WEST INDIAN PLAYERS AT SWINDON.

A Decisive Victory Over Wiltshire.

SPARKLING CRICKET.

The West India cricketers played a two days match against Wiltshire on the County Ground at Swindon on Wednesday and yesterday. Some sparkling cricket was seen on the opening day. The day was blazing hot, and the players had a very trying time. The visitors won the toss and their rate of scoring was fairly brisk. With the score at 25 Tarilton was taken in the slips, and a mistake in calling resulted in Neunes losing his wicket. Three wickets were down for 58 runs. Small obtained 25 runs in 20 minutes, catching up his partner Ince, who was also playing a good game.

With the score at 99 Lucas relieved James, and the 100 was sent up after 81 minutes play. Off one over of Newman's, Small, who is a coloured man, got 16. At lunch-time the association of Fernandes and Small had resulted in the fourth wicket adding 123 runs.

After lunch the attack was entrusted to James and Sandford. Wiltshire immediately met with success, James getting Fernandes caught behind the wicket by Nash off his first ball. With a four off the same bowler, Small reached his century, having been at the wickets 160 minutes. After scoring eight more, he gave his first chance by lifting the ball into the country, but Lucas was unable to make the catch, the ball bouncing out of his hands. With the score standing at 220, Darell relieved James and Fleming Sandford. Success came Fleming's way, for with his first ball he bowled Hunter off his pad.

Small was missed by Newman at 128. After he had scored three more his stumps were disturbed by Fleming. Austin, the visitors' captain, only got 17 before he was taken at cover point by James off Lucas's bowling. The 300 was reached after three hours' play. Holt reached his half century in 45 minutes.

The first six of the match came from Pascall, who lifted a ball clean over the chairs at the pavilion end of the ground. With the score at 356, Holt was dismissed. Butler making a brilliant catch on the boundary. He hit 13 fours. At this stage the visitors declared.

Wiltshire Bat.

Wiltshire opened their innings with Butler and Fuller to the bowling of John and Pascall, the former batsman scoring at the faster rate. Subsequently both settled down, and sent up the 50 after 60 minutes' play. With only one more run added, Butler was stumped. Newman, the incoming batsman, failed, being beaten by the first ball he received from Pascall. Sandford succeeded in preventing the hat-trick. Pascall, however, soon got another victim, beating Fuller with a good ball. Ill-luck continued to attend Wiltshire, Sandford being bowled by John.

Three wickets had fallen for one run. Bankier had a short stay, the first ball being sufficient to beat him. John spread-eagling his stumps. James, the incoming batsman, saved the hat-trick and then turned John to leg for four. His sudden collapse came as a big surprise to the crowd. In having a go at John he had his stumps upset. Awdry and Darell adopted safety tactics, and with the score at 83 Small relieved John, but it was left to Pascall to dissolve the partnership by bowling Awdry, who went in third wicket down and left at the seventh. Fleming, after scoring three, was caught out on the boundary. At 93 John was brought back on—vice Small—and Darell immediately placed him to the boundary. The century was hoisted after an hour and a quarter's play, and with Wiltshire's score at 101 for the loss of nine wickets, the first day's play ended.

The Second Day.

The heat was again intense yesterday when the match was resumed. Nash was accompanied to the wickets by Lucas. John had one ball to complete his over and Lucas got him away for a single. Nash opened his account with a couple

off John, who was making the ball get up very quickly off the ground. Pascall bowled at the other end and sent down some good deliveries. Nash, however, got him away through the slips for four—a very nice shot.

Both batsmen were playing well and appeared to be steady against good bowling. The end came soon, however, John catching Lucas at mid-on off H. Pascall's bowling.

The West Indies, therefore, had a lead of 246 runs. Pascall had the excellent bowling analysis of six wickets for 51 runs and John four for 43.

In Wiltshire's second innings the visitors' captain, H. B. E. Austin, was unable to field owing to feeling unwell, and Constantine went out as a substitute.

The home team opened their second venture with Fuller and Butler to the bowling of John and Pascall. Butler started well, collecting six off John's first over, including a boundary. Fuller sent up double figures by cutting John for three. Both batsmen played steadily, and 30 was hoisted after 20 minutes' play. Butler being responsible for 21. He was, however, caught at 27. R. W. Awdry contributed a capital 40, and A. A. Bankier showed an agreeable improvement on his exhibition of the previous day, compiling a capital score of 69. H. J. Fleming played steadily for 16, but the other contributions were small, and the West Indies won by an innings and 34 runs. Scores:—

WILTSHIRE v. WEST INDIES.

