JUNIOR CRICKET CUP.
 Rattee and Kett qualified for the first round of the Cambs. Junior Cup on Saturday, when in the preliminary stage they defeated Stapleford by 27 runs. They meet the winners of A.S.L.E. and F. and Willingham. Although Mossop and Starling gave the winners a useful start, a collapse threatened until Roberts and Burgess came together for the sixth wicket. After G. Dean who bowled well throughout, had broken this partnership, another rot set in, and the innings closed for 87. Dean's seven wickets cost three runs apiece, Stapleford made a poor start, and although A. Dean, Harvey and A. Jennings made good efforts, the innings closed for 60.

Runs were plentiful in the Junior League match between Ickleton and Old Perownians on Parker's Piece, which the latter won by nine wickets. E. Wombwell and L. 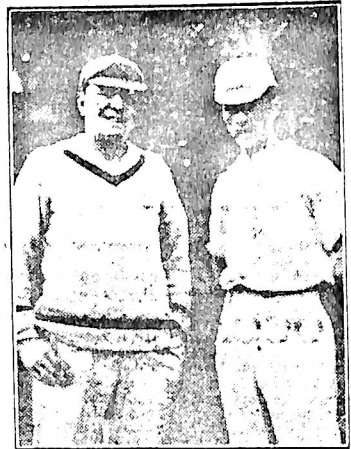
Splendid Effort by F. Lilley and Self

CAMBS. HEAVY DEFEAT.

Oxfordshire's ten wickets victory at Cambridge on Saturday would have been even more pronounced had not the Cambs tail-end batsmen once again come to the rescue of the side. At one period it appeared likely that the visitors would succeed with an innings to spare. After they had dismissed Cambs. on Friday for 129, Oxfordshire scored at a steady pace, and the home side were eventually set to get 142 to avoid the innings' defeat.

As in the first innings, five wickets went down quickly, and it looked as if the side would all be disposed of before lunch. The obvious weakness in our County side is the need of a pair of opening batsmen. That is what was lacking last week, and the captain was continually experimenting. Until two sound bats who can open the innings are found, I am afraid Cambs. will always have a mediocre team. Their bowling is always steady, if not brilliant, and one can find little to complain of in the fielding.

Y.M. STILL WINNING.

Although without Pask, who was assisting the County side, and Kerridge, who was figuring in the athletic match at Lowestoft, Y.M.C.A. easily defeated St. Andrew's-the-Great when they met for Senior League points on Parker's Piece on Saturday. Y.M.C.A. have a clear lead in the race for the championship, but have twice to meet Histon Institute, their nearest rivals.

Their victory on Saturday was gained by a margin of six wickets. Bating first, St. Andrew's made a fair start, Tadman, going in at the fall of the first wicket, giving a sound display for 32. Cockell undoubtedly plays a prominent part for Y.M. as a wicketkeeper, but he should realise by now that there is no necessity to attempt to "show off." Repeated appeals—sometimes ridiculous claims—do not enhance his reputation as a wicketkeeper. He has a good voice, but one does not want always to hear it.

EASY FOR ST. GILES.

St. Giles' easily defeated College Servants when they met on Queens' College ground. The Servants won the toss and decided to bat, but against the bowling of Rose, Hobson and Smart, only Bryan showed any aggressiveness. He added a useful 25 out of a total of 93. Rain fell before St. Giles' went in, and the Servants' bowlers were handicapped by a greasy ball. Rose and Cote made a big second wicket stand, the former scoring 50 and the latter 45 before stumps were drawn with the total at 104 for 1 wicket.

OLD PEROWNIANS IN FINAL.

OLD PEROWNIANS' CUP VICTORY.

In defeating Great Wilbraham on Saturday in the final of the Cambs. Junior Cup competition, the Old Perownians gained considerable distinction for themselves and ensured the cup remaining within the borough for another year. Their victory was by a margin of four wickets, and they were, if one can put it so, this much the better team. The Perownians always had a more impressive variety of bowlers, and their batting for the most part was more consistent and reliable. Wilbraham possessed one or two good bats, and a score of 148 was quite good, but the weakness lay in the attack.

There was so much sameness about the bowling that any batsman who first played himself in must eventually make runs, and that is exactly what the Perownians' opening pair did. Game and Webster knew that they could get runs if they played the right type of game, and, as the score shows, they certainly did. The way these two lads—Webster is only 17 years of age—played almost convinced me that they would put up a hundred between them, and they would have done had not Game become a little impetuous.

