LYNE AND CARTER SAVE CORNWALL SECONDS.

SECOND INNINGS STAND BRINGS IT OFF AGAINST DEVON II.

A fine stand by C. P. Carter and Lynes in the second innings enabled Cornwall II. to obtain a splendid victory over Devon II. at Camborne on Wednesday and Thursday. R. F. Hambly, of the Truro Club, bowled with remarkable success, and took six Devon wickets in the first innings.

Devon won the toss on Wednesday, and took first innings on an easy wicket. Williamson and Emmett opened to the bowling of Richards and Hambly. Emmett got a nice 6, but asked the next attempt, and was caught at point by Pearce. Stribley was quickly taken by Beard at the wicket, and the Devon skipper, Uren, was bowled with the first ball from Hambly, whose analysis at this stage read 15 overs, 20 runs, 5 wickets.

Lenden, a left-handed batsman, placed well to leg, and included some nice strokes in his score of 17 before being splendidly caught by Beard. No one else reached double figures. Williamson carried his bat through the innings for 37, and was batting for nearly three hours. The Cornish fielding was particularly good.

Cornwall opened their innings with Angwin and Pearce, to the bowling of Alford and Ostler. The latter kept a good length, and was difficult to score from. The Cornish skipper, C. P. Carter, the old South African Test cricketer, got a useful 15, when he was run out. Richards got three nice 4's in his score of 15 not out, and the innings closed for 90.

Devon opened their second innings shakily, Williamson being yorked by Richards, and Emmett being bowled by Hambly for 7. Kitchen and Stribley, however, stopped the rot. The former took his overnight score of 45 not out to 78 before being lbw to Carter, and Stribley obtained a useful 28. This stand released 77 runs. The innings closed at 141, leaving Cornwall to get 157 to win.

Cornwall commenced with Angwin and Pearce to the bowling of Alford and Ostler. The latter bowled both these men with the score at four. Bond and Rogers were both caught and bowled by the same bowler, and Hambly was caught by Stribley off Emmett, the score-board reading five for 36.

Lynes, the Falmouth professional, and C. P. Carter, however, gradually wore down the attack, and the score rose to 153, needing only four to win, when Carter was out to a remarkable one-hand catch by Turl at forward short-leg. Richards then joined Lynes, who made the winning hit amid great excitement.

Carter's 72 included five 6's and six 4's, and Lynes's 52 not out included five 4's. Scores:—

CRICKET GOSSIP.

THE COUNTY XI.

Cornwall opens its Minor Counties' championship matches against Devon on the Truro College ground on Friday and Saturday next, and if the team as selected turn out it should give a good account of itself.

The Cornish team was selected at Camborne on Wednesday evening at the conclusion of the day's play between the Cornwall and Devon 2nd XI's, and compared with the teams that have done duty in past years there is really very little alteration, although it is anticipated that the changes should go to strengthen the side.

The side selected is as follows:—H. Tresswina (captain), C. Shaw Baker (vice-captain), J. C. Colquhoun, J. P. Wallace, W. Rogers, C. P. Carter, J. Wills, Rogers (G.), Cory (W.), Ollerenshaw (H.), and Whiting (F.).

On paper this looks as about as strong an XI as Cornwall can put in the field, and as the team always do well on the Truro College ground, it can be confidently expected that a good fight will be put up against the Devon side.

The passing over of two such players as S. Rust and P. H. Kendall is to be regretted after their long association with county cricket, but even such players as these cannot go on for ever. It would have been a surprise if C. P. Carter had not been included, as on his present form—to say nothing of his record as a South African Test player—his claim could not be overlooked. The choice of wicket-keeper has fallen to the Camborne stumper, J. C. Colquhoun, and no doubt what influenced the committee more than anything else in his favour was that of the likely aspirants for this position he is by far the best bat. Had it not been for this probably the choice would have fallen on B. Dunn, the Troon player, or N. Beard, of Falmouth.

The passing over of P. H. Kendall for Whiting is the most criticised action of the Selection Committee, and public opinion certainly favours the inclusion of the Redruth bowler. The general impression is that Whiting is gone beyond county cricket just now, and his performances last year, when he failed to get even 50 wickets for the first time in his career, seems to point to the soundness of this criticism.

It was hoped that J. P. Wallace, of Newquay, would have been able to accept his place this year, but it was announced on Thursday that he would be unable to do so, and that W. J. Addison, of St. Just, would come into the side. The St. Just player can be depended upon not to let the county down, but it is rather a pity that some definite understanding cannot be come to between the Selection Committee and Wallace, as the same thing happened on several occasions last year.

W. Rogers, the Camborne slow bowler, played in one county match last year. This year he is undoubtedly the best bowler of his class in the county, and if he can play as required, he will considerably strengthen the county's bowling.

It is rather a pity that a place cannot be found for such a promising player as B. Dower (Troon), as he more than justified his inclusion in the side last year, but it is more than likely he will be in the team before the season closes, as Dower at present is getting a lot of runs, and is playing at the top of his form.

CORNWALL 2nd XI. BEAT DEVON 2nd XI.

There was a surprising finish to the Cornwall and Devon 2nd XI. match at Camborne on Thursday afternoon, and the Cornish boys sprung quite a surprise on the Devon side by winning by four wickets. There was no outstanding point in any of the play until C. P. Carter and Lynes came together. Cornwall had then lost five wickets for 82 runs, and they had been set the task of getting 158 runs to win. It looked all odds on a Cornish defeat, but the batsmen actually indulged in a partnership which produced 117 runs. The Devon bowling was completely collared, and the Cornish success proved very popular.

The game throughout was thoroughly enjoyed by both sides, and in fact the Devon boys, who were put up by members of the Camborne team, were delighted

with the reception that was given them. From a financial standpoint, however, the game was one that will have to go down as a complete failure, and I am afraid that even from a playing standpoint it failed in its mission to unearth any future county players, as the abilities of the likely players who took part were well known to the powers that be, apart from this game.

GAMBORNE v. TRURO.

Camborne and Truro indulged in a friendly game at Roskear on Saturday, and some very interesting cricket was witnessed. Camborne lacked the services of four of their regular players, and Truro were short of J. C. Elliott, but they had a good substitute in R. Alford, who played on the Camborne ground earlier in the week for Devon 2nd XI. against Cornwall 2nd XI. Truro won the toss, and decided to bat on an excellent wicket. Their start, however, was none too promising, and half the side was out for 84 runs.

F. Timmins and R. Alford helped matters a bit by putting on 16 runs for the sixth wicket, but Hambly failed to score, and eight wickets were down for 66 runs. J. E. Shearing survived an appeal for lbw of the first ball he received, and he afterwards settled down to score freely. The last wicket actually took the score from 85 to 123, Shearing's total being a well played 44 not out. He hit a 6 and seven 4's, and altogether his innings was a most creditable performance. J. E. Mill bowled remarkably well for Camborne, his analysis being 20 overs, 5 maidens, 48 runs, nine wickets. Seven of his victims were clean bowled.

Camborne's first wicket fell for three runs, but there was never any doubt about the result. G. Rogers batted splendidly for an innings of 51 runs, which included six 4's, and later F. Rogers and H. Bond took the score from 107 to 163 before stumps were drawn. F. Rogers' batting was of his best, and in his score of 71 he never gave a chance. He hit ten 4's, and finished very strongly. Camborne won by a margin of five wickets and 40 runs.

Both players tested all bowlers alike until Nicholls was put on, and he got Warren in his second over. Redruth were faced with 231 runs, and when Cory quickly lost Pearce matters looked none too hopeful, but K. Nicholls made a great stand with the Redruth captain, and although the Penzance bowling and fielding made scoring slow, the wickets did not fall. With five wickets in hand there was only fifteen minutes to play, but three of these were lost quickly. Harry and Johns, however, kept their end up until the last over was called, and Redruth secured a point from the most interesting match seen on the ground for the season.

GAMBORNE STILL WINNING.

It was unfortunate from a spectators' point of view that the home side did not put up a better show. They were all dismissed for 43 runs, the earlier batsmen being completely at sea with the slow deliveries of W. Rogers.

One of the most pleasing features of a delightful game was to find E. Polgreen in harness again. In fact, "Ned" captained the side with all his old skill, but he never had the resources at his command as when his side was successful in winning the cup and going through the League competition without a defeat.

After the match the Camborne players attended a dance organised by the St. Just Club, and two of their players took on the task of judging a fancy dress parade! It looks as if the Midsummer Day fixture between the clubs will continue for many years to come.

OLLEREARNSHAW LEAVING PENZANCE.

The surprise of the week has been the announcement that Ollerenshaw, the Penzance professional, will in all probability be leaving Cornwall at the end of the season. The difficulty at Penzance apparently is in finding Ollerenshaw a job during the winter months, and as cricket only runs for such a short season, the professional finds the months that he is out of work altogether too long, and evidently thinks that he can do better in his native county—Yorkshire. If, at the end of the season, he does actually leave the county, his departure will be regretted in all cricketing circles, as a better sportsman one could not wish to meet. It will also be a pity from a county standpoint, as Ollerenshaw is now qualified to play for the county, and his departure will mean a distinct loss to the county attack, to say nothing of his batting.

Both Camborne and Truro were free from League worries on Saturday, and these teams indulged in a very sporting and friendly encounter at Roskear, the honours of which went easily to the home side.

PENZANCE DROP A POINT.

Penzance dropped a point at Redruth on Saturday. Prior to this game they were three points behind Camborne, and now with another point gone, the gap between them and the Camborne Club is widening so much that they might find it very difficult to overtake the Camborne side in the race for the cup, especially as the Camborne Club is playing so well at the present moment. Redruth no doubt felt very pleased at securing the point, but the margin of runs was so wide at the finish that they must consider themselves a bit lucky.

Apparently the Penzance skipper lacked the courage to declare his innings closed when the score reached 200. Had he done so instead of batting right through for another 20 runs, his side would have won. With the bowling at his command this is rather surprising. Still, Redruth did no mean thing in standing up to the Penzance attack as they did, and they certainly deserve credit for what is quite a good performance.

TROON'S GREAT WIN.

Falmouth came a cropper at Troon, and after they had batted first and scored 161 runs. No doubt Falmouth thought they were safe with such a score, but if they did they must have had a rude awakening, for Troon actually got the runs for the loss of only two wickets!

This win must be regarded as one of the best performances that Troon has accomplished this season, and it clearly goes to prove that they are one of the most improved sides in the League, and one that can be depended upon to put up as good a fight as any.

DEVON EASILY OVERCOME.

GOOD BOWLING BY W. ROGERS AND WHITING.

In the first Minor Counties Championship match at Truro on Friday and Saturday Cornwall beat Devon by nine wickets.

