

CORNWALL V. DEVON.

INTERESTING CRICKET AT CAMBORNE.

WHITING'S REMARKABLE BOWLING FEAT.

THE GAME DESCRIBED.

Cornwall and Devon met at Boker, Camborne, on Friday morning in a two days' match in connection with the Minor Counties Championship. The weather was decidedly tricky. Overnight there had been considerable rain, and the morning opened with a heavy mist. About 11 o'clock this gave place to bright sunshine, but when the game opened, a light mist again set in. Cornwall won the toss, and in view of the weather conditions, put the visitors in to bat.

There was not a large attendance when Saltmarsh and Capt. Haynes faced the bowling of Whiting and Hawke. Saltmarsh opened to Whiting, who claimed for low off his second ball, but the point was not conceded. Only one run was scored off Whiting's first over, but Saltmarsh lifted Hawke to the boundary in Hawke's first over. In Hawke's next over, Schofield dropped a hot drive from Haynes, and in the succeeding over Bickford behind the stumps failed to hold a catch from Saltmarsh off Whiting. Reed took on the bowling from Hawke when a quarter of a century had been scored, but Haynes sent him to the boundary in his first over.

Saltmarsh unleashed Whiting to the boundary beautifully, but from the next ball he succumbed to a smart catch off Whiting for 13.

Campbell partnered Saltmarsh, and when three more runs had been added, Schofield atoned for his former mistake by dismissing Haynes with a fine catch, off Whiting.

From this point the Devon batting broke down in a most unaccountable manner, none of the batsmen offering any real resistance. Whiting bowled throughout the innings in his best form, having the splendid average of 7 wickets for 32 runs, in addition to assisting in the dismissal of Campbell with a fine catch.

CORNWALL'S POOR START.

When Cornwall opened their innings just a quarter of an hour before lunch, the sun was shining brightly. Tresawna and Capt. Smith were the first pair at the wickets, Amory and Saltmarsh bowling. The pair opened promisingly, but in the last over before lunch Tresawna was bowled by Amory for 6, which included a boundary. Commander Irwin partnered Smith after lunch, but the latter did not stay long, being smartly caught by Aspinall off Amory, and two wickets were down for 16. Irwin's stay was very short, being well caught by Haynes off Saltmarsh for 3. Bentley followed, and was shaping well, when he fell to a catch by Butcher off Amory for 2. For a total of 23, Cornwall had now lost four wickets. Cunnack took Bentley's place and opened with a boundary, and play livened up. After he had hit another 4, Cunnack gave a very difficult chance to point. With 30 up, Light took on vice Saltmarsh, and had a maiden over. In the next over Light, with a one-handed catch, off Amory's delivery, sent Cunnack back. Bickford took Cunnack's place, and in his first over sent up a high catch, which Amory successfully negotiated. Six for 37. Hawke partnered Schofield (who had continued to score steadily), and evoked loud applause by driving Amory to the boundary twice in succession. Taking on to Light's bowling, he put one rather high and was caught by Clarke for 15. Seven for 59. Beecher Williams was Schofield's next partner, and was the first to drive Light to the boundary. With his next stroke he not only repeated this, but enabled Cornwall to pass the Devon total. Reed was next in, and was caught and bowled by Light. Whiting was the last man in, and after he had made a couple of singles, Schofield woke up and drove Light out of the field for 6. Then Whiting sent Amory to the boundary, but from the next ball Amory clean bowled him, and Cornwall's innings closed for 86.

Devon opened their second innings more steadily, and there was an evidence of carefulness with the batsmen, but still wickets were fairly cheap, though the play was a rule slow. Saltmarsh, the first man in, made an excellent stand, being out sixth wicket for a well-played 28. Campbell had a life behind the wickets, and then succumbed to Bickford for 21. The fourth wicket was down for 51, and only 83 had been scored for 8.

SENSATIONAL CHANGE.

It looked as if Devon would not be worth a hundred in their second venture, but then a change came over the scene. Light and Carter became associated, and 60 runs were put on before the partnership was dissolved, the ninth wicket falling at 149. This entirely altered the complexion of affairs. Light had mastered the bowling most effectively, and when Whiting and Hawke gave place to Smith and Reed scoring became more rapid than at any previous period during the day. Light had three 6's and several 4's to his credit, and was loudly applauded when his individual score reached 50. Still the score mounted as the time for close of play neared. Another change of bowling was tried, Whiting and Hawke again taking up

the attack. The innings came to an almost dramatic close, Light being caught in the last over for the day with a splendid score of 72, Devon's innings closing for 181.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

CORNWALL'S GREAT VICTORY.

MAGNIFICENT 8th WICKET STAND BY BICKFORD.

The dramatic conditions which marked yesterday's play were in a way repeated this morning, when Cornwall were set the task of making 164 runs to beat Devon.

Tresawna and Irwin made a splendid first wicket stand, but after Irwin had been caught by Aspinall, wickets began to fall rather cheaply.

At the luncheon interval, Cornwall had scored 120 runs for the loss of seven wickets.

On resuming after lunch, Hawke was dismissed when the score was 126. Whiting partnered Bickford, and the most brilliant cricket for the match was witnessed. Bickford, who is notoriously a hard hitter, was in great form and went for the bowling for all he was worth. Discounting the admitted trickiness of Light's bowling, he punished the Devon pro, without mercy, and three times in succession lifted him to the boundary. Whiting, meantime, was content to keep his end up and gather singles. As the pair neared the Devon total, the excitement became intense, and when Bickford returned to the pavilion undefeated with a score of 56, he was accorded a tremendous ovation, and Whiting was similarly treated. Reed did not bat. Scores—

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL WIN FIGHTING FINISH AGAINST DEVON

In connection with the Minor Counties Championship, a two days' match between Cornwall and Devon opened at Boscar, Camborne, on Friday. Cornwall won the toss, and sent Devon in first. Saltmarsh and Haynes opened for them. Whiting and Hawke sharing the bowling. There was an excellent first wicket stand of 36 runs being scored before a separation was effected. With the score at 36 Reed caught Saltmarsh in the slips, and three runs after this player had left with thirteen runs to his credit Haynes was dismissed, being beautifully caught at mid-on by Scholesfield off the same bowler. Baker, the Argyle football professional, tried to stop the rot and stonewalled for 40 minutes, during which time he scored only one run. He was smartly stumped by Bickford in stepping out to meet one of Capt. Smith's deliveries. Bickford was an excellent wicket keeper, allowing only one bye to pass him. The Devon batting then practically collapsed, the whole side being out for the remarkably small score of 68. This was mainly due to the splendid and irresistible bowling of Whiting, who claimed seven wickets for 32 runs, and also caught Campbell.

