## MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Cornwall opened their second match Cornwall opened their second match in the Minor Counties Championship, at the Sports Grounds. Penzance, on Friday) afternoon, when they met Monmouth. The start had been deferred till 2 p.m., consequently there was no play before lunch. The weather was ideal. The match had been set uside by the Cornwall O icket Club as a "benefit" for Whiting, the popular Penzance and county "pro," who has rendered such signal service to crecket in the Delectable Duchy during the past sixteen years.

Tresawna, the Cornish captain, won the toss, and Cornwall opened with Irwin and Scholfield. Raikes and Harris took up the attack. Both batsmen opened steadily, and each early got a boundary off Harris. With 20 on the board Scholfield drove Raikes to the boundary. When 30 had been scored, Irwin was missed at extra cover by Rust off Harris. Williams went on vice Raikes when 40 had been signalled. With a fine drive to the boundary Irwin sent up the half-century. The batsmen were now hitting with some freedom. At 69 another change of bowling was tried, F. G. Phillips (the Monmouth's first success came when 78 had been scored, Harris beating Irwin, who had scored 33 by good cricket. Bentley filled the gap, but was out to the second ball after scoring a single.

The third wicket fell at 100. Cory being stumped after making 8. The remainder of the Cornwall wickets fell very chenply, Haeris capturing them all, having the remarkable average of nine for 62. In his last two overs Harris took seven wickets for seven runs. Monmouth started far from well, and they lost two wickets for 15 runs. Williams, however, batted finely, and was only beaten llw., when he had made 41. Little support was afforded by any of his colleagues, and on a capital wicket, Monmouth could only compile 89.

With only three-puarters of an hour remaining, matters looked rosy for Cornwall, but disaster came early. In the first over of the second innings, both Irwin and Tresawna were dismissed without a run being tegistered on the board, and a little later Scholefield was run out. When stumps were drawn a 7.15, five of Cornwall's thest batsmen had been dismissed for the pultry total of 25 runs.

Phillips and Harris took up the attack but met with no success, and the batsmen, gaining confidence, put more power into their drives. Each had boundaries to their credit, when Bontley lifted Harris out of the long boundary for 6. With boundaries coming more frequently, Cornwall's hopes revived. The danger of over-confidence, however, was always present, and when the accre was 87 Bentley gave a chance to R. M. Phillips. The players carried the score to 107, when Bentley was taken in the slips by Harris. Cornish succeeded Bentley, and soon Cory scored his half-century. With the score 124 Cory was missed by Smith. Bickford hit out vigorously, getting two 4's and a six in the same over. He hit 22 off five balls, and then was again missed by Williams. Scoring was now much more rapid and the game far more lively.
