DURHAM v. STAFFORDSHIRE.

Durham and Staffordshire met yesterday for the first time since 1920, on the ground of the Consett and District Club at Blackfyn. The pitch was soft, and the wicket rather tricky, when Russell, having won the toss, sent in K. W. C. Dobson and P. F. Stubbs to face the attack of Weight and T. K. Dobson. Runs came freely at starting, Dobson punishing his namesake for a dozen in one over, including a splendid straight drive for six.

The first wicket fell at 24, Dobson slaying a ball to Wake at point. Something of a collapse followed, and five wickets were down for 40, Weight claiming four of the victims. Jolly, ninth in, hit with some freedom for 20 not out, and the venture, which lasted just upon 60 minutes, realized 98. Weight and Dobson bowled unchanged; the professional having six wickets for 44, and Dobson four for 49. Dobson got a good deal of spin on the ball, and was unfortunate in having two easy chances off his bowling dropped by Hall. Brookes dropped a sharp chance in the slips, and Swinhoe failed to gather a somewhat difficult chance at mid-off, both escapes being off Weight's bowling.

Durham opened badly, the two local batsmen, S. Hall and A. Oliver, both falling quickly. Weight shaped well, but fell to a fine catch by Hunt after scoring 14. Swinhoe and Brookes displayed great caution, and their partnership was the most productive of the innings. None of the batsmen seemed at home to Morgan, a fast left-hand bowler, who emerged with the excellent return of eight wickets for 20. He finished off the innings, which lasted almost exactly the same time as Staffordshire's, by bowling T. K. Dobson and W. Spiller with successive balls, the innings realizing 83.

Staffordshire scored 136 in their second venture; Sedgwick and Stubbs with 38 and 34 respectively being the chief scorers. Common was very prominent behind the wickets, catching two batsmen and stumping three. Durham, not to get 154 to win, had scored six without loss at the drawing of stumps. Score:—

DURHAM v. STAFFORDSHIRE.

Durham failed at Blackfyn in their attempt to get the 154 runs required in their second innings, and were defeated by Staffordshire by 12 runs after an exciting finish. Overnight Staffordshire had completed both their innings for 98 and 138, against Durham's score of 83 and 6 for no wickets. Oliver (5) and Hall (1), the overnight not out, gave a good display yesterday, and took the score to 47 in 70 minutes, when both were dismissed. Oliver's 30 was free from fault, but Hall was missed from a ridiculously easy chance by Jolly when 11.

Weight and Swinhoe did little, but the home captain, H. Brooks, and Wake, of Chester-le-Street, presented a stout resistance, and had carried the score to 93 for four wickets at the luncheon interval. Upon the resumption after lunch runs came at a good pace, Brooks in particular scoring with freedom. Oddly enough, as was the case with Oliver and Wake, both batsmen fell at the same score—132—; their partnership having added an invaluable 70, and placed the home county in a strong position.

With four wickets in hand Durham required 22 to win, but Lockett and Platt finished off the innings in ten minutes, and Staffordshire won a narrow victory by a dozen runs, the innings having lasted three hours. The Staffordshire bowling was close, but the ground fielding was faulty. Russell kept wicket well, despite a nasty blow in the face from a rising ball. Score:—

FIGHT FOR RUNS AT FEETHAMS.

WEST INDIANS 103 RUN ON
WITH 8 WICKETS IN HAND.

There was nothing particularly exhilarating about the cricket at Feethams yesterday, when Durham County met the West Indies.

T. Kinch, the Durham captain, won the toss, and sent the visitors in to bat on a wicket which was drying rapidly after the rain of the previous night. His policy fully justified itself, as the West Indians found both Weight and Dobson exceedingly difficult to play, and credit must be given to the bowlers for getting all the assistance they could from the wicket.

The cross wind helped Dobson to swing very awkwardly, and some of his deliveries nipped back from the pitch more quickly than the batsman anticipated.

Yet, despite the fact that he took four of the first six wickets, he was not more difficult to play than Weight, who not only kept a splendid length, but got a good deal of spin on the ball.

Lesson to Spectators.

The brightest feature of the West Indies' innings was the batting of Constantine, who made some beautiful off drives in his 16, and hit Weight over the rails for six. The big feature of the innings, however, was the masterly defensive display of Challoner, who carried out his bat for 47. Challoner not only used his bat effectively, but the spectators got a lesson on the use to which a first-class batsman makes of his legs in defence.

Durham's fielding was very good, and Common's wicket-keeping exceptionally fine. The County cracked up in amazing fashion, finding the bowling of Browne very difficult to cope with. Not only was Browne successful with the ball—he took five wickets for 26—but he did well in batting, assisting Challoner in the biggest partnership of the day. He is a medium-paced off-break bowler, and had three men at short leg.

He got Harry Turner beautifully caught from a hard drive by Holt, although the latter was not more than eight yards from the wicket. Francis and Constantine are both fast bowlers, and the former in getting Brooks bowled off his pads with the first ball was fortunate.

At the close of play the tourists were 103 runs on with eight wickets in hand. Visitors would appreciate a little accuracy in the telegraph board. Yesterday it was a deceiver ever. Details:—

WEST INDIES WIN EASILY.

