INNINGS DEFEAT OF BEDS AVERTED

COUNTY CLUB'S FINE START

Bucks opened their fixtures on Wednesday and Thursday of last week by entertaining Bedfordshire at Bletchley Park.

After a day in which no play was possible Bucks, on a bad wicket, played extremely well and were well on the way to victory, Bedfordshire just managing to escape an innings defeat.

Rain had fallen heavily during Tuesday night so that the ground was unfit for play before lunch. The wind began to dry the pitch but heavy showers continued to fall at intervals—so after waiting until 4.30 it was decided that play would not be possible that day.

Thursday opened with better prospects. Bedfordshire won the toss and decided to bat, sending in Poole and Volz to the bowling of Rutter and Lund. After bowling four maidens Rutter retired in favour of Edwards. Play was painfully slow only one run being scored in 25 minutes. Lund caught and bowled Poole and Volz fell to a catch in the leg trap. Southgate was missed before scoring but the "let-off" did not matter as he was caught next over. Cook and Davidson stayed some time but only singles were scored, the latter playing on to his wicket. Both bowlers were bowling well, Lund at this time having taken four wickets for four runs. Edwards met with his first success when Baker caught Southgate. Half the wickets were down for seven runs and had all the chances that were given afterwards been accepted the score would have been a poor one. Cliff Rawlins (left hand) stayed half an hour to make double figures, and he and Davis were the only ones to make a stand, the latter hitting the only boundary scored. At lunch time after two hours play the score was only 45 for nine wickets.

Play might have been prolonged to finish the innings and thus save the time allowed between the innings. The first over after lunch finished the innings without any addition to the score.

The skipper took Powell with him to open the innings but after scoring a boundary he was caught. Stephenson filled the vacancy but did not stay long getting in front of a straight one which he missed and was l.b.w. Two for eight was a bad start but Skinner and Powell scored freely so that a double change in the bowling was made, Cook for Ward and Cliff Rawlins for his brother. This met with success. Poole making a splendid catch to dismiss Powell. When Brooke joined Skinner the score rose quickly and 49 runs were added before Brooke ran himself out, having scored 25. Rutter was sent in to get runs quickly and he soon got busy, hitting two fours and a six, and the wicket put on 24 runs. Baker joined Skinner and both batsmen treated all the bowlers alike. When Skinner was near his 50 he skied the ball and was caught. He had batted freely, hitting three fours and five threes in his 45. James and Baker continued to pile on the runs, and when Baker was bowled for 22 the innings was declared closed at 147 for 7, James being not out with 22.

Being 102 behind and with 2½ hours for play, Bedfordshire commenced their second innings. They made a bad start, losing two wickets for five runs. Then Cook and Southgate made a stand and in spite of frequent changes in the bowling, added 35 runs before Cook was caught for 28. Southgate was well set and contrived to get most of the bowling. F. Rawlins added 13 before being caught from a "skier." Time was slipping away and also Bucks' chances of a win. When the ninth wicket fell Bedfordshire had saved the innings defeat and there was no time to make the runs required so stumps were drawn just before 7 o'clock, the score being 105 for nine wickets. Southgate, who began batting just before five o'clock, was still undefeated at the close of the innings, being 39 not out and having three fours in his score. Considering that there was a blank day on Wednesday, Bedfordshire might have agreed to commence half an hour earlier on the second day.

Being holiday week there was a good attendance on the first day and the spectators were able to watch a fine century scored by Thomas in a very short time. Stephenson (Bucks) also pleased those present with some capital batting.

Winning the toss Oxfordshire decided to bat and sent in Lee and Walker.

Lee has made some good scores this season and by the way he started it looked as if he was in for another score. Rutter and Aubrey-Fletcher started the bowling and the former was successful in his fourth, seventh and tenth overs. Four wickets were down for 20.

When Lee was joined by Walters, Edwards and Stephenson were tried, but 14 runs were scored from the latter's first over. Stephenson, however, bowled Lee in his third over. Crawshay did not stay long, but when Hartley joined Walters the fielders had more leather hunting. After adding 55 to the total Hartley was out l.b.w. Thomas came in and soon began to score. He hit four boundaries in succession and quickly caught up his partner, who after scoring 52, was bowled by Rutter.

