**MONMOUTHSHIRE V. SURREY II.**  
Surrey Seconds, in their match against Monmouthshire, won very comfortably by five wickets at the Oval on Friday. Gregory showed very good form in making his runs.

After leading by 17 on the first innings the visitors had overnight scored 10 runs without loss in their second innings.

During the opening half hour's play on Friday the Welshmen fared poorly against the bowling of Lowe and Maslam, four wickets falling for the small total of 23. After Maslam had bowled a "no ball," Phillips was beaten by a " Yorker." He had batted three-quarters of an hour for his five runs.

Webb and Williams played enterprising cricket, scoring 41 in nineteen minutes, which included five strokes by each batsman, the 50 being put up in 45 minutes.

Williams was caught off a skier at deep cover. Wickets then again fell cheaply, Raikes giving an easy catch at mid-on at 77, and without an addition Webb, after batting well for 35 minutes, was dismissed by a low left-handed catch at backward point. The 100 appeared in one hour and 55 minutes, and the three remaining wickets added 42, when the innings closed for the total of 119, leaving Surrey to get 137 for victory. Surrey batted for 25 minutes before lunch and secured 48 for the loss of Hullock's wicket.

Continuing after lunch, the batsmen scored fairly freely until Dally was lbw at 68. Hullock three runs later was well caught on the pavilion rails after batting 45 minutes.

With Gregory and Baldwin in partnership, the visitors' good bowling kept the pace of run-getting down. Twenty-five minutes yielded 22 runs, when Baldwin was smartly taken at the wicket off F. G. Phillips. Weger sent the hundred up in an hour and three-quarters by off-driving F. G. Phillips for 8. In the end the home side got their runs with ease, and won by five wickets. Scores:—

## MINOR COUNTIES' GAME AT ABERCARN.

## SLOW SCORING ON AN EASY WICKET.

Monmouthshire, who entertained Dorset at Abercarn on Wednesday, were without T. B. Williams and E. C. Francis. They were deputised by S. J. Smith and E. H. Bannister. It was a Minor Counties' game, and will conclude today. At the close of the first day's play Dorset had established a lead of 37, having been sixteen in front on the first innings and totalling 21 at their second attempt for the loss of J. C. Parke's wicket. The latter, who has contributed the highest individual score of the game up to its present stage, was well taken by F. Scoulling, who gathered a fast low return before Parke had scored. This early success is likely to materially improve the home county's chance of victory.

Dorset hardly adopted the correct policy when, after winning the toss and electing to take first knock on a wicket that undoubtedly favoured the batsmen, they made no attempt to force the pace of run-getting. Runs came very slowly and mainly in singles. Gradually, however, the cricket brightened, and Knight, who had opened the innings with Parke, sent up the 10 with a grand drive out of the ground for six off the bowling of K. C. Raikes, who shared the attack with F. Gordon Phillips. At 18 the former was taken off in favour of Scoulling, and immediate success attended the change, for, with Knight 29, he was cleaned bowled by the new-comer. Two runs later Capt. Busk, who had joined Knight, was out to a confident appeal for leg-before to the same bowler, C. D. Adams was his successor, and stayed to make nine before being smartly taken by Wilcox off Phillips, who then uprooted Parke's wicket when that player had contributed 37. Scoulling continued to be troublesome with the ball, and the only batsman to make a stand subsequently was Major H. M. Greenhill, who contributed a very useful 29 before being taken by Bannister, the innings closing for 136.

Monmouthshire responded with 140, to which G. A. Webb subscribed 39, H. Jenkins 17, J. F. Rust and H. Griffiths 15 each, and S. Wilcox 12 not out. Scores:—

MONMOUTHSHIRE BEATEN AT  
NEWPORT.

## SURREY WIN BY AN INNINGS.

After a poor batting display on Friday, when Monmouthshire could only muster 73 in reply to Surrey's 264, they were forced to follow-on, and on Saturday G. A. Webb and K. C. Raikes opened the second innings to the two bowlers who had done the damage on Friday. The home county's position was a precarious one, for they needed 191 runs to save an innings defeat.

