

YORKSHIRE II. AT HORSFORTH.

AN INTERESTING GAME.

The Yorkshire County Colts have an attractive fixture list this season—ten matches in all, including home and away games with Durham, Northumberland, Cheshire and Lancashire Seconds, and two matches with elevens representing the Yorkshire Council. They opened their programme, yesterday, with a two days' game against a strong Council side, and though rain interfered with the play, some interesting cricket was witnessed. In these Council matches play commences at 1.30 and proceeds until seven in the evening.

The Council batted first and scored 170, and in reply the Colts ran up 112 for the loss of two wickets. A heavy shower of rain brought play to a close ten minutes before the hour. Hobson and Tyson opened the Council innings, but the South Kirby batsman was stumped by Allen off Maude when he had only scored two. Tyson and Twiss retrieved the position somewhat, and added 35 before the last named was clean bowled by Bake. Jackson assisted the Whitwood man to carry the score to 88, and then Tyson, who had scored a sound 34, fell a victim to Allen. Coates was the bowler. The Council captain found the easy boundary profitable, but when at 33 he lifted a ball from Ryder and the bowler took the catch cleverly. Rain stopped play for over half an hour at this point, and the break proved fatal to Gariside for, on the resumption, he was bowled with Ryder's first delivery. Staniforth and Slater put on a useful 43 for the sixth wicket, but the remaining Council men did not cause much trouble and Ryder and Coates disposed of them for the addition of 20 runs. Ryder comes from Thirsk. He bowls a medium fast ball and his five wickets cost 62 runs. Coates took three wickets for 40.

The Castleford keeper, Allen, and Bell, the Yeadon batsman, gave the Colts an excellent start. Bell, indeed, opened in sensational fashion. He faced Moss, and hit the first four balls to the leg boundary. Allen hit Harrison for a four in the first over, and altogether the batsmen livened matters up a little. Twigg, Shires and Slater were given turns with the ball, but it was the combination of Moss and Shires which put a stop to the fast scoring. Moss, after a rest, bowled much better, and runs came very slowly. At one time four successive maiden overs were bowled. Allen scored 43 before he was caught at first slip by Shires off Moss, and the Batley bowler repaid the compliment, catching Bell from one of Shires' deliveries. Bell had a neat 46 to his credit. HORSFORTH MATCH DRAWN.

The rain which fell overnight, and early yesterday morning, had a two-fold effect on this match—it made the wicket soft, and kept the attendance small. On the first day (Wednesday) the "gate" numbered close upon 500, including County members, but yesterday there was only a handful of spectators present when a start was made half an hour late. The Horsforth Hall Park ground recovers very quickly from rain, and a drying wind—though it proved trying to the spectators—assisted matters.

The Colts were well placed, being within 60 of the Council first innings score and having only two wickets down. Marwood and Mitchell, who were 11 and 1 respectively, opened against Moss and Shires. Mitchell, who comes from Baildon, only added one when Shires had him lb.w. The wicket was a tricky one, and the Wakefield bowler made good use of it. Taylor helped Marwood to take the score to 145, and then he was clean bowled by Shires. Marwood was Shires' next victim—he lifted a ball to Staniforth at point—and then Crossley was smartly taken at the wicket by Hirst. At this point Shires had taken four wickets for 12 runs. A useful stand by Mr. Holdsworth and Baker carried the Colts beyond the Council total, but Shires had the Colts' captain caught by Staniforth, and Harrison disposed of Baker and Ryder in one over. The Colts led by 26 on the first innings.

Tyson batted attractively in the Council's second innings, and ran up 66 before Ryder caught him out off Crossley's bowling. The Whitwood batsman hit 10 fours, and, after a slow opening, played lively cricket. Hobson, who opened with Tyson, was brilliantly caught by Ryder when he had scored 19. When the score was 169 for four wickets, Mr. Jackson declared, and the Colts were given a little over an hour's batting. They scored 38, and lost four wickets in doing so. They never really got on top of the bowling of Shires, and he was well assisted by Moss, Harrison, and Slater. The Council fielding was very keen.

The Colts' team for this match only included three of last season's players—Mr. Holdsworth, Allan, and Bell of Yeadon. The remainder were all young players. Bate, Harrogate, is 18; Maude, Lightcliffe, is 19; Crosley, Halifax, is 18; and Mitchell, Baildon, is 19. Two or three of the others are under 23. Full score and analysis:—

YORKSHIRE COUNCIL MATCHES.

Drying wickets were in most cases very tricky on Saturday, and many fine bowling performances accounted for some very decisive results in Yorkshire Council cricket. The champions, Sheffield, continued their winning career at Hull, and that in face of G. Crawford's successful bowling. He took eight of the Sheffield wickets for 49 runs, but the attack of those experienced Sheffield bowlers, Buckley (6 for 52), and Elms (4 for 30), was too much for the Anlaby Road team, who were beaten by 47 runs. The state of the wicket gave Hull small hope of success, but a little more enterprise on the part of their batsmen might have brought the issue much closer. As a matter of fact, only F. Vasse exhibited his true form in contributing 30 out of the total of 85 before being out to a very unpopular decision.

Leeds, with all their talent, had another bad day. It was a nasty knock for their No. 1 team to suffer defeat at Horsforth by seven runs, but there was some excuse for the defeat of their No. 2 side at Elland, as the Headingley representatives missed the services of F. W. Elam and F. Luckhurst. Still the dismissal of a Leeds team for only 44 runs is a matter which calls for comment, and no little misgiving. There were notable bowling performances in each of these matches against Leeds. H. Jefferson, for Horsforth, captured five wickets for 34 runs — though a better performance was J. E. Walker's six for 33 for Leeds—and in the Elland match, W. S. Parker, after batting well for 41, crowned a good day's work by capturing seven of the Leeds wickets for 12 runs, which performance included the "hat trick." E. King, the first change bowler on the Leeds side, had the respectable analysis of five for 13.

The Batley fast bowler, E. Moss, who was the most successful bowler in the Council last season, has again opened in rare form. His success in taking six wickets for 38 runs on Saturday paved the way for Batley's hollow triumph over their much-feared opponents at Ossett, though the personal phase of the triumph was shared by G. Rendor, who was unbeaten in a fine batting performance which yielded 59 runs. One of the biggest scores of the day was that made by Dewsbury, who were so well served with the bat by E. Nixon (not out 80), P. Barracough (49), and G. Hodgson (47), that they were able to "declare" at 220 for seven at Clockheaton, and to win subsequently by 112 runs. Wakefield got the better of Birstall by four wickets in a keenly-contested game at Wakefield, and there was excitement at York where the home team failed by 10 runs to reach Harrogate's score. Apart from a useful innings of 37 by the Harrogate batsman, R. G. Raworth, the best feature of the latter match was the fine bowling of R. Rooks and E. Leyland on the respective sides.