HURRICANE HITTING

Thomas continued his hurricane hitting getting most of the bowling. From one over from Skinner he scored 22 runs—one six, three fours and two twos. He treated all the bowling with scant respect and was loudly cheered on reaching three figures. The last two batsmen only scored six between them but Thomas scored runs while they kept their end up. When the last wicket fell he was still undefeated with 114 to his name. He hit two sixes and eighteen fours. The spectators were delighted with his hitting and gave him a warm ovation when returning to the pavilion. The time occupied in scoring his runs was not long and he gave few if any real chances. CAUTIOUS BUCKS

Play slowed down for a time as the bowling was good, an occasional four coming to relieve the monotony of singles. Byass was bowled after scoring 23. Brooke (the batsman who did so well in the second innings at Norwich) now joined Stephenson and the hopes of Bucks began to rise till Brooke was l.b.w. Skinner, Baker and Southall, who have been making runs this season all failed, so that although three wickets were down for 94, when the sixth fell the total was only 105. Stephenson and James played out time, the score being 128, Stephenson having made 66. His innings was in contrast to that of Thomas, but he played the right game for his side. He watched the ball carefully and scored off the loose ones. He had five fours and four threes in his score. The bowling analysis speaks for itself. The attendance during the day was 754. As both sides had not completed an innings, the game does not count in the championship. It was a great disappointment to the public and all concerned.

Brown and Forham were bowling well, the latter hooking the tall deliveries from Rutter to the boundary. After scoring 18 (three fours) he was l.b.w. Brown missed a straight one from Rutter and was bowled.

Hodgson was missed at mid off, but the 'let off' was of no consequence as he was bowled in the same over. Tarbox now joined Nelson and helped to raise the score to 45 before he was stumped. With five wickets down for 45 runs the game was in an interesting condition. Would the tail end do as well as those gone before or would they fail? Tea was taken with the score 51 for 5, Nelson being not out 16.

When the game was resumed Nelson, who had batted well before tea fell in the first over. Hoare (a newcomer to county cricket) came in and should have been caught before scoring, a misunderstanding took place between Rutter and Skinner and the ball dropped between them. However after scoring five he was l.b.w. The hopes of Herts faded away and those of Bucks rose as each wicket fell. When the last man came in 32 runs were required to win. A splendid piece of fielding by Stephenson and a smart return to the bowler enabled Edwards to break the wicket before Burton could get home. Thus ended a fluctuating game in a win for Bucks. BUCKS TURN THE TABLES

89 RUNS WIN OVER KENT

Bucks turned the tables on Kent during the week, when they beat them on the London Road ground, on Tuesday, by 89 runs. Earlier in the season at Tunbridge, Bucks were beaten by six wickets. The batting of Byass in the first innings, and the bowling of Hazleton, Rutter and Skinner were features of the match.

The weather was cold when play started on Monday. Franklin again won the toss and decided to bat, taking Byass with him to the wicket; Watt and Peach started the bowling and runs came slowly in singles, except for three boundaries by Franklin. With his score 17, the skipper was out to a running catch by Lewis. Skinner did not stay long, being lbw. Brooke now joined Byass and made a stand so that the bowlers were changed. Watt, who had bowled four maidens in succession gave way to Blunden and Lewis (left hand), relieved Peach. Brooke brightened up the scoring and caught his partner up when 31. Lewis was bowling a good length, his first ten overs producing only 11 runs. The hundred went up at 1.15 p.m., the batsmen being neck and neck towards 50. However, when within 4 of that total, Brooke was smartly stumped. His chief hits were four fours and three threes. The third wicket had put on 78 runs. Lunch was taken soon after with the score 120 for three, Byass being 47 and Baker four. When the game was resumed, Peach and Watt were the bowlers. After batting 2 hours 20 minutes, Byass reached his 50, which contained 31 singles. After several changes, Byass was caught at leg for 76. This is his highest score for the county and was made without giving a chance. His runs were mostly singles till he had passed the 50 mark. Hamilton (who is a new recruit for the county) came in and saw 200 up at 3.30 p.m.. He did not stay long, but made some good strokes. He was also very good in the field. Aubrey Fletcher joined Baker, but after opening with a four, was clean bowled. James who followed, also had a boundary but had the misfortune to play the next ball on to his wicket. Baker's innings was closed by the smartness of the wicket keeper. The last wicket fell with the score 243 and tea was taken.

Pearce and Hubble opened the Kent innings and made a bad start, the latter being caught in Rutter's first over. Fagg, who came in, was lbw. in Hazleton's second over, two wickets being down for only one run.

The skipper (Simpson) joined Crawford but did not stay long, being bowled for two. Lewis was beaten by Hazleton and six wickets were down for only 18 runs. This collapse was unexpected as the wicket was perfect, and reminded the spectators of the collapse of the Bucks side last year when Kent got them out for 26. Lund got several loose balls on the leg side but the batsmen did not score off them. After raising the total to 86, Crawford was bowled by Rutter. He had played sterling cricket hitting five fours. It may be noted that Rutter and Crawford both hail from the same school (Tonbridge) and had played together. With the fall of Crawford's wicket play ceased for the day, the score being 86 for 7, Levett being 22. Kent will have their work out on to save the follow on.

