

County Cricket Club's Prospects.

GREATER MEASURE OF SUCCESS EXPECTED.

SOME VALUABLE RECRUITS.

Hertfordshire County Cricket Club are preparing for the opening of their minor Counties championship campaign on July 4th, when they encounter Bedfordshire at Luton. Those connected with the club are looking forward to the season with confidence, and are entertaining hopes of a greater measure of success than was achieved last year, when Herts were about half-way up the list of competing counties.

Mr. A. J. Reid, of Radlett, has succeeded the Rev. C. G. Ward, Vicar of North Mymms, who retired from the captaincy at the close of last season, after he had rendered long and valuable service to Hertfordshire cricket. The new captain will have at his command all the regular players of last year, and also hopes to have the services of some valuable recruits. Mr. J. Titchmarsh (Harpenden), from his successful tour with A. C. Incarnate's team in Australia and New Zealand, should again be a tower of strength in batting, and will be available for all the matches except the first. Fred Burton will again be the mainstay of the attack, while Mr. F. S. Walthew, the Harpenden left-hand bowler, is available on his return from a year abroad; Mr. R. Driscoll (Uxbridge) is expected to assist in some matches; Mr. W. H. Mars, the veteran County bowler, who has been hon. secretary of the Harpenden Club for a quarter of a century, has placed his services at the disposal of the Committee once again, and Mr. R. D. Hylton Stewart, the former Somerset fast bowler, who is now a master at Harebury, will be included in the team during August. The Hon. D. E. Brand, who proved his all-round prowess with Mr. MacLaren's team in the Antipodes, will, it is hoped, be able to assist the county, of which his father, Lord Hampden, is Lord Lieutenant; and another all-rounder who will play in August, is Lieut. T. F. Halsey, of the Royal Navy. In that month, too, Mr. C. B. G. Hunter, of Harpenden, the well-known Corinthian centre-half, and a first-rate batsman, will join the side, while another famous international footballer, Mr. A. F. Grimshill, of Watford, captain of Tottenham Hotspur, will again be the regular wicket-keeper, save in the two games at Stevenage, when he will be on holiday. Mr. R. R. Cowley, who has been a prolific run-getter for the County, will also assist, and an early opportunity will be given to Mr. J. J. Thorley, a former Tonbridge School captain, who formerly assisted Radlett, and now resides in St. Albans, a forceful batsman and a change bowler. R. Sinfield, a sound batsman and improved bowler, now on the ground staff at Lords, may be engaged for some matches, and a young player, to whom it is hoped to give a trial, is Mr. R. J. O. Meyer, the captain of Harebury College, who is showing excellent form with both bat and ball. Meyer, who is a son of the Rector of Watton, is regarded as one of the most promising boys in public school cricket. It is quite likely that he may make a name for himself as a bowler, for he can turn the ball both ways with a whip of the pitch.

The County XI, when at full strength in August, should be powerful enough to give a very good account of itself; there is a nucleus of good players to play throughout, and the July matches will give plenty of opportunity to some promising players.

The Club's list of members and subscribers is increasing rapidly, a considerable filip having been provided by the successful County Club dinner recently held to welcome Mr. Titchmarsh and Mr. Brand back from their Australasian tour. The authorities are hoping that this increase in members will continue; for, in the long run, the success of a county eleven depends upon the amount of moral and material support accorded to the club by the sportsmen of the county.

Porter succeeded him and raised the score to 426 for six wickets. Then he, in turn, was bowled by Benstead. Thorley was the next man in, and when the tea interval was taken the scoring board showed 430 for 6. Two wickets fell quickly after the tea interval, Thorley being bowled by Raven for 11. With one run added, Cowley was caught off Raven for a useful 56. Walthew was the next in rotation, and he scored three fours very quickly, but with one more run added he was bowled by Raven. Marsh then joined Burton, and both scored runs at a quick pace, the total ultimately reaching 500. Then Burton, in attempting to hit Raven's ball, was stumped by Richardson for a very useful 21, Marsh being not out with 14 to his credit.

A BUCKS CENTURY.