This former Cherryhinton Constitutional Club player, who two years ago scored a brilliant double century on this, the King's and Clare College ground, was dismissed by a very clever catch at square leg by Hulver, who held a fast travelling ball above his head. Game departed when the score was at 70, and his contribution of 45 included six 4's, mainly gained by flashing shots through the covers and leg strokes. Webster was then in the twenties, and, partnered by White, who, by the way, had earlier distinguished himself in the field at mid-off, he continued to play his waiting game. Of the 35 added for the second wicket, White obtained a quick 24, and he was out to a catch off a ball wide of the stumps that he should wisely have left alone. With victory in sight the batting became tedious, and the score mounted very slowly. Canning, a batsman much the same as Webster, helped to put on 26 and was bowled, and two runs later Webster was out in rather extraordinary fashion. He attempted a hit to leg, and the bat slipping from his grasp, went sailing through the air to land twenty yards away. The ball cocked up into the air, and the wicket-keeper had an easy catch. Webster failed by three runs to reach his 50, and he was unlucky not to do so. He played a game ideally suited to an opening batsman, and took off the bowling what little edge there was.

I think that more will be heard of this boy Webster in a few years if he continues to improve as he has been doing. Sixteen runs were still required, but when within two of their opponents' total the Perownians lost their captain, who was bowled by his namesake. Although Hunt made the winning stroke and the score was at 150 when Cornwell was dismissed, Kefford went in to make victory certain.

This was done because of an error on the part of the scorers—that of Great Wilbraham, a lady, be it said—who totalled up to 151 a score that actually was 148. A. Jarvis, who used to play in Senior cricket for St. Andrew's-the-Great, was the most successful Wilbraham bowler. His three wickets cost him about 35 runs, but he is hardly the bowler he used to be. The villagers fielded well at periods, and picked up off the ground in slightly better fashion than their visitors. One noticed, however, the greater zeal displayed by the Old Perownians in the field. It was a case where youth had an advantage.

WILBRAHAM'S BATTING.

As for the batting of the village team, who, to the regret of a great many, are not a League side these days, I must confess that at the start I thought they would make a big score. Rolfe and Sparke began in very good style, and when the former left at 37, Stubblings, a 16-year-old assistant at Fenner's, played his part in a stand that produced 30,

Sixty-seven for two wickets was a very handsome commencement, but two further wickets fell quickly, and the game underwent a change.

Bowling that had by no means been really difficult, began to take the ascendancy, and at the finish Great Wilbraham had collected only 148. Of the other batsmen, Goodwin was outstanding, being forceful at times in his innings of 24. The last eight wickets put on ten runs apiece, but had this been 16 I think Great Wilbraham would have had a very good chance of winning, despite their none too formidable attack. The Old Perownians are a particularly strong batting side, but with the loss of four wickets for less than twenty runs just when the cup was within their grasp, does not suggest that they would have been capable of 200 runs.

The Perownians' most successful bowler was Edwardes, whose three wickets were captured at a cost of seven runs each, but he, like the others, found difficulty in finding a length at the opening of the innings. With their success on Saturday, one recalls with interest the history of the Old Perownians' Club. They began cricket in Cambridge only a few years ago, and after a baptism of the sport as played in the evening on Parker's Piece, I believe I am correct in saying they entered the Thursday League.

With a team of youth, success naturally followed, and this year saw an expansion of the club's activities by entry into Saturday cricket. And what is the result. The Junior Cup won in meritorious fashion from a strong village team, and a possible championship of the League, not forgetting the fact that the Thursday side are winners in their particular group. This surely is a splendid result for a club of young men, and I for one wish them every success for the future. In a year or so, the Old Perownians should consider entering Senior cricket.

RAILWAY SHIELD FINAL.

Poplar Docks won the Railway Directors' Shield for the first time on Saturday, defeating Cambridge A.S.L.E. and F. by five runs. The Docks' success was meritorious. They made a disastrous start, and with 7 wickets down for 13 runs, the Cambridge side appeared to have an easy task. Then Ball and Dickerson made a bright eighth wicket stand that produced over 50 runs, and the total eventually reached 72. W. Taylor bowled well, taking four wickets for 26 runs. Against Ball and Barrett the A.S.L.E. and F. found runs difficult to obtain, only Abraham's reaching double figures. Misunderstandings caused the loss of one or two wickets, and the innings closed for 67.

ALL OUT FOR SEVEN.

F. Thompson, of Pye Radio, bowled exceptionally well in a Junior League match with Newton on Parker's Piece on Saturday. He took eight wickets for nine runs—hitting the stumps seven times in the course of 12 overs, eight of which were maid ens. It was a game of low scoring. Pye's, batting first, were all out for 43. Johnson being the only double figure contributor. J. Fuller bowled well for Newton, taking seven wickets. The villagers were soon in trouble against the bowling of Thomson, and their total fell 12 short of that of Pye's.