On the second day the sun was shining and the weather warmer. Levett (22) and Watt went to the wicket and faced Hazleton and Rutter. Levett scored twice off the edge of the bat and lost Watt when he had scored two. Rutter was given a rest after bowling 8 overs for 8 runs. The last pair of batsmen put on 26 before Blunden was bowled. The total only reached 130, a much better score than at one time looked possible. Hazleton had the best analysis but Rutter and Lund bowled well. Franklin did not make Kent follow on and intending to get runs quickly altered the batting order. At 12.15 Bucks commenced their second innings, but Byass did not repeat his first inning score. Brooke came in and he and Franklin soon settled down. The fielding of the team was splendid the captain setting them a good example. Brooke seemed content to score

singles, whilst Franklin had several boundaries. Sixty runs were scored in the first hour. Franklin reached 50, after batting for just over an hour. At lunch time the score was 84 for 1. Franklin 52 and Brooke 18. The luncheon interval again caused a separation, as on resuming Franklin only added two when he was snapped at the wicket. His innings contained five fours and three threes. A single to James sent up 100.

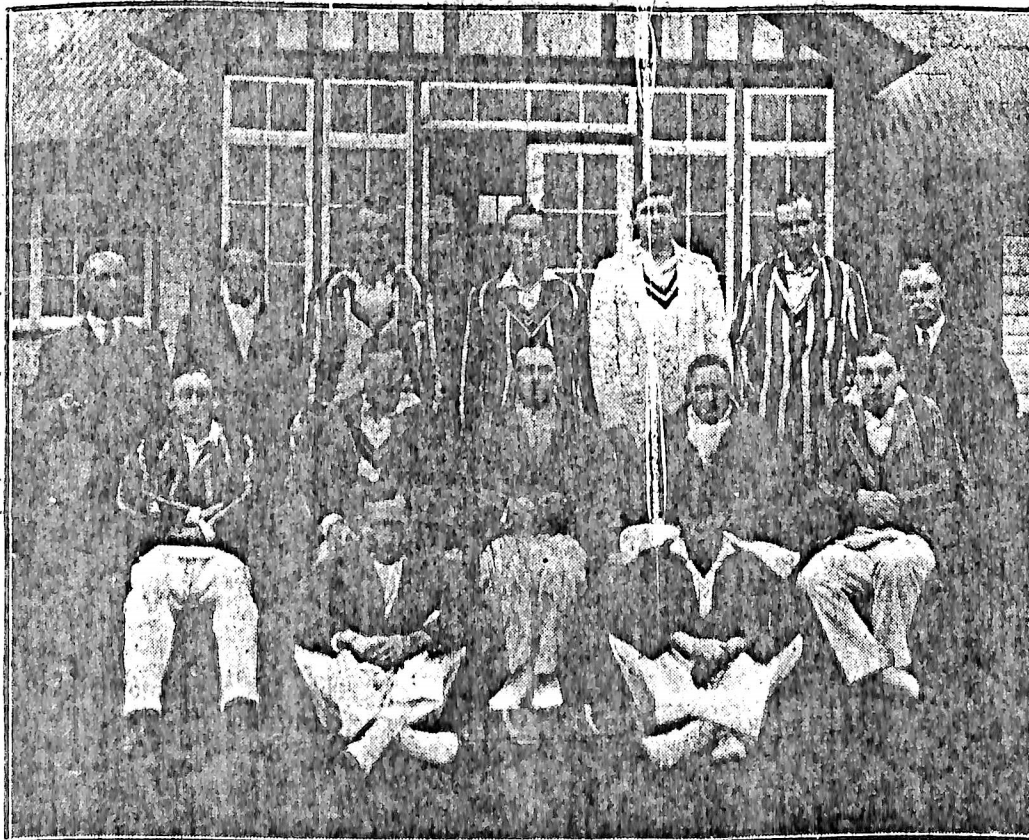

THE LATE DR. WEAVER ADAMS.

A Skilled Medical Man and a Great Sportsman.

As briefly announced last week, Dr. Edmund Weaver Adams, F.R.C.S., the Medical Officer of Health for Slough, died suddenly on Thursday, September 24th, whilst enjoying a well-earned holiday at Llandrindod Wells. Thus, at the comparatively early age of 62 years, a brilliant career has been brought to a close. Only a few days previously he had said how much better he seemed for the rest, and that he was feeling quite fit again. Dr. Adams was one of the best known public men in the district and the sad news of his death came as a great shock to everyone in Slough, and particularly to members of his own family, for whom the deepest sympathy is felt.

Dr. Adams was spending a holiday with Mr. and Mrs. Boret, his son-in-law and daughter, at Llandrindod Wells, where Mr. Boret was convalescing from the serious injuries he sustained in a motor accident some weeks ago. Everything had gone well and the party were thinking of returning in a few days time.

On Thursday of last week, the doctor and Mr. and Mrs. Boret went for a motor drive in the country. On the return journey they left the beaten track and the car became stuck in a small stream ten or twelve miles from Llandrindod. Dr. Adams, with his customary vigour, endeavoured to extricate the car, but all his efforts were unavailing. It was a lonely spot and Mrs. Boret walked some distance to a farm house in the hope of getting some assistance. She was, however, unsuccessful in her quest. On returning she found Mr. Boret and Dr. Adams still struggling with the car and she again went to seek help.