Big Hitting Against Herts.

COUNTY CRICKET AT CASSIO ROAD.

[SPECIAL REPORTS BY
"WAYFARER."]

After doing finely on their Northern tour, Hertfordshire came to Watford on Monday for the annual matches on the West Herts ground, with Buckinghamshire providing the opposition on the first two days. The home county fielded a good side, though W. Lismore, of St. Albans, had to decline at a late hour owing to family reasons, and the eleventh place in the team was given to H. James, the West Herts left-arm bowler. R. J. O. Meyer, this year's Haileybury captain, made his first appearance for the county.

There was only a thin ring of spectators throughout the first day.

L. J. Reid carried out the first duty of a captain by winning the toss, and in the brilliant conditions a big score might well have been anticipated. Against W. E. Hazelton and Edwards, however, the home batsmen made a dreadfully poor show. It was suggested that the wicket was a trifle over-damp on the surface, but bad batting was much more the cause of the downfall. L. A. Watson was the one man who displayed any resolution in meeting the attack, and he contributed a valuable 26 out of the meagre total of 73. The Bucks first pair bowled unchanged, and came out with flattering figures.

NO FAULT WITH THE PITCH.

That there was no fault to find with the wicket was soon demonstrated when Bucks opened their innings immediately after lunch, for W. B. Franklin having been quickly disposed of—snapped at the wicket—the next pair carried the score to 44, when Salmon was caught in the slips. W. N. Roe—a son of W. N. Roe, a one-time brilliant Somerset batsman filled the vacancy at the crease, and just prior to his dismissal for a neat 27, the Herts total was passed. Roe was caught at cover-point off a skie—an awkward catch, well taken.

During this time Jackson had been steadily travelling ahead, and his partnership with P. W. Le Gros more than doubled the score, 159 being on the board when he left eventually for 70. Though it contained many good shots, the knock was patchy. Early on he was missed in the slips, while he got the benefit of the doubt in a confident appeal for stumping. At 38 he hit a ball to Cowley's right hand at second slip, but the chance was not held; whilst when he was 60 he pulled one hard from Burton to Thorley's left hand at short square leg.

After Jackson had departed, Le Gros was the dominant figure, and he put in some lusty hitting. Some of his boundary shots between the covers were beautifully executed, and his driving was at times very fierce. When the ten interval was taken he had 43 to his credit, and during he garnered runs apace. He hit a no ball from Hylton-Stewart out of the ring, and "took" 18 off one over from Burton, a six and three fours. When 70 he half hit a no ball from Meyer, and was caught at mid on by Burton. Before reaching 20 he had been missed at mid-off by Hylton-Stewart—a difficult chance, low down to the left hand, from James' bowling. Le Gros reached his century amid applause, and, hitting all the time, took his contribution eventually to 155, before lifting the ball in trying to drive James and being caught by the wicket-keeper running towards square leg. He was seventh out at 225, and his innings included three sixes and 17 fours.

A CURIOUS INCIDENT.

A curious incident developed at this point. W. B. Franklin wished to close his innings in order to get Herts at the wicket for a short period after their long and tiring outing. The point was raised whether, with such limited time available he had power to make a declaration on the first day, but no definite ruling could be produced, and ultimately the innings was continued. The remaining wickets quickly fell, and with a total of 338, Bucks had the enormous advantage of a lead of 265.

Meyer bowled well and James also did excellent work, neither being blessed with good fortune. Hylton-Stewart got the first three wickets, but was expensive, and Burton never showed his bowling form of a couple of seasons ago.

The best feature of the Herts' "out" cricket was the splendid "keeping" of Arthur Grimsdell. He disposed of four men with catches, and a couple of his stops on the leg side were absolutely brilliant. Hunter also fielded well throughout, but the slip work was a good deal below what might have been expected. Titchmarsh and Cowley—both short men, incidentally—stood the same distance from the bat to all the bowling—not, as the writer understands it, the hall mark of the successful fielder in this difficult position.

A HUGE DEFECT.