Ten minutes after Devon had opened their innings on Friday they lost a wicket for 24. Goldie was clean bowled by C. P. Carter, missing the ball in an attempt to send it to the boundary. In a brief but vigorous innings he had three boundaries, with a total of 18. Goldie's partner at the opening was Fulcher, Carter and Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance professional, leading the attack. Both batsmen treated the bowling with respect, and four overs produced not a run, and Fulcher's shot for 2 was the only score in six overs. Whiting changed for Ollerearnshaw, and his fifth ball deceived Fulcher and sent his balls flying with the score at 32, to which Fulcher had contributed nine in half an hour. Hoare joined Falding, and both played a safe game. At 50 W. Rogers' slow bowling was substituted for Carter. A couple of overs later Whiting bowled Hoare, who had made 10 of the 54 total. Troike, who was missed by Baker before he had scored, lost his wicket to Rogers after making three. Four wickets were down for 69. When Amory and Falding had carried the score to the nineties, Ollerearnshaw and Whiting shared the bowling. The century was reached in 1½ hours' play.

BATSMEN IN DIFFICULTIES.

Devon struck a very bad patch after lunch, losing three wickets for one run. Baker settled Falding's account by catching him in the slips off Ollerearnshaw, and Amory was out lbw to Whiting, one run having been scored in the meantime. Six Devon wickets were down for 108, and with nothing more scored Ollerearnshaw got Redman out lbw. J. C. Vickery sent a ball from Whiting into Ollerearnshaw's hands, and the ninth wicket, Knapman's, went through a catch by Addicott off Carter. The score was 124 when Midgley joined Jennings. Jennings hit out, and Cory missed him when he eluded a ball boundary-wards. Two balls later Cory got him from a similar shot, from Whiting's ball. The innings closed for 146, compiled in 2½ hours. Five of the wickets fell to Whiting for 45 runs. Carter took two for 28, Ollerearnshaw two for 38, and W. Rogers one for 30.

Tressawna and Rogers (G.) opened for Cornwall, and Rogers put Midgley's first ball for 4. Vickery bowled at the other end. The scoring was steady, if not fast, and there was not a maiden over until 30 runs were scored. Jennings then took the ball from Vickery, and Amory took on from Midgley. Rogers sent his first delivery to the leg boundary. Tressawna missed a ball from Amory, and was bowled after making ten, one wicket being down for 37. C. Shaw Baker joined Rogers, and added five before getting out leg before to Amory. Two wickets were down for 52 when Cory came out. Rogers, who had been batting with confidence, had the hard luck to play on a ball from Midgley. He had been in 1½ hours, and made a bright 46. Cornwall's total was then 70 for three. Addicott and Cory batted with some freedom, though not incautiously, and the 100 was reached in 1½ hours. Falding was tried in place of Jennings, and his slow paced balls were hard to get runs from, and only three were scored in his first seven overs. Cory, who like Addicott gave no chances, reached the half-century, and a few runs later Devon's total was passed. The pair's really good batting had put on 77, and they looked well set when Addicott was run out through a misunderstanding. Knapman cleverly stopped a shot which Addicott thought was going past him. Cory did not attempt the run, and Addicott was more than halfway up the pitch when Knapman returned the ball. To the total of 185 this partnership had contributed 86. Wills' stay was short. He lost his wicket to a fast ball from Amory, which beat him utterly. Play closed with the score at 163 for five, Cory being 67 not out.

Cory was accompanied to the wickets by C. P. Carter when play was resumed on Saturday morning. The professional did not stay long, however. He got a beautiful 4 off Midgley, but the Plymouth player got his revenge just after by clean bowling him with a fine delivery. Carter never appeared comfortable, and his downfall was no surprise. Colquhoun and W. Rogers sent up the double century, the former batting very soundly. W. Rogers got three 4's off Midgley, but Vickery, who came on at the top end, succeeded in getting him lbw off the last ball of his first over.

PENZANCE PRO'S BRIGHT BATTING.

Ollerearnshaw followed, and at once commenced to bat brightly. He opened his shoulders splendidly to the Devon slow bowlers, and got them away to the boundary several times. It looked as if this partnership was going to produce a lot of runs, but with the score at 244 Colquhoun, in trying to turn Jennings to leg, cooked up an easy catch. Whiting followed, but Jennings bowled him with his second delivery. Ollerearnshaw batted splendidly for his 28 not out, and Cornwall's lead was 98 runs—quite a useful number.

Devon had about 20 minutes' batting before lunch, and they again opened with E. A. Fulcher and E. E. Goldie. The bowling appeared to give them no difficulties whatever. There were frequent changes, but neither looked like getting out, and at lunch time the score was 32, and Devon had all their wickets intact.

When play was resumed Goldie hit out fearlessly, and runs were coming very freely. The partnership, however, was broken at 71. Goldie, in trying to pull Ollerearnshaw around to leg, being clean bowled. Falding followed, only to snick the next delivery into the hands of Baker at first slip. W. Rogers since lunch had delivered two good overs, which kept the batsmen quiet, and in his third Fulcher was smartly stumped without any addition to the score. With three of their best batsmen out Devon were now in a bad way. Rogers added to their troubles by bowling Hoare, and then Troike and Amory made a determined stand. Both apparently made up their minds to stop the Camborne slow bowler, and endeavour to get runs off Ollerearnshaw and Whiting, and in this for some little time they succeeded.

Rogers deliveries, however, were very puzzling, and Troike at last determined to have a "go" at him, with the result that he missed the ball altogether and was stumped. The Devon captain was very subdued, although occasionally he got a four off Whiting. His attempts to stop Rogers however provided the spectators with some amusement, and at last he attempted a mighty hit, but the ball beat him completely and he was bowled.

Both E. B. S. Redman and G. B. Knapman were bowled with the first ball they received, Redman making no attempt to play the ball which broke right across the batsman and took his leg stump. Knapman was also surprised at the delivery which beat him all ends up. Jennings snicked a single and then stepped out to stop the ball. Colquhoun did the rest and also was responsible for sending Midgley back. The innings thus closed for 162 runs. Before lunch W. Rogers had 16 runs knocked off his bowling without success, but after lunch he took 8 wickets for 29 runs—a really remarkable performance. Ollerearnshaw had the other two for 44 runs. This left Cornwall 65 runs to win.

After tea G. Rogers and J. Colquhoun opened the Cornwall innings, and the runs were knocked off in half an hour. G. Rogers was caught by Hoare after he had made 22 in forcing the pace, and then C. Shaw Baker and C. Colquhoun played confidently and got the runs. Cornwall thus won by 9 wickets, a

CRICKET GOSSIP.

(By LEG-BYEL.)

Cornwall has made a brilliant start in the Minor Counties Championship, and if the team can reproduce the form they showed in the second day's play against Devon at Truro on Saturday they should occupy quite a respectable position in the championship table at the close of the season.

Whether Cornwall's nine wickets' victory is a record I am not prepared to say, although the older members of the team assured me after the game that they could not remember defeating Devon by such a large margin. Sufficient for me to say that the victory was well earned, and should do the county, XI. a lot of good.

When the game was resumed on Saturday morning I doubt if there was anyone present who anticipated such an ending. Indeed, many were the remarks made to me that Cornwall would never succeed in getting Devon out again as they did on the previous day, and everyone seem to take it for granted that there would possibly be a good day's cricket, with the result a draw, and Cornwall winning on the first innings. And they were quite content with such an ending.

There was one player, however, in the Cornish side that they had not reckoned many a long year, if ever at all, that a wicket, and that was W. Rogers, the Camborne slow break bowler. It must have bowled on such paradise of a batsman's wicket at the Truro College ground as has accomplished such a performance as Rogers did in this game, and it was really to this remarkable performance that Cornwall's victory must be credited. In saying this I do not want to detract in any way to the splendid batting of G. Rogers, W. J. Addicot and Cory on the previous day, and indeed to Whiting's bowling, when he captured five wickets. These all helped considerably, but I think everyone who saw the game will agree that W. Rogers was the man on Saturday who virtually carried Cornwall to victory.

From the manner in which he went about his business one would have thought that Rogers was playing in quite an ordinary League encounter. Indeed, he made most of the Devon batsmen look quite as simple as he does when playing in club cricket, and that he is the best bowler of his class playing in Cornwall to-day goes without saying. Writing these notes before the Cornish side to go on tour is announced, I can only hope that arrangements are made for him to accompany the side, but I happen to know some of the difficulties that, owing to the nature of his work, have to be surmounted for Rogers to play, and I can only hope that these difficulties can be got over by the powers that be. Every effort I know will be made in this direction.

Another great success in the match was J. C. Colquhoun, the wicket-keeper. Opinion in some parts of the county has been very strong as to the inclusion of this player, and those who knew his real work have often wondered why he was not chosen before. After Saturday's display there can be no question of his inclusion for future matches: in fact, I heard the opinion expressed in more than one quarter on Saturday that he was the ideal player for the future captain of the Cornish side! The most amusing part concerning his appearance against Devon was that he should have been put in in the batting list as No. 10. If the Camborne batsmen say anything at all, he is a player who should either open the innings or come in first wicket down. This was always his place at school and for the Kent 2nd XI.

The mistake, however, was rectified in the second innings, when he received rapid promotion, and was sent in to open the innings with his club mate.

Last week I referred to the fact that the fact that the general opinion was that Kendall should have been given the preference over Whiting, and this opinion was shared by almost everyone right up to the day of the match.

In the evening, however, Whiting dumbfounded his critics by taking five Devon wickets, and although he had no success on Saturday, it is quite evident that Whiting is one of the diamonds of the first class, and probably he has already cast his die for another season in county cricket. The fact remains, however, that sooner or later, and perhaps sooner than some expect, players like Whiting, Treawna, and possibly one or

two other will be leaving county cricket for good, and so far very few youngsters have been given the opportunity to come on and take their place in the county XI.

I am not altogether sure that every encouragement is given to the young player. Last year the county report was very loud in its praises concerning the success of Wills (Camborne) and Dower (Troon), who played in county cricket for the first time. There was no doubt about the success of their efforts when the team was on tour, yet against Devon Dower was passed over, whilst on Saturday one of the chief topics on the Truro ground was the failure of Wills the previous evening, when he was dismissed for five. Last year Wills, who is only 19 years of age, had an average of over 20 for the county, and this year he has an average of over 60 for his club, so even if he did fail on Friday, he only did what others have done.

In fact, he was not the only failure in the Devon match from a Cornish standpoint. I simply refer to this fact to point out how foolish it is to indulge in such criticism concerning young players as was the case of Wills, when every encouragement should be given to them, for in the next few years such youngsters will form the backbone of Cornish cricket.

No doubt the wisdom of Devon's defeat came as a surprise to their players, and probably there will be changes in the next side as a result. Looking through the team, however, there are not many changes in it as compared with former Devon sides for many years past.