AT SWINDON, JULY 11th and 12th.

There were three main objects in Wiltshire playing the West Indies this year. Firstly, on both the previous West Indian tours the match had taken place—oddly enough with victor—falling to Wiltshire each time; secondly, a match against a really good side which is playing against first-class and minor counties alike provides the only opportunity for measuring a Minor County's form with that of the first class counties; and, thirdly (and by far the most important), Wiltshire has always desired to play against the very best sides that can be induced to play against it.

In actually playing the match Wiltshire discovered with regard to the first point that it is not so good as it used to be, while the West Indians have improved considerably: as to the second point it learnt—not greatly to its surprise—that its bowling is too plain to get out a first-rate batting side on a good wicket, but that there is a certain amount of promising batting. With regard to the third it knew already that it is a much better sport to be beaten by a better side than to trample on a weak one.

The loss of the toss was bound to lead to trouble, and it did. After doing splendidly in getting three wickets down for 50, the hopes of the fielding side were rather damped by Small, a large and very cheerful native, and Fernandez. Small's innings was a model, and quite delightful throughout. His driving was wonderful, more especially off balls a little short of the half volley, and he timed every ball perfectly. Fernandez was not so interesting, but quite sound. Holt, another native, not so large, made 68 excellent runs. He was not so good and finished a batsman as Small, but some of his shots, especially four amazing thumps past cover point, were even better than any of the latter's. The Wiltshire bowling had long been harmless under the double influence of the pitiless sun and strong batting; and Austin was able to declare the innings closed at 4.15.

Butler and Fuller started really well, to the bowling of the two natives—John, fast right, and Pascall, slow left. Butler was scoring freely, and Fuller playing straight and calmly till 50 appeared in little over twenty minutes, when suddenly, and for little apparent reason the whole bottom fell out of the batting—Butler got rather tied up in hitting at Pascall and could not save himself from being stumped, and immediately afterwards Newman and Fuller were bowled by Pascall, as were Sandford and Bankier by John for no very obvious reason. Bankier's was a good one, and kept low, which is rather cruel for the first ball. At 5.19 the score was 51 for no wicket, and at 5.39 it was 52 for five. James and Awdry were both bowled quite unnecessarily by half volleys, and Darell alone did any good. He played very well, and stoutly, and was finally splendidly caught at mid-off off a full-blooded bang off the fast bowler. After the excellent start it was a sad collapse.

Thursday came, hotter and more cruel even than Wednesday, and it is worth putting on record that with one accord the West Indian players declared that such heat was absolutely unknown in the West Indies. The native members had perpetual relays of water carried out to them to drink, which is unusual, as most English cricketers would suggest that to fill yourself with water would decrease your activity—not so John, the fast bowler, for the more he drank the faster he bowled, the faster he bowled the more he perspired, the more he perspired the more he drank, and so ad infinitum.

Butler and Fuller again started well, and their play together in this match suggests that Wiltshire's opening pair for the next decade or so is now found. At 38 Butler left, caught at the wicket; at 40 Newman was caught at slip, while at 48 Fuller and Sandford were bowled, and it looked as if all was over. Awdry and Bankier stayed in for some time, and after the former was out James played soundly, and made a good stand with Bankier, so much so that the result was almost beginning to be in doubt. Bankier, after a long spell of ill success throughout last season and this, at last found his feet, and after starting rather tentatively and jerkily settled down to play a fine innings. If it proves that his form has returned Wiltshire is indeed lucky, for 1921 records of what value he is to the side. Fleming made some stout blows, and altogether the total reached 212, which is by no means discreditable.

A sound beating by a good side, but a beating with plenty of cause for hope in it.

WILTS OUTCLASSED BY SURREY II.

Londoners Secure an Innings Victory.

POOR BATTING.

Wilts put up probably one of their weakest displays on record on Monday on the opening of the two days' match with Surrey seconds on the County Ground. The batting was exceedingly feeble, as may be imagined when it is stated that the whole side were out for 74 before the lunch interval. And it is all the more surprising in view of the fact that the visitors opened the attack with a slow left hand bowler at one end and a medium fast at the other on a hard wicket, which should have enabled the Wiltshiremen to rattle up a respectable score.