Called upon to bat for 10 minutes in the face of their huge deficit, Herts opened with Grimsdell and Burton, and once more made a dreadful start. Hazelton bowled a maiden over to Burton, and then Edwards, with his fifth delivery, beat Grimsdell with a beautiful swinger, which came very fast from the pitch. He had appealed with great confidence for "lbw" from the previous ball. In Hazelton's next over, Burton, trying the goose game, chopped a ball gently to Edwards at second slip, and also departed without scoring. Reid shouldered the further responsibility himself and joined James. The latter stood up manfully to a nasty over from Edwards, gently playing every ball, and stumps were then drawn for the day. Herts needing 261 to save the innings defeat, with eight wickets to fall.

Second Day.

A DREADFUL START.

Resuming on Tuesday morning, with a prospect which might have dismayed the most stout-hearted side, Herts lost another three wickets in less than half an hour. James was snapped very low down at second slip after obtaining a single, and Reid, having similarly broken his duck, fell to a good ball from Hazelton. The score at this point was only six, and Watson, having stayed long enough to see 10 hoisted, of which his own share was 7, was finely taken at short slip with one hand by Le Gros, whose height enabled him to make the catch. Hazelton had at this point taken three wickets at a cost of only two singles.

Hunter next joined Titchmarsh, who got the first boundary of the innings with a beautiful shot to leg off Hazelton. In the latter's next over, the Herts veteran found the boundary three times; two were on the leg side, but the middle four, in front of square leg, was actually a difficult left-hand chance to Weaver-Adams, who just reached a hand hit, but was not able to stop the ball from going to the ring. Hunter followed his partner's example with a delightful glance to the long leg boundary; but with his score at 18, Titchmarsh had another narrow escape, Phillips just failing to reach a dropping shot when running across from deep point.

Fifty was hoisted with the pair still together, both having showed fine steadiness at a very critical juncture. When 13, Hunter quite misjudged one from Hazelton, and, shaping to turn him to leg, put the ball just out of reach of Jackson at third slip. At this stage, however, the Cambridge University footballer was very far from comfortable when facing Edwards, who was bowling with rare skill, varying his pace and flight repeatedly.

The partnership was broken when 52 had been added. Titchmarsh had hit a full pitch from Hazelton to the on boundary, and, endeavouring to repeat the stroke in the same over, got under the ball and was easily caught at deep mid-on by Weaver-Adams. His 37 included no fewer than eight fours, and was a very valuable knock in the prevailing circumstances.

COWLEY'S GREAT EFFORT.

Cowley was next man in, and soon found the way to the boundary with a hefty clump off Edwards, following this with a powerful off drive which also reached the seats from the other end. Cowley's next shot took the Herts' score past their first innings total, and soon afterwards, with

his score at 16, the same batsman hit a full toss very hard into Salmon's hands at square leg from Edwards' bowling. The chance was not taken, and Cowley showed his appreciation by hitting two full-blooded boundaries to square leg in the same over. This incident heralded the first change in the Bucks' attack, Aubrey Fletcher replacing Hazelton, who had bowled 19 overs.

AN INNINGS DEFEAT.

The hundred was signalled with cheers from the handful of people present, and Cowley continued to bat finely. At 143, Roe got through Colin Hunter's defence, and he left for 29. The value of the innings, which had occupied nearly two hours, cannot be over-estimated. He went in when five men had fallen for 10 runs, and his doggedness held the side together.

Thorley was Cowley's next partner, and they remained together till lunch-time, when the total was 188, and Cowley had just completed his century. Forty-five minutes sufficed to finish the match after the interval. Thorley put his leg in front of a straight one at 222, his share of the 79 added being a very commendable 20. Cowley, as often happens, left at the same total. He was nearly caught on the leg side from a ball which kicked sharply, and the next kept low and bowled him. He had played a magnificent innings in the circumstances, including 20 fours, and was the recipient of an ovation, in which the Bucks team joined, when he returned to the pavilion. Meyer was quickly stumped in going in to Hazelton, and the visitors accordingly won by an innings and 36 runs.

