ARRANGEMENTS OF THE LOCAL CLUBS.

IMPROVEMENTS AT EDBGASTON

There will be no Australian team striding victoriously among us this year, no Test matches to induce us to despair, and there is consequently not the blazing of expectation in the air that there was on the eve of the cricket season twelve months ago. Nevertheless, the opening of the cricket season of 1922 is being impatiently awaited, and in every town and village in the country the first notes of the pavilion bell calling the players to the wicket and the spectators to their seats will fall on glad ears. Since the end of August, 1920, a great many illusions about the state of English cricket have been shattered. The failure of Douglas's team in the Commonwealth was a corrective to over-confidence, but as a medicine it was mild compared with the drastic doses administered in this country by Armstrong and his compatriots last season. Draughts they were beyond all doubt, but health-giving if properly regarded, and it is their chastening influence which should impart interest and vitality to English first-class cricket in the immediate future. Players and supporters alike can now take stock of the game with a clearer vision; a balance sheet has been presented, the deficiencies proved, and the way is clear for sound reconstruction, with calmness and without haste. The restoration of English cricket to its former high standard will probably be slow and laborious, but progress in this direction is likely to be assisted by the disarray into which such uglinesses as the two-eyed stumps in batting is falling, and the energy with which bed-length bowling and elevenfold fielding—two of the biggest blots last season—have been pilloried during the winter months at annual meetings and elsewhere. If these faults can be cured English cricket will rapidly recover its prestige.

There are no Test matches to be played, but as a result of last season's experiences there will be important trial matches between North and South, in addition to the usual Gentlemen v. Players games to stir the ambition of young players, and at the end of the season a team will be dispatched to South Africa. With these honours in view there should be a good deal of zest in the county championship tournament, which begins on May 3rd, when Leicestershire meet Notts.

A DERBYSHIRE NURSERY.

All the county clubs regard their prospects hopefully, although none can announce confidently the acquisition of a young player of potential All-England rank. There is, however, a very keen search proceeding for young talent, and various expedients are being adopted to discover and encourage it. Derbyshire, among other clubs, have adopted the idea, well-established in Kent and elsewhere, of a nursery. Lancashire have called in as instructor and captain of their second eleven steven the expert assistance of that past-master of the game, Archie MacLennan, and Warwickshire, taking their own line, are offering special membership terms to youths who wish to have practice facilities. Pending the arrival into the first eleven of the youngsters the majority of county elevens will be constituted very much on last season's lines. Middlesex, the champions, will again be captained by F. T. Mann, and he will have full forte at his command, including Hearne who is now in much improved health. Two other invalids are on the active list again—Hobbs and Mead, and are expected to make early appearances in the ranks of Surrey and Hampshire respectively, and Rhodes, after a winter in India, will again

be one of the stalwarts of Yorkshire. The wingers of the white rose arm to be captained by Geoffrey Wilson, who has succeeded D. C. F. Burton. Lancashire report no important changes in personnel, and will continue under the leadership of Myka Kenyon; and Kent, who have lost the services of Fairhurst, will again be led by L. H. W. Troughton.

The Midland county clubs, whose prospects are dealt with in detail in this article, and another to appear later, are all in cheerful mood. Warwickshire, who will continue to have the Hon. F. S. G. Calthorpe as captain, will be strengthened by the regular presence of N. E. Partridge, the old Malvernian and Cambridge bowler and batsman; Worcestershire will have W. H. Taylor as captain, and will occasionally include in their ranks Gilbert Ashton, last year's Cambridge captain; Northants, with V. W. C. Jupp as secretary, have been placed in a sound financial position, though they will miss the loss of Haywood, who has become a school master in Scotland; Leicestershire, with Major Lewis as captain, will be powerful in attack, as Goss and Skelding have ceased league cricket and will play regularly; and Derbyshire, who have a new captain in G. R. Jackson, hope that their nursery will produce useful additions to their resources.

WORCESTERSHIRE'S OUTLOOK.

A NEW CLASS OF MEMBERSHIP CREATED.