There was only a quarter of an hour's batting left for Cornwall before lunch, but in this period Treawna was bowled by Amory for six. Half an hour was Devon's show in the first innings. Cornwall looked like being worse off than six wickets fell in quick succession for 37 runs. At this juncture Hawke came to the rescue with 15, and Beecher Williams with two boundaries in succession enabled Cornwall to pass the Devon total. Whiting, the last man in, added six, and the innings closed for 86. Scholesfield, who went in when the third wicket had fallen, played a very steady game and carried his bat through for 25—the highest on the Cornwall side, and equalling that of Capt. Haynes for Devon.

In their second venture things did not go well with Devon until late in the innings, half the side being out for 28, and eight wickets fell before Cornwall's first innings total was exceeded. Saltmarsh, who went in first and was sixth to leave, contributed a useful 26. The stand of the day was that between Light (the county pro.) and Carter, who put on 54 runs for the ninth wicket. After Carter's dismissal, Butcher joined the pro, and runs came freely, the total being taken to 181 before Light skied a ball from Hawke and succumbed to a catch by Bickford. The pro's 72 included three 6's, and the only chance he gave was at 54, when Cunnack dropped a catch in the long field.

Cornwall's Recovery

Cornwall started on their task on the second day to get 164 to win with all their wickets intact. The wicket was soft and fairly easy and the damp ball gave the bowlers some difficulty. H. Treawna and R. H. Irwin started against the bowling of Amory and Saltmarsh. Both batted carefully and Irwin made some fine leg strokes. With 29 runs on Midgley took the ball from Saltmarsh, and a little later Light displaced Amory. The batsmen took no risks and runs came slowly, the half-century being hoisted after 50 minutes' play. Butcher had a turn with the ball and Aspinall failed to hold a difficult snick from Irwin off his first ball. In the next over from Light the first wicket fell, Irwin being taken by Aspinall at the wicket, the score board reading 52-1-33.

Scholesfield came in and Amory displaced Butcher at the bottom end. The Helston man was too eager to score and lost his wicket by going out to Light, two wickets being down for 67. Bentley made a short stay, the third wicket falling at 73. Midgley had a further trial and the fourth wicket fell at 113. A run later Treawna was stumped by Aspinall through playing forward to Light and his innings of 49 was most valuable. It included 24 singles. At lunch time the score was 120 for seven wickets.

Hawke and Bickford resumed for Cornwall after lunch, 44 runs being required with three wickets to fall and the game was consequently in an interesting stage. On the second ball from Amory the pair were nearly separated through being run out, but Hawke sent up an easy catch in the next over, 126-8-5. Bickford and Whiting hit out, and the score rose quickly, although the bowling was good and the fielding keen. Bickford hit remarkably clean, and after a partnership lasting just 17 minutes the necessary runs were obtained and Cornwall won by two wickets. The retiring batsmen were loudly cheered on returning to the pavilion. Scores:—

CORNWALL V. MONMOUTH.

Ideal weather prevailed when the two day's match in connection with the Minor Counties Championship, opened at Penzance on Friday, between Cornwall and Monmouth. There were two changes in the Cornish team that opposed Devon the previous week at Camborne. Cunnack injured his thumb in that match, and Cory, the popular young Cambornian, now playing as a professional in Wales, had been selected to fill the vacancy, but unfortunately was unable to come to Penzance. E. Trevarthen, son of the old Cornish pro., Kit Trevarthen, was selected vice Reed, of Lelant, and Semmens, of St. Just, who has been playing so consistently this season, filled the vacancy caused by Cory's absence.

Monmouth won the toss, and went first to the wickets. T. B. Williams and G. A. Webb opened the batting, to the bowling of Whiting and Hawke. Williams opened confidently, but in his second over, Whiting bowled Webb for two. Raikes then joined Williams. The latter was hitting freely, but succumbed to a fine catch by Scholefield at mid-off—a hit that was deserving of a better fate—from a delivery from Whiting, after having scored 19. Two wickets were down for 21. Raikes did not last long, being bowled by Whiting off his pad for five. Price and Rust then became associated. Three of the visitors' wickets were down for 31. Wickets were cheap, the fourth wicket falling at 34, Hawke securing his first success by dismissing Rust for 4. R. M. Phillips was next in, but his was a short stay, being caught by Beocher Williams, off Whiting for two, and five of the visiting bats had now been disposed of for 41 runs. Price, who had been batting steadily, was the next to go, being caught and bowled by Hawke for 19.

After an hour's play, Monmouth had scored 60 runs.

Beocher Williams now took the ball from Hawke at the Trecrore end. A misfortune befell Monmouth at this juncture, Lord having to retire temporarily, having been struck on the knee-cap by a ball from Whiting. Harris filled the gap. Scoring still continued to be free, and both Phillips and Harris hit with a good deal of confidence. The century was hoisted after an hour and twenty minutes' play, with the above pair still in. In the same over, however, Phillips was well caught by Hawke off Whiting for a capital 26—the highest individual score so far. Jenkins was next at the wickets, and opened with a single, and then sent Williams to the boundary. Runs were now coming rapidly, and at 1 o'clock 120 were registered. Capt. Smith relieved Williams, who had been rather expensive, having 37 runs hit off him in 6 overs.