At that time, Dr. Adams, although apparently rather tired, still seemed perfectly well. His exertions necessitated a great deal of crouching owing to the position of the car, and he took several short rests, but he was unable to move the vehicle. When Mrs. Boret again returned she and her husband both noticed that Dr. Adams was showing marked sign of weariness, and they persuaded him to lie down for a short time. She went and fetched a rug for her father and as she was spreading it he became unconscious and passed away before assistance could be obtained.

Owing to the fact that Dr. Adams had never taken a day off on account of illness and had not been medically examined for some years an inquest was deemed necessary. The facts as stated were laid before the Coroner by Mr. and Mrs. Boret and by Dr. Ralph Weaver Adams. The medical evidence clearly showed the cause of death, and a verdict of death from heart failure was returned.

Although Dr. Adams appeared to be in exceptionally good health, it had been known for some years that his heart was not over-strong. As far back as 1920, he somewhat unwillingly brought his brilliant cricket career to a conclusion on the advice of Lord Dawson of Penn. It was a very fine finish, too, for he ended a remarkable record by scoring three centuries in a week. Full of energy and enthusiasm for his professional duties, Dr. Adams never gave up any of his work, although it was obvious to those around him that at the time he suffered both pain and inconvenience.

A LIFE OF USEFUL WORK.

Dr. Adams was born in London in 1869, and was educated at the City of London School, where he greatly distinguished himself both at work and at play. From school he proceeded to King's College Hospital, and in due course became qualified, obtaining his degree as a Fellow of the College of Surgeons at the lowest permissible age.

There was the promise of a distinguished hospital career, but Dr. Adams elected a life of general practice rather than that of a specialist in surgical knowledge, in which a great opening awaited him. He came to Slough about 1893, and became a colleague of Dr. Dodd, who occupied the same house in Church-street, where Dr. Adams had since resided. He was married in 1894. Two years later he was appointed Medical Officer of Health for Slough, an appointment he held to the time of his death.

Dr. Adams built up a wonderful practice as a "family doctor," and so great were his services in demand that on occasion he appeared to work all day and half the night as well. Despite this, he found time to undertake many duties on behalf of the community. He was medical officer to the Princess Alice Home, where he always had a cheerful word for the men who were disabled in the War. He was Inspecting Officer to the County Education Committee, Surgeon and a prominent organiser in connection with the St. John Ambulance Brigade, and in the early days he gave lectures to both the Slough Town and G.W.R. Divisions; also he acted as Hon. Surgeon to the Convalescent Home at Upton, which was associated with the Paddington Green Children's Hospital.

One of his greatest interests was in connection with the Slough Nursing Fund, with which he had long been associated, and its offshoot the Maternity Home. Although he did not appear in an official capacity Dr. Adams was largely responsible for the birth of the latter institution, and he put in a tremendous amount of voluntary work in connection with it. Infant Welfare and Maternity was a work with which he had always closely identified himself, because he was a strong believer in and advocate of the value to the nation of looking after the mother and the child. Dr. Adams was truly regarded as a maternity specialist, and few medical men had seen more babies make their entry to the world than he had. Small wonder then that Mrs. Weaver Adams should desire that any memorial to her husband should take the form of a donation to the Maternity Home rather than in floral tributes.

Dr. Adams was also greatly interested in missionary work, and particularly in the medical side. As Hon. Treasurer of the Slough Branch of the Church Missionary Society, he never lost an opportunity of advocating the necessity of missionaries attending the bodily welfare of those to whom they taught Christianity. For many years he was a member of the Slough Leopold Institute.

AS A SPORTSMAN.

There was no keener sportsman in the true sense of the word than Dr. Adams. From the time of his arrival in Slough he manifested his interest in cricket in general, and in the Town Club in particular. It was always his earnest wish that Slough Cricket Club should become the lease-holders of their present ground, and he was largely responsible in making this an accomplished fact. For several years he acted as hon. secretary, and in 1899 succeeded Mr. R. C. de Winton in the captaincy, a position he held until his enforced retirement. Under his able guidance a great cricket side was built up, and for many years opposing sides considered it a real honour to administer a defeat to his team.

During the first quarter of the century Slough provided many county players. Dr. Adams was perhaps the best of many prime batsmen who played for the Club during that period, and it was very rare that his average for the season fell below 50. As a bowler his lobbs earned a great deal of respect from opposing batsmen, and he occasionally put up some excellent performances for his side. His fielding, like his batting, was exceptionally accurate and reliable. He played for many years for the County, whenever his professional duties allowed him to do so, and on several occasions he rendered very useful service. The highest score of his life was 162, which was compiled for the county.

