way of matches.

Mr. Hart said that was the first objection he had been waiting for, and asked if those members had done anything themselves to express the wish for all-day matches.

The Chairman announced he had a letter from Mr. Frank Goodlife, stating that Hunts Cricket Club would be willing to arrange fixtures with the new club, with which he was in sympathy. He had subscribed to the County Cricket Club, but had never heard any more from them beyond the receipt of a complimentary ticket to attend the matches. That was Mr. Frohock's point; nothing had been done for them.

Mr. Rowley stated that he was a member of the County Club, but the only match he was asked to play in was when he was about 17. He was never asked again, and he did not know why. (Laughter.)

It was pointed out that there would be no professional element in the new club, and that those who played would have to contribute towards the expenses.

A RICH MAN'S CLUB.

Mr. Richford said it appeared to him to be a rich man's club. They could not always find new light in one circle, and they had to go out in the field for that purpose. It was only picnic cricket.

Mr. Rowley said it was their idea of having friendly games, and they did not wish to raise the ire of the powers that be.

Mr. Richford: We do feel we are not getting support from some of the county people we ought to.

Mr. Moss: You don't deserve it.

Mr. Richford: If the County Cricket Club don't deserve support for what they are doing now I should be very sorry for it. They are running the County Club in competition cricket that is something worthy of support.

AN ALLEGATION WITHDRAWN.

Mr. Moss, who comes from Wimpole, said he would like to have joined the County Club and paid a subscription of a guinea, or whatever it might be, if he could have an hour's practice at the nets twice a year. But in his part of the county no one knew anything about the club. He had never been approached by anyone in the county, and there were a good many people in the same boat. Surely they ought to try and embrace the whole county.

Mr. H. C. Tebbutt said he believed Mr. Moss had not been in the county long. He referred to the difficulties under which the County Club was established last season, and said that if Mr. Moss had been missed in the appeal made to cricketers he had the apologies of the County Club, but his remark was unjustifiable.

Mr. Moss: I withdraw it.

Mr. H. C. Tebbutt: If you have not had a chance of supporting, you will next year. If we don't deserve some help, I think we ought to drop the thing altogether.

The Chairman said they were getting a little beyond the point of the meeting. Anyone who knew Mr. Richford and Mr. Hart knew they had done their best, and he did not want to see any antagonism. They simply wanted a club, so that they could enjoy themselves without interfering with the other organisations.

THE SOCIAL CRICKET CLUB.

On the proposition of Mr. Frohock, seconded by Mr. Hayes, it was decided to form a club. Two names were proposed, "The Cambridgeshire Wanderers" and "The Social Cricket Club," and on a vote being taken the latter was carried.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Dr. Ellis was elected president, Messrs. Rowley and Nutter joint secretaries and treasurers, Mr. T. Hayes captain, and Mr. Frohock vice-captain. Messrs. G. Rose, Moss, Hogg, Newman and H. C. Tebbutt were elected to form the committee, with the ex-officio members.

It was agreed that a deputation from the committee meet representatives of the County Club to discuss certain details.

The subscription was fixed at 5s.

The hon. secretaries would be glad to receive the names of would-be members as early as possible.

The annual general meeting of the Cherryhinton Liberal Cricket Club was held on Wednesday evening, when the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: President, Mr. G. At the adjourned meeting of the Landbeach and District League, Mr. T. J. Chapman was elected chairman for the present season.

The many friends of H. C. Tebbutt will hear with much regret that he has resigned the captaincy of the County Cricket Club.

A special vote of thanks was accorded Mr. Tebbutt for his great services to the County, extending over many years.

If memory serves me right, Jack Hobbs had a wonderful season for Cambs. the year before he qualified for Surrey, but when the averages came out, the Surrey professional had to take second place to Tebbutt, who was in the form for the County at that time.

Commander Start, the successor of Mr Tebbutt as skipper of the County cricket team, has had an extensive sporting career with the Services, and is, of course, a Rugby International.