The first wicket was not long in falling, for after ten minutes' play Webb was out to a fine ball from Gulland, which broke the middle stump. Four runs later Raikes was beaten by a similar ball. Scoring was very slow until Rust opened his shoulders, and scored two 4's and a 2 off successive balls from Gulland. Several "no-ball" decisions against Gulland appeared to put him off his length, and he became rather expensive. As a result Maslen was put on. The new bowler was soon successful, for at 49 Jenkins was bowled.

At 11.50 Rust sent the 50 up with boundary on the leg side. He was now batting delightfully, and the first innings total of 73 was soon passed. At 89 Rust's attractive innings came to a close, Baldwin bowling him with his second ball. In his total of 49 were seven 4's and three 3's. With no further addition to the score, E. C. Francis was caught behind the wickets for a patient 6. F. Gordon Phillips was bowled by Maslen with the total at 96, and 100 was registered after one and a half hours' play.

Wileox and Wadley then made a stand, which produced 23 runs, but afterwards a collapse was brought about by the fine bowling of Baldwin. The whole side were dismissed for 128 runs at 1.2. Surrey thus winning by an innings and 63 runs.

## COUNTY CRICKET.

SURREY GROUNDS PAY A VISIT  
TO NEWPORT.

## MONMOUTHSHIRE'S VISITORS.

Monmouthshire have not met with much luck in the Minor Counties' Championship this season, but it was anticipated that they would make a good show against Surrey Seconds in the two-day match which commenced at Newport on Friday. They did so in the corresponding match last year, when Surrey Seconds were beaten by one wicket. Four of the visitors have played for the famous Surrey team this season—Redgewell (Strudwick's deputy), Jennings, Bullock, and Baldwin. Surrey fielded seven professionals. Daily, of the Surrey team, has been picked to play for the South against the North (Minor Counties) at the Oval on August 27 and 28.

Surrey won the toss, and W. T. Cook and Bullock opened the innings to the bowling of F. Gordon Phillips and F. Scoulding. The batsmen seemed confident, though they only scored slowly by singles. Their running was very smart. Bullock was completely beaten by a fine ball from Scoulding which just missed the sticks. The rate of scoring continued very slow, the first half hour producing only 18 runs.

With the score at 19 K. C. Raikes went on for F. Gordon Phillips, and with his fifth ball he bowled Cook. Bullock scored the first boundary with a fine drive over Scoulding's head for four. After Packham had hit Raikes for three with a lucky "snick," the bowler clean bowled Bullock with a beautiful ball.

With Daily and Packham in, the scoring quickened somewhat. At 48 K. Harris went on for Scoulding, and at 64 Jenkins displaced Raikes. Scoulding came on again for Harris. At 89 Daily played back to Scoulding, and hit his wicket, after compiling 35. Lorenson, who was next in, sent the 100 up after one and three-quarter hours' play.

After the luncheon interval Packham, after only adding 11 to his total, stopped in front of a straight one from Scoulding, and was out. Out of his total of 61, only three were from boundary hits. With Baldwin and Lorenson in, the scoring rapidly increased. With the total at 189 the fifth wicket fell, Harris taking Baldwin in the slips off Raikes. The newcomer, Gregory, opened his account with a drive for four—all run—off Raikes. Lorenson reached his half-century with a lucky leg glide for three.

Gregory sent the 200 up with a cut for four. Both batsmen appeared set, but at 221 Lorenson was brilliantly caught in the slips by Scoulding, off Raikes. He had batted very attractively for 62. Three runs later Raikes got Gregory's wicket through a catch by Francis.

# MINOR COUNTIES MATCH AT NEWPORT.

## MONMOUTH'S POOR BATTING AGAINST SURREY SECONDS.

The minor counties' match started at Newport on Friday on a very good wicket. It was Monmouthshire's fifth match of the season. They made a gallant fight against Cornwall a week ago, but the four previous games had gone against them. The first match with Surrey II. at the Oval was won by Surrey by five wickets. The visitors, who went first to the wickets, had a strong team. Of seven professionals, Daily has been picked to play for the South against the North in a minor counties' game. Scoring opened very slowly, only 20 runs being got in the first half-hour's play. Soon afterwards the first wicket fell, W. T. Cook being beaten in Raikes's first over. Run-getting was a little faster when H. A. Packham joined Bullock, but at 27 the pro. was clean bowled by Raikes. Forty runs were registered after an hour's play, but the scoring became faster when Daily was with Packham. At 99 Daily hit his wicket in playing a ball from Scoulding after he had scored a neat 35.