PASCALL TAKES 3 WICKETS
FOR NO RUNS.

Another inert batting display was given by Durham against the West Indies, at Derlington, yesterday, when the tourists won by 180 runs.

Whilst the batting of the County XI. fell far below expectations, one must pay tribute to the excellent bowling of the visitors. Pascall, a medium paced left-arm bowler, was unplayable, and bowled six maiden overs, during which he took three wickets.

Weight was the most successful of the Durham bowlers, taking four wickets for 41. After lunch the professional was extremely effective, and took the last three wickets at a cost of 14 runs. Weight also made a splendid effort to put an end to the rot which set in during the Durham innings, staying at the wickets just over an hour for his 13 not out.

Challoner was again to the fore for the the visitors, but Holt played the livelier innings, scoring 53 in 50 minutes. Turner was the only bowler to get him into difficulties, and the Darlington man secured his wicket and that of Constantine for 17 runs. Details:—

HARRY TURNER'S BENEFIT MATCH.

Redcar, regarded as probably the best batting side in the N.Y. and S.D. League, are due at Feethams to-morrow, when Harry Turner, the Darlington Club's professional, takes his benefit. DURHAM v. LANCASHIRE II.

The weather was dull and threatening when the match commenced on the pleasant little ground at Chester-le-Street. Kinch won the toss for the home county, and sent in C. F. Gowland and Weight on a wicket which looked promising, but might do anything if the sun came through. Brown and Ellis opened the bowling.

With ten on the board Gowland got in front of a ball from Ellis, but the Durl. m. captain and Weight settled down to some steady cricket. The pair added 96 runs, and then Kinch was cleverly taken at the wicket off Ellis.

J. R. Wake filled the vacancy, and a period of quiet play followed. Minshull

and Hopwood had displaced the opening pair, and the former was making the ball rear up a good deal, whilst the left-hander gave little away. Weight did most of the scoring, and some of his hooks and off drives were beautifully timed.

The score steadily mounted to 70, when Wake slashed round at a fine ball from Hopwood and lost his leg bail. H. C. Ferens and Weight carried on the good work until the lunch interval arrived, with the score at 77 for three wickets.

In the second over after lunch Ferens left, but Weight and M. Nichol took the score to 100. The professional reached his 50 soon after. He had a quick over or two and then got in three delightful square cuts. Nichol skied a ball, and retired in favour of Common.

The sun had now come out, and the wicket began to play tricks. Weight, however, was too firmly established to be disturbed, and he collected runs all round the wicket. His partnership with A. Goodrick helped things considerably, both men going for every ball that was pitched up. When within eight of his century Weight sliced a ball into the slips, and was caught after a patient, useful innings.

He hit eleven 4's, and his timing throughout was splendid. Hard square cutting and vigorous hooks off the body were his best contributions. A. Goodrick's innings was marked by strong forward play. The Durham effort realized 208 in about 34 hours.

The Lancashtrians, on a newly-rolled pitch, started aggressively, both Houseman and Youren going for the bowling in enterprising style. The former scored the more rapidly of the two until taken at leg off Goodrick. The latter bowled steadily, and kept the batsmen guessing all the time. At one period he had six maiden overs in succession. Hopwood was frequently in difficulties, but collected runs at a fair pace until Spiller, displacing Milam at the town end, disturbed his wickets. DURHAM DRAW WITH LANCASHIRE II.

On the resumption of the game at Chester-le-Street, yesterday, J. T. Tyldesley and Minshull set out to rub off the aches of 80. The wicket was fast and easy, and both batsmen played confidently. The enterprising pair put on over 100 runs inside an hour. Minshull drove powerfully, and his placing was rarely at fault. The Lancashire captain specialized on shots off the leg and late cuts, a decided crispness being the feature of all his work.

When Minshull had scored 90 he gave a hard chance to Spiller. The latter got one hand to the drive, but the ball went on to the boundary for fear. A little later Tyldesley put back a terrific return to Marshall, who made a valiant attempt to hold the ball, but failed, and had to retire with a damaged hand.

In the next over the professional tamely sent the ball back to Goodrick, and retired for a well-played 96. The visiting captain soon followed him, and the Lancashire innings closed with the score at 278, 70 runs on.

Durham started their second innings badly. With only ten runs on the board A. Goodrick was caught and bowled, and T. Kinch left seven runs later. J. R. Wake and Weight stayed for a while, but the latter nibbled at a rising ball, and was easily taken in the slips. H. C. Ferens followed in and helped Wake to put the score steadily up.

The most popular stand of the innings was the partnership between the two local players, Wake and Gowland. The latter, in a natural anxiety to avoid gathering a pair, was not too confident, but later he played soundly. The score eventually reached 173.

Lancashire had an hour and three-quarters in which to get 114 runs. After the effects of the roller had worn off, however, Spiller found a spot, and, keeping to it, he rattled the stumps of Houseman, Youren, and Minshull in quick succession. Tyldesley's first ball found his legs in front of the wicket, and within three-quarters of an hour five men were out with only 32 runs on the board. In attempting to take a hot return from Brown, Spiller severely injured his hand, and had to retire. Goodrick, who was bowling very steadily at the other end, captured three wickets cheaply, and about 20 minutes from time, with three wickets in hand, the visitors required over 50 runs.

