**THE SUMMER GAME**

**CORNWALL'S FIRST INNINGS WIN OVER DEVON**

Cornwall opened their Minor Counties competition programme at Camborne, on Friday, when they were opposed by their neighbours, Devon. The home county routed mainly on last season's players, the only new comers being V. Bickford, H. Hancock, and V.C.P.O. Cornish, of the R.N. Barracks, Devonport.

On a wicket greatly affected by rain, batsmen fared ingloriously. Cornwall won the toss and elected to have first knock, Commander Irwin and Scholefield opening the innings, and the attack of Sturt and Amory. The batsmen showed extreme caution, and runs came slowly. With only 16 runs scored, Sturt dismissed Scholefield with a smart single-handed catch in the slips. J. V. Bentley joined Irwin, and the first boundary hit was scored by Bentley, after 45 minutes play. The rate of scoring improved, and the stand for the second wicket produced 31 runs. The half-century was reached after 75 minutes play. At 74 Irwin was stumped, after giving an attractive display for 40 runs. With only two runs added, two more wickets fell, and at the luncheon interval half the side were out for 84. Only half-an-hour's play was necessary after the resumption to finish off the home county's innings for 114 runs.

Devon batsmen opened badly, three wickets falling for less than 30 runs, and in an hour and 45 minutes the side were dismissed for 91. Carter hit merrily during his brief stay. None of the Devon batsmen showed any mastery over the Cornish bowling. Beecher Williams was in excellent form, taking six wickets for 26 runs in 14 overs. The holding of the Cornishmen left little to be desired.

**Second Knock.**

When Cornwall commenced their second innings, the light was bad, and bowlers continued to have matters all their own way. The Cornishmen failed to take advantage of their first innings lead, and when play ceased for the day were only 81 runs on, with two wickets in hand.

Not a ball could be bowled on Saturday, and the match was abandoned as a draw, Cornwall gaining the first innings points.

**RAIN-SPOIL GAMES.**

For the third Saturday in succession Cornish cricket clubs' programmes have been interfered with by rain. Last Saturday rain fell in torrents at many places. A few games were commenced but were not played to a finish. At St. Columb the game between St. Columb and St. Ervan was abandoned. The visitors completed an innings for 16 runs. For St. Columb, C. Nail took four wickets for five runs, including three wickets in the first over for no runs, and A. J. Tretthewey got six for 11. A start was made in the Junior League game between Illogan and Hayle, but the game was abandoned owing to the weather, and the teams agreed to divide the points. Owing to the bad weather the match between Truro City and Newquay was again postponed, on Saturday. This was the third successive occasion on which inclement weather has prevented play.

**PROBUS SCHOOL DEFEAT VERYAN.**

By 78 runs to 66, Probus School defeated Veryan, on Thursday. The outstanding batsmen for the School were J. Teague 27, C. Leamon 20, and P. Nicholls 18. Veryan lost four wickets for 13 runs, but thanks to W. Rundle (25), and A. Johns (31), they succeeded in getting within twelve of their opponents total. For Probus, P. Nicholls secured five wickets for 23 runs, J. Teague three for 31, and C. Pentecost two for four. For Veryan, C. Johns claimed five wickets for 14 runs, H. Whitford three for 17, and R. Tregunna two for 17.

**GORRAN BOWLER'S "HAT TRICK."**

Playing for Gorran, at home, against Probus School, on Saturday, H. Whetter performed the "hat trick," his analysis being three wickets for five runs in two overs. The School compiled 33 runs for the loss of seven wickets, J. Teague having 20 runs to his credit. Gorran's innings yielded 31 runs (G. Kempthorne 14). Teague and Nicholls bowled well for Probus, taking six for 18 and four for 12 respectively. For Gorran, T. Penrice took three wickets for 13 runs, and H. Whetter three for five.

**LOSTWITHIEL'S EASY WIN.**

Lostwithiel won comfortably by seven wickets in their Lostwithiel and District League game with Bocomnoc, on Saturday. Bocomnoc were dismissed for 38 runs (D. Courst 13, H. Stead 12), and Lostwithiel collected 49 runs for the loss of three wickets, the principal scorers being R. Laddie 21 and R. Santo 12. For Lostwithiel, the Rev. J. Groser was in capital bowling form, capturing six wickets for 16 runs, and L. Brewer got three for 17.

