

## HERTS v. BERKS.

### Good Bowling By Tarbox.

Owing to rain, no play was possible in the Minor Counties match between Hertfordshire and Berkshire at Radlett on Wednesday.

On Thursday it was impossible to make a start until after noon, owing to the wet state of the wicket. Herts elected to bat first, J. C. Bland and B. G. Oswald being the opening batsmen. The conditions were against rapid scoring, and for the first thirty minutes play was very quiet. When the luncheon interval arrived the score was 81 for one wicket, Oswald being smartly caught by Stokes off Seymour after contributing a useful 26. H. E. Dollery and Dr. W. Y. Woodburn made two excellent catches each. Dollery was instrumental in dismissing C. B. Fordham when he had made 33, and J. H. F. Mardall when he had scored 9. Woodburn caught R. P. Nelson and P. G. T. Kingsley, who compiled 6 and 2 respectively. Bland was clean bowled by R. H. C. Human after making 48, and Smith dismissed S. Brown for 37. F. Tarbox was not out 41 and A. Grimsdell not out 12 when the tea interval arrived, and Herts declared with the score 220 for 7 wickets. Berks' opening batsmen, R. J. F. Remnant and H. E. Dollery, took their stand against the bowling of C. B. Fordham and F. Tarbox. After 30 minutes Remnant was clean bowled by Tarbox for 15. Dollery was joined by Lewis, who was caught by Grimsdell for a duck, and then J. L. Carr, who followed, was dismissed for 5. Wickets were now falling rapidly, Tarbox bowling extremely well. Thirty runs were scored in the hour, and at the end of that period Dollery was caught by F. Burton. Dr. Woodburn made a short stay, being given out lbw for none off Tarbox, who had taken 6 wickets for 9 runs in 11 overs; 6 of these were maidens. R. H. C. Human was Norris' next partner, but the rot continued, and he was caught by P. G. T. Kingsley. D. W. Stokes joined Norris, and these two batsmen made the longest stand for Berks. When stumps were drawn Berks had 59 for 7 wickets.

## MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

### Dull Ending to Berkshire's Game Against Oxfordshire.

#### A RECORD FIRST WICKET STAND?

A somewhat cautious and belated declaration postponed the second day of the Minor Counties Championship match between Berkshire and Oxfordshire at Chiswick on Friday last of any interest it might have had and the game fizzed out in an unsatisfactory draw, Oxfordshire taking points for a first innings lead. Had the Berkshire skipper taken a chance instead of playing safe we should probably have seen a keen, sporting finish with the home county standing some chance of winning the match. The circumstances were these. Oxfordshire had a lead of 44 runs on the first innings, and then in the second innings Berkshire had 230 on the board when the tea interval arrived. If Dr. Woodburn had then declared—Berkshire were 186 on—the visitors would have had something more than two hours in which to get the runs. This was a task well within their power but, on the other hand, Berkshire would have had a chance of getting them out and winning. The doctor cannot be blamed for waiting until a draw was the only conceivable result before he called the batsmen in, but I think he would have won the approbation of all if he had declared at the tea interval. It would have been taking a risk, but in these days of supposedly brighter cricket such a risk would have been worth while. As it was, the Oxfordshire batsmen just played out time in a game, the dullness of which had been relieved only by the century of the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant.

The first wicket stand in Berkshire's second innings between Remnant and H. L. Lewis put on 199 runs before the former fell a victim to an awkwardly spinning ball from Walters—I wonder if this constitutes a record for the county. Remnant had scored 122 and Lewis was undefeated with his score within seven of the coveted century. Lewis seldom opened his shoulders and all his runs came from deft little snicks or turns. It was a personification of neatness, but it was not the type of cricket which thrills a crowd. The state of affairs called for free hitting, even at the cost of a wicket or two. Berkshire wanted runs quickly if they were to win the day. R. H. C. Human, the Cambridge blue, did his bit to enliven the game, but he was soon caught in the deep field off Walters. Dr. Woodburn declared at 261 for 2 wickets, and Oxfordshire opened their innings at 8.20 faced with the hopeless task of knocking up 217 if victory was to be claimed. ## CRICKET IN THE SCHOOLS.

### Katesgrove Become the Holders of the "Percy Cohen" Cup.

The final for the "Percy Cohen" Cup was played at Cintra on Monday evening. Amongst the spectators were Mr. Percy Cohen, Mr. J. Wright (chairman, Reading Cricket League), Alderman F. A. Cox, Alderman J. Rabson, Councillor Miss E. M. Sutton, Mr. Leonard G. Sutton, Mr. J. Royle, Mr. E. S. It was early evident that Katesgrove would have to play carefully to obtain the runs, and things looked very unfavourable when the first five wickets fell for 17 runs. The next three wickets fell for ten runs and with only two batsmen to go in ten runs were still required. By this time Pearce had settled down to a match winning style, and with Wicks keeping his end up the Wilson total was passed before the latter was bowled for a most valuable eight runs, which included the winning hit. Pearce, who made a faultless 16, soon commenced to have a hit, with the inevitable result that a simple catch brought the Katesgrove innings to a close with a total of 47 runs. ## A CRICKET QUERY.