A feature of the Monmouth side is that it has no "tail," the whole of the men being capable of getting runs by good cricket. Their innings demonstrated this, the latter men atoning for the failure of the opening bats.

With the score at 138, Bentley took on at the York House end in place of Whiting.

Resuming after lunch, Whiting and Hawke again took up the bowling, and in the first over Hawke dismissed Harris without any addition to the score. Harris had made all the difference to the visitors' position, his 47 being not only an invaluable contribution, but came at the psychological moment. Then the visitors had a slice of luck, Semmens missing Jenkins rather badly, and Smith failing to hold a high one from Wilcox. Semmens was given a turn with the ball in place of Hawke, when 180 had been scored, and just failed to hold a hot return from Wilcox in his first over.

At 2.45 the second century went up, and soon after Whiting was given a rest, Beocher Williams taking on with the ball, and Smith went on vice Semmens. Off the latter's first ball, Jenkins completed his 50. In the same over Smith completely beat Wilcox who had scored 56. Williams finished off the innings.

Cornwall opened their innings with Tressawna and Irwin. Both men shaped well and gradually settled down to the bowling. Tressawna, however, began to score the more freely, but Irwin's batting was steady, and neither seemed to be greatly troubled by the bowling.

When a quarter of a century had been registered, Parkes relieved Harris with the ball, and the latter took on vice Phillips. The double change, however, was unproductive, the Cornish pair continuing to score steadily.

Not long after the Cornish innings started misty rain began to fall.

Monmouth's first success came when Cornwall had made 61, Irwin being caught behind the wickets by Wilcox, off Raikes, when he had made 16. Tressawna's score then being 39. Cornwall's first pair were at the wickets an hour and a quarter. Scholefield then partnered the Cornish skipper. When the teams adjourned for tea, Cornwall had scored 73 for one.

During the interval, it looked as if further play would not have been possible, the rain having increased. Luckily it eased again, and Tressawna and Scholefield resumed. With a fine boundary, Tressawna sent the 100 up, amidst applause. The drizzle later lifted, but the scoring still continued very steadily, and 160 was telegraphed. Then the mist again came on. Jenkins had now relieved Raikes at the Trecrore end. Soon after Tressawna had the honour of completing his century—a faultless effort without a chance, scored in just over two hours at the wickets. A hearty round of applause deservedly greeted the Cornish captain. Phillips again took on at the York House end. Just on the stroke of 6 o'clock Scholefield played a ball on to his wicket from Phillips, when he had made 48. An adjournment was then made to the pavilion, the rain coming on quite heavily. After a brief stay, play was resumed, the weather once again improving. Bentley joined Tressawna, and this pair remained together till the close of play, Tressawna having scored 117, which included seventeen 4's. Bentley's score was six. Cornwall are thus in a strong position. Undoubtedly the home side were favoured by the light rain, which, not sufficient to drive the men to the pavilion, made the ball slippery to hold, and robbed the bowling of its sting.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

Heavy rain fell in the early hours of the morning, and continued till 9 o'clock. This caused a delay in the start. The game was timed to open at eleven, but the wicket was then not considered to be fit, and play did not commence till noon.

The sun was then shining brilliantly, and there was every chance of a glorious day.

The attendance was good, attracted by the promise of a full day's play. Friday's gate was a record.

Tressawna and Bentley resumed, the former with 117 not out overnight to his credit, and the latter 6. Raikes and Harris were the bowlers.

The overnight's rain had changed the condition of affairs, and had added that spice of uncertainty which is the soul of cricket, and speculation was keen as to how affairs would shape.

When within two runs of the Monmouth total, Tressawna skied one from Harris, and was well caught by T. B. Williams. Tressawna had scored 131, and the stroke that dismissed him was practically the only chance he had given. Trevarthen joined Bentley, and after play had been in progress half an hour Cornwall had passed the Monmouth total. Just here Trevarthen had a slice of luck, a slip by the fielder enabling him to get home just in time.

Bentley seemed to be gaining confidence, and was hitting vigorously, and Trevarthen was shaping well, when he was beaten by Harris. This success on Monmouth's part atoned for a slip on their part immediately preceding. Trevarthen had hit a single, but the fielder

in returning overthrew the ball for a boundary. In the next over Bentley drove a ball fiercely from Raikes, which the bowler gamely stopped, and Bentley retired with a most creditable 32.

Monmouth opened their second innings after lunch with Williams and Webb. With only one run recorded, Webb was caught by Hawke off Whiting, and G. G. Phillips left at 16. Price and Williams became associated, and Williams hit out very freely scoring half a century in as many minutes. Price gave a chance of being stumped when he had scored three. Williams continued to hit very freely, but at 81 he was well bowled by Beocher Williams for 59. His score embraced one 6, one 5 and eight 4's, and the method of his scoring can be deduced from the fact that of the total of 81 he had contributed 59.

With Williams' departure, a change soon came over the scene, the fourth wicket falling at 113, and the fifth at 129. Price, however, continued to bat with freedom, despite frequent changes in bowling, Smith, Williams and Bentley having been tried. Price and Raikes continued to score at a good pace, and at 4 o'clock 170 was hoisted.

There was a dramatic finish to the match, Cornwall having to fight till the last second in order to save the game, after at the close of the first day's play appearing to have an easy win in prospect. The homesters replied to Monmouth's total of 233 with 319. Monmouth, in their second venture scored 237, leaving Cornwall 152 to get to win and two hours in which to accomplish the task. It soon became apparent that the home side would not do this, and then Monmouth fought for all they were worth to force a win, just failing to bring it off.

To Hawke fell the privilege of breaking the partnership, the Camborne player dismissing Price, getting him out c and b—singularly enough a repetition of his feat in the first innings. Soon after 4 o'clock the second century was telegraphed. In putting together this total, Monmouth had only occupied 110 minutes—a good rate of scoring and implying bright cricket.

Trevarthen was now given a turn with the ball, and in his first over clean bowled Lord for 5, and in the same over got Harris caught for a single.