The first three postal deliveries following the issue of tickets to members of the Warwickshire County Cricket Club brought to the secretary, Mr. R. V. Ryder, subscriptions amounting to £200. Such a prompt response was a happy augury for the coming season, and suggests that the membership, which received a big fillip last season, will be maintained. There is, indeed, a possibility of an increase because a new class of membership has been created which enables youths of 15 to 18 years of age to join the club and enjoy the privileges of afternoon practice at the wickets and of witnessing all matches from the pavilion for an annual subscription of fifteen shillings. A sound financial position is very helpful in inducing success in the field, and consequently the knowledge that the club is well supported enables all ranks to take a cheerful view of their playing prospects. Last season, it may be remembered, Warwickshire did fairly well in the opening month of the season and then were afflicted by a series of accidents to the three men who were the mainstays of the attack, and thus crippled they had to fight an uphill battle against heavy odds for the remainder of the season. But as they had a great deal more than their share of bad luck twelve months ago the hope is that fortune will look on them with a more kindly countenance this year, and that victory will more often be their portion.

Duckworth's cheerful expansive smile will be missed at Edgbaston, for he has finished with county cricket, and has gone to impart the secret of his bowley style to the naval officers in training at Dartmouth, and business claims will prevent G. W. Stephens from playing. Business may also delay the absence of G. A. Rotherham, but with these three exceptions there will be little change in the personnel of the team. The Hon. F. S. G. Calthorpe will again captain the side, and amateurs will support him are N. E. Partridge, who now stands qualified by Warwickshire, and whose round skill as bowler and batsman should prove a asset; G. A. Kiddian-Green, R. L. Holden, R. L. Hobbs, H. L. Stannet, Rev. H. P. Chappell, Commander Cowan, G. M. Nelson, K. B. Rouse, F. R. Santall, H. G. A. Gould, G. H. Price, H. J. Kittermaster, E. P. Howson, G. H. Smith, E. P. Green, T. W. Burnell, and R. G. Smith. The professionals available are Smith and Bowden, the latter when Lancashire visit

Howell (A.), Smart (J.), Smart (G.), and Fox, the last-named being a young local left-hand bowler who was on the bowling staff last season. Strength and variety in bowling are obviously lacking, and must remain so until the young men who have been added to the ground staff become qualified; but there is material from which to select a useful team and if, as the captain urged at the annual meeting, the standard of fielding is raised to a more creditable level this season's record should show improvement on last year's. The players qualifying for Warwickshire, it may be added, are A. J. W. Crom (Boris), right-hand batsman; W. Clarkson (Lancashire), left-hand bowler; G. Duckworth (Warrington), wicket-keeper; G. A. Jennings (Devonshire), slow left-hand bowler; J. W. Martin (Eastbourne), right-hand batsman; and H. A. White (Hereford), medium fast bowler. L. Santall will continue to act as coach.

THE PROGRAMME.

The season will open on May 13, when Worcester visit Edgbaston. Another home match, against Sussex, follows immediately, and subsequently all the other counties except Essex and Glamorganshire, will be met, 28 county championship matches being played, while Cambridge University are opposed at Fenner's in May. An important item in the fixture list is the match with Notts, who have not met Warwickshire since 1894. Actually this will be the first championship match between the counties, for Warwickshire were not admitted to the competition until 1895, and in connection with the latter event it is interesting to note that it was then that Mr. R. V. Ryder took over the secretaryship of the Warwickshire Club—a record of service which is probably unequalled. Fixtures have also been arranged which will afford prospective county players useful match practice. There will be the customary home and away second eleven matches against Derbyshire II., and, in addition, two-day home and away Club and Ground matches against the Notts and Gloucestershire Club and Ground teams respectively, and one-day home and away games with Northants Club and Ground. The Public School matches, which have been an interesting feature of the last two seasons, will be continued, August 16, 17 and 18 being allotted for this purpose.

During the winter important work has been carried out at the ground, the playing surface having been improved and the accommodation for spectators extended by an enlargement of the banking at the Calthorpe Park end of the ground. Alterations have also been made to the pavilion, and much needed improvements effected in connection with the dressing-room arrangements for professionals. The new arrangement provides rooms adjoining each other for the home and visiting professionals, and these rooms are equipped with baths and all necessary appurtenances.

