

**COLTS V. COUNCIL.**

**FINE BATTING BY BARBER, OF BRIGHOUSE.**

Castleford, Monday. Yorkshire's Second Eleven started its season's work here to-day with the customary match against a team selected by the Yorkshire Council, and from the start to the close the bowlers had the upper hand. Major Chichester-Constable, who is captaining the Colts again, won the toss, and put his side in, but with three wickets down in the first half-hour for 14 runs, the young Yorkshiremen made a start from which they never recovered.

That their innings topped the century mark was due first to the sound batting of Wilfred Barber, the young Brighouse professional, and second, to a ninth wicket stand in which T. A. Jacques, the York fast bowler, played his part manfully to reveal a batting ability he has not previously shown in the Second XI. As Barber scored 62 and Jacques 33 not out, and the extras totalled 12, it will be seen that the innings was a job-sided affair altogether, and that the other nine players only contributed 27 of the 134 among them.

Barber opened the batting with A. E. Mallalieu, the amateur who has had experience in the Huddersfield League, and he was ninth man out, caught by Allen behind the wicket off Rawlin. His innings stood out alone, and he showed all the form that gave him the top average with the Colts last season. It is true that he took over two hours to score his 62 and that he only hit four 4's, but it has to be remembered that he was playing a lone hand all the time until Jacques joined him. On this form Barber is going to play a big part in the Colts' matches this season.

Rawlin and H. S. Jacques were the bowlers who caused the trouble. Last season Rawlin, who is with the Sheffield Club, was a member of the Colts' team, and this afternoon he bowled as well as ever he did them. At one time he had three wickets for 10 runs, and he ended with five for 46. Equally good was the bowling of young Jacques, of the Leeds Club, who had three wickets for eleven runs each. Jacques, a left-arm slow bowler, commanded the right length all the time, and went through his 22 overs in a very easy fashion, for though he is only small, his action suggests that he could bowl all day, as the saying is, without losing his length. Robshaw, the Castleford Council captain, took the other two wickets with his first three balls, and then had 27 runs hit off him by the Barber-Jacques partnership.

The afternoon was far from a good one for the game, and rain stopped play for one hour and a half. The Council, however, had 75 minutes' batting, in which they lost four wickets for 36 runs to Verity and Jacques, and so the Colts will start to-morrow in a much better position than at once seemed likely. **COLTS' MATCH DRAWN.**

**TAME ENDING AT CASTLEFORD.**

Castleford, Tuesday. The Colts v. Council match on the well-appointed ground of the local club ended here this evening in the usual draw, the Council side taking such honours as the first innings lead could give them. It has been a tame day's cricket altogether, the only bright feature being the innings of 73 played by Reg. Allen, the former Second Eleven wicket-keeper. As yesterday, the bowlers were masters of the situation, and those young batsmen who looked to this match with hopes of distinction have been sadly disappointed.

When play was resumed half an hour after the appointed time, owing to the state of the wicket, the Council had scored 36 runs for 4 wickets in reply to the Colts' total of 134. Allen, who was 28, promptly got to work and put on 45 runs—ten 4's, two 2's, and a 1—in little over half an hour. Yet he was the only one to face the attack of Verity and Turner with confidence. He took especially heavy toll of Verity, and nine of his boundaries were scored off this young Horsforth man, who this season is professional with Accrington in the Lancashire League. Just how valuable Allen's work was is shown by the fact that when he had left he had scored 73 of the 83 runs which had been obtained for six wickets, and 4 of the 83 were extras.

Allen was missed off the third ball of the day, and Jacques, who kept his end up until his side had got the lead, was missed twice in one over from Verity. Jacques, the Selby man, came out with the best bowling figures. He is stronger and heavier than he was last season, and his fast bowling is being watched with interest. In this innings, on a wicket which had not helped him at all, he had four wickets for 29, while Verity had four for 71, which was not so bad when allowance was made for Allen's hard hitting. Stanley Douglas, the Bradford left-arm bowler, was not able to take his part in the attack, owing to a strain received on Saturday, and he was missed, of course, for he was the leading Colts' bowler last season. The Council led by 4, and this was soon rubbed off by Mallalieu and Barber. The latter did not repeat his performance of the first innings, for at 7 he was brilliantly caught by Allen behind the wicket, and Somers owed his dismissal to the Castleford keeper's smartness. Mallalieu and Turner took the score to 100, when Major Chichester-Constable declared, leaving the Council less than an hour to get 97 for victory.

Mallalieu had hard luck in not reaching the half century mark—he was 48, not out. It is a long way the best innings he has played with the Second XI, and should give him the confidence that some of his previous experiences with the side have not encouraged. He is a nice bat—of that there is no doubt.

In their second innings the young Council men went slowly. Douglas and Jacques were the bowlers, and they kept the upper hand right to the drawing of stumps. They never gave their opponents an opportunity to go for victory. Again Grimshaw left early on, but Jacques and Ellis batted stubbornly, and at the close the Council had scored 35 for three wickets. ## RIVAL COLTS AT YORK.

### YORKSHIRE LEAD LANCASHIRE ON FIRST INNINGS.

#### BALL BEATS THE BAT.

The ball mastered the bat in the Minor Counties Championship fixture between Yorkshire II and Lancashire II on the Yorkshire Gentlemen's ground at York yesterday, and quick progress was made with the match. It was the first time such a game had been played at York, and about 2,000 spectators witnessed an interesting day's cricket. Batting first the Yorkshire Colts made 119, but even this moderate score was sufficient to lead Lancashire on the first innings by 47 runs. Yorkshire fared no better at their second venture, and at the close had lost six wickets for 57, having a lead of 104. Play will be resumed to-day at 11 a.m.

Three of the players in the Yorkshire eleven are included in the North v. South Minor Counties game at Lord's on Friday and Saturday, namely Major A. C. Chichester-Constable (capt.), Barber and Douglas. Yorkshire took first innings on a pitch softened by overnight rain, and A. E. Mallalieu and Barber faced Preston and Higgins. Lancashire gained an early success, as with the score six, as the result of ten minutes' play, Mailalieu, who had made all the runs, played late to Preston and was out leg before wicket. Preston found the turf responsive, and a beautiful ball, which whipped across from the off, had R. D. Somers well beaten and took his leg stump. This was at eight.

Yorkshire's batting continued to be laborious, double figures taking twenty minutes to reach, with Barber and Grimshaw setting themselves to doggedly retrieve the bad start. A snick in the slips brought Grimshaw the first boundary off Higgins, and another such stroke was repeated by the same batsman at the other end.

#### BARBER'S EFFORT.

Barber, who had been very quiet, hooked a short pitched delivery from Higgins to the leg boundary. Still for the most part the bowlers had the batsmen subdued, and Lancashire had a very short-set field. Barber, after surviving an appeal of obstruction against Preston, off drove the bowler to the ropes, and at 30 Woolley relieved Higgins. The new bowler had an early success and separated a partnership that was developing soundly by getting Grimshaw caught at short leg, Chadwick taking the ball very low. The score was then 36, the product of 50 minutes' batting.

Barber took a four off each bowler, and after making 32 out of 61 in 70 minutes, was caught behind the wicket off Woolley. Yorkshire continued to fare moderately, Woolley getting H. S. Jaques taken at first slip at 73, and Heyhurst leg before four runs later. Turner batted soundly, and at lunch Yorkshire had made 93 runs for the loss of six wickets.

About a thousand spectators saw Yorkshire lose their captain shortly after 100 had been reached in two hours. T. A. Jacques, the York cricketer, turned a ball to the leg boundary that was a possible but difficult chance, but was taken in the slips in the same over. Turner could find no partner to stay with him, and the innings closed for 119, of which Turner made 41 in an hour and three-quarters. Woolley and Turner had the good bowling figures of six wickets for 41 runs and four for 32 respectively.

#### SUCCESS FOR YORK BOWLER.

Lancashire's opening pair fared no better than Yorkshire, as at five Douglas had Marsh well beaten, the batsman being far too late for a ball that kept very low. Douglas and T. A. Jacques kept the batsmen quiet and it took 20 minutes to reach double figures. Douglas met with further success at 18, bowling Paynter, who had made 13 of the runs.

T. A. Jacques, the York bowler, got rid of Halliday and Chadwick at the same over, and Lancashire had four wickets down for 28 runs. The first bowling change was Turner for Jacques and it brought an acceleration in the pace of the run getting, nine coming in the opening over. Fifty appeared within the hour, and H. S. Jaques took the ball from Douglas. Houseman and Farrimond batted freely, with the result that T. A. Jacques was brought on to bowl again. It was a change that was instantly successful, as with his first delivery Jacques spread-eagled Houseman's wicket. The fifth wicket

had taken the score from 23 to 60. Four runs later Turner took a fine catch at point from Preston, and Yorkshire again were in a strong position with six wickets down for 64 runs.

After two unsuccessful attempts Dickenson stumped Farrimond, and when H. S. Jaques bowled Higgins at 72 tea was taken. Lancashire were then 47 runs behind with two wickets in hand.

The two outstanding wickets fell without addition, and Yorkshire led on the first innings by 47 runs. T. A. Jacques took four wickets for 19 runs and H. S. Jaques three for nine.

Yorkshire again fared moderately on going in for the second time, and in 90 minutes lost six wickets for 57. H. S. Jaques played a sound defensive game, and with his captain remained unbeaten after a stay of 50 minutes. With four wickets in hand the Yorkshire colts are 104 runs on. Scores—

## YORKSHIRE COLTS WIN.

### LANCASHIRE BEATEN BY NARROW MARGIN OF 21 RUNS.

#### HOUSEMAN'S FINE EFFORT.

Yorkshire II and Lancashire II fought a keen finish in the Minor Counties Championship fixture at York yesterday, Lancashire just failing by 21 runs after a bad start. It was a commendable revival, as at one period Lancashire had six wickets down for 46, but thanks chiefly to an attractive innings on the part of Houseman they reached a total of 137.