Butler and Fuller went to the wicket when stumps were pitched, and runs came slowly. The first wicket fell for 19, and the second with only 10 added to the board. Newman was bowled with only three runs to his credit, and the third wicket fell for 32. The next wicket did not add a single run, both Bankier and Awdry returning to the pavilion with "ducks." Lovell-Hewitt could only make four, and the score then read 37 for 5. The sixth wicket fell with the score unchanged.

Nash took the score to 41, where it remained for the next three wickets, and it was only the last wicket stand that provided anything approaching lively cricket. The partnership of Nash and Knight nearly doubled the score, both playing prettily. Up to this point Gulland and Jennings had been bowling unchanged, but Watts and Baldwin replaced them and the faster deliveries of the latter checked the scoring somewhat and eventually he bowled Nash. The Swindon player had given the best display of the side, and his score of 22, the highest, included two 4's and two 3's.

Surrey's Batting.

Lovell-Hewitt and Blair were the bowlers to oppose the first two Surrey batsmen—Cook and Bullock—who had only ten minutes to bat before the luncheon interval. Fourteen runs had been registered before the interval, after which Newman re-placed Lovell-Hewitt. With the score at 36 Bullock was bowled by Blair for 11, and Packham, who followed him met a similar fate with only two runs added to the board. Daily joined Cook, and runs came merrily, the home team's total soon being passed. The Wilts captain constantly changed the bowling to no good effect, and the score stood at 204 when Daily was out lbw to Lovell-Hewitt. Then the captain (J. M. Sorenson) partnered Cook, and some exceedingly attractive batting was seen before the former was bowled by Blair for 22. The Surrey tailed wagged vigorously, and Watts was not out for 45, when the innings closed with the score at 359.

Wilts went in again for about half-an-hour. Butler and Fuller again led off, and fared much better than before, 40 having been registered when time was called, so that Wilts had a chance of wiping off some of the deficiency to-day.

In the bowling department Wilts were little better than in their batting, no fewer than six men being tried. Of these Blair was the most successful, taking five wickets for 119 runs while Kirkpatrick took three for 91 and Lovell-Hewitt two for 50. Others who trundled were Newman (0 for 17), Knight (0 for 36), and Butler (0 for 20). For Surrey Gulland took four wickets for 28 runs, Jennings five for 22, and Watts one for nine.

SECOND DAY.

In the follow-on on Tuesday Wiltshire made some improvement on Monday's batting at the commencement, but fell away badly and suffered an innings defeat. Butler and Fuller made a promising start, knocking up 36 and 31 respectively, while Newman played good cricket for his 24. The rest of the batsmen had rather a sorry time. Sawyer's 19 included some very pretty strokes, while Lovell-Hewitt hit a useful 10. The last wicket fell with the score at 152, Wilts thus losing by an innings and 113 runs. SWINDON CHAMPIONS OF WILTSHIRE.

Chippenham Skittled Out for 50 in Knock-out Final.

HILDER HITS OUT.

Great interest was centred in the final match in the Wiltshire knock-out cricket competition between Chippenham and Swindon on the ground of the former at Hardenhuish Park.

Swindon had good cause for optimism, for in their opening match of the season in which they met Chippenham they dismissed them for the insignificant total of 37, and on Saturday Chippenham only exceeded that total by 13.

The honours were equally divided between Willis and Bates, whose clever deliveries completely nonplussed the home batsmen. Willis's analysis was: 13 overs, 8 maidens, 26 runs, 5 wickets, an average of 3.2. A fortnight ago he captured six Trowbridge wickets for 25, and last week he took three Charlton wickets at the small cost of 18. Bates's average was five for 17, a very creditable performance, and with two such deadly bowlers one is not surprised to find that Swindon have gone through the season of 1923 without having a single defeat recorded against them.

A Bowler's Wicket.

Reckless, the groundsman, had prepared a good wicket, which was a trifle soft at the pavilion end, but taken altogether it was in favour of the bowlers. Chippenham won the toss and elected to bat, sending in W. Holder and E. S. Warrilow, both of whom are invariably to be relied upon to make a substantial contribution to the score. But it was evident from the outset that they were not at all comfortable. Within five minutes of the opening, Bates clean bowled Holder for a single. There was surprise amongst the spectators, which was turned to dismay when Warrilow succumbed to Willis.