After 17 years' victorious career, and without a single defeat, the Cambridge Borough Police team succumbed to the Cambs. County Police on Wednesday afternoon. It was certainly the Borough Police's "day off" for on 11 previous occasions they have been able to give a great account of themselves. M. Staples has the distinction of scoring the first century of the season in Senior League cricket. It was a capital display, and by making 131 not out he did not give a single chance. I believe "Mick," as he is popularly known to his colleagues, could have gone on batting all day had the clouds not been applied. It must also be borne in mind that he made his century against some of the keenest fielding I have seen this season. The bowling of Newmarket was, perhaps, not so good as at the commencement of the innings, when Stan. Woolston, F. Roberts and F. E. Kitchener had to play cautiously. But it was by no means poor when Staples went in, although Roberts had subdued it somewhat by well judged tactics.

When he first went in, Staples soon caught up to the total of his colleague Roberts, and hitting out, he soon reached his half century. His driving and late cutting was particularly attractive. A. J. Neaves also gave a sound display of late cuts, and he stayed with Staples while 101 was added. Notwithstanding the huge score of 259 for five wickets, the Y.M.C.A. were foiled by the admirable play of their Newmarket batsmen. They played with their backs to the wall, and played the right game in a splendid manner.

While credit is due to every member of the team, I think the palm of honour must go to F. Balls and C. Leon, the last pair at the wickets. They defied the attack for 20 minutes, and thus saved the game. Leon is slightly deformed in the hip, and unless he or his partner hit the ball well out to the field it was impossible to run and add to the total, because of this handicap. What he lacked in speed, Leon more than made up for in his knowledge of playing the waiting game, and he was patience personified. Roberts, Stan. Woolston and Staples all tried to sport his wicket, but it was of no avail. The same applies to F. Balls, and the Y.M.C.A. had to be content with a share of the points, although they had scored 146 runs more than their opponents with four wickets less.

I believe the Cherryinton Liberals have as yet on the Camba Junior Cup, besides the Bowls Cup. At any rate, it is no mean achievement for a club in their first appearance in the Junior Cup Competition to reach the semi-final, and to dispose of two clubs like St. Giles' "A" and Ickleton. Ickleton had previously defeated the College Servants and the Post Office in their first and second rounds respectively, both being away matches, and on their own pitch it looked a hard task for the Cherryinton club, but they sprang a surprise, and made light of their task by winning by seven wickets. Ickleton had exactly the same team that defeated the College Servants and the Post Office.

I have never seen a better country wicket, but the outfield was bad, which made run-getting slow. This was the first time that the Liberals have played on a country pitch this season, and they did unconsciously well. Their fielding at times was brilliant, and W. E. Newton once more distinguished himself by his alertness, his quickness being the downfall of more than one batsman. C. L. Mason made things very uncomfortable for the home side, for assisted by the wind he was very fast, and keeping a good length, was on the wicket, and in all secured twelve wickets for 43 runs.

The Liberals are developing into a strong batting side, and in R. P. Fuller have a man who is always capable of runs, and on Saturday he batted splendidly. Content only to hit loose balls, his shots on the leg are pretty to watch. The most encouraging point with the team is, however, that the "tail" is developing, and does not fail so lamentably as it used to do.

Newham have also realised the semi-final of the Junior Cup Competition for the first time, and here again congratulations are due. They beat one of the strong favourites for the Cup, Histon Institute, whose team included S. Rowley, W. Chivers and A. Bevis, stalwarts of local cricket. If that cup comes to Newham, I shall hear of the "Two Freds" making very long speeches at the next annual general meeting of the Newham Institute. To beat Histon Institute by 34 runs was a capital performance. F. Heath, G. Washell and C. T. Marriott shared honours in batting for the winners, and Heath and H. Foulger were the destructive agents in bowling. Bevis, Rowley and Chivers made 45 out of Histon's total of 52, the players named scoring 18, 14 and 13 respectively. Six of the other batsmen failed to score, chiefly owing to the keenness of Newham in the field.