CLIFTON SPRING A SURPRISE.

A victory by the once-despised Clifton club was among the noteworthy results on Saturday. Brighouse were the team whom they surprised, and although the visitors were narrowly beaten by one wicket, the result should be encouraging to a club who have had great difficulty in building up a team. Clifton were shown to have a useful bowler in Firth, who took six wickets for 26 runs, though T. Sheard, the Brighouse professional, subsequently improved upon that analysis with six wickets for 20. Bowlers held the mastery over the batsmen in the Rastrick v. Sowerby Bridge match, but although Smith on the home side performed the "hat trick" it did not prevent Sowerby Bridge winning by five wickets.

There were some interesting features in the local "Derby" affair between Guiseley and Rawdon, which was won by the former by six wickets. A remarkable catch was brought off in that match by Allen Cloughton who, after tripping and falling, clutched the ball and held it as he lay prone on the ground. J. Yeadon, the old Pudsey St. Lawrence player took five of Rawdon's wickets for 17 runs. Tong Park, who never won a match in the Bradford League last season, had the satisfaction of scoring their first Yorkshire Council victory by beating Yeadon Green Lane by 187 runs to 30. Six of the Green Lane wickets were taken by C. Pratt for only 11 runs.

King Cross, who were well beaten by Castleford in the opening match of the season, had their revenge by inflicting defeat on Castleford for the first time on their own ground in three seasons. This was largely due to the all-round brilliance of Coates, who bowled through the Castleford innings, taking 8 wickets for 32 runs. Then, when his side were faced with defeat, requiring over 70 runs to reach the home total of 112 and only having four wickets in hand, he scored 57. When Allen caught him smartly behind the wickets only two runs were wanted to win, and a three wicket victory resulted. Batting for Whitwood Colliery against Pontefract, R. Tordoff scored 75 of the total of 166, this being his highest total with the Colliery team. Pontefract found runs very difficult to get against excellent bowling by Drake, who came out with 7 wickets for 27 runs. They lost 9 wickets for 59 runs, the last wicket adding 30. Those keen rivals, Frickley and Featherstone, met at Featherstone, and the visitors had much the better of the game. They began very badly, losing half their wickets for only 49 runs, but with some vigorous hitting by A. Shields

(43), the last 5 wickets added 83. Featherstone were all out for 76, T. Smith taking half their wickets for 28 runs.

BRADFORD LEAGUE—BARNES AGAIN THE MASTER.

With wickets for the most part favouring bowlers, it is small wonder that there were many excellent bowling performances in the Bradford League, and that Sidney F. Barnes should again come out on top with a wonderful record of nine wickets for 23 runs, bringing up his aggregate for the season to twenty-eight wickets for 120 runs, or an average of seven wickets per match played at a cost of 4.28 runs per wicket. Undercliffe provided the opposition on Saturday, and only J. T. Bell appeared able to oppose Barnes with any confidence. Saltire, however, had by no means an easy task to beat their opponents' total of 48. A. Mitchell, the Yorkshire colt, put up a marvellous defence for the winners, going in first and carrying his bat through, while Hickton bowled exceedingly well for Undercliffe, and was the best all-rounder on the losing side. The tactics of W. Close, the Undercliffe wicket-keeper, were regarded by the Saltire supporters as exceedingly unsportmanlike, and at the close there was a regrettable scene.

East Bierley lost a point and undisputed leadership of the League by delaying their declaration against Idle, which left too short a period in which to get their opponents out. Bowling Old Lane, playing Low Moor, had quite a fright at home, being at one time in grave danger of defeat, and yet only missing victory because Ernest Holdsworth had not the courage to make his declaration before 183 runs were on the board. With only two hours in which to get 200 runs to win, Low Moor adopted defensive methods and with success, despite some fine bowling by the veteran ex-County player, Grimshaw, who took seven wickets at a cost of 70 runs.

The Bankfoot v. Windhill match was a weary affair, the home batsmen losing eight wickets after more than three hours' batting before declaring their innings at 186. Windhill were dismissed fifteen minutes before time for 118. A little more enterprise in batting would be much appreciated by visitors to the Bankfoot enclosure. The League champions, Bingley, declared their innings closed at 172 for nine (A. Judson 58), but Great Horton made a telling response with 103 for three wickets (R. Whitehead 56). B. Walker played a great innings of 76 not out for Pudsey Britannia against Eccleshill, and the other Pudsey club, St. Lawrence, failed badly in fielding and with the bat against Keighley. Laisterdyke, though having first knock at home, made a sorry show against W. Brown and J. Slack, the Farndale bowlers, and were tumbled out for 51. Farndale only lost three wickets in gaining the victory.

The Lidget Green v. Bradford game at Springfield was a very slow affair, and if the newly-admitted Park Avenue Club is to make any impression in the League there will have to be a vast improvement in run-getting. Methods which are all right in a three-days' match are all wrong in a League game.

HUDDERSFIELD LEAGUE FEATURES.

There were some good performances, both with bat and ball, in the Huddersfield and District League cricket on Saturday. Haigh, of Meltham Mills, took seven Holmfirth wickets for 19 runs, and Holmfirth were all out for 40. Meltham Mills passed this total with the loss of but one wicket. Another good bowling performance was that of N. Fisher, of Kirkheaton, against Golcar. The match was at Kirkheaton, and the home club compiled 94 runs. Golcar could do no more than knock up 56, Fisher taking six of their wickets for 23 runs.

Huddersfield won their fourth match of the season at the expense of Broad Oak. Huddersfield batted first and bright cricket was seen when Harling and Senior added 64 runs in 40 minutes for the second wicket. Huddersfield were at the wickets two hours and a quarter, in which they knocked up 178 for seven wickets. The innings was declared closed, and Broad Oak were dismissed for 100. Dalton were the visitors at Almondbury and won by a margin of 17 runs, whilst a close contest was witnessed at Meltham, the home team defeating Honley by three runs. The highest individual score of the day was that of N. Peace, at Kirkburton, where this batsman carried out his bat for 76, which enabled his side, Bradley Mills, to win by 27.

