GEOIGE RYE'S SPRVICES TO NORFOLK.

The comparatively few persons who have responded to the appeal of Mr. Gilbert Daynes on behalf of George Rye is probably due to so many years having passed since the latter figured prominently in the cricket life of the country. Rye was born in 1857 at Bracondale, a short distance from the Lakenham ground which was to be associated with so many of his cricket achievements. In his treens Rye was a club player above the average, and a good all yound performance in a country frial match. East v. West, when he scored 25 and 22 not out and took five wickets, led to his first appearance a few weeks later in a country match against Suffolk at Stownarket. Rye's bowling analysis in that East and West match are worth recording, if only as evidence of his early pessession of accurate length bowling, which was the foundation of his aubsequent success. In the first imnings his figures wore 18 overs, 10 maidens, 18 runs, 3 wickets, and in the second innings 42 overs, 15 maidens, 57 runs, 2 wiokets, With a short run of only a few pnees, and an easy delivery, he conserved his energy and could keep up his end for hours at a stretch. SOME REMARKABLE PERFORMANCES.

Like many other cricketers who have since had reason to regret it. Rye kept no record of his oricket achievements, and an accurate record cannot now be compiled, but a few of his performances picked haphazard from the scores available will serve to show the character of his work for Norfolk. His splendid "professional" length, and the ability to keep batsmen quick, are reflected in most of his bowling figures. Against the Ineogs at Norwich in 1890 he bowled 23 overs, of which 20 were maidons, for 9 runs. In the corresponding match a year lature his figures were 29-19-16-5. In the second innings of a county match at Lincoln he bowled 23-12-22-6, and on his first appearance at Lord's, in 1892, his figures were 29-18-18-9 and \$8-12-20-3. At Bedford in the same year with H. R. Ore playing for the home county, Rye's first inning's work with the ball was 44-17-77-4. L. K. Jarvis took his bat right through the first innings of Norfolk, secoring 75, and unde 50 in the second innings. Against Suffork, at Bury, Rye lowled 19-72-75 and 30-16-42-3, and when Shaw and Shrewsbury brought their famous Players of England XI. to Lakenham in the August of 1822 to be beaten by the county by ten wickeds, Rye, in the second innings, and Arthur Shrewsbury's wicked after the great man, land scored 66. At Bury in 1884 Ryc took seven Suffolk wickets in the first innings in 24 overs for 31 runs, and in the Essex match at Norwich that year his match figures were 66.34.88-7. Against Northamptonshire he put up the fine performance of 21.12.27-5, and at Northampton in 1886 Ryc went in first for Norfolk with the Rev. A. P. Wickham. In 1887 he bowled with marked success against Hampshire at Southampton and against Essex at Leyton and took part in the memorable tie match with Herts in the cricket week of 1888, secring 17 at a critical stage in the gains. In 1889, with five balls to the over, Ryc bowled 23-7-49-5 in the first innings against Northumberland. At Hertford his match figures were 61-22-85-8, and against Hampshire at Norwich 22-10.244. The following year at Dorby when F. R. Spofforth was playing for the Midbaud County, Ryc had the fine figures of 20.7-59-5. When Hampshire visited Norwich his match figures were 91-41-128-10, and in the first innings at South-lampton be bowled 40-16-67-7, altogether taking 18 Hampshire wickets in the two matches.

#### BATSMAN AND COACH.

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Ryo was associated with Norfolk cricket at a time when the County was particularly rich in amateur bowlers. He was contemporary with such fine bowlers as C. H. Morton, the Rev. A. C. Davies, P. H. Morton, C. P. Wilson, C. J. E. Jarvis, E. B. Raikes, Hansell, Rudd, and later with Shore and Morley. Rye was always a useful bat, and, morrover, and the invaluable habit of generally making runs when they were most wanted. Batting No. 9 in a match against the M.C.C. in 1892. Rye accord 50, E. Massangham's 21 being the next best score in the innings. In 1893 he was second to the Rev. G. B. Reikes.

in the Norfolk batting averages of that year, with 87 and 26 against the M.C.C. as his best match figures. No record of George Rye's cricket worth to the County would be complete without some reference to the long years he has given to conching young players at Norwich School and elsewhere. The number of players who have benefited by his tuition is legion, and it would be difficult to estimate the value of this work and its bearing upon the cricket of the county. Rye is now in his 66th year, and happily recovered from two serious operations. The summary we have given of few of his networthy achievements will enable the present generation of cricketers to realise something of the nurse of his long service to Norfolk cricket. The chiect of the fund Mr. Daynes is raising is to provide a weekly sum until Rve becomes entitled to the old age pension. His playing and canching days are over, but he is still capable of unpiring, and no one is more efficient.