Generally speaking, the Monmouthshire fielding was good. Scoulding brought off a very fine catch in the slips when he took Sorenson. The visitors batted very consistently for a total of 261. Monmouthshire, who were disposed of in a comparatively short time, never seemed to master the Surrey bowling, the top scorer being K. C. Raikes with 19 runs. Monmouthshire will follow on to-day (Saturday).

## SPLENDID GWENT BOWLING.

With a lead of 54 runs, Devonshire commenced their second innings against Monmouthshire at Newport Athletic Grounds, on Tuesday. F. Gordon Phillips opened the attack from the pavilion end, and his third ball was sent by the Rev. F. N. Bird into the slips, where E. C. Dolman brought off a good catch. C. R. Bloy was joined by F. H. Carroll, who opened his account with a single off the last ball of the over. Carroll played the fourth off F. Scoulding on to his wicket, and thus two wickets were down for two runs. Capt. C. E. Haynes filled the vacancy, and with the total at seven Scoulding bowled C. R. Bloy. Capt. Haynes was smartly stumped by S. Wilcox in the same over. The total was eight and Scoulding at this stage had taken three wickets for two runs. J. F. Shelley hit F. G. Phillips for three, and with Light in the rate of scoring appreciably increased. K. C. Raikes relieved F. G. Phillips when the total reached 30, and Shelley was the first to make a boundary stroke, driving his fourth ball past Bavin. The partnership was broken at 50, Light being brilliantly taken by K. Harris in the long field off F. Scoulding after having scored 20. The fourth wicket had produced 42 runs. The sixth wicket fell at 65, Scoulding having five victims for 26 runs. Shelley hit one 4, two 3's, and three 4's. Harris claimed his first victim in the next over, bowling C. # HOPELESS OUTLOOK FOR WALES.

## IRELAND'S HUGE TOTAL LISTLESS EXHIBITION BY HOME BATSMEN.

When it is borne in mind that for the most part club cricket, in which play is restricted to one day only, is as yet the most serious character which the game has assumed in Ireland, one has to acknowledge that the standard reached is particularly high, and the future of the great summer game in the Emerald Isle is very bright. The batting of the Irishmen in their "Rubber Match" with Wales at Cardiff Arms Park on Saturday was a revelation to most of us, but that it was no mere "flash in the pan" was proved on Monday when the match was resumed. By a consistent and brilliant batting display, they ran up the huge total of 418 runs and established the formidable first innings lead of 265. It is true they were opposed to a team whose keenness and vitality had been exhausted as a result of playing continuously for over three weeks, but notwithstanding this the Irishmen's performance was extremely creditable. By the manner in which they set about their task and the grace and care with which they gathered runs they impressed, and one has no hesitation in saying that they would be a tough proposition for most of our first-class counties. They made much of the bowling look trash, and they actually scored for the first three hours at the phenomenal rate of a hundred runs an hour, whilst the innings altogether lasted only four hours and forty minutes. Arnott was the most successful bowler, but his figures were anything but flattering, his three wickets costing 82 runs. Bates also claimed three victims at a cost of 101, Mercer two for 92, and Ryan one for 55.

## BOWLERS HANDICAPPED.

Heavy rain fell in the early morning, but the only purpose it served was to handicap the bowlers. Their troubles began early, for Bookman (29) and Headlip (13), the not outs, carried the overnight total of 190 for five to 324 before they were separated. They smothered some indifferent bowling mercilessly, and looked like staying all day, until a smart piece of stumping by Sullivan disposed of Bookman. The Irish international footballer was batting for two hours and twenty minutes for his 77, which was completed without a mistake. He was very sedate until he reached 50, and then hit brilliantly and collected six 4's. His departure marked the beginning of a partial collapse, three more wickets falling for an additional 10 runs. Headlip, who was eighth to leave, had wretched luck in not running into three figures. He only required 47 for the distinction, when he stepped across his wicket and was adjudged leg before. During a stay of just over two hours he drove and hit to leg with fine judgment, and altogether collected nine 4's. The rot which set in following Bookman's dismissal was checked by King and Sproule, who indulged in a lively last wicket stand that yielded 84 runs in fifty minutes. King, a left-hander with a nice style, was particularly severe on the tired bowlers, and half his runs were gained by means of boundary strokes.