Therefore, the Cornish win must go down as a really good performance. I cannot refrain from expressing the general satisfaction that was heard on all hands for the arrangements that were made by the Truro College staff for the game. Every convenience was made for the spectators, and the game was fought out on an ideal wicket. There is no doubt that nothing is left undone for the benefit of the county game at Truro, and whilst such pleasant conditions exist, the County Committee cannot ignore the claims of Truro for a county game, even if the gates are not exactly up to the standard of those further west.

LEAGUE CRICKET.

In view of the county game, League cricket was practically at a standstill on Saturday, only one match being played, where at Troon the home side followed up their recent successes with another win at the expense of Helston. Helston batted first, but could only score 116 runs, and these Troon obtained for loss of four wickets when the game was given up. Troon are certainly playing pretty strong cricket just now, and having dropped only six points, cannot yet be regarded as out of the running for League honours. If the Camborne side should make another slip, there is the possibility of some fun amongst them and the Troon and Penzance Clubs before the final is reached.

Next week the League matches will be renewed in real earnest. Camborne will visit Falmouth, and it being Navy week at the seaside town, a big crowd is expected to witness the game.

WIN FOR CATHEDRAL SCHOOL.

Truro Cathedral School beat Truro College at Trewinnard Court on Wednesday by 75 runs to 46.

Rain, which fell early in the day, made the wicket very tricky, and the slow bowlers of both teams were particularly effective.

The Cathedral School won the toss, and batted first. Gibson played a steady innings of 89 on a difficult wicket, but no one else stayed so long, and the last man was dismissed with the total at 75.

CORNWALL V. DEVON.

MINOR COUNTIES' MATCH AT TRURO.

Cornwall opened their series of county matches at Truro College cricket ground on Friday morning, when Devon were their opponents. There was one change in the Cornish team, W. J. Addicoat (St. Just) playing in the place of J. P. Wallace (Newquay). The weather was fine, and the wicket favoured the batsmen.

The umpires were Messrs. Boon and Storer, while the scorers were Mr. R. Rule and Rev. G. E. Davis, M.A.

Devon won the toss and elected to bat first. E. A. Fulcher and E. E. Goldie opened the innings, facing the deliveries of C. P. Carter, of Penzance, and Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance pro. Goldie got Carter nicely away to leg for four, and did the same thing off Ollerearnshaw. The same player hit two more fours in the same over off Ollerearnshaw, the over counting 12 runs. Carter soon met with a success when he tempted Goldie to hit out, and clean bowled him. The first wicket put on 24 runs, of which Goldie made 18, in 10 minutes. Falding (S. W.) now joined Fulcher at the wicket. Both bowlers kept an excellent length, and the batsmen could do very little with them. Eventually Ollerearnshaw gave way to Whiting. Off his fifth ball Whiting bowled Fulcher, who had made 9 out of a total of 32. With his total at 7, Falding gave a chance in slips, which was not taken, and the ball went to boundary. Carter was changed for W. Rogers, of Camborne. In the next over, Hoare was beaten by a ball from Whiting. The score was 54 for three wickets when W. J. Troke came in to bat. Troke was given a "life" when C. Shaw Baker missed him at short slip off Whiting. Troke could do nothing against Rogers' slow breaks, and eventually fell a victim to him. Rogers was also bowling well, only 12 runs being scored off 6 overs, Carter had only 19 made off 12 overs, and Whiting's analysis the same. Amory, the Devon skipper, seemed to get the measure of Rogers, and hit two fours off him. With the score at 92, Amory sent up the hundred after an hour and a-half's play. Falding, who went in first wicket down, was still batting, with 31 to his credit, and Amory had 24.

Things took on a different complexion after lunch, for Falding tried to put a ball from Ollerearnshaw through slips, and was out to a good catch by Baker. One run later Amory was out l.b.w. to Whiting. Devon now had 108 runs and 6 wickets down. Without a run added to the total, Ollerearnshaw got E. B. S. Redman l.b.w. A few runs later, Whiting sent back J. C. Vickery, who was out to a catch by Ollerearnshaw. With the score at 127, the ninth wicket fell, as Knapman skied a ball from Carter into Addicoat's hands at point. The two remaining batsmen, Jennings (T. S.) and F. W. Midgley gave some trouble. Jennings was missed in deep field by Cory, but the latter redeemed his mistake when he caught him in the same place. The innings closed for 145, the last wicket putting on 23 runs.

CORNWALL'S INNINGS.

H. Tresawna, the Cornish captain, and Rogers (G.), the Camborne pro., opened the innings for Cornwall. Runs came quickly in the first over, Rogers hitting the first ball by Midgley for a four, while four singles were added. J. C. Vickery bowled from the pavilion end. Vickery was taken off and Jennings (T. S.) was put on in his place, when Cornwall had scored 30, while J. H. Amory took the ball from Midgley. Runs now came slowly, and Amory hit Tresawna's off stump. The first wicket put on 37 runs, of which Tresawna made 10. C. Shaw Baker was next in, and the half-century went up with these two still in. When one more run was added, Baker was out leg before to J. H. Amory. Rogers had made 35 not out of the total. Cory (W.) joined Rogers, who was batting extremely well, but when within 4 runs of his half-century he had the bad luck to play on to his wickets from a ball from Midgley. The total was then 70 for three wickets. Rogers included five fours in his 46. W. J. Addicoat, of St. Just, was next in. Cory sent up 80

with a beautiful four to leg off Midgley. Cory was now batting in fine style, and was well backed up by Addicoat. Goldie was applauded for some fine fielding but the general standard of the Devon fielding was not so high as that of Cornwall. The hundred was signalled after an hour and three-quarter's play. Falding kept a good length, and though runs came fairly freely, the batsmen could take no risks with him, for his first seven overs only cost three runs. Addicoat, who started a little shakily, was now also batting with great confidence, and Cory reached his 50 out of a total of 145. A few minutes later the Devon total was passed with Cory and Addicoat still unseparated. A misunderstanding between the two led to Addicoat being easily run out. Addicoat made 35 out of 155, and the partnership put on 85 runs. J. Wills, of Camborne, came in, but never looked comfortable, and was beaten all the way by a ball from Amory, with the score at 163.

SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

TRURO, Saturday.

Cory and C. P. Carter resumed Cornwall's first innings at Truro this morning, the over-night total being 163 for five wickets. Cornwall thus having a lead of 17 with five wickets to fall. Amory and Midgley opened the bowling, and the latter worked Cory when he had made 64 out of a total of 175.

C. P. Carter did not last much longer, for the same bowler shattered his wickets.

After 50 minutes' play on the second day, the score reached 200, the batsmen being W. Rogers and J. C. Colquhoun, both of Camborne. Jennings gave way to Vicary who dismissed Rogers by getting him l.b.w.

Ollerearnshaw and Colquhoun then made an excellent stand. The eighth wicket fell for 204, but Colquhoun was not out until 243 runs were registered. He then played a ball back to Jennings, who took his first wicket for the match. Colquhoun made 18. Whiting was bowled by Falding, and the innings closed for 244, Ollerearnshaw being not out 28. Ollerearnshaw batted very freely, making some fine off-drives. The Cornish innings lasted about 4½ hours.

DEVON'S SECOND INNINGS.

When E. A. Fulcher and E. E. Goldie opened Devon's second innings, Cornwall held a lead of 98 runs. Whiting and W. Rogers shared the attack. Goldie punished Rogers, and he gave way to Carter.

Whiting, who had only 14 runs knocked off 11 overs, was changed for Ollerearnshaw. The two opening batsmen put on 50 after about an hour's play. When 71 was reached, Ollerearnshaw clean bowled Goldie who had made a very useful 48, including five fours. Falding (S. W.) was in next and was out first ball, being caught in slips by Baker, off Ollerearnshaw. Three balls later saw Fulcher's dismissal without a run being added. He was smartly stumped by J. C. Colquhoun, C. W. Rogers after making 25. Thus three wickets fell without a run being added. Troke was missed by Baker, off Ollerearnshaw, when he had made only 2 runs. W. W. Hoare could not stop the rot, for with 80 runs on the board, he played back to W. Rogers and hit his own stumps. Amory came in and steadied matters, so that 100 went up after Devon had been batting for about 90 minutes. Once more W. Rogers tempted the batsman to hit out, and Colquhoun stumped Troke, when 123 runs were registered. Troke's contribution was 30. E. B. S. Redman came in then and his first ball from W. Rogers, took off his leg ball. Rogers was bowling very well, his analysis being 4 for 34. G. B. Knapman fared little better, for he made no attempt to play an off ball from Rogers, and the ball broke in to hit the wicket. The batsmen's futile effort to hit Rogers caused the crowd to laugh. Amory fell another victim to Rogers' cunning, when he had compiled 27 runs. Eight wickets were down for 138 when Jennings (T. S.) went in. He made a single, and then stepped out to a ball from Rogers, and was stumped by Colquhoun. The innings closed for 152,

F. W. Midgley being caught behind the stumps off Rogers. Vicary was not out with 13. The feature of the innings was the fine bowling of W. Rogers, who took 8 wickets for 45.

CORNWALL'S SECOND INNINGS.

Cornwall needed 55 runs to win when they went in for the second time. Tresawna did not open the innings with Rogers (G.), and Colquhoun took his place. Rogers was missed by Vicary when he was 5. Runs came fairly quickly, and Amory went on in the place of Vicary. Being in a hurry to get the runs, Rogers hit out and skied a ball from E. A. Fulcher, and was caught by the wicketkeeper, W. W. CORNWALL'S KNOCK-OUT BLOW TO DEVON

W. ROGERS' BOWLING FEAT

Cornwall achieved a brilliant victory over Devon by nine wickets in the first match of their Minor Counties programme, at Truro College ground, on Friday and Saturday. The Devonians made a moderate start on Friday, putting on 146, but at the close of the day's play Cornwall were in a strong position, having passed their opponents' total with only five wickets down. On Saturday Cornwall increased their overnight score from 163 to 244, thus gaining a first innings lead of 98 runs.

Cricket of a sensational character marked Devon's second innings. They knocked off 71 of the arrears before losing a wicket, and there were visions of the game ending in a draw, with Cornwall taking major points on the first innings lead. But a surprise was in store for the spectators. Three Devon wickets fell at 71, and then W. Rogers got to work and polished off the remaining batsmen, the innings closing at 152. Cornwall required only 85 to win, and they got them for the loss of one wicket, thus registering a brilliant win by nine wickets, one of their best performances in the competition.