CAMBS.' BIG SCORE.

Never have I witnessed such an exhilarating display of batting as Cambs. provided in their concluding match of the Minor Counties' Championship with Beds. on St. John's ground on Monday, and rarely have I seen so moderate an attack as put up by Beds., and certainly never so poor a display in the field on top right from the start, and their superiority was so pronounced that at the tea interval the captain was able to apply the closure. Our side, or, to be more correct, eight of the batsmen, amassed the huge total of 430, and then dismissed six of the visiting side for a meagre 89.

The wicket was perfect all day, and Cambs. made the best use of it. Beds. went in with the same opportunities of making runs, and failed. The difference between the two teams was obvious. The double century by Rose was the outstanding feature, and quite outshone Covill's hundred, peculiar, as it may seem. Covill jumped into his best form from the first ball sent down, and was nearing his fifty when Rose took Saxon's place. It was almost a certainty that Covill would make a lot of runs, and the fact that Rose went on to surpass his partner's score when least expected is what gives to it the mark "outstanding." Covill is renowned for being a punishing bat. Well, Rose hit still harder and as often, and was always overhauling the professional.

Together they put on 156 for the third wicket, and the runs occupied about 90 minutes. This extraordinary rate of scoring reached its zenith in the last half-hour before lunch, when the bowlers were "swiped" to the tune of 66 runs! Covill was at the wickets approximately two hours for his hundred, and to say that it was an innings played by the man at his very best is a fitting description. Cricketers know what Covill's "best" really is.

In his innings of 204 not out, Rose hit two 6's and twenty-four 4's, and was batting three hours. He took his cue from Covill. He made the bat meet the ball every time, and was particularly severe on the slow bowlers. His pulls to leg and shots through the covers were excellently judged and executed with consummate ease. It was easily the best innings the St. Giles' clubman has played this season, and it redeemed a good many past failures.

Rose had two remarkable escapes, the first when he played on to his wicket without removing the balls (at 60), and again at 188, when Southgate dropped a "sitter" in the long field. The batsman also put up one or two other risky shots, but he could not go wrong when his luck was in. It is a long time since Cambs. ran up such a big score, and Rose's Bradman-like innings recalled a similar feat by Sammy Ling many seasons ago. The only other instance of two centuries being scored in one innings also lies to the credit of Ling, when partnered by the late E. H. Leek, against Herts a few years back. There was a crowd of quite large proportions to witness the batting of the home side, and it shows that there is a little support in the town for county cricket. And there was not one who did not enjoy the day's sport.

Dynes, whose score reached 80, and Southgate, made a stand in the first innings of Beds, and retrieved the fortunes of their side to some extent, but the other men did nothing, and the innings closed at 170. The same story was to be told in the visitors' second knock—they being forced to follow on—Dynes and Southgate alone showing any real fighting spirit. This time Dynes made 42, and Southgate, who is quite a youth, 25 not out. The latter batted very low down in the list, and his worth to the side would have been more emphasised had he been sent in earlier.

It was rather extraordinary to see how the wickets kept tumbling down on so perfect a pitch, and especially when Cambs. lacked the services of a fast bowler. The explanation is that, with the two exceptions named, Beds. were a poor side and never gave promise of extending Cambs., who gave nothing away. The Cambs. bowlers all did their bit, and worked really hard for the success they so thoroughly deserved. Smith and Covill were untiring.

Cambs. thus completed the double at the expense of the neighbouring county, and have finished their fixtures with a percentage of 53.3, a performance that places them well up in the championship table. Altogether it has been a good year for the County, from the playing point of view, at least, and I for one sincerely hope they will carry on next year. There is still plenty of good material in the town and county.

THE HOBBS' MATCH.

Twenty players have been selected from whom the team of 15 will appear against Jack Hobbs' side on Parker's Piece on Thursday, September 18th. They are: P. A. French, captain (Camden), H. J. I hear that Ridgdon and Sussum have declined the invitations, Ridgdon owing to scholastic duties, and Sussum owing to the fact that he will be on holiday abroad. It will be noticed that few county players are included, but the selectors felt that at the present time cricketers from the villages are not up to the average. At present it is not possible for Jack Hobbs to say who will be included in his side, but it is certain that it will contain the names of many of England's greatest cricketers. Those two good sportsmen, Harry Coulson and "Bill" Manning have consented to act as umpires.

