**MINOR COUNTIES' CHAMPIONSHIP.**

**WILTSHIRE v. SURREY 2nd XI.**

At the Oval, Kennington, on Saturday last, Wiltshire met Surrey Second Eleven in the Minor Counties' Championship. Wiltshire took first innings, and it was a significant feature that with the exception of H. Hardy, who was not out (7), each of the Wiltshire batsmen was clean bowled, a fact which speaks volumes for the quality of the Surrey bowling. With one outstanding exception, high scores were not the order of the day for Wiltshire; the exception was E. M. Nash, whose 129, before he was bowled by Lock, was the backbone of the Wiltshiremen's total. The only other scorers worthy of note were those of W. Lovell Hewitt and F. W. Fitzgerald, who made 57 and 46 respectively. Of the bowling, Baldwin took highest average with four wickets for 68 runs, and this with 24 overs; he was closely followed, however, by Lock, who took three wickets for 59 runs in 26 overs. The close of play on Saturday saw Wiltshire all out for 323 runs on the first innings.

On Whit-Monday Surrey Second Eleven took the batting for their first innings. Here, although no centuries were scored, the average number of runs per player was much higher than that of Wiltshire. W. T. Cook and G. A. Rimbault, who opened the batting for Surrey, made 62 and 68 respectively before they were dismissed, the former being caught by R. W. Awdry and the latter being given out l.b.w. The only "duck" of the match was made by D. D. O'Gorman, who was given l.b.w. on the bowling of Lloyd. In contrast to Wiltshire's innings only three batsmen were clean bowled by the Wiltshiremen, these being Gregory (44), H. Geary (38), and Lock (four). Surrey coming all out for 368 runs, thus won the first innings by 45 runs. Wiltshire then took second innings, S. H. Fuller and W. Lovell Hewitt opening the batting: these two made 15 between them, 11 and four not out respectively. Scores:—

**WILTS. COUNTY CHAMPIONSHIP.**

**DEVIZES, TOWN v. CHIPPENHAM.**

This County Competition match, played at Devizes on Saturday last, resulted in a victory for the visitors by the substantial margin of 67 runs. Devizes were at full strength for this match, but their batting, with one or two exceptions, was far below the usual standard. Chippenham won the toss, and elected to bat. Holder and T. Neate gave them a fine start, laying the foundation of a good score before they were separated at 55, Trapp clean bowling Neate. The Chippenham batsmen were not unduly troubled by the home bowlers, with the exception of Trapp, who was always difficult to play. The wicket was fiery, many of the shorter balls rising above the batsmen's heads. Lucas, who had made 26 and was batting confidently, was unfortunately hit on the head by such a ball from A. F. Ellis, and had to retire to the pavilion. Later batsmen, however, still continued to get runs, notwithstanding the fact that Jotcham tried no fewer than six bowlers, and made frequent changes in the attack, and when the tea interval arrived the visitors had compiled 168 for six wickets, Trapp claiming four of these for 22 runs. The Chippenham captain declared the innings closed at this stage, giving Devizes a sporting chance of reaching their total—by no means an impossible task. Thus, however, proved to be beyond the home batsmen, and although A. S. Barlow, and subsequently Jotcham, withstood the attack confidently, there were some unexpected batting failures, and the whole innings realised only 101. The former batsman, in getting a magnificent 48 out of this total, once more proved his worth to the side, and he was unlucky to be bowled by a shooter when within two of his half-century. The visitors' attack was always accurate, Lucas being especially deadly. This bowler had so far recovered from the blow which he received while batting that, bowling splendidly all the time, he took six wickets for 20 runs. Full scores:—

**DEVIZES v. R.A.F., NETHERAVON.**

Devizes Town entertained the Netheravon R.A.F. on Whit-Monday in a whole day's match, the game being a County League one, and after some thrilling incidents the Airmen were beaten just on time by 65 runs. Both sides had two

