

**MINOR COUNTIES MATCH.**

**Kent v. Bucks at the Foxgrove.**

Inclement weather played havoc with the minor Counties match between Kent and Bucks at the Foxgrove ground on Monday and Tuesday, but some good cricket was seen on a sticky wicket.

Franklin, the Bucks captain, won the toss, and took Brooke in with him to open the innings, against the bowling of Blunden and Watt. Brooke was caught from a ball by Watt when he had scored 13. Three wickets for 40 runs did not seem too good, and the Kent skipper kept changing his bowlers, but was unable to part the batsmen, and 100 runs were passed without further loss.

When the score was at 128, lunch was taken, and soon after the resumption, Brindley was well caught in the slips by Hubble, when his score was at 34. Raffety continued to hit out, and reached his 50 with a nice three off Blunden, but three runs later he nicked one, and was caught at the wicket.

His 53 included seven fours, and he was loudly cheered when he reached the pavilion.

Battock made several good strokes before he fell a victim to the Hubble-Watt combination. When six wickets were down, the score was 150. An early miss from Hazelton by Hubble proved to be expensive for Kent, for this player went on to score 81. He was ably supported by Steven Davis who made a brilliant 35. Rutter lashed out at one from Lewis and was caught by Chalk. The innings closed for 273 runs.

Fairservice and Bull opened the innings for Kent to the bowling of Hazelton and Rutter. With only two runs registered on the board, Brooke made a good catch, dismissing Bull. Hubble came in and kept the innings going. At 22 Edwards relieved Rutter in the bowling. Fifty runs were up in an hour, but at 57 Brindley captured Fairservice's wicket through a catch by Franklin. He clean bowled Christopherson next, but Chalk managed to stop the "hat trick." Chalk and Hubble were still in partnership at the conclusion of the day's play, Chalk's score being 32, and Hubble's 40.

On the second day's play, Rutter and Edwards bowled, and Chalk seemed uneasy when facing the former. Hubble started to hit, but was caught in the slips for 71. Crawford came in, but did not stay long, being bowled by a fast ball from Edwards, when he had just broken his duck. Simpson the Kent skipper made 10 before being taken by Brindley off Edwards. Rutter bowled Chalk off his pads, and Levett fell to Edwards before he had scored.

At this point play was delayed by rain, and on the resumption, Wall was clean bowled by Rutter, soon to be followed by Lewis who was caught by Franklin off Edwards. The innings closed with 157 runs to Kent's credit.

Bucks did not enforce the follow on, and Brindley and Brooke started the second innings for Bucks, but when eleven was registered on the board, the former was caught at the wicket. Brooke was out from a good catch by the Kent captain off Fairservice. After lunch Raffety was unfortunately struck by a rising ball, which hit him on the head, and he was forced to retire having scored only 8 runs.

A sharp shower interrupted the play for a little while and the teams were forced to seek the shelter of the pavilion. About 5 o'clock Bucks declared with 111 runs to their credit.

Bull and Fairservice started Kent's second attempt, but played very slowly, only scoring 15 runs in 30 minutes. A dark cloud came over the ground, and the teams went off on account of the light. They had just reached the pavilion when rain fell in torrents, and swamped the pitch, thus causing the game to end.

**CRICKET.**

Some good holiday cricket will be seen in Beckenham this week-end. To-morrow, (Sat.) Beckenham meet Sutton, and on Bank Holiday, Bickley Park.

There has been a minor county match at Beckenham this week. Kent II. v. Bucks played on the Foxgrove on Monday and Tuesday.

Last week Beckenham went on a tour of Kent and visited Ashford, Canterbury, Broadstairs, and Shoreham.

R T Bryan scored a useful 76 not out on Saturday for Beckenham against Pinner, at Pinner. C. H. West also of Beckenham scored 48. Beckenham's total was 148, to which Pinner replied with 104.

A Beckenham team journeyed to Broadstairs on Friday, and returned home easy victors by 175 runs to 77. C. H. West made 44 for the visitors, and took four wickets for 26.

Dulwich were the visitors to the Foxgrove on Saturday, and the local side lost by 143 to 84. The highest scorer of the match was A. Jeacocke of Dulwich, who made a total of 58. W. H. Bradshaw took 5 of the Dulwich wickets for 43 runs, and six of Beckenham's wickets fell to J. A. Lovesay for 31 runs.

Beckenham played Lever House II. at Eltham and won comfortably. The home team was out for 90 and Beckenham went on to score 172 for six wickets.

Beckenham entertained Tonbridge on Wednesday, but little play was possible. The home side went in first and were 90 for three wickets, when rain fell and caused the game to be abandoned. H. J. Linnell the local player scored 45.