Since his retirement from active participation in the game, Dr. Adams has maintained his interest in the administrative side of the club, and up to the time of his death was taking a leading part in the effort to complete the purchase of the ground. Dr. Adams' interest in sport was not limited to cricket.

At athletic meetings at the Dolphin Ground he invariably held an official position, and was a keen supporter of the Slough Football Club. In his earlier days he played a good game of tennis, and at five he attained something above the average of proficiency. As a young man he was a great runner and at school carried off many prizes.

AN IMPRESSIVE FUNERAL.

The esteem and respect in which Dr. Adams was held by all classes in the town was manifested at the funeral which took place at Upton on Monday afternoon in the grave of his son, who was killed in a flying accident during the War. The body was brought from Llandrindod Wells overnight and taken direct to St. Laurence Church. Seldom has a larger congregation assembled, and not one half of those who desired to attend the service were able to be accommodated. The officiating clergy were the Bishop of Buckingham and the Rector of Slough (Canon A. G. P. Baines), assisted by the Vicar of St. Paul's (Rev. A. A. Dowsett), Rev. J. B. Marsh and Rev. F. Waller. The service was extremely simple, and included the 90th Psalm and the hymn, "Art thou weary." At the close the organist, Mrs. Clarence Blanchett played, "O Rest in the Lord." The committal sentences at the graveside were recited by the Bishop of Buckingham in the presence of a great assembly of sympathisers. Afterwards the members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade filed past the grave, which was lined with evergreens and flowers, and saluted.

The family mourners were Mrs. Weaver Adams (widow), Dr. and Mrs. Ralph Weaver Adams (son and daughter-in-law), Mr. and Mrs. Heath-Godwin (son-in-law and daughter), Mr. and Mrs. Boret (son-in-law and daughter), Capt. and Mrs. Baines (son-in-law and daughter), Dr. W. S. Adams (brother), Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Adams (brother and sister-in-law), Mr. and Mrs. A. John Adams (brother and sister-in-law), Mrs. Joseph Adams (sister-in-law), Major D. Guy Adams (nephew), Major Paul W. Adams (nephew), and Mrs. David Martineau (niece).

The main entrance to the church was lined by the members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, the Cadets and Nursing Divisions, the officers present being: Reserve Supt. Smith, Supt. Hall, Supt. Judd, Cadet-Supt. Druce, Cadet Officers Rees and Orchard, Lady Ambulance Officer Hall, Lady Ambulance Officer Miss Gomm and Lady Cadet Officer Mrs. Butler. Dr. S. J. C. Holden, the County Medical Officer, and County Surgeon to the Brigade, was in attendance, together with Major P. G. Darvil-Smith (County Commissioner) and Mr. W. Scott Evans (County Secretary). For many years Dr. Adams was a Corps Surgeon of the Brigade, and Lecturer and Examiner of the Association.

Nearby were stationed the disabled soldiers from the Princess Alice Home.

The Chairman of the Slough Urban Council was unable to be present, but he was represented by Mrs. E. T. Bowyer, and his son, Mr. C. P. Bowyer. Other members of the Council present were: Councillors L. S. A. Bull (Chairman of the Health Committee), C. E. Shrapnell, W. H. Ford, H. Phillips, F. R. Whiteman and R. M. Price, with Mr. F. R. Duxbury (clerk), Mr. George Moxham (deputy clerk), Mr. Alan Bromly (surveyor), and Mr. J. Dempsey (sanitary inspector).

Many members of the medical profession attended as a token of respect to a late colleague, including Dr. W. Attlee (representing Eton College Medical Board), Dr. and Mrs. Burridge and Mr. Burridge, junr., Dr. and Mrs. Millar, Dr. Fraser, Dr. Hypher, Dr. O'Connor, Dr. Brickwell, and Dr. Stanley Mansfield.

The Slough Cricket and Bowls Club was represented by Messrs. H. Jones, M. L. Waiter, J. Paterson, S. Dupe, R. Young, G. Fisher, E. R. Smith, W. E. Baker, H. G. Willmott, G. Rolph, H. Lewis, G. Dewley, J. C. Berry, C. Rohde.

Mr. F. Proctor and other members of the Committee represented the Leopold Institute. The Elementary Schools of the town were represented by Mr. R. A. Stone (Moutem), Mr. W. G. Drewett (Slough National), Mr. S. J. Warring (Chalvey National) and L. A. Hill (Thomas Gray). Miss Power (the Matron) and members of her staff represented the Princess Alice Home: Mr. D. C. Joseph the Slough Y.M.C.A.; and Mr. S. G. Gallop represented the "Court North Star" A.O.F., of which Dr. Adams was medical officer for many years.

SLOUGH.

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Slough's Great Loss.