innings, and notwithstanding the dull and showery weather some keen play was witnessed by a good number of spectators. Two changes were seen in the Devizes Eleven, C. D. Mead and R. Eyles coming in for P. R. Trapp and A. F. Ellis. Jotcham won the toss, and sent in Barlow and Eyles to open the innings for Devizes. There were some sensational happenings, King, the Airmen's opening bowler, getting four wickets in the first four overs, the total score being only 12. Wickham and Jotcham came together, and stemmed the onslaught for a time, adding 24 before the latter was caught, when he had made a useful 21. Jotcham continued to bat steadily, but he was bowled with his score on the 30 mark. Short was the only other batsman to reach double figures, and the Devizes innings came to an end at lunch time for the very poor score of 68. There was more startling play after lunch, and the Airmen's earlier batsmen fared even worse than their opponents had done. Short and Barlow opened the attack, and off the former's third ball Watts was well caught by Hopkins at square leg. Only one bye was on the board when Barlow got Roberts l.b.w., and six runs later Short broke the wicket with a fine throw to dispose of King, who was run out easily. With only 14 to their credit, the visitors then lost Field, who got his leg in front of a straight one from Barlow. Devizes were on their toes all the time, and there was now a great chance of preventing their opponents from heading their total. This, indeed, proved to be the case, for notwithstanding some steady batting by Lenard and Yool in an attempt to save their side, the visitors were eventually disposed of 22 runs behind the Devizes total. This was an unexpected state of affairs for which Barlow was mainly responsible with some fine bowling, his five wickets costing only 28 runs.

A second innings was decided upon, and this time the home batsmen gave a better display. Salmon was bowled with the score at seven, but Church, Walter Ellis and Wickham took the score to 74 for five, and Barlow and Jotcham made a good stand, the score reaching 105 before Barlow was dismissed, the bowler taking one-handed a hot return drive. Jotcham was bowled after contributing 30 for the second time in the match, and after Mead and Acocks had carried the score to 153 in a last wicket partnership, the innings was declared closed, leaving the Airmen to get 176 to win. They made a promising start, for 55 runs were scored for the loss of only two wickets. The Devizes bowlers, however, backed up by some keen fielding, gradually gained the upper hand, and the game was won for the home eleven five minutes from time, the visitors then being 65 runs behind. The losers were indebted to their captain, Flying-Officer Watts, for a fine not out innings of 52. Going in first, and with his colleagues coming and going quickly, he refused to be moved, and was undefeated at the close, a feat which was heartily applauded. The most successful bowler in this innings was Salmon, who made the ball do puzzling things. He obtained four wickets for 10 runs. Short took three for 32, and Jotcham two for 41. The Devizes fielding all day was of a very keen nature, by far their best display this season. Scores:—

GOOD MATCHES AT BEMERTON.  
TWO MINOR COUNTY GAMES.

In view of the success of the "Cricket Week" at Bemerton last year, the Wilts County Cricket Club decided to make the South Wilts Club's ground the venue of a repetition this year. Three attractive matches were arranged, and everything was done so that the spectators should see the games in comfort. All that was necessary in addition was the sunshine. Last year the weather was ideal, but this year the elements were not so kind for the first few days.

The "Week" began on Friday, when the old established club, the Eton Ramblers, were the visitors. The Wiltshire Club and Ground team, captained by Lt. Col. R. W. Awdry, batted first on an excellent pitch prepared by Mr. W. Vining, and runs were scored consistently, although A. A. Bankier, who opened the innings with Capt. L. F. Marson did not stay long. His partner, however, played the bowling comfortably and at lunch time he was in the 70's and still undefeated. On resuming he took his score past the 100 mark and it was after doing this that he gave his only chance. After batting for two hours and a half he was clean bowled by Cartwright for 133, which included 15 fours, four threes, and seven twos. The merriest knock of the day was Col. E. L. Henslow's, who in an innings of 41, hit 2 sixes and four fours. W. Lovell-Hewitt and E. M. Nash also batted well for Wiltshire, the innings closing at 415 for 353. Whether such a big score would have been compiled had G. H. M. Cartwright bowled for Eton from the commencement is a moot point. Until his arrival at 3.30 Mr. Berkley played as substitute. In three quarters of an hour Cartwright finished off the innings, capturing five wickets for 40 runs. When the visitors went in to bat they soon lost Lt. Col. Darrell, their captain, who was out before he had scored. G. H. M. Cartwright also lost his wicket, but when the stumps were drawn, the Rev. J. Barker and M. E. Impey looked well set, 136 runs being on the board for the loss of two wickets. There was a good attendance during the afternoon, over 500 guests attending the "at home" given by Lady Everett, whose husband, Major General Sir Henry Everett, is president of the Wiltshire club. The band of the 2nd Batt. Somerset Light Infantry supplied a capital programme of music.