Overnight Yorkshire had made 57 for six wickets, and were 104 runs on. With Major Chichester-Constable defending defiantly, and the York cricketer, T. A. Jacques, hitting freely, the tail wagged to some purpose and the score was taken to 111. Jacques hit a six to leg off Holdroyd, and had four 4's in his 32. Lancashire were set to get 159 runs to win. Holdroyd had four wickets for 31, and Preston's three cost eight runs each.

#### EARLY BATSMEN FAIL.

Lancashire started badly. Paynter being taken in the slips by T. A. Jacques in the opening over sent down by Douglas and with only two runs scored. T. A. Jacques's first over should have yielded a wicket, Dickinson failing to hold a snick behind the wicket from Houseman. Halliday drove Douglas for

a straight six, but was brilliantly taken in the slips off the York bowler by Mailalieu with only ten runs scored.

Yorkshire established a winning position when Douglas was taken off and transferred to the other end in place of T. A. Jacques, as at 25 Chadwick played on and next ball Farrimond was taken in the slips by Jacques (H. S.). Half the side were out for 34 runs and only Houseman offered much resistance, claiming 24 out of 46 runs when he lost his captain. He found a useful partner in Marsh, and the pair were together at lunch time with 67 runs on the board for the loss of six wickets.

#### LANCASHIRE'S TAIL DEFIANT.

The Houseman Marsh partnership continued to be troublesome to Yorkshire after lunch and runs came steadily against Douglas and T. A. Jacques. So well did they pull the game round that 48 runs were added before Marsh was smartly taken by Douglas in the slips off T. A. Jacques. Marsh had helped Houseman to carry the score from 46 for six wickets to 94, and Houseman still batted confidently enough for Lancashire to get the 65 runs needed for victory if he could find anyone to stay with him. Higgins failed against the York bowler, but an over-throw which reached the ropes from the Yorkshire captain turned a single into a five and caused the century to be hoisted after 90 minutes' batting. A four to leg off Jacques (H. S.) gave Houseman his 50 out of 104, made in two hours.

After making 57 out of 119 Houseman was caught near the boundary, and with Higgins failing, Lancashire were 38 runs behind at the fall of the ninth wicket. The last pair were defiant and took the score to 137 before Douglas bowled Holdroyd, Yorkshire II winning by 21 runs. Douglas took five wickets for 38 runs and T. A. Jacques three for 26.

## YORK'S EASY VICTORY.

### YORKSHIRE COUNCIL AND WEST YORKSHIRE LEAGUE.

#### VISIT OF KING CROSS.

King Cross, after their defeat by Wakefield on Saturday, paid their first visit to the Bootham Crescent ground, York, yesterday, when the counter-attraction on the Gentlemen's ground undoubtedly had an effect on the attendance.

York made two changes in the side which was so narrowly defeated by Wath through Jacques having been claimed by the County and Lofthouse unable to play. Their places were taken by Hall and Nicholson. Hobson, this time, won the toss, and it was certainly his turn to do so, seeing that he had only been successful once this season.

Hobson and Stevenson, as usual, began York's innings with the attack in charge of Illingworth and Briggs. Hobson opened in promising style, as after two singles and a two, he hit Tunncliffe behind point for 4's off successive balls. This was followed by Stevenson square cutting Briggs to the seats, but that bowler, in his following over, caught and bowled Hobson off an easy return. York's first wicket fell at 19 and King Cross were well satisfied at having got rid of the home captain so cheaply after his brilliant innings at King Cross. Another disaster befell York when Stevenson was well beaten and bowled by Briggs. Curry, who in recognition of his fine innings on Saturday was applauded on going in, had a very short stay as, playing outside the third ball he received, he edged it into his wicket and three men were out for 24 when Sanders joined Tunncliffe, who greeted him by straight driving Tunncliffe for three. The product of the first half-hour was 31 runs.

Still another disaster came at 36 when Turland, after being unsuccessfully appealed against, was leg before to the following ball. Nicholson showed promising form, but after a very good square cut for four off Tunncliffe a "bailer" from Briggs caused his downfall. This was at 47 and a two and a single to Pogson brought 50 on the board in 50 minutes. At this stage Clarkson went on instead of Tunncliffe.

#### POSITION IMPROVED.

Only 55 runs were scored in the first hour, and Briggs at this stage had taken four wickets for 21 runs. After a sequence of singles Pogson on-drove Clarkson for four and Sanders followed by hitting Briggs hard to the leg boundary. The good crowd of spectators appreciated the stubborn stand Sanders and Pogson made, but it was closed at 71 by Pogson being easily stumped in jumping out to Jowett, whose second ball it was.

McReynolds began by hitting Jowett for two and three and then went one better by pulling Clarkson lustily for four. Sanders, who played a watchful game, was next in the picture with a well-timed leg hit at Jowett's expense, and the ball went to the seats; in that bowler's next over an old-fashioned leg hit by the same batsman reached the refreshment room. When 26 he received a life behind the wicket off Clarkson, but he did not profit from his escape as, after running a single for the stroke, he skied one from Jowett to Crossley at point and was caught after a very careful stay of an hour. This was at 96, and after McReynolds had hit Jowett for four and a single, Appleyard was leg before to the first ball he received. McReynolds, who forced the pace, next hit Clarkson for two and four off successive balls, but was caught from another hard drive off the next ball—a decision with which he obviously was not satisfied. Hague and Hall caused unexpected trouble for the last wicket; without any big hits they steadily took the score along and the total had reached 125 when Hall was bowled after the innings had lasted 110 minutes. Briggs had the best bowling figures, his five wickets being secured at a cost of 33 runs.

#### SUCCESS OF APPELYARD.

King Cross began their innings with Jowett and Crossley to the bowling of Appleyard and Hague, Jowett hitting the second ball to the square leg boundary, but this and a single were all that had been scored when Crossley hit a ball hard to Hall at mid-off and the catch was safely held, the successful bowler being Appleyard. Simpson filled the vacancy, and after a single he on-drove Hague for 3

and followed this by hitting Appleyard just over square leg's head for 4, and continuing his aggressive tactics he drove Appleyard for 2 and 4 in his next over, but it was not completed before that bowler, after unsuccessfully appealing for l.b.w., clean bowled him next ball. York had thus dismissed two of the visitors for 21 when Dawson joined Jowett, and the new-comer was early in action with a 4 straight drive off Appleyard, but two balls later he attempted to repeat the stroke and was altogether too late and his off stump was uprooted and three were out for 27. With Wade as his partner Jowett glided Appleyard nicely to the pavilion, but again in the same over Appleyard had his revenge by leaving Jowett l.b.w. Clarkson cocked his first ball up in the slips and very poor fielding credited him with four for the stroke. Wade nicked Appleyard for 4, but at 43 lost Clarkson, who was cleverly l.b.w. to Hague. Two singles to Wade made the score 50 in 45 minutes, and only a 4 bye had been added when Appleyard made his number of victims five by bowling Wade. Hague, too, was bowling well, and at this stage his analysis read—10 overs, 4 maidens, 9 runs, 1 wicket. The seventh wicket proving troublesome Hall was given the opportunity to make his debut as a York Council bowler, and after Whitehead had driven Hague for 4—the first one off that bowler in 70 minutes—the new bowler met with success and clean bowled Whitehead.

King Cross had now three wickets left, and were 49 behind York's score, and they were in a poor position when Radcliffe failed to time a slow yorker from Hall. This was at 83, and this was still the score when Hague accepted an easy return from Briggs and at one run later he did the same to a very low return from Beecroft and thus York won by 41 runs. It was an excellent victory due to the very fine bowling of the three York men, Appleyard, Hague and Hall.

**COLTS AT YORK.**

**UPHILL FIGHT FOR RUNS.**

(From Our Own Representative.)

York, Monday.  
The batting of the youngsters engaged in the Lancashire and Yorkshire Colts match on the spacious ground of the Yorkshire Gentlemen's Club here, to-day, has not been equal to the wicket, and the use to which the bowlers have put it, with the result that 26 wickets have fallen for 242 runs. The situation is a promising one for to-morrow, when there should be a really keen fight for the honours. Yorkshire's Colts, who batted first, gained a lead of 47 on the first innings, and with four wickets standing in the second innings they are 104 to the good.

Only Cyril Turner, the Sheffield United player, and W. Barber, the Gomersal batsman, who is playing with Brighouse in the Bradford League, got any satisfaction out of the Colts' first innings, for the young Lancashire bowlers found the wicket responsive to their spinning efforts, and it was an uphill fight for runs all the time. Barber, who opened the innings with Mallalieu, the Huddersfield League amateur, lost his partner at 6, and an over or so later he saw R. D. Somers, of Lightcliffe, who scored a century in Bradford League cricket on Saturday, play a ball from Preston into his wicket. Thereupon Barber, who has scored 200 runs in his last three matches with his club, was content to progress at a steady rate.

Grimshaw, the 17-year-old batsman from Horsforth Hall Park, looked like setting up a partnership with Barber until the introduction of Woolley, a medium paced right-arm bowler, who can swing a ball as well as spin it, brought about his downfall. Then Barber and Turner got together, and took the score to 61, when the former, with an invaluable 32 to his credit, was caught behind the wicket—he was out in the same fashion in both innings in the Council match the other week—off Woolley. Turner went on in sound style, and, when the innings ended at 119, he had 41 on the board, and was the highest scorer of the day.

The Lancastrians were soon in difficulties with the bowling of Jacques, the York amateur, and Stanley Douglas, of Bradford, who goes from this match with Barber and Major Chichester-Constable to play in the Minor Counties' North v. South game at Lord's. Douglas started with two maiden overs, in the second of which he had the wicket of March, while Jacques maintained his pace for nine overs, taking the wickets of Halliday and Housman in the last. Farrimond was the only visitor to top the twenty mark—he took toll of Turner, who relieved Jacques—and when the York man returned to the attack with Jacques, of Leeds, at the other end the innings was soon ended.