At the adjournment for tea, Monmouth had made 236 for the loss of eight wickets. The end came with almost dramatic suddenness on the resumption. Jenkins was caught by Bickford off Smith without adding to his score, and Wilcox, the last man in, was caught by Scholefield off Trevarthen, after scoring a single. Raikes's score remained unchanged at 44 (the total was 237) leaving Cornwall 152 to win.

The home county started on this effort at 5 o'clock, Tressawna and Irwin facing the bowling of Phillips and Harris. Both batsmen were very careful, and only 49 runs had been scored in 50 minutes, when Tressawna was bowled by Raikes. When the score was 76, there was a confident appeal against Irwin but was not upheld, but in the next over Scholefield was stumped by Wilcox—a decision which did not meet with approval. Semmens had a little better luck on this occasion, but was well caught in the slips when he had made 6. Whiting's exit was almost farcical. A ball from Harris appeared to pitch wide, and Whiting walked across his wicket to meet it. However, the ball broke in behind him, and took his wicket. It now became a moot point as to whether the home side would survive the required time. There were about five minutes to go, with one wicket to fall, and 31 runs required to win the match. The getting of the runs was an impossibility—the only possibility was that of playing out time. The excitement was almost intense, but Beocher Williams did the requisite, and Cornwall managed to save the game, and won on the first innings. Scores:

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL'S STIFF CONTEST WITH MONMOUTH

Cornwall played Monmouth at Penzance on Friday and the match ended in a draw, the concluding stages being exciting. Left to get 152 to win, and with two hours in which to get them, Cornwall failed, but managed to save the game. With only a few minutes left for play their last batsman went in, and Capt. Smith and Beecher Williams surviving an over and a half, Cornwall were 30 runs behind and the single wicket in hand.

Except for half-an-hour's delay in the restart on Saturday because of the early morning rain there were two full days' interesting cricket. All through it was a very keen fight, and, perhaps, one of the best "games" the county has ever had saw as good a game as any played on the Penzance ground. Monmouth deserved to win. In batting, at any rate, they were stronger than Cornwall, and did not possess the fall our county did. Indeed on the first day their last four or five batsmen performed wonderfully well, staying off a threatened disaster, and making the ultimate position fairly secure. Their fielding was splendid. But quite the outstanding feature of the match was a really magnificent innings of the Cornish captain, H. Treawna. He cannot have played better cricket in his long career. Mainly through his collecting 131 in the first innings were the County placed in a winning position, when in their last venture they were given 152 to make to secure victory. He scored all round the wicket, but, chiefly—or rather, most attractively—on the leg side. It probably ranks as his finest innings, for it was without fault until he put up a high one at square leg which dismissed him.

Whiting did not come off on the second day. He bowled exceedingly well at the start on the opening day, and looked like having an outing. After the rain, and then the sun, on Saturday it was thought Whiting would have been helped a lot, but he was not, and it fell to young Trevarthen to come on late and get three Welsh wickets for three runs and finish off the visitors' second innings. The son of the old County player, young Trevarthen was brought in vice Cory, who was selected, but was unable to play, and Semmens, of St. Just, was played for Cunneen, who injured his thumb in the Devon match.

Cornwall had every reason to be proud with the position at the end of the first day's play. Monmouth had compiled 233 in their first knock, on a good batting wicket—certainly more than was expected on their showing for the first half-a-dozen wickets. Things looked far from well with them when the board reached 152 wickets down for 57. Whiting had bowled with such effect that it looked as if the Welshmen were to collapse. But the visitors have a fall which can wag furiously, and a complete change came over the game. The next three wickets brought in no fewer than 172 runs, so Cornwall had the fair total of 233 to face. Things went so well with them, however, that at the end of the day's play they were only 31 runs behind with eight wickets in hand. Treawna and Commander Irwin laid the foundation, and then Scholefield came along later and helped his captain to put on 121 runs in fine style. Treawna reached his century without giving a chance in two hours and seven minutes, and he was loudly applauded. Scholefield played delightfully free cricket for his 48.

On Saturday the Cornish captain added 74 to his overnight score, getting out with the one faulty stroke in his innings of 131. He hit 18 4's. Bentley and Bickford made 32 apiece and Cornwall finished up 86 on, and a good chance of winning.

The Welshmen were not to be denied, though. They collared the bowling after an ominous start, the last five wickets yielding 108 and they left Cornwall to get 152 to win in two hours. It was too much for our men, and when Treawna, Irwin, and Scholefield had been dismissed for 85, Cornish wickets were not worth a great deal. Capt. Smith played with great steadiness, and scored the same when he was partnered by the last man. Monmouth worked hard for a win and lost it by time. Another ten minutes would have made all the difference to them.

TWO RUNS A MINUTE

AMATEUR'S 25 BOUNDARIES AGAINST CORNWALL

Cornwall made a poor show in their Minor Counties match with Berkshire, at Liskeard, yesterday. A notable absentee from the Cornish side was R. F. Scholefield, who did not accept his place, thus considerably weakening the batting strength. Macnamara, the ex-Liskeard and Penzance "pro," who is now playing for Ramsbottom in the Lancashire League, was brought into the home side, and E. Gibson (Liskeard) was another newcomer. E. M. Cunnack, having recovered from the injury to his hand, resumed his position. It was the first time for 17 years that a county game has been played at Liskeard, and the change of venue proved a success, the receipts amounting to well over £50.

Berkshire batted first and fared none too well at the start, losing two wickets for 10 runs, but a remarkable change came over the game when, A. P. F. Chapman went in. Chapman is one of the finest amateur batsmen in England, although he is not long past his majority. He came to the fore at Cambridge, later with the M.C.C., and the Gentlemen of England. He treated the spectators to a wonderful display of batting, and in a practically faultless 124 obtained 25 boundaries. Chapman was bat for 62 minutes before Whiting secured his wicket, and he scored at the rate of two runs per minute.