LITTLEBOROUGH PROFESSIONAL'S FINE INNINGS.

The prime feature of the opening day's play of the first of the annual matches between Yorkshire and Lancashire second eleven at Old Trafford, yesterday, was the wonderful recovery by the home county, under the captaincy of Archie MacLaren, the new coach at the headquarters of the County Palatine. NOTES.

YORKSHIRE COUNCIL CHAMPIONS BEATEN.

The heavy showers of rain which were general on Saturday afternoon seriously limited play in the Yorkshire Council matches, and there were very few that were played out to a decisive issue. Among the finished matches, however, was one which had the result of bringing about the defeat of the champions, Sheffield United. The Bramall Lane team had previously only suffered one defeat in ten games, but in appearing on the Wath Athletic ground, on the occasion of the home captain's benefit, they failed signally before the Wath attack, and as they were only able to muster a total of 79 they lost by 27 runs. The home bowlers were in fine form, and captured half the visitors' wickets for 34 runs. Only Greenwood and Austin were able to get double figures; but when the first bowling change took place, Hargreaves effected a separation, capturing both wickets for one run. B. Wilkinson, for the visitors, took 4 wickets for 6 runs.

The two Council teams of the Leeds Club, whose performances to date have been singularly level, both gained decisive victories over their respective opponents. Whilst the Leeds "No. 1" team won at Guiseley by four wickets, the other "No. 2" team made short work of York, who were beaten in hollow fashion without the loss of a wicket. Credit for the latter victory was chiefly shared by the bowler, S. Allen, who did the "hat trick" and captured eight of York's wickets for 25 runs, and by that all-round athlete, S. O. Walmsley, who in carrying out his bat for a well-hit 64 showed his capacity for distinguishing himself as much in club cricket as he does on the football field.

Batley, who were the leaders of the Council tournament up to Saturday, were rained off at Birstall, and the leadership of the competition is now assumed by Gomersal, who proved easy victors over Drighlington. Two matches in the Wharfedale valley were played out. Ilkley had the best of their encounter with Menston on the latter's ground, the feature of their display being an innings of 44 by E. R. Heywood, from the second team, who was largely instrumental in carrying the score from 77 to 120 for the eighth wicket. No one on Menston side was able to tackle with confidence the bowling of Darby and Ebdon, the former taking five for 29 and the latter five for 37. The feature of Yeadon's innings of 150 against Otley was a contribution of 67 by F. Slater, who faced all the bowling with confidence and gave no chances. Otley's batsmen shaped poorly, and would have been out for less than their total of 95 if all the chances they gave had been taken. E. Hanson, Yeadon's fast bowler, took five for 41, and A. Vickerstaffe four for 49.

BARNESLEY BATSMAN'S CENTURY.

Among the drawn games, one which produced a very interesting afternoon's cricket was that between Barnsley and Elland on the Shaw Lane ground. The match was notable for a brilliant innings by C. Hesketh, Barnsley's first batsman, who contributed 103 to a total of 260 for five wickets (declared), though Elland's response was so well sustained by B. Smith (68) and his colleagues that the visitors were able to make a good draw with a score of 170 for six. The Skipton veteran, F. Horner, showed that he has lost none of his cunning with the ball, for although Silsden knocked up a total of 170 against their visitors, he had the very creditable figures in the circumstances of six wickets for 46.

There was an unusual spectacle at Castleford, where, after the home team had made 68 for two wickets in response to the visitors' total of 128, rain interrupted the game. Although the umpires did not decide to the contrary, Brighouse were so sure that there would be no further play that the majority of the side changed into their ordinary clothing. With only a quarter of an hour to go the umpires directed play to proceed, and there was the unusual scene of Brighouse turning out partly in flannels and partly in ordinary clothes. By forceful cricket Castleford carried their score to 88 before the end came.

BRADFORD LEAGUE GAMES UNFINISHED.

Notwithstanding the heavy downpour on Saturday morning, it was possible to make a start in every Bradford League match, but later rain fell again with such persistency that all the games had to be abandoned. At Keighley, the two Whiteheads, for Great Horton, bowled so well that the home eleven's total only reached 136. They bowled unchanged, Ralph taking five wickets for 60 and Haydn five for 68. The revival of the old-time fixture between Bradford and Bowling Old Lane attracted the best "gate" of the season to Park Avenue. Batting first, the home side made a sorry start against Makaula and Grimshaw, five wickets being down for 30 runs. C. Smith—who, having been engaged as a professional wicket-keeper, was making his debut—showed that, in addition to his abilities behind the wickets, he can handle a bat. He made 31 in fine style, and helped to put on 34 runs for the eighth wicket before falling to a fine catch low

by Makaula. With Smith's dismissal came rain, and there was no further play. Smith, who is a Batley man, may do something to enliven Bradford's rate of run-getting.

Undercliffe batted in fine style against Bullock Green, J. T. Bell making 84 and H. Widdowson 52 (not out) in a total of 213 for three wickets. Thanks to mistakes in the field, Bingley were able to run up 190 runs for four wickets against Laisterdyke. J. Abbott being chief scorer, with 58 not out as his contribution. C. Small bowled very well indeed for Bankfoot against Queensbury, taking five of the eight wickets that fell for 33 runs. Parsley dismissed Pudsey St. Lawrence for 100, W. Brown being credited with six wickets for 43 runs, and J. Black three for 39. The best "gate" of the day was that at Springfield, where Lidget Green and Saltaire were in opposition. As usual, the outstanding personality in the match was Barnes. He had no opportunity of showing his skill with the ball, but with the bat he made 81 in a total of 164 for five wickets (declared).

SPIRITED BATTING IN SYKES CUP GAMES.

Rain interfered to considerable extent with cricket in the Huddersfield district, and it was particularly unfortunate for the first round of the Sykes Cup competition was in progress. The rain held off long enough to enable one team to complete its innings and then the downpour commenced, with the consequence that all the games had to be abandoned for the day. Some of them will be completed this evening.

At Slaithwaite, the League leaders would have been seriously challenged by Broad Oak if the game had been played to a finish. The visitors knocked up 248, J. H. Dunning being the chief contributor with 47. Spirited batting was seen at Meltham, where Huddersfield knocked up 178 for eight wickets. W. Gill scored 72, and G. Senior 47. N. Hill of Friarmere, scored 72 at Kirkheaton, Friarmere's total being 178. The best bowling performance of the day was that of J. A. Beaumont, of Golcar, who took 9 Lockwood wickets at a cost of 54.