After Brown had left for a careful 22 P. Ekersley and Hopwood played out time, and at the close of play Lancashire's score stood at 74 for seven wickets. Score:—

Lancashire II, sent in Houseman and Yeoman to face the bowling of Goodrick and Spiller. These two batsmen scored smartly, getting four fours in two overs, and 40 was reached when Houseman was caught by Nichol for 29. Leach shortly afterwards was out lbw for only 1, and P. Eckersley was caught by Marshall for two at short leg by a rising ball. Three wickets were down for 46.

After an interval for tea, Hopwood joined Yeoman with Goodrick and Weight as bowlers, when the scoring became slow. Youren was caught by Weight, and at 100 Marshall took a hand at bowling with C. R. Milam at the other end. At 109 Spiller, who was bowling at a fast pace, found Hopwood's stumps for 37. White replaced him, and after making 6 he was caught by Wake from Marshall's bowling. J. T. Tydesley received a hearty send-off from the pavilion as he went to the wicket and joined Minshull. Shortly afterwards stumps were drawn for the day, Lancashire having batted just over two hours for 128. Goodrick had bowled six maiden overs in succession.

Lancashire followed on from the previous day, before a good company, with J. T. Tydesley and Minshull as companions and Goodrick and Spiller as bowlers. Tydesley scored from off the first ball, and the total of 128 from the previous night was quickly carried to 150, with Minshull driving well at the boundary. Tydesley also displayed his fine old form which greatly delighted the public, who

were treated to some first-class cricket. He is an old Lancashire cricketer who has scored some thousands of runs for his county, with dozens of centuries. He has taken up as coach at Old Trafford in place of A. C. McLaren and is a great favourite with the boys. He has figured for all England many times. Thus his presence at Chester-le-Street was most pleasing and popular. Milburn relieved Goodrick at bowling, and a great cheer was raised when Minshull reached his 50. Weight also took a hand at bowling, and Minshull continued to place some nice shots resulting in additional scoring until 200 was on the board. A new ball was used. Tydesley placed his side ahead of Durham's score with a pretty shot—a glance to the leg, and soon 220 was reached. After playing for an hour Tydesley and Minshull had increased the score by 100—an excellent record of batting. Minshull, who had made 91, gave a difficult chance to Spiller who, however, failed to hold the ball. Soon after this Marshall, in attempting to stop a ball from Tydesley, received an injury to his thumb and had to leave the field. Lancashire had now scored 260 runs, when Minshull was caught and bowled by Goodrick after making 96 of which 12 were boundaries. Tydesley had also reached his 50. This wicket made 132 runs. These batsmen had kept together for an hour and a half and Minshull received quite an ovation on returning to the pavilion. J. T. Tydesley, who had played a magnificent game, was dismissed by Spiller with one of his fast balls. This old campaigner had made 64 runs, half of which he obtained by boundaries. Brown went to the wicket and was quickly dismissed by one of Spiller's straight balls without adding to the score. Ellis was caught by Taylor (sub) for a duck. Parkinson, the last man in, was not out for 1, and with 22 extras Lancashire's total was 278, being 70 ahead of Durham.

After luncheon, Durham sent in Weight and Goodrick to bat, and after having made 3, Goodrick was caught and bowled by Ellis. Shortly afterwards T. Kinch was caught in the slips by Hopwood for 4. Wake and Weight became companions to Brown's bowling with Ellis at the other end. Wake at this point received an ugly blow in the mouth, but continued to play, receiving encouraging cheers from the crowd. Weight, after playing a good game, was caught by Houseman from off Hopwood's ball for 22. H. C. Ferens became companion to Wake, and soon 50 was telegraphed. Durham had now made 70 and their combined score was equal to Lancashire's. Wake and Ferens were settling down and appeared in good form, scoring easily. Hopwood, the left-handed bowler, replaced Ellis with Minshull at the other end. Ferens sent up an easy catch in the slips and Hopwood secured it, for

24. M. Nichol was unfortunate in being run out without having a ball. J. J. Common batted next, when the telegraph recorded 100. Brown now replaced Minshall at bowling. After making 15, with the score at 123, J. J. Common was clean bowled by G. Brown for 15. C. F. Gowland joined Wake, the latter making a boundary at the offset, with several others following. These two local men are attached to the Chester-le-Street Club, and they made a good stand. Ellis missed a chance from Wake in the slips, failing to hold the ball. Shortly after this Wake reached his 50 amidst hearty applause, with the score at 150. He was bowled by Minshall for 59 and was greeted with loud cheers at the pavilion. After an adjournment for tea, the remainder of Durham's team were quickly dismissed with a total score of 183, or a combined innings of 391.

Lancashire went to the wicket having to get 114 runs to win in about two hours. When Tyldesley went in there was again great cheering for the popular international, and expectation of further first-class cricket. However, this hope was suddenly cut short for he was declared out at the first ball lbw from Spiller's ball, to the great disappointment of the crowd. N. White went to the wicket and became companions with Brown, but had only a short innings, being caught by Spiller at slip for 1, with a total score of 32. Five wickets were now down.