Brilliant single-handed catches by Gibson and Macnamara disposed of Stephens and Morris respectively, and half the side were out for 185. Woodburn, the visiting captain, also batted splendidly, being undefeated for 72. Hawksworth knocked up 33 in just over a quarter of an hour. The Berkshire innings concluded at 3.30 for 349.

Cornwall opened with Tresawna and Irwin, and the pair indulged in some sharp running, sending up 40 in the first half-hour. Just as the home county's supporters were beginning to build up hopes of a long partnership, Tresawna was caught by Woodburn after having made 24 out of a total of 46. Capt. Smith, after scoring six, was l.b.w. Commander Irwin continued to play cautiously, and with Cunnack took the score to 95 for the third wicket, Cunnack being caught after making 12. The fourth wicket fell without any addition to the score. Gibson and Irwin passed the century, but at 110 Irwin was taken behind the wicket by Stevens after compiling 41. A collapse of the home county followed, the remaining five batsmen producing only 12 runs.

With their score 227 runs behind Berkshire's total, Cornwall had to follow on, with about half-an-hour left for play. Tresawna was bowled in the second over after making a single, and Irwin and Smith took the score to 29 without further loss. Cornwall have to make 199 to avoid an innings defeat. Scores:—

MASTERLY DISPLAY FOR CORNWALL.

SINGLE INNINGS DEFEAT AVERTED.

BERKSHIRE BOWLERS HIT BY IRWIN.

A little over two and a half hours' play at Liskeard yesterday sufficed to finish the game between Cornwall and Berkshire, and in going under by ten wickets Cornwall sustained their first defeat this season in the Minor Counties' competition.

Such an advantage had Berkshire gained on the first day that when play was resumed yesterday it seemed only a question of what margin the visiting county would win by.

Following on overnight 227 runs behind, Cornwall had lost one wicket for 29 runs. The task of averting an innings' defeat was not an easy one, and had the conditions been similar to the opening day it is doubtful whether it would have been accomplished. Handicapped by a wet ball, however, the Berkshire bowlers for a long time were ineffective.

The overnight not out, Com. Irwin and L. C. Smith, batting freely, augmented the score at a good rate. The century was sent up after 45 minutes' play, but without any addition to the score Smith, who shaped well for 44, was clean bowled by Hawksworth, the partnership for the second wicket having yielded 93 runs.

HURRICANE HITTING.*

Com. Irwin, who reached his 50 in as many minutes, was next, partnered by Cunnack, and the scoring continued at a merry pace. The Helston player frequently drove to the boundary, but survived two chances before being dismissed by Hawksworth with the total at 140. Some hurricane hitting by Bickford followed. Missed in the slips before he had scored, the Liskeard man, following a slinky start, hit with tremendous vigour, scoring two successive 6's off Woodburn. In the next over from the same player he hit another 6, and was missed a second time in the deep field. He failed to take advantage of this blunder, however, being clean bowled by Hinde.

Another express delivery from the latter had Gibson completely beaten, and after Trevarthen had been forced to retire injured, wickets fell rapidly. There was every likelihood of an innings defeat for the home county when Trevarthen pluckily resumed. Offering a skilful resistance to this attack, he enabled Com. Irwin to complete his century, and the pair made the useful stand of 45 runs for the last wicket.

One of the opening batsmen, Irwin played a superb innings of 131. Until he had passed the century he did not give the semblance of a chance, and his masterly display alone saved his side a far heavier reverse. Never in difficulties, Irwin batted brilliantly all round the wicket, and 88 of his runs were by boundary hits.

COUNTY CRICKET AT LISKEARD

CORNWALL v. BERKSHIRE.

IRWIN'S PATIENCE AND CHAPMAN'S
BRILLIANCE.

A SUCCESSFUL RESUSCITATION.

The long anticipated resumption of county cricket in the eastern end of Cornwall took place on the fine Lisk and ground on Wednesday and Thursday, Berkshire, best of the minor counties, being the visitors, and bringing with them the redoubtable left-handed amateur, A. P. F. Chapman. The popularity of the game in Liskeard and district was shown by the splendid attendance all day Wednesday, when parties arrived by rail and car from all over the countryside, and the officials were in the happy position of being able to announce a record gate for 1923. The ground had received every attention, and no prettier sight could have been staged than the fluttering flags, close-cropped lawn, and the summer dresses of the ladies, when H. Tresawna led the home county out to field promptly at 11.30. The sun at that time and throughout the day was very fierce, and perhaps in this may be found the excuse for the weakness of the home batting display after a gruelling time in the field.

BERKSHIRE INNINGS.

Success came to Cornwall early, for Whiting completely beat Remnant with only six scored, and Gibson brought off a nice catch in the slips to dismiss Ellis, with double figures only just reached. Then came the hard-hitting Chapman, who in two minutes over an hour scored 124 runs—exactly 2 per minute. There was a foretaste of what was to come with the second ball he received, which he pulled to leg for 4, and thereafter he thrilled and delighted supporters and opponents alike with a masterly display of scoring on the leg side. Rarely indeed did he drive, more than half his runs came behind mid-wicket, although a curious push shot between point and cover was very effective, and his fine judgment of a run was often helpful. He practically gave no chance, although he was very nearly caught napping when Smith hit the wicket with a fine return from short leg. An appeal then might have saved the home county a hundred runs, for those in line with the crease are confident that the batsman was outside. Whilst Chapman was scoring, Stokes kept up his end, being ironically applauded when he got a boundary, and batting 73 minutes before he was caught by Tresawna for 20 runs. Bowling changes were ineffective until Whiting had a turn at the road end, which resulted in his second ball shocking curiously, and beating Chapman's defence. The latter received a great reception on his return to the enclosure. His score included 25 boundaries. The telegraph then was 167-4-124, and the visitors took advantage of the tiredness of the attack to add another 180, their captain, Woodburn, playing a perfect 72 not out. The outstanding features of the latter part of the innings were two fine catches, Macnamara holding a very hot drive at mid-off, and Gibson bringing off a beauty high up right handed in the slips.

CORNWALL'S BATTING.