# CRICKET TOPICS. COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP REFORMS.

#### INCLUDED 'IN NORFOLK SUGGESTED RE-GROUPING.

Many schemes are being mooted for placing the county cricket championship on a more satisfactory basis, and the forthcoming deliberalions and decisions of the Advisory County Cricket Committee may have a far-reaching effect on the future of county cricket. The need of improvement in the methods of deciding the county championship has long been recognised and most of the leading counties are agreed upon the necessity for reform, and also of reducing the number of matches. It is only when they come to suggested remedies that there is any divergence of views. Mr. Fender goes holdly for the League principle with two divisions, plus a number of friendly matches on second division clubs' grounds, so that the latter should not suffer financially. Mr. Warner is a strong supporter of a scheme brought toyward by Mr. Blackshaw, and earnestly appeals for its adoption by the powers that be. The present huge programme of matches, says Mr. Warner, is doing no good to our cricket, and is killing our fast bowlers. The scheme for which Mr. Warner pleads is briefly as follows:—A Section to comprise the first nine counties in the championship; B Section the last eight, plus another, say, Bucks or Norfolk. All would be first class. Each county to play 24 matches—16 home and away with the counties in its own section, and 8 home and away with 4 counties in the other section. Counties requiring a larger farture, list could fix up friendly matches with counties they did not meet in the championship.

The Mayor said that during the week he had been initiated to lawn tennis, and his golf was improving—(laughter)—but he was a novice at cricket. He knew it was a game which made gentlemen of men and taught them to play the game of life. They were pleased to welcome the Norfolk Club and Ground XI.

Captain C. H. Borthwick, captain of the Club and Ground team, congratulated the Yarmouth club upon its success this season. He said the time had come when we might reasonably hope to see first-class in this part of the kingdom. (Hear, hear.) The suggested new method for arranging the county cracket championship in two sections, as outlined by Mr. P. F. Warner in the "Morning Post" would provide an opportunity for Bucks or Coming from such an authority the scheme was assured of careful consideration. He appealed to Yarmouth to bring pressure to bear, upon the Norfolk County Committee, so that if the offer or opportunity came the question should be thoroughly considered. The district was populous, and increased greatly in the summer time. He felt that if cricket could be a success anywhere it could be made successful at Yarmouth as ht other seaside recort. He was sure that persons who subscribed one guinea, and took a lukewarm interest in the County cricket, could be induced to subscribe five guineas if the cricket were first class. (Applause.)

Mr. A. W. Bouse, the Yarmouth Town captain, said that in Yarmouth splendid assistance was given to swimming, tennis, bowle, and solf, but they did not possess one good cricket ground. As a member of the Norfolk Committee, he knew that pressure had been brought to bear upon the committee, and the claims of Yarmouth would provide a cricket ground comparable with those possessed by other first class watering-places.

A. Beadsmoore having played in the corresponding match last year, and their places will be taken by G. R. R. Colman and G. N. Scott-Chadd. The latter did not play at all for Nor-

folk last season, but in 1921 he had a batting average of '26 for the County, and this year he has been scoring heavily for the Household Brigger and also taking wickets in good class orioket. Beadsmoore who helped Watson to add 63 runs for the last wicket at Stevenage last year and also took wickets, is unable to get leave of absence for the matches with Herts, and Bedford this week, but he and G. A. Stevens will join the tourists for the match with Staffordshire which begins at Old Hill next Monday.

Although there is no left handed bowler in the team, there is plenty of bowling. # NORFOLK DROP POINTS AT LUTON.