Y.M.C.A. CHAMPIONS AGAIN.

Y.M.C.A. are to be congratulated on winning the championship of the Senior League again. Although they have not yet completed their fixtures, they assured themselves of the title by easily defeating College Servants. So far they have not lost a match—their only point dropped was in a game with St. Giles—and they are hoping to go through without sustaining a reverse. Saturday's victory was a ridiculously easy one. They dismissed the Servants for the paltry total of 44, and then knocked off the necessary runs for the loss of only one wicket.

Abbs and Pask bowled unchanged for the winners, the former taking five wickets for 18, and the latter four for 25. Bryant and Fromant were the only Servants' batsmen to make anything of a show, and they accounted for nearly half the runs. Y.M. met with an early reverse when losing Abbs for a "duck," but Horne and Ablett, by steady batting, made a winning stand. Afterwards wickets fell cheaply, and when stumps were drawn the total stood at 72 for 5 wickets.

HISTON BEAT ST. GILES'.

Although it was of little use in their quest for championship honours in the Cambs. Senior League, Histon Institute put up a splendid performance on Saturday by defeating St. Giles', who had a strong side out on St. John's College ground. Hart and Handcombe gave Histon a very good start by putting on 56 runs for the first wicket. Later there was a collapse, and four wickets fell with the score at 102, the whole side being out for 128.

St. Giles' started fairly steadily against some good bowling. J. Smith bowled unchanged for Histon, being well backed up at the other end by A. Peck and H. Rogers, but St. Giles' were dismissed for 78 runs. There was a sharp contrast in the fielding of the two sides, Histon giving little away, but St. Giles' were prone to be slack, Hart and Handcombe being misused.

OLD PEROWNIANS STILL WINNING.

Old Perownians, the Junior Cup holders, continue in a winning vein, and they strengthened their claims to League leadership on Saturday, when they defeated Newnham Institute by four wickets on Selwyn College ground. The Institute, having first knock, made a poor start against Game and Woolard, but the "middle" batsmen aided a recovery—H. King, Reynolds and F. Flores each gave steady displays—and the total reached 80. The Old Perownians began rather scratchily, but Game, who was one of the opening pair, again played a sound innings, before being third out for 39. Jarvis and Hunt made a useful fourth wicket stand, and the Newnham total was passed with only six men out.

STAPLEFORD WIN.

Visiting Little Shelford, Stapleford gained Junior League points by a margin of 18 runs. They have largely to thank C. Matlock and G. Dean for their success, for this pair put on 32 for the fourth wicket. Matlock played his best innings of the season for 38, and the Stapleford total eventually reached 72. With the exception of H. Hudson and Newman, who added 20 for the fifth wicket, Little Shelford could do little against some well varied bowling, and the innings closed for 53. B. Hall, with three wickets for seven runs, was the most successful bowler.

RATTEE'S WIN AT HISTON.

Histon second team were at home to Rattee and Kett on Saturday, losing a fairly close game by 25 runs. Snowers caused stoppages at times. The visitors Starling scored 35 not out and F. Roberts 23. Adams and Matthews shared the wickets. Histon batted fairly consistently, but nobody stayed long, and they were all out for 70 runs. Robinson, a former player for Histon, took five wickets.

WEBBER CUP FINAL.

The final of the Webber Cup will be played on Parker's Piece to-day week, when the Borough and County Police will be in opposition. A keen game is promised. This will probably be the last appearance of P.C. Brooks, the County Police captain, who is retiring from the Force in October. P.C. Brooks is well known as an all-round cricketer, not only in police, but in Junior League circles, and the best wishes of everyone will go with him in his retirement.

TO CARRY ON Decision of County Cricket Club UNANIMOUS VOTE

The Cambridgeshire Cricket Club is to carry on in 1931.
This decision was made at a special meeting of the club on Wednesday at the Lion Hotel, and there was not one present who opposed the proposition to continue. This was after the hon. treasurer (Mr. R. H. Parker) had reviewed the financial position—not very illuminating he said—and the matter had been fully discussed. What the meeting appealed for most was new subscribers.

Major O. Papworth was in the chair and beside a number of the players, there were present: Messrs. R. J. Pearson, W. Varney Webb, Dr. Roper, E. H. Church, J. Nutter, R. Alsop, George Smith, A. B. Diver, H. B. Hart (captain of the eleven), and in addition to the treasurer, Mr. A. R. Chalk (hon. secretary).

THE POSITION REVIEWED.

Mr. Parker said the committee were called together a week or two ago, and they considered the position. As a result a sub-committee was set up and they went into the question more fully.