Rain prevented play on Saturday morning, but the clouds broke, and at four minutes past three Eton continued their innings on a drying pitch. The band of the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry played during play. Wyatt and Creek were the bowlers, and the latter, off his second ball, got Impey caught by Marson at cover-point, before he had added to his score. The Rev. J. Barker continued to bat well, and soon reached his half century. Twelve runs later he was smartly stumped by Nash, his score including one six and seven fours. Wiltshire continued to bowl and field well, and wickets fell cheaply, and although the Ramblers tried hard they were unable to save the follow on, the innings closing for 224. With only an hour for play Eton batted again, but a complete rot set in, four wickets being down for 31. At the fall of the fourth Creek had taken three at the cost of one run! Cartwright and Benson then became associated, and when stumps were drawn they were still together, Eton having scored 78 runs for the loss of four wickets. WILTS v. DORSET.

The last match of the "week" commenced on Wednesday, Dorset being Wiltshire's opponents in a minor counties championship match. The weather was ideal and Awdry beating Elderton in the call of the coin chose to bat first on a splendid wicket, he and C. S. Butler opening the innings. Both batsmen opened with great confidence. Butler gave a chance when he was 32, but the first wicket did not go down until 116 was on the board, Awdry falling a victim to Busk, after having hit five fours and one six in a score of 57. **MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.**

Wiltshire won their match with Berkshire in the Minor Counties' Championship, played on Friday and Saturday, by 159 runs. At 260 Bankier was taken by Nash at short leg off Relf, and his innings of 64 included one five and six 4's. The partnership had yielded 121. Colonel R. W. Awdry followed and hit a four off the first ball he received, and another three strokes brought him to double figures.

At 3.30 Awdry declared at 297 for six. Newman's score was 68, and included six 4's. When Berkshire started their second innings at 3.40 they required 315 runs for victory, with three hours to get them in. The first ball of the innings from C. Awdry proved fatal, Lewis playing on. Luther was next beaten by the same bowler and two wickets were down for one run, that being obtained from a wide. Woodburn was splendidly taken low down in the slips by R. Awdry. At this stage C. Awdry was bowling in a deadly manner, and the Wiltshire fielding was brilliant, being frequently applauded.

So well did the Wiltshiremen bowl and field that the visitors were all out for 155. Palmer was top scorer with 39, which included seven 4's. A feature of the game was the good fielding by W. Lovell Hewitt for Wiltshire.

**WILTS v. BERKS.**

For the first time for several seasons a second class championship match was commenced on the Trowbridge County Ground on Friday, Berkshire being the visitors. Mr. R. W. Awdry won the toss and naturally took first knock on a good wicket. Fuller and Butler opened the innings, the first over from Relf (the old Sussex professional) producing a couple of byes. Butler off-drove Nash beautifully to the boundary, but with his score at nine, the total being 15, Relf got his off stump. Marson followed, and Fuller swung Relf to the leg boundary, turning Nash to leg for a similar number. Marson got Relf through the slips for a two. Fuller scored freely on the leg side, and 40 were registered in as many minutes. Hawksworth then relieved Nash, and Relf changed his bowling by going round the wicket, Fuller at once getting him away for three. In the same over Marson got his leg in front of the wicket and was given out, the score being 49—2—11. Hewitt, who followed, got Hawksworth to the boundary with a terrific drive, but next over almost gave a return to Relf, who just failed to reach the ball, and then got one just over the fieldsman's head for a couple. Fuller scored a three through bad fielding, and then brought up 70 with a leg boundary. Hewitt drove Relf to the off boundary. Hawksworth gave place to Woodburn with the ball, and Hewitt drove him to the rails twice in his first over, both being beautiful strokes along the carpet. A minute

later the same player brought up the century with a single, though he was nearly caught by Relf, who touched a high return, the ball dropping behind him. Next ball Fuller brought his individual score to 50 with a delightful hook to the rails, made in an hour and a quarter. Soon after Hewitt was caught in the slips for a well played 31, the score being 106—3—31. Eighteen later Hunloke was bowled in attempting a drive, and with one added Fuller was caught at the wicket, the keeper taking the ball at the second attempt. The retiring batsman had 69 to his credit, making his runs without the semblance of a chance, and principally on the leg side. Newman was beautifully held at short leg in trying to turn Relf. The home skipper brought up the 140 with a glance to the leg boundary, and at the luncheon interval the total was 150 for six.