Marshall followed, and the great expectations of his repeating his morning performance of 96, was cast to the winds; for he, too, was dismissed at the first ball, the bales flying high in the air from Spiller's splendid bowling. Eckersley joined Brown and these two played a good game. At this point Spiller sustained a severe blow in attempting to stop a ball, which caused him intense agony in his hand by the ball striking the spot of a previous injury. He had to leave the field and be medically treated. He, however, persisted, in returning to the field and met with a great ovation. It was now 6-30 p.m., and the drawing of stumps; but as there was some probability of the match finishing, it was decided to extend the time to 7 o'clock. Brown was now caught by Common, from Goodrick's ball, after making 22. Eckersley carried his bat for 19, and the match closed for seven wickets for 74. CHESTER-LE-STREET versus BOLDON.

The weather on Saturday at Chester-le-Street was ideal for cricket except for a troublesome wind. Boldon were late in arriving, which delayed the commencement of the game until 3.10. Chester-le-Street jacked the services of Major Turnbull, who is at camp, and consequently played Howgate, the new wicket keeper from Craghead, the latter making his first appearance. Common and H. Stoddart were the first batsmen, the bowlers being Thackeray and Carr.

The first over was disastrous, Thackeray bowling Stoddart with the third delivery. Brockhill opened his scoring confidently with a boundary from the last ball of the over, and a little later obtained another from Carr, thus bringing up double figures. Carr, however, had his revenge by bowling him in the next over. Two wickets were now down for 14 runs.

Holt, the visitors' professional, was not very comfortable against Thackeray. A bowling change took place, Swinhoe bowling in place of Thackeray. Play continued to be swift and interesting, runs coming quickly, though mostly in singles. Holt with a three to leg which was converted into a seven by a wild overthrow. Thirty minutes' play brought up the half-century, both batsmen still scoring well.

Swinhoe proved expensive, so Thackeray once more took up the attack, and three runs later Crichton displaced Carr. Still the scoring was fast, and Holt, who had become well set, with a huge drive sent up the century, and also his own 50, off one of Crichton's deliveries after an hour's play.

Further changes in the attack followed, Martin, a slow left hander, going in at Thackeray's end and Carr returning. Holt should have been out after a mis-hit, but through a misunderstanding the chance went begging. Common also gave a chance, but it was a very hot drive, and Carr did well to even stop the ball. The batsmen had so far added more than 100 runs for the third wicket, and the fielding, owing doubtless to the heat, was slack. Wright took the ball and was successful in bringing about the necessary separation, Holt's wicket falling when he had made 73, the result of bright batting.

W. Malby was smartly caught off the first ball behind the wicket by Howgate, who was giving a good display behind the stumps. Hardy prevented the "hat-trick," and some further quick scoring brought the opening bowlers back again.

Common was unluckily run out when one short of his 50. His display had been a very patient one.

DURHAM II. v. NORTHUMBERLAND II.

In a high scoring match at Prince Consort Road, Gateshead, yesterday, 580 runs were scored in just under six hours, when Durham II. defeated Northumberland II. by 107 runs, the match concluding at 6.30 with the dismissal of Nichol.

The match served its purpose to show the batting strength of the lesser known League players of Northumberland and Durham, and incidentally to show up the weakness of the visiting attack. The fielding of the Northumbrians was disappointing, especially the ground work, but Geoffrey Wilkinson was seen to advantage after the initial stages of the Durham innings with his smart picking up and general alertness in the field. Durham, on the other hand, shone in the field, and their attack proved to be much stronger and more varied than that of the visitors.

Whether the fact that the wicket was easy to play and the bowling of an inferior quality accounted entirely for the prominence of certain Durham batsmen one cannot definitely say, but certainly the displays of Arthur Winnard, G. L. Crichton, C. E. Stephenson, and F. Pattinson were distinctly encouraging. A. Wilkinson, who, in addition to bowling well, hit up 39, was credited with two 6's and three 4's, but the best display of hitting came from Pattinson, who made his 56 runs in 34 minutes, and found the boundary on 11 occasions.

Winnard's best hits were a six and three 4's, while Stephenson, who with Crichton put on 98 for the seventh wicket, scored his 52 runs at the rate of a run per minute. He had a 5 and ten 4's in his account, while his partner, who was at this wicket 18 minutes for 65, hit no fewer than thirteen 4's. R. A. Tyson, who is a brother of Cecil Tyson, the Yorkshire player who did so well last year in the County Championship matches, was the pick of the Northumberland bowlers, and he preserved an even length for 14 overs.