There was an unusual incident in the Y.M.C.A. v. Sawston match on Parker's Piece on Friday. Shadbolt, one of the Y.M.C.A., did not turn out to field and on going in to bat was objected to by the Sawston team. This was only to be expected and in accordance with the rules of the game. A somewhat heated discussion ensued, and there were fears that a protest would be entered by Sawston. I alluded to the fact in the Sports Gossip column of the "Cambridge Daily News," and I have received letters from Mr. Shadbolt, the player concerned, and Messrs. P. E. Waite and T. F. Teversham, the captains of the Y.M.C.A. and Sawston clubs respectively. These letters give the true light on the situation, and it is pleasing to note the affair has ended all right.

I give Mr. Shadbolt's letter first. He writes:— "In reference to your report of the incident that occurred in the Cup match, Y.M.C.A. v. Sawston, being the player concerned, I would like to say what actually did occur. For business reasons, I found it very difficult to get away at all, staying at business until fetched by Mr. Waite, the Y.M.C.A. captain, as he had already agreed with the Captain of Sawston that a sub should field for me. Naturally we thought a sportsman would keep his word, and I was very much surprised on going out to bat to be pulled up by the Sawston captain, who admitted that he had agreed with Mr. Waite, but he first of all would consult his vice-captain, who promptly said he should protest against me batting.

"The umpires did not uphold the protest, as Mr. Edwards said the matter rested with the captain. I am well aware that a rule of cricket is against me, but I understand in Senior League this season a man has been allowed to bat under similar conditions. If that is correct, then we were not wrong. If the captain had not agreed, I should have been fetched before to field, and then no trouble would have occurred. I am very sorry that a sportsman of Mr. Teversham's standing should not have kept his word. He owed up to us after the match that he had made a hurried decision, but surely he should have stood by his word.

"We had at least three men on the Piece who could have played in my place, but as Mr. Waite had asked me to play, and being selected, he did what he thought was right. I have played cricket for close on forty years, and I don't remember ever having come in contact with such an unpleasant experience as occurred on Friday. Of course, as I did not bat, I fail to see how a protest against me can be lodged. I wonder they did not allow me to bat and then have protested, then they might have won a protest, if they had been bad sportsmen enough to have done so. Of course, very little was said by any of the players, but what was said should be put in its proper light, as I don't want any of my old cricketing colleagues to think I have been a bad sportsman. Trusting to see a better version of the affair in an early issue of your interesting columns."

This is Mr. Shadbolt's side of the question, and you will agree it is given in a straightforward manner. What a pity he was not sent for in time to do some fielding, and it would have avoided much unpleasantness.

Here is Mr. Waite's version: "As captain of the Y.M.C.A. cricket team on Friday against Sawston, I should be obliged if you will give my version in reference to Shadbolt, our player who was objected to. Before the match started I asked permission from the Sawston captain for Shadbolt to bat, explaining to him he was unable to field owing to business difficulties. Permission was readily given, but he was objected to when going in to bat. The Sawston captain came to speak to me, stating he was very, very sorry, but his men objected to Shadbolt batting. Shadbolt immediately withdrew from the field of play. I should like to add that the debate mentioned in your columns was caused by the Sawston players having a consultation. Hoping you will see your way clear to insert in Sports Gossip."

Mr. T. F. Teversham, the Sawston skipper, giving his side of the question. He writes:— "The Sawston C.I.C.C. has never had the slightest intention of protesting against the result of the recent cup-tie against the Y.M.C.A. So far as I know there is nothing to protest against, and if there were I personally should be completely opposed to the idea of exercising that right. The protest is the ill-gotten child of the competition or pot-hunting principle, and it always whines when it is beaten. I was as much, or more, to blame for the incident which occurred in the game than anyone else. Before the match started Mr. Waite asked me whether I would allow him to field two substitutes, and something else, which I did not fully comprehend.