ANOTHER AUSTRALIAN IMPORTATION.

The announcement is made that another Colonial cricketer, Frank A. O'Keefe, has come to England for the purpose of playing with a Lancashire League club. He has signed on for the Church Club, and appeared in their team against Accrington on Saturday. The exceptional terms obtained by Macdonald at Nelson were calculated to attract the attention of other Colonial players to the financial possibilities of engagements in the Lancashire League, and if rumour may be trusted, there will be other "acquisitions" before next season. O'Keefe is a New South Wales player, whose abilities were so highly appraised in some Colonial papers that one wondered why his genius should have escaped the notice of the Australian selectors, and of Warwick Armstrong in particular. He did not play in any eleven-a-side matches when the last England team visited Australia, but in the Inter-State matches of 1920-21 he played for New South Wales against South Australia and Victoria. In the first of these matches he scored 3, and, fifth bowler tried, did not take a wicket; against Victoria he made 2 and 26, and in another short turn with the ball was not successful. He has since been playing in Melbourne, and from the high coloured accounts one has read of his form, O'Keefe must have made great strides since these appearances.

YORKSHIRE II. AT MORLEY.

FAIR START AGAINST CHESHIRE.

The Yorkshire Second Eleven made a promising start in their Minor Counties Championship match against Cheshire, at Morley, yesterday. To date, they have played four games in this competition—all away from home—and have won two and lost two. They secured a comfortable victory over Cheshire, at Northwich, in Whit-week.

Heavy rain fell at Morley in the morning, and, in addition to delaying the start until one o'clock, it interfered considerably with the game. Later in the afternoon there was a fair ring of spectators. Cheshire had first use of the wicket, and were dismissed in less than four hours for 123. The Yorkshire attack was a well-varied one. Mr. Holdsworth utilised Bayes, Coates, Leyland, and Ryder, and good bowling was backed up by excellent fielding. It was neat work in the field that led to the dismissal of the first two Cheshire batsmen—W. E. Jones and V. Hope, the captain—who were run out. The visitors owed a lot to Hodgson for the respectable appearance of their total. He played a bright, sound innings of 68, and was the only one of his side to really get on top of the attack. His best-scoring strokes were on the leg side, but he played confidently, and it was only a smart catch by Bell, off Leyland, that got his wicket.

Coates, the Halifax slow bowler, who has taken 25 wickets for the Colts in Minor Counties matches this season, had the best figures. He took three wickets for 6 runs. He had hard luck too, for time and time again he beat the batsmen. Bayes, who opened the Yorkshire bowling with Coates, had little success in the opening stages, but he dismissed the last three men in quick style.

In the hour-and-a-half batting they had, the Colts ran up 115 for the loss of five wickets. Allen and Bell opened the innings, and the wicket-keeper was the first to go, being well bowled by Dean. Bell played a stylish innings to score 39, and then he too fell, a victim to Dean. The Cheshire bowling was consistently good, and Leyland and Marwood were compelled to play cautiously. The Harrogate batsman was clean bowled by the Cheshire captain when he had scored 13, but Marwood, who was playing on his home ground, improved after a shaky opening, made several good boundary strokes, and was unbeaten at the close, with 35 to his credit. **MINOR COUNTY CRICKET
MATCH AT MORLEY.**

YORKSHIRE II. v. CHESHIRE.

The Yorkshire Second Eleven and Cheshire match in the Minor Counties Championship series was played on the Scatcher Lane ground, Morley, on Tuesday and Wednesday, and was the first county match at Morley. The committee of the Morley Cricket Club had made admirable arrangements for the match, and they had great hopes for its success, but they were doomed to disappointment on the opening day, heavy rain falling all the morning and preventing a start till one o'clock, thus causing a delay of an hour and a half, besides having an adverse effect on the attendance of the public, which was very small until after luncheon, when there was a fair ring of spectators. During the afternoon a collection was taken on the ground for the benefit of Dolphin, the Yorkshire wicket-keeper, which realised the sum of £3 3s. Od.

Mr. V. Hope, the Cheshire captain, won the toss, and opened the innings with W. E. Jones, to the bowling of Bayes (at the Cemetery end) and Coates. The rapid scoring was evidence of the satisfactory condition of the wicket, which, by the way, had not been previously played on this season, but with the score at 23 Hope was run out, and he was succeeded at the wicket by Hodgson, who, after scoring a single, saw Jones also run out. L. N. Jones helped Hodgson to take the score to 48, when the latter was smartly caught by Leyland off Coates, his contribution being 7. Parry was the next comer, and when the score was 70 Leyland took up the bowling from Bayes, who changed over to the other end, and with 12 runs added Parry (16) was out leg before Leyland. On Hodgson being joined by Astle runs came freely, and at 66 Ryder displaced Bayes. With the "telegraph" at 115 Hodgson was missed by Coates off Leyland, when he had scored 47, and 18 runs later Astle was stumped by Allen off Coates, who had taken up the bowling again from Ryder. Smoker was bowled by Coates without adding to the score, but when Beeley partnered Hodgson there was a further display of good batting till the total was 155, when Hodgson played into the hands of Bell off Leyland, and he was accorded a hearty reception on returning to the pavilion, having played a fine innings for 68. His best scoring strokes were on the leg side. Dean was bowled by Bayes for 10, and Beeley was the ninth man out to a smart catch by Mr. Holdsworth at slip off Bayes, his score being 22. Crook was caught by Allen off Bayes without scoring, the innings closing for 183, Clifton being 11 not out. The runs at the fall of each wicket were as follows:

The Yorkshires commenced their innings at five o'clock, Allen and Bell being their first batsmen and the bowlers Mr. Hope (from the Cemetery end) and Dean. By cautious play they made a good start, 35 runs being registered before Allen succumbed to Dean's bowling for 17. Ten runs later, however, Taylor was caught by Dean off Hope, and he was succeeded by Leyland, the Harrogate professional, who scored 15 before being bowled by Hope, the total at this time being 67. Harry Marwood, the Morley Colt, now went in, amid the cheers of the spectators, and batting with caution at the start he assisted Bell to take the total to 99 before a separation was effected by Bell failing to Dean's bowling after batting well for 39. Garside was bowled by L. N. Jones for 4, and Marwood and Brook, of Ossett, were not out with 25 and 2 to their credit respectively when play closed for the day, the score then being 115 for five wickets.