A. R. Beardwell, going in at first wicket down for Cyphers II. carried his bat for 72. The Barclay's Bank second string were able to pass the Cyphers total of 137 with a couple of wickets in hand.

A Dulwich "A" team entertained Cyphers on Wednesday, and the visitors just pipped the home team in a good game. Dulwich opened strongly, and scored 220. Cyphers batted well, and the tail wagged particularly strongly.

MINOR COUNTIES CRICKET

INTERESTING MATCH AT SITTINGBOURNE.

SPINELESS DISPLAY BY KENT 2nd XI.

The meeting of Kent 2nd XI. and Wiltshire in the Minor Counties Competition, which was played on the Sports Ground, Tunstall-road, Sittingbourne, on Monday and Tuesday, provided some interesting cricket, cricket, however, that ran all in favour of the visitors. Messrs. Edward Lloyd, Limited, placed the ground and pavilion at the service of the teams, and in passing it might be mentioned that this is believed to be the first time that Kent 2nd XI. have played a match in this competition on the ground of a Works team. The whole of the arrangements were carried out under the direction of Mr. G. E. Garrett, on behalf of the Paper Mills Recreation Club, but it was upon the shoulders of Mr. W. Wilson, the groundsman, that the responsibility for everything really fell. Mr. Wilson had prepared an excellent wicket, and the pitch had been covered with tarpaulin, which protected it from the showers of Monday morning. It was not long after the advertised time that a start was made.

Both counties were well represented, and on paper the Kent team appeared to be quite a good side.

R. W. Awdry, the Wiltshire captain, was no stranger to the Sittingbourne district. As Major Awdry he was in command of the Wiltshire yeomanry, who were billeted at Murston in the early days of the Great War. He is now Lieut. Colonel Awdry, but seemed little older than in the anxious times of 1914. F. S. M. Creek, one of the well-known Wiltshire cricketers, is, of course, the well-known Corinthian footballer, and in E. M. Nash, the Wiltshire wicketkeeper, we had the Swindon goalkeeper.

The visitors brought with them a couple of giants, the brothers Smith, W. and J., who hail from Corsham, Wiltshire, and who each stand about 6ft. 3ins., and are powerfully built men. How these Corsham giants dominated the game will be seen later on.

The Wiltshire captain won the toss and went in first, and up till lunch time on Monday the visitors had done none too well, as will be gauged from the fact that they lost seven wickets for about 80 runs. One felt sorry for the visitors, and hoped they would improve. Then came the luncheon interval, and from that moment the game swung completely round. Fitzgerald, the Wiltshire professional, who lives at Trowbridge, joined C. E. Awdry and the score moved steadily until the amateur was caught at the wicket off Fairservice for 30, the score then reading 111 for eight wickets. Smith (W.) then strode to the wickets and joined Fitzgerald, who, by this time had played himself in, and while the smaller man was content to wait for the loose ball and score when opportunity offered, Smith, handling his bat as though it was a mere wand, went for the bowling in marvellous fashion. He drove, pulled, and cut, and

as a nitter must; but his aggressive policy bore good fruit for in addition to sending the figures on the score board jumping up he fairly paralysed the attack and the fieldsmen. In his dashing innings Smith twice drove the ball over the boundary, and it was not until the partnership had realised 104 runs that the batsmen were separated. Blunden then bringing about the dismissal of Fitzgerald with a good length ball for 62. Fitzgerald hit one five and six fours during his excellent innings, and the stand for the ninth wicket completely altered the complexion of the game. The other Corsham giant, Smith (J.), last man in, laid about him lustily, rattling up 17, and Smith (W.) took out his bat for a brilliant 56, which included two sixes and five fours. He was favoured with some luck, but he deserved every run he got for the courageous manner in which he attacked the bowling. The three Wiltshire professionals had given a spirited batting display which was very much to the liking of the spectators. The Wiltshire total was 243, and when it is considered that seven wickets had fallen for about 80, once again cricket showed what a game of surprises it is.

The story of the batting of the Kent 2nd XI. is both doleful and dismal. Smith (W.) took charge of the bowling at the upper wicket, while C. E. Awdry bowled up the slope, and so finely did these two men bowl, backed up by some keen fielding, that they went through the Kent defence like a hot knife going through butter. It would scarcely be credited, but half the Kent

team were out before double figures were on the score board, and when the sixth wicket fell ten runs went up. Something like a panic seemed to have seized the home county batsmen. J. Smith, using his great height and taking a long run, bowled at a tremendous pace, and had all the batsmen guessing. There was an encouraging little round of applause for Lewis, the Sittingbourne representative in the home team, but when he fell to a ball from Smith (J.), that broke in from leg and spreadeagled his wicket one sympathised with the young cricketer. Just when the Kent team looked like getting all out for 50—for nine wickets had fallen for 46 runs—there came an unexpected stand for the last wicket. Watt had shown that attack was the best defence by running up 14 in quick time, and with W. H. Levett, the Kent wicketkeeper, playing a watchful game and scoring when possible, Blunden the last man in, using the long handle, hit out fearlessly, and quite cheered the spectators by showing that the fearsome Corsham giant could be hit. The last two Kent men put on 67 runs before Blunden was smartly caught in the slips for a well-played 35, leaving Levett to carry out his bat for a faultless 45. The Kent team were all out for 113, a total which was much larger than at one time appeared probable.