By the death of Dr. E. Weaver Adams, which occurred with such tragic suddenness last week, Slough has lost one of its foremost public men. For nearly forty years he had been one of the leading medical practitioners in the town, and this, combined with his official position as Medical Officer of Health, brought him into touch with the majority of the inhabitants of the town. As the "family doctor" he was respected by all his patients, who reposed the greatest confidence not only in his medical skill, but in his kindness of heart and fatherly advice. He paid equal attention to all classes, and only this week a panel patient was heard to remark: "Well, he has twice saved my life and he could not have given me greater attention if I had paid him one hundred guineas a visit." That in essence is how the majority of his patients were wont to speak of Dr. Adams, because he was such a humane man. Of him it has been well and truly said, "He went about doing good." His was a very active life, and there were many who thought he should have eased off some years ago. The many activities of Dr. Adams are well known. Apart from his professional duties he took a keen interest in anything that made for the good of the town and the benefit of the community. He was a most able writer, and he had the gift of making a report, whether it referred to cricket or the health of the town, most interesting reading. Above all he was a great sportsman in the truest sense of the word. He played the game for the love of the game, and whether his side was successful or otherwise, he derived the same pleasure with the knowledge that he had done his best. His cricket career was closed somewhat prematurely, but by scoring three separate centuries in the closing stages it had a glorious finish. We had the privilege of seeing his last century, one of the finest he had ever compiled. The suggestions put forward with regard to a memorial to Dr. Adams are excellent. There could be no more fitting testimony to his work than the clearing off the debt on the Maternity Home and naming one of the wards the Adams Memorial Ward. We are sure if such a scheme is put forward by the Committee it will receive the generous support of a large number of people not only in Slough, but in the surrounding district, where Dr. Adams was almost as well known, and his good work equally appreciated.

SLOUGH CRICKET AND BOWLS CLUB.

1st XI's Batting and Bowling

Averages.

Much has been written upon the disastrous weather during the past summer, and the Slough Club suffered in no small way from the atrocious weather. Of the 20 games arranged only 10 were completed, 6 being drawn, mostly because of delays owing to rain, 4 being abandoned after about an hour's play, and on 3 occasions it was not possible to even bowl one ball. But in the remaining 10 games the team did splendidly, winning 10 and lost but 0, a record much superior to any for the last four or five seasons. The team has many fine performances to its credit, and the victories over the M.C.C., Beaconsfield (twice), and Shepherd's Bush were particularly brilliant ones, Slough being the first team to beat Shepherd's Bush during the season. Ickenham were beaten easily as were Uxbridge, but other fine wins were those at Wargrave on Whit-Monday, against the G.W.R. at Castle Bar Park, and versus the Polytechnic at Chiswick. The defeats were with the exception of the Surbiton game all of a close nature and the failure of the batting was the cause of them all. Against the Polytechnic at home the team were set but 73 for victory, and could only get 60. Rickmansworth scored 114 and then got Slough out for 83, but the most disastrous batting was again at Shepherd's Bush at home, when, after dismissing the strong opponents for 92 runs, Slough could only score 58. Of the drawn games four at least ended in Slough's favour. So the Club have every reason to be pleased with their season's work. The Captain, Mr. H. Jones, has, through illness etc., been absent from the side for a considerable number of games, but so admirable has the team work of the side been that the task of the Deputy-Captain has been an easy one. V. Lund has once more finished at the top of the bowling averages, and has again justified his claims to a regular place in the County XI. Lund had many splendid bowling spells during the season, but his best was undoubtedly his 5 for 22 against the Bucks Club and Ground, although his 7 for 19 against Wycombe was magnificent work. W. H. McConnell, although not returning such a good average, has been a fine stock bowler and his immaculate length has tested the patience of no small number of batsmen. McConnell's 5 for 28 against the Polytechnic, was his finest performance. Black has had a disappointing season, but towards the end, especially against Hounslow, showed signs of returning to his best. Robey, too, did good work, as did Skinner, especially in the latter case, against Beaconsfield. Neither Stott nor Edwards played very often, but both proved the value of their services when playing. The batting was except for rare occasions, deplorably weak and it is obvious that batsmen must be found. Southall, after being deposed for one season, is again top of the batting average, but he has not been available very often, most of his cricket being confined to Bank Holiday, Cricket Week and Mid-week matches. Wilmot, of the regular Saturday men, returns the best average, and still shows signs of developing into a great batsman. The appearances of P. W. Durlacher, who scored two centuries in his four innings, were unfortunately all too few—he would have been a great asset to the team had he been able to play regularly, and this remark also applies to Skinner.

It only remains in conclusion to express a word in appreciation of the great help to the team Mr. George Pitthouse gives as its Hon. Umpire, his keenness and concentration on his job, and of the undoubted pleasure the whole team and their opponents take in being in his company. There are many others who have helped the Captains and the team during the season. The list is too large to mention every one individually, but all the assistance given is appreciated, as are, once again, the splendid teas provided by that willing band of lady helpers. CRICKET CLUB'S "108 NOT OUT"

High Wycombe Players Hold Their Annual Dinner

TREASURER TALKS HISTORY

High Wycombe Cricket Club, founded 1823, is still going strong; and their annual dinner, held in the Mayor's Parlour at the Town Hall on Monday night, indicated that the popularity and strength of the Club after its 108 seasons has not waned.