Cornwall were thus faced with 349 to make to gain the first innings lead. This they never looked like doing after Tresawna, who accompanied Irwin to the wicket, was unluckily caught in the slips from a ball that rose badly. The latter went on scoring steadily, but could get no assistance, and the innings only realised 122, of which 18 were extras.

The second venture started half-an-hour before time for drawing stumps, and the captain was again unfortunate, playing on to Hearne with only a single on the board. Irwin and Smith remained together until stumps were drawn, with the score at 29 for one, and 198 still required to save the innings defeat.

Thursday morning came with an unusual damp mist hanging over the ground, but no appeal was made against the light, and the overnight not-outs faced Hearne from the road end and Hawke from the other. Both batsmen played good cricket, and appeared well set, when a ball that rose quickly beat Smith, who had played faultlessly, and brought the score to the excellent one of 100 for two. Cunnack came in and hit so hard as to get 30 in twenty minutes, including a boundary "overthrow."

On his departure in the same way as Smith, Bickford joined the Commander, and treated the 47 gate to a display of hitting bigger, but unfortunately not so sustained, as Chapman's. After three quiet overs, he opened his shoulders to two in succession. The first ball cleared the road by many yards, into the field beyond, and the next into the road. He took another six and a boundary before being bowled by a bailer from Hind, who had relieved Hawkesworth. Gibson failed first ball, and Trevarthen came in to be so badly hurt in the ribs that he had to retire. Macnamara, Whiting, Hawke and Williams did nothing, and had Trevarthen not been able to continue the innings would have closed for 210, with Irwin not out at 97. Happily with someone to run for him, the pro. came out again, and with his help the total passed the Berkshire one by 28. Irwin's innings is beyond all praise. Faced throughout with the collapse of his side, he continued stoically to play the game, and scored his runs without a fault. It was a great exhibition of perfect cricket under trying conditions, and without disparagement of Chapman, must rank as the best feature of the match. He hit 22 boundaries. Trevarthen, too, deserves all praise for his plucky innings when in extreme pain. Altogether the Cornish second innings was a great credit to the team, and provided two hours' exhilarating cricket to the fair number who were optimistic enough to turn up.

CORNWALL'S MATCH WITH DORSET.

STEADY BATTING.

CENTURY BY KNIGHT.

There was a long day's cricket in the Minor Counties championship game between Cornwall and Dorset at Penzance yesterday, play starting at ten o'clock and stumps not being drawn until seven. The reason for this was that to-day Cornwall want to leave home by the 4 p.m. train to meet Monmouth at Ebbw Vale.

The Cornish team underwent four changes from that which opposed Berkshire, W. Nicholls (Redruth), J. V. Bentley (Penzance), Dr. Birks (Hodges), and R. F. Schofield (Helston) filling the places of W. Lawke (Camborne), E. Gibson (Liskeard), G. H. Buckford (Liskeard), and Macnamara.

Winning the toss, Cornwall first went to the wickets, and in a few minutes less than three hours, which brought them to lunch time, they completed their innings for 229.

With Tresawna and Irwin in against the bowling of Harrison and Cummins runs came freely—35 in fifteen minutes. The partnership terminated at the end of three-quarters of an hour, when Irwin succumbed to a catch by Elderton off Busk, after compiling 44. Schofield joined Tresawna, who did not stay much longer, a pretty catch by Elderton, the wicket-keeper, displacing him when he had made a serviceable 36. Two wickets had now gone for 61.

The next stand of importance was by Dr. Birks, who headed the innings with the best individual total (45). The position was then 150 for four wickets. Smith, Trevanthen, Nicholls, and Whiting were the only other batsmen to reach double figures.

Dorset replied with a total of 276. Jephson, who made 31, had scored only 8 when Nicholls almost stumped him, and Knight, whose two hours' batting was the feature of the innings, gave an opportunity to Smith in the field. Jephson was well caught by Bentley low down. Three wickets fell for 107, Busk being clean bowled by Whiting. Dorset had 230 on the board, with six wickets in hand, and on the adjournment for tea, with the score at 243, Knight and O'Shea were still holding their own. Resuming, O'Shea was caught by Trevanthen off Whiting for 48, the partnership having added 109 runs.

Soon afterwards Knight was bowled by Whiting for a contribution of 110, including ten 4's and one 6. Smith bowled Cummins, who had made 8, and in the next over, without any runs having been added, Cunneen, with a fine catch near the boundary, sent Elderton back off Whiting's bowling. With one run added William brought off a splendid catch in the slips which accounted for Harrison's wicket, and in the same over Pinney returned the ball to Smith, and the innings closed for 276. The last four wickets produced only one run.

CORNISH CAPTAIN'S STRANGE OBSESSION.

AN OMEN AND ITS SEQUEL.

CORNWALL v. DORSET.

After defeating Devon handsomely at Exeter on Saturday, Dorset opposed Cornwall in a two-days' match at Penzance on Monday, in connection with the Minor Counties' Championship. The Cornish team had undergone considerable alteration from that which opposed Berkshire at Liskeard last week. W. Nicholls (Redruth), J. V. Bentley (Penzance), Dr. Birks (Roche), and Scholefield replacing W. Hawke (Camborne), F. Gibson (Liskeard), G. H. Bickford (Liskeard), and Macnamara.

The morning opened hazy, but very warm, and as there was an absence of breeze, there was promise of a very hot day. There was not a large attendance when play opened. Cornwall won the toss, and Tresawna and Irwin opened to the bowling of Harrison and Cummins. Runs came steadily, and 36 were registered in the first quarter of an hour. Both batsmen were shaping with confidence, and a double change in the bowling was tried, Bush and Walby taking on. Still runs continued to come, until at the end of three-quarters of an hour's play 78 had been scored. Then Irwin succumbed to a smart catch behind the wickets by Elderton off Busk, after compiling an excellent 42. Scholefield filled the gap. Soon after Tresawna shared an exactly similar fate to Irwin, being caught very smartly by the Dorset wicket keeper off Busk. Two wickets were down for 81, Tresawna's contribution being 38.