Being 130 behind, Kent 2nd XI. had to follow on, and as Levett and Blunden had done so well these two men went in to open the second venture, but Blunden was dismissed immediately by a good ball from C. E. Awdry. Bull then joined Levett, and at the close of play the score was 15 for one wicket, Levett being not out 14.

THE SECOND DAY'S PLAY.

On Tuesday morning the weather was gusty, a strongish wind blowing down the ground, and Smith (J.), who took up the attack from his old wicket, with the wind to help him, was more dangerous than ever. Levett played carefully, and had compiled 22 when he was out lbw to C. E. Awdry. Once again a rot set in, the only batsman to keep his end up and to show that runs could be attained against such an attack being Pearce, the Tonbridge amateur. Smith (J.) fairly frightened the batsmen out, and the ball with which he bowled T. A. Crawford sent one of the bails 37 yards behind the wicket. Pearce could get no-one to stay with him till Watt came in, and then by boldly going for the ball he brought off some clean, powerful hits. He once drove a ball from C. E. Awdry into the tennis courts for six. When he fell at last to a good ball from Smith (W.) for 39, Pearce followed him soon after, caught by C. E. Awdry off his own bowling for 59, which was the highest individual Kent score in the match. The innings closed for 137, and Pearce had a big reception on his retirement.

Smith (J.) took five wickets for 47, C. E. Awdry four for 69, and Smith (W.) one for 17.

It was a little comfort to know that the innings defeat had been averted, but Wiltshire required only eight runs. These were soon obtained, and before lunch Wiltshire had won well by ten wickets. The winners outplayed Kent at all points of the game, and what was the matter with the young Kent professionals and amateurs the writer cannot think. It was the general comment round the ground that if these are the reserves who are going to take the places of our first team cricketers when they retire there is a poor outlook for Kent.

One of the few Kent players who will be able to look back on the match with some satisfaction is Watt, for in addition to his breezy batting he took five of the Moonrakers wickets for 97. Blunden had one for 45, Fairservice three for 25, and Lewis one for 23.

The umpires were Ayres and Cutlar. The catering arrangements for luncheons and teas during the match were excellently carried out by Mr. and Mrs. W. Wilson, assisted by an able staff of waitresses. If the Kent cricket had been as good as the catering there might have been a different tale to tell.

One more "grouse" must be made. Who were the public? Here was an attractive match staged for Sittingbourne and district, the total proceeds of which were to go to the Sittingbourne Cottage Hospital, and yet the total takings were only £11/1/3! Probably many people were looking forward to an afternoon's cricket on Tuesday, but, thanks to the Kent men, there was a blank afternoon.

The return fixture in this competition between Kent 2nd XI. and Wiltshire is being played this week-end at Salisbury, and it will be interesting to note if the Kent men do better away from their native heath than when they were on it.

OBITUARY.

MR. H. C. HACKNEY.

We regret to record that on Saturday, at the University College Hospital, London, Mr. Harold Clifford Hackney, second son of Dr. and Mrs Hackney, of Hythe, passed away after a long and painful illness.

Mr. Hackney, who was twenty-seven, was born at Hythe, and partly educated in the district. He was a very versatile sportsman, and had identified himself with local clubs and activities in this direction to an extent which will cause him to be greatly missed in many circles. He left Seabrook Lodge to complete his education at Blundell's College, Tiverton, Devon, and in 1925 entered the service of that well-known company, the Sudan Plantations Syndicate, and was engaged in cotton planting in Bakarat. Before he took up these duties, however, he had become well-known as a cricketer, having played for the Kent second eleven in 1924. He received an invitation to play in the Kent first eleven the following year, but he had to refuse on account of his call abroad.

While he was in Bakarat he started a cricket eleven among employes of the Syndicate, and also indulged a keen-

ness for polo, at which he was particularly adept. In June of 1929 he came home on sick leave, and, although his health rapidly became worse, was to be seen on the cricket ground as late as last summer playing for the Hythe Cricket Club, of which he was a popular member. He formerly played for the Band of Brothers, the East Kent Ramblers and other local teams. He was also a prominent member of the Hythe Association football team.