In delivering the report of the sub-committee, the treasurer said the position so far as the present year was concerned was: Accounts overdrawn to the amount of £58, estimated expenses totalling £120, which made a deficiency in all of £178. The club had Savings Certificates amounting to £111 and if these were realised there would then be a deficiency of £70 at the end of the present season. On the other hand money accruing from the Test matches would be in the neighbourhood of £200.

The sub-committee then considered the future, Mr. Parker said. The expenses for the last three years had been £263, £457 and £219 respectively, and this year £215, making an average for the four years of £238. Taking the income first of all as regards subscriptions, in 1927 the subscriptions amounted to £112, in 1928 £125, and last year they dropped to £83. Based on the experience of the previous three years he thought that the club could count upon the subscriptions being even less this year.

Of the total amount of subscriptions for this year, the late Lord Clifden gave £25—a very large proportion of the amount. There had been other receipts, sometimes from gate money—last year there was no gate money—and sometimes from the sale of materials. However, based on last year and this year to date and bearing in mind the fact that Lord Clifden had departed, the committee did not feel able to estimate the income, but felt that from subscriptions and so forth it would not be more than £70 for next year.

Then the committee looked into the question of what would be received from Test matches, etc. The average receipts during the last four years had been £70. Therefore, if that average was kept up in the future it meant that the annual income of the club would be £140, together with subscriptions, etc. Of that amount the club was sure of between £80 and £100, and the sub-committee thought it would be nearer £100.

If £200 was received from Test matches this year it meant that the club could pay off a deficiency of approximately £70, which would be due at the end of the present season, and be able to carry on certainly for one year, and perhaps two years. The sub-committee felt that the club ought to be able to increase the subscription list very materially.

A SMALL RESPONSE.

The chairman raised a question concerning the subscribers, and the secretary stated that he had written over 200 letters asking people to become members and subscribe to the club and in reply he received something in the neighbourhood of £5 or £10. All those who subscribed last year had had a fixture card and the reminder that went out with it.

The chairman is afraid some of us went a little far reminding these days. It seems we ought to have a list of subscribers that someone should be asked to go into.

"WE OUGHT TO GO ON."

Mr. W. Varney Webb said he felt that they ought to go on for another year at least. He certainly felt that they could if receiving the £200 from the Test matches receipts. "We had a fairly successful season this time and we ought not to let the club drop," the County Chief Constable said. Although the finances were bad they could be improved. The club had some good players who made up a very good team.

Mr. Chalk: This is the moment to bolster up the club. They are 11th in the table, public attention should be called to that and also the fact that there is good material and keenness among the players. It ought to touch the hearts of a good number of people.

The Chairman: I agree with Mr. Webb, I feel very strongly that the club should be continued. The thing is to get more subscribers.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

Mr. Driver said they ought eventually to decide whether they were going to enter the championship again and Mr. Varney Webb said he would propose that this be done.

Mr. Roper seconded. The treasurer, however, raised a question regarding the money from Test matches. Were they absolutely sure of the amount stated.

The chairman said even if it was not quite £200 the club would be able to carry on for another year; it meant work on the part of somebody to get new subscribers.

The proposition being put, it was unanimously decided that the club should carry on.

A meeting of the committee was fixed for Sept. 23rd at 8 o'clock, and it was agreed that all bills should be paid before that date.

It is anticipated that further suggestions for reducing expenditure during the season will be made at the committee meeting.

BEST SEASON FOR MANY YEARS The Averages

It seems rather remarkable that after their best playing season for many years the Cambridgeshire County Cricket Club should have contemplated disbanding.

This season the club finished its programme with a percentage of 53.33, the best record of post-war years. This compares with 8.58 last season, 37.50 in 1928, 32.50 in 1927, and 25.00 in 1926.

As usual, eight fixtures were arranged, but there was only sufficient play in six to count for championship purposes. Three of the six were won, two lost and one drawn (lost on the first innings).

Cams. started off with a fine three wickets' victory over Lincolnshire, but then had a patch of inconsistency, only to recover and wind up the season with two brilliant innings victories over Bedfordshire.

During the period of inconsistency to which I have referred there was a peculiar weakness in batting. The difficulty appeared to be to find a solid opening pair.

A glance at the batting averages appended shows that the batting, if not great, has been fairly steady.

The brilliant 204 not out of H. J. Rose in the concluding match of the season enables him easily to top the averages. The only other batsman to score a century was R. Covill, although Parfitt went very close in the first match with Beds.