"In my natural desire not to appear discourteous to our opponents, I replied, 'Oh, yes, certainly,' feeling disinclined to ask him to be more precise. I think all sportsmen will understand my feelings. To be fair to myself, I did not for one moment realize that he wished a man to bat who would not field. That would have been stretching consideration for your opponents to a breaking point—even for friendly cricket, except for urgent reasons—and in any case it is not cricket. Naturally, therefore, I feel rather grieved when Mr. Waite accused me of going back on my word. We were beaten after an excellent game, which we all thoroughly enjoyed, and I trust that nothing will rankle in the mind of Mr. Waite or of any other members of the Y.M.C.A. eleven in connection with the game."

And so the matter is ended, and I am sure the Y.M.C.A. and the Sawston players will accept Mr. Teversham's suggestion and let nothing rankle in their minds. It was an unfortunate incident which created a lot of grumbling, most of it unnecessary.

A better sporting spirit, than that shown by Mr. Teversham one does not wish to see. He acknowledges his error made on the spur of the moment in the manner of one who is out for all that is best in cricket. There was a misunderstanding, but that has ended on the field of play—the right place. I am glad to be able to publish the three letters together, for they will clear the air and dispel the confusion which occurred on the day of the match, and which gave rise to unpleasantness.

I have received a further letter from Mr. P. E. Waite, who writes:—"I should be very grateful if you will allow me further space in your most valuable column, to thank Mr. Teversham, the Sawston captain, for his very sporting letter. Also to assure him that the unfortunate incident is completely forgotten by the Y.M.C.A. cricket team."

HOME COUNTY GET HOME BY THREE WICKETS WITH SEVEN MINUTES TO SPARE.

Cambs. wound up their home season on Saturday with a fine win over Oxfordshire by three wickets, after an interesting game and a fairly close finish. CENTURY BY SARAVANAMUTTU.**

Rain delayed the start of this match on Corpus Christi Ground on Thursday, and it was twenty minutes past three when Saravanamuttu and Marchant opened the Camden innings. Sadler made the ball shoot up from the pitch, and made three runs on the hour. Marchant was completely beaten by a good length ball that spread-eagled his wicket in the left-hander's first over. Taylor was missed in the slips off the first ball he received, but Saravanamuttu soon found the boundary. Taylor had only scored a couple when Bellamy had him easily caught at point by Doig. Lilley joined Saravanamuttu, and the two made a stand, both getting Bellamy to the boundary, and although Saravanamuttu was hit by Sadler for three, he also returned one to hold. A made a good but ineffective attempt to hold, the thin rain was falling almost continuously, and the bowlers being greatly handicapped, and the pitch gave them no assistance. Run came at a good pace and at 30 Cousins displaced Bellamy, Saravanamuttu turning his second ball round to leg for four. The latter was making the pace, repeatedly reaching the boundary, but Lilley played sound cricket at the other end, occasionally popping a loose one. The hundred was held after an hour and ten minutes, and ten minutes later Hobson went on for Cousins. Sadler met with success when French was behind the wicket by Lilley being smartly taken behind the wicket by Pratt, after a steady display. French did not stay, being caught at square leg, before he had scored. Saravanamuttu passed his century by a straight drive for four, and after hitting another boundary was dismissed by a fine running catch in the long field. Wickets began to fall quickly now, and Hurry displaced Taylor to leave to a splendid catch at cover, Laurie rolling over as he took the ball, and six wickets were down for 166. With Hart and Hayward appearing the run came slowly, both batsmen displaying caution against Hobson, who was bowling well. Cousins came back at 189 and the rate of scoring increased a little, the two-hundred mark being reached in a little under two hours. Hart drove a ball from Sadler for 6, the ball going over the wall into the roadway, and he gave a difficult chance behind the wicket off the next ball. CAMBS. JUNIOR CUP—Final Round. NEWNHAM INSTITUTE v. WILLINGHAM. Cup Goes to Willingham.