#### TO-DAY'S MATCH WITH STAFFORD-SHIRE.

Norfolk had every reason to be satisfied with their performance on Wednesday at Stevenage, and seldom has the quest for points in the Minor Counties Championship commenced under more promising circumstances. Only twice last season did Norfolk score over 300 runs in an innings, and the total of 366 made against Herts last Wednesday is their best since 497 were obtained against Cambridgeshire in the Norwich Week of 1921. The difference between the size of the grounds at Lakenham and Stevenage is however very marked, and Harold Watson would be a disappointed man if he did not hit a few sixers at Stevenage. On Wed-nesday he hit two in one over from Sinfield, the first to the on, which almost reached the London road, and the other was a towering drive over mid off, the ball curving many yards at the end of the carry like a golfer's sliced drive. The only other 6 in the match was G. R. R. Colman's on drive off Marsh. The Old Oxonian also had a large proportion of fours in his score of 68, and was out in a rather curious way. Hearing no sound of the wicketkeeper taking a ball which passed on the leg-side, the batsman started to run byes, and was astonished to find the wicket put down by Porter.

No one brought off more boundary shots at Stevenage than C. H. Titchmarsh. The famous little batsman had taken 100 in his previous metch off the Cambridgeshire bowling, and at the close of play on Wednesday he needed only another 4 to complete a century against Norfolk. A year ago M. Falcon had an almost similar experience, when he played a brilliant innings of 95. M. Falcon got Titchmarsh's wicket twice on Thursday. Late in the afternoon he sent Titchmarsh's middle stump flying, and if the rain had not come to the assistance of Herts the visitors would undopbtedly have repeated last year's handsome victory. DEATH OF MR, TOM PAWLEY.

Mr, Tom Pawley, the manager of the Kent County Cricket Club, died suddenly at Canterbury on Friday exeming. Arriving at Canterbury on Friday exeming. Arriving at Canterbury station shortly after five o'clock he was taken ill on entering a cab with his wife. It was at once apparent that the matter wos serious, and before reaching the Kent and Canterbury Hespital he passed away. The cause of death is thought to be heart trouble. #### FLUCTUATING PLAY IN HERTS MATCH.

The cricket at Lakenham on the opening day of the 38th Norwich Week presented many features of great interest, and nearly 2000 spectators spent an enjoyable day in brilliant weather. £75 was taken at the gates, and this figure was stated to be a record for Bank Holiday. Yesterday's attendance will encourage the County Committee to still further increase the seating accommodation for the coming visit

of the West Indies cloven.

The ground looked at its best, the tents and bunting supplying the touch needed to suggest the carnival apirit, in keeping with the traditions of the festival. 

STAFFORDSHIRES 39 RUNS VICTORY.

Staffordshire outplayed Norfolk at Lakenham yesterday, and by six o'clock they had won a splendid match by 39 runs. Some really fine bowling by W. A. Beadsmoore, who took the first eight Staffordshire wickets yesterday for 7 runs apiece and had the splendid match figures of twelve for 79, left Norfolk with quite a good prospect of victory, and but for a series of missed catches which prolonged the innings of J. W. Johnson, Norfolk would have been left with an easier task. As it was, few doubted their ability to make the 103 runs required; but with Nichols handicapped by a damaged knee and G. R. R. Colman unfortunately run out, the batting broke down badly before the accurate length howling and ball spinning of Lockett and Morgan. After six wickets had fallen for 17, P. W. J. Eryer and Nichols made a little stand, and there was an heroic last wicket effort by Nichols and G. R. Pedder which yielded 28 runs, but the score at the end was no more than 63. We remarked yesterday on the splendid fighting qualities of the Staffordshire players, and how difficult it is to beat them, and they showed some of the grit and tenacity of the first-class champions in emerging from an uphill fight with the victor's laurels. Staffordshire were only 2 runs on when their fourth wicket fell, and after Johnson's courageous innings, their two bowlers rose to the occasion. Lockett's figures were rather remarkable. His first six overs were maicens and six runs wore scored from the next to overs, after which he bowled 8 more maidens, his final figures being 19 overs, 14 maidens, 12 runs, and 4 wickels. Stevens has only dropped a few points in his average, but after these four there has been a great shortage of raiss Several players, who in former years were at least useful contributors, have been quite out of form, and with the exception of E. F. Long, the committee have made no discoveries or met with reward expected from the new players introduced.

# WEST INDIES OUTPLAY NORFOLK.

VISITOR\$ IN STRONG POSITION.

NORFOLK'S FIGHTING INNINGS.

BRILLIANT DISPLAY BY G. CHALLENOR.

The West Indies were seen to great advantage at Lakenham yesterday, and when rain caused stumps to be drawn nearly an hour before the usual time the visitors were in a very strong position.