The Leeds Jacques, a slow left-arm bowler, with a delightful action, got three wickets for nine runs in five overs, and started his career with the Colts in fine style, while the other Jacques came out with 4 wickets for 19. Douglas had six maiden overs in 11, and 2 wickets—both clean bowled—for 13 runs.

Yorkshire's second innings opened in much the same way as the first. Again Mallalieu was unlucky enough to be l.b.w. just when he was promising well, and the wickets of Barber, Somers, Grimshaw and Heyhurst fell for 27 runs, while Turner was run out before he had scored. But Jacques followed up his good bowling with a defensive bat, and, along with the Colts' captain, took the score to 57 for 6 wickets when stumps were drawn. Present score and analysis:

**COLTS' FIRST VICTORY.**

**LANCASHIRE SECOND XI. BEATEN BY 21 RUNS.**

(From Our Own Representative.)

York, Tuesday.  
Yorkshire's Second XI. completed a very satisfactory victory over Lancashire's Colts on the Yorkshire Gentlemen's ground here this afternoon, and so they have made the right sort of a start in their campaign in the Minor Counties' Championship.

To their first innings lead of 47 they added a second innings total of 111, and it is worthy of note that the top scorer was T. A. Jacques, the amateur who is included in the side for his fast bowling, which is as promising as anything seen in the Colts' ranks for some years. With York in the Yorkshire Council, however, Jacques frequently makes useful scores, and his 32 this morning was soundly played for. He hit the first 6 of the game, as well as 4 fours and was out in attempting to drive Holroyd, for Farrimond, the Lancashire junior keeper, misses few stumping chances.

Holroyd took two of the four outstanding Colts' wickets this morning. He is a member of the Old Trafford ground staff, and spins a ball exceedingly well. His figures for the innings were 4 for 31. Preston, the latest of the visitors—and he is nothing like so fast as Jacques—having 3 for 24, and Woolley, who did so well in the first innings, only one for 22.

The young Lancastrians started their second innings wanting 159 for victory. Their batting order was changed owing to an injury to March, and Halliday accompanied Payntor to the wicket. But the opening batsmen never shaped at all. Douglas got Payntor caught by Jacques in the slips off the third ball of the innings, and after Halliday had made one mighty swipe for a 6, he was finely caught off Jacques by Mallalieu, whose fielding always is good to watch. Then Chadwick played on from Douglas—the ball had him beaten completely—and with Farrimond out in the same over, 4 wickets were down for 25 runs.

Housman fought hard, and he it was who stopped the collapse. He received plucky support from the leg-injured March, and together they took the score from 46 to 94. Still Housman could not hit Douglas, whose fast ball invariably got through the batsman's defence, and he was repeatedly puzzled by the harmless-looking deliveries of the Leeds Jacques. Eventually March was brilliantly caught in the slips by Douglas off the York Jacques, while 23 runs later Housman tried to hit a ball from the Leeds Jacques out of the ground and was caught near the boundary by Grimshaw. Housman's 57 included 6 fours, and was a great effort, but it failed to save the side, for when Holroyd was clean bowled by Douglas the young Yorkshiremen were 21 runs on.

Douglas has started the colts' season well. In the first innings he had 2 wickets for 13, and in the second he dismissed half the visiting side for 38 runs. T. A. ### VARIED TACTICS BY YORK.

When York visited Savile Town yesterday the weather had fortunately taken a favourable turn, but the Whitsuntide processions in the town had had a deleterious effect upon the attendance, which was only moderate. York, who had one alteration from Monday's team, Lofthouse displacing Nicholson, won the toss, and Hobson took Stevenson in with him to open the visitors' innings. Elton and Hudson were the bowlers, and in the first over, after Stevenson had glided Elton for three, Hobson was snapped at the wicket off the first ball he received. Turland and Stevenson appeared to be settling down nicely but only 16 had been scored when Stevenson was lbw to Elton. On being joined by Curry quick footwork by Turland gave him a three to leg off Hudson, but 24 was all that were scored in the first half hour. With both bowlers bowling well no liberties could be taken, and although Turland on-drove Hudson for four the total only advanced slowly, but another well-timed drive for four by Turland helped it along. Another single and Turland was Elton's third victim, as at 45 he was lbw. With Lofthouse and Curry together Mason relieved Hudson, and in his first over Curry hit him square for three, this being his first hit above a single in half an hour. The very wide set field was all against fast scoring, and many fine shots produced only angles. A two to leg by Lofthouse made the score 51 in just under the hour, and four runs later Elton was given a rest, Moulton going on, but it was Mason who claimed the next wicket, Curry after a stay of 55 minutes being another victim to Hill's smartness behind the wicket. So slow was the rate of scoring that when this wicket fell eighty minutes play had produced 59 runs. Another wicket should have fallen at 61 when Lofthouse was badly missed at mid-off Moulton. With Sanders in, the same monotonous play ensued, and it was a decided relief when Lofthouse drove Mason for four. When Moulton had bowled six overs for four runs he retired in favour of Hudson, who, after Lofthouse had off-driven Mason for four was hit for 10 off three successive balls, a 4 and 5 to Sanders and a 3 to Lofthouse. Off the next one, however, Sanders dragged his toe over the line and was smartly stumped. This was at 86, 12 hours after the game had started, and one run later Thompson went on bowling. Pogson was next on the list, and a risky stroke on the leg side gave him a four. This was followed by Lofthouse getting Hudson away to leg for 3. The 100 appeared in five minutes under two hours. The next incident was a four drive by Pogson off Hudson, and another equally good shot off the next ball gave him another four, and this stroke he repeated off the last ball of the over. It was then Lofthouse's turn, and he took a good four off Thompson, who had gone on. As can be judged from this, the rate of scoring had greatly improved, but at 125 Pogson was caught at cover off Thompson after the wicket had added 39 runs in 25 minutes. McReynolds began with a couple off Thompson, and Brook was the sixth bowler to be tried. Lofthouse, who was now playing most confidently, next drove Brook for three 4s, and completed his first 50 for York's Council XI in 85 minutes. The same stroke brought 150 up after 2 1/2 hours play, and a fine straight drive by McReynolds reached the seats. A little amusement was caused by three of the fielders chasing a ball which Lofthouse had hit off Elton, but it reached the boundary. Considering the slow rate which had prevailed it was surprising that York should now be in such a position as to force the pace, and this merry partnership had taken the score from 125 to 194 in just over half an hour before McReynolds was caught off Moulton. Lofthouse, who was playing the innings of his life, was then joined by Hague, and the scoring still continued, and 200 came in 160 minutes. Eventually the innings was declared at 216 for 7 wickets. Lofthouse had only given the one chance mentioned in his stay of exactly two hours, and his innings was a

peculiar mixture, the first half being most sedate and the second exactly the opposite, and in his 87 he had 11 4's.

Dewsbury, seeing that they had only 1 1/2 hours to bat did not appear to have much chance to win and this was lessened when Brooke was lbw in Appleyard's third over with only 5 runs scored, but Moulton, on joining Watson, forced the game well and on four occasions got Appleyard away on the leg side for fours, and as a result of these 50 were scored in the first half hour. One run later Sanders went on in place of Hague and after Moulton had hit the new bowler for 4 and 3 in his first over, Hall replaced Appleyard. Sanders had his revenge when with the first ball of his second over he completely beat and bowled Moulton with the score at 60. After Moulton's departure Squire came in and the rate of scoring slackened appreciably although Watson got each bowler away on the leg side for 4's, but Squires was unable to get going as after scoring 3 he was lbw to Hall with the score at 79. Mason, who has the reputation of being a hitter, began by driving the first ball he received for 4, Watson following this by cutting Sanders to the pavilion and this made the score 87 in the hour, of which number Watson had scored 29 only. A four to leg by Watson of Sanders brought 100 up in 65 minutes and ensuing upon this was a square cut to the track by the same batsman off Hall. With 35 minutes to go 105 were wanted. Appleyard and Hague returned to the attack, but at the opposite ends to which they had started. This change was successful as at 116 Mason gave Hall at mid off a hot catch which was held. On being joined by Bailes a 4 on-drive by Watson off Hague gave him his 50 and the next ball he hit over the rails for 6, but this time all interest in the game had ceased as neither side had any chance of winning and the game resulted in a draw, Watson having a chanceless 75 to his credit. ### YORKSHIRE COLTS AT NEWCASTLE.

#### POOR DISPLAY AGAINST NORTHUMBERLAND. (From Our Correspondent.)

Yorkshire Second had a distressing experience at Newcastle yesterday in the opening day of their match with Northumberland. They were dismissed for 60 in the morning, were in the field for three and a half hours while Northumberland were making 317, and making 57 for one wicket in the last half hour of the day, wound up requiring 200 to avert an innings defeat. There was no excuse for their poor total on a good wicket. It was merely a case of inexperience and bat batting against Hetherton. Turner alone offered strong resistance, and, with Barber, was the only man to reach double figures. Northumberland on the other hand, were placed in a strong position by a wonderful partnership between Mackay and Pritchard, each of whom made their first Minor County century when adding 242 for the fourth partnership in two hours and five minutes. There was a big change afterwards when T. A. Jacques had a fine bowling spell, and the last six wickets fell for 21.

In the morning Yorkshire lost Mallalieu and Grimshaw at nine, both being victims of smart work by Peacock. Northumberland's debutant wicket-keeper, Barber and Turner took the total to 24, but half the side was out for 53, Hetherton taking all five wickets. Turner, in at the fall of the second wicket, defended well, but could get no one to stay with him, and the innings closed after 87 minutes. Turner was not out 27, for which he was batting 67 minutes. Major Chichester-Constable, T. A. Jacques, and Render were all too late in playing their stroke, but the first three batsmen to fall were rather unlucky to be the victims of smart fielding. Grimshaw, the seventeen-year-old Osett youth, being brilliantly stumped.