Play was resumed on Wednesday morning in threatening weather, and in the presence of a moderate attendance of spectators. Marwood and Brook, the not-outs, went to the wicket, but Marwood did not stay long. He added 4 to his score, and was then caught and bowled Dean for 29, Coates taking his place. Brook and Coates batted vigorously, and carried the score from 129 to 165, when a change in the bowling brought about the downfall of Coates when he had made 22. It was the best innings the Halifax man has played for the Colts. Brooke quickly followed Coates to the pavilion, being caught by Astle off Clifton after scoring 23. The Yorkshire innings did not last

long after this. Bayes was run out, and Mr. Holdsworth and Ryder each hit a four before the captain was caught behind the wicket, and the Colts finished eight runs in arrears.

He was caught and bowled by Mr. Holdsworth in his first over after relieving Coates. Hope was another safe batsman, and he had 35 to his credit when dismissed by a catch by Garside, who had fielded brilliantly through the innings. In fact the fielding all round left nothing to be desired. The innings closed for 181.

Sports Items.

It is a remarkable fact that Rhodes occupies at the present time—and at his time of life!—the proud position of top of the first-class bowling averages for all England. And Wilfred is in his 45th year, being born October 29th, 1877.

Wilfred Rhodes picked the following team as his fancy to represent the Players against the Gentlemen:—J. Hobbs, A. C. Mead, F. E. Woolley, C. Parkin, H. Howell, G. C. Macaulay, P. Holmes or H. Sutcliffe, and G. Brown or W. H. Livesey.

"Usually there is not much question about a man being out, 'leg-before' decisions always expected," writes J. B. Hobbs, the famous Surrey and England cricketer in "All Sports." "Sometimes a batsman knows he is out 'lbw,' and admits it cheerfully, but this is so rarely the case that a man who does it at all often almost deserves a second benefit. Generally speaking, however, the batsman is not at all in a good position to say whether he infringes the 'lbw' rule, not nearly so often regarding 'lbw' decisions as the batsmen commonly suppose."

"If you are given out 'lbw,' which you are bound to be sooner or later, don't rage back to the pavilion cursing your rotten luck. If you make a 'duck' don't say it was the best ball ever bowled, or that you were swindled out; say nothing,"—D. L. A. Jephson.

Umpires' mistakes cannot be recalled although I have heard of one which was remedied in remarkably quick time (writes Hobbs, in "All Sports"). This was in army cricket before the war. An old drill sergeant was "standing umpire," and it was pointed out to him that he had "given a ball short" in the over. Wicket-keeper and fieldsmen had changed over before the error was noticed, but the worthy old non-com. did not allow a trifle like this to disconcert him in the least. Drawing himself up in his best barrack-square manner, he shouted, "Shun! As you were before you were!" and corrected his slip with military promptitude.

W. Brockwell, the old Surrey and England cricketer, writing reminiscences in "Sport Pictures," says in this week's article that after "Ranji" and Victor Trumper, Jack Hobbs is the best batsman of all time. The same authority says that no sides had two finer slingers than Surrey and Yorkshire in Mr. J. Shuter and Lord Hawke.

Brockwell says:—"The greatest cricketer of all times, W. G. Grace, was possibly the greatest personality in the game also, and when he was bowling, with his brother Dr. E. M., playing at point, and Mr. Bush at the wicket, you had to play their conversation as well as 'the ball.' Frank Sugg, the Lancashire hitter, was asked during one of our games (Surrey v. Lancs.) by dear old Johnny Briggs, how he was out against Gloucestershire. His reply was prompt and emphatic: 'Why, talked out!' And his diagnosis of his dismissal was probably correct."

By the way, Brockwell was born in January 21, 1866, and is therefore 56 years of age. In 1893 he gained a place in the third Test match at Manchester, and in 1894 scored 1,401 runs, or 38.2 per innings, and had five centuries to his credit. He finished his career with Surrey in 1903. Between 1898-1900 he made over 1,000 runs in each season, his best record being in 1899, when he compiled 1,696. Altogether he hit 21 centuries in first-class cricket. In 1901 he took 105 wickets for 25.2 runs each, his previous best being 70 wickets.

Charles Hallows, who regularly opens the Lancashire innings with Makenpeace, was born on April 4, 1895. He made his first appearance in the Lancashire County XI. in 1914. Last summer he gained a place in the fourth Test Match at Manchester against Australia.

"Joe" Smith, the well-known Batley batsman, scored a century (101) for Batley against Heckmondwike last Saturday; and Norman Keenan, professional for Staincliffe, and formerly "pro." for Morley "pro." who plays in the same team as his father—Horsforth Hall Park, Young Hutchinson, in Peel's opinion, is a player—he both bats and bowls—of distinct promise, especially with the bat.

R. Peel was at Horsforth the other night, fulfilling an engagement under the "Yorkshire Evening News" coaching scheme, and he had a very good word for H. Hutchinson the 17-year-old son of "Bob" Hutchinson, the popular former Morley "pro." who plays in the same team as his father—Horsforth Hall Park. Young Hutchinson, in Peel's opinion, is a player—he both bats and bowls—of distinct promise, especially with the bat.

Drawn Game at Dewsby.

**YORKSHIRE AMATEURS V.
LANCASHIRE AMATEURS.**

AN OLD FIXTURE REVIVED.

(FROM OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

Old Trafford, Monday.

Some of the joys of old-time cricket, when averages and percentages played no part in the game, were recaptured here to-day, when a fixture that died before any of the present participants were born was revived. This was the meeting between gentlemen of Lancashire and Yorkshire, a two-days' engagement that promises to go its full length, for as the result of one day's play only one innings has been completed, and two wickets of the other side have fallen.

The sides were led by two veterans famous in the cricketing history of both counties, namely, Mr. Arthur Sellers and Mr. A. C. MacLaren. The Yorkshirite, unhappily for those who were anxious to see whether his hand retained its cunning, ran up against one of the best balls sent down during the day, and was bowled first ball. Mr. MacLaren has put himself down lost in Lancashire's batting order.