**MAWNAW'S SUPERB BOWLING.**

Graham scored 53 not out, W. G. J. Harvey 16, H. Barncourt 13 not out, H. S. Graham has now the remarkable average of 204 in Cornish League cricket this season.

Rain fell throughout the match between Peack and Perranwell, on the former's ground, on Saturday when Perranwell won by 37 runs to 14. Parsons (16) was top scorer for the winners.

Truro won by 40 runs in their home match with Redruth County School. The School knocked up 56 runs, the top scorers being Dunsfield 16 and Bennetts 15. Truro replied with 96, the principal contributors being J. Nile 26, H. Pendray 22, and W. H. Richards 14.

CORNWALL v. MONMOUTH.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Cornwall opened their second match in the Minor Counties Championship, at the Sports Grounds, Penzance, on Friday afternoon, when they met Monmouth. The start had been deferred till 2 p.m., consequently there was no play before lunch. The weather was ideal. The match had been set aside by the Cornwall Cricket Club as a "benefit" for Whiting, the popular Penzance and county "pro," who has rendered such signal service to cricket in the Delectable Duchy during the past sixteen years.

Tresawna, the Cornish captain, won the toss, and Cornwall opened with Irwin and Scholfield. Raikes and Harris took up the attack. Both batsmen opened steadily, and each early got a boundary off Harris. With 20 on the board Scholfield drove Raikes to the boundary. When 30 had been scored, Irwin was missed at extra cover by Rust off Harris. Williams went on vice Raikes when 40 had been signalled. With a fine drive to the boundary Irwin sent up the half-century. The batsmen were now hitting with some freedom. At 69 another change of bowling was tried, P. G. Phillips (the Monmouth skipper) taking Williams' place. Monmouth's first success came when 78 had been scored, Harris beating Irwin, who had scored 33 by good cricket. Bentley filled the gap, but was out to the second ball after scoring a single.

The third wicket fell at 100. Cory being stumped after making 8. The remainder of the Cornwall wickets fell very cheaply, Harris capturing them all, having the remarkable average of nine for 62. In his last two overs Harris took seven wickets for seven runs.

Monmouth started far from well, and they lost two wickets for 15 runs. Williams, however, batted finely, and was only beaten lbw., when he had made 41. Little support was afforded by any of his colleagues, and on a capital wicket, Monmouth could only compile 89.

With only three-quarters of an hour remaining, matters looked rosy for Cornwall, but disaster came early. In the first over of the second innings, both Irwin and Tresawna were dismissed without a run being registered on the board, and a little later Scholfield was run out. When stumps were drawn at 7.15, five of Cornwall's best batsmen had been dismissed for the paltry total of 25 runs.

An unexpected change came over the weather during the night. There was every promise that the glorious sunshine and fresh breeze of Friday would be repeated, but, instead, the wind changed to the west, accompanied by a drizzle.

Bentley and Cory resumed their innings at 11.30, under a leaden sky, but the drizzle had ceased. The batsmen opened very cautiously and runs came gradually. Phillips and Harris took up the attack but met with no success, and the batsmen, gaining confidence, put more power into their drives. Each had boundaries to their credit, when Bentley lifted Harris out of the long boundary for 6. With boundaries coming more frequently, Cornwall's hopes revived. The danger of over-confidence, however, was always present, and when the score was 87 Bentley gave a chance to R. M. Phillips. The players carried the score to 107, when Bentley was taken in the slips by Harris. Cornish succeeded Bentley, and soon Cory scored his half-century. With the score 124 Cory was missed by Smith. Bickford hit out vigorously, getting two 4's and a six in the same over. He hit 22 off five balls, and then was again missed by Williams. Scoring was now much more rapid and the game far more lively.

Bickford continued his merry pace after lunch, and quickly raised his total to 77, when he was beaten by Harris, whilst Cory continued to add steadily to his score, and was given an ovation when he had completed his century.

With assistance from Pecher Williams, Cory took his score to 124—one of the finest efforts in the annals of Cornwall county cricket. The innings closed for 292.

Monmouth were faced with an almost impossible task, and almost from the start, the result was a foregone conclusion. There was one factor, however, that Cornwall had to contend against, and this was the prospect of rain, which became more imminent as the game progressed with two wickets to fall it began to descend, and an adjournment to the pavilion must have been a certainty in a few more minutes, but Whiting made victory secure by taking both wickets in the same over. BOYS BEAT CORNISH SIDE.