Mr. P. J. Birch (son of a former captain of the Club, the late Alderman Walter Birch, J.P.) was the chairman, and he was supported by the Mayor (Alderman W. H. Tyzack, J.P.), Mr. W. B. Franklin (captain of the Bucks County C.C.), Mr. Ralph Birch, Mr. G. H. Brocklehurst, Mr. W. H. Healey, J.P., Mr. J. Gibson, J.P., Rev. W. Bleiben, Mr. W. Bliss, Mr. T. Thurlow, Mr. H. R. Luttman, Mr. J. H. M. Gibson, Councilor H. Aldridge, Mr. Harold Baker, Mr. R. G. Brocklehurst, Mr. W. L. Jackson, Mr. J. P. Gee and Mr. W. M. Pierce. The long associations between the High Wycombe C.C. and North Middlesex C.C. were again demonstrated by the presence of Mr. H. W. Wheeler (past President of the Club Cricket Conference), Mr. C. W. Morrison (13 years captain of the North Middlesex C.C.), Mr. H. Lester (the present Captain), and Mr. J. A. It was announced that Mr. F. R. Gomme was unable to attend owing to family bereavement.

Grace was said by the Rev. W. Bleibert (Vicar of Christ Church), and the Chairman gave the loyal toasts.

Councillor G. H. Brocklehurst, giving "The High Wycombe Cricket Club," said that in a few days' time he would have completed a quarter-of-a-century in High Wycombe, and nearly twenty years he had been elected hon. treasurer of the High Wycombe C.C.—which was still solvent.

"As the Rye has been common land since the 14th century, it is fairly safe to surmise that this valuable site was the cradle of Wycombe cricket," he went on. "No records seem to be extant until the year 1823, when a set of rules was printed, a copy of which is framed and hung in the pavilion. As far as can be ascertained, there is no authentic history of the Club until it is picked up by an old minute book commencing in 1858.

"There were defaulters, and arrears even in those 'good old days,' and the names of the former were boldly set out in the records. Much debate and trouble did these occasion, and a proposal to consult a solicitor with a view to taking forcible measures of recovery was agreed upon, but no mention of any proceedings being taken is reported.

"In 1870 the Wycombe Amateur C.C., as it was then called, joined forces with the South Bucks C.C. (a rival local club) and since then has run under its present name.

"In 1888 the Club secured the present private ground on lease from the then Lord Carrington, who for many years was President of the Club. The pitch was levelled and turfed under the advice of the late Sam Apted, of the Oval. Within the year before his death, the late Marquis of Lincolnshire gave us a lease for fifty years at pre-war rent. I think High Wycombe and the cricket-loving people should always reverence the name of the Marquis of Lincolnshire. (Applause).

"Going back to the earlier history of the Club, we find that a curious custom prevailed in the 'sixties. The teams always dined at the 'Coach and Horses' after the match, and the tables being cleared, the first item on the programme was the rolling of the ball from the head of the long table by the home captain, to the rival skipper at the foot, to be returned by that worthy in a similar manner. The first who failed to make the ball complete its course had to bear the expense of liquid refreshments to the company. This was before the days of round or over-arm bowling."

20 YEARS AGO

Mr. Brocklehurst did not think the Club had quite such a formidable eleven now as twenty years ago! (Laughter). But those who did play had quite a jolly good time, and the feeling between the players was good.

He would mention Leslie Baker, who had the splendid average of 50.9 runs for 15 innings.

In bowling, the man at the top of the averages was R. R. Britnell, who, from 26 overs had secured 9 wickets for 77 runs.

They appreciated Mr. Britnell's work as their hon. secretary; no one could reckon the amount of time he spent in the interests of the Club.

They appreciated the support of the vice-presidents, but for which the Club could not be run as it was run to-day. The Club was grateful to "Laddie" Page, also, for his fine services on the ground. They did not know what he would do when he reached his jubilee, but they all hoped that he and his wife would be spared for many years to continue their services.

With the toast were coupled the names of L. G. Baker and Allan Jones. Baker, continued Mr. Brocklehurst, had proved a very able captain. Allan Jones, who took over the captaincy of the "A" team, was following in the footsteps of his father (Mr. Maurice Jones), who 20 years ago was a good cricketer.

Mr. L. G. Baker, in his response, "hit back" at Councillor Brocklehurst for intimating that the team was not so good as when he used to play. Although the weather gave them a rough season, they had some very exciting finishes. He paid tribute to Jim Ball, who started off the season with the "hat-trick" against Reading. He also spoke of the support given him by H. E. Page, captain of the second eleven, who often supplied players to fill vacancies in the first eleven at short notice.

