These figures tell their own sad story of Berkshire's opening match in this season's Minor Counties Championship against Hertfordshire at the Kensington Road Ground on Wednesday and Thursday. To be beaten by an innings and 69 runs is a depressing start to the season, and only can only hope that Dame Fortune will be more kind to Berkshire in their second game, against Oxfordshire next week. Herts won the toss and, batting first, scored 309. The home county were dismissed before lunch on the second day with a two-innings total of 240.

The first day was one of dismal failures for Berkshire's batsmen, seven of whom made only two runs, and at the close of play the home county were 162 runs behind and were faced with the prospect of a follow on. Hertfordshire batted first and ran up a total of 309 and then the last ball of the day saw Berkshire dismissed for 147.

The luck was all with Herts, and it seemed that winning the toss would win the game for them. The early Herts batsmen had had the best of the wicket, which by now had become difficult for the men coming in. To cut a long story short, the remaining wickets fell quickly, the last five falling for the addition of 23 runs. Kingsley was in a merry mood and scored 158 before he had a go at a tempting ball from Hinde and hit up a catch to Palmer. The Oxford captain hit two 6's and twenty-one 4's—twice he got four 4's in succession—and he put on the runs at a quick rate. The Berkshire fielding was good on the whole—only eight extrawere given away—but about six or seven catches, and some of them easy ones, were dropped.

Captain Hinde celebrated his return to the county side with an analysis of EIX wickets for 56 runs—pretty good going out of a total of 309. Human, the Cambridge blue, captured two for 49, and Mundy, of Benham Park, got one for 47.

SPORTS NOTES.

Berkshire County Gossip.

BY THE SPORTS EDITOR.

Berkshire centuries in Minor Counties Cricket have not been numerous of recent seasons, and therefore all who had the pleasure of being present at Kensington Road, Reading, on Friday afternoon last week particularly appreciated the splendid innings by Major J. L. Carr of 138 not out. Against Herts on the previous day Major Carr had scored 68 not out, so that his many friends were quite justified in their congratulations. Major Carr did not have the opportunity of completing his innings, for Berkshire declared at the overnight total and dismissed Cornwall on Saturday for 187, so that Berkshire had a handsome victory by an innings and 10 runs. It was quite like a Berkshire performance which one used to associate with the days of G. G. M. Bennett, Sir Charles Nepean, the Collins', and (later) A. P. F. Chapman. I shall have a word to say about Dr. Woodburn later—let me just mention here his comprehensive service against Cornwall—42 not out, four for 35 and three for 41. Truly a captain's part.

Bank Holiday Diversion.

Cricket enthusiasts saw some entertaining cricket at Kensington Road, Reading, on Bank Holiday, for they had the satisfaction of seeing Devonshire dismissed for 96, Berkshire replying with 106 for seven. One of the Devon players told me that the visitors' unexpected collapse was due to the change in the character of the wicket; they had been playing on plumb wickets in Devonshire, and then finding themselves on a slow wicket they were unable to accommodate themselves to the changed conditions. He acknowledged, too, that they played badly. Still, great credit is due to the Berkshire bowlers, particularly H. M. Hinde (three for 25), and W. Y. Woodburn (five for 50). Hinde was successful, not only in hitting the sticks, but in getting batsmen caught in the slips, while Woodburn's subtlety was again in evidence. The look of surprise on the faces of several of the batsmen was convincing proof that they had thought the Berkshire captain's bowling more simple than it really was.

There was one little incident which showed Woodburn's intelligent anticipation. Crossing over, he gave with his

There was one little incident which showed Woodburn's intelligent anticipation. Crossing over, he gave with his first ball a nice tempting ball which seemed just the one to hit. The batsman yielded to the temptation and the ball was seen to be sailing in the direction of Norris, the son of the Mayor of Maidenhead. It came a little awkwardly, but Norris made a splendid catch, which certainly deserved more applause than it received.

By the way, Norris has every appearance of becoming a successful recruit to Minor Counties Cricket. He appears to have the temperament for this really good class cricket, and this is more than can be said for all those who have been tried this season. Minor Counties Cricket is far better than many people imagine; the bowling is of a much higher standard than is generally supposed, and the spin bowling finds many a weak place in the ambitious young cricketer's equipment. Then, too, the fielding, particularly as regards catching, is more accurate, and the batsman does not have so many "lives." That is a diversion. Norris, it is gratifying to state, shapes like a batsman who will in a season or two become a great acquisition to the Berkshire eleven.

Reverting to Woodburn, high praise should be accorded him for his loyalty to and enthusiastic work for the Berkshire C.C. He is a fine example of the allround cricketer, and he takes so little out of himself when bowling that he can keep going for long periods—a great asset to a club like Berkshire, which has no outstanding professional bowlers. By the way, it was pleasing to see on the ground on Monday Mrs. Howard Palmer, whose esteemed husband did so much for sport in Berkshire, both as regards athletics and cricket. Her son, R. H. R. Palmer, is one of the most popular and hard-hitting members of the Berkshire C.C. and a smart field, even if he does occasionally find a fast one elusive. The Berkshire Club continues to be under a great debt to the Palmer family.