KEEN GAME AT REDRUTH.

The match between twelve representing a Cornish side and fourteen players from the Cornwall Schools at Redruth on Tuesday, proved most attractive, and will do much to foster the game in Secondary and other schools in the county. The County side were well represented and included many veterans, whilst the Schools included Truro Cathedral School for the first time, and R. C. Parrett, the representative, justified his inclusion. His bowling proved too good for the County XI., and when 80 was registered, eight wickets had fallen, of which Parrett was responsible for 6. With the assistance of Clook, the County were beaten after 90 minutes, making 95.

L. Tamblin (Redruth) and I. Stobey (Truro College), opened for the Schools, but the former's stay was of short duration, Hawke getting his wicket for 4. T. H. Nicholls (Probus) was the next to go on, but what promised to have been a decent partnership was broken by Stobey being stumped when the register read 15. H. D. Thomas (Redruth) stopped the rot, however, and before he was caught by Trevorthen he made 17, which included a six. Parrett and Thomas brought the total to 64 before the former was beaten by Gundry's deadly delivery. The Cathedral School representative made 13. Thomas closed his innings for 22, the result of fine play. Rees (Penzance) and D. Couch (Truro College) were soon separated, the latter coming out lbw. B. Sawle (Falmouth) was beaten by his first ball from Hawke, and a minute later Rees followed suit. A real rot set in and ten wickets were down for 85 the last three scoring only 8. THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL'S DECISIVE VICTORY

There were several surprising turns in the Minor Counties competition match between Cornwall and Monmouth, which commenced at Penzance, on Friday. Whiting, the Cornish professional, who has rendered yeoman service to the county for a number of years, took a well-deserved holiday. The home county batted first, and caused the visiting attack considerable anxiety. The century was noted by the Cornishmen before the third wicket fell, Commander Irwin and Scholefield having added in the first 30. Scholefield contributed 37, and Irwin 35, and neither of the remaining batsmen reached double figures. The tall end offered a feeble resistance, and the innings closed for 124 runs. The bowlers, who were out for 24 runs, bowled exceptionally well for Monmouth, taking nine wickets for 62 runs. Monmouth batted next, and were in their century at the wickets against the bowling of Williams and Cornish, who were not easily playable. K. Harris 26, B. Williams 21, K. C. Raikes 13 and Rust 10 were the only batsmen who made an effective stand. The visitors' innings yielded 89 runs, and Cornwall started their second innings with 39 runs in hand, but things went dead against them. Irwin and Tresawna were out in the first over without a single run being made. At the end of the days play five Cornish wickets had fallen for 25 runs. It looked a fairly easy thing for the Welshmen, but the glorious uncertainty of the game stalked out on Saturday morning. Rust had fallen overnight and the wicket was easy. Bentley and Cory went out to bat, and competently altered the game, putting on 62 runs before the Penzance player was sent in, after making 42. Cory plodded along resolutely, punching the loose balls. Partridge, by Bickford, who played forceful cricket, Cory reached his hundred, and had a fine ovation from the crowd, whose spirits had risen appreciably. At last Cory had his made 124 in a great innings, although he had given an occasional chance. It was a fine effort, because it came when it was badly needed. Bickford's was another fine innings. He made 77, and played the right game at the right moment, by forcing the game. Cornwall's second innings produced only eight runs short of the 500. The Welshmen were set to get 328 runs to secure a win. They did better than at their first venture, but their last wicket fell, just as rain was setting in, for a total of 123. Cornwall had pulled the game around rather unexpectedly and won by 204 runs.