A feature of the Yorkshire Amateurs' innings, which lasted for three-and-a-quarter hours, was the batting of C. E. Anson, who was first in and last out. But for his great patience his side would have fared badly. He was missed in the slips when he was six, the ball splitting Rhodes's finger, and he was dropped again in the over before he was out, caught at the wicket. Between those whilsts he played cricket with a perfectly straight bat, never taking the slightest risk, seldom letting the ball pass him, and waiting for runs to come. His was an example of "defence not defiance" cricket. Useful help came from Martin Smeeth, E. Suddards, and B. C. Boyes, who ought to have been caught by MacLaren early on.

The Lancashire Amateurs' bowling on the whole, except for Rhodes, did not seem so skilful as that of the Yorkshirites, but, so far as has been seen at present, there is more promise about the Lancashire batsmen. Young Midgley, who has been scoring very consistently all the season for Bacup, made some beautiful strokes in an all too short innings, and both Major Green and G. Rogerson batted well, the former being unfortunately run out near the end of the day's play. The fielding throughout the day has been very keen. Indeed, cynics have been busy suggesting that some of the Lancashire professionals might follow their example with benefit. While liveliness between the wicket when Green and Rogerson were together near the close of play was certainly in striking contrast to the "wait and see" policy of some of the professional brotherhood—Parkin, of course, being excluded. **YORKSHIRE AMATEURS' BOWLING
TROUNCED.**

HUGE TOTAL BY LANCASHIRE.

(FROM OUR SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

Weak bowling and failure to seize their chances in the field ended in the Yorkshire Amateurs being completely outplayed in the revived old-time match at Old Trafford yesterday. Lancashire scored runs at such a refreshing rate that when A. C. MacLaren put into force a somewhat belated declaration at the tea interval they had carried their overnight score of 84 to 473, and had only lost seven wickets. Thus, when Yorkshire commenced their second innings, they were 260 runs behind, but as only an hour and a half remained for play, a draw was the only possible outcome, and stumps were drawn at six o'clock.

The foundation of the County Palatine's big total, made in five hours and ten minutes, was laid by Rogerson, of Manchester, and Capt. Howard, of Preston, who, coming together when the score was 74 for two wickets, were unseparated until the score had mounted up to 280, in five minutes over two hours. Then Rogerson, who had scored 182 by faultless cricket, was taken at the wicket by Boyes, who subsequently had the misfortune to dislocate his thumb in stopping a delivery from Knapp. The Manchester amateur showed excellent style, and was at the wickets for three hours and half, during which time he hit 15 fours. Subsequently Howard hit with great vigour, and in company with Rhodes, of Finsloden, put on 105 for the fourth wicket, Rhodes's share being 84. The introduction of Suddards at this juncture brought about the dismissal of four batsmen rather cheaply, but Howard, although he was missed when 47, and 159, remained unbent to the end, and carried out his bat for 177, made in three hours and fifty minutes.

The Lancashire innings occupied in all five hours and ten minutes, and whilst much of their batting was of first-class order, the freedom of the scoring was in a larger measure due to the weak bowling and missed chances. At periods the ground work, especially that of Martin, Smeeth, and Radcliffe, was very clever, but there were too many blunders to applaud the Yorkshire fielding as a whole. Arthur Sellers only had five bowlers at his command, and of them Suddards was the most difficult to play, although Radcliffe bowled very steadily. Of the others they were too inclined to overpitch the ball, and came in for heavy punishment. C. E. Anson again showed his powers as an opening batsman, and when the closure was applied Yorkshire had wiped off 74 of their arrears, and the match, which failed to attract the crowd, was left drawn. NOTES.

COUNCIL FIXTURES SEVERELY CURTAILED.

Although the weather conditions were not so completely unfavourable as was the case three weeks ago, when not a ball could be bowled in club cricket in the whole of Yorkshire, the number of Yorkshire Council fixtures in which any play was possible on Saturday was small, and the matches brought to a definite conclusion were fewer still. Among them, however, was the game at Bullock, in which the keen colliery team defeated Hull very comfortably, thanks largely to a masterly innings of 143 by F. Stocks.

Sheffield United were another club able to force a victory. They were at Featherstone, and a weak home side found the bowling of Buckley and Elms almost unplayable. Featherstone lost their first four wickets for 19, the fifth fell at 37, and the other five totalled 13 runs only. In twelve overs Buckley took six wickets for 27 runs, and the other four fell to Elms for 27. Sheffield did not win until five of their wickets had gone, and Booth (3 wickets for 27) bowled well for the losers.

Rain spoiled what should have been an interesting finish at Ackworth, where Thornhill were the visitors. The home side's total was 132, and L. Halstead, Thornhill, had the excellent bowling figures, in the circumstances, of five wickets for 31 runs. Thornhill had lost three wickets for 23 when rain stopped play. Leeds No. 2 visited Castleford for the second time within a fortnight, and again rain prevented the match being completed. Leeds totalled 136, towards E. H. Jackson made the substantial contribution of 88. His partnership with H. B. Dawson carried the score from 29 for one wicket to 86. Hayes had the creditable analysis of five wickets for 35 runs. Castleford had scored one run when rain began. Sowerby Bridge were severe upon the bowling of Brighouse, and were assisted in their run getting by bad fielding; but Brighouse had only just gone to the wicket in response to the visitors' total of 261 for six wickets when the game was stopped.

Of the fixtures in which no play at all took place particular disappointment was caused at Guiseley, where Guiseley, who are the leaders of the Leeds Section of the Council, should have opposed their near rivals, Tong Park.

HUNDRED WICKETS FOR SIDNEY BARNES.

The completion by Sidney Barnes of his hundred wickets in League and Cup-tie cricket this season was the outstanding feature of the play in the Bradford League. Only two hours' play was possible at Undercliffe; but the famous Saltaire player contrived to secure the six wickets necessary to carry his total to three figures. The sodden pitch did not help him in the least; but he maintained such an accurate length that only 21 runs were scored off the 30 overs he sent down, and Undercliffe had made but 86 for nine wickets when the rain caused the abandonment.

In twelve League matches to date, Barnes has taken 86 wickets at an average of 4.50 runs, whilst his success in two Cup-ties brings his total to 100 wickets at the remarkably low cost of 4.35 runs per wicket. With the possibility of nine more matches this season, the Saltaire bowler will, at his present rate of progress, surpass his record of 140 wickets in League and Cup during season 1918, when Saltaire, the present leaders with three points advantage over Baildon Green and Keighley, achieved the double distinction of winning both the League championship and the Frieatley Charity Cup.