WORCESTERSHIRE RECRUITS.

W. H. TAYLOR SUCCEEDS M. F. S.
JEWELL AS CAPTAIN.

Worcestershire are one of the few county clubs, perhaps the only one in the first-class list, who have not increased the annual subscription of members. The fee is still one guinea, which is a modest sum in these days. Last season the membership roll contained 1,300 names, and Major C. V. Beresford, the honorary secretary, cherishes a confident hope that all those subscriptions will be renewed. The committee of the Club are certainly showing enterprise which entitles them to liberal support. An attractive fixture list, embracing home and away matches with thirteen counties have been arranged, and the home matches are being distributed over four centres in the county—Worcester, Kidderminster, Dudley, and Stourbridge. Further than that, an important concession has been renewed by the local railway companies who, within a radius of sixty miles, will issue return tickets at the rate of a fare and a third to the Worcestershire towns concerned on match days. Another forward step taken since last season has been the improvement of the accommodation for spectators at Worcester. A strong new stand has been erected, and generally the arrangements around the enclosure have been smartened up and re-painted. The ground, of course, is from the playing point of view one of the best in England, and Hunt, who continues to have charge, has got it into excellent condition for the opening of the season.

M. F. S. Jewell, who captained the team in 1920 and 1921, expects to play regularly during the coming season, but he has relinquished the leadership, and will be succeeded in that position by W. H. Taylor, who resumes a rôle he filled in pre-war cricket. The majority of the men who played last season are available this year, and there are some additions, the most notable being Gilbert Ashton, who was the Cambridge captain last season, and who is now a schoolmaster in the county—at Abberley Hall.

NEW PLAYERS.

He will only be able to play when scholastic duties permit, but whatever assistance he can give should be of solid value to the team and highly attractive from the spectators' point of view. L. W. Greenwood, who is also engaged at Abberley Hall, is a useful batsman who may be expected to accompany the ex-Cambridge skipper, and other new-comers will be J. McLean, a wicket-keeper and batsman, Dr. Bunting, a batsman, and Corbett, a medium-paced right-hand bowler. It is unfortunate that C. G. W. Robson, the Old Malvernian, who distinguished himself with the bat in the few matches he took part in last season, will not be available, as he is on military duty at Constantinople, and A. N. Jewell, though much improved in health, does not expect to be fit enough to play this season, but there is a numerous band of amateurs upon whose services the club can rely. M. E. Foster and H. A. Gilbert will play regularly, and others who are likely to be seen are H. L. Higgins, A. M. Carr, H. O. Hopkins, Hon. J. Coventry, Rev. R. H. Fowler, V. W. Humpherson, G. B. Ponsonby, E. Somers-Smith, W. E. Richardson, G. G. F. Greig, G. H. Seely, and J. W. C. Turner. On the professional side Bowley and Pearson will be the mainstays. Both have been in excellent form at the nets, and look like repeating their successes of last season. Other professionals at the service of the club are Tarbox, who made a promising beginning last season and developed well, Preece, Root, Turner, and Summers. The committee, incidentally, have decided to recognise the services of Ernest Bale, who was familiar as the Worcestershire wicket-keeper in pre-war days, by opening a subscription list on his behalf and giving him the proceeds of a ground collection during the August Bank Holiday match against Essex at Worcester.

A satisfactory feature of the match programme is that the fixture with Yorkshire, which was not in last season's list, has been removed, and a match with Sussex has also been arranged. Of the home games, Lancashire, Hampshire, Somerset, Gloucester, Notts, Northants, Essex, Glamorgan, Sussex and Derbyshire, will be met at Worcester, Yorkshire at Dudley, Kent at Kidderminster, and Warwickshire at Stourbridge.

NOTTINGHAM FORCE COMFORTABLE
VICTORY.