Northumberland had ten minutes' batting before lunch, and made 12 without loss. After the interval Mackay and Bruce took the score to 42 in forty-two minutes before T. A. Jacques yoked Bruce, whose 24 included three fours. Leathes did not stay long with Mackay, being caught at second slip at 54, while the next ball saw Jacques clean bowl Arkwright. Then came the turning point in the game. Mackay had been scoring well up to this stage, and he found in Pritchard an enterprising partner. The 50 had been signalled in thirty-seven minutes, and Yorkshire's total was passed thirteen minutes later, while 100 went up in seventy-three minutes. Mackay reached 50 out of 103 at the same time, and Pritchard secured his half-century after batting an hour. The 200 was reached in two hours, and Mackay completed his individual 100 out of 231 shortly afterwards.

At the tea interval the score was 251, Pritchard being 96, and he reached 100 out of 216 in two hours just after the interval. Mackay was bowled by Jacques immediately the amateur commenced his third spell. Batting for two hours and fifty-one minutes, Mackay's innings included 21 fours, made all round the wicket in delightful style; he was dropped when SE, but did not give another chance. Jacques followed up his capture of Mackay's wicket by bowling Broadbelt in the same over, and later getting rid of Maconachie and Peacock. He actually took four wickets in sixteen balls for one run. Douglas got Pritchard caught at 300, Grimshaw making a fine catch. Batting in all for two hours and twenty minutes, Pritchard made 119 runs out of 246, hitting 1 six, 16 fours, and 2 threes. T. A. Jacques came out with seven wickets for 91, and Douglas three for 56. ### NORTHUMBERLAND'S EASY VICTORY.

#### COLTS BEATEN BY 10 WICKETS. (From Our Correspondent.)

The position overnight in the Northumberland v. Yorkshire Second match at Newcastle presaged an easy win for Northumberland, for with nine wickets in hand Yorkshire wanted 200 yesterday to avoid defeat by a single innings. As it happened Northumberland won by 10 wickets—a convincing enough victory—but they had to wait until 5.14 before success was finally gained.

The day's cricket was remarkable for the fine recovery of Yorkshire in the early part of their second innigs, thanks to the excellent batting of Barber, A. E. Mallalieu, Grimshaw, and Turner, and the fact that for the last hour in the visitors' innigs and during the time Northumberland were occupied in getting the necessary 79 runs for victory, the balls were not in use. This was due to the gale of wind blowing, which caused countless interruptions in ball fixing, and ultimately influenced the respective captains to agree to remove the balls. This is the first time in the history of the game in the north-east that such a happening has occurred, and the Yorkshire scorer, the Rev. John Ford, who has seen hundreds of games, could not remember a similar case, although he recollects the use of iron balls at Scarborough. The wind was so fierce that the bowlers were sadly handicapped, and play generally was conducted for half the day under most uncomfortable conditions.

Yorkshire's second wicket pair resumed in the morning with the score at 57 and carried it to 121 before Mallalieu was bowled by Towler. Mallalieu was batting under difficulties with a poisoned hand, and his display was extremely good. He was altogether at the wicket 85 minutes, helping to add 117 in that time, and was finally beaten by a quick break ball. Grimshaw, the Horation youngster, joined Barber for the third partnership, and the score was taken to 183 before Barber was caught at short leg. Batting altogether for two hours and twenty minutes he made his 95 out of 183. There was another prolific stand when Turner joined Grimshaw, the pair putting on 106 in an hour and forty-five minutes. Grimshaw had 9 fours, and 3 threes in his 88. He should have been stumped at 40.

The score was 294 when Grimshaw left, and six more wickets actually fell for 41 runs. Turner was fifth out at 304, having batted five minutes under 2 hours for 45, including 5 fours, and onlyx Heyhurst of the others shaped like getting runs. Hetherton again did well, claiming six for 73, to bring his record for the match up to 13 for 106. Northumberland had to get 79, and they made 80 without loss. Full score and analysis:—

**YORKSHIRE II. BEATEN.**

**MAJ. CHICHESTER-CONSTABLE'S VIGOROUS HITTING.**

The issue of the two days match which commenced at South Shields yesterday between Durham and Yorkshire Seconds was left in a state of glorious uncertainty when stumps were drawn at the conclusion of the first day's play, Durham having responded with 155 for six wickets to the visitors' first innings total of 180. Play was stopped about half an hour before time owing to rain, but a resumption was later possible, although it only permitted of four overs being played; nevertheless, it materially affected Yorkshire's outlook; for two wickets fell, one in each of the first two overs, the score of 141 for four only being increased by 11 runs when the day's play finished. With four wickets in hand Durham are thus 25 runs behind.

The feature of Yorkshire's innings was the great stand made by Major Chichester-Constable and Rendel, the former striking out vigorously and severely punishing the bowlers. The game had been monotonously slow, but the tail end enlivened the proceedings, and the Yorkshire captain's seven boundaries came as a welcome change. Kinnie, who took A. E. Mallie's place, contributed 11. Grimshaw and Heyhurst both had narrow escapes before eventually losing their wickets, the former when Ferens just missed stumping him, and the latter when Howell missed a catch at mid-on off one of Dobson's deliveries. Howell soon made amends, however, effecting a low catch and sending Heyhurst to the pavilion, the sixth wicket being down for 69. When Jacques became associated with Major Chichester-Constable, Yorkshire took a new lease of life, but Douglas failed to maintain the scoring, and it was left to Rendel to assist his captain to punish the bowlers. Batting for three and a quarter hours, Yorkshire compiled 180.

Although Durham's first wicket fell for 13, Ferens and Adamson punished the bowling unmercifully. The former recorded half a century in fifty minutes, and when he was bowled by Rendel he had made 84 in an hour and a half, the partnership with Adamson having produced exactly 100. Yorkshire's fielding was smartly executed, although on one occasion Rendel missed a somewhat difficult catch. Subsequently T. K. **YORKSHIRE COLTS' FINE VICTORY.**

**ANOTHER FINE BOWLING SPELL BY DOUGLAS.**

(From Our Correspondent.)

Thanks to another fine spell of bowling by Douglas, Yorkshire Second succeeded in defeating Northumberland at Thornaby yesterday by 76 runs, and thus avenged their recent defeat by that county at Newcastle by ten wickets. Douglas, who yesterday captured eight wickets for 21 runs, had the following record for the whole match: Overs 43.2, maidens 16, runs 48, wickets 14. He finished off the match in dramatic fashion by performing the "hat trick," dismissing Atkinson, J. K. Craig, and Hetherton with successive balls. Atkinson was stumped, Craig caught in the slips, and Hetherton smartly taken by Jaques at mid-off in making a hard drive. It was a fitting climax to a splendid performance. Mackay and Bruce, who scored centuries against Yorkshire in the former match, went in first, but they were both quickly sent back, Mackay a victim to Render and Bruce caught off Douglas in the slips. Only N. Whitfield showed any sustained ability to cope with the attack, for in addition to Douglas, Jaques was found to be very tricky with his slow. Whitfield scored 26 by patient cricket before being well beaten by Douglas, and then the match was as good as over. It would have been over sooner had not both Whitehead and Grimshaw missed easy chances in the field. However, apart from these mistakes the Yorkshire fielding was again smart. **FINE BATTING BY A BARNSLEY COLT.**

(From Our Own Representative.)

Workshop, Monday.  
Making his second appearance for the Yorkshire Colts, H. Bedford, the Barnsley batsman, created a very favourable impression in the Minor Counties match against Notts II. at Workshop to-day. Going in when three Yorkshire wickets had fallen for 42, Bedford faced the bowling of experienced county players like Matthews, Staples, and Richmond with remarkable assurance. Very quick to make up his mind, nimble-footed, and with a large variety of strokes at his command, he batted with an unhurried ease, which was highly attractive to watch. Bedford made 76 not out for Barnsley against Castleford on Saturday, and if his form to-day is to be relied upon, he may be regarded as an exceptionally promising addition to Yorkshire's young batsmen. He made 50 in 45 minutes, and scored a faultless 53 while his partner, Grimshaw, was making 21.

Grimshaw, unfortunately, was not at his best, and was helped by two mistakes in the field, but his resourceful defence enabled him to keep Bedford company in an invaluable stand of 93 for the fourth wicket. Matthews and Staples bowled so well at the outset that Barber and Turner never settled down, and the best of the earlier innings was undoubtedly that of Shackleton, who comes from Keighley, and has once previously played for the Colts. In the absence of Mitchell, Shackleton opened the Colts' innings with Barber, and showed such steadiness as to merit further trials. Apart from the fourth wicket stand, however, Matthews and Staples were masters of the situation, and for his last turn with the ball Staples had the splendid analysis of 10.2 overs, 5 maidens, 15 runs, and six wickets. The last five Yorkshire wickets fell for only 21 runs, and the total of 163 was disappointing.

Bedford's display had a counterpart of exactly the same value in a really delightful innings for Notts by G. V. Gunn. Besides greatly resembling his father in appearance, this son of George Gunn has inherited or acquired all his father's grace of style at the wicket plus a youthful enterprise, which enabled him to make 50 in 47 minutes.

The bowling of Douglas and Render was severely punished, Notts sending up the 100 in an hour for the loss of two wickets. Major Chichester-Constable then gave Bedford a prolonged try out with the ball. He is a bowler of the gooly type, and obviously was able to get a good deal of spin on the ball, but he proved decidedly expensive. Nevertheless, he tempted two good batsmen, Gunn and G. F. Heane, into being easily caught and bowled. With only five wickets down Notts passed the Yorkshire total, the bowling of the visitors against men who were well set being made to appear altogether lacking in sting. When stumps were drawn Notts, with a wicket to fall, were 73 runs ahead.