Ten were added after lunch when Bankier hit out at Woodburn and was bowled. Relf, who had been bowling from the commencement, reverted to over the wicket, and bowled C. E. Awdry, who was dismissed for the first duck. R. W. Awdry played a patient game, though he did most of the scoring; but when 30 he made the most beautiful stroke of the day—a perfect drive past cover to the rails. Lord Douglas Hamilton added a few runs, and Awdry made his score 50 with another perfect off drive, getting Hawksworth to the rails twice more in the same over, the 200 coming up after 24 hours' play. At 210, however, he was very smartly caught behind the wicket for an invaluable 60. The first 30 of these were made by very careful cricket, but afterwards the home captain gave one a glimpse of his batting of years ago, finding the boundary on seven occasions with perfect ease. One incident caused a roar of laughter. Hawksworth bowled a rather high ball to Kirkpatrick, and R. W. Awdry, apparently thinking he would make a mis-hit, shouted to Kirkpatrick "Don't hit it." He did, however, getting a couple.

Winter and Lewis opened the Berkshire innings, Kirkpatrick and C. Awdry bowling. Newman missed Winter in the slips in the latter's first over, having the ball in his hands and dropping it, and the same player almost pulled the ball on to his wicket; it went for four. At 22 Lewis was given run out, following a smart return by Hunloke. There appeared to be some hesitancy on the part of the batsman to leave, but eventually he retired to the pavilion and the next batsman came to the pavilion rails. Dr. Woodburn, the Berks captain, went on to the field and had a chat with the home captain. The umpire was heard to exclaim: "Let him come back; I can alter my decision." Lewis was then called back to the wickets, and it was afterwards gleaned that the home wicket keeper, when he broke the wicket, did not actually have the ball in his hand. A few runs later Winter was bowled by a full toss for 18. Newman relieved Kirkpatrick at 30. Runs came slowly, the Wiltshire fielding being very good, and an hour went by before the half-century was hoisted. Then Luther pulled a ball from Butler (who had relieved Awdry) on to his wicket. At the tea interval the score was 59 for two, made in 14 hours. Scoring after tea became a little faster, despite several bowling changes, which included bringing on Marson with his underhands. This change succeeded, for with his third ball he got Dempsey lbw, with the total at 81. Relf, who followed, was caught second ball behind the wicket for a "blob." Lewis got three fours off Marson, which brought up the century, after two hours' play. Shortly after Lewis, who had taken over two hours to make 48, was caught from a skier, and Nash was run out in trying a second run. Newman had an appeal for leg before to Woodburn given against him, but he bowled the Berkshire captain next ball for a well played 43, the score being 135 for seven. Next over Butler hit Palmer's stumps, and at the call of time Berks had lost nine wickets for 170.

Resuming on Saturday morning, de Vitre and Hawksworth added 23 runs before the latter was caught at the wicket with the total at 193, which gave Wiltshire a lead of 17 runs.

Butler and Fuller again opened the Wilts innings. When five the latter gave a hot return to Relf, who dropped the ball, a let off which the batsman appreciated by getting a nice three through the slips. The 50 came up after 35 minutes' play. Then Butler was given out caught in the slips by Relf, but it was evident that the ball had touched the ground before the fieldsman took it, and after an explanation by Relf the batsman continued at the wicket. Fuller, however, was caught two runs later. Butler batted confidently, making some beautiful drives, and reached his 50 in exactly an hour. At 85 Marson chopped a ball from Hawksworth on to his wicket, and the century was hoisted after 14 hours when Butler drove to the rails. He might have been stumped next ball. Butler slowed up considerably, but Hewitt hit hard, getting several boundaries in quick succession. With the score at 131 he was held behind the wicket for a useful 30. Six later Butler was bowled by Relf for 71, a capital innings marred only by the chance of a stumping. Hunloke was soon out, but Bankier and Newman scored freely, and soon after lunch Wilts were 200 on, with five wickets in hand. When 30, Newman was missed from a hard hit by Luther. Despite frequent bowling changes, the batsmen added runs at a good rate, both playing excellent cricket. With a two to leg Newman brought the partnership to exactly 100, in just about an hour, each player being for a splendid 64, with the total at 260, the pair having added 121. R. Awdry, who followed, quickly reached double figures, and with the total at 297 the venture was declared, leaving Berks 315 to get to 212 in three hours. New-

man carried out his bat for 68, and on retiring to the pavilion received well merited applause. Awdry made his 25 in ten minutes.