C. J. Smith, D. V. Pask and Covill have borne the brunt of the bowling, and the first two named have averages very much akin. Throughout the season the bowling has been very good, and it has been backed up by some excellent fielding.

Altogether Cams. scored 1,908 runs for the loss of 98 wickets, an average of 10.48 runs per wicket (compared with 21.38 last year), while opponents knocked up 1,715 for the loss of 97 wickets, an average of 17.68 (as against 32.79).

GREAT CROWD ON PARKER'S PIECE

The eyes of all Cambridge were turned on the skies yesterday morning. "What," this was the universal question, "will the weather be? Will it affect the match?"

If a stranger had, in his innocence, asked what match, he would have been greeted with shouts of derisive laughter. For Cambridge there was only one event that could have any possible interest.

That, it seems hardly necessary to say, was the visit of the great Jack Hobbs with one of the most brilliant teams that even Parker's Piece, a traditional home of English cricket, had ever seen. The visit had as its object the assisting of the funds of Addenbrooke's Hospital.

For the first time since the opening of the pavilion that bears his name Cambridge was to have the opportunity of seeing the greatest twentieth century batsman in action.

SEVEN ENGLAND PLAYERS.

With him was a team that included no fewer than seven players who have achieved the heart's desire of every cricketer and been capped for England. They were Hobbs himself, Sutcliffe, Duleepsinhji, Leyland, Hendren, O'Connor and Nichols.

Special local interest attached to three of the team. Hobbs and O'Connor both learned the game in Cambridge, while the name of Duleepsinhji recalled not merely his own prowess but that of one of the most romantic figures in all cricketing history, the great "Ranji."

Sutcliffe, too, had a special interest for the Cambridge crowd, in view of his impending visit to India with Hobbs, and that he had headed the season's batting averages, Duleepsinhji immediately following him in the table.

Little wonder, then, that the weather became a more than trifling source of concern. Heavy rain during the night, had given place to warm sun, and a wind that was doing its best to dry the sodden wicket.

The wicket, however, remained soft when play opened after lunch had been taken by the teams in the pavilion.

Long ere the players emerged every seat round the belagged and tented enclosure was taken, and fresh crowds were

pouring on to the Piece in their hundreds. The pavilion was surrounded by yet another crowd, and cameras clicked as the players came out. Photographs were taken of the two teams as a memento of a unique occasion.

Then amid vociferous applause the visitors took the field. They were without Brooks and Cockerill stood behind the stumps for the first over. Barling was also an absentee.

There was more applause for the Cambridge side's opening pair, Rose and Edwards. Edwards was the first to score with a single off Nichols.

The weather had now become somewhat cloudy with a strong wind.

THE FIVE THOUSAND.

By two o'clock there were at least 5,000 spectators massed three and four deep round the entire field. Others were continually pouring in and stood on the sides of the railings and on the running boards of cars drawn up in Park-terrace in an attempt to see the game.

Still the throng increased, though by now every chair and seat had long been taken. Hordes of small boys sat by the edge of the pitch in a perpetual state of animation.

Enthusiasm grew as the afternoon wore on, and some fine fielding by Duleepsinhji and others roused the crowd to a higher pitch.

Webster, who went in after Hobbs' dismissal, struck a small boy sitting on the boundary. He was not seriously hurt, but others crowded round him from all sides. The scene resembled the swarming of ants.

With the tea interval, the crowd dashed across the pitch, and lined the entrance of the pavilion as the players walked in. The ubiquitous small boys were, as usual, well to the fore, and gave their heroes yet another oration.

England's opening pair, Hobbs and Sutcliffe, opened for the visitors after tea and proceeded to score off the local bowling.

With the score at 57 a large black dog was seen to run across the field in pursuit of another, and this seemed to bring them bad luck for immediately afterwards Sutcliffe was caught.

Leyland was dismissed and was greeted with the same stampede of children as the last batsman. So intense was their fervour that Duleepsinhji, who came in next, had to be escorted to the wicket by policemen.

When Duleepsinhji returned he was again mobbed by the crowd, which entirely surrounded him, cheering and patting him on the back.

The police came to the rescue, but Hendren, who came in next, ran into the same crowd, and only dispersed them by pretending to threaten them with his bat.

HOBBS' CENTURY.

Excitement had been growing among the spectators as Hobbs neared his hundred. Ninety-eight, ninety-nine, the score crept up by singles. Then, with a snick through the slips, he added one more to his long list of centuries.

When a few minutes later he was caught by Parfitt off Smith, the crowd swarmed almost down to the wicket, and he doubled down a lane of almost hysterical boys.