Taking first knock on an excellent wicket, Devon appeared to be none too comfortable against the bowling of Carter and Ollerearnshaw. With only 24 runs on the board, shaw was clean bowled by Carter. After about half an hour's play, Whiting relieved Ollerearnshaw and with the fifth ball of his first over the county's old warrior broke Fulcher's wicket with a lovely ball. Fulcher had been in from the start making his nine runs. Falding and Hoare carried the total to 54, when Whiting bowled the latter, and 15 runs later W. Rogers captured the fourth wicket, with the score at 69. The visiting captain, Amory, and Falding stopped the rot, and the rate of scoring briskened. This pair were together at the lunch interval, the score having reached 107.

Things went badly for Devon on the resumption, Falding being smartly caught by Baker off Ollerearnshaw, after being at the wicket for about two hours. The South Devon prop, by cautious play at a critical period, for his side had collected 32 runs, which was the highest individual score in the first innings. Further trouble was in store for the Devonians, as Amory lost his wicket to Whiting with the next fall, his contribution being 31. In the next over Redman was sent back, three wickets having fallen for the addition of only one run to the lunch score. Knapman and Vickery were disposed of after 16 runs had been added. Jennings and Midgley put on 23 runs for the last wicket, the innings closing for 146. Cory caught Jennings in deep field after having missed a similar catch at the same spot two balls earlier. The Cornish bowling and fielding was exceptionally good, and it was a creditable performance to dispose of Devon for a moderate score. Bowling honours went to the veteran Whiting, who came through with the excellent analysis of 26 wickets, eight maidens, 44 runs, five wickets. Cornwall made a promising start, Tressawna and G. Rogers putting on 37 in just over half an hour, before the Cornish captain fell a victim to the Devon captain. When the half-century was reached, Shaw Baker was out for obstruction, Amory being the bowler. Cory partnered Rogers, and this pair were batting confidently, but with the score at 70, Rogers played a ball from Midgley on to his wicket, his contribution being 46. A fine stand by Addicot and Cory enabled the Cornishmen to top their opponents' total before a separation was effected. Addicot attempted a sharp run, but a smart return by a fieldman caused him to lose his wicket. The total was then 153 for four wickets, the partnership having yielded 85 runs. In the last over Amory bowled Wills for five, and Cornwall left off 16 runs ahead, with five wickets in hand.

Devon Batsmen in Trouble

When Cornwall resumed with Cory and Carter, on Saturday morning, the score was taken to 175 when Cory's wicket was taken by Midgley, the Redruth man having added only seven runs to his overnight score of 57. Cory batted attractively, and had the best individual score. Carter was sent back after one run had been added. The double century was hoisted by Colquhoun and W. Rogers, but at 204 the latter was out l.b.w. to Vickery. Strong hitting by Ollerearnshaw improved Cornwall's position, and 243 was on the board before Colquhoun returned a soft catch to Jennings. After a single had been added, Whiting was bowled by Falding. The innings closed with Cornwall leading by 98 runs.

Devon looked well on the way to wiping out the arrears without loss, Fulcher and Goldie knocking up 71 before the first wicket fell, Goldie being clean bowled by Ollerearnshaw after making 46, which included five boundaries. With his next delivery Ollerearnshaw got Falding caught in the slips by Baker. Three balls later Fulcher was sent back Colquhoun having stumped him when he stepped out to hit W. Rogers. Things had taken a bad turn for Devon, three wickets having fallen with the score at 71. Troke was let off in the slips by Baker off Ollerearnshaw's bowling, and at 82 Hoare succumbed to W. Rogers. The rot was stopped by Amory and Troke, this pair raising the total to 123, when the latter was stumped by Colquhoun off Rogers, who with his next delivery captured Redman's wicket.

Rogers was having a merry spell, mystifying the batsmen with his slow left-hand break bowling. He played further havoc with the Devon batsmen, dismissing Knapman at 129, and nine runs later he spread Amory's wicket. The ninth wicket fell at 142, Colquhoun stumping Jennings off Rogers' bowling. Vickery and Midgley put on 10 for the last wicket, Colquhoun catching Midgley behind the wicket, bringing Rogers' bag of wickets to eight, obtained at a cost of 45 runs. The collapse of Devon after a good start in their second venture was mainly attributable to Rogers' effective bowling, and Colquhoun's alertness behind the stumps. This was Rogers' best bowling performance for the county, but in club cricket he has several better records to his credit.

Cornwall were set the easy task of getting 55 runs to win. George Rogers and Colquhoun being sent out first. They collected runs rapidly, 42 being registered before Rogers cocked up a ball from Fulcher, for Hoare to take an easy catch behind the wicket. Baker joined Colquhoun, and the requisite runs were obtained in just under half an hour, and Cornwall achieved a brilliant victory by nine wickets.

MONMOUTH BATSMEN KEPT IN CHECK

Cornwall's bowlers had a merry time on a wet wicket at Ebbw Vale yesterday against Monmouthshire in the Minor Counties Competition.

There was a blank morning, while the pitch was recovering from a torrential downpour, and during the afternoon play was again interrupted owing to rain.

From the commencement the Cornish bowlers shaped exceedingly well, while Monmouth's opening batsmen, determined to play bright cricket in spite of the adverse conditions, threw discretion to the winds and paid the penalty. Dally was out immediately after lunch, with the total advanced to 79, he put his pad to the first ball sent down by Kendall and was l.b.w. In the next half-hour Cook and Wilson added 34 runs.

Cook hit another 6 with a fine pull off Whiting, and before the storm set in the Surrey captain claimed two 6's and two 4's—a fine example of forcing the game while the wicket was easy.

BERKSHIRE OUTPLAY CORNWALL

INITIAL ADVANTAGE QUICKLY LOST

Brilliant batting and bowling enabled Berkshire completely to outplay Cornwall at Reading yesterday.

Starting off by dismissing Cornwall in 2½ hours for 123 runs, the home county took the lead with six wickets in hand, and, thanks to a brilliant century by Major Carr, scored 320 for six and wound up with a lead of 197 runs with four wickets to fall.

In at the fall of the third wicket at 44, Carr cut and drove to such effect that he completed 100 out of 201 in two hours, and so far has made 138 in 2 hours 25 minutes, having got the ball to the boundary 19 times.

Having been struck on the ankle by a fast ball at the Oval, H. Trosawna was too lame to play, and the captaincy of Cornwall was entrusted to Cory, a professional.

CORNWALL LOSE THEIR ADVANTAGE.

Cory certainly made a good start by winning the toss, but Cornwall quickly threw away their advantage of batting first on an easy pace wicket, half the side being out in an hour and a half for 67 runs.

Cory and Rogers had put on 27 runs for the opening partnership, when the deputy-captain hit a ball to cover and called for a run. Rogers failed to respond, however, and Cory was run out.

In a short while three men were out for 39, Dower having his wicket smartly thrown down from cover by Carr. Ollerearnshaw, who completed the Cornwall side, made several fine strokes before being snapped at the wicket.

CORNWALL BEATEN BY AN INNINGS

UNAVAILING EFFORT BY OLLEREARNSHAW

In spite of a plucky display of batting by Ollerearnshaw, Cornwall met with their first defeat at Reading on Saturday, Berkshire winning by an innings and ten runs. Incidentally, it was Berkshire's first success this season.

A series of showers in the morning delayed the resumption until a quarter to twelve, and, with the Berkshire captain declaring at the overnight total of 320 for the loss of six wickets, Cornwall had to score 197 runs to save being defeated by an innings. The task was beyond them, for, going in on a damaged pitch, the visitors were all out by 3.30 for 187.

At first when the wicket was soft on top the ball appeared to come through at a nice even pace, but as time went on the bowlers, and Mundy in particular, made the ball lift in a disconcerting fashion.

The day's play produced two outstanding feats, Ollerearnshaw hitting up a brilliant 68 for Cornwall when a collapse seemed certain, and the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant taking six consecutive Cornwall wickets at a cost of 51 runs before being given a rest.

CORY'S SMASHING START.

Starting his innings with three boundary strokes, Cory's opening partnership with Rogers yielded 41 runs in half an hour, before the latter played outside an innings. The first 30 runs occupied only three-quarters of an hour, and then Cory, having hit a further four, was easily caught at forward short leg after scoring 32 out of 66 in rather more than an hour's splendid batting.

Dower's dismissal by the next delivery was distinctly unfortunate, inasmuch as the ball from Remnant kicked up, and the batsman was caught off his glove. Addicoat batted quite well, until at 79 he mistimed a stroke, and was caught at mid-on.

Taylor, as in the first innings, played good forcing cricket. His first three scoring strokes sent the ball flashing to the boundary, but when he fell to a good catch at cover point half the Cornwall side were out for 90.

OLLEREARNSHAW'S GREAT EFFORT.

At lunch time the visitors still needed 91 runs to put their opponents in again, and it was then that Ollerearnshaw made his great effort, Lynes defending stubbornly while helping to put on 37 runs for the sixth wicket.

Ollerearnshaw, making full use of his long reach, went well out to the pitch of the ball, and brought off a number of delightful off drives. He was eventually caught off a slider at mid-off. He went in when three men were out for 65, and was seventh to leave at 167. He made his 66 out of 103 in an hour and 25 minutes. Apart from a difficult chance to Sayles in the long-field when 35, his display was faultless, and on eight occasions he despatched the ball to the boundary.

The last three wickets, however, fell for 18, and the end came suddenly, when Cornwall required no more than 10 runs to avert an innings defeat. The Hon. R. J. F. CORNWALL v. DORSET AT LISKEARD

EXCITING STRUGGLE FOR FIRST INNINGS POINTS

CORNWALL BOWLERS IN GREAT FORM

BRILLIANT START AGAINST MONMOUTH

The feature of yesterday's play between Cornwall and Monmouth at Camborne was the remarkable collapse of Monmouth at the outset of the day's play and Cory's magnificent century for Cornwall during the afternoon.

Within an hour and a quarter Monmouth were all out for a paltry 57, whilst Cornwall, batting all the afternoon, knocked up 247, thus getting a lead of 190 on the first innings.

MONMOUTH COLLAPSE.

Hodges and Lawday opened the innings for Monmouth, and trouble started almost at once. Hodges tipped the last ball of the second over into the hands of C. S. Baker, and Whiting made short work of Webb. Jenkin was caught by Stoneman at square leg for 3, making 5 wickets down for 11 runs. Within two minutes the fourth wicket fell, Lawday being caught for 7.

After being once missed by Baker, Raikes was clean bowled by Carter for one. Ralph was lbw from a ball by Carter before he could score, and Carter also dismissed Gwatkin for a "duck." Play had only been in progress 45 minutes, and already seven wickets were down for 19. Within the hour Wilcox was out lbw for a "duck," with the total 8 for 25.

Roff, who had been playing steadily, began to hit out, and made some nice strokes before he was caught in the deep field for 26. Nine wickets were now down for 45, and Harris and Spary took the score to 57, when, after 1 1/2 hours' play, Harris was caught by Whiting for 9.