### Disoussion Follows Incident in Village Match.

A cricket correspondent, commenting on the match between Mortimer 2nd XI and Pulsometer, raises an interesting query. He writes: "An incident in the game led to much discussion around the pavilion. A Mortimer batsman played the ball and it struck the wickets at the other end. Collins, whose wicket was struck, was out of his ground preparing to run. The umpire's ruling was 'out.' Was it? The opinion of the Sports Editor is solicited."

My correspondent does not say whether the wicket was actually "down"—ball must be removed before the wicket is "down." If this happened, I think ninety-nine out of every hundred umpires would give the batsman run out. This decision has, to my knowledge, been given several times without being questioned. Such a happening is not specifically mentioned in the rules, but the incident is, I would say, covered by rule 28, which reads: "Either batsman is out if in running, or at any other time, while the ball is in play, he be out of his ground, and his wicket be struck down by the ball after touching any fieldman, or by the hand or arm—(with ball in hand)—of any fieldman—run out.—Sports Editor, "Reading Standard."

For, apart from the wide disparity that existed between the respective opportunities of the sides for training and practice, we have to remember that our opponents were playing upon the type of pitch on which they had learned their cricket and, almost invariably, played it. I am strongly of opinion that were the same teams to meet in a series of matches the disparity between them would consistently lessen and, eventually, disappear; while it is not too much to believe that, were a return game played on an average countryside pitch, the result might even be reversed at the first time of asking. Also it has to be noted that in addition to the advantages mentioned, the League attack, at the outset, when the handicap was at its heaviest, was faced by several batsmen of county status. But a truce to excuses: I am sure that everyone of the League players have been gratified by the opportunity that was afforded them to gain useful experience, and will be resolved to take full advantage of it. May the opportunity be the first of many such. Thank you, gentlemen.

### INTER-SCHOOLS LEAGUE.

The meeting of the divisional champions of the two sections of the Elementary School League for the "Percy Cohen" Cup furnished a most enjoyable function that must have proved gratifying indeed, alike to the donor of the trophy; the officials of the Reading and District League, who originated the competition; Mr. L. G. Sutton, who again loaned his beautiful ground at Cintra and entertained the teams, and—especially—the school teachers who had been responsible for the training of the lads. The value of that that training was clearly exemplified in the excellent show that was given by the youthful cricketers. It was for the purpose of testifying to the marvellously improved and generally commented upon form of the lads that this note was written, though there is quite a lot I'd like to say about the game did space permit.

### DEVON v. BERKS.

### Drawn Game at Exeter.

Following on their big success against Cornwall at Camborne, Berkshire opposed Devon at Exeter on Bank Holiday and Tuesday, and some interesting cricket was seen. The match resolved itself into a close struggle for first innings advantage—a struggle which ended in Devon's favour.

Berkshire won the toss, and the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and H. L. ## BERKSHIRE ON TOUR.

### An Innings Victory Against Cornwall.

#### GOOD BATTING AND FIELDING.

The match between Cornwall and Berkshire was played at Camborne on Friday and Saturday, the visitors winning by an innings and eleven runs. Cornwall won the toss and elected to bat on an easy wicket, but were disposed of for 142. Berkshire replied with 265—H. L. Lewis batted excellently for 92 not out, carrying his bat through the innings; it was, indeed, a very patient effort. The partnership between him and Dr. Woodburn was the turning point of the game and produced 71 runs. The skipper's 53 included five 4's and was truly a captain's innings at a very difficult period of the game. He and Lewis were down and collared the attack completely.

A. H. Lewis also batted excellently from the start, his shots all round the wicket being crisp and very forceful. Hon. B. F. Remnant, with 29, and H. L. Cottrell, 17, were the next in order of merit. D. W. Stokes "kept" beautifully throughout both innings—splendidly stumping the Penzance professional in the first innings, and also took two splendid catches—standing up and taking Smith in good style.

Dr. Woodburn and Smith were by far the most successful bowlers on a wicket that did not help them in any way—a wicket in which there was no life, and played dead easy and well throughout the game. The fielding was good on both sides—particularly by the visitors, whose ground work was excellent—only one possible chance was noticed in both innings. The visitors were a much stronger and evenly balanced side—particularly so in batting.

Cornwall in the second innings were all out for 112—Rogers, the Camborne professional got 40 not out, he alone facing the attack with any degree of confidence whatever. The home skipper (B. ## DEVON MATCH DRAWN.

### Splendid Batting by Hon. R. J. F. Remnant.

Berkshire are always a big attraction at Exeter, and the Minor Counties Competition match in which they opposed Devon at the County Ground on Monday and Tuesday of this week was full of very good cricket. The visitors impressed as the stronger side in batting, bowling and fielding, yet, as luck would have it, Devon secured first innings advantage in a drawn game by a margin of half-a-dozen runs.