In delightful weather, Herts entertained Bucks on the West Herts Ground on Monday and Tuesday, and the home county were defeated by an innings and 36 runs.

Herts went to the wickets first, but with the exception of L. A. Watson, who compiled a nicely played 28, the batsmen found the Bucks' bowling too good for them, and the rapid fall of all the wickets (Watson excepted), and the dismissal of the side for the low total of 75, left the visitors with a comfortable task. Jackson and Franklin went in first to bat against the bowling of Thorley and Hylton-Stewart. The former played himself in carefully, and then attacked the bowling with confidence. 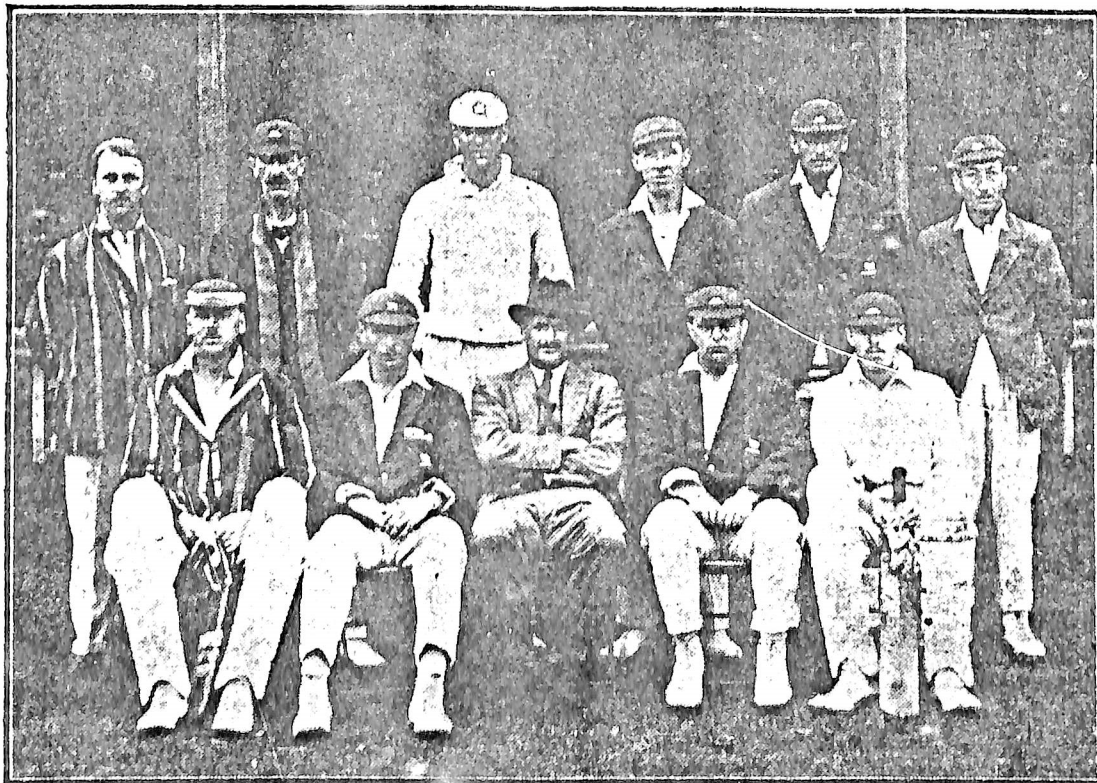

His innings was the feature of the game, and he richly deserved the reception he

The catering arrangements, which were carried out by the West Herts Club, with the kind assistance of a number of ladies, were really excellent, and pleased everybody concerned.

CRICKET.

HERTS v. OXFORDSHIRE.

The second county match of the Watford week on the West Herts Ground was on Wednesday and Thursday against Oxfordshire. The visitors, winning the toss, went in first, but were all out in two and a half hours for 110. The bowling was very good indeed. Burton had the fine analysis of six for 30. B. D. Hyton-Stewart was unfortunate enough to strain the tendon of his left leg, and later in the afternoon he left the ground in order to consult a doctor.