When Berkshire went in they made a disastrous start, C. Awdry bowling Lewis with the first ball sent down, and in the same over he almost yoked Luther. Next over the same bowler had a second wicket, clean bowling Luther for a duck, two wickets thus falling without a run being scored. Kirkpatrick bowled a wide, but next ball R. Awdry made an excellent catch in the slips which disposed of Woodburn, three wickets thus being down in three overs for one. A confident appeal for a catch at the wicket against Dempsey was answered in the batsman's favour. It was, of course, impossible to maintain such an excellent start, and Relf and Dempsey stayed the rot. The latter was nearly captured in the slips by C. Awdry when 13, but the bowler had the satisfaction of bowling Relf next over, the score being 32—4—16. Awdry at this point had three for 13, all clean bowled. Dempsey should have been caught by Kirkpatrick from a return, but for some unaccountable reason the bowler stood still and looked at the ball, which just dropped in front of him. Afterwards Dempsey was bowled for a somewhat lucky 30, the ball going on to the wicket from the bat. Tea was taken, with the score 57 for five, and immediately on resuming Awdry claimed a further victim, Nash getting his leg in front of a straight one. Winter and Palmer hit out and added 40 before the home skipper held the former in the slips. The latter continued to bat well, but was eventually bowled for a hard hit 39. At six o'clock Kirkpatrick bowled de Vitre, and Wiltshire won a splendid victory by 159 runs. This was the home county's second win of the week.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

Wiltshire v. Berkshire.

Wiltshire won this game on Friday and Saturday at the County Ground, Trowbridge, by 159 runs. The superiority of the home county's batting was the chief feature of the game. Wiltshire had compiled a score of 210 in their first innings, B. H. F. Fuller and R. W. Awdry being the principal contributors with 60 and 60 respectively, while Lovell Hewitt had hit a merry 31. Berkshire replied with 193, de Vitre and Hawksworth putting on 36 for the last wicket. The most interesting cricket of the game, however, took place after lunch on Saturday, when Wilts forced the proceedings in an effort to obtain a commanding lead on their second innings and then declare. G. S. Butler followed up his century against Dorset, and gave them an encouraging lead with a well-played 71, and Lovell Hewitt again showed how he enjoys his cricket when he merrily swung the willow for 30 in short time. It fell to Bankier and Newman, however, to take part in the longest and most prolific scoring partnership of the day. Despite the very poor light, both, early on, decided to go for the bowling, particularly Newman, who gave a chance to Luther at mid-off when his score was 30, but that was his only mistake. The pair added 121 runs before Bankier was held by Nash at short leg. His contribution of 64 included six 4's and a 5 (from an overthrow). Newman had thoroughly entertained the spectators (of whom there was a large number), and they gave him a splendid reception at the declaration. He hit five 4's. Including the game against Dorset on Wednesday and Thursday Newman had scored 114 runs and only been out once in four innings. The concluding minutes of Wiltshire's innings produced some exhilarating cricket from "Skipper" Awdry, who deemed that the ball was meant to be hit and demonstrated how to do it in a business-like way. The first ball sent down to him was sent past deep mid-off for 4, and his next three scoring strokes produced a 1, 3 and 4—twelve in four hits! He pulled with great power throughout his innings. With his score at 25, and the score-book recording 207 for six, he declared at 3.30. Berkshire had thus three hours in which to obtain the 318 runs required for victory—an almost hopeless task. When at 8.40 H. L. Lewis and W. J. Woodburn resumed against the bowling of C. Awdry and Kirkpatrick, disaster was quickly forthcoming, for with the first ball sent down Awdry sent back Lewis, who played on. The events of the next 10 minutes were thrilling. Woodburn was gloriously taken low down at first slip by R. Awdry, of Kirkpatrick, and Luther was "skittled" by C. Awdry. The latter was bowling splendidly at this period, and faster than we have seen him for a long while. Thus Berkshire had three of their best men out, and the score board only registered a single—an "extra"!

Relf and Dempsey then stayed awhile and stopped the "rot," but the latter was lucky to get the benefit of the doubt from a very confident appeal for a catch behind the wicket. The same batsman should also have been easily caught and bowled by Kirkpatrick. C. Awdry, maintaining his splendid pace and length, eventually secured both these wickets, and soon after came the tea interval, when Berkshire's total was 57 for five. The high-class fielding of Wilts, which had been a feature of the afternoon, was maintained after tea. Lovell Hewitt being very fast and clean in gathering the ball. C. Awdry also took many tremendous returns from his own bowling. Winter added a useful 29 before being caught by R. Awdry, and then came the hardest hitting of the innings by R. H. R. Palmer, a stalwart standing well over 6ft. He hit with tremendous power. It was during his knock that Lovell Hewitt was so active in the field, and without his brilliant work Palmer would have had a better score than 39. The power and accuracy of his strokes may be seen from the fact that his total included no fewer than seven boundaries. After his departure Awdry and Kirkpatrick soon finished off the "tail," the innings closing for 155 just before 6.15.