Splendid batting by the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant and a hectic partnership by Major J. L. Carr and A. H. Mole, too, had distinguished himself earlier by dismissing Seldon with a remarkable low catch of Woodburn's bowling. Five Devon wickets fell quickly in the half-hour before lunch, leaving the home side in a precarious position—for by this time it was very clear that the battle was for first innings points. J. G. Poynder and W. T. French, however, came to the rescue in spirited style and with an exciting last wicket stand put Devon ahead. The real struggle was now over, and the subsequent play was simply in the nature of complying with the regulations as to hours. The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant, however, again had a very fine innings.

## BERKSHIRE OUT FOR 39.

### Seven "Ducks" in First Innings Against Wiltshire.

##### PEPPARD v. STOKE ROW.

But for the comparatively unfortunate times upon which the Stoke Row club had fallen this season, the meeting of the champions with their near neighbours at Peppard who were so favourably placed for finishing honours, would have stood as one of the outstanding encounters of the season. As it was, with last year's champions practically out of the running, interest rested mainly on the effect that the result might have on the relative positions and prospects of Peppard and Checkendon. Neither of the sides were at full strength in consequence of the pull of such things as holidays and banquets which come but once a year; Peppard's lack of B. and C. Clayton and Farmborough being, in considerable measure, compensated for by the ability and willingness of R. C. Naish to step into the breach, while Stoke Row suffered an irreparable loss by the absence of their captain. Stoke Row without Ernie Stallwood and Billy Walters was a strange and unwelcome experience.

##### Percy Clayton and Naish

speedily laid the foundations of success by scoring 36 for the first wicket, but both of them, together with J. Tibbles, had gone back at 43 after an attractive partnership. Naish's innings—all singles bar one for an overthrow—could not exactly be termed unlucky, but on the whole, his exhibition, spite some lack of active service, was a clever one. Another useful and attractive partnership was that of two free hitters, Bishop and F. Tibbles, the latter of whom is batting better to-day than I've ever known him do; while Russell delighted the crowd by reaching the boundary twice in best-approved old-time style. S. Emmens who, with P. Tibbles was, for so long, the backbone of the Peppard attack, is also developing his batsmanship, and was doing well when the end came. The most successful bowler for the visitors was F. Carter, who took 6 for 34—a rare good performance especially as, if I may venture to say so, the fieldsmen did not add to their reputation for smartness.

##### Stoke Row Opened

with Brown (acting captain) and Frewin, and seemed to be in no way disconcerted by the century odd of runs that they had been set to get. Frewin, however, gave best to J. Tibbles at a total of 10, and when Brown went back at only double that number to the same bowler, half the wickets were down. Indeed, but for the helpful partnership of Carter and Wixen, the latter of whom, also, twice got to the boundary nicely, the visitors' score would have been a poor one indeed. Nevertheless, all credit to the younger section who faced the issue bravely. The bowling was shared by J. Tibbles and Bishop, who took 6 for 24 and 4 for 17 respectively.

Woodcote v. Spencers Wood.—Yet again the meeting of these old rivals resulted in a close finish, and the record in this respect that has been set up is a remarkable one. With the exception of Lord, whose hard hitting might have reversed the result had he gone in a bit earlier, and Melhuish, who did fairly well by comparison with the other of his clubmates, none of the visitors could do much with the bowling of G. Beeson and Lewendon, who took 6 for 12 and 4 for 10 respectively. When Woodcote's opening pair had scored 19 without loss, it looked an easy thing for them, but Cooke, with the remarkable average of 7 for 6, and Jessett, 3 for 13, made a procession of the remaining batsmen. Melhuish and West making brilliant catches in the long field. I should think it was a

record for First Division cricket that 18 batsmen should score an aggregate of a dozen runs—i.e., an average of two-thirds of a single.

## Good Batting by Hon. P. F. Remnant.

Rain prevented play in the match between Berkshire and Devon on Monday, but on Tuesday some interesting cricket was seen at the Kensington Road ground, Berkshire gaining first innings points. The home side, batting first, compiled 196 and then dismissed Devon for 120. Devon just failed by one run to prevent a follow on, but Berkshire did not enforce this, as only a possible 45 minutes was left in which to bat.

A feature of the Berkshire innings was the splendid batting of the Hon. P. F. Remnant. He went in at the fall of the second wicket when Berkshire's score stood at 47. The next wicket put on 39 runs. # VICTORY FOR BERKSHIRE.

## Herts Beaten in Thrilling Finish.

A good stand by the Berkshire opening batsmen, followed later by patient batting by the Berkshire skipper, Dr. W. Y. Woodburn, largely enabled the home team to knock up the useful total of 198 against Hertfordshire on the Kensington Road ground on Wednesday. Hertfordshire were then dismissed for 75.