The final stage of the Junior Cup competition was contested at Fenner's on Friday and Saturday by the above teams, neither of whom had reached this stage on any previous occasion. Both sides gave an amazingly poor display in the first innings, Newnham being dismissed for 58 and Willingham just managing to gain a lead of six. It was left to the second innings to decide the destination of the trophy and although at one period they were in none too good a position Willingham eventually won in a convincing manner by five wickets.

Newnham won the toss and going in to bat were soon skittled out, Cornwell and Thurston being alone reaching double figures. Washell was bowled by the first ball of the match, and with only 13 scored two more batsmen followed. The fourth wicket put on eleven, but half the side were out for 33. The remaining batsmen only added 25, and Newnham seemed in a bad way. Willingham, however, failed to take their chance of obtaining a substantial lead on the first innings. They made an even more disastrous start than their opponents, three batsmen departing with seven runs on the board. Five wickets were down for 22, but an invaluable seventh wicket stand by Ellwood and King, that put on 25, enabled Willingham to pass their opponents' total by six runs.

The early Newnham batsmen were inclined to be very cautious, but three men were out with but a score of runs registered. Then Argent and Washell came together and staying at the wickets for nearly an hour, put on 46 for the fourth wicket, pulling the side out of an awkward position. Argent scored six off his first three balls and reached the boundary four times in quick succession. When stumps were drawn on Friday honours were very even, 109 being scored for the loss of six wickets.

There was a large crowd present when the match was resumed on Saturday, and Foulger was dismissed in Thorpe's first over when he had made no addition to his score. Unwin and Goddard did not stay long, and with Benstead, who hit Thorpe for 6, making a useful effort, the innings realised 155.

Frohook and Jakes opened the Willingham second innings and the latter had not gained his account when he was stumped in the first over. Hart joined Frohook, and the pair proceeded to make an excellent stand. Hart was inclined to be rather cautious, but his partner hit the bowling with some freedom, and frequent bowling changes were futile until Washell took the ball from Foulger. Hart attempted several of his deliveries, and then attempting to drive, was clean bowled, with the score at 57. Two runs later Washell claimed Ellwood's wicket before he had scored. Frohook was within one of his half-century when Washell shattered his wicket, the bowler having taken three wickets for one run in a couple of overs. Thorpe, the next man in, was not taking any liberties, although he hit a ball from Marriott out of the ground for 6. With Camps in runs came steadily, and the pair had put on 37 when Camps was bowled by Washell with 105 on the board. Thorpe was hit by a ball from Washell, necessitating a short stoppage, and on resuming the batsman hit three 4's off successive balls. He then hit another hefty six, passing the Newnham total, and Willingham won in fine style by 5 wickets. Thorpe hit six 4's and two 6's in his excellent innings. Presentation of the Cup.

After the match the cup and medals were presented to the victorious team by Mr. A. R. Hill, Vice-President of the Cambs. Cricket Association.

Mr. Hill, in his speech, said it was the duty of the President of the Association, Capt. R. S. Hicks, to present the cup, but he was unable to be present. In other years it had been the custom to hold a smoking concert and make the presentation there. But it was rather tantalising to the players to have to wait so long, and Willingham, whom he congratulated on their success, would be able to go home with all the glory of the cup and medals. "I understand," said Mr. Hill, that Willingham entered the final with high hopes, and I am sure Newnham did, because I have seen some reference in the paper to speeches that were going to be made." (Laughter.)

In illustration of his remarks about junior and senior cricket, Mr. Hill mentioned that while the Senior League consisted of only five clubs, 42 clubs entered for the Junior Cup. That was not a fair proportion, and he hoped it would be altered next season. He hoped Willingham would come along and turn out a senior team.

Mr. P. Garner, captain of the Willingham team, responding, expressed his pleasure at receiving the cup, and said that they were very proud to have won it. Their opponents had played a fine sporting game.

The Junior Cup final on Fenner's on Friday and Saturday provided many ups and downs, and both the teams concerned, Newnham Institute and Willingham, had their moments of anxiety before the latter won. Both sides gave an unexhilarating display, for which the wicket was not responsible, in their first innings. Newnham must have "had their dots" when they were rattled out for 58, but Willingham could only gain a lead of six, and it was left to the second innings to decide.