N. J. Awdry joined the Rev. L. Parsons, who was lucky in attempting to play a ball forward snicked it to leg for the first boundary. Immediately afterwards he mistimed a ball and had his bails dislodged by Willis, who had at this stage two wickets to his credit for no runs. The telegraph registered 10-3-5. E. P. Awdry joined his brother, and at one time it looked as if they were going to stop the rot, but Bates dispelled all hopes by defeating E. P. Awdry.

The partnership added 18 to the score, of which the retiring batsman made 11. N. J. Awdry soon followed his brother, being caught behind the wicket by Nash off Willis. J. Lucas and T. Luce came together, and after a nice stroke to the boundary the former was dismissed by Willis, and the latter was smartly caught by Williams without troubling the scorers. B. Weakley, who joined E. Pound, played with characteristic caution and succeeded in reaching the fatal figure of 13, the top score for his side, when one of Willis's off breaks scattered his bails. Fifty went up, but the remaining two batsmen did not alter the score and the innings closed, having lasted only 75 minutes.

Hilder Missed

Swindon commenced their innings at 4 o'clock, C. L. Hilder and the Rev. J. Kemmis falling to the bowling of Lucas and Warrilow. The latter batsman, who had a short stay, failed to crack his "duck." The vacancy was filled by E. M. Nash, and runs came steadily. Hilder, in the early part of his innings, ought to have been taken at least twice, if not three times, and these missed chances turned out to be very expensive. Hilder hit out with the greatest freedom, and his powerful strokes to the boundary delighted the spectators.

His partner Nash was taken at cover point by N. J. Awdry. Sutton was the next comer, and an appeal for run out was allowed by the umpire. At the pavilion there were loud protests against the decision, and Sutton, who is acknowledged a good sport, was confident that he was past the wicket when the bails were removed. H. Bates was Hilder's next partner, and his first ball he drove into the tennis court for 6, while Hilder, not to be outdone, sent the ball over the corrugated iron boundary into the Marshfield road. The last over before the tea interval 14 runs were scored off Warrilow.

On resuming after tea, Bates, who had 22 to his credit, retired, and Tinsley joined Hilder, but he was soon out, being caught at square leg by Neate off Warrilow. He had added 7 to the score. C. Williams was run out when he had rattled up 24 by free hitting. Hilder, when he had reached a total of 83, was caught at the top end of the field by Lucas off Martin. WILTSHIRE v. KENT II.

W. OVERTON'S BENEFIT.

The Minor Counties' cricket match between Wiltshire and Kent Second Eleven, which opened at the County Ground, Swindon, on Friday last, was set apart for the benefit of W. Overton, the ex-Wiltshire cricketer, but it was decidedly unfortunate that there should have been a break in the spell of fine weather and a return to unsettled conditions. "Billy" Overton is a Swindon product, being born in the railway town in March, 1873. He has been a member of the Wiltshire team since 1897, and has rendered signal service to the club both with bat and ball. In 1903 he took 103 wickets for the county, and his notable batting performances include 109 against Devon in 1901 and 74 against Berkshire in 1921.

Rain was falling at the time fixed to commence—11.30—and the start was delayed until 12.10. Wiltshire won the toss, and decided to take first knock. A promising start was made, Butler and Fuller putting on 34 for the first wicket. The former batsman compiled 27, and his chief hits were five 4's and two 2's. Four good wickets fell for the addition of 26 runs, and at lunch with the score standing at 60 for five wickets, the outlook was not very promising. On resuming, Newman and Sawyer carried the score to 79 before the latter fell to a smart catch in the slips. Newman continued to play with confidence, but could get no one to stay with him. E. P. Awdry and Kirkpatrick were out for "ducks," and Fleming was caught after making nine. Willis, the last man in, kept his end up for some time, and the last wicket took the score to 108 before the Swindon man, in attempting to hit out, skied the ball and was caught. Newman, who was undefeated at the close of the innings, batted very soundly and hit three 4's, one 3, and five 2's.

Kent started none too well, losing two wickets for 19 runs. Taylor and Hollis made a useful stand and looked well set, when Hollis got his leg in front of a straight one from Sellick, and was given out l.b.w. Taylor was smartly caught behind the wicket by Kirkpatrick, and Hearn and Reid were cheaply dismissed. Capes and Povey played out time and at close of play, with the score at 85 for six wickets, the game was in a very interesting position.