## WALES STILL WEAK.

The listless exhibition to which Wales had treated a mere handful of spectators continued when they commenced their second innings, requiring 265 runs to avoid an innings defeat. A brilliant return which hit the wicket ran out Symonds with only 12 runs telegraphed, and then Pollock, who created a mild sensation with his bowling on Saturday, got rid of Bates and Cording before the total reached 50. Then Davies, who had opened the innings, found a sturdy partner in the veteran Stone, and 45 runs were added in half-an-hour before a clever catch by Jackson at point got rid of the last-named. The ball was driven hard and low to the fieldsmen, who, although losing his balance, managed to retain possession of the ball. Another brilliant catch by Sproule accounted for Pinch with only one run required to hoist the century. Davies, who played with fine determination for an hour and a half, fell to a good ball from Lambert at 108, and Arnott was the victim of a clever piece of stumping. As the game now stands, Wales are in a hopeless position, requiring 135 runs to save the innings defeat with only three wickets to fall. Scores:—

# WALES CONQUERED BY IRELAND.

## INTERNATIONAL TEST MATCH AT CARDIFF.

By "NOMAD."

Despite a gallant eighth-wicket stand by N. V. H. Riches and Mercer, which realised 108 runs, Wales failed to recover from the hopeless position they found themselves in at the drawing of stumps the previous day, and were defeated by Ireland at Cardiff Arms Park on Tuesday by an innings and 23 runs. The Irishmen, who thoroughly deserved victory, became the first champions in the series of international Test matches arranged between Wales, Scotland, and Ireland. When play commenced on Tuesday Wales still required 135 runs to save the innings' defeat, with only three wickets to fall, but so well did Riches and Mercer play that at one period it looked extremely likely that Ireland would have to bat again. Bowling changes were of no avail, and the score mounted rapidly every minute. Then Mercer, who had enjoyed the good fortune to be twice missed, got well under a delivery from Sproule, to be nicely caught by Bickerman on the edge of the boundary. Save for the two chances referred to, the professional played a great innings.

## PERFECT UNDERSTANDING.

He had a perfect understanding with Riches, and the manner in which the pair ran between the wickets was a feature. Although he did not take undue liberty with the bowling, Mercer scored at a tremendous pace, his 71 runs being obtained at the rate of one a minute. He got in one beautiful off-drive off Lambert's bowling which landed the ball clean over the ropes for 6, whilst he also hit four 4's. Mercer promises to be a great acquisition to Glamorgan when he qualifies. After he left, the remaining two wickets fell away quickly. Norman Riches, who carried his bat for 17, played with unusual restraint, but judging by the manner in which he met the bowling, Ireland's victory would have been considerably lessened had he been able to find anyone to stay with him after Mercer had left. ## MONMOUTHSHIRE V. DEVONSHIRE.

Monmouthshire have been decidedly unfortunate in their matches in the Minor Counties' Championship this year. So far they have played seven matches, have lost six and drawn one. The match they drew was against Cornwall, at Penzance, when time alone prevented them gaining a victory. Hopes were raised once more when Wilcox began to hit merrily, but after he had scored 13 he was caught out by Knowles-Pfeiffer. With two wickets to fall Monmouthshire needed 22 runs to win. Soon after Evans, who had saved a debacle, was caught out, and then Scoulding was clean bowled the first time he lifted his bat. Thus Devonshire won by 15 runs. Evans had played a sound innings for Monmouthshire, and he was loudly cheered for his brilliant 55. Knowles-Pfeiffer proved the undoing of the Monmouthshire team. He kept a splendid length, and accounted for four Monmouthshire wickets before he was out. For 71 runs he captured seven wickets, while Light, the Devon pro., who bowls right-handed and bats left—scored three for 53. F. Scoulding, the Abercarn bowler, was the most dangerous bowler on the field. In Devon's first innings his analysis read, 29-4-5-70-7, and in the second 20-3-44-8. K. C. Raikes did yeoman service with the willow; he scored 70 in the first innings, and run out on the last wicket after having opened the batting, and made a pretty 30 in the second innings.