Seldom has there been such a sensational finish as was witnessed on Tuesday, for Berkshire actually dismissed Devon in the second innings for 29, and thus, though the Berkshire innings only just exceeded 150 (the Berkshire tail wagged well), the home county won by an innings and 26. Berkshire Dismisses Devon for Twenty-nine Runs.

After an exciting finish, in which, with three minutes to spare, Devon were dismissed for a second innings total of 29, Berkshire won this match at the Kensington Road ground by an innings and 20 runs.

RAIN DELAYS START.

RAIN DELAYS START.

Rain interfered with the start of Berkshire's game with Devon on August Bank Holiday and play was an hour late in commencing. Devon, winning the toss, opened on a soft wicket and disaster soon overtook them when Woodburn bowled Hoare before he had scored a run and when only two were on the board. Then Falding had but a brief stay, being 1.b.w. to Woodburn after hitting two singles. Fen for two was then the state of the game and at the luncheon interval Seldon and Goldie had taken it to 32, still for two. R. Remnant and Woodburn opened the bowling, but after eight overs, in which he had been hit for only seven runs, the former was taken off, Hinde, the Berks skipper, being still on at the interval, when 21 overs, eight of them maidens, had been bowled. Woodburn had conceded six runs when, with the last ball of his fifth over, he took his second wicket.

Only one run had been added after lunch when Woodburn, at point, caught Seldon off Hinde, and then when the score was at 35 Goldie was l.b.w. to Woodburn. It was remarkable that each of the four wickets had been taken with the last ball of an over. Buckley, who was j'laying behind the stumps for the first time this season, made a spectacular catch on the leg side to dismiss Outram off Woodburn, again off the last ball of an over. The score was then 39 for five after an hour's play. Woodburn was bowling consistently well and wis keeping a good length. Jones was at the wifete only four, with the first time off Hinde, then when three runs had been added Hinde got Poynder's middle peg with a "yorker." Devon had thus lost five wickets in 30 minutes after the interval. Amory, the herd-hitting skipper of the Devon side, was joined by Baxter, and they took the score to 50—after Devon had been batting 30 minutes. Woodburn came off after bowling 21 overs, putting on Munday in his stead. Woodburn had taken four wickets and had been hit for 32 runs. Woodburn came on again, this time at the pavilion end, in place of Hinde, and with his first ball he got Baxter's wicket. Norris holding a good catch in the long field. Baxter and Amory had been together 40 minutes and had put on 26 runs. The score was now 71 runs for eight wickets and when two more had been adued Webber was bowled by Mundy. Amory and Wheaton's last wicket stand was one of the brightest leatures of the Devon innings, but at last Amory's wicket fell to Mundy's bowling. Devon had batter 150 minutes to score 96, their lowest total this season. Amory had indeed played a skipper's part and his 34, in which there were four fours, represented 70 minutes' interesting, if somewhat slow, batting.

The wicket looked to be playing easily when R. Remnant and Rowland opened Berkshire's innings. Remnant had two "lives" before reaching 20, Seldon missing him at mid on and Poynder dropping a fairly simple catch at cover point. When the opening pair had been at the wicket for 35 minutes Folding made a splendid catch in the alips to dismiss Rowland with the score at 36. Within a short space of 45 minutes Devon had tried five bowlers, but the pitch was not belying them much and runs came was not helping them much and runs came at a slow and steady rate, the half century being reached just under the hour. A mis-understanding between Remnant and Norris led to the former narrowly escaping being run out when the score was at 67. Ten minutes later Remnant was caught at mid off by Wheeton after scoring 44 in 80 minutes.

CAUTIOUS BATSMEN.

Considering the state of the game the early batsmen seemed to have played with overmuch caution and there were few noteworthy shots. The second wicket had fallen at 71 and after a five minutes stay in which six runs had been added, P. Remnant was caught behind the stumps by Hoare. Webber,

who took Remnant's wicket, seemed to have found a "spot" and was making the ball pop quite often. One all from him "kicked" up and cut Carr's face. Norris was playing a steady innings but taking no chances, had scored only 17 runs at the end of an hour. When at 19 Norris had an escape, Poynder, who had the sun in his eyes, missing another catch at cover. catch at cover.

When Berkshire were within two of their opponent's total Carr was bowled by Baxter, who with the next ball missed Palmer's stumps by the proverbial coat of varnish. With the fourth ball of the next over and with the score still at 95 Norris fell a victim to Webber's bowling, being caught by Baxter at forward short leg. The fourth wicket partnership between Carr and Norris had lasted more than 30 minutes and had produced 17 runs. Norris had batted 80 minutes for his 21 runs. With 10 minutes left for play Palmer hit the single which took Berks score to the level of Devon, but then before another run was scored he was caught at forward square leg. Woodburn came in and his first scoring stroke was a snick to the sight screen for a four, which completed Berkshire's century. With the first ball of the last over of the day Amory bowled Lewis with the score at 106 for 7. This was the score at the close of play, when Buckley and Woodburn were batting.

