

DORSET DEBACLE.

Monmouth Win By An Innings.

CAPT. R. D. BUSK'S EFFORT.

A REMARKABLE BOWLING FEAT.

Dorset suffered defeat against Monmouthshire in the Minor Counties' Championship match at Panteg yesterday by an innings and 77 runs.

As on Wednesday, weather conditions were unfavourable, and inspection on the morning of the second day revealed a saturated wicket and a sodden outfield. Play was impossible until after lunch.

Monmouth added 75 to their overnight total, Jones carrying his score to 66. He hit a couple of 6's, one off Harrison and the other off Jowett.

Only three and a half hours remained for play, but in less time than that Dorset were twice dismissed for an aggregate of 123 runs on a wicket badly affected by the rain.

BUSK HITS OUT.

In their first innings two wickets fell before a run had been scored, but Capt. R. D. Busk then went in and attacked the bowling so vigorously that in 40 minutes he had scored 50. He hit a couple of sixes off Sadler, but some of the other Dorset batsmen could cope with the bowling of the Newport professional, who achieved the remarkable feat of taking all 10 wickets for only 37 runs.

Compelled to follow-on, Dorset fared even worse. Capt. Busk, who opened the innings with Knight, fell to a brilliant catch in the deep before he had scored, and the only stand of the innings was made by Brockway and J. M. Carter for the fifth wicket.

Sadler's record for the match was 16 wickets for 53 runs.

Despite yesterday's heavy rain, the start of the two-days' match between Dorset and M.C.C. in Poole Park, to-day, was not delayed.

M.C.C. won the toss and elected to bat on a soft wicket. R. H. R. Buckston and Colonel O. L. Mathias opened the innings to the bowling of Hayes and Marshall Harvey. Runs came extremely slowly at the start, seven overs producing only five runs. At 15, Brockway displaced Hayes, and a further change brought on Killick for Marshall Harvey at 23.

With the total at 35 Mathias was caught at deep square leg off a mis-hit. He was at the wicket 45 minutes for 17, which included two 4's. W. Strachan, renowned as a hitter, followed in, and Marshall Harvey came on again at 47 in place of Brockway. At the other end, Carter displaced Killick with the score at 83. Strachan brightened the game considerably, and in half-an-hour he had caught up his partner. At lunch M.C.C. had scored 91 for the loss of one wicket.

After luncheon a startling change came, and six wickets fell quickly.

The partnership between Buckston and Strachan came to an end when Buckston was stumped. His 46 included three boundaries.

The second wicket fell at 118. It was not long before Strachan left, too, with the total at 146. He hit hard for his 64, which included one five, five fours and seven threes.

A bowling feat by Marshall-Harvey caused three wickets to fall with the total at 142. He dismissed three batsmen with four deliveries. Waugh and Bowers retrieved the situation after this collapse.

He and Brockway added 46 for the fifth wicket before Brockway was stumped, and in their unbroken sixth wicket partnership before lunch Byrte and Carter put on 92.

Byrte reached his century soon after lunch, and when Carter was bowled the pair had added 111 for the sixth wicket. Byrte carried his bat for a faultless 146, and although slow at times he was never in difficulty with the bowling. Dorset's innings closed at 4 o'clock, and M.C.C. were 117 behind.

A TAME DRAW.

M.C.C. Easily Save Game With Dorset.

MAJOR H. C. BYRTE'S FINE INNINGS.

The two-days' match between Dorset and the M.C.C., in Poole Park, ended in a tame draw last evening.

Dorset had scored 350 in their first innings, against the M.C.C. total of 253, but the tourists wiped out the arrears, scoring 131 for the loss of two wickets in the second innings.

Major H. C. Byrte, who went in at the fall of the second Dorset wicket, carried his bat for 146. He took part in several profitable stands and gave a sound display, making no mistake. He hit 15 fours, chiefly through drives and cuts.

FYNN'S 100 WICKETS.

C. G. Fynn bowled for long periods and bore the brunt of the attack. He came in for rather severe punishment at times, but would have had a better analysis had he been better supported in the field. With his six wickets yesterday, Fynn has taken 107 wickets this season.