By better all-round play, Nottingham Club and Ground achieved a good win over Warwickshire Club and Ground yesterday at Edgbaston by 162 runs. The outstanding feature of the last day's play was the prolific stand by Walker and L. N. Durand, who scored 132 for the second wicket in seventy minutes. Both players gave unceasined returns after passing the fifty mark, but otherwise their batting was faultless. Walker carried his bat for 118, which included fourteen 4's, while the amateur hit nine 4's. The home side were set the big task of making 385 in the three and half hours remaining, but never shaped like accomplishing it. B. Flint made the ball get up sharply, and both Croom and Jennings were temporarily hurt. The latter together with White made quite a resolute stand, and scored so freely that 60 runs were added in half an hour for the seventh wicket. Morter made a few hard hits, but B. Flint then finished of the innings, taking four wickets for 28 runs, while Smallwood took three wickets for 48 runs. Scores:—

BIRMINGHAM LEAGUE.

THE CHAMPIONS ECLIPSED AT WALSALL.

Sensational cricket was witnessed at Walsall on Saturday when Walsall and Old Hill met in a game which was of exceptional interest by reason of the fact that neither had yet been defeated this season. The League champions were, in fact, playing their thirteenth game (an unlucky number as events turned out) since they were last beaten in a League match, and their previous performances this season suggested that Walsall would find them doughty opponents. The visitors were fortunate in being able to play their full side, but Walsall lacked the services of L. J. Taylor, A. T. Lyons, the old Villa footballer, filling the upper vacancy. The home team, however, held the upper hand all through, and gained a surprisingly easy victory, largely owing to a wonderful bowling performance by Sedgwick, the Staffordshire bowler, who took eight Old Hill wickets for 20 runs. The fast was all the more meritorious because the conditions favoured run-getting, and the Old Hill bowlers were more or less ineffective when Walsall were batting. Sedgwick has now taken 31 wickets in five League games this season for 113 runs, or less than 4 runs per wicket. Walsall were fortunate in batting first, and they made good use of their advantage. Hewson and Pollock put on 34 for the first wicket, and to 10 went up with two wickets down. Taylor, who went in when three were down for 68, gave a sharp chance to the wicket-keeper before he had scored, but Danks failed to accept it, and runs afterwards came freely, the total being taken to 113 when Hewson ran himself out. Taylor and Lyons afterwards put on runs at a good pace. Taylor reached his 50 in sixty-five minutes, and the score was taken to 206 before Lyons was bowled. Taylor then scored more rapidly, and made a hit for 6, but when wanting one to reach his century he was out to a brilliant catch in the long field, Forrest falling as he took the ball, but retaining it in his grasp. Walsall closed their innings with a total 256, leaving Old Hill nearly two hours and a half in which to get the runs. The start which the visitors made hardly indicated the collapse which was to follow, as 20 was on the board before a wicket fell, but Sedgwick dismissed Greaves and H. W. Homer without addition to the total. T. F. Horner and Yates made a praiseworthy attempt to avert further disaster, but had only added 2 runs when Sedgwick got past T. F. Horner's defence. Yates hit the Walsall professional to the off-boundary, but Sedgwick immediately afterwards dismissed him with a ball which broke a bail. The batsmen after this were hopelessly at sea with Sedgwick's deliveries, the Walsall bowler not only bowing at a great pace, but occasionally making the ball get up awkwardly. Forrest was fifth out with the total 30, and Sedgwick took his sixth wicket by clean bowling Platt. The remainder of the innings was little better than a procession. Sedgwick finishing it off by sending Edwards's off-stump flying. On a pitch which evidently suited him, he had bowled magnificently, and was carried by the crowd shoulder high to the pavilion. The gate was a record for the Walsall ground, and probably for the League, the attendance being over 3,500 and the takings £115.

CASUALTIES AT CAPE HILL

THE UNITY'S HANDICAP AGAINST MITCHELLS AND BUTLERS.