To C. H. Grimshaw, of Bowling Old Lane, fell the best bowling performance of the day, for he triumphed over the prevailing conditions so successfully as to take eight Low Moor wickets for 81 runs, an achievement which included the "hat trick." Low Moor were dismissed for 127, but Bowling Old Lane had no opportunity to reply. The only other side to dismiss the opposition was Lidget Green, Bradford only totalling 96 against G. Walker, who took five wickets for 31 runs, and E. C. Keighley, whose four wickets cost 66 runs.

It was a bad day for the leading batsmen, and J. T. Bell, the Yorkshire County colt, falling a victim to Barnes for 11, lost the leading place in the League averages, which he has so long held. His average of 58.12 is, however, quite a good second to the record of A. Turner of Farsley, of 60.87 runs per completed innings.

NOT A GAME FINISHED.

Though all the matches in the Huddersfield and District League were started, heavy showers of rain throughout the district prevented any one of them being finished. Indeed, it was only in a few instances that a single innings was completed. Huddersfield and Slaithwaite, the two clubs which head the League, were both in a strong position, and undoubtedly would have won if the games had been proceeded with. Armitage Bridge were the visitors to Fartown, and were practically overwhelmed by the bowling of L. Sollis and Mortimer. The first-named took five wickets for 23, and the latter four for 49. Slaithwaite made 181 for four wickets against Dalton, and then declared, but further play was impossible. Ellis added to his already long list of fine performances by an innings of 62, and F. Poole carried his bat out for a half-century. A surprising feature was the big score recent weeks have been in the best of form. Lascelles Hall made against Kirkheaton, who in The Lascelles Hall eleven made 230 for four wickets, and then declared. To this total B. Ellis contributed 70 and S. Thewlis 67.

YORKSHIRE II. AT BRIDLINGTON.

GOOD START BY DURHAM.

Durham made an excellent start against the Yorkshire Second Eleven in the Minor Counties Championship match, commenced on the pretty little ground of the Bridlington Club yesterday. Play should have begun at 11.30, but a heavy shower of rain, which had fallen early in the morning, had so soaked the wicket that the captains, after an inspection, decided to bring the lunch interval forward and start the game at 1.30.

The Colts were without their captain, Mr. E. E. Holdsworth, who was kept in Bradford on business. This is the first time this season Mr. Holdsworth has not led the team into the field, and Mr. E. H. Jackson, of Leeds, took his place. Mr. H. D. Badger, the Oxford University bowler, was also unable to play, and Mr. F. C. H. Knapp, who did so well in the Colts' match with Northumberland, came into the team.

Favoured in the spin of the coin, Durham batted first and made use of a slow wicket. Their start was none too promising. Bayes, the Flamborough fast bowler, who accomplished the hat trick against Northumberland in the Bridlington match last year, and Knapp opened the Colts' bowling, and four overs were sent down before Weight, the only professional in the visiting side, scored a single. With the score at five, Brooks was easily stumped by Allen. Doggart, the Cambridge University batsman, joined Weight, and they combined in a partnership that added 91 to the score. On Monday, against Northumberland, these two batsmen had a partnership which realised over 200.

Doggart played very attractive cricket. He has a fine style, and hits hard and freely. This season he has only played three times for his county, and on each occasion he has scored a century. Weight scored 33, and desisted several bowling changes. Once he gave a sharp chance to Bell at cover-point, but beyond that he was very sound. Doggart, who scored 116, was at the wicket close upon three hours. He hit 8 sixes and 6 fours, and only gave one real chance. That was when he had scored 99, and Usher failed to hold a high ball. Leyland nearly caught him before he reached 100, but it was hardly a chance. Finally he was well caught in the long field by Brook off Bayes. Blaylock was the only other batsman to get on top of the bowling, which was consistently good. Knapp, for instance, bowled seven overs for 14 runs without taking a wicket, and Smeeth bowled five for five runs. Coates, the Halifax bowler, had the best analysis. He took 4 wickets for 47 runs—a good performance under the circumstances. Bayes bowled untiringly for 30 overs, and his three wickets cost 88 runs, while Leyland claimed three for 67.

The Colts had ten minutes' batting before stumps were drawn, and Allen scored eleven off J. H. Doggart's first over—he hit the first two balls to the boundary. Score and analysis:—

BRIDLINGTON GAME DRAWN.

The Yorkshire Second Eleven concluded their Minor Counties Championship programme this season, with a draw with Durham at Bridlington yesterday. They had eight matches arranged in this competition, but only seven have been played—the Harrogate match with the Lancashire Colts was abandoned owing to the weather—and of these seven they have won three, drawn two, and lost two. Their last game this season is with a Yorkshire Council Eleven at Elland, commencing on Monday.

A fair crowd of spectators witnessed the play yesterday, and it was always interesting, though the finish was not so exciting as it promised to be, when Durham collapsed at the beginning of their second innings.

The Colts first innings realised 210—only 20 behind the Durham score—and altogether it was a good performance. Those stalwarts, Allen and Bell, gave the side a good start, and there was 89 on the board when they were parted, Bell falling to a change in the bowling. Allen hit out in great style, and his 67 was a bright and useful contribution, and included 10 fours. Mitchell, the promising Baildon youth, who scored a century against Durham at Blackhill earlier in the season, only scored two, and Smeeth and Mr. Jackson were dismissed el aply. Leyland and Brook, however, removed whatever danger there was of a follow-on, and, curiously enough, they were both dismissed with their individual score at the same figure—27. Brook hit 1 six, a good drive, which lifted a ball from Weight out of the field.

The last five wickets put on just as many runs as did the first five. Knapp gave further proof of his ability as a batsman with a sound 30, and the young amateur, Usher, who was making his first appearance this season with the Colts, set up a ninth wicket partnership with Coates which put on 30. Usher had reason to be satisfied with his debut. He scored a useful 21 when it was needed, and Coates, who scored 13, again showed that he is a useful bat, as well as a bowler. The success of the younger men was particularly pleasing.

When Durham went in to bat for the second time, shortly before three, the general anticipation was that the match would be drawn. In his second over, and when only five runs had been scored, Bayes created a little sensation. He had Weight l.b.w. with his second ball, and with his fourth ball he got A. G. Doggart, the century scorer, l.b.w. also. Knapp clean bowled Kinch when only three runs had been added, and when Scott Page was run out, and the total only 15, it began to look as though the Durham innings would not last long. But Brooks, who did not score in the first innings, and Blaylock put a very different light on matters. They got on top of the Yorkshire bowling, and while Brooks scored Blaylock contented himself with defending his wicket. They carried the score to 77, when Brooks was nearly caught by Knapp.