Lieut.-Col. O. L. Mathias and R. H. R. Buckston batted soundly, if slowly at the M.C.C.'s second attempt, and put on 81 in about 90 minutes, when Buckston, an old Etonian, was finely caught at mid-on. He hit only one boundary. Mathias reached his half century after being at the wicket 105 minutes.

D. Strachan relieved the monotony by hitting Brockway for five successive boundaries. He opened his shoulders to a tempting ball from Hayes, was deceived by the spin and bowled. He sustained a nasty knock while fielding at short-leg. Major Byrte got hold of a full toss on the leg side from Fynn and the ball hit him on the forearm and completely numbed the nerves. He felt the pain two or three overs later and had to be attended by Dr. T. V. Somerville.

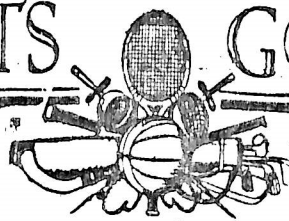

The Butchers, Wilcox almost dominated the match between the Trams and Wimborne in Division I. of the Bournemouth and District League on Saturday. Going in at the fall of the second wicket, "W." of Wimborne, defied the efforts of his brother and the other Tram bowlers and carried his bat for 40, made out of 21. He batted carefully, making defence his chief object. Bishop and Bleatham, the opening pair, were more aggressive, each hitting three 4's in 22 and 14 respectively. The total reached 120.

Bowling throughout the innings, E. Wilcox sent down 24 overs, of which eight were maidens, and captured seven wickets for 51 runs. The Trams could do little against the bowling of Welch and W. In a low-scoring game Corpus Christi avenged their defeat in the De Zoete Cup by Mudeford, winning on this occasion by 11 runs, on the first innings. 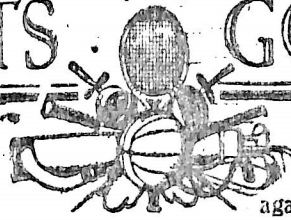

Hey's Valuable Innings for Dorset.

Hampshire made such a splendid fight against Sussex at Portsmouth yesterday that they had no difficulty in saving the game; in fact, they came very near to securing a sensational victory.

Set to make 102 runs in 80 minutes, Sussex went for the runs, taking all risks, and in doing so imperilled their own position. With only three wickets left they were 25 short of the task when stumps were drawn. It was a great sporting match from beginning to end.

It was really due to the splendid fifth wicket stand of 157 between Kennedy and Creese that Hampshire were able to gain the position they did.

SUSSEX DISASTERS.

DORSET v. CORNWALL

STRUGGLE FOR FIRST INNINGS POINTS

Dorset's match with Cornwall at Liskeard was abandoned on Wednesday, but play was commenced on the second day.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

DORSET v. DEVON.

GOOD START BY HOUSE SIDE.

The Minor Counties' Championship match between Devon and Dorset was opened at Exeter on Friday.

Seldon and Outram opened the innings for Devon, and while the former played with great caution the latter opened his shoulders at every opportunity. Outram's forcefulness, however, nearly cost him his wicket on two occasions. Before he had reached double figures he gave a chance on the leg side, and also drove hard into the hands of Busk, off Harrison's bowling.

Meanwhile Seldon had scored only 7 when he was taken behind the wicket with the total at 49. Fifteen runs later Outram was also taken behind the wicket. Amory, who followed Jones, was dismissed after scoring six runs by Hey, who brought off a brilliant catch. At four o'clock Battersby reached 50 with a pull to leg, which realised a single. He had been batting cautiously for 2½ hours, and, supported by Sherlock, brought the total to 187 for seven with the tea interval.

SOUND DISPLAY.

Soon after tea Battersby was out l.b.w. to Harrison, having scored 66. He had been batting soundly for just under three hours, and had not given a chance. Sherlock and Webber were now together, and the former sent up the 200 with a boundary hit. A few minutes later he was caught at mid-on, the ninth wicket falling at 201. Baxter, who now joined Webber, played bright, cricket for his 21, which included several 4's. He was eventually stumped by Elderton in going out to Harrison, the innings closing with the total at 233, having lasted 4 hours 50 minutes.