The word "casualty" had a dual significance at Cape Hill. The fact that Aston Unity succumbed in quite surprising fashion was but one interpretation. H. L. Simms was injured at Nottingham and L. Jones at Old Hill. The former's disability rendered it necessary for a "sub" to field, and two of the home side fell victims. White, the profes-

sional, was overcome by the heat after he had sent down five overs. This weakened the attack and enabled Mitchells and Butlers to rattle up a good score. Edden (who went in to bowl when White quitted the game) had a large measure of success; at one point he had secured seven wickets for 7 apiece. But there was laxity in the field which enabled the batsmen to get over a bad patch and it spoiled his average. As it was Mitchells and Butler should not have reached the double century. But even with this recorded there was a mistake which enabled Summers to punish the bowling: he made 41 out of 44, and then with a pull to leg which was going for 6 he had the chagrin to see his half-century thwarted by a very fine one-handed catch by Hickman at the rail. Still he had the satisfaction of going in last and making the best score. The details show how consistent was the betting. The Unity never overcame a bad start. Wilkinson was "no-balled" almost at the outset, and then his third delivery dismissed Ogden. Ogle was injured by a ball from Roberts, and he had to be assisted off the field. Hickman, who took his place, attempted a similar "pull" and was similarly injured. He, too, received the attention of the ambulance man, but had to leave. Holloway and Ogden took the score to 31, when the former left. Odell had but a short life and left at 40. Hickman resumed, but only survived two delivered and no addition was made to the score. Edden was out from a short-pitched ball from Wilkinson, and half the side had gone for 55. As was the case with the home side, the men from the second team proved the most successful run-getters. N. Pulley played a really fine innings for his 21: he and Holloway had made 40 of the 65 at this point. Pulley proved a victim of F. Payne, the brother of the Cape Hill stumper, who was included for the first time. He secured wickets with the first and last balls of a maiden over. Ogle (who was suffering from his disability) returned the ball to him. He continued to bowl with good judgment, and Bell and Captain Durban were bowled; the off stump being dislodged in three of these four instances. It was a very significant first appearance: four for 7.

KIDDERMINSTER'S COLLAPSE.

NORMAN PARTRIDGE'S CENTURY FOR DARTMOUTH.

That nothing succeeds like success is as true of cricket as of most other things, and it is certainly exemplified in the case of the Dartmouth this season, when they have done better than for many years past. Tomkinson. Five wickets for 21 was bad indeed, but the next three failed to add to the total, Spring at one time having six wickets for 4 runs in nine overs. A. M. Carr was content to keep his wicket intact, without attempting much in the way of run getting. R. L. Branton forced the pace a bit, and his 20 was the result of capital cricket. The Dartmouth, with such a score against them, could afford to take risks, and the batsmen hit freely, though they lost three wickets before they passed the Kidderminster total. Norman Partridge followed his fine bowling by a brilliant innings. He scored 60 in

twelve minutes, and reached 101 in thirty-five minutes, out of 120. His hits included five 6's and fourteen 4's. Perry also hit furiously, sending the ball out of the ground on four occasions. WALSALL LOSE THEIR UNBEATEN RECORD.

DARTMOUTH'S DESERVED SUCCESS.

Walsall met with a surprising defeat when visited by West Bromwich Dartmouth. The latter had not previously won at Walsall since 1906, and as some huge scores have been made against them by the Walsall batsmen in years gone by it seemed long odds on the home team achieving another success, particularly as they were able to place a strong side in the field. WARWICKSHIRE SEASON REVIEWED.

SIGNS OF IMPROVEMENT IN THE TEAM.

(By Our Special Representative.)

With eight victories to their credit in the County Championship competition, Warwickshire, who concluded their programme at the Oval yesterday, can claim to have had their most successful season since first-class cricket was resumed after the war. Their victories have been over Worcestershire, Derbyshire, and Northants, each of whom have been beaten twice. Gloucestershire were conquered at Edgbaston, and Somerset were defeated at Taunton. As all these counties rank among the weaker sides in the County Championship competition, Warwickshire's performance cannot be described as one of remarkable merit. Perhaps, however, it is better than it looks on paper. Warwickshire are essentially a fast wicket side. Their batsmen are more likely to do well when runs can be made quickly than when circumstances demand that caution should be exercised, for the majority of them are not adepts at playing back when the ball is spinning; and their best bowlers are not of the type to constitute a really dangerous attack on a soft wicket. Considering, therefore, that the weather practically throughout the cricket season has not been helpful to Warwickshire, the fact that they have been able to do so much better than in the two previous seasons is significant. It shows that the side have made substantial improvement, and as, with two or three exceptions, they are a young side, the future may be regarded with some optimism. There have been three years of experimentation, and as the upward path has at last been struck the committee of the County Club should now feel at liberty to attempt to stabilise the team, and avoid those frequent changes which are always inimical to efficiency.