Mr. Allan Jones said that good help was given by Mr. Bexon and other members of the Club, and remarkable keenness had been shown throughout the year. It was no rare experience to find on a Saturday morning, half the "A" team missing, because they had been requested to play for the second eleven, some of whose players had been drafted into the first eleven at short notice!

He recalled how, when they had a fixture at Stokenchurch, they stopped a car and discovered that the occupant was Will Jackson, who came and played for the "A" team and scored a crafty 60 runs. (Laughter).

"A" team had no ground, but occasionally they were able to secure the Royal Grammar School pitch. The School had provided them with some very good players, and he hoped they would get more support from that source.

Now that they had got a new ground, there was no reason why the Club should not run four elevens.

CUP WINNERS

The Chairman presented trophies, as follows: the Bastick Cup, won by Leslie Baker — average, 50; T. Peace Year Cup, given by Councillor John Gibson, J.P., won by S. A. Keen, who, in eleven innings, scored 339 runs, and came out with an average of 83.9. Mr. Keen was unable to be present, and Mr. H. E. Page accepted the cup on his behalf.

Mr. Norman Theed, in the name of the High Wycombe Club, extended a hearty welcome to all representatives of other clubs — Beaconsfield, Slough and Bucks County. He congratulated the Mayor

(Alderman Tyzack) on the honour conferred on him. The Club wished him a happy and prosperous year of office.

They had with them Mr. W. B. Franklin, who was not only a fine leaver of the Bucks County Cricket Club, but a wicket-keeper who should have played for England. (Cheers).

With them, also, they had Mr. Wheeler, a member of the North Middlesex Club and a past President of the Club Cricket Conference; and others — not forgetting Jack Ritanie. (Cheers). With North Middlesex they had had many needle games, and they had to thank Mrs. Ritchie for the splendid hospitality he provided for the Wycombe players at all times.

Mr. H. Jones, Mr. Gladwell and his son were representatives of the Slough C.C.; and Mr. James and Mr. Montague of Beaconsfield. Another guest was Frank Edwards, one of the mainstays of Bucks County cricket, and who headed the bowling averages of the Minor Counties last season. (Applause).

Mr. W. B. Franklin (the County skipper), for all the guests, thanked the High Wycombe C.C. for their hospitality. He was a visitor to High Wycombe about three times every year, for the county games, and they all enjoyed their county games at High Wycombe — firstly, because of the ground; secondly, because the wicket was always perfect; and, thirdly, for the considerable amount of support which they always received from High Wycombe and the surrounding districts.

Last season with the Bucks County Club was an exceptionally good one; they finished third in the championship table, and they should have been first, without any doubt. In their first match against Bedfordshire they lost on the stroke of time; and at Luton, when the return was played, it rained incessantly, and from their lead they should have won on the second day.

Someone had referred to Frank Edwards, top of the Bucks County averages. He could tell them that Edwards' average was seven runs per wicket—a remarkable performance.

COUNTY HOPES

As to the future — Bucks would have much the same team next season; the only change would be the man (Kitching) who took the "Varsity" record for the highest score in a twelve hours' contest. (Cheers). He thought that, with tuition from the Bucks old stagers, there was no reason why Bucks C.C. should not develop into a really fine team.

Mr. Wheeler (North Middlesex) said he had been to High Wycombe on many occasions, and he was always sure of a hearty welcome. Hitherto he had come as a guest of a friendly club, and he could say that they had had some very pleasant games and a High Wycombe welcome.

Mr. W. Bliss gave "Our Chairman — Percy John Birch," who, he said, had carried out his duties in an efficient manner. Their Chairman was a well-known member of the firm of William Birch, Ltd., and that night they had various branches of the family with them. His father (the late Mr. Walter Birch) was a cricketer of repute, and so was his uncle (Mr. Charles Birch). The members of the family had taken an interest in the property of the town.

At one time their Chairman was also a good cricketer, and the speaker was told that after he dropped it, very few could beat him at the ancient game of darts! But whatever sport Jack Birch entered—he always played the game.

The company sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," and cheered the Chairman.

In his reply, Mr. Birch thanked the Mayor for being with them. He also expressed appreciation of the honour of being asked to take the chair.

Mr. Birch recalled one of his earliest matches, when his side were all out for four (two byes)! When Amersham came to bat against the R.G.S., Bob Orton, of Amersham, hit the ball out of the ground for six! (Laughter). Mr. Birch added his appreciation of the services of Mr. and Mrs. Page and Dick Britnell, who did every job well.

The artists were Mr. Clay Thomas (baritone), Mr. Will Gardner (humorist), and Messrs. N. Plumridge, I. Williams, and Wright (violin), all members of the local club. All were recalled many times. Mr. Cliff Williams was the accompanist.

Community singing was led by Messrs. C. W. Birch and Frank Lord.

Catering was by Sherriffs, of High Street, and Mr. H. H. Lee, of the Falcon Hotel.