Dorset took the field, and Bower and Hey faced the attack of Baxter and Webber. Scoring was slow, and apart from a couple of 4's by Bower off Battersby, who relieved Baxter, there was no outstanding cricket before stumps were drawn, with the total at 88.

Set to get 227 runs to win in two hours, when stumps were drawn.

For three-quarters of an hour Bower and Hey, who opened the Dorset first innings the previous day, scored steadily, advancing the total from 36 to 71 before Amory dislodged Bower's off-stump. This was followed by a double success by Battersby, who got Outram caught at the wicket and Hey at fine slip, the third wicket falling for 86.

MISSEP TO DEVON CAPTAIN.

During his sixth over Amory had the misfortune to collide with Busk, who was batting with Tovey, and to damage his right hand. He could not finish the over, which was cancelled, and retired to the pavilion for treatment. A substitute deputised until the Devon captain was able to resume, just before lunch. Lunch was taken with the total at 153 for 8, and ten minutes after resuming the innings closed for 160.

Devon commenced their second innings with a lead of 73 runs which Outram and Seldon increased by 50 in 40 minutes. Seldon had reached his previous day's score of 32, when he was taken at the wicket by Elderton, off Harrison, the first wicket having produced 66. Outram did not survive long after, for at 78 he was caught by Tabor at mid-on. MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

DORSET MEET CORNWALL AT BRIDPORT.

HOME COUNTY'S POOR START.

ON a wicket considerably affected by rain Dorset began their Minor Counties match with Cornwall at Bridport on Monday.

The home county made a poor start for, with the score at three, Knight fell a victim to Rogers, who opened the bowling in partnership with Whiting. In attempting to play forward to the spin bowler Knight, misjudging the flight of the ball, was smartly stumped by Addicoat.

SEVEN RUNS IN 30 MINUTES.

The rate of scoring progressed very slowly and the first half hour of play only yielded seven runs. The batsmen were disinclined to take risks and with the wicket assisting the bowlers, the game lost much of its attractiveness. Carter, who replaced Rogers, met with quick success, dismissing Hey with the total at 14.

Outram and Tabor, the incoming batsmen helped to retrieve the situation, and just prior to the luncheon interval had carried the score to 54 without further loss. They certainly exercised more enterprise than shown by their predecessors, the former scoring all round the wicket at a much faster rate than his colleague.

Just when he appeared to be well set, Outram was stumped after playing an invaluable innings of 41. Some idea of the restraint and caution shown may be judged by the fact that only one boundary hit was registered. After scoring a single, Busk was caught, and he was quickly followed by Brockway, who reached double figures.

In the meantime, Tabor batted stolidly, but the trouble was to find anyone to remain with him. Elderton signalled his appearance at the crease by hitting a four. Dorset's captain, a forceful bat, failed to stop a good-length ball from Whiting, and he returned to the pavilion with the score 101 for seven wickets.

An otherwise sombre display was retrieved by the forceful hitting of Tabor and Jowett, who carried the score to 150 without being separated. The partnership yielded exactly 50 runs, when Jowett was beaten by Whiting.

TABOR'S HALF CENTURY.

Showing increased confidence Tabor went on to complete his half-century which was obtained without any semblance of a chance. Weld, in a carefree innings, was particularly severe on the bowling of Rogers, whom he hit for a 6 and three 4's in one over. In twenty-five minutes at the crease he scored 40 runs, including five boundary strokes, and a series of 3's. Dorset's innings finally closed at 205.

Unlike their opponents Cornwall made quite a promising start, but failed to consolidate a good position. Shaw-Baker and W. Cory put on 48 runs before the former was bowled by Jowett, and then Harrison played havoc with the remaining batsmen until the close of play. With the departure of Cory, who batted attractively for 36, wickets fell quickly, Addicoat and Rogers (G.) being dismissed for an aggregate of eight runs between them.