The Hertfordshire innings was opened by two international footballers—A. Grimdell and C. B. G. Hunter, but the former was soon caught. With P. B. Cowley and C. H. Titchmarsh in partnership, the spectators were treated to some fine cricket. The bowling was fairly collared, and to celebrate reaching his half-century, Titchmarsh hit three fours in succession. E. Cotton was put on, and with his first ball got Cowley's wicket. R. J. O. Meyer, who followed, got the first six of the match and scored 18 in one over. When within seven of his century, Titchmarsh fell a victim to Wakelin, and when stumps were drawn Herts were 151 ahead, with only six wickets down.

Resuming their partnership on Thursday morning, before a fair attendance of spectators, Reid and Thorley took the score on to 330 before they were separated. At that figure the latter hit straight into Wimble's hands. A little later Reid was also caught off Wakelin after a very creditable contribution of 44. The fielding of the Oxford men was remarkably keen, and Wakelin was bowling very well. He got Chester and Burton caught, just before he was out, Burton went out to a tempting one and hit the bowler for six. This six was the last score, the innings closing with the total of 340. It should be mentioned that Hyton-Stewart had recovered from his strain sufficiently well to bat. As a whole, the Herts innings was a credit to the County, and pleasing compensation for Monday's disappointing display. The bowling was good, especially that of Burrows, the Army fast bowler. Wakelin took five wickets for 110. The innings closed at 12.15.

At 12.30 Oxfordshire went for their second knock. Cotton and Wells opened to the attack of Meyer and Burton, and in the first over the former got Cotton dismissed without scoring. Burrows joined Wells, and they had compiled 33 when the former was the victim of another beautiful catch by Cowley. Wells continued to bat steadily, and at the luncheon interval had scored 28. When, after luncheon, he had made 10 more he was caught by Grimdell behind the wickets. Throughout his two and a half hours' stay he was generally on the defensive. Kennard's innings was the feature of the day's play, and his exhibition saved Oxfordshire from an innings defeat. He played good, sound cricket and hit all round the wicket without giving a chance.