The Hon. R. J. Remnant and H. L. Lewis opened for Berkshire, who went in to bat first, and on a wicket which favoured the batsmen runs came quickly. The partnership was dissolved at 78, Lewis being caught by Clark off Tarbox after scoring 23. J. H. Human joined Remnant, and took the score to 82 before Remnant was clean bowled by Tarbox. With the second ball sent down to him by Tarbox, the Hon. P. F. Remnant was clean bowled by the ex-Worcestershire bowler without adding to the score, and Major J. L. Carr shared the same fate, being out "leg before" off Tarbox for a duck. At lunch time Berkshire had 97 for the loss of four wickets. P. H. C. Borgnis, who followed, also made a "duck" being caught and bowled by Roberts. Dr. W. Y. Woodburn, however, stopped the rot, and he and R. W. Smith made a good stand, making on 47 runs for the ninth wicket in 40 minutes. When Smith left, Berkshire had 108 for nine wickets. H. Mundy also batted well, and remained in with Dr. Woodburn 36 minutes, putting on 80 runs in that time. Mundy cut and drove in fine style, and the partnership would no doubt have put on many more runs had not the Hertfordshire captain hesitated when Mundy had scored a two, and been run out.

The Hertfordshire innings was a dismal procession, wickets falling rapidly. They were batting for less than two hours, and scored 75 runs. One wicket was lost for three runs and two wickets for five runs, the minutes being taken to make this score. C. B. Fordham and G. R. Walker, Hertfordshire's two best bats, were dismissed for two and one respectively. Hertfordshire were 60 minutes in scoring 10 runs, and at the end of this period had lost four wickets. A.

Grimsdell, the old Tottenham and Clapton Orient footballer, who captained the side, and Roberts batted steadily, and put on 20 runs before Roberts was caught by Borgnis in the slips. Hertfordshire were just over an hour scoring 40 runs, and when they had obtained 40 Tarbox was smartly caught by Mundy at second slip. One run later Grimsdell left, after scoring six. Clark was clean bowled by R. W. Smith with the fifth ball over the over, and with the next ball of his over Smith had Burton's off-stump. R. J. Remnant bowled well, taking two wickets for 20 runs. He bowled 13 overs, eight being maidens, and had 10 hit off his bowling in one over. R. W. Smith had the best Berkshire analysis, taking five wickets for 23 runs. It is interesting to note that five batsmen were caught in the slips.

### An Exciting Finish.

There was an exciting finish to the second day's play, Berkshire needing 88 runs to win, and being left with an hour to bat. They scored 30 runs in 45 minutes to win by four wickets.

Hertfordshire batted on Thursday morning requiring 123 runs to avoid an innings defeat. On a wicket rendered easy by a shower before lunch, they quickly knocked up the runs, and when they were dismissed at 5.50 they had scored 190 runs. C. B. Fordham and G. R. Walker, the opening batsmen, batted well, the partnership producing 82 runs. Fordham compiled 74. The Hon. R. J. F. Remnant bowled well, taking four wickets for 25 runs in 10 overs. He had hard luck in not getting the hat-trick, taking three wickets in four balls. A. H. Lewis fielded well at square leg, and he was responsible for getting two batsmen run out.

Berkshire went in to bat at 8 o'clock amidst tense excitement. Rain clouds overhead threatened to stop play, but fortunately held off. The Hon. P. F. Remnant and the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant put on 20 runs for the first wicket, and then Berkshire, in an effort to force the runs, lost three wickets for eight runs. P. H. C. Borgnis was the hero of the match. He hit three fours, the first to make Berkshire's total 30, the second to make the score 40, and the third to win the match.

## CRICKET WEEK IN READING.

Rain Prevents Two Matches Being Finished.

### BERKSHIRE'S STRONG ALL-ROUND ELEVEN.

Berkshire cricket week opened on the Kensington Road ground on Friday of last week, but the weather was not kind and the games against Cornwall and Devon were not completed. In the first Berkshire did not complete their first innings, but in the Devon game they took first innings points. On Wednesday and Thursday Hertfordshire visited Reading, and a report of this match will be found on another page.

This Friday and Saturday Berkshire are at Oxford, and on Monday and Tuesday of next week they will meet Wiltshire at Kensington Road. Berkshire have been able to call on some good players this season and have fielded elevens strong in bowlers and batsmen alike.

### CORNWALL MATCH DRAWN.

#### Only an Hour's Play on Second Day

Owing to Saturday's heavy rain scarcely more than an hour's play was possible on the second day of the Minor Counties Championship match between Berkshire and Cornwall, which opened the cricket week at the Kensington Road ground, Reading, on Friday of last week. Cornwall, who had a strong batting side, won the toss and opened on a wicket which had dried remarkably well after all the rain we had had in the few preceding days.