Northumberland started very badly, Stubbart being stumped off the wicket keeper's pads with 10 on the board. Tyson and Wilkinson then added 80 for the second partnership. The South Northumberland player, who is a keen Rugby man, scored at a very rapid rate, and reached his 50 in 37 minutes. He had scored 31 in 41 minutes before he was well beaten by a fine ball from Crichton, and his hits included a 6 and ten 4's. He scored all round the wicket, and impressed one with his aggressiveness which was coupled with perfect timing. Ian McLachlan, Pritchard, Fraser, and Skinner offered some resistance to the Durham attack, but the 115 was closed for 239. Surrey, not unnaturally, had all the better of the play yesterday in their match with Durham at Ashbrooke, and when stumps were drawn the First Class County held a lead of 235 runs on the first innings and still had four wickets in hand.

Durham were not particularly fortunate on the run of the play, and their position would have been a much better one had full opportunity been taken of the chances which came their way in the last half-hour.

To commence with, the start was delayed half-an-hour owing to a misunderstanding with regard to the state of the pitch, which the visitors were informed would be unplayable until noon, and it was twelve o'clock before Durham, who won the toss, opened to the bowling of Peach and Hitch.

The wicket was fairly easy, but the outfield was slow, so that boundaries were difficult to make. Weight got Peach away for three off the first ball delivered, but he failed to get on top of Hitch's opening ball—a bad one—and gave an easy catch to Hobbs at cover point.

Brooks and Kinch then offered a stern resistance and compelled Hobbs, who captained the Surrey side, to make a treble bowling change before Brooks, who batted forty-five minutes for 20, and helped to add 45 in thirty-eight minutes, was caught by Hitch off Sadler.

With five more runs added Abel bowled Page, and with the score unaltered Thain caught Squance in the slips off the same bowler. Heaviesides helped Kinch to take the score to 70, and then the Durham captain was out leg before to Sadler. He had batted fifty-five minutes for a finely made 30, which included three fours and five threes.

Turner at the same score fell a victim to Sadler, who also bowled Common first ball after lunch, thus securing three wickets in four balls. Goodrick and Heaviesides added 15, but the last three wickets fell for 10 runs, Milam's wicket being cleverly thrown down by Hobbs. The innings of 95 had occupied 80 minutes. Sadler, with 5 for 22, secured the bowling honours, but the excellent way in which Hobbs handled the attack accounted largely for the rapid downfall of the Dunclethians.

Hobbs and Sandham, who opened for Surrey on an easy paced wicket to the bowling of Goodrick and Weight, sent up the 50 in 40 minutes. One run later Weight missed Sandham in the slips. Despite a double bowling change, Hobbs reached his 50 after batting 65 minutes, and the 100 was signalled five minutes later.

Sandham completed his half-century soon afterwards, but he lost Hobbs at 117, the famous All-England batsman giving a catch to Heaviesides in the long-field. He had batted 80 minutes for 71, and his hits included a six, off Weight's first ball, and seven fours. His placing was perfect, and he scored with remarkable ease all round the wicket.

Sandham left twenty-five minutes later, his 67 having been compiled in an hour and three-quarters. He helped to put on 151 runs in that time, and hit six 4's. The next partnership, between Ducat and Shepherd, produced 109 runs before the latter was caught by Page off Brooks, who was only given a turn with the ball when less than an hour remained for play, and 71 runs had been scored off Spiller in 13 overs.

Brooks, in the same over, got Ducat stumped when the International footballer was within five of his century after batting ninety minutes and hitting a 6 and fifteen 4's. The Sunderland amateur got Hitch caught in his next over, and he should have been credited with the wickets of Harrison and Abel. Common had the chance of stumping the former, while Kinch dropped the latter.

DURHAM v. SURREY.

Set to get 277 to avert an innings' defeat at Ashbrooke yesterday, Durham never looked like getting the runs, and despite the comparative weakness of the Surrey attack the match was over by five minutes past four, when the last home wicket fell with the total at 141. The visitors thus won by an innings and 136 runs, and one is inclined to think they would have triumphed by a much larger margin had Sadler, the promising young fast bowler, been put on earlier in the Durham second innings.

In the morning the outstanding four Surrey wickets produced 51 runs in one hour, Abel being credited with 40 of them. He was unheaten at the close, having batted 80 minutes in all for 71. Except for the costly miss overnight, Abel did not give a possible chance, and his hits included a 6 and eight 4's, the 6 and 5 of the boundaries being part of the 29 runs he made with his last eight strokes. The whole innings lasted four hours and a quarter, and produced 373 runs.

Spiller, who found the wicket much more to his liking in the morning, bowled with fine effect, his analysis reading nine overs two balls, four maidens, 11 runs, two wickets, but he had been hit for 71 the previous evening. Hubert Brooks returned the best bowling figures in the Surrey innings with three for 40.

Durham entered upon their second

venture 10 minutes before the luncheon interval, Goodrick and Turner coming out to face the bowling of Thain and Peach. Turner, who hit a four and a three off Peach in the first over, gave an easy catch to that bowler in Thain's last delivery before lunch, the score then being seven.

Brooks was splendidly taken by Hitch at square leg after the resumption with three runs added, and then came the first stand. Goodrick and Weight taking the total to 46 before the Darlington amateur, who had batted fifty minutes for 18, was bowled by Thain. Weight was associated in another good partnership, this time with Kinch, and 31 runs had been added when the Sunderland professional who had made 30, lifted a ball which Peach took with ease. Prior to this the 50 had been signalled in fifty-five minutes, and the first change, Harrison for Thain, had been made.