Dr. Birks joined Scholefield, and both men seemed to settle down to the bowling. With the century in sight, Cummins relieved Busk, and Birks with a boundary, off Cummins completed Cornwall's first hundred. Harrison then replaced Walby, and in his first over Scholefield was caught by Pinney, the telegraph reading 106-3-9.

Capt. L. C. Smith then partnered Dr. Birks, and 130 were hoisted at 11.30. Dr. Birks hit a couple of boundaries in succession, bringing the total to 150, and then fell a victim to a catch by Busk off Cummins, for a splendid 45.

In the same over, Capt. Smith was dismissed, being caught by Elderton behind the wickets off Cummins, his contribution being a patient 14.

Cunnack joined Bentley, and he also was dismissed by a catch after making 9.

E. A. Trevarthen filled the vacancy, and then Bentley hit a ball up off Cummins, and was caught by Busk.

Nicholls and Trevarthen, both of whom hail from Redruth, then became associated at the wickets, and scored freely, Nicholls having the misfortune of being stumped when he had made 16, the total being 199.

Whiting was next at the wickets. To Trevarthen fell the honour of raising the home total to 200. Whiting opened his innings with a boundary. Trevarthen, who was playing most promisingly, was smartly stumped when only one short of his quarter of a century.

Beecher Williams was last man in, and was caught by Jephson off Walby after making 5. Whiting being not out 11. Cornwall's total was 229.

The attendance had considerably improved after lunch. Dorset had batted one over before lunch, scoring 5 runs, during which Chadwick was missed by Smith off Whiting. With only seven runs scored, however, Chadwick was caught by Birks off Smith, who, with Whiting, had opened the attack. Just before 30 had been scored, Tresawna relieved Smith. Knight had joined Jephson, and began by hitting pretty vigorously. Jephson narrowly missed being stumped when he had scored 8. At this juncture Beecher Williams took on vice Whiting. When Knight had made 29 he was missed by Smith in the deep field. With 60 up, Bentley took the ball from Tresawna. With his score at 31 and the total 81, Jephson was smartly caught by Bentley off Whiting. Knight, however, was hitting very vigorously.

Busk, who partnered Knight, had the distinction of being the first man bowled for the day, falling a victim to Whiting. Trevarthen relieved Smith, and in his first over had Mauser caught by Smith. Four wickets were down for 146. O'Shea joined Knight, and both hit out, boundaries coming rapidly. After his initial success, Trevarthen proved very expensive. With 180 scored, Smith replaced Trevarthen.

MONDAY'S PLAY.

At the tea adjournment Dorset had scored 243, Knight and O'Shea being unbeaten. Runs had been piled up rapidly just prior to the adjournment. Knight, with a boundary completed his century, and enabled his side to pass the Cornish total. He had been batting for about 2 hours.

Resuming, O'Shea was caught by Trevarthen off Whiting, for 48. This partnership had added 109 runs. Eventually Knight succumbed to Whiting, whose previous ball had beaten the batsman. Knight had compiled the fine total of 118, which included ten 4's and one 6.

Smith captured Cummins' wicket when the latter had made 8, the total being 275 for seven wickets.

In the next over, without any runs having been added, Cunnack dismissed Elderton with a fine one-handed match, off Whiting. With only one run added, Williams brought off a magnificent catch

in the slips, which sent Harrison back, and in the same over Pinney returned one weakly to Smith, and the innings closed for 276, the last four wickets having added only one run.

This collapse was all the more remarkable following, as it did, the magnificent innings of Knight, and his spectacular partnership with O'Shea, when runs came with almost disconcerting ease and rapidity.

CORNISH CAPTAIN'S STRANGE OBSESSION.

Cornwall re-started 47 in arrears, which was a far more satisfactory position than at one time could have been hoped for. Tresawna and Irwin again faced the bowling, and runs came along at a very satisfactory pace. Tresawna enjoyed one or two favours of fortune, but with 90 on the board without loss, things were becoming more rosy for the home county.

Then there happened one of the strangest incidents in local cricket. It only required a quarter of an hour to close of play, and there was no suggestion of either Tresawna or Irwin losing his wicket, when Tresawna, the home captain, left his wicket, walked towards the pavilion and summoned Beecher Williams. A brief conversation ensued, and then those in the vicinity heard the names of Whiting and Cunnack called.

It seemed as if Skipper Tresawna had a premonition of what was to occur and had nominated his successors in the order in which they would be required.

This foreboding was borne out in a remarkable manner. Tresawna had no sooner returned to the wicket than he was stumped, and, without addition to the score, Irwin was dismissed. Whiting had taken Tresawna's place at the wickets, and in endeavouring to block the first ball he received, he just grazed it, and was caught behind the stumps. Cunnack, who had taken Irwin's place, was now joined by Beecher Williams, thus completing in its entirety Tresawna's obsession.

This had also wrought a great difference in the complexion of the game. From the score of 92 without loss, the telegraph now read: 92 for three.

However, Williams and Cunnack kept their ends up till stumps were drawn at 7 o'clock—nine hours cricket—when the score read: Cornwall—2nd innings—107 for 3.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

Cunnack and Williams, the overnight's not outs, resumed their innings at 10 o'clock, Williams having 11 to his credit, whilst Cunnack had not scored. Williams took up the running, and carried his total to 27, when he was caught behind the wickets by Elderton off Busk, the total then being 127. Scholefield partnered Cunnack, and opened well, but did not last long, being beaten by Walby when he had made 9. Dr. Birks, who followed, had a brief stay, also succumbing to Walby, who was bowling well.

Six wickets were down for 151 when Smith joined Cunnack, who was batting steadily.

In direct contrast to the opening day, however, the ball seemed to have supremacy over the bat, Walby being particularly dangerous. Cunnack was the next to succumb to this bowler, Bentley was dismissed by him without scoring, Trevarthen followed next after making 8, and then Nicholls was run out.