Capes and Povey, the overnight not outs, continued the Kent innings in brilliant sunshine on Saturday morning. They took the score to within three of the Wilt total when Povey was caught and bowled by Newman. Wright joined Capes and the pair hit merrily. Capes was eventually caught behind the wickets for an invaluable 44, including one big drive for six. Wright played well for 25. The innings closed for 149, and the visitors thus had a lead of 41 runs.

Hardly had the players returned to the pavilion than a heavy thunderstorm swept over the ground and rendered the wicket under water. The weather cleared, however, and under the influence of bright sunshine, the wicket recovered in remarkably quick time. At 4.30 another start was made, and Butler and Fuller opened Wiltshire's second innings. Runs came at a fine pace, and 60 was on the board when Butler succumbed to a catch behind the wickets. The outgoing batsman had played a stylish innings of 36, and was heartily applauded. Fuller soon followed to the pavilion, having made 23 in good style, and Sellick was stumped after a short and merry innings. Colonel Henslow was bowled first ball, and then Newman and R. W. Awdry came together. The skipper narrowly escaped bagging a pair of spectacles, and it was some fifteen minutes before he scored. Newman was given two "lives" before he had been at the wickets a few minutes, but when the batsmen settled down they hit out to some purpose, and were still together at close of play. Wiltshire's second venture realised 124 for four wickets, and the match was left drawn, with Kent taking three points for the first innings' lead. The attendance was disappointing, and it is hoped that some effort will be made to augment the Overton benefit fund by other means.

WILTS v. DORSET (Under 19).

A great deal of interest centred around the match between Wilts and Dorset on the County Ground, Trowbridge, on Wednesday and Thursday of last week, when the boys of both counties under nineteen years of age, gained much useful experience which will fit them for the sterner battles of county cricket in years to come. It is only of late years that Wiltshire has adopted this policy of bringing on the younger players, and it is a policy which cannot but be admired, for it is from the schools that the future cricketers will come, and the County which has fostered its School players will be bound to benefit in the future. Judging from the display on the County Ground on Wednesday and Thursday there is some coming talent among Wiltshire youth, and Major Awdry, with his usual sound judgment, has succeeded in spotting it, and is determined to nurse and foster it thoroughly.

Wiltshire went first to a rather difficult wicket, and put up a useful score of 102 runs, T. Cuedon, of Melksham, making a sound 37. They started disastrously, and one wicket was down for eight runs, two and three were down for 27, but then things improved, and the fourth wicket fell at 69. Withers took four wickets for 35, Brown three for 20, and Jones three for seven. Dorset started well, their first wicket falling for 28; two were down for 60, but then came a remarkable collapse, and three wickets fell in quick succession, five being down for 79. Their innings total reached 203, Wiltshire being 101 runs behind on the first innings.

On Thursday morning Wiltshire started well, and began to make light of the Dorset bowling. Forester, Awdry, Haines and Salmon made good scores, while Cuedon again came out top of the innings, as well as of the match, with an exceedingly good knock of 64. "Mr. Extras" accounted for the huge score of 46. The side were eventually all out for 309 runs at four o'clock. Tea was then partaken in the pavilion, and sharp at 4.30 Dorset started to make the 209 runs required for victory, Wiltshire having left them until seven o'clock in which to do it. It is to the credit of Dorset that they went for the wicket and tried to get the runs, and did not "sit on the spile" as many another side would have done in the circumstances. As so often happens they did not lose their wickets, and scored the 209 runs for five wickets by 6.30, or in exactly two hours batting—a splendid performance, and an excellent example of "brighter cricket." This ended two days of highly interesting cricket, of great benefit to each participant—a thoroughly hard-fought match between two sides, both of whom were keen to win. Wiltshire had bad luck in losing, but Dorset must be congratulated on an exceedingly good and creditable victory. It was a case of "something attempted, something done," but many sides would not have had the pluck to make the attempt.

Wiltshire v. Berkshire.

The return match between these counties opened at Trowbridge on Wednesday. Heavy rain in the early morning, culminating in a downpour at ten o'clock, rendered play impossible before lunch. Bennett should have been caught by Fuller early on, but went on to make a half-century, and the Wiltshire total was passed for the loss of one wicket.