Two more wickets fell for the addition of five runs, Shepherd bowling Squance and Heaviesides, while nine runs later Kinch, who had given chances at 55 and 60, was out to a wretched stroke, the ball going straight up for Strudwick to secure an easy catch. The home captain with an aggregate of 57 for the two innings, was the highest Durham scorer, but his batting in the second venture lacked the polish of the previous day.

Page and Common sent up the 100 as the result of ninety-five minutes' batting, but with 13 more runs scored both were dismissed. Durham v. Cheshire.

TO-DAY'S PLAY AT PARK DRIVE.

Durham and Cheshire were opposed at Park Drive, West Hartlepool, to-day. There had been a very heavy fall of rain during the night, but the wicket was not seriously affected, and dried rapidly under the influence of a pleasant breeze.

The ground itself looked admirable. Long canvas strips were placed at two sides of the enclosure to obliterate the view of those who like to see their cricket "free, green, and for nothing."

Cheshire won the toss, and when the first pair went in to bat—H. W. Hodgson and W. E. Jones—the attendance was only very thin. The bowlers were Goodrick and Spiller. Ten minutes had elapsed when Hodgson was well beaten by Spiller, the Langley Park fast bowler. There were then only 7 runs on, Jones having opened his account with a boundary past cover.

Midgley, the new-comer, had scored two runs when he was misered at the slips by Heaviesides off Spiller. There were 26 runs on in as many minutes of play, when Midgley played a ball from Goodrick out to the wicket. Astle joined Jones, who had latterly been scoring more freely, making one or two pretty strokes to the off.

Spiller has a nice bowling action, and Astle, in particular, found him rather difficult to deal with. Jones got Goodrick cleverly to find leg for a boundary. The wicket was inclined to be a bit treacherous, and there was much vigorous patting by the batsmen.

There were 39 runs on when Jones cut 300 sharp into the slips from Goodrick, and was smartly taken by Spiller. He had been at the wicket 50 minutes for his 27 runs.

Astle and J. P. Hodgson brought up the 50 on the score board, reached in an hour and five minutes. Shortly afterwards the first change in the bowling was made, Weight going on for Goodrick, who had bowled 14 overs at the expense of 28 runs. Spiller also went off after 14 overs for 22 runs, Marshall taking his place.

The Cheshire batsmen treated the new bowling with respect, contenting themselves with a defensive game. Hodgson had got 7 runs when he played one back towards Weight, and was nearly taken. This followed a pretty bit of fiddling by Kinch, which met with well-merited applause.

The total was carried to 74 for the loss of three wickets when the luncheon interval was taken. On the resumption, Spiller and Goodrick went on to bowl once more. Astle was by now fairly comfortably settled, and continued to score with some freedom. A stick through the slips by him off Spiller sent up the century. Ferris was particularly brilliant in fielding at mid-off, and came in for round after round of applause.

At 102 Astle was given out lbw to Goodrick, having taken an hour and 22 minutes to compile his 42, which included five 4's. With the appearance of L. N. Jones to partner Hodgson, Marshall resumed bowling for Spiller at the pavilion end.

The attendance was rapidly increasing, and at 2-15 was about 1,000.

Hodgson was tempted once too often by Goodrick. His total was 26, when he stepped out at one, and was promptly stumped by Common, the Beldon veteran. Goodrick was bowling remarkably well, and the batsmen obtained few runs from him.

Jones was not destined to remain long, being bowled by Marshall after he had had some little trouble owing to a youngster playing in front of the sightboards. Deliveries from Marshall were coming up a good deal, and were not at all to the liking of Parry and Hope, who were now associated.

Wickets had fallen fairly rapidly following lunch, four batsmen being dismissed within an hour. After the fall of the fourth wicket at 102, three more batsmen were dismissed with only 14 runs added.

Parry and Clifton began to hven things up a little, and in one over from Goodrick—after he had bowled five successive maidens—nine runs were scored. In the next over, however, Goodrick was treated with greater respect.

The Durham fielding was quite good in all positions, but chiefly so at point and mid-off. The total was 137 when Clifton had his basis scattered by Goodrick, and with the first ball of his next over Marshall displaced Parry.

The "tail" wagged insignificantly, and Cheshire were all out for 138.

Durham commenced action at 3-30 with Weight and Wake, the bowlers being Clifton and Dean, the former a fast bowler, whose pace can be indicated by the fact that the wicket-keeper thought it wise to stand some eight or ten yards behind the stumps. Ten runs were on in less than a quarter of an hour, and a little later Wake put one up in the direction of point. The chance was lost through some confusion between point and cover.

Durham v. Cheshire.

The Durham and Cheshire cricket match was resumed at Park Drive, West Hartlepool, this morning. Cheshire compiled 138 runs in their first innings yesterday, and when stumps were drawn last evening Durham had made 162 runs for the loss of five wickets. The outlook from the point of view of the home county was thus very satisfactory.