The innings closed at 11.15, for the somewhat mediocre total of 168, leaving Dorset 122 to win.

DORSET'S SECOND INNINGS.

Dorset started their second innings with Jephson and Knight, Whiting and Smith bowling. With only seven scored, Jephson gave a difficult chance to Smith in the slips off Whiting. Hoping to profit by this, Jephson lifted the next ball with a hefty shot, with which Cunnack made no mistake, and the batsman was sent back with only two to his credit—peculiarly enough Dorset's total being identical with that of their first innings—seven runs for one wicket.

Busk was missed in his first over by Nicholls off Whiting, and then began to hit freely. Nicholls made amends for this, however, by smartly taking Knight off Williams. Whiting had hard lines in not catching Mauser, but in the next over secured his wicket, Tresawna bringing off a fine catch. Three wickets were down for 37.

The score mounted steadily and at mid-day, Dorset had added 50. Busk's innings came to a peculiar termination. He hit a ball from Williams hard, and turned to see where it had gone. The ball spun round, and stopped within Nicholls' reach, and before Busk realised what had happened the wicket keeper had the balls off. Of the total of 57, Busk had made 28.

O'Shea, who hit so finely on the previous day, opened with a boundary. He was not so happy on this occasion, however, and never seemed really comfortable, Whiting securing his downfall by a smart catch off his own delivery.

There was now a fine fighting chance for Cornwall, five of Dorset's best batsmen having been dismissed, for just half of the required amount.

Chadwick was next to leave, Williams bringing off a fine catch in the slips off Whiting. Chadwick had contributed 29. Six wickets for 87.

At a quarter to one the century was hoisted, and immediately Cummins was missed by Smith off Whiting.

The match concluded just on the lunch interval with Dorset winners by four wickets.

The M.C.C. went to the wickets first and Bettington drove Whiting to the boundary for 4. Durlacher opened very slowly but later hit Whiting for three. The bowling was shared by Whiting and Trevarthen, the Redruth pro. Bettington was giving a masterly display but from one of Whiting's balls he was caught by Trevarthen for 17. Hough was next in and without adding to the score he was caught by Trevarthen off Whiting. The telegraph read 29-2-0. Light, the Devon professional, next occupied the wicket with Durlacher. Rust was fielding well in the slips and stopped a hot shot from Durlacher. Light had made four when Cunnaack missed him in the deep field, the ball going right through his hands. Trevarthen was bowling well and, keeping an excellent length, up to this period had bowled five overs and only had eleven runs knocked off him. The fielding of the Cornishmen was excellent. Runs were not coming so freely but things were livened a little when Light hit Whiting to the boundary for four. Trevarthen's seventh, eighth and ninth overs were maidens. Durlacher hit two off Trevarthen and the forty was signalled. Light was in for half an hour to make seven when he was c and b Whiting. Tregear occupied the wicket next but his stay was of a short duration, he being clean bowled by Trevarthen for a duck. Deburgh next went to the wickets to partner Durlacher, and hit Trevarthen to the boundary for four. A single by Deburgh brought the score up to fifty. Deburgh hit Trevarthen to the boundary for four whilst Durlacher was playing very careful cricket. At fifty-eight a change in the bowling was made, Beecher Williams coming on vice Trevarthen. The 60 was not long in being registered. At 70 Capt. Ashton went on vice Whiting and soon the score was 87 for five wickets, Deburgh being out for 22. Scholefield faced Light's deliveries with extreme caution and off his third ball he secured a single. Cunnaack partnered Scholefield and the latter pulled Bettington to the boundary for four. Cunnaack secured a couple off Bettington but two overs later he was caught by Wright for 5, the score board reading 15-2-5. GOOGLY PARALYSIS AFFECTS CORNWALL

To conclude the season's programme Cornwall had an attractive fixture with the M.C.C. at Penzance, on Monday. W. Rogers (Camborne) was brought into the home side and "Kit" Trevarthen, the veteran county player, made his reappearance. Commander Irwin, one of Cornwall's best batsmen, was a notable absentee, being away from the county. The visitors included R. H. Bettington, of Oxford University, a googly bowler of the best type. Bettington first on a perfect wicket, the M.C.C. opened with Bettington and Durlacher against the bowling of Trevarthen and Whitting. Runs were coming at a slow pace, Trevarthen and Whitting's bowling being splendid, backed up by keen fielding. The half-century was reached within one hour's play with four wickets down. After an hour and a half's play, Beecher Williams and Capt. Ashton went on in place of Trevarthen and Whitting. At the luncheon interval the M.C.C. had scored 112 runs for the loss of six wickets. Half an hour's play after lunch sufficed to dispose of the visitors for 176. The Cornish batsmen found the bowling of Bettington, the googly bowler, almost unplayable. In his first over he had Rust caught almost on the boundary line before the scoring had been opened. "Kit" Trevarthen knocked the "googly" bowler to boundary, but three balls later, his stumps were disturbed by the same bowler. In less than 30 minutes, four Cornish wickets had gone down for a quarter of a century. The Cornish man continued to play havoc with the Cornish batsmen, bowling Nicholls for four, and then secured Scholefield's dismissal for 10 runs after being at the wickets for 40 minutes. Cornwall's 38 so far included 12 byes. At this stage, Bettington's analysis was six wickets for 21 in nine overs. Bentley and Treawna became associated, and the net was stopped, the half-century being registered without further loss. The Penzance man batted confidently, but Treawna was not at ease, and was stumped by Day after scoring a couple. Bentley was top scorer with 14. W. Rogers and Beecher Williams carried the score from 56 to 70 for the last wicket. Cornwall's innings lasted just over an hour. Bettington had the splendid analysis of eight wickets for 30 runs. Being 106 runs behind, Cornwall had to follow on, and half the side were out for 48 runs, but the remaining batsmen raised the total to 131. E. M. Cunneen and J. V. Bentley each made 24 runs. Whitting hit the only six. Bettington's performance for the day was 16 wickets for less than seven runs apiece.