OVATION FOR WHITING.

Whiting, who had taken six wickets for 21, was given an ovation when he came off the field, and a collection which was afterwards made for him realized £5. Carter also bowled splendidly, and dismissed four batsmen for 32.

Cornwall went in to bat before lunch, opening the innings with Cory and Rogers (G.). Rogers, however, fell an early victim, and Addicot joined Cory, and the pair made a capital stand, batting steadily and taking no unnecessary risks, so that Cornwall's total was 97 before Addicot was caught by Ralph. Baker came in next, and despite the keenness of the fielding, which made run-getting difficult, contributed a useful 26 before being stumped by Wilcox.

FINE INNINGS BY CORY.

The next three wickets fell rather cheaply. Cory, who had played a magnificent innings, was caught brilliantly by Jenkins for 110. He had batted for 3 1/2 hours, and he was loudly applauded as he returned to the pavilion. Taylor and Stoneman contributed some bright play before Taylor was bowled for 4, and Cornwall's innings realized 247. Play will be resumed this morning at 11.30.

MONMOUTH SHOCKED CORNWALL'S VICTORY AT CAMBORNE

Monmouth never recovered from a disastrous start against Cornwall in a Minor Counties championship match at Camborne, on Friday, and soon after the lunch interval on Saturday they were beaten by an innings and 47 runs. Seven Monmouth wickets fell for less than 20 runs on Friday morning, and the whole side was dismissed for 57 runs in 90 minutes. To account for the series of failures in their reliable run-getters is perplexing. It was not because the wicket was of extreme help to the Cornwall bowlers, nor was it that the bowlers achieved a higher standard of attack than is generally expected from them. It was Whiting who wrought the damage. His first six overs were maiden, and accounted for four wickets—a remarkable record.

The chief reason for much of the indifferent batting of the visiting county was because some of them imagined that the bowling was charged with more treachery and guile than was actually the case. The early batsmen appeared to concentrate on defence, hoping that if they stayed there runs would come. Had resolute forcing tactics been adopted after the early reverses, Monmouth would have returned a total more in keeping with their reputation.

Cornwall batsmen showed more enterprise, and registered a total of 247, chief honours going to Cory and Addicoat, who put on nearly 80 for the second wicket. Cory compiled a delightful century by attractive and forceful batting. Monmouth were set a by no means light task of getting 190 runs to avert an innings defeat. They improved upon their first day's display, putting on 143 before their second venture closed, but they were 47 runs short, and Cornwall thus triumphed by an innings and 47 runs.

Winning the toss, Monmouth decided to bat first on what appeared to be an easy wicket, but they soon met with reverses. With three runs on the board, Hodges was caught in the slips by Baker off Whiting, and four runs later Webb was bowled by Whiting. The third wicket fell with the score at 11, Jenkins, being caught by Stoneman off Whiting. After 32 minutes Lawday, who opened the innings, was smartly taken in the slips by Baker off Whiting, he having made seven out of 14 runs.

Whiting's Maiden Overs.

The veteran Cornish bowler, Whiting, was almost unplayable, his first six overs being maiden, and yielded four wickets—a remarkable feat. The Monmouth captain, K. C. Raikes, gave a chance to Baker after notching a single, but Carter's next delivery reached his stumps, and half the side were out for the amazingly small score of 16 runs. Three balls later Ralph was out for obstruction, Carter claiming his wicket, and the procession of batsmen from and back to the pavilion continued. Gwatkin was bowled by Carter, Monmouth's position after 45 minutes' play being 19 runs for the loss of seven wickets.

The steady nature of the Cornwall attack and the keen fielding made run-getting difficult. The visiting county's batsmen played with extreme caution in an endeavour to stem the flowing tide, but their efforts met with little reward. Wilcox survived an appeal by Carter for obstruction, but the ex-South African Test player claimed Wilcox's wicket with his next delivery. With eight wickets down for 26 runs, Monmouth were in a terrible plight, but Roff, who went in at the fall of the third wicket and made the longest stay, decided to adopt aggressive methods. He hit Carter for a six and a boundary off successive balls, and in attempting another big hit, he was caught by George Rogers near the boundary line.

Roff had made 26 out of 45 when the ninth wicket fell in just under one hour. Harris and Spary put on 12 runs for the last wicket, the whole side being polished off for 57 runs in 90 minutes. The success of Cornwall in dismissing Monmouth so cheaply was in a large measure due to Whiting, who came out with the fine analysis of 15 overs, six maidens, 21 runs, four wickets, and his club mate, Carter, also did creditably, claiming four wickets for 38 runs, in 15 overs.

Cornish folk were ready to acknowledge Whiting's valuable services to his county, not only in this match, but over a long period, and when the hat went round on his behalf, nearly £5 was collected.

Cornwall opened their innings with Cory and George Rogers about 35 minutes before the lunch interval, against the bowling of Spary and Raikes. With the score at 19, Rogers, who had been far from comfortable, was out l.b.w. to Spary, his contribution being three. Addicoat joined Cory, and at the adjournment the score stood at 23 for one wicket. On resuming, both batsmen settled down to score at a fair pace, and the Monmouth total was passed without further loss. When the score was three short of the hundred mark, Addicoat was smartly caught by Ralph off Harris, after making 46 by sound batting. Soon afterwards Cory gave a hot return to Raikes, who failed to hold it. Cory and Baker raised the score to 159 before the third wicket fell, the latter being stumped by Wilcox for 26.

At the tea interval, Cornwall were 102 runs ahead, with seven wickets in hand, but when play was resumed, three wickets fell quickly. Colquhoun, Ollerearnshaw, and W. Rogers being disposed of for an addition of 14 runs. Stoneman and Cory made a good stand, and the double century was hoisted after 3½ hours' batting. After completing his century, Cory batted with less restraint, and after putting on ten more runs, he was brilliantly caught by Jenkins off Harris.

Cory received a well-deserved ovation for his sterling innings. He batted attractively and powerfully for over three hours, and would have had a lot more runs but for exceptionally smart fielding, particularly by Gwatkin, who did brilliant work in the outfield. After hitting a boundary, Taylor had his stumps disturbed by Harris, Carter and Stoneman were aggressive, and 243 was reached before the former was caught out. Whiting made a short stay, and the innings closed for 247, Stoneman being 21 not out. Cornwall had reason to be satisfied with their position at the close of the day's play, being 190 runs ahead.

Second Innings.

Monmouth suffered two early reverses when they opened their second innings on Saturday morning, losing Hodges and Ralph with only six runs on the board. In his second over Whiting got Hodges caught in the slips by Baker, and a few minutes later Colquhoun caught Ralph behind the wickets off Ollerearnshaw. The third wicket fell at 14, Jenkins being caught by Taylor off Ollerearnshaw. Events augured a repetition of Monmouth's dismal failure on the previous day, but Lawday and Roff stopped the rot, carrying the score to 35 before the next dismissal. Lawday, who opened the innings, remained for 48 minutes to make nine runs, before he was bowled by Ollerearnshaw. Raikes and Roff enlivened matters, scoring at a good pace, and 90 was reached in about as many minutes. This pair appeared to be well set, and changes were made in the bowling. W. Rogers relieved Whiting at the pavilion end and Carter substituted Ollerearnshaw at the other end. With the score at 94, Rogers bowled the Monmouth skipper, Raikes, and with the score unaltered, Webb fell a victim to the same bowler, who was causing the batsmen considerable uneasiness with his slow left-hand break deliveries. At the lunch interval five wickets had fallen for 109 runs. Soon after the resumption Gwatkin was brilliantly caught and bowled by Whiting, who jumped to hold a hard return with one hand. Wilcox, the visiting stumper, succumbed to the wiles of Rogers, who tempted him to come out to meet the ball, but he missed it, and Colquhoun smartly whipped off the balls. Roff, who had batted solidly for more than 90 minutes, was caught in the slips by Baker off Whiting, after making 85. CORNWALL V. MONMOUTH

CORNWALL WIN BY INNINGS AND 47 RUNS

Sensational cricket was witnessed at Camborne on Friday morning, when Cornwall met Monmouth in a two days' match in connection with the Minor Counties Championship. Monmouth, who won the toss, were dismissed for the remarkably small total of 57, thanks to the splendid bowling of Whiting, the Cornwall veteran pro., and F. Carter, of Penzance. Whiting took six of the Monmouth wickets for 20 runs, at an average of 3.5 per wicket. Carter secured 4 wickets for 32 runs, at an average of 8.

Cornwall have previously met Monmouth this season in Wales, when the game was abandoned owing to rain. There were two changes in the Cornwall side, H. F. Taylor, of Liskeard, and E. Stoneman, of Boconnoc, taking the places of H. Treawna and Kendall. C. Shaw Baker, of Penzance, captained the Cornish side.

Monmouth won the toss and elected to bat on a wicket which was slightly in favour of the bowlers. A. E. Hodges and E. E. Lawday opened their innings, to the bowling of C. P. Carter, of Penzance, and F. Whiting. The innings opened disastrously for Monmouth. Carter took the first over, from which three runs were scored, but, with no runs added, off Whiting's first over, Hodges snicked the ball into the slips, and was well caught by C. Shaw Baker.

G. A. Webb took the place of Hodges, who had made 1. Whiting was again successful two or three overs later, for, with only 7 runs on the board, he clean bowled Webb with a beautiful off-break. H. H. Jenkins, who followed Webb, was no more successful, for he turned a ball from Whiting into Stoneman's hands at forward shortleg.

Three wickets were now down for eleven runs, when R. W. P. Roff came in. F. E. Lawday, who went in first wicket, was the next victim to Whiting's bowling, when he fell to a very fine catch in the slips by Baker.

In 32 minutes four wickets had fallen for the small total of 14 runs, and Whiting claimed all four.

K. C. Raikes, the Monmouth skipper, now came in to bat, but after he had made only 1, he was clean bowled by Carter, who was bowling very well.

In the same over A. R. Ralph was lbw. to Carter, before he had opened his score. The sixth wicket fell with the total at 15.

H. J. Gwatkin failed to stop the rot, as Carter yorked him for a "blob." Roff was given a "life" when he narrowly missed being caught and bowled by Whiting.

Willcox was in difficulties with Carter, and, after surviving one appeal for lbw., fell a victim in the same over. Roff, who seemed to be the only man to face the bowling, hit Carter for 6 to leg. This was the first boundary for the match. He later drove Carter to the boundary for 4, and did the same to Whiting. Attempting to hit Whiting again for 4, he was well caught in deep field by George Rogers, the Camborne pro. Roff had compiled 26 out of 45 runs.

The 50 went up after an hour and ten minutes play.

The innings closed when Harris was caught and bowled by Whiting, Monmouth's total being 57 after an hour and a-quarter's play.