The Yorkshire bowling and fielding was excellent. Bayes bowled 23 overs, of which 12 were maidens, for three wickets, at a cost of eight runs each. Knapp had two wickets for 18, and Coates three for 40. Full score and analysis:—

NOTES.

YORKSHIRE COUNCIL MATCHES.

As most of the leading clubs in the Yorkshire Council tournament have now only three more matches to play, it is regarded as tolerably certain that Sheffield United, who have usually been "there or thereabouts," must yield up the championship which they so well won last year. It is more than likely that Sheffield's successors as champions will be the Gomersal

team, whose consistency has been one of the brightest features of club cricket this season. Gomersal have now established such a substantial lead at the head of the table that their chances of being overhauled, especially as their last three matches are all at home, are very remote.

There was some very interesting cricket in Saturday's matches, and many fine performances were witnessed. Among the notable achievements was Halifax's victory at Illingworth, where the home team's total of 185 was rubbed off for a loss of only three wickets, thanks to a useful partnership between S. Atkins (77) and M. Garside (61). Dewsbury in their home match with Birrall gave a benefit to their professional, E. Nixon, who appropriately signalled the event by taking the chief personal honours of the match. He was the highest scorer with 26 not out, and his feat in taking five Birrall wickets for 32 runs made Dewsbury's task an easy one. Nixon has now made his season's "bag" into 93 wickets at an average cost of 8.6 runs per wicket.

One of the centurions of the day was T. A. Booth, the Brighouse captain and former Bradford League player, who, being now at the height of his powers, must be regarded as one of the most prolific run-gutters in the Council. He had the felicity of carrying out his bat for 127 against Clifton. That score was closely approached by E. Richardson, the Barnsley batsman, who participated largely in the victory of his side by hitting up 119 not out against South Kirkby. Another batsman who came out of his shelf was A. Kellett, of Loftus Park, who with a contribution of 93 had the chief credit in his side's victory over Featherstone. The Leeds No. 2 team made a good batting display against Elland at Headingley, but their declaration at 192 for 4 elicited a spirited response from the Elland batsman, E. King, who in making exactly a century enabled his side to participate in a good draw.

The Leeds No. 1 team provided the "feast" attraction at Guisley, and were considered to be on a fair way to victory in compiling 170. Guisley went one better, however, obtaining the required runs amidst much excitement with their last two batsmen together. By their victory, the home eleven strengthened their position as leaders of the Leeds section of the Council tournament. One of the best bowling performances of the day was that of H. Harrison, the professional of the Yeadon Green Lane club, who, with his slow left-arm bowling, took eight of Calverley's wickets for 30 runs, Calverley being thus beaten by 23 runs. The match between Yeadon and Rawdon at Yeadon ended in a tie of 73 runs each.

THRILLING CUP FINALS.

Two cup finals at Leeds and Bradford produced a thrilling afternoon's play without result. These were the final for the Hopworth Cup between Burmantofts and Allerton Bywater, played at Whithorn, and the final for the Priestley Cup between Saltaire and Bowling Old Lane, played at Park Avenue. In the former event, Burmantofts put up the useful total of 280 runs, but whether this will give them possession of the trophy remains to be seen, as Allerton Bywater (the holders) have responded with 142 for one wicket. The two brothers H. and D. Burton gave Burmantofts a capital send-off by making good scores, but the feature of the innings was the splendid score made by Reg. Burton. This lad is only 18, yet he displayed wonderful punishing power in making his 73 runs. Buxton was the most successful bowler for Allerton Bywater; he captured 5 wickets for 65 runs. The game will be resumed this evening at six o'clock.

After six hours' play at Park Avenue, neither Bowling Old Lane nor Saltaire could claim a definite advantage, and the match will be concluded this afternoon at 5 p.m. There was some disorder towards the close, when Saltaire had to bat in failing light, and there was talk of them allowing the trophy to go to Bowling Old Lane by default, but wise counsels prevailed. The outstanding feature of the day's play was the duel between Sydney Barnes and C. H. Grimshaw, and but for the success of the latter Bowling Old Lane would certainly not have had so much in hand to-day. Surviving a confident appeal for obstruction from the second ball of the match, Grimshaw batted for three hours and ten minutes, and his faultless innings of 56 was

only terminated by the running out of his substitute runner, Watson. The ninth man to be disposed of, the ex-Yorkshire County left-hander, was at the wicket while every one of his side's 134 runs were scored, and the crowd expressed its appreciation of his great effort by contributing £25 7s. 6d. to his collection.

Barnes had the unusual experience of bowling an hour without meeting with success, but he was not given the support he can generally rely on in the field, and 29 runs were knocked off him in his first spell. Changing ends, however, the Saltaire "crack" immediately got a wicket, and his second onslaught bringing him six wickets for 25 runs, he completely undermined the strong position Bowling Old Lane had built up. The third wicket fell at 92, half the side were out for 115, and the last five batsmen only added a further 19 runs. Barnes thus finished with six wickets for 54 runs, and his total for the season now stands at 123 wickets at an average cost of 4.27 runs. In two hours and ten minutes before bad light stopped play, Saltaire lost their five best batsmen for 75 runs. The attendance was officially returned as 10,350, and the "gate" receipts were £527 5s.

HUDDERSFIELD WIN THE SYKES CUP.

The destination of the two trophies in the Huddersfield district was settled on Saturday, and the Sykes Cup goes to Huddersfield for the first time, whilst the Paddock Shield goes to Paddock. Huddersfield's opponents in Saturday's final were Slaithwaite, whom they met for the first time this season. The Colne Valley club were playing under a handicap, as the venue of the game was Fartown, where the finals in this competition are always played. Huddersfield batted first, and the best feature of this innings was the last wicket stand of Falk and Hobson. The latter played forceful cricket and knocked up 22 not out. The Huddersfield total was 166 when Falk was caught off Sugden, and it was realized that Slaithwaite would have a difficult task to win the trophy. As a matter of fact, however, they did not put up a good struggle, for once more Bolts, of Huddersfield, proved to be in good form, and he captured five wickets for 34. Only three of the Slaithwaite batsmen managed to reach double figures, and they were all out for 74.

Paddock won the Paddock Shield, at Honley, in a game in which low scores were the feature. Paddock were dismissed for 48, but their opponents could do no better than compile 31.