Wood, the Yorkshire wicket-keeper, had an uncomfortable experience. While batting, a ball from Staples ran up his bat and struck him on the jaw, breaking a tooth, which Wood, in his surprise, swallowed. Present score and analysis:—

**YORKSHIRE COLT'S CENTURY.**

**NOTTS II. WIN AFTER EXCITING FIGHT FOR RUNS.**

(By Our Special Correspondent.)

Workshop, Tuesday.  
After quite a thrilling fight for runs against the clock, the Notts second team beat Yorkshire II. in the Minor Counties Championship, at Workshop this evening, the winning hit crowning a period of rousing batting eight minutes before the extra half-hour expired.

When the Yorkshire innings closed at a quarter past four, the possibility of a keen sporting finish was obvious, Notts being left to get 199 to win, with two hours twenty-five minutes remaining for play, including the extra time, though the odds appeared to be against the batting side succeeding in their big task.

George Gunn, junior, again gave Notts an inspiring start. Batting with the same delightful elegance as on the opening day, he scored fifty of the first seventy runs in forty-five minutes; but when the second wicket fell, at eighty, 118 runs were required in ninety minutes.

Notts were still further behind time when Staples came in as partner to the Workshop amateur, G. F. Heane, for the fourth wicket; but with an impetuosity which is characteristic of all his cricket, the professional attacked the Yorkshire bowling in a way which soon aroused the liveliest excitement. Hitting at everything which came along, he straight drove a ball from the Leeds boy, Jaques, out of the ground into the street, and when in the next over off the same bowler Staples sent the ball into the little river which borders the ground, Jaques was taken off.

At half-past six, when Mr. Kirk, the Notts captain, demanded the extra thirty minutes, 49 runs were still required; but nothing the bowlers were able to do now could check the riotous pace of run-getting. The last twenty runs were actually hit off in five minutes, and with the partnership still unbroken Notts won with seven wickets in hand.

In his rousing display, Staples hit a six, seven fours, and 4 threes, and had the distinction of causing three balls to be lost. His six is believed to be the biggest hit ever made on the ground. Heane, although less spectacular, entered into the adventure with great spirit.

Notts established a lead of 77 on the first innings, less than an over this morning being required to capture their outstanding wicket.

With half their side out for 115, Yorkshire were only 38 runs on, and an early defeat appeared certain, when Wood, of Bradford, showed his value as a batsman by punishing the bowling with refreshing vigour. When keeping wicket on the first day, Wood had injured his right thumb, and was unable to take his usual place behind the stumps to-day; but in spite of this handicap he set about the bowling so heartily that he scored fifty in fifty minutes, and his second half century in little more than half an hour. He made several bad strokes, and when 30 he was missed by Staples in the slips, but nevertheless it was an excellent performance. Wood's batting was marked by clean, hard driving and lusty pulls round to square leg, and his hits included a six, fifteen fours, and four threes. He was last out, having made 102 out of 160 put on during the hour and a half he was at the wicket. His most useful partner was Douglas, the pair adding 60 for the ninth wicket. The Yorkshire innings, which realised 275, lasted exactly four hours.

The weather was chilly and dull to-day, but the match throughout was most interesting and enjoyable.

**YORKSHIRE COUNCIL AND THE LEEDS CLUB.**

**COMPLAINT OF DISCOURTESY.**

A meeting of the Emergency Committee of the Yorkshire Cricket Council was held at the Victory Hotel, Leeds, last night, Mr. J. Nicholson (Sheffield) presiding.

The secretary (Mr. H. Knowles) reported that he had written to the directors of the Leeds Cricket and Football Company communicating the Council's complaint of incivility by one of the Leeds officials towards an umpire appointed by the Council. The letter pointed out that the trouble had apparently arisen through the official's criticism of the umpire's charge for expenses. "Would it not have been better and kinder," proceeded the letter, "to have written to the Council direct on the matter than to have abused the umpire?" This letter received an acknowledgment four days later from Sir Edwin Airey, the chairman of the Leeds directors, who wrote that the matter "had had attention."

The chairman thought that the matter was of such seriousness as to call for a more detailed reply than that. What the Council needed assurance upon was that in futuro their umpires in officiating on the Headingley ground would not be subjected to abuse or incivility. Mr. Nicholson added that he did not think the Leeds directors were quite treating the Council with the courtesy which they were entitled to in the matter.

Mr. Darbyshire, a representative of the Leeds club, said the Council could be assured that such action had been taken as would prevent the likelihood of any repetition of such an incident as they had complained of. At the same time, he thought the Leeds directors might have given the assurance in a more formal way.

After further discussion, it was decided to ask the Leeds directors what action they had taken in the matter.

The secretary reported recent proceedings of the Playing Fields Association, and regret was expressed that more rapid progress had not been made in the direction of applying funds for the purchase of grounds for the assistance of junior clubs. Eventually Messrs. Nicholson, Knowles, and F. W. Elari were appointed to represent the Council on the Lay-out Sub-Committee of the Association.

A recent disagreement which led to a display of temper between an umpire and scorer in a match at Gomersal was brought to the notice of the Committee, who decided to leave the adjustment of the matter to the good offices of the Council's secretary.

A ruling was sought by an umpire as to the rolling of the wicket in the case of an evening match which extended from one evening to another. It was decided that the M.C.C. rule governing two-days matches should be applied, and that the wicket must be rolled before the commencement of the second evening's play.

Complaints as to the umpiring in the recent Scarborough v. Sheffield match were made by the Sheffield club, and it was decided that future appointments of the umpire in question be cancelled.

There were several other complaints against certain umpires who had changed their appointments without first obtaining the sanction of the Council, and the secretary was instructed to inform the offenders that they must in futuro conform to the Council's rules.

Transfers were granted to E. Shaw, from Wakefield to Lofthouse, and of E. Lark, from Bullcroft to Dinnington.

Some uncertainty having been expressed in regard to the use of the smaller ball in Council matches, the Committee reiterated that the Council's decision, as passed in February last, was that the use of the smaller ball was not permissive, but obligatory; umpires had no option but to insist upon its use.

A grant of five guineas was voted towards the fund which is being promoted on behalf of the widow and family of the late Mr. George Dawson, of the Armley Club, and the secretary of the Leeds Evening League.

**THE UNIVERSITY SHIELD.**

The match between the Universities of Cardiff and Manchester for the final of the University Shield was concluded at Manchester yesterday. Manchester won by an innings and 81 runs. The scores were: Cardiff University 55 and 55; Manchester University 201.

The cricket cup-tie between Batley and Heckmondwike, which has been the subject of considerable controversy, was completed at Mount Pleasant last evening. When play was resumed Batley, in reply to Heckmondwike's total of 148, had 105 runs to their credit and two wickets in hand. In the sixth over of the evening George Hodgson captured both the outstanding wickets, Batley's innings closing for 114.

**YORKSHIRE COLTS AT PONTEFRACT.**

**YORKSHIRE II. AND DURHAM DRAW.**

**DURHAM'S FAVOURABLE POSITION.**

The ground of the Pontefract Cricket Club, for the first time in its chequered history, was yesterday the venue of the Yorkshire II. and Durham match. The attendance was very disappointing, there never being more than 200 or 300 spectators, although the weather conditions were ideal and cricket interesting, though by no means brisk.

The only change in the announced team was caused by the elevation of Barber to the front rank, his place being taken by Whitehead, of Friarmerc, and Yorkshire winning the toss and electing to bat first, Whitehead speedily proceeded to justify his selection. He and Shackleton faced the bowling of Howell and Cook, and although the former's first ball was sent to the boundary by Shackleton, the subsequent play was very dull, for Whitehead was taking no risks, and Cook's first over was a maiden. Whitehead's first boundary came after half an hour's play, and it required a full hour to register the first 50. After the score had been doubled in the next 30 minutes, Whitehead completed the century and his own half-century with a boundary stroke. After Shackleton had been missed at point by Weight, Whitehead, continuing to hit out vigorously at Brooke's bowling, sent a couple to the score box. A third followed, but this time Alderson was in readiness, and made no mistake with a fine catch. Whitehead's 75 included 15 fours.

With Turner in, Shackleton had added only 9 to his half-century when he was out lbw. to Howell. Grimshaw was next in, but Howell took his wicket without change, and, with only 15 added, Bedford was dismissed by Cook. One run later Jacques was neatly caught by Adamson, off Howell, and the remaining five wickets fell for the addition of another 62. Turner, who had gone in second, being the last man out with a total of 51. Major Chichester-Constable scored 12, of which half were from one hit out of the field.

Durham, faced with a total of 240 against them, opened with the care which seemed to accuate both sides, and 28 had been slowly accumulated when Ferens received a nasty blow on the leg from a ball by Bastow. Play was suspended for a few minutes, and though Ferens pluckily resumed his stand, he was obviously in pain, and Bastow's next ball carried away his stumps. Six runs later Weight fell to Douglas. With the total at 98, Major Chichester-Constable effected a very clever return, and Nichol was smartly run out, after contributing 40. Adamson imparted a little life into the game by snicking Jacques to leg for four, and the next ball for a single, and when the score stood at 110 Alderson survived an appeal for lbw. Half an hour extra time was played, and when stumps were drawn, Durham were in the favourable position of having secured more than half the Yorkshire total, with seven wickets still in hand. **A LIVELY LAST WICKET STAND,**

The feature of the second day's play in the match between Yorkshire II. and Durham, at Pontefract, yesterday, was a lively last wicket stand between the Durham bowlers, Cook and Howell, who put on 100 in 55 minutes.

When Adamson (51) and Alderson (15) resumed Durham were in a good position, being only 98 behind with seven wickets in hand, but Alderson was caught at the wicket in the first over off Bastow's fourth ball, with the score still at 142. Adamson was then joined by Brooks, and the two put on 68 before a ball which Brooks played downwards, spun back, and nipped off his leg bail. The score then stood at 210 for 5 wickets, so that with half their wickets intact the visitors only required 31 for the first innings lead.