CORNWALL'S FIRST INNINGS.

Rogers (G.) and Cory (W. D.), the Camborne and Redruth professionals, opened Cornwall's first innings, facing the deliveries of H. Spary and K. C. Raikes. Runs came fairly quickly, and Cory turned Spary to leg for 4. Rogers was not comfortable, and when he had made three runs he put his leg in front of a straight one from Spary. The score was then 19.

Addicoat, of St. Just, joined Cory, and Spary gave way to Harris, the slow bowler.

Spary and Raikes bowled again after lunch, but did not make much impression on Cory and Addicoat, who sent up the 50 after about an hour's play.

Hodges and Harris replaced Raikes and Spary. Cory hit Hodges for 4 with his first over, and, as runs came at a steady pace, Roff displaced Harris.

Addicoat and Cory were still together when Addicoat sent up 80 with a nice shot to leg.

When Cornwall were three short of the century, Addicoat fell to a good catch at mid-off by Ralph off the bowling of Harris.

Addicoat had compiled a splendid 47. The century appeared on the board after about an hour and a half's play, with Cory and C. S. Baker batting. Cory continued to hit with great confidence, and reached his 50 with a lovely drive for 4.

The Monmouth fielding was excellent and not a run was given away. Cory was given a life when he hit one very hard straight back to the bowler Raikes, who dropped it.

Gwatkin was applauded for fine fielding on the boundary. Runs now came very rapidly in spite of many changes in the bowling.

Eventually C. Shaw Baker hit out at Harris, missed, and was smartly stumped by Willcox. Baker claimed 26 of the 59, and at this point Cory was 67 not out.

After tea J. C. Colquhoun partnered Cory, but after scoring 2 runs was clean bowled by Harris. Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance pro., was next in, but did not last long. He hit a ball from Harris; it was a beautiful shot, but it went straight into the hands of G. A. Webb, fielding nearly on the boundary line. Webb missed it at the first attempt but caught it as it was falling. W. Rogers had a short stay, for he skied a ball from Harris, and was caught by Raikes, after making 2. E. Stoneman went in with the score at 177 for 6. Stoneman and Cory continued to bat steadily and sent the 200 up after about three hours and a half's play.

CORY REACHES HIS CENTURY.

Spary then went on with the new ball, but Cory hit him for four to reach his century. Cory's hundred was a very fine effort. He hit well all round the wicket, but more particularly on the off side, and played very attractive cricket. None of the bowlers worried Cory, and his score would have been larger but for the excellent fielding of the visitors. With the score at 210 Cory was out to a brilliant catch by Jenkins, off Harris. Cory was given a great ovation when he reached the pavilion, after making 110. H. J. Taylor, who was next in, did not stay long, being bowled by Raikes, after making four. Raikes put every man except one on to the off side, and Stoneman, who was batting well, took advantage of this, and hit to leg. Carter made 12, and was then caught in deep field by Ross, off Raikes' bowling, with the score at 243, for 9 wickets. The innings closed for 247, when Whiting was caught by Gwatkins off Raikes. Stoneman was still undefeated with 21 to his credit.

A collection was taken on the ground for Whiting, which amounted to 24 16s. 3d.

SATURDAY'S PLAY.

The two days' match in the Minor Counties Championship between Cornwall and Monmouth was resumed at Camborne on Saturday morning.

MONMOUTH'S SECOND INNINGS.

CAMBORNE, Saturday.

When Monmouth started their second innings to-day at Camborne, they needed 190 runs to avert an innings defeat. There had been little rain during the night, and the wicket was not affected very much.

The innings opened very disastrously. The first batsmen were A. E. Hodges and E. E. Lawday, who faced Ollerearnshaw and Whiting. Hodges was soon out in the same manner as on Friday, for he snicked a ball from Whiting and was smartly caught by C. S. Baker, fielding in the gully.

There were only 5 runs on the board when Hodges' wicket fell, and with only one run added, Ollerearnshaw got A. R. Ralph caught behind the stumps by Colquhoun before he had scored.

Without a run to his credit, H. H. Jenkins was missed in the slips by Ollerearnshaw off Whiting. Jenkins did not last much longer, as he was easily caught by H. J. Taylor in the slips from Ollerearnshaw's bowling. The third wicket fell at 14 after 28 minutes' play.

R. W. P. Roff and Lawday looked like making a stand, and Roff hit two or three boundaries. Lawday, however, had his stumps shattered by a good ball from Ollerearnshaw after making 9.

The score was 35 for 4 when K. C. Raikes partnered Roff. The latter and Raikes were still together when the half century appeared after an hour's batting.

At this period, C. P. Carter replaced Ollerearnshaw, but Raikes and Roff continued to hit freely and the score mounted rapidly. W. Rogers took the ball from Whiting. Roff and Raikes put on 35 in 20 minutes and Roff reached his 50 out of a total of 94. Raikes backed him 28 well, but with his score

at 23, he was bowled by W. Rogers. This pair had raised the score from 35 to 94 for 5 wickets, putting on 59 runs.

G. A. Webb, who went in next, was never comfortable when facing Rogers, who eventually bowled him for a "duck."

Roff and H. J. Gwatkin sent up the century, after an hour and 50 minutes' play.

At the lunch interval the total was 111 for 6 wickets.

After lunch, Roff and Gwatkin put on 10 more runs before Gwatkin was out to a beautiful one-handed catch by Whiting. Gwatkin had made 8 runs.

Willcox, the Monmouth wicket-keeper, made 0 runs before he was smartly stumped by Colquhoun from one of Rogers' deliveries.

Roff's long innings was soon to end, for with the score at 142, Baker caught him in the slips off Whiting. This was a very hard catch. Roff had made 85 out of a total of 142, and his score took about an hour and a half of good cricket. The innings closed one run later for 143, when Spary tried to hit out at Rogers and was well caught in deep field by Taylor.

Cornwall thus won by an innings and 47 runs.

The opening batsmen for the visitors were J. E. G. Rowland and H. Cresswell, and Cornwall opened the attack with Whiting and Rogers.

The innings opened disastrously for Berkshire. Whiting bowled a mauler over, and then Rogers took the ball. Off his fourth ball he made Cresswell play back, and clean bowled him. There was not a single run scored when Cresswell made his way back to the pavilion. J. H. Human, the incoming batsman, however, showed no respect at all for Rogers' bowling, and he went out to meet the ball, hitting three fours in succession. Rowland had a narrow escape when he nibbled at a ball from Whiting, but the ball went just a little too far for Addicoat to catch it, although he made a very good attempt. Human continued to score off Rogers, but Rowland was never at his ease when facing the "goofy" bowler, and fell a victim to his wiles. With the score at 25, Rogers shattered his stumps. Rowland's contribution was 5.

Whiting was keeping an excellent length, and it was not until his seventh over that a run was scored off him. The game was adjourned soon afterwards owing to rain.

Human and A. Norris continued to get runs, and C. P. Carter went on to bowl instead of Whiting, but the half-century went up after an hour's batting.

Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance fast bowler displaced W. Rogers, and with the Berkshire total at 61, he sent Norris back to the pavilion. The pair had brought the total up from 25 for two wickets, to 61 for 3 wickets, and Norris had 18 to his credit. Evidently Tresawna did not think the wicket suited Ollerearnshaw, for he put on W. Rogers again.

H. E. Dollery, who now partnered Human, hit one straight back to Rogers, who missed it, but on the next ball, Dollery stepped out and was smartly stumped by W. J. Addicoat. Dollery made one out of 65.

Human did not last long after tea, for after he had added two runs to his total, he was bowled by Whiting. Human made by far the greater part of the score, for he claimed 51 out of the total of 79. Cornwall were now in a fairly good position, having dismissed half of the Berkshire side for 78 runs.

G. Sayles and H. L. Lewis made a stand, and added 27 runs before they were separated. W. Rogers again tempted the batsman to step out of his crease, and Lewis was yards outside when his balls were whipped off by Addicoat. Sayles scored off W. Rogers, who gave way to Ollerearnshaw. Runs were now coming very slowly, and Whiting, who had bowled 28 overs, 19 of which were maidens, had only 15 runs hit off him, while he had taken a very valuable wicket. Sayles and Woodburn struck in a long while, and Carter took the ball from Rogers. In his first over, Carter clean bowled Sayles, who had made 27. The score was then 123, and with no runs added, Whiting got Woodburn caught by W. Rogers at mid-off. Eight wickets were down for 123, and the ninth wicket fell for the same score, as Douglas was clean bowled by Whiting before he had scored. H. Mundy did not score, and was bowled by Carter. The Berkshire innings closed for a total of 124. The total would have been very small had it not been for the splendid innings of J. C. Human. The best bowler was Whiting, who took 3 wickets for 15 runs, after bowling 30 overs, 22 of which were maidens. W. Rogers, although he had 85 runs knocked off him, took 4 wickets, and after all, that is the important thing.

PENZANCE, Saturday.

When Cornwall opened the second day of their match with Berkshire at Penzance to-day (Saturday), the sun was shining brilliantly. There had been very heavy dew during the night, and the wicket was quite damp when play started.

The bowling of W. Y. Woodburn and H. Mundy did not seem to trouble Stoneman, but Addicoat was never comfortable. With only 11 runs on the board, his leg stump was knocked out of the ground by Mundy, the fast bowler. With only one run added, W. D. Cory, who had not opened his score, hit one straight back to the bowler, Woodburn, who made no mistake.

Stoneman, who was joined by C. Shaw Baker, was very anxious to score quickly, and had two narrow escapes from being run out. The wicket was playing very tricky, and several times caused the ball to jump up, and at others, to keep very low. The bowlers kept the batsmen very subdued, and Baker had the mortification of seeing his wicket shattered by Mundy. Three of Cornwall's best batsmen were thus out for the small total of 19, and their prospects were not bright.

Rogers (G.) did better than those before him, and hit Woodburn for three fours. J. S. Douglas took the ball from Woodburn, and in his first over, Stoneman was run out. Stoneman had played a very good innings for his 17, out of 34. Two runs later, Rogers fell to a very good catch by H. L. Lewis, off the bowling of Mundy. Rogers contributed 15 runs during his short stay at the wicket. Ollerearnshaw, who was next in, could not stop the rot, and the remarkable collapse continued. Ollerearnshaw played a rising ball from Mundy, and Vaughan, the Berkshire wicketkeeper, gladly accepted the opportunity. The score was 37 when Ollerearnshaw's wicket fell, and C. P. Carter was out in precisely the same manner in the next over. Cornwall were now cutting a sorry figure, but the bowling of the visitors was excellent. Tresawna did not last long for when 40 were on the board, he played a ball back to the bowler, Mundy. S. Barnicoat, who was making his debut in County cricket, opened his score and sent up the half-century with a nice drive for four. In the next over, W. Rogers was clean bowled by Mundy. Rogers' wicket fell at 51, and then came a resolute stand by Barnicoat and Whiting. These two attacked the bowling from the start, and it was some time before they were separated. Barnicoat being caught at the wicket by Vaughan, off Mundy. The last wicket stand, which was the best feature of the Cornwall innings, put 65 no fewer than 29 runs. Both batted well, and Whiting hit the first six of the match, and made the top score of the innings. Whiting claimed 18 not out, and Barnicoat 15. H. Mundy bowled remarkably well, and was unchanged throughout the innings. He had the excellent average of 8 wickets for 32 runs.