At the drawing of stumps for the day Cornwall appeared to be in a somewhat precarious position, four of their opening batsmen being out for a total of 84. The attendance was disappointing, but this may have been attributable to the unsettled state of the weather.

Throughout the morning and afternoon the skies were overcast and with a cold wind

sweeping the ground the conditions were none too pleasant for both players and spectators.

At the luncheon interval on Tuesday Cornwall had carried the score to 178 for the loss of seven wickets. A feature of the play was the batting of Barnicoat, who, in making his second appearance for the visiting side, contributed 68 which included nine boundary hits. Going in at a critical period of the game he played the bowling with confidence, and helped to retrieve the early mistakes of the side.

DORSET AHEAD.

A change of bowling—the introduction of Harrison in the attack—brought about his dismissal, an easy chance being offered Hey, fielding at third man. It was the only blemish in a polished innings. When play was resumed after lunch the game was in an interesting state. Cornwall, with three wickets in hand, required 28 to gain a lead on the first innings.

Holman, with his individual score at 10, was bowled by Jowett, and then a downpour of rain sent the players to the pavilion. Still 15 runs in arrears Cornwall with Stoneman and Carter at the wicket quickly lost the latter, and an unenviable task confronted Whiting, the last man in. Never comfortable facing Harrison he attempted to hit a ball well up and paid the penalty, being clean bowled. Dorset thus gained a lead on the first innings of 13 runs, due in no small measure to the bowling of Harrison, who had the fine analysis of 7 wickets for 55 runs.

DORSET'S LEAD OVER CORNWALL

FINE BOWLING BY HARRISON.

Dorset gained a first innings lead of 15 runs against Cornwall in their Minor Counties game which ended on Tuesday.

When play opened on Monday, on a wicket considerably affected by rain, the sky was overcast and a cold wind made conditions none too pleasant. The match was drawn.

The home county made a poor start for, with the score at three, Knight fell a victim to Rogers, who opened the bowling in partnership with Whiting. In attempting to play forward to the spin bowler Knight, misjudging the flight of the ball was smartly stumped by Addicott.

SEVEN RUNS IN 30 MINUTES.

The rate of scoring progressed very slowly and the first half hour of play only yielded seven runs. The batsmen were disinclined to take risks and with the wicket assisting the bowlers, the game lost much of its attractiveness.

An otherwise sombre display was relieved by the forceful hitting of Tabor and Jowett, who carried the score to 150 without being separated. The partnership yielded exactly 50 runs, when Jowett was beaten by Whiting.

Showing increased confidence Tabor went on to complete his half-century, which was obtained without any semblance of a chance. Weld, in a carefree innings, was particularly severe on the bowling of Rogers, whom he hit for a 6 and three 4's in one over. In 25 minutes at the crease he scored 40 runs, including five boundary strokes, and a series of 3's Dorset's innings finally closed at 206.

Unlike their opponents Cornwall made quite a promising start, but failed to consolidate a good position. Shaw-Baker and W. Cory put on 48 runs before the former was bowled by Jowett, and then Harrison played havoc with the remaining batsmen until the close of play. With the departure of Cory, who batted attractively for 36, wickets fell quickly, Addicott and Rogers (G.) being dismissed for an aggregate of eight runs between them.

CORNWALL SAVED.

At the drawing of stumps for the day Cornwall appeared to be in a somewhat precarious position, four of their opening batsmen being out for a total of 84. The attendance was disappointing, but this may have been attributable to the unsettled state of the weather.

At the luncheon interval on Tuesday Cornwall had carried the score to 178 for the loss of seven wickets. A feature of the play was the batting of Barnicoat, who, in making his second appearance for the visiting side, contributed 68, which included nine boundary hits. Going in at a critical period of the game he played the bowling with confidence, and helped to retrieve the early mistakes of the side.

A change of bowling—the introduction of Harrison in the attack—brought about his dismissal, an easy chance being offered Hoy, fielding at third man. It was the only blunder in a polished innings. When play was resumed after lunch the game was in an interesting state. Cornwall, with three wickets in hand, required 28 to gain a lead on the first innings.

HARRISON'S BOWLING.