The Yorkshire fielding was exceptionally keen, and a particularly creditable piece of work was the beautiful one-handed catch with which Bedford dismissed Dobson. Carr came in next, and he hit the first two balls he received from Render to the boundary, and got a single in the same over. His stay did not last long, for he was caught at the wicket after scoring 15, but it was one of the brightest spells of the innings. By this time the total had reached 238. Maloney only stayed long enough to score a single, but he had the consolation of knowing that it was his one and only run that gave Durham the lead. At 243 Adamson was caught in the slips when four runs short of his first century.

Cook and Howell then settled down to give the liveliest display of the match. Scoring freely all round the wicket, they each hit a six in successive overs from Bedford and Render. They were still together at the lunch interval, when the score stood at 345 for nine wickets. Cook's 60 included 10 fours and Howell had five to his credit. The declaration was made during the interval.

Going in for the second time, Yorkshire had to face arrears of 105, but with only 26 on the board rain caused a hold-up. A resumption was made at 4 o'clock, but the moment the umpires stepped into the field the rain recommenced, and after two overs had been bowled, in which the score was raised to 31, the match was abandoned. **AUSTRALIAN PLAYER FOR ENGLAND.**

**TO PLAY IN LANCASHIRE.**

## COUNTY CRICKET AT PONTEFRACT.

FOR THE FIRST TIME.

### RAIN SPOILS AN INTERESTING MATCH.

On Monday and Tuesday, for the first time in the history of the Pontefract Cricket Club, county cricket took place on the club ground. The match was between Yorkshire 2nd and Durham, in the Minor Counties Championship.

Originally the fixture was allocated to Selby, but could not be played there, and Mr. R. E. Crofts, a member of the Committee of the Yorkshire County Cricket Club, was asked to arrange for the match to be held at Pontefract. The arrangements were excellent to the last detail. The most important factor, of course, was the wicket, and much care had been spent on it. The Yorkshire captain (Major Chichester-Constable) declared to a representative of "The Express": "I have only one complaint; it has been too good."

From the point of view of attendance the match was disappointing. Monday's weather was glorious, yet the receipts were under £16. Tuesday was dull from the start. In the early afternoon rain fell, and after a long delay, and a re-start, the match was abandoned. Great interest was taken in the match by members of the Yorkshire County Committee. It was stated that it is very rare for any of them to attend a Second XI. fixture, but on Monday six members of the committee were at the match, and greatly enjoyed their visit.

Local interest was centred in Bastow, the Castleford fast bowler, who came fresh from a fine performance against Whitwood on Saturday. He found himself faced with batting of a much higher order than obtains in Yorkshire Council cricket, however. It is said that Durham are so strong in batting that they can turn their team about, and send the last-wicket men in first with good results. This statement was borne out on Tuesday, when the most enjoyable batting of the match, from the view-point of the average spectator, was contributed by Durham's last-wicket pair.

Yorkshire won the toss. Whitehead (of Friarmerne, who came into the team as substitute for Barber) and Shackleton opened. After a shaky period they settled down to play excellent cricket. Whitehead in particular greatly pleased the spectators, and made 73 of the first-wicket stand of 128. Shackleton was out at 162. Afterwards, with the exception of Turner, who batted to the end, the Yorkshire batting was disappointing, though breezy hitting by Major Chichester-Constable was much enjoyed. The innings closed for 240. Howell took four wickets for 41 and Brooks four for 48.

At the close of play on Monday Durham, in two and a half hours, made 142 for the loss of three wickets. The batting on the whole was much too painstaking, and Adamson, in particular, was content very often to let the ball hit the bat.

On Tuesday Adamson and Alderson resumed for Durham, and Bastow was the opening bowler. With the fourth ball of his first over he had Alderson caught at the wicket. On Monday he clean bowled Ferens. The two wickets represented his share of the spoils, but he bowled very much better than his figures of two wickets for 90 runs would suggest, and maintained a better length than Render, the other fast bowler on the Yorkshire side. With three wickets in hand Durham passed the Yorkshire total, and Adamson was ninth man out for a very carefully-compiled 96. When Howell joined Cook for the last wicket some brilliant hitting was seen. All the bowling was treated with the utmost contempt. In 55 minutes the pair added 102 runs, and were still in possession at the luncheon interval. Cook hit one six and ten fours in a total of 60, and Howell was only a little less unmerciful, 26 of his 40 runs being obtained by boundary strokes. The Durham captain declared at lunch-time, with his side leading by 105 runs. Bastow's bowling figures have been given. Douglas took two wickets for 49, Bedford two for 63, and Render two for 60.

There was very little play after lunch, but what there was served to show that Yorkshire have an excellent colt in Whitehead. Eventually, after a long wait and a short resumption, the match was abandoned, Durham taking first innings points. The details were:—

## NOTES.

A very interesting Yorkshire Council match at Pontefract yesterday week was cut short by the storm. South Kirkby, who had lost only two matches, were the visitors, and Pontefract were making a very good stand against strong bowling when the match had to be abandoned. Wordsworth and Ollivierre batted well, and made 82 before Ollivierre was out lbw. Husband joined Wordsworth, and by careful play the pair took the score to 61 before Husband, through an error of judgment, was run out. In the Pontefract side for the first time this season was Theo. Crabtree, who holds an appointment in France, and who is on vacation. He plays cricket in France on matting wickets, but the change to grass evidently did not upset him, for he delighted the spectators with his excellent form. He had made 82 when the rain came. He should prove of great value to Pontefract in the remaining matches this season. The score when play ceased was 114 for five wickets. Wordsworth played excellently for his 87 runs.

There is always more than usual interest in the meeting of the local rivals, Castleford and Whitwood. The first meeting this season should have been at the Colliery ground on the 25th of last month, but bad weather prevented the match taking place, and they did not, therefore, come together until Saturday at Hightown, where a keen and interesting match was played before a large crowd of spectators completely round the enclosure. The Castleford captain won the toss, but sent in Whitwood to bat, and their innings was opened by Tordoff and Rollins, Bastow and Robshaw having charge of the attack. Both batsmen played with more caution than usual, and runs came very slowly, half an hour being occupied in obtaining the first 13. This was not only on account of the carefulness of the batsmen, but also the smart fielding. Rollins played a ball almost back into Bastow's hands, and in the following over from the same bowler he repeated the stroke, and Bastow readily accepted the catch, one wicket being down for 17 runs, of which Rollins had made 12, the stand having lasted nearly three-quarters of an hour. The score stood at 24 after an hour's play, and there was a double bowling change, Tyson succeeding Robshaw, and Didlock going on at the other end. Elliott, who had filled the breach, began to show a little enterprise, and a two from him off Tyson raised a cheer. There was some applause also when Tordoff scored his fifth run. At 40 Bastow resumed in place of Tyson, and Tordoff was smartly dismissed for 12 by Allen off Bastow with the total at 43. The half-century was reached in an hour and a half, and a run later Bastow clean bowled Nodder. Four runs later Robshaw went on again at the other end, and the fourth wicket fell at 59, Hind being sent back by Bastow for 2. This led to the most productive partnership of the innings, Wright joining Elliott, and raising considerable enthusiasm by four successive boundaries. He was not long in putting together 26, and then Bastow got amongst his wickets, 34 runs having been put on. Dunn was very unlucky, the first ball he received from Bastow going straight into Didlock's ready hands at slip. Bellwood, who began to hit out, was finely caught on the boundary by Didlock, off Robshaw, and Crozier was caught for a couple by Tyson off Bastow, who at this point had taken 7 wickets for 31 runs, eight wickets being down for 104. Baker added a useful 15 before being out for obstruction to Bastow. Elliott in the meantime having been busy, and being joined by Toddington for the last wicket at 142. The last-named had made 10 when Elliott was out lbw. to Bastow with the total at 153, towards which he had contributed 51 in a fine innings. Whitwood had been at the wickets nearly three hours. Bastow's final figures were 31 overs, 11 maidens, 53 runs, 9 wickets, which was the finest bowling feat for the day in the county. Robshaw had 20 overs, and his one wicket cost 48 runs. From Tyson and Didlock 17 runs each were scored, and Ostick had a couple of overs for 8 runs,

Castleford were left with an hour and three-quarters to bat, and the opening pair, as usual, were Allen and Tyson. From the first ball Allen gave a sharp chance, which Rollins missed, but he made no further mistake in a splendid not-out innings. Tyson was out lbw to Dunn for 6 with the score at 18, and Ambler went out to make 14, but again the runs were not coming too freely. Reaching out to Dunn, he was sent back by Bellwood, who put down his wicket, giving place to Robshaw, who, when he had only made a single, played back into Toddington's hands, three wickets being down for 48 runs. When Didlock went out it was expected that the pace would quicken, and this expectation was realised. The field was, however, cleverly set for Dunn's bowling, though it led to not a little amusement, as most of the fielders went into the country, and returned for the opposite over. The runs were, however, kept down, and there were many long hits for singles, but Didlock got half-a-dozen through to the boundary, putting together 38 fairly rapidly. This was a valuable stand, and lifted the total to 130. He, however, fell a victim to Dunn, being caught out of his crease by Bellwood. When Broadbent filled the vacancy there was not time to get the required runs for victory, and stumps were drawn at 137 for 4 wickets. Allen was warmly applauded on reaching the half-century, and he went on to make 68 not out, his score including seven boundaries. In Dunn's 19 overs there were 6 no balls, and he took three wickets for 54 runs. Twelve runs were knocked from Tordiff in six overs, and 41 from Hind in four overs, Toddington's wicket costing 20 runs.