The Institute batted more confidently when they went in a second time, Washell, who fell to the first ball of the match, and Argent, playing brightly, putting up good scores. When stumps were drawn on Friday it was Willingham's turn to wonder. When the Newnham innings closed on Saturday, Willingham required 130 to win, and although they lost Jakes before a run was scored, they always looked like getting them. Frohook and Hart putting on 57 for the second wicket, but Thorpe took chief honours in the victory by five wickets. Thorpe was temporarily laid out by a ball, and on resuming he hit three 4's off consecutive balls, and after making a single to get the bowling, hit a fine six to win the match.

The supporters of Newnham and Willingham mustered in full force on Saturday, and the latter displayed considerable enthusiasm. They applauded a fine bit of fielding by an Institute player or a good stroke by a Willingham batsman with equal heartiness, which is the proper spirit. A curious feature of the match was that on no fewer than five occasions were two batsmen dismissed by successive balls. In this manner Washell dismissed Jakes and Smith, and Foulger sent back King and Askew, and Goddard claimed Ellwood and Garner in the Willingham first innings.

In the Newnham second innings Thorpe dismissed Argent and Marriott, Washell and Thurston falling to Garner. The latter had an analysis for the match of 10 for 83, and Thorpe 7 for 61. For Newnham, Heath had 6 for 49, and G. Washell five for 40. The Cup and medals were presented, amid cheers, by Mr. A. R. Hill, Vice-President of the Cambs. Cricket Association. Mr. Hill commented on the disparity of interest in the Senior League as compared with the Junior Cup Competition, and the reluctance of the clubs to enter senior cricket or football.

Being present at the presentations of both the Senior Cup and the Junior Cup, I was struck with the contrast in the interest displayed by the public. Of course, the weather was perfect on Saturday, and far from it at the presentation of the Senior League trophy, and the result of the Junior Cup Competition was not so much of a foregone conclusion. Still, senior cricket is senior cricket, and in Cambridge it does not occupy its rightful place in the interest of the sporting public. It is outshone by the glamour of Junior Cup cricket.

TRUMPINGTON v. LODGE.

These two teams, both much fancied for the cup, met on Magdalene College Ground on Saturday. Trumpington went out to bat first and scored 101 in their first innings. Mayle and A. G. More Subscribing Members and Young Players Wanted.

Lack of interest in the doings of the club, the small number of subscribing members, and means of stimulating interest were the principal topics of discussion at the annual meeting of the Cambs. County Cricket Club, held at the Lion Hotel, Cambridge, at 5.30 on Saturday afternoon. The attendance numbered 17, of whom all but two were members of the committee.

Major O. Papworth was voted to the chair. Others present included Commander S. P. Start, R.N., Captain E. S. Hicks, Dr. R. Ellis, and Messrs. H. C. Frohock, A. B. Diver, F. N. D. Digby, P. W. Gray, H. H. Hart (hon. secretary), W. Manning, R. H. Parker, H. C. Richford, G. Smith, A. C. Taylor, H. C. Tebbutt and W. V. Webb.

Letters of apology for absence were received from Viscount Clifden, Lord Queenborough, and Messrs. J. H. Widdicombe, C. E. Townley, C. E. Benstead, A. S. Ling and P. A. French.

COMMITTEE'S ANNUAL REPORT.

The annual report of the committee stated that the past season, although at the outset appearing bright, was somewhat disappointing, both from a playing and financial point of view. Eight matches were played, of which one was won, five were lost, and two were drawn. The side felt the loss of Messrs. H. C. Tebbutt (whose associations with the team, both as captain and player, had been so invaluable), G. L. Livock, J. Colchester and G. Butler, very severely, as well as that of Mr. E. H. Leek, who, after promising to be of great help to the side, was, owing to an injury sustained against Bucks., unable to play in any of the remaining matches, whilst Mr. E. Childs could only get away to play in three matches.