"Duleep" now had his revenge on the crowd. He went round with a box—and was highly successful. Mrs. Hobbs was also among those who collected.

The game drew to a close amid a crescendo of boundaries. Ball after ball went for four and six, and 32 was scored in two successive overs.

Wickets also were falling fast. O'Connor and Nichols were both caught on the boundary by Hobbs, and L. Hobbs went to join Hendren. The latter was stumped with the score one short of the third hundred. At this point stumps were drawn, and thus ended a memorable chapter in the history of Cambridge cricket.

STORY OF THE PLAY

The Cambridge side batted first.

The visitors were given a good reception, but it was seen that there were only ten fielders, and these included Cockerill, the Y.M. wicket keeper in place of Brooks. His position, however, was taken by Barrett, the St. Giles' wicket-keeper.

Nichols, the Essex fast bowler, who appeared in one of the "Tests," opened

the attack to Edwards at the Melbourne-place end.

Edwards opened carefully and with the fourth ball obtained a single with a stroke to leg. Leyland bowled from the opposite end, and with the fifth ball Edwards reached the boundary with a pull to leg. Duleepsinhji fielded a snick by Rose smartly, and two maidens followed.

Rose opened his account with a single from Nichols. He followed it with another at the other end, and Leyland bowled round the wicket instead of over.

Runs began to come faster, and Rose got three from Leyland. One of Nichols' "fasts" also went to the boundary for four byes.

A gasp arose from the crowd when Nichols was seen to shatter the wicket of Edwards. It was, however, a "false alarm," for the umpire signalled a no-ball.

EDWARDS OUT.

Twenty was sent up by Rose with a leg boundary off Nichols. With the score at 22 the first wicket fell, Leyland tying up Edwards with an off-spinner and clean bowling him.

E. Hobbs followed and opened with extreme care. For a time the score stood still, and Gover, the Surrey speed merchant, took over from Nichols. In the new bowler's first over Rose nearly ran himself out when he called for a single, but Hobbs did not reply. In the last ball Rose gave Duleepsinhji a high chance in the slips, and although he sprang to it, the chance was missed.

Hobbs sent Leyland to the leg boundary and four more runs were obtained from the same over. Forty was sent up in as many minutes, of which Rose had obtained over 20. He was batting very well and hitting hard. Once he lashed at Leyland and clean missed the ball, which went for a couple of byes.

HOBBS MISSES HOBBS.

A no-ball by Gover made the score 60, of which Rose had made 27. Jack O'Connor went on for Leyland, and in his first over Hobbs hit him hard and high to leg. Hobbs—THE Hobbs—was fielding near the boundary and missed what appeared to be quite an easy catch, thus giving the Cambridge side its second chance.

After playing a splendid innings of 34 Rose was bowled by O'Connor at 63. Rose stepped across his wicket in an effort to drive to leg, missed the ball, and was bowled round his legs. He scored three boundaries.

Fred Lilley, of the Borough Police, took his place, and got his first run by means of an overthrow. In the meanwhile Nichols had taken over again from Gover.

DULEEP. BOWLS.

Lilley drove Nichols for three to make the score 70, and Duleep then went on for the fast bowler. Lilley snicked a single from his opening ball, and Hobbs got a fine boundary with a strong drive to leg. After another single Lilley got four on the leg, making ten runs from the over.

The pace of scoring had quickened considerably, and runs were made from every ball in O'Connor's following over. With the first ball in his second over, however, Duleepsinhji got Lilley's leg stump. Lilley's 17 occupied very few minutes.

Parfitt then joined Hobbs, who had settled down. A drive past mid-on to the boundary by Hobbs raised the century in just over 80 minutes' play, and he knocked ten off an over from O'Connor.

By making the total 118, Hobbs made his own contribution 41, and afterwards survived an lbw appeal. He was severe on O'Connor, driving that bowler twice to the boundary in one over.

Meanwhile Leyland had returned to the attack, and he obtained his second wicket when he bowled Hobbs. His total was one short of 50, and knocked six 4's, the aggregate being 128 for these wickets.

Webster, the young Old Devonian, was the next batsman, and he smashed Leyland to the boundary. The ball went

with such force that it hurt a boy on the line.

After Parfitt had driven O'Connor to the boundary, Webster hesitated to the same bowler, and gave Duleepsinhji a catch in the slips about two yards from the wicket, the score being 139.

Joined by Kerridge, Parfitt helped to put on another ten before Jack Hobbs made one of those famous returns from cover to run out Kerridge.

Ayres had only just reached the wicket when Parfitt was tempted by O'Connor, missed the ball, and was stumped by Barrett. Seven wickets were thus down for 149 runs.