The following report was inadvertently omitted from our last issue:—A fairly large number of spectators witnessed an exciting match at College Grove, when the return match in the West Yorkshire League took place between Wakefield and Castleford. The visitors had again the better of the argument, and given a little more time victory would have been theirs. Against the bowling of Bastow and Robshaw, Wakefield made a disastrous start, and Walsh and Siswick received their quietus with the total at thirteen. With Cooper and Bruton in partnership there was an improvement, and the latter, playing a forceful game, was not long in registering twenty. His was the third wicket to fall at 45, but with the addition of only four runs Jones was the fourth man to be clean bowled by Bastow. Cooper continued to give a masterly display, and there was an interesting and profitable partnership by him and Birkinshaw, the latter rattling up 32 before being bowled by Bastow (5 for 101), who had thus the honour of having captured all the five wickets. It was not until Bastow had bowled for two hours, during which he sent down 23 overs, that he was given a rest. Pearce played a very enterprising innings for 27, but the shining light on the Wakefield side was Joe Cooper, who batted with correctness and confidence, and the first chance he gave was his last. His contribution was 54, which included seven fours. Bastow went on a second time, and he brought Wakefield's innings to a close by clean bowling Pickup, who had the satisfaction of knocking the only six of the match. Wakefield's venture closed for 178. Bastow carried off the bowling honours with six wickets for 79 runs. Castleford had two hours at their disposal, and the spectators wondered whether they would play for a draw or endeavour to get the runs. Allen and Tyson were the opening batsmen, and with Birkinshaw and Pickup bowling well, runs at the outset appeared difficult to get, the early impression being that Castleford did not appear likely of chronicling a win. Eventually, however, matters took a more lively turn, and after the dismissal of Allen, with the score at 47, Tyson and Ambler were responsible for some enterprising batting, changes in the bowling being deemed necessary. Wright was the fifth bowler to be tried, and with the first ball he sent down he had Tyson caught at cover point by Pickup. The second wicket had taken the score to 132, and Tyson, a clever batsman, had contributed 67. Wright also got the wicket of Ambler, who had put on fifty, and the third wicket fell at 162. Before this Castleford had realised that there was a possibility of getting the runs, and after the

fall of the third wicket their supporters became very excited—and so did their players. Didlock, the fourth man in, made desperate efforts to score the runs, but his subsequent colleagues were unable to render him any assistance. The state of affairs was 166 for six wickets when Marshall went to keep Didlock company, but when five runs had been added, including four byes, the match ended. The result of the match, of course, was a big disappointment to Castleford, and some of their spectators seemed to blame Allen and Tyson for not making more progress in the early stages, but they evidently did not take into account the fact that both Birkinshaw and Pickup bowled very well at the start, and these two experienced batsmen knew perfectly well that any other policy would have been fatal to them.

Castleford went to Dewsbury on Monday to fulfil their West Yorkshire League fixture, and in the absence of Bastow, playing with Yorkshire Colts, Ambler, Broadbent, Newton, and Ostick, whose places were taken by reserves, they were not too sanguine of success. Dewsbury won the toss, and went in to bat on a good wicket. Owing to a blistered foot Robshaw ceased bowling after five overs, and his place was taken by Didlock, Tyson operating at the other end. The last-named had a very successful afternoon, the ball coming sharply off the pitch, and he clean bowled five of the best batsmen, and finally came out with 7 wickets for 41 runs, having ten maidens in 21.3 overs. Didlock in 17 overs took three wickets for 50 runs, and a couple of good catches were taken by Little and Hague, Dewsbury being all out for only 106, in under two hours. Allen and Tyson were together for the first Castleford wicket until 56 was recorded, and Elton finely took a running catch from a mis-hit when Allen had made 43, which included seven boundaries. Didlock took his place, and later made the winning hit with a boundary, being 88 not out, and Tyson 29 not out. Elton had fourteen overs, and bowled well, only 17 runs being scored from him. The victory was a highly creditable one to Castleford, the runs being knocked off in an hour and twenty minutes.

The all-victorious Ackworth players had a very narrow escape at Pontefract on Saturday. Eager to maintain their leadership of the Yorkshire Council, they were confident that they would be able to repeat their decisive victory over Pontefract earlier in the season, when they scored 263 for six wickets, and dismissed their opponents for 149. There seemed every prospect that "the double" would be accomplished when Ackworth, after two hours and forty minutes' batting, declared with a score of 229 for six wickets. With bowlers like Fox, Hoyland, and Brooke, and Peate's teasers thrown in, the odds were that Pontefract would not approach the Ackworth score. But the unexpected happened and before the end of a most interesting match Ackworth were wondering if they could stave off defeat. Whether or not the umpires allowed "time off" for lost balls, they were generous to Pontefract in not calling "last over" before they did. Ackworth's usual pair, Fox and Peate, opened the match, and there was a double repetition of the first match. Again Ackworth scored over 100 for the first wicket, and again the Pontefract fielders were extremely kind to their old club-mate, Peate. He gave a simple chance to Horner before he had made 10, and the failure to take it probably cost Pontefract the match. Crofts and Stubbs kept the batsmen quiet, and in the first four overs of Crofts only eight runs were scored. Stubbs also bowled well without success. In addition to missed chances, the ground fielding of the Pontefract team was very poor at times. Fox, having taken the measure of the bowling, played delightful cricket, and was much the more attractive of the two batsmen. Horner and Burgoyne were tried in place of the opening bowlers, but did not succeed. Fox made his 50 out of 85 runs scored, and continued to make excellent strokes. The 100 was hoisted, and Peate reached his half-century. The pair were still together at 150, but four runs later a hot return by Fox was smartly held by Pickles, who had displaced Burgoyne. Fox made 81.

and has not played a better innings this season. He had 12 boundaries in his score. Ellis was never comfortable, and when he had made 12 was well caught by Ollivierre. J. Tait began to hit at once, and quickly scored 21. Peate made 36 by boundary strokes, and with his score at 72 was stumped by Guest. N. Tait gave no trouble, and Hoyland was bowled by Horner with the score at 223. Six runs later the Ackworth innings was declared. Pickles and Horner had three wickets each, for 57 and 90 runs. Thompson and Ollivierre made a capital start for Pontefract, and 60 was sent up without loss. In Brooke's first over, however, he had Ollivierre brilliantly caught at the boundary by Ellis. The outgoing batsman showed very pretty cricket, and a big score was promised. Of the total of 63 he made 41, including six fours. Crabtree failed to score, but Crofts helped Thompson to add 30 for the third wicket. With the score at 97 Pickles joined Thompson, and a prolific partnership followed. Pickles was in free-scoring mood, as will be gathered from the fact that 20 of his first 29 runs were from boundary hits. Thompson reached his 50, the result of sound, if rather too studied, batting. Neither the wiles of Peate, the "expresses" of Brooke, nor the effective work of Fox and Hoyland could separate the pair. Pickles scored his 50 very quickly, and there was a slight prospect that the pair would be able to force a victory. Thompson, however, lacked the freedom of Pickles, and the Pontefract chances of a great victory receded. The second century was hoisted amid loud cheers, but with the score at 205 another excellent catch by Ellis ended Pickles's exhilarating display. He had made 65 in a partnership of 108. There was not time now to make the requisite 25 runs, but nine more were added before the umpires called "time." Thompson batted throughout for 75 runs, 22 of which were from boundary strokes. With six wickets in hand, therefore, Pontefract were only 16 runs behind—a lucky escape for the visitors. Hoyland took two wickets for 36 runs each. Brooke and Fox took one each, for 23 and 54, and Peate had 47 runs scored off him without success.

Allerton Bywater fulfilled their engagement with East Ardsley, on the latter club's ground, entirely to Ardsley's satisfaction. Marsh was still an absentee from the visiting team. The outstanding feature of the Allerton innings was the batting of Buxton and Wall, who took the total to 109 for the fourth wicket, and contributed respectively 45 and 49 by sound cricket, but the tail failed to wag, and the venture closed at 131. Fisk and Webster opened the Ardsley innings, and Webster gave a chance to Buxton when he had made only a few runs, but after this he played a faultless innings, and the Allerton bowlers could make little impression upon him. He was finally caught out by Barker off Buxton for the excellent total of 83, and the visitors' score was passed with six wickets in hand.

Knottingley are in fine form just now, and if they maintain the standard of play shown on Saturday, when they entertained Featherstone in the First Division of the West Riding League, they have a very good chance to win the League cup once more. Bating first for Featherstone, Alder and Johnson made a good start, scoring 83 runs before Alder was bowled by Dey for 17. After completing 12 runs Johnson followed, and a rot set in, six wickets falling for 56 runs. A. Cookson, however, indulged in some free hitting, and contributed 40 runs before succumbing to a catch by Thompson off his own ball. Seven wickets were down for 91, and the innings closed for 101 runs. E. Taylor bowled exceedingly well, taking three of the wickets for no runs. Barton and Taylor opened for Knottingley, and the partnership produced 92 runs, 50 of which were obtained in 20 minutes. Barton was bowled by Johnson when the score stood at 76, his share all told being 47. A. Link was caught without making a run, but Dey joined Taylor, and the two secured the necessary runs. Taylor batted finely throughout for 47, and Dey carried out his bat for 11. Knottingley had eight wickets in hand at the finish.

**LANCASHIRE COLTS BAT ALL DAY.**

The Lancashire colts obtained a commanding position against Yorkshire's second team at Old Trafford yesterday, scoring 397 in 5½ hours. H. R. Silverberg found the wicket to his liking, and with the score at 47, he took Shackleton's wicket, caught at square leg. Bedford came out in attempting a short run, five wickets were now down for 48. Wickets still fell, Grimshaw returning the ball to Harris for an easy catch—six wickets down for 50. Wood came out soon after, smartly caught behind the wicket off Harris. Major Chichester-Constable joined Jaques, but Jaques was run out attempting a second run off Major Chichester-Constable's stroke. The score had only reached 51 when Major Chichester-Constable was clean bowled by Silverberg, who had now taken four wickets for eight runs. Douglas opened his shoulders a little, and finally gave a chance to Coperly by skying the ball, but was missed. Bastow's wicket went to Silverberg, caught easily in slips.