It should be borne in mind that Cambs. was not in the strict sense of the word a residential county, with the result that it was very difficult always to get the best side available. This accounted to some extent for the results not being better. T. W. Sadler, who was resident in Cambridge, was engaged during the summer as professional for all the matches, and proved of great assistance. His average of 53 wickets for 13.78 runs each was sufficient testimony to this. Colours had been awarded to Commander Start, R.N., and Messrs. E. H. Leek, A. H. D. Livock and Sadler.

The committee again wished to record their appreciation of and thanks to Commander Start for captaining the side in six matches, and Mr. T. S. Thomas (who made a welcome reappearance after many years' absence) for captaining the side in the remaining two; to all those gentlemen who played for the side, many of them at much inconvenience to themselves, to the members of the County Club for their continued support; to the C.U. Cricket Club for the use of their ground for practice, and for all the home matches; to Mrs. Bailey and Miss Moyes for the use of rooms for meetings; to Mr. H. F. Hutt for scoring in three matches, and Mr. O. A. Digby for scoring in one match; and, lastly, but by no means the least, to Mr. Harold B. Hart for carrying out the difficult and laborious duties of hon. secretary.

The report was adopted, on the motion of Mr. Gray, seconded by Mr. Smith.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

The treasurer's statement of receipts and payments showed the following figures:

MORE SUBSCRIBERS WANTED.

Mr. Hart said that although the balance in hand appeared to have increased, the increase was on account of deferred subscriptions and donations from the previous year, which he was not able to collect last year. So really

they had just about paid their way. He had to write round about three times to get some of the subscriptions in. Mr. Hart said the membership last season was 98.

Mr. Webb: Only 98 subscribing members in the county?

The Chairman: That's all. I hope the Press will take note of that and try to induce other cricketers in the county to become members of the Association.

Captain Hicks asked if the time had not come when they should take some active steps themselves, such as a house-to-house collection throughout the county, and having someone to go round and interview people and try to get them to join. He knew that there were some people who had not subscribed because they had not been asked. It was no use sitting down and saying they hadn't any money if they did not ask for it. Could they not have a flag day or something of that kind for the County Cricket Club? Surely it was as deserving an object as hospitals and such-like, deserving as they were. They ought not to sit down under the fact that they had only 98 members and no money to pay their expenses.

Mr. Hart said that in addition to the members, he had addressed 150 letters to residents in the county, but had practically no response.

Captain Hicks: I should beard them in their own den.

Mr. Gray thought it would require a paid assistant secretary or collector to carry out Captain Hicks' idea. It was a question whether they could afford to pay for this.

Mr. Manning thought it would pay. He knew of one club that paid a collector, and they had found that their subscriptions had more than doubled.

Dr. Ellis alluded to the small amount of gate money, and thought it showed the lack of interest in the county. The villages seemed to take more interest in their own clubs and league cricket than in the county cricket. His impression was that league cricket had knocked out all interest in the county cricket.

Mr. Digby said they spent hours last year looking up directories and sending to people. The only way seemed to be to approach people personally. If someone would undertake to see a number of people personally they would get on.

Mr. Parker thought that whoever went round ought to be able to explain matters and state how much was wanted to run the club on a good basis.

The Chairman said that some of the members paid their own expenses, and the county was greatly indebted to them.

Capt. Hicks thought it would be a good thing to get a professional batsman.

Mr. Parker said it should be pointed out very strongly how much money was required, and for what purposes.

Capt. Hicks said there was the question of talent money. If they had a professional, and wanted to keep him bucked up, they must pay him talent money.

Mr. Hart said the captain last year was generous enough to pay the professional talent money; and he would like him to know that they appreciated what he did in that respect. (Hear, hear.)

The Chairman said they wanted enough to pay a good professional batsman and professional bowler, and to pay the expenses of the amateur players.

Mr. Tebbutt did not think it was much use going to the population of the villages for money; he thought more could be got from the townspeople.