When Ferris and Nichol, the overnight not outs, went out, they had an encouraging cheer from the few spectators present. Clifton and L. N. Jones were the bowlers. Nichol increased his score with a nice stroke to fine leg for 5. There had been six minutes' play and six runs added to the overnight score when Nichol was well beaten by Jones. Marshall joined Ferris, and the latter had a narrow escape of being run out through a smart return from mid-off by Vernon Hope, the Cheshire skipper.

Ferris continued to make progress by a series of fine hits past point and some good off-driving. Marshall was lucky to snick a last ball from Jones through the slips for 4. With the total at 190 Ferris played one softly back to Clifton and was easily taken by that bowler. Ferris's score included four 4's.

Goodrick came in to remain only a few minutes, two runs having been added to the fall of the last wicket. Marshall made a fairly good stand, though his runs came but slowly. Midam had made two runs when he came dangerously near being taken in the slips. He added three more, and was then far too late at a ball from Jones.

Spiller arrived to bang Clifton round to the boundary for 4 and then past cover point for 2. He next hit Jones for 4 and was then bowled by him, the Durham innings closing for 209. Thus they had a 71 runs lead over the visitors.

At 12-14 Cheshire began their second venture, H. W. Hodgson and W. E. Jones again being the first pair. Eight runs were on before Jones opened the scoring account proper. Spiller and Goodrick bowled, the latter putting one ball down over the head of Hodgson in consequence of which the umpire called a wide.

There were 20 runs on when Hodgson put a ball from Spiller round to leg and was splendidly taken by Harry Heaviesides.

Wake, in an attempt to stop a boundary hit by Jones, fell over the seat on the south side of the field. He injured his wrist and had to leave the ground for immediate medical attention. Spiller went off after six overs, giving place to J. I. Marshall.

The total was 41 when Weight came on for Goodrick. Jones and Midgley plodded away successfully despite the change in the bowling. Nine runs were added when the luncheon interval was taken.

On the resumption fairly frequent changes in bowling were resorted to, but the batsmen continued to do some vigorous hitting. Runs came at a fast rate and 50 was added to the lunch score—making the total a century—in 35 minutes.

The Durham bowling was being made to look rather poor stuff, and Midgley, on occasion, had a delightfully happy knack of placing the ball where there was no one about. He and Jones obtained their half-centuries almost simultaneously. The whole trend of the game was being gradually changed.

The partnership had produced 117 runs when Jones was caught at square leg by Nichol off Midam. Jones had nine 4's to his credit. Midgley was joined by L. N. Jones, and soon afterwards 160 was brought up on the score board.

L. N. Jones was not destined to remain long, being out to a good ball from Spiller. Midgley, the left-hander, went on in rare style, smiting the bowling all round the wicket. He had scored 52 when he was given out lbw to Spiller. His had been a most delightful innings, comprising no fewer than twelve 4's.

It should be mentioned that Wake, injured earlier in the day, was able to resume in the afternoon. J. P. Hodgson was not so successful as yesterday and retired, well bowled, after putting on only 12 runs.

Cheshire brought the second century up after about 214 hours batting. Astle again settled down well and after a few singles had a couple of boundaries in succession.

Durham v Northumberland At Ashbrooke.

KINCH'S HALF-CENTURY.

With Northumberland leading the Minor Counties Championship and an unbeaten side this season there was considerable interest in their return match with Durham which opened at Ashbrooke this morning. Durham were without a win to their credit, and if they were again beaten in this game Northumberland stood a capital chance of appearing in the final match with a Southern County for the championship.

Durham enjoyed a piece of luck in winning the toss for the wicket looked in excellent condition and the weather was warm and bright. Durham, by the inclusion of A. G. Doggart, the Cambridge "blue," who will probably play regularly for the County next season, had probably their strongest side of the season in the field. The crowd must have numbered well over 3,000 when the game commenced.

The "veteran" George Milne and Hetherton, who have been Northumberland's chief destructive agents this season, shared the attack, and in his third over Milne got through Hubert Brooks's guard and the Durham vice-captain retired with seven out of a total of 18. This has been his worst season in Minor Counties cricket, for this innings brought the number to 11 and his gross return is but 104 runs.

Weight was in trouble against Milne occasionally, but batted skilfully, though he was quickly overtaken by Kinch. The 50 was reached in 40 minutes, which was good scoring, considering the keen fielding. Bernard Surry missed a sharp chance to his left-hand, which Kinch gave, through the slips when he had scored 22. Hetherton was the unlucky bowler, but in the third ball of Milne's 12th over he succeeded in making a successful appeal for a catch behind the wicket from Weight. The Sunderland professional had withstood the attack for exactly fifty minutes, his share of the 53 runs on the board being 10, which included one boundary hit, and three threes.

Doggart's Disappointing Innings.

There was a round of applause when Doggart came to the wicket, and he promptly punished a leg ball from Milne by placing it wide of deep square-leg to the boundary. Kinch continued to score well, his leg shots being particularly productive, but a charge in the bowling at 66 by Lindesay taking the place of Hetherton was disastrous to Durham as Doggart placed his fourth ball into the slips for Surry to make an easy catch. Scott-Page quickly punched Milne to the leg boundary, and he off-drove Lindesay for a couple, and glided the next ball to the leg for a single. Hutchinson cleverly saving a boundary. Later Scott-Page drove Milne over the rails for six, and this stroke brought the hundred up in an hour and a quarter. Kinch reached his 50 after batting an hour and five minutes. The pair were still together at lunch when the score stood at 116 for the loss of three wickets.