## COUNTY CRICKET.

## MONMOUTHSHIRE WIN A GREAT VICTORY.

### CORNWALL BEATEN.

The Minor Counties match between Monmouthshire and Cornwall was continued at Ebbw Vale on Thursday. Overnight, Cornwall, after being dismissed for a total of 230, captured eight Monmouthshire wickets for 164. It is interesting to note that Commander Irwin, who scored 126 for Cornwall, hit one 6, thirteen 4's, four 3's, and eight 2's. He was at the wickets about three hours.

E. C. Dolman and K. Harris, Monmouthshire's batsmen, opened played on Thursday morning against the bowling of Williams and Hawke. Runs came freely, and both batsmen seemed safe, when Harris, in endeavouring a drive, was smartly caught by Commander Irwin after adding 23 runs to the Monmouthshire total. Dolman, partnered by Scoulding, continued to play attractive cricket. He got two successive hits from Tresawna to the boundary, and looked like making a big score. Unfortunately Scoulding was unable to hold his own, and was lowly by Williams after scoring only a single. Dolman had played a fine innings for 42 not out, and the Monmouthshire score was carried to 213, of which 49 runs were added this morning in about half an hour.

Cornwall opened their second venture with Tresawna and Irwin, but the bowling of F. Gordon Phillips and Scoulding was particularly good, and met with great success. After an hour's play Cornwall had lost four of their best players for a total of 72 runs.

Cornwall were all dismissed for 160. There was a very exciting finish. Monmouthshire, with 227 to get, set about their task in great style. They captured the bowling, despite frequent changes, and it really became a race against the clock. Raikes, Jenkins, and Dolman played confidently, and Bavin and Gordon Phillips made stands at a critical juncture, with the result that five minutes before stumps were to be drawn the Cornwall total was passed, and Monmouthshire received hearty cheers on a three-wicket victory.

## MINOR COUNTIES.

### CORNISHMAN'S CENTURY AT EBBW VALE

Considerable interest was taken in the Minor Counties Championship game between Monmouthshire and Cornwall, which opened at Ebbw Vale on Wednesday. The fixture was favoured with delightful weather, and the wicket was in perfect condition. The visitors batted first, and made a disastrous start, Tresawna being bowled with only five runs registered. With Scholefield partnering Commander Irwin runs came at a steady pace. Scholefield, early missed, stayed to score 40 runs before he was smartly taken by Jenkins. The partnership added 61 runs. Dr. Berks who followed was not very troublesome, and after adding three, he was caught by Bayin. Capt. Smith settled down quickly, and contributed sixteen before losing his place through an appeal for lbw.

#### IRWIN'S CENTURY.

After lunch, the Monmouthshire attack did well, and in 30 minutes,

Cennick and Gibson had succumbed to the bowling of Phillips and Scoulding. ## A NEW EXPERIENCE.

### MONMOUTH WIN GREAT GAME BY THREE WICKETS.

When this match was continued at Ebbw Vale on Thursday Monmouthshire, with eight wickets down, were 116 behind the Cornish total. E. C. Dolman and K. Harris, the overnight batsmen, readily settled down when the game was resumed, the score mounting rapidly, but Harris was smartly taken by Irwin in trying to drive a ball from Williams, and a good partnership was ended. Dolman played most attractive cricket, but Scoulding, who succeeded Harris, was unable to hold his end up, and the Monmouthshire effort closed at 213, with Dolman not out 42. Although the home side were only batting for about half an hour, 49 runs were added to the overnight total. B. Williams was Cornwall's most effective bowler, taking seven wickets for 64 runs.

#### CORNWALL'S POOR START.

Cornwall's second venture did not open very auspiciously. There was still an hour and a half left before lunch, and in this time Monmouthshire had six of the wickets down for 56 runs. Scoulding, Phillips, and Raikes, the Monmouthshire bowlers, doing very well, Scoulding maintaining a splendid length and causing the batsmen a great deal of anxiety.