BERKSHIRE'S SECOND INNINGS.

J. E. G. Rowland and H. Cresswell once more opened for Berkshire, and as in the first innings, they lost a wicket before the scoring opened. Cresswell putting his leg in front of a straight one from Whiting. Berkshire fared no better than Cornwall, and Rowland, with the total at 6, walked out to a tempter from W. Rogers, and before he could get back was stumped by Addicoat. J. H. Human and A. Norris were now together and Rogers and Whiting gave way to C. P. Carter and Ollerearnshaw. Ollerearnshaw was injured in his first over, Norris hitting the ball straight back to him.

The score at lunch was 16 for 2 wickets, and a very large attendance saw, after lunch, two wickets fall at the same score. Human, who looked like making another big score, was the first victim, as he was smartly stumped by Addicoat, off Carter's bowling. Carter then obtained Dollery's wicket, he being also stumped before he had scored. Norris did not remain much longer, for he skied one of Carter's balls to Stoneman at mid-off. With the score at 42, Ollerearnshaw relieved Whiting, and got Sayles leg-before. Sayles made a "duck," and H. L. Lewis made the same score. He was Addicoat's sixth victim at the wicket. Carter took Lewis's wicket, and two or three balls later clean bowled W. Y. Woodburn for a "blob." Berkshire were faring worse than Cornwall, eight of their wickets having fallen for the total of 42. Vaughan and J. S. Douglas made a short stand, putting on 10 runs before Douglas was bowled by Carter, after making 8.

Vaughan made a valiant effort to increase the score, and succeeded in making 23, the innings closing for 65, Vaughan being lbw to Carter.

The outstanding players for Cornwall during Berkshire's innings, were Carter, who took 7 wickets for 21 runs, and Addicoat, who stumped 2 men in the first innings, and 4 men in the second innings, making a total of 6 men during the match.

CORNWALL'S SECOND INNINGS

Cornwall opened with Tresawna and Cory, facing Mundy and Douglas. Tresawna scored quickly, but with only 14 on the board, Cory was bowled by Mundy, for 4. Tresawna was joined by S. C. Baker, and soon sent up the half-century.

When the 50 appeared, Tresawna had hit eight fours. Baker was dismissed when one run had been added. He was out to a very clever catch by Cresswell, off Mundy's bowling.

Tresawna completed his half-century amidst great applause. Addicoat was bowled by W. Y. Woodburn, for 5, and Cornwall had wiped off 84 of the required 108. Those who thought Cornwall would have an easy victory were mistaken, for one run later, Rogers (G.) lost his wicket, being leg-before to Mundy. Then Stoneman was bowled in the same over, and faces grew long again. Barnicoat stopped the rot, however, and it was he who scored the winning hit. Tresawna was still unvanquished with a score of 61, and Barnicoat was not out with 22.

Cornwall thus won a game that never flagged in interest, by the margin of 5 wickets.

CORNWALL REVENGED

FIVE WICKETS VICTORY OVER BERKSHIRE

Cornwall triumphed over Berkshire by five wickets, in the Minor Counties competition, at Penzance, on Friday and Saturday. A fine stand by the Cornish captain (H. Tresawna) and S. Barnicoat, of Penzance (a newcomer to the county side) in the second innings, enabled the Cornishmen to pull off a victory. Tresawna batted superbly for his 61 not out, which included ten boundaries, and Barnicoat made 22. Berkshire won the toss, but rain prevented a start being made until 2.45 in the afternoon. J. E. G. Rowland and H. Cresswell opened the innings, being opposed by Whiting and Rogers. The veteran opened with one of his usual maidens, and in Rogers's first over Cresswell was bowled before a run was registered. J. H. Human, a young brother of the famous University star, followed, and commenced to score from the start, particularly so when in opposition to Rogers, but Rowland was not so successful when facing Rogers, by whom he was clean bowled with the total at 25. Whiting was keeping the batsmen at one end pegged down entirely, and it was not until the seventh over that a run was scored off him. A. Hattie and Human raised the score from 31 to 61, when C. P. Carter was brought on instead of Whiting, and Ollerearnshaw displaced Rogers. The Penzance pro clean bowled Norris, who had collected 16 runs. Probably owing to the slow state of the wicket, Ollerearnshaw was displaced by Rogers. H. E. Dollery, who now partnered Human, hit a hard low return to Rogers, which he failed to hold, but off the next ball he was stumped by Addicoat. After two runs were added by Human, when he was bowled by Whiting, after making a splendid 51 out of a total of 79 for five wickets, G. Sayles and H. L. Lewis added 27 runs before Lewis was smartly stumped by Addicoat, off Rogers. The Berkshire skipper (Dr. Woodburn) kept up his end for a considerable time, while Sayles scored frequently. Carter came on again, and clean bowled Sayles. W. Rogers caught Woodburn off Whiting, at mid-off, with the score at 123 for eight. Douglas and Mundy failed to open their accounts, and the innings closed for 124. Whiting bowled 30 overs, 22 of which were maidens, in which he obtained three wickets for 15 runs.

Cornwall had 20 minutes to bat, and W. J. Addicoat and H. S. Stoneman opposed Woodburn and Mundy, and eight runs were scored without loss at the close of the day's play. On Saturday, when Cornwall resumed their first innings, the sun was shining brilliantly. With the score at 11, Addicoat was bowled by Mundy. Cory followed, and was immediately caught and bowled by Woodburn. Stoneman, who was joined by C. Shaw Baker, was very intent on short runs, and had two very narrow escapes of being run out. Baker, however, was the first to go, being bowled by Mundy with the score at 19 for three. Rogers (G.), commenced in his usual confident manner, and hit Dr. Woodburn for three 4's in one over, and this brought Sholto Douglas on in his stead.

Stoneman, who had scored 17, was run out, and Rogers was well caught by Lewis at the second attempt, off Mundy, who was now getting the ball to kick up frequently. Ollerearnshaw and Carter were both splendidly caught behind from rising balls off the fast bowler, and seven wickets were down for 37 runs. Tresawna was caught and bowled from a ball that got up very quickly. With the total at 46 for eight, W. Rogers was bowled by Mundy, when he had made six. S. Barnicoat, of Penzance, who was making his first appearance in county cricket, opened with a nice drive to the boundary for four. Whiting followed suit. Both batsmen attacked the bowlers for the first time for the day, Whiting claiming 18 not out, when Barnicoat was caught by the wicketkeeper with his score at 15. Mundy bowled splendidly throughout the innings, and had the excellent analysis of eight wickets for 32 runs.

BERKSHIRE IN TROUBLE.

Berkshire commenced their second innings with a lead of 44 runs. Cresswell was out for obstruction to Whiting without scoring, and with the total at six, Rowland was stumped by Addicoat, off Rogers. At the lunch interval two wickets were down for 16 runs. After lunch, two more wickets fell at the same score. Human and Dollery were both splendidly stumped by the St. Just man, in each case off Carter, who was bowling a splendid length. Norris, in attempting to hit Carter, was caught by Stoneman at mid-off. Sayles, Lewis, and Woodburn were disposed of without scoring, and the score was then 48 for eight wickets. Vaughan was joined by Sholto Douglas, and this pair added 21 valuable runs for the next stand. The end came with Vaughan getting in front of a straight one from Carter. Addicoat, who had pre-

viously stumped two batsmen in the first innings, stumped four more in the second innings. Carter, who had kept a wonderful length, came out with the splendid analysis of seven wickets for 21 runs. He was practically unplayable.

Cornwall commenced their second innings needing 108 runs to win. Tresawna and Cory opened to the bowling of Mundy and Douglas. The skipper commenced to score quickly and drove the fast bowler for two 4's in his first two overs. Cory was bowled for four, with the total at 14. Shaw Baker joined Tresawna, and was content to keep his end up while the skipper continued to score freely all around the wicket, and 51 was registered, when Baker was cleverly caught by Cresswell, who dived for a catch and fell, but held the ball. Addicoat scored five while the score was being carried to 84 for three wickets. Tresawna completed his half-century amidst great applause. At this score, Addicoat was bowled by Woodburn, and G. Rogers was l.b.w. to Mundy for one run. Stoneman was bowled in the same over without scoring, with the total at 88 for five wickets. CORNWALL AND DORSET IN A KEEN STRUGGLE

Cornwall's match with Dorset, at Bridport, on Monday and Tuesday, resulted in a draw, the home county gaining a first innings lead of 13 runs. On Monday, Dorset, after a poor start, made a fine recovery, and compiled 205. At one period they had lost four valuable wickets for only 70 runs, but as the result of some exceedingly steady and resourceful batting by C. L. Tabor, who scored an invaluable half-century, the situation was saved. Tabor received valuable assistance from C. Jowett and E. H. Weld, the latter batting with refreshing freedom. On Tuesday, Cornwall could only score 192, Barnicoat being responsible for 68 of this total. It was Barnicoat's second appearance for the Cornish side, and going in at a critical period of the game, he played the bowling with comparative ease and confidence.

Dorset won the toss, and on a heavy wicket, batted first. Cornwall met with an early success, for with only three runs scored, the home county lost their first wicket, Knight being smartly stumped by Addicoat when attempting to play forward to Rogers. The batsmen could make little headway against some very keen bowling, and with the total at 14 the second wicket fell, Hey being dismissed by Carter, who had come on in the place of Rogers. Following, however, Outram and Tabor batted with much more enterprise, the former scoring all round the wicket, and at the lunch interval they had taken the score to 54 without further loss. On the resumption Dorset met with a further setback, for Outram was stumped after playing a valuable innings of 41. Busk only scored a single, when he was caught by Rogers off Carter's bowling, and he was quickly followed by Brockway, who scored 12 before being clean bowled by Carter. During this period Tabor had batted very soundly, but the trouble was to find anybody to remain at the wicket with him. The Dorset captain, M. B. Elderton, added seven runs, and then failed to stop a good length ball from Whiting, and he returned to the pavilion with the score at 101 for the loss of seven wickets.