The play after lunch was more in keeping with Durham's batting performances this season, Kinch and Scott-Page fell without any addition to their individual scores. But this was not all. Wake, Nichol, and Dobson all fell within a quarter of an hour with but 15 runs added. Common and Goodrick stopped the rot which had set in, and the 150 was reached in 125 minutes' actual cricket. Common, however, was given out leg-before to Hetherton three runs later, when Milne bowled Spiller off his pads he claimed his 50th wicket in Minor Counties games this season. Durham's collapse after lunch was, if not surprising, certainly unexpected. The seven wickets taken after lunch had only added 38 runs after the interval. The innings lasted 2 hours and 20 minutes.

Durham's attack was in the hands of T. K. Dobson and Weight, and with ten runs on the board Whitfield was caught behind the wicket off the Whitburn bowler, Mackay and Bruce batted with caution, but the first named was badly misaid in the slips by Weight off Dobson when he had scored 11. In the next over

Weight caused Bruce to snick one up behind the wicket, where Dobson repaid his colleague's error by kindness.

A fine catch at point by Brooks dismissed Mackay, and Stanger-Leathes and Hutchinson were together when the fifty was raised in three-quarters of an hour. Weight seemed to make the ball come across the wicket all right, but he did not keep a good length, and sent up many short balls. He was displaced by Doggart at 53. The Darlington man nearly got Hutchinson taken in the slips with his second ball. Hutchinson knocked three 4's in one over off Dobson, but in the next over, when he faced Doggart, he was given a "life" by the slowness of Weight in the slips, the easiest of catches being abegging. Spiller relieved Dobson, and bowled Hutchinson in his third over with a beautiful ball.

Second Day of Durham v. Northumberland.

A DRYING WICKET.

BY "AUGUS."

The heavy rain which fell over-night had not seriously affected the wicket at Ashbrooke, but it had made the pitch easy for the Durham batsmen, who had to face arrears on the first innings of 85. Towards this Common (10) and Wake (2) had rubbed off 12 without loss. Contrary to expectations it was possible to restart the game at the appointed time, but there was a ten minutes' delay owing to the Northumberland captain and a colleague being held up on the road down from Newcastle. Yesterday the gate receipts amounted to £199 9s 6d, but the attendance this morning was very small before lunch.

Milne and Hetherton soon found the wet ball a handicap and Common scored at such a good rate that when the 50 was put up he had collected 43 of this number. He was two short of his half-century when he cocked one up on the leg side and Stanger-Leathes ran in to make a simple catch. Just before this Surry had displaced Hetherton, who later came on at the other end for Milne. Before this change had been made Doggart had driven the Benwell pro. over the rails for six, but the change was only made to allow Milne to take over the attack at the other end. When Wake brought his total to double figures he had batted an hour and 25 minutes. On the easy wicket this morning he occupied an hour and ten minutes for eight runs. Doggart was given out leg-before to Hetherton after scoring 12 out of the 20 runs added for the wicket. Five runs later Mackay easily caught Wake at mid-off, and this catch meant Hetherton's 50th wicket in Minor Counties games this season. With Brooks in the arrears were wiped out, and

Scott-Page eventually brought the hundred to the board by pulling Milne across to the leg for six. Durham had occupied an hour and three-quarters in getting this total. Nine runs later a ball from Milne got up and Brooks had the misfortune to be caught off his gloves. The influence of the sun and drying wind was having its effect on the wicket, and both Scott-Page and Weight were occasionally in difficulties. In the last over before lunch Scott-Page should have been caught and bowled by Hetherton. At the interval Durham had scored 124 for the loss of four wickets.

Runs Despite Keen Fielding.

After lunch the fielding was very keen, but Page and Weight after a slow start got runs at a fair pace. Weight drove Milne for a six and a four in one over, and Page also drove him to the boundary, the over costing 16 runs. Page was eventually out to a wonderfully fine left-hand catch low down in the slips by Surry. He had hit one six, five fours, and a three—a very valuable contribution. Kinch was quickly dismissed as a result of a grand catch by Bruce, and Nichol was run out five runs later. The decision did not please a section of the crowd, and there was a little mild barracking. Weight was eighth out at 191. He had batted 68 minutes for his 40 runs, which included one six, two four's, and three three's.

Dobson batted patiently, and hit anything loose, but Goodrick, who seemed lame when running, did not stay any length of time. Hetherton almost caught and bowled Spiller off the first ball, but Dobson got a beautiful four off Milne, and drove Hetherton almost out of the ground in the next over. He was last out after scoring 87 runs in 82 minutes; hitting one six, four fours, and a three. Northumberland were set 143 to win.

It will be noticed from the bowling analysis that Milne bowled nearly 48 overs. Of these 43.3 were bowled 'o-day, and in the course of them his only rest was one over, when he changed from one end to the other during the lunch interval.