Tea was then taken, and the Cambridge side declared their innings closed.

A great crowd assembled before the pavilion and gave the famous English opening pair, Hobbs and Sutcliffe, a tremendous reception.

HOBBS AT THE WICKET

Pask opened the attack from the University Arms end, and Hobbs got a couple to the off from his fourth ball. The attack was shared by Smith, and Sutcliffe snicked him for a single. At the other end Sutcliffe survived an appeal by Pask for leg before, and with a fine stroke sent the following ball to the boundary.

Smith sent down a maiden of swingers to Sutcliffe, who could not get hold of them. The leg boundary was reached by Hobbs when he hit Pask for four.

The next over by Pask to Hobbs was a maiden, while Smith followed suit to Sutcliffe. Smith's first ball beat the Yorkshireman and almost clean bowled him. The sequence was broken when Hobbs again drove Pask to the leg boundary.

Smith was bowling remarkably well, and his succeeding over, which was to Hobbs, was also a maiden. His five overs had produced three runs.

Sutcliffe was harsh on Pask when he reached the boundary with two successive balls. Smith, however, bowled another maiden.

Taylor took over from Pask, and Sutcliffe sent his opening ball to the deep field boundary.

A dog was running about the pitch, and Sutcliffe caused amusement when he threw his bat at it.

SUTCLIFFE CAUGHT.

Off Taylor's following over, Sutcliffe got the first six of the match, also a four.

The 50 went up after half-an-hour's play, and for once in a while Sutcliffe was leading his partner.

The partnership was eventually broken when with the last ball of Taylor's third over Sutcliffe offered the bowler a catch which was immediately taken. Sutcliffe had hit 37 out of 57, and hit one six and five fours.

Leyland, another Yorkshireman, filled the breach, and opened his account with two runs. Hobbs was very subdued and scored mostly by singles.

A bowling change was made when Daisley took over from Smith, and eight were taken from his first over. Taylor was also relieved, Edwards going on in his stead.

Daisley's second over brought reward, for with his second ball he shattered Leyland's wicket with the score at 80. Leyland had obtained 15 and Hobbs was 27.

Crowds of youngsters, who patted him on the back, accorded Duleep a vociferous reception.

Further bowling changes were made when Pask and Ayres took over the attack, but runs were coming as fast as ever. A four and a two gave Hobbs 80, and "Duleep" made a beautiful snick through the slips.

CAMBRIDGE SCORE PASSED.

Duleepsinhji, with a single, sent up 150, and incidentally passed the Cambridge total. Laughter was caused when the batsmen sneaked a run and Pask broke the wicket without avail.

The batsmen were scoring from nearly every ball, and treating the crowd to some delightful strokes. With such stylists as Hobbs and "Duleep" together it can be imagined there was a feast of batting.

Hobbs was rapidly approaching the century mark, although he slowed down when nearing 90. This he reached with two singles, while Duleepsinhji's most spectacular shots were cuts.

A drive past the bowler to the boundary made Hobbs' score 95, and he followed it with two to the off. "Duleep" hit Pask to the leg boundary in splendid style, but two balls later he put up a easy catch to Parfitt, who held it at his second effort.

Duleepsinhji was absolutely mobbed by crowds of boys on his way to the pavilion. Joined by Patsy Hendren, Hobbs made two sharp singles to arrive at 99.

HOBBS OUT.

The necessary one to make his century was obtained with a snick through the slips. At 103, however, he "fell," sending up a catch to Parfitt off Smith.

He also had to make a dive into a dense crowd of boys, and was rescued by the police. His 103 included ten fours and one six.

With Hendren and O'Connor together, some amusing running between the wickets was witnessed during overthrows.

The pair took the score past the second century and made many attractive shots.

Hendren hit Ayres very hard, one stroke high into the air falling just inside the boundary. With four balls from Ayres he hit successive fours.

Lilley went on to bowl, and O'Connor got 16 from his first over, the strokes being 2, 4, 4, 6, making a total of 32 runs in two overs.

In trying to reach the boundary from the next over off Ayres, O'Connor was well caught near the line by E. Hobbs. Nichols, who was next to bat, opened his account with a four from the first ball. It was, however, his only score, for from a terrific hit to leg he was taken by E. Hobbs.

Hendren, who had been joined by Len Hobbs, completed his 50 with a six off Lilley, followed by two fours in the same over. His partner opened with a four to the off from a full pitcher.

With the score one short of the third hundred, Hendren fell to a smart piece of stumping by Cockell with his contribution 69.

Stumps were then drawn.