The Chairman asked if Capt. Hicks would be satisfied if the new committee took the matter up. Perhaps members would take a district each, and canvass a certain number of people. Capt. Hicks having assented to this, the accounts were adopted.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Viscount Clifden was re-elected president, and the vice-presidents were re-elected en bloc.

Commander Start said his movements were likely to be uncertain after March next, and it was very doubtful whether he would be in the district. He would like to take that opportunity of thanking the committee and players for their loyalty and trust in him during the past season under all circumstances. He was sorry the season had not been a little more successful, but owing to Cambs. not being a residential county, they were up against considerable difficulties. It was also a handicap that no club had a ground of its own where they could build up a county club round it. Results would have been better had it not been for the fact that most of the playing members had reached an age when younger ones should take their places. The thing was to try and get the

younger people to take up county cricket more keenly. It was younger members that were wanted. In conclusion, Commander Start said that if he was in Cambridge next season he would be pleased to help as much as he could.

The Chairman said they would lose Commander Start with very great regret, and they would like him to allow himself to be nominated again as captain. (Applause.)

Upon the motion of the Chairman, Commander Start was then unanimously re-elected captain, and heartily thanked for his services, the Chairman remarking that he took an enormous amount of trouble with the team, and they owed him a deep debt of gratitude. (Applause.)

Upon the proposition of Mr. Gray, it was agreed that the appointment of vice-captain be left to the new committee.

The other officers were then elected as follows:—Hon. sec. and treas., Mr. H. B. Hart (re-elected); auditors, Messrs. P. A. French and H. Rayner (re-elected); committee, Major Papworth, Capt. Hicks, Dr. Ellis, Messrs. F. N. D. Digby, J. C. Falkner, P. A. French, P. W. Gray, W. Manning, H. C. Richford, G. Smith, A. C. Taylor, H. C. Tebbutt, H. H. Tebbutt, R. J. Pearson, W. V. Webb, F. W. Wilson, J. H. Widdicombe, W. J. Tabraham, E. H. Leek, and H. C. Frohock.

Mr. Diver said there was a feeling that some of the prominent clubs in the town should be asked to send a member to the Committee, so as to create interest among the younger players in the Borough, and Mr. Richford suggested that New Chesterton Institute should be one of the clubs to send a member.

Eventually it was agreed that the Committee should have power to add to their number.

DIFFERENT TIME OF MEETING SUGGESTED.

Mr. Taylor thought the calling of the annual meeting for 5.30 p.m. was rather against creating interest in the club. He felt certain that if they wanted to get people to come in any numbers to support the club, they would have to choose a different time.

Mr. Diver supported Mr. Taylor's remarks, saying it did not need any further evidence than the attendance that evening. With the exception of two, the meeting consisted of members of the Committee. To his mind 5.30 was a ridiculous time.

Capt. Hicks pointed out that Saturday was the most convenient day for county people, but agreed that a different hour would be advisable. They could not expect people who had been in the town on business all day to stop to a meeting at that hour.

Mr. Taylor said it had been mentioned in his several times by business people that they would like to attend, but could not get away from their business on account of the hour.

Mr. Hart pointed out that, according to the rules, the meeting must be held on Saturday. He added that the time was not fixed for his convenience. It was quite immaterial to him what day or hour it should be.

It was eventually agreed, on the motion of Mr. Diver, that the matter should be considered at the first meeting of the new committee.

THANKS TO THE HON. SEC.

Commander Start proposed a hearty vote of thanks to Mr. Hart for the great amount of trouble he had taken, not only in connection with the ordinary secretarial duties, but in getting the sides together and in looking after their comfort at the various hotels. They were very greatly indebted to him, and on behalf of the players he would like to thank him. Mr. Manning, as one of the players, seconded, and the motion was carried unanimously.

Mr. Hart, in responding, said that whatever he had done had been for the love of the game and the best interests of the club. He could only regret that he did not get more support throughout the county. It had been a pleasure to him to do what he could, and he hoped to continue to do so. (Applause.)