At 3 o'clock all danger of an innings defeat had passed, and eventually Herts were left with 54 to get to win. The home County opened their second innings at 3.45, Hunter and Grimdell meeting the bowling of Burrows and Wakelin. Grimdell had a nasty smack on the hand from the fast bowler. 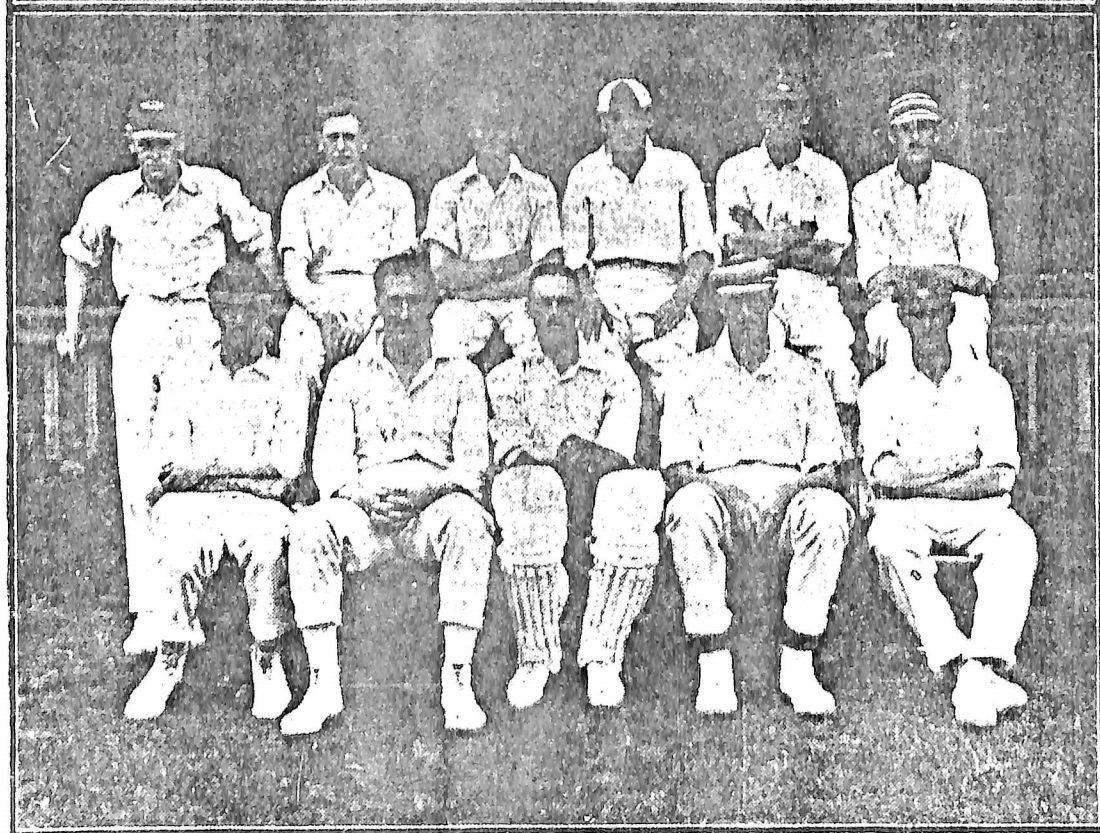
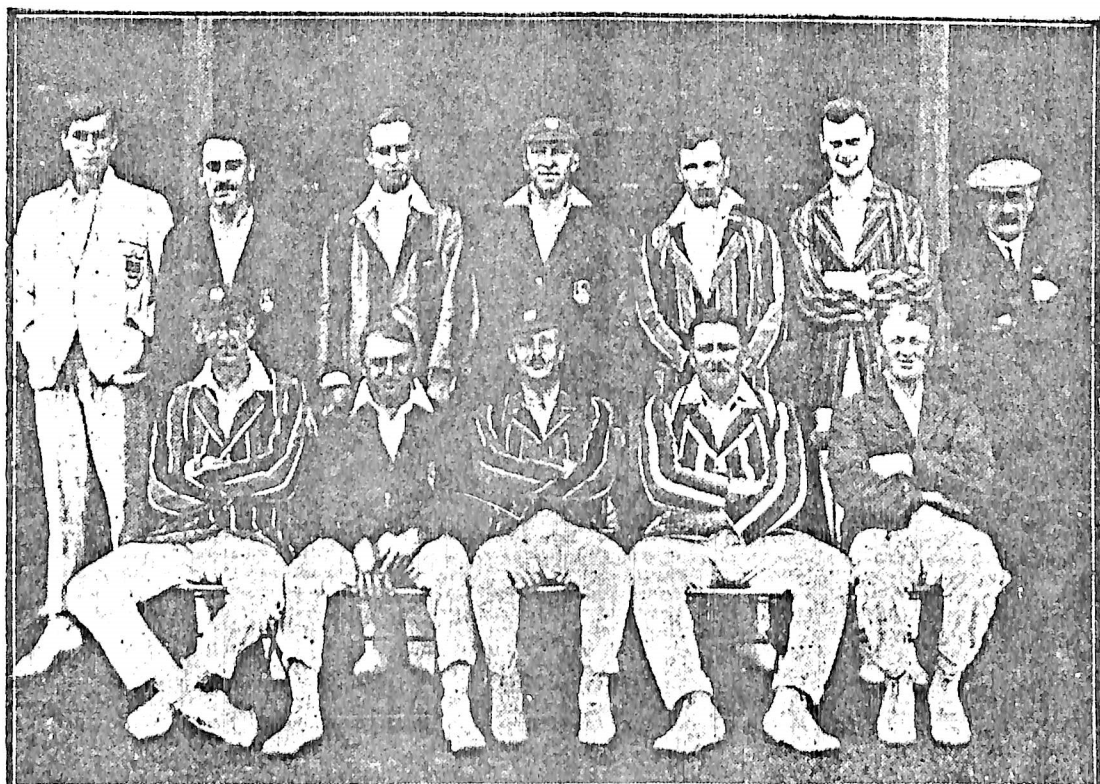