Borgnis, the Navy fast bowler who is helping Berkshire this season, soon took toll of the visitors' wickets, and two men had returned to the pavilion when only five runs were on the board. Then came the stand of the game when S. Barnicoat joined H. S. Stoneman, and the score was taken to 138 before the latter was caught at the wicket by Stokes off Dr. Woodburn. Stoneman's 72 represented a delightful innings, for he played with accuracy all round the wicket making many fine shots on the leg side, these being an outstanding feature of his play. He hit eight fours and until he cocked up the ball from Woodburn into Stokes' alert hands, he did not give a chance worthy of the description.

Barnicoat continued to show Berkshire scant mercy and had seen four more wickets fall before he himself was out, his leg stump falling to the last ball of an over from Smith. Cornwall had been batting for three and a half hours when the tenth wicket was captured, their skipper, H. Tresawna, being caught at forward short leg off Smith.

Cornwall had scored 203 and Berkshire were faced with no easy task if they were to take points for first innings lead. R. J. Remnant, whose first hit was a three to leg, had a short life, for after scoring five he played a ball from Ollerearnshaw too soon and the bowler, running half way down the pitch, made a good single-handed catch. H. L. Lewis, whose defensive batting was admirable, was the next to go, after batting an hour for seven runs and having been dropped behind the stumps when five. He and Human tried a second run, but the ball was smartly fielded and thrown in by Whiting and the Factory player was run out. Before this, when the Berkshire score was at 24, Human had a life when, he having scored 14, Barnicoat failed to hold a difficult catch. Runs came but slowly against the bowling of Whiting, Ollerearnshaw and Mills, and at the close of play Berkshire had scored 91 for 5. Human's 58, his fifty went up after he had been in a hundred minutes, was the innings of the side, and without it Berkshire would indeed have been in a poor position. Owing to rain play did not start until after the tea interval on the second day, and after an hour Berkshire had carried their score to 127 for six wickets and so the game was drawn.

Berkshire were a useful all-round side, and it is a pity that the game should have been cut short, for they would have given Cornwall a run. The visitors were exceedingly alert in the field and their picking up and throwing in were clean and accurate. Numerically they were not strong in bowlers and the main of the work fell on the shoulders of Ollerearnshaw and the veteran, Whiting. The latter bowled forty overs and of these twenty were maidens—this despite the fact that he bruised his thumb rather badly in fielding a ball. Berkshire were able to call upon six bowlers and it is a long time since the county were able to put such a well-balanced eleven into the field.

## ANOTHER UNFINISHED GAME.

### Devon's Fight to Avoid Follow On Falls by One Run.

Although match points were not at stake an element of excitement was introduced into Berkshire's game with Devon by reason of the visiting county's struggle to avoid being forced to follow on. They failed—by one run only—but there was only forty minutes left for play and the Berkshire skipper wisely forbade to enforce his right of making them bat again. The match was due to start on Monday but owing to rain no play was possible and the game, which commenced on Tuesday, became a one day game, which meant, of course, that the team batting second had to get within 75 runs of their opponent's first innings total to avoid a follow on. Berkshire, batting first, totalled 196, and then dismissed Devon for 120. The visitors would have had to follow on had time permitted.

Berkshire won the toss and opened on a wicket which, although somewhat dead, made the ball do some queer things. The first wicket put on thirty and then the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant, attempting a pull, mistimed his stroke and put up an easy catch to the bowler. Apart from a steady 39 by H. L. Lewis the only Berkshire batting performance of note was that of the Hon. P. F. Remnant, who scored 72—including six 4's—out of 176 (for six) when he skied a ball from French and was caught at cover. Before lunch runs came freely and at the interval Berkshire had lost 3 wickets for 158 runs. Afterwards the bowlers got more out of the pitch and the remaining seven wickets fell at a cost of only 38 runs, Berkshire being all out for 196. The man who did the damage was L. J. Turi whose analysis read 12.1.39.8. Before lunch he was inclined to bowl slow and on the leg too much, but after the interval he quickened and took six of the last eight wickets to fall, two of them—Major J. L. Carr and P. H. C. Borgnis—with successive balls.

The Devon batsmen could make little headway against the Berkshire bowlers, and Dr. Woodburn showed judicious wisdom in his handling of the attack. Keeping a good length R. Remnant did well with the new ball and the batsmen could make little out of him. He bowled 12 maidens out of 21 overs and took 3 wickets for 21 runs. Dr. Woodburn played a skipper's part by capturing 3 for 19, while H. Mundy, who was getting a maximum of acceleration from the pitch, took 3 for 27. Berkshire's fielding was again splendid and Devon could never get on top of the attack. They had two wickets in hand when they wanted six runs to avoid the follow on, and the ninth wicket put on five, leaving them to get one run for the last wicket. Two balls from Woodburn were played cautiously by Turi, but then the doctor tempted him with a shortish ball which swung in a lot and he stepped out but misjudged the flight of the ball to be smartly stumped by Stokes. There could have been only forty minutes for Devon's second innings, and as it was hopeless to expect to get them out in that time stumps were drawn, with Berkshire taking points for first innings lead. All the way through Berkshire impressed one as being the stronger side and if they can retain the services of the men who have been playing this week an era of brighter cricket should dawn in the county. The cricket we have been given is well worth the price of admission charged and it is a pity that the gates have been so small. Berkshire, on their present form, deserve a better following.