Holman, with his individual score at 20, was bowled by Jowett, and then a downpour of rain sent the players to the pavilion. Still 15 runs in arrears Cornwall, with Stoneman and Carter at the wicket, quickly lost the latter and an unenviable task confronted Whiting, the last man in.

Never comfortable facing Harrison he attempted to hit a ball well up and paid the penalty, being clean bowled.

Dorset thus gained a lead on the first innings of 15 runs, due in no small measure to the bowling of Harrison, who had the fine analysis of 7 wickets for 56 runs.

Dorset in their second venture scored 148, of which Busk claimed 53. The innings closed shortly after 6 o'clock, and with the conditions none too favourable stumps were drawn.

DORSET REGIMENT v. SOMERSET STRAGGLERS.

MAGNIFICENT BOWLING FOR THE REGIMENT BY P. W. VASEY.

The annual Dorset Regimental Cricket Week was continued on the Dorchester Recreation Ground on Wednesday and Thursday, when the Regiment had the Somerset Stragglers as visitors. Thanks to a very great extent to some magnificent bowling by P. W. Vasey, the Regiment were easy winners by an innings and seven runs. Rain interfered a little on both days, but the match proved a thoroughly enjoyable one. The Stragglers went in first, and they were soon in a very bad way; in fact, only something of a stand by Captain Cole (11 not out) and F. E. Baldock (12) saved the side from entire disaster. Matters were quite bad enough, however, for when the last wicket fell the total had only reached 36. P. W. Vasey took eight wickets for 15 runs, bowling with a remarkable leg break which had the batsmen guessing all the time. G. H. Vasey had one for nothing and J. N. Carter one for 19. When the Regimental team went in they showed that runs could be made, their batting being fairly solid throughout, and they compiled the useful total of 220. G. H. Vasey was the highest scorer with a very well played 50. W. F. Baldock did some good bowling for the visitors. In their second innings the Stragglers' opening pair set about their formidable task with right good will, W. F. Baldock making 59 and H. D. Burrough (a Somerset County amateur) 56; Colonel Shine also contributed a valuable 15. After that, however, wickets again fell cheaply, and, despite a lively 14 by A. G. DORSET CRICKET CLUB.

PAST SEASON'S PLAY REVIEWED.

BATTING AND BOWLING AVERAGES.

THE past season of the County Cricket Club unfortunately has not been so successful as in previous years. The wet weather experienced in the latter part of July and in August ruined several of the matches and in only three matches out of eight was a definite decision arrived at.

The consequence was that the form of the players was at times much below the standard expected and in the opinion of those who are enabled to form a judgment the team did not do itself justice. On hard wickets it is safe to say that better results would have been attained. However, many good performances were accomplished with M. B. S. Bower as the most successful batsman.

A. M. Harrison once again bore the brunt of the bowling, and although his average is better than last year, yet the total number of wickets taken by him were less. Brockway showed improved form, which is very gratifying, and this young professional has a big future before him, whereas Knight, although making runs in local cricket did poorly. J. I. Outram made the only century against Monmouth at Poole Park, playing a good innings.

The County opened the season with the match against Monmouth where, owing to the luck of the toss, the home team were able to bring off a good win. However, this defeat was wiped out in the return match at Poole Park. Both matches against Devon and Cornwall were drawn and one to Wiltshire was lost and the other drawn.

POOR SUPPORT AT MATCHES.

Once again the lack of support at the home matches was deplorable in spite of the fact that the lowest possible price was charged for admission. If those who love cricket would only take the trouble to see some of the matches they would see cricket played as it should be. However, because the match is not labelled first-class they form the opinion that it is not worth seeing and therefore stay away. The cricket played by the Minor Counties is never tedious, the delays one is accustomed to in first-class cricket are absent, and playing for an average is a thing unheard of.

Dorset is not the only county that this lack of support can be levelled at because most of those participating in the Minor Counties championship experience the same difficulty with the exception of Cornwall and those in the North of England. The remedy is difficult to find, but local patriotism should be an incentive to better support. In expressing these remarks, thanks are due to those annual subscribers who support the Club year after year but for whose generosity the Club could not continue.