A BRILLIANT RECOVERY

CORNWALL'S REMARKABLE PLAY AGAINST BERKSHIRE

In delightful weather and on an ideal wicket, Cornwall opened their third game for the season in the Minor Counties Championship, at Roskear ground, Camborne, on Monday, when Berkshire were the visitors. The alterations from the team that beat Monmouth, at Penzance, the previous Friday and Saturday, were Dr. A. C. Hancock (st. Asnes) and Trevarthen (st. Redruth), who played vice Cornish and Bentley. The Berkshire side included A. P. F. Chapman, a Cambridge Blue, who gave such a fine exhibition for the Gentlemen v. Players at Lords recently. Berkshire won the toss and decided to bat first. R. J. F. Remnant and Greaves opening the innings, but at eight Beecher Williams clean bowled Greaves. Misfortune continued to befall the visitors up to the lunch hour, Remnant being the only batsman to show anything like form. Four wickets were down for 45 and seven for 46. At lunch the score was 76 for nine. On the resumption, Hawkesworth gave the bowlers a considerable amount of trouble and hit freely. Twice he lifted the ball clean out of the ground. He soon obtained 50 runs, which put an entirely different complexion on the game. Beecher Williams came on at the top end in place of Whiting, and in his second over succeeded in disposing of Hawkesworth. The innings closed for 132—a much higher score than at one time seemed probable. Cornwall opened very badly, losing four wickets for 17 runs. Scholefield and C. V. Paul were the opening pair, but in his first over Chapman best Scholefield. Commander Irwin's partnership with Paul was of short duration, the latter being sent back by Hawkesworth when he had made only seven—the total runs registered. Cory, who gave such a fine display against Monmouth, was unfortunate in being given out l.b.w., after making a steady 77. Irwin and Irwin were not long together, the latter being finely caught at mid-on by R. J. F. Remnant. From now on a rot seemed to set in and there was a procession of batsmen to the pavilion at short intervals. Bickford was the only batsman to make figures, and the innings closed for 55 after less than two hours' play.

A feature of Berkshire's second innings was the beautiful exhibition given by Chapman. Going in fourth wicket with the score at 50, he had 75 minutes' play, during which he contributed ten 6's and three 4's towards a superb 78, not marred by a single fault. Seven wickets were down for 184, and thanks to two brilliant catches by Cory, the remaining batsmen did not add a run to the score. When Cornwall resumed the game on Tuesday morning they were faced with the serious proposition of having to make 95 to win. The weather was cloudy and cold, but the light showers had not interfered with the condition of the wicket. Cornwall's first two wickets fell cheaply for 29, and when the register read 46 Trevarthen was caught and bowled by Hawkesworth for three.

Cornwall then made a wonderful rally. Irwin and Scholefield, by starting play, brought the total to 110 after 40 minutes' batting. Scholefield's contribution being 50. A few minutes later he was elven out l.b.w. when the total was 118. The high standard of play was well maintained when Cory partnered Irwin, and at the lunch interval the telegraph board read 166 with Irwin 69 and Cory 25. On the resumption 20 minutes' play brought the total to 198 when Cory was finely caught by Greaves behind the wickets after making 39. Bickford hit out freely, and after 40 minutes' play the total registered was 234, leaving Bickford with 20 to win. Irwin's score being 35. Bickford knocked Hawkesworth out of the field for six. At three o'clock Cornwall declared with 257 runs for six wickets, thus winning by four wickets. Scores—

CORNWALL V. DORSET.

HOMESTERS LOSE 6 WICKETS FOR 37

WONDERFUL RALLY.

Cornwall opened a two days' match with Dorset in connection with the Minor Counties Championship at Penzance on Wednesday morning. The weather was unfavourable, a misty rain falling during the day. The mist however did not interfere with the condition of the wicket which favoured the batsmen. Cornwall made a change at the last moment, Clarence Paull (Camborne) playing vice J. V. Bentley (Penzance). The Cornishmen won the toss and went to the wickets against the deliveries of Bartlett and Harrison. The innings opened disastrously and in less than an hour's play six wickets had fallen for 37. Harrison, the Dorset bowler, was deadly and in quick succession he dismissed 4 wickets for 11. When he had made a single Scholefield fell a victim to Bartlett. Then came the procession. Harrison got rid of Clarence Paull for one, Irwin for two, Rust for one and Trevarthen for 7. Five wickets fell when the telegraph read 13. Six wickets fell for 37, when Bickford partnered Capt. Smith. The Cornish wicket-keeper was in fine form and seemed to stop the rot. He got a six and two fours off Harrison in one over. Although the light was very bad, these players got along well until Smith was beaten by Cummins after making 14. The partnership totalled 75 for 7. Escott, the ex-Camborne skipper, was the next to go in, but in an endeavour to snatch an extra run Bickford was run out after making 28, which included a six and three 4's. Escott was dismissed by Cummins after making one, and nine wickets were down for 88. Beecher Williams and Whiting brought the score to a century and went along merrily, boundaries by each player being frequent. In spite of the rather free scoring, the fielding of the Dorset men left nothing to be desired. Whiting and Williams provided the bit-bit of the game and it was not until the score reached 115 that Whiting was stumped by Elderton.

DORSET.