## A THRILLING FINISH.

### Lightning Scoring Gives Berks Victory Against Herts.

Rain clouds were threatening overhead and the clock was ticking relentlessly on when, faced with the task of scoring 58 runs in about as many minutes if victory was to be secured, Berkshire opened their second innings in their match against Hertfordshire at Kensington Road. Hertfordshire finished their second innings at 5.30 and Berkshire had to make 58 runs to win before 7 o'clock, after allowing a ten-minute interval between the innings. They got the runs with about 13 minutes to spare and lost six wickets in the achievement of their win. It was as exciting a finish as has ever been seen in a Berkshire game and the batsmen's daring singles and twos were continually bringing outbursts of clapping and cheering from the spectators. It was a great finish to the cricket week in Reading and it was a well deserved triumph on the part of the home county.

#### TAIL WAGS VIGOROUSLY.

Berkshire, winning the toss, opened on an easy paced wicket on Wednesday and it seemed that the bowling would not unduly trouble the batsmen, for the ball did few unexpected things on a pitch which had but little life in it. Ninety-seven runs were on the board when the third wicket fell and then the middle batsmen collapsed before the slow spinners of Roberts and the fast bowling of Tarbox, and five more wickets fell for the addition of only 24 runs. With eight wickets down for 121 things did not look too pleasant, but the Berkshire tail saved the side and made ultimate victory possible. There was a good stand between Dr. Woodburn and R. W. Smith, which put on 47 runs in 40 minutes before the latter played a ball which jumped a lot into the hands of Burton at mid-on. Smith had not been too happy with the slow stuff of Roberts and had this bowler been kept on for a few more overs the Berkshire man's wicket might possibly have fallen much earlier. Mundy joined his skipper and played the bowling with confidence, always having a go when opportunity presented itself. The last wicket stand lasted for 30 minutes and put on 30 runs before Dr. Woodburn was run out in trying a second run on a risky call. He had played a worthy captain's part, and, by crisp batting and forceful hitting, without sacrificing his defence, he scored an invaluable 45.

#### R. REMNANT'S FINE BOWLING.

Hertfordshire were dismissed for 75 runs almost on close of play and no batsman mastered the bowling of the Hon. R. J. F. Remnant, P. H. C. Borgnis and R. W. Smith. At one time Remnant had the remarkable analysis of 8.6.2.2, but then he began to lose his effectiveness and in one over Roberts hit him for ten off three successive balls. Both Borgnis and Smith were making the ball come off the pitch to off at a fast pace and between them they got five men caught in the slips. Hertfordshire had thus to follow on and started their second innings on Thursday when only 45 minutes' play was possible owing to rain. The first wicket pair scored 82 when Walker was caught at the stumps and there were 115 on the board when the second went, Fordham being caught at second slip after making 74 runs. The remaining wickets fell cheaply and the side were out for 180, Berkshire having to get 58 runs in an hour to win. Remnant bowled well and of his five wickets three were taken in one over, a maiden at that, when Tarbox was caught in the slips, Vennings was stumped with the next ball, and then with the fourth ball Clark was caught at forward short leg. Remnant missed the hat trick by one ball.

#### TWENTY IN EIGHT MINUTES.

The brothers Remnant, always a popular pair with followers of the county side, started the ball rolling in dazzling fashion and scored 20 in eight minutes: hurricane cricket, this. Then P. R. Remnant was stumped, and with the next ball Tarbox got Human out in the same way, the man behind the stumps being Arthur Grimsdell, the old Spurs and Orient footballer. Berkshire continued to force the pace and lost wickets in the doing of it, five men being sent back to the pavilion with 39 runs up. Smith and Borgnis carried the score to 54 before the former was caught by Walker. Victory was assured when Woodburn joined Borgnis, for four runs were needed with twenty minutes to go, and a little more than five minutes had gone when the Navy player hit a four which gave Berkshire victory in one of the most thrilling finishes seen in this class of cricket. Borgnis hit three fours, one carried the score to thirty, the next to forty, and the third was the winning hit. Scores:—

## WILTS BEAT BERKS.

### Victory by Two Wickets.

After gaining a first innings lead of 78 runs in their match with Wiltshire at the Kington Road ground on Monday and Tuesday, Berkshire were beaten by two wickets. Berkshire scored 134 in their second innings and left their opponents to get 218 to win. Wiltshire obtained 218 for 8 wickets. It was a splendid finish, but Wiltshire were decidedly fortunate to win, as in their second innings they were three wickets down for five runs. A good stand by G. E. Butler and A. E. Lloyd stopped the rot and the Wiltshire skipper, A. Awdry, and E. M. Nash provided a good partnership for the ninth wicket which produced 62 runs.