Tabor continued to bat with great restraint, and together with Jowett, the pair took the score to 150 before they were separated. The partnership yielded exactly 50 runs. Just after Tabor completed his half-century, he had played a faultless innings, and never once gave a semblance of a chance. The brightest innings of the day was by Weld, who, in 25 minutes, knocked up a total of 40. After adding a further six runs, Tabor fell to a clever catch by Holman off Ollerearnshaw's bowling, and the Dorset innings closed at 205. Carter was the most successful bowler taking four wickets for 48 runs, Whiting having three for 54.

At the luncheon interval on Tuesday, Cornwall had carried the score to 178 for the loss of seven wickets. A feature of the play was the batting of Barnicoat, who, in making his second appearance for the visiting side, contributed 68 which included nine boundary hits. Going in at a critical period of the game, he played the bowling with confidence, and helped to retrieve the early mistakes of the side. A change of bowling—the introduction of Harrison into the attack—brought about his dismissal, an easy chance being offered Hey, fielding at third man. It was the only blemish in a polished innings.

When play was resumed, the game was in an interesting state. Cornwall, with three wickets in hand, required 28 to gain a lead on the first innings. Holman, with his individual score at 10, was bowled by Jowett, and then a downpour of rain sent the players into the pavilion. Still 15 runs in arrears, Cornwall, with Stoneman and Carter at the wicket, quickly lost the latter, and an unenviable task confronted Whiting, the last man in. Never comfortable facing Harrison, he attempted to hit a ball well up, and paid the penalty, being clean bowled. Dorset thus gained a lead on the first innings of 13 runs.

In their second innings Dorset gave a moderate display, scoring 146. R. D. Busk was the only batsman to face the Cornwall attack with any confidence, an innings of 53 was a great help. J. Outram (25) and M. Elderton (22) also batted well. Scores:—

CORNWALL BEATEN BY 99 RUNS.

PENZANCE, Monday.

Cornwall opened their last Minor Counties match against Surrey 2nd XI at Penzance to-day. Surrey came straight from their victory over Devon. Both teams made two changes. H. Tresawna and Rogers (W.) were unable to turn out for Cornwall, and their places were taken by G. Holman and G. Richards, both of Troon. Surrey played Daily instead of Owen.

Surrey won the toss and elected to bat first on a soft wicket. W. Cook and Daily opened, facing C. P. Carter and Whiting. With the score at 6, Daily fell to a catch in the slips by G. Richards, off Whiting's second over. Cook was getting well set, when he put his leg in front of a straight ball from Whiting. Cook's wicket fell at 21, of which Cook claimed 17. Mobey and Whitfield made a stand, but runs came very slowly, so slowly that only one run was scored in 7 overs. Carter and Whiting were bowling excellently, and Carter bowled five successive maiden overs. Carter gave way to Ollerearnshaw, whose first over was a maiden. Mobey began to open his shoulders and hit 7 off one of Whiting's overs. In the next over he was leg-before to Ollerearnshaw. The third wicket fell for 38, which was not a large score. Mobey batted steadily for his 11. R. G. Woollatt, the incoming batsman, did not have a long stay, for with the score at 44, he played outside a straight ball from Ollerearnshaw, and was clean bowled. Baldwin now partnered Whitfield, and sent up the half-century with a beautiful six off Ollerearnshaw. The 50 was completed after an hour and a half's play, and at this total, G. Richards displaced Whiting, who had bowled 19 overs for only 28 runs.

Whitfield smashed his bat in hitting a fast ball from Richards. The 60 was signalled when Baldwin, who was batting well, pulled Ollerearnshaw for 4.

Whitfield and Baldwin attacked the Cornish bowlers more than those before them, and runs came much more quickly. At 70, S. Stoneman, a slow left-hander, took the ball from Ollerearnshaw, and Whiting displaced Richards. The change was successful, for with 72 runs on the board, Whitfield was caught at the wicket by W. J. Addicoat, off the bowling of Whiting. Whitfield had made 11 when he was sent back. Henty also did well when he came in, but at 83 Whiting obtained his fourth wicket, getting Baldwin, who had scored 24, leg before. E. M. Wellings joined Henty, and immediately hit Carter into the cemetery for six. At lunch the score was 86 for six wickets.

Wellings sent up the century after just over two hours play. Ollerearnshaw resumed for Carter and Henty snicked Whiting through slips for four and was immediately missed at mid-off by Barnicoat. He was then splendidly caught and bowled by Ollerearnshaw off a hard drive. The score was 119 when the seventh wicket fell, and Henty was top-scorer with 85. R. W. Skene and Wellings batted well, until Skene was clean bowled by Carter.

Geary (A.) came in and made 10 before Carter caught him in two minds and clean bowled him. The innings closed for 174 when Wellings was also bowled by Carter, for 39. CORNWALL'S FIRST INNINGS.

Baker's contribution to the 39 was 14. S. Barnicoat, who has been batting so well of late, was next in.

Henty now joined Daily, who was still undefeated, but did not stay at the wicket much longer. Whiting, who replaced Stoneman, making him play back, and hit his wicket. J. Addicoat, the wicket-keeper ran several yards to bring off a fine catch. Much the same thing happened to E. G. Woollatt. He hit his back towards the bowler, and Ollerearnshaw brought off a very good catch off his own bowling. The fifth wicket fell at 141, the last three runs later, Baldwin was out. Again Ollerearnshaw brought off a brilliant catch. He was fielding at mid-on, and Baldwin slammed the ball very hard, only to be excellently caught. THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL YIELD FULL POINTS TO SURREY 2nd XI.

Cornwall had Surrey 2nd XI. as their opponents for their concluding match in the Minor Counties Championship, at Penzance, on Monday and Tuesday. The Surreyites came fresh from their victory over Devon by seven wickets, and they took first knock on a soft wicket. With only six runs on the board, Dally was smartly caught in the slips by Richards, off Whiting. Mobery joined his skipper, W. T. Cook, who was playing himself in nicely, when he stepped in front of Whiting, and was out l.b.w. with the score at 21, of which he had made 17. Mobery and Whitfield made a stand, but runs came very slowly, seven overs yielding only one run. Carter and Whiting were both keeping excellent lengths, the former sending down five successive maiden overs. CORNWALL COUNTY'S GOOD RECORD

FINE TALLY OF WICKETS BY WHITING

Cornwall County Cricket Club has completed its programme for 1930 in the Minor Counties Competition and has accomplished a very creditable performance.

Since last reviewed the club has played four games, two with Dorset and Devon away and two with Berks and Surrey II. at home. Dorset won the points for a first innings lead, and the game with Devon was abandoned through rain. The home games with Berkshire and Surrey II., both played at Penzance, were favoured with the sun and some real cricket weather.

After being 42 runs behind on the first innings, Cornwall pressed home the subsequent advantage they gained by dismissing Berkshire cheaply, and won this game with the comfortable margin of five wickets. From Cornwall's point of view the game was marked by good bowling by C. Carter and Whiting, and a very fine innings by the captain, H. Tresawna, who batted with all his well-known skill and charm.

Surrey II. brought a strong XI. to the West, and were particularly interested to win this match with Cornwall, as a win would make them runners-up to Durham in the competition. The bowling of Geary was the deciding factor of this game, and Surrey were able to maintain a steady, strong pull over the home county, and won comfortably by 100 runs.

COUNTY'S RECORD.

Cornwall's record for 1930 is played 10, won 3, lost 2, won on first innings 1, lost on first innings 1, drawn 3. This gives a percentage of 54.5, and should place the county fairly well up in the first half of the table, a position which will hearten those whose duty it is to keep the flag of the club flying.

The latter is a very confident batsman with a number of good shots, but struck one as rather impulsive, and should realise that in a two-day match there is time to play himself in at a reasonable rate of scoring. He is well worth watching, however.

Cory has been the most consistent batsman of the season, and put together the only century made this year. C. S. Baker has been out of luck, and the county has suffered accordingly. Rogers (G.) has not maintained his fine form of 1929, but there are other seasons ahead for both these batsmen. Taken as a whole, the batting has been disappointing.

REMARKABLE BOWLING.

On the contrary, the bowling of Carter, Whiting, Rogers (W.), and Ollerearnshaw has been very good. Congratulations are due to Carter for his fine performance in his first season for Cornwall, and we all hope he will repeat this next year. Whiting is a wonder. Although a veteran in the game, he is still a live wire, and now has the remarkable record of some 850 wickets for Cornwall in Minor County cricket. This is all the more noteworthy when it is remembered that during most of this time Cornwall played only eight matches, and never more than ten in any season. Surely this record can hardly be equalled in the country. Rogers (W.) and Ollerearnshaw have had greater success than formerly, and the latter is a valuable all-rounder, and is generally popular on the field.

The Colts match, Devon v. Cornwall, was won this year by Devon. This game is a valuable incentive to the youngsters in Cornwall, and the game next year will be awaited in Cornwall with interest.

The county club has now to put its house in order financially, and requires all the public support that can be given it. The "gates" in the county have been rather disappointing, and it is to be hoped that the treasurer will be cheered by a substantial cheque as the county's share of the profits of the Test matches.

CORNWALL'S RECORD

FINE WICKET KEEPING BY W. T. HARRIS

HOW THE COUNTY SIDE FARED

With the invasion of football, cricket has once again fallen back into obscurity, and for the majority of clubs the season is over. The Cornwall County Club have just completed their programme in the Minor Counties Championship Competition. Although from a match winning point of view the 1930 season has not been very successful, the team has accomplished several creditable performances. Ten matches have been played, three won, two lost, one won on first innings, one lost on first innings, and three have been drawn. Young players have been given a chance in all the games, and at least two, H. S. Stoneman and S. Barnicoat, have made a good impression. The latter, in particular, has shown much confidence as a batsman. Taken generally the batting strength has been disappointing. Cory (W.) has been the most consistent batsman of the season, and has been responsible for the only century, 110. C. Shaw Baker has been out of form, whilst Rogers (G.) has failed to reproduce his fine form of the previous season.

The strength of the side has been in the bowling, and C. Carter, Whiting (F.), Rogers (W.), and Ollerearnshaw (H.) have been very sound. A great deal of the team's success has been due to Carter, and to head the averages during his first season with the county is a creditable performance. Whiting, although a veteran in the game, is still as effective as ever, and he now holds the fine record of taking 880 wickets for Cornwall in Minor Counties cricket. This is all the more noteworthy because during most of his time the county have played only eight matches and never more than ten in any season. Rogers and Ollerearnshaw also have met with great success, and the latter has proved himself to be a valuable all-rounder, and is also very popular on the field.

The most interesting fixture was against a strong Surrey second eleven who were particularly keen to win the match, as a victory would make them runners-up to Durham in the competition. After an exciting encounter, Cornwall were beaten by 100 runs. Perhaps the most creditable performance of the season was the victory over Berkshire. Cornwall were 42 runs behind on the first innings, but they dismissed their opponents cheaply in the second innings and won by five wickets.