Play on the second day was held up for forty minutes owing to rain. When the overnight score of 105 had been carried to 121 Dr. Woodburn injured a leg muscle and Lewis had to run for him. After twenty minutes Buckley was bowled by a straight good length ball from Webber when the score was 127. Although he had been at the wicket nearly half an hour Woodburn had not added to his eight of the previous day when he cut a ball off Falding into the hands of Seldon. Mundy went for Webber's bowling with a vengeance and in ten minutes had scored 18, including three good fours on the leg side. At 100 Hinde, the last man in, was dropped by Coldie at long off, but with the next ball Hinde made exactly the same shot, this time with fatal consequences, for Goldie held the ball, and the Berkshire innings, which started in so pro-Berkshire innings, which started in so promising a style, closed with the total of 127, a lead of 55 on Devon. The home county had put on 45 in 35 minutes, 19 runs being scored by Munday in a quarter of an hour. Rain began to fall heavily and the covers were put on the wicket.

It was not until 5.35 that the pitch was declared fit for play, and Berkshire were faced with the formidable task of dismissing the Devon side for less than 55 in 85 minutes. The fight against the clock provided a thrilling climax which made the long dull wait well worth while. The wicket was in a terrible state and on the rain-sodden turf the ball did many queer things, while the variation in pace was bewildering. The Devon onening pair started confidently, but their idle of woe soon began when Hoare, probably their best bat, was bowled at five. Wickets fell quickly—two down for six, three for 14, four for 15—but the clock kept ticking relentlessly and there were only 35 minutes in which six vickets had to fall. Seldon, who had oatted exactly an hour for 16, went at 23, and in the next over Mundy got two more—three wickets, all at 23. The cighth wicket fell at 29, the ninth went without further score, and then, with less than five minutes to the time for drawing stumps, the last man was caught, and Berkshire's bid for an innings victory had been successful. The wicket had played a vital part in Devon's collapse, but Berkshire's triumph and Caryer fielded as substitute. The men who played leading parts in this exciting cricket drama were R. J. F. Remnant, who took four wickets and made one catch: Hinde, who capbured three wickets and also brought off a catch: Mundy, who got two wickets, and Buckley, who caught two men behind the wicket.

Cornwall Defeat Berkshire.

MUNDY'S REMARKABLE BOWLING FEAT.

Cornwall took full revenge for the innings defeat inflicted on them by Berkahire at Reading, in the Minor Counties Championship match which ended at Penrance on Saurday, the home eleven winning by five wickets.

Play on the first day was delayed by rain, and a start was not made until 2.40 p.m., so that there seemed every possibility of a ruined match, but Saturday proved gloriously fine, and there was a fine fighting finush to a match which was full of fluctuations and interest until the end. Essentially, also, was it a bowlers' game, the warm sun of the second day, following the rain of Friday, making the wicket extremely treacherous. Bowlers on both sides madifull use of their opportunities, making the bail turn dangerously, so that the game was remarkable if only fer the fact that 25 wickets fell for only 252 runs.

Though there were but four hours of cricket on the first day, what there was was full of interest and tension, notable in the first place for some magnificent bowling by Whiting, the veteran Cornwall professional, who in 30 overs bowled 22 maidens, took three Berkshire wickets and only had 15 runs scored against him, and in the second place for the excellent batting of J. H. Human, who played the soundest of crickand scored nearly half his team's total.

Whitiny opened the game against Rowland and bowled six maiden overs in succession, but Rogers (W.), at the other end, took Cresswell's wicket in his first over, and very soon after bowled Rowland for five.

Human, however, who was third man in, made a brave stand, and for a time found a useful partner in Norris, who scored 16 before Ollerosarnshaw took his off stump. G. Sayles appeared well set, but his wicket fell when his total was 27, whilst Woodburn was dismissed by Rogers, who made the only catch of the day. A total of 124 was not formidable, more particularle as Addicont and Stoneman, going in at 6 nm.

Mundy, the Berkshire fast bowler, found his best form when the match was resumed on Saturday morning, the Cornish batsmen failed irnominio

with their total at 80, were 44 runs behind on the first innines.

The wicket was by now beginning to suffer, and the Cornish bowlers proved more deadly than ever in the Berkshire second innings. Only two batsmen, indeed, succeeded in reaching double figures, J. H. J. H. HUMAN'S FINE CENTURY.

Although they established a first innings lead of 167, Berkshire Boys were defeated by 34 runs by Wilts in the annual intercounty youths (under 19) game, which was played at Cintra on Wednesday and Thursday. Evicently with thoughts of an innings victory Human made Wilts follow on, and it was soon apparent that the visiting batemen were not to be treated with contempt this time. They scored 311, leaving Berkshire to get 144 runs to win. This they failed to do and were beaten by 34 runs, being, of course, without the services of Mole at the wicket.

One ventures to think that it would have been wiser if Human had let Berkshire carry on with their second innings without making Wilts follow on. It was a good finish and had Berkshire had their full quota of batsmen they might just have pulled it off.