Berkshire, winning the toss on Monday, went in to bat first and knocked up the creditable score of 148. D. W. Stokes, who opened with H. E. Dollery, played a sound innings, compiling 39 in brilliant style. C. W. Mole also batted well for 29 and he would have stayed at the wicket much longer had he not been run out in trying to get an impossible one. Carker contributed a useful 18 not out. Wiltshire lost E. H. Fuller for one run, but G. S. Butler and F. N. S. Creek made a stand against the bowling of Smith, Woodburn and Mole, and when Butler left after contributing 12 the Wiltshire score stood at 23 for 2 wickets. When he had made 11, Creek was missed by Dr. Woodburn at third slip and this proved costly to Berkshire, Creek going on to score 25, and taking the score to 68 for 7 wickets. Two more wickets fell without any addition to the total, however, and Wiltshire were all out for 70 runs, Smith (W.) being bowled by E. W. Smith after obtaining one run. It was interesting to note that Creek, Sandford and Forrester were each dismissed with the first ball of three successive overs. Smith bowled well for Berkshire, taking 6 wickets for 27 runs in 19.1 overs, 9 of which were maidens.

Berkshire followed on and when stumps were drawn had scored 11 runs for one wicket, in 20 minutes, H. E. Dollery being caught by Butler without breaking his duck. Stokes and Human batted steadily on Tuesday morning and when Stokes left with seven to his credit, Berkshire were 86 for two wickets. The next wicket fell for the addition of only one run, but A. H. Lewis, who joined Human, batted fearlessly and knocked up 34 runs in a short time, scoring one very fine six. Human left after making 41 runs, while Dr. Woodburn batted well for 80. When the Berkshire captain was caught and bowled by C. E. Awdry, the score stood at 130 for 6 wickets, and the next four wickets fell for only four runs.

Wiltshire started batting at 1 p.m. and in the half hour before lunch they fared badly, losing three wickets for 5 runs. G. S. Butler and A. E. Lloyd made a good stand after lunch and the partnership was not dissolved until 3 p.m., producing 30 runs. Lloyd was smartly stumped by Stokes after compiling a sound 42. Ten runs were put on for the next wicket and then, with the score at 164 for 1, Butler was caught by Lewis at square leg. He batted for two and three quarter hours in which time he gathered 54 runs. Awdry was then joined by E. M. Nash and Wiltshire needed 59 runs to win, with 2 wickets to fall. The Wiltshire captain, A. Awdry, batted steadily but he was fortunate. He was dropped by Smith in the slips at 16, and at 21 he "skied" the ball and was missed by Dr. Woodburn. This second miss cost Berkshire the game, for Awdry went on to amass 73 and with a four obtained the winning hit. A mistake was made in the Berkshire bowling, Smith being put on at both ends. He bowled altogether 40.1 overs and was obviously perturbed after the tea interval and should have been taken off for either Human or Carker.

## BERKSHIRE LOSE LAST GAME.

### Wilts Skipper Wins the Match After Being Dropped Twice.

Although at one time victory seemed sure for the home county, Berkshire lost their match with Wiltshire on the Kensington Road ground on Monday and Tuesday by two wickets. Berkshire scored 148 in their first innings (D. W. Stokes getting 58 and C. W. Mole, the Marlborough boy, 29), and Wilts were all out for 70, F. W. S. Creek, the Corinthian and England Soccer man, being the only player to settle down on a wicket which was making the ball pop quite a bit. When at 11 Creek was dropped at third man off Smith and then went on to get 28—a better performance than the mere figures would indicate. Smith took 6 for 27.

#### STOKES' GOOD STUMPING.

In their second inning Berkshire, who had the weakest side of the season in the field, did but moderately well and were all out just before 1 o'clock on Tuesday for 134 runs, Butler having taken four for nine in five overs, getting the last two wickets—Sayles and Caryer—with successive balls. Wiltshire were left with the task of getting 213 runs on a wicket which though rather worn was playing easier every hour. In the half hour before lunch three wickets were down for five runs, and an early finish with Berkshire comfortable winners seemed to be in store, but Butler stopped the rot and with Lloyd as a partner 62 runs were put on for the fifth wicket in a little more than 45 minutes. Lloyd getting 42 after as bright a knock as one could wish to see. He was well stumped by Stokes, who has kept well this season, and then when ten runs had been added Ling also fell a victim to Stokes' alertness. In each case it was off Human's bowling, Stokes gathering a ball which was breaking well to the off and having the balls off like lightning—very smart work indeed.