Dorset opened with Elderton and Knight opposing Escott and Beecher Williams. Runs came slowly at the start, but Elderton got moving with three nice boundaries after fifteen minutes play when the total registered 17. Knight was beaten by Beecher Williams after making 2. Busk came on and every opportunity was taken to "steal" runs with the result that 31 had been compiled after twenty minutes, towards which Elderton had contributed 24. The light was abominable, the misty rain lunging over the wicket like a fog. Trevarthen bowled vice Whiting, but runs still came and half a century was registered after three-quarters of an hour's play.

The players seemed to be "set" and a frequent change of bowlers had no effect. Busk sent Smith's second ball to boundary, and then the game was stopped on account of rain with the total at 69, Elderton 52 not out and Busk 35 not out. When the game was resumed, Elderton got two sixes and two of Escott in the first over. Trevarthen gave Elderton got two sixes and two off Escott 75, and this was the first chance either of the batsmen gave during the innings. Cory tried a turn at bowling, but the runs continued to come more freely and with only one wicket down the visitors had brought the score to 130 after 100 minutes play. After Elderton had made 83 he was caught by Whiting. Elderton's innings included two sixes and seven fours. Chadwick and Busk continued to score freely when the former was caught by Escott after making 33.

After the tea interval Walby was bowled by Whiting after contributing ten. The register read 230-4-10. A few minutes later play had to be abandoned on account of rain. Busk had eight fours and one six in his unfinished innings.

THURSDAY.

Busk and Jephson went in this morning. Both batsmen were "not outs" and Busk needed three more to complete his century. Fortunately he made his three, but was then caught by Bickford off Whiting. Runs were now coming very freely, and Jephson was clean bowled by Escott after making 16. Gooden was next in, but was clean bowled by Whiting. The telegraph read 249-7-0. Escott at the top end was bowling smartly, and had the batsmen in difficulties frequently. The fielding of the Cornish side was very keen and left nothing to be desired. Beecher Williams went on at the bottom end vice Whiting. Harrison was hitting at everything and got Escott to the boundary for six. Cory went on vice Escott, and Harrison claimed seven off him in his first over. Bartlett pulled Cory to leg for a nice four, but in the next ball he was beaten by Cory after making 18. Cummins was next in and Trevarthen went on vice Williams, and in the last ball of the over he was beaten by the Redruth "pro." The telegraph registered 303-9-2. Cox was bowled by Trevarthen and Harrison carried out his bat for a nicely contributed 53. The Dorset innings closed for 303.

CORNWALL.

Cornwall opened with Paull and Scholefield, and in the first over off Harrison Paull scored 8. The batsmen started very cautiously, and when at 10 Paull gave a chance in the deep field. After being in about half an hour and making 12 Paull was caught by Elderton off Bartlett. Irwin was next in and hit Bartlett

to the boundary for a four. Walby went on vice Harrison and his first over was a maiden. Both Scholefield and Irwin played with extreme caution and the bowlers were backed up by good fielding. Irwin pulled Bartlett to the leg beautifully, but only scored a single. Cummins went on vice Bartlett but he met with little success. Irwin knocked Cummins to the boundary for four, and fifty was registered. Two runs later Irwin was beautifully caught in the long field by Bartlett off Cummins. Telegraph 52-2-13. Cory took Irwin's place and scored a single off Walby, but Cory was out lbw to Cummins after making 1. At one o'clock lunch was taken when the score stood at 58 for 5 wickets, Scholefield not out 25, Rust not out 0.

After lunch Rust and Scholefield continued, but Rust's stay was short, he being clean bowled by Walby for 3. Trevarthen, the Redruth "pro," was in next and after making a couple he was nearly run out. Scholefield was still in, his contribution being 38, which included 4 four's and 3 two's. The telegraph read 67-4-3. Trevarthen was batting very steadily and hit Cummins to the leg beautifully for four. Harrison went on at the bottom end and in his first ball Trevarthen was caught in the slips by Jephson. When Bickford went in it was thought that he would be of some assistance to Scholefield, but in the fourth ball of the over he was caught by Walby off Harrison. Smith was not at all at home to the bowling of Harrison, and he was on one or two occasions beaten by him. Scholefield got three off Harrison and 100 were registered. Scholefield's contribution being 50. Smith was scoring very slowly, being in quite twenty minutes before he made a couple. In attempting a run Smith was run out at 106 for 7, he having made 8.