Gunn (G. V.) and Keeton opened for Notts, facing the bowling of Douglas and Bastow. The batting was rather slow at the start, and 14 only had been reached when Keeton fell to a smart one-handed catch by Shackleton off Douglas. Gunn and Shipston batted well together, the former hitting out well. He gave a chance to the wicket-keeper with his score at 26, but escaped, to be bowled by Douglas at 30. Gunn's stand was renewed by Harris, who stayed in to score a sound 36. Notts took two and a quarter hours to reach the hundred mark, and were ultimately all out for 138.

**YORKSHIRE II. AT BRIDLINGTON.**

**COLLAPSE BEFORE THE NOTTS ATTACK.**

(From Our Own Reporter.)

Bridlington, Thursday.  
A weak batting display by the Yorkshire Colts when they had first use of the wicket on the Recreation ground here to-day cost them first innings lead, and put them in danger of another defeat at the hands of the Notts second eleven. When Major Chichester-Constable won the toss he promptly decided to bat, and the young Yorkshiremen with their batting strength seemed good for a couple of hundred runs at least.

The wicket was slow and soft with the rain of the morning. Notts, too, were said to be weak in bowling, but the home colts never looked like making a score. Mallalieu, the amateur from the Huddersfield district, was clean bowled before a run had been scored, and the home men were fighting an uphill battle.

For the Colts it was a dismal experience, and when the wickets began to fall the side lost its confidence. Barber and Waind, a new amateur from Scarborough, were the only two to make a stand. They took the score to 43, of which Barber made 27. His innings stood out, for he was confident and quick. He hit 5 fours. Waind scored a useful 13, and then the wickets fell quickly. As a matter of fact seven wickets went down for eight runs, and but for a bright finish by Douglas, who hit 2 fours in his 11—he was the third highest scorer—the innings would not have totalled 62.

Good wickets were thrown away by reckless running. Bedford, who made a century against the Lancashire colts the other week, lost his wicket in attempting a run when the ball was in the hands of the fieldsman, and so it was with the young Leeds all-rounder, Jaques. They were expensive errors of judgment, for the Notts fielding was sound all the time. Since the war the Colts have had some strange experiences on this Bridlington wicket, but none quite so disastrous as this. It provided two of the visiting bowlers with good returns however. Silverberg had five wickets for 16 runs, and consequently was well satisfied with his first appearance in the Notts second string this season, while Harris had two wickets for 10 runs in his nine overs.

The visitors found runs none too easy to get off the bowling of Douglas, Bedford, and Bastow. They lost four wickets in passing the moderate score of the Colts, and would have been hard pressed, indeed, but for the steadiness of Gunn and Harris. The first named put them well on the way to the lead with a sound 30, and when he had gone Harris with 26, in which he only hit a couple of fours, carried on the good work. Notts after an innings of two and a quarter hours led by 76, and it seemed a winning lead at that time. Bastow, of Castleford, was the most successful of the bowlers, with four for 26, while Douglas, who bore the brunt of the attack, had four for forty.

The Colts had an hour's batting before the close, and lost two wickets for 52 runs. Again Mallalieu was unlucky, playing on before he had scored, and again Barber stood firm for 23. The Colts will have their work cut out to-morrow if they are to save the match. Present score and analysis:—

**COLTS WELL BEATEN.**

**NINE WICKETS VICTORY FOR NOTTS SECONDS.**

(By Our Own Reporter.)

Bridlington, Friday.

Since the war the members of the Yorkshire Second XI. have had some disastrous experiences on the Recreation ground here, but rarely have they been as well beaten as they were to-day by the young Notts second team. Indeed, Yorkshire's Colts have usually held rather more than their own in these games with Notts—their big defeats at Bridlington have been at the hands of Northumberland, and then, of course, the bowling of Milne and Hetherington has been the cause of the trouble.

It can be said at once, however, that the Notts Colts' bowling has been nothing like so good as that of the Northumberland pair, and it can be said with equal certainty that the Colts' nine wickets defeat in this game (which has given Notts their first "double" at the cost of Yorkshire for many a season) has been due entirely to batting which has lacked confidence and strength. When it was all over one of the Colts said that the wicket had not been a bowler's wicket at any time in the game.

The young Yorkshiremen—and the Colts' side is younger than it has been at any time since the war—never got over the bad start they made yesterday, on a wicket which should have provided them with a big advantage. They were 76 down on the first innings, and as they lost two wickets for 52 runs last night they started play this morning in the shadow of defeat. A hot sun shone on to a wicket that had had a heavy dew, and the visiting spin bowlers made the ball turn a lot. Shackleton failed to survive the first over of the day, and it was left to Bedford, who comes from Barnsley, and Grimshaw, the 17-year-old Horsforth boy, to endeavour to hold their ends up until the wicket became easier.

Grimshaw was patient—he has plenty of cricket in him—and Bedford shaped like the promising bat he is until he became Hodgkinson's second victim. Waind and Jaques failed to stay, and it was not until Wood joined Grimshaw that the arrears were rubbed off. The Bradford wicket-keeper did all the scoring. He went for the bowling, and, without taking risks, quickly totalld 24. It began to look as though he was in for another big score like that he got against the same bowling at Worksop, but he was smartly caught behind the wicket by Wheat, just as he was yesterday.

To all intents this finished the Colts' innings, and when Douglas was out two hours had been spent in scoring 50 runs. Again Silverberg was the most successful bowler, and his analysis for both innings was 9 for 37. Hodgkinson took 3 wickets this morning for 13 runs.

The visitors wanted 27 runs, and got them for the loss of Gunn's wicket, in just under half an hour. From their point of view it was a very easy win. Full score and details:—

**PUBLIC SCHOOLBOYS PLAY COUNTY COLTS.**

**INTERESTING NEW FIXTURE.**  
(By Our Own Representative.)

York, Wednesday. The Yorkshire County Committee have made a very interesting and acceptable addition to the club's activities with a fixture which began on the Yorkshire Gentlemen's ground to-day between a team of Public Schoolboys of county birth and the Yorkshire Second XI.

Though favoured with one of the most beautiful days of summer, the match did not appeal very strongly to the public; but the idea is so good and has so many potentialities that the fixture will probably become an annual one. Indeed, it has been tentatively agreed for the match to take place next year at Harrogate, and it is believed that the social side of the occasion can be so developed as to make it something of a county function.

The fifteen boys who made up to-day's team had all come under the tuition of George Hirst at the Headingley practices during April, and the great veteran acted as captain of the side. Unfortunately for the character of the cricket, the rainy summer which has spoilt so many things has been very detrimental to schoolboy batsmanship, the slow wet wickets calling for qualities which are contrary to all the natural impulses of youth, and when Hirst won the toss he had no choice but to send the boys in on a very soft pitch. He had little hope of them doing at all well, but there was every indication that under the hot sun the wicket would be worse in the afternoon.

The wicket never became really difficult; but Hirst's fears were realised, and an almost complete collapse was only prevented by the clean, forceful hitting of the elder of the brothers Tew, who are nephews of Lord Hawke. J. E. Tew is now at Oxford, and plays with the Authentics, so that in physique and experience he had a big advantage over the schoolboys; but, judged by any standard, it was a fine innings, and he hit six fours in his 49. Intent on getting his half-century, he made a tremendous hit at a delivery from Douglas; but the ball came with deceptive slowness off the pitch, and, missing it, Tew was easily stumped.

He had found a valuable partner in W. Elliott, of St. Peter's, York. Adopting a rather crouching attitude, Elliott played very good cricket, and his alert backing up for a run was an object lesson to boys from many other schools where, apparently, this important aspect of batsmanship receives less attention than at St. Peter's. W. A. Lupton, son of the County skipper, also defended watchfully; but the Second Eleven bowling was clearly too strong for the boys, who were all out in two and a quarter hours for 91.

**A NEW FAST BOWLER.**

The Colts attack included what has every appearance of being a notable acquisition in Dennis, of Hickleton. He is a genuine fast bowler, over six feet tall, with a gratifying absence of hops, skips, and contortions in his action, his run up to the wicket being quite a model. Taking three wickets in one over, he claimed altogether six victims for 23 runs. Douglas was almost equally destructive, with six for 27.

The Colts team included two other interesting newcomers who have been making quite a stir in Leeds League cricket this season. R. Shaw, of Holbeck, and H. Fisher, of East Leeds. Shaw, in partnership with Turney, punished the schoolboys' bowling very vigorously after a slow start, but Fisher and Bedford, though batting in delightful style, soon fell victims to the rather unusual bowling of Harbord, who is in the Eton College team. Bowling a slow, medium delivery, Harbord flights the ball skilfully, and seemed to be making it "swim." Fisher and Dennis were actually bowled in quick succession with full tosses, and Harbord on a number of occasions beat other batsmen with this delivery. A. M. Tew bore the brunt of the bowling with him. The schoolboys, by the way, fielded only eleven. When stumps were drawn for the day the Colts were 107 runs ahead with three wickets to fall. **THE PARK AVENUE GROUND.**

To the Editor of The Yorkshire Post.  
Sir,—Mr. Priestman's statements to your representative do not meet the points I raised. No well-informed person will deny that, in the past, Bradford has given admirable support to county cricket, but the question is: Is it doing so now? When one compares the poor support—despite agreeable weather on the first two days—for Oldroyd's benefit with the excellent support—despite cold weather—for Kilner's benefit at Leeds two years ago, one cannot give an affirmative answer, even allowing for the facts that Middlesex are a more attractive team than Notts, and that Kilner is a more prominent member of the Yorkshire eleven than Oldroyd. The drainage system at Park Avenue may be very extensive, but the question is: is it efficient? The fact that play was not possible in the county match on Saturday, but was possible in all save two of the Bradford League matches, suggests that there is, at any rate, a doubt upon the point. I may add that, if the number of matches allocated to Bradford be, as it should be, reduced, I do not expect that Leeds will reap the benefit.