RECKLESS BATSMEN.

When the season's record is considered it will be found that the bowlers have achieved far better results than might have been expected, and that had they received adequate support from the batsmen a few more matches would have been won. In innings after innings wickets were practically thrown away because men would not trouble to play themselves in. With half a dozen or so attractively enterprise batsmen in their team Warwickshire time after time have been weakened because of the sheer recklessness which has been shown. No one would urge that the Warwickshire batsmen should adopt that "allow but sure" policy which finds favour in some quarters, but they ought to realise that the man who can consistently hit 6's and 4's in his first over must be preposterously lucky or a genius. If the art of being discreet, therefore, is cultivated next season, it cannot but be productive of good. The fielding has been fairly good, but the side have been deficient in reliable slips, and the costliness of this weakness cannot be exaggerated.

The most notable event of the season was the match against Hampshire, at Edgbaston, which passes into history as one of the curiosities of cricket. The match provided an excellent illustration of phases of Warwickshire's strength and weakness. When things went their way, and the wicket afforded help, Howell and the Hon. F. G. Calthorpe were a very dangerous bowling combination. In Hampshire's first innings everything came off for the bowlers, and the side were dismissed for 15. Warwickshire were winning easily, and they held a winning position until Hampshire, following on, reached the seventh wicket partnership. Then a weakness was exposed. The bowlers became fatigued, and weariness of flesh was followed by weariness of spirit, as the opposition began to show fight; and the morale of the side ebbed steadily until possible victory had been converted into certain defeat. The spirit which should have brought the team to their toes again was lacking, and for want of it Warwickshire failed not only in this memorable match, but also in a number of others when they had at least a sporting chance of victory.

LEADING PLAYERS.

During the season thirty players have taken part in the county club's matches. The newcomers have included two public schoolboys of distinct promise in J. G. Pugh, the Rugby captain, and W. M. Hampton, the Clifton captain, both of whom should develop into valuable members of the side in future. R. G. Baynton, who made one or two appearances twelve months ago, has also played in a number of matches, and has improved so considerably that it is reasonable to hope that he will in the future be able to reproduce in county cricket the form he has shown in the ranks of Moseley. The most valuable members of the side, however, have been the captain (the Hon. F. S. G. Calthorpe), N. E. Partridge, C. A. F. Fiddian-Green, Smith, Quaife, Howell, Bates, and F. B. Sartell. Calthorpe has not been at the top of his form, but he has scored 961 runs and taken 74

wickets. Norman Partridge became qualified for the county at the beginning of the season, and, as will be seen from the appended statistics, he is at the head of the bowling averages, and is sixth in the batting table. It is unfortunate that he has not been available for all the matches. Incidentally, he was an excellent captain when Calthorpe was absent, and his excellent generalship had much to do with the victory the side gained at Taunton. Smith has distinguished himself not only by splendid wicket-keeping, but also by regaining his form as a batsman, and the soundness he has displayed in opening the innings has been an asset of the greatest value. Quaife, as everyone knows, registered his thousand runs in a season for the twenty-first time, and in addition he captured 51 wickets, so that it may be assumed he has still plenty of good cricket left in him despite his fifty years. Howell, with 120 wickets, was the mainstay of the attack, and would have had an even better record had he received smarter support in the slips. Bates, although inconsistent, was by far the most brilliant batsman on the side, and, like Smith and Quaife, made over a thousand runs on behalf of the county. Fiddian-Green was not available until after the University match, but when he was able to join the side he stiffened the batting appreciably. Sartell started the season brilliantly, but had a lean time afterwards. He is a batsman, however, of unusual promise. G. W. E.