#### A POLICEMAN BOWLER.

C. E. Awdry helped to run the score to 120 for 7 when he cocked his bat to a ball from Dedman—a Berkshire policeman who has a low delivery which keeps the ball down to a remarkable degree—and gave an easy catch to the bowler. R. W. Awdry, the Wilts skipper, who won the game for his side, started his partnership with Butler in a quiet fashion and for a long while the cricket was tedious. At last, having batted 2½ hours for 54, Butler was caught at second slips—in trying to cover a ball from Smith which kicked up awkwardly he played it on to his pads and into the hands of Lewis. Eight wickets down with 64 runs needed for victory, Berkshire were still in a good position, but Awdry played a wonderful "back-to-the-wall" skipper's innings and, after having three escapes, scored 73, including nine fours, which enabled Wilts to win by two wickets.

#### WILTS SKIPPER'S ESCAPES.

Berkshire had no luck in their attempts to get Awdry. Early in his innings a "shooter" from Dedman had him beaten all the way, but the ball missed the leg stump by the proverbial coat of paint. Then when Awdry was at 16 and the Wilts total 149, Smith failed to hold a not too easy low catch in the slips. But worse was to come, for Dr. Woodburn, at cover, dropped a "sitter" from Awdry when the Wiltshire man had scored 21. Such happenings are unfortunate, but cricket is a game of uncertainties, and Awdry did not fail to profit by his escapes. One wonders why Dr. Woodburn kept Smith bowling so long when he was obviously a tired man. He had forty overs and towards the finish put down

a number of loose balls, which were freely hit. One also wonders why Human and Caryer were not given more to do—the former was "mixing 'em" and had the batsmen guessing, while Caryer was keeping the runs down. The Berkshire skipper's half-volley seemed far less likely to worry the batsmen than the bowling of Human. However, Wiltshire deserve credit for pulling the game out of the fire and turning seeming defeat into victory. Berkshire have now finished their season's programme, in which they have done quite well.

## READING & DISTRICT LEAGUE.

As is quaintly remarked by our Checkendon correspondent, "The weather was quite favourable for cricket for once," and it would seem that the experience has been too much either for the "usual dependability of the local postal arrangements or the good scribbling friends who take advantage of them. There has, as you will gather from what follows, been quite an epidemic of delayed reports this week, but they will, I have no doubt, be to hand in the morning when, though too late for comment, they will be in time for the publication of the tabulated scores, and, maybe, the bowling averages. The interest in both our competitions is concentrating as the end approaches, and the positions hold plenty of attractive possibilities. In Division I, whatever happens at Spencers Wood this (Saturday) afternoon, there will be a battle royal at Checkendon, where Peppard are the visitors next week, while in Division II, Central, though still favourites, are now faced by the possibility of being overhauled by either Emmer Green or Wyman's.

### Division I.

#### Last Week's Results.

London Road v. Spencers Wood.—Here, again, I am dependent upon the casual kindness of my friends, from whom I glean that Spencers again lost after seeming to have the game well in hand. I understand that after building up a moderate total of 46 they had captured seven opposing wickets for nine runs, but that then W. Lawrence, well backed by the tail, not only overhauled the visitors' total, but passed it by a margin of 36. Here again, also, the outstanding reports are awaited with interest.

Checkendon v. Castle Institute.—The Institute did quite as well as they were expected to do on the ground of the championship challengers, and are to be congratulated upon the plucky manner in which they are fulfilling their engagements in a competition which they did not enter by their own desire. As a matter of fact, the margin against them was 27 runs fewer than when they had entertained Checkendon a fortnight earlier. There is not a lot to say of the conduct of the game other than what is clearly spoken by the figures. The winners, headed by Scribe Pearson, who is doing well the noo, again gave a consistent display with the bat, and not a single player failed to contribute his quota of runs. They had won the match with three wickets down. The most successful bowlers for the winners were: Varley 4 for 2, Main 2 for 3 and Cooke 2 for 5. Hedges claiming the other 2 for 16. For the losers, Walker took 4 for 19, and Morgan 6 for 50. Not a single extra in either innings!

Woodcote v. Stoke Row.—For once in a way the reports from these clubs have tarried by the wayside, but far be it from me to attach any responsibility for the delay to either of the scribes, both of whom have been regular and punctual with their correspondence. When I was at Peppard on Thursday, someone who ought to know told me that this fixture was to be played for four points at Stoke Row, but this I have been unable to confirm up to the time of writing. In the circumstances, therefore, I have treated the result as governing the allocation of a single brace. The matter shall be adjusted next week should any amendment be due. I await, with interest, something in the shape of explanation of the ridiculously low totals that were scored in this game.

### Division II.

Wyman's v. Central.—When these two clubs met for the first time on the second Saturday of the season, Central won the verdict by a margin of four runs, but last week the result was reversed by a plurality of two in favour of the Printers. On the one hand Polden, going in at sixth wicket down, scored 17 of the 30 runs that came from the bat, and did much to make his side's total a fairly respectable one; on the other Simmonds, who played a patient and invaluable innings, had his hopes dashed by a low decision against Brown when within two runs of saving the game.
