

**DORSET CLUB AND GROUND v. M.C.C.**

A touring eleven of the M.C.C. met Dorset Club and Ground at Poole Park on Monday and Tuesday, and some excellent cricket was seen, the match resulting in a draw. The M.C.C. went in first, and were disposed of for the rather moderate total of 103. This was due to the very fine bowling of Captain Henderson, of the R.A.F., a native of Sherborne recently returned from Egypt, who came out with the remarkably good analysis of 21 overs, 4 maidens, 43 runs, 7 wickets: Brockway claiming the other three for 39 runs. Dorset then went in, and at the close of play on Monday had scored 162 for four wickets. On Tuesday Dorset carried their total to 219, thanks to some excellent batting by Major H. C. Byrte (56), F. C. T. Honey (47), and H. M. Morris (30). H. J. Killick was the visitors' most successful bowler, claiming six wickets for 51; G. Crwys-Williams got two for 57, Captain W. H. Anderson one for 11, and Tregear one for 58. In their second innings M.C.C. did better, and, thanks to a splendid innings of 85 not out by J. F. Crawford (captain of the team), declared with their total at 211 for nine wickets. Of the Dorset bowlers, C. Speer had two wickets for 18, T. K. O'Brien two for 39, H. M. Morris two for 67. DORSET v. MONMOUTH.

MATCH DRAWN AFTER AN EXCITING FINISH.

When Dorset and Monmouth met at Abercarn a week or so ago, in the Minor Counties Championship, the result was a draw, with Dorset very unlucky not to win by an innings, the weather alone saving Monmouth. The teams met for the return match at Bridport on Tuesday and Wednesday, and on this occasion Monmouth were unlucky, for when the last ball of the match was sent down the visitors needed two runs to win, which they failed to obtain, and, therefore had to be content with first innings points. Dorset batted first on Tuesday, but, with the exception of Knight (64) and Brookway (38), they gave a disappointing display, and were all out for 169. The successful visiting bowlers were Ricketts (five for 53), Fry (four for 48), and Harris (one for 28). Monmouth did not do much better when they went in, at one period having five wickets down for 85; but a whirlwind innings of 121 by Roeyn-Jones saved the situation, and their total eventually reached 215. Of the home bowlers, J. F. Hanbury got three for 27, A. M. Harrison three for 86, C. J. P. C. Jowett three for 28, and B. F. Hunt one for 16. Dorset did not do so well in their second innings, and were all out for 143, of which Capt. R. D. Busk batted well for 38. Monmouth were left to get 97 runs to win, with one and a-half hours remaining for play, and in that period there was some most exciting play. A. M. Harrison bowled magnificently, and as the end drew near with the wickets going down steadily, but with the runs creeping up to within winning distance, there was great excitement. Eventually, as previously stated, Monmouth wanted two for victory with the last ball of the match, which they did not get, their final total being 96 for the loss of seven wickets. # DORSET DRAW WITH CORNWALL. MINOR COUNTIES' CRICKET AT WEYMOUTH.

## FINE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES.

There were several surprises in the Dorset v. Cornwall match (for the Minor Counties' Championship), which was played at Weymouth College ground on Monday and Tuesday. First was the surprisingly low score registered by both teams in the first innings. Dorset won the toss, and went in to bat on a perfect wicket, and managed to put together only 146. Cornwall went in and created great excitement by coming within four of Dorset's score.

The individual performances were remarkably good, too. In Dorset's first innings Brockway put together 84 out of the 146. He hit ten 4's. Cornwall's bowling was exceptionally good also, Ollernshaw coming out with the splendid average of 5 for 17. Cornwall's first innings, like Dorset's, was almost a one-man show. H. D. Cory scored a valuable 64, in which he played all the Dorset bowlers with the greatest confidence while wickets were falling rapidly at the other end. Dorset's bowling was very consistent, Busk getting 4 for 38, Harrison 3 for 42, and Hunt 2 for 9.

Dorset's first innings did not start any too well. B. F. Hunt was caught and bowled by Whiting before a run had been registered, and he was followed by the North Dorset professional Knight, with only eight on the score-board. The game was very slow at this stage, and only ten runs were scored in the first half-hour. Both players made a useful little stand, and withstood the bowling well at a time when runs were badly needed. Whiting pitched several tempting leg shots, but Brockway failed to catch them properly. Ollernshaw was bowling confidently at the other end, and neither player was any too comfortable with him. After the partnership was broken by Mill bowling Hoyle wickets fell thick and fast, and, except for a lively 17 by Captain R. D. Busk, the Dorset innings was not particularly noteworthy. Right at the end, however, came two useful stands between Brockway and Foot and Foot and Harrison. It was thanks to these efforts that Dorset gained their 146 runs. Cornwall's bowling and fielding was remarkably keen, although Dorset had two lucky escapes from being run out.

Cornwall's first innings opened as badly as Dorset's, the first bowl of Busk's second over spreading the stumps. H. D. Cory, however, continued to play the bowling with ease, and in one over he hit two sixes off Foot. He and Ollernshaw put on a useful 31 for the seventh wicket. Cornwall made a great attempt to equal Dorset's score, and with only four runs off Busk clean bowled Whiting.

Dorset started their second innings disastrously. Knight, Hunt, and Hoyle were out with only 13 runs on the board. #### DORSET'S FIRST INNINGS LEAD.

Weymouth College ground was the setting of the match between Dorset and Cornwall on Monday and Tuesday. The weather on the first day was splendid but for the strong breeze, but on Tuesday play was delayed for a considerable time by a heavy rainstorm, and it was not possible to complete the game. Dorset, therefore, took the points for a first innings lead.

The home county went in first, but only compiled 146, of which total Brookway was responsible for more than half. The innings started badly, the first wicket falling without a run on the board, and the subsequent runs coming very slowly. In the half-hour only 10 had been scored. The position quickened appreciably with Brookway and Busk together, but the brightest partnership came when Foot joined the former. A double bowling change separated the pair, Brookway being clean bowled by Ollearnshaw with 84 to his credit. Cornwall had been bowling and fielding in great style, Ollearnshaw taking five for 17.

#### AN EXCITING FINISH.

# DORSET v. DEVON.

## DULL BATTING AT SHERBORNE.

### "THAT'S THE STUFF."

The Dorset skipper, Mr. M. Elderton, tried several changes at the silk factory end, but Harrison, except for two overs, carried on at the Abbey end. With his score at 25 Poynder gave another difficult chance to Hunt, but he failed to hold it. The total had reached 113 when Harrison put a full toss to Poynder, who skied it to Busk in deep field behind the bowler, and a brilliant catch sent Poynder to the pavilion. Warfield hit a three, and the spectators, possibly a little bored, cheered and called to the batsmen, "That's the stuff, go on, hit them."

At this stage of the game Harrison had bowled 40 overs, 25 of which were maidens. Warfield on attempting to cut Jowett with the slips, flashed the ball into Brockway's hands. It was a beautiful catch. With only three added to the score Goldie was dismissed by a smart catch by Busk. Falding was still playing canny, but with only two runs added was clean bowled by Jowett. It was a beautiful length ball that would have beaten many better batsmen. Falding had batted nearly two hours and his steady play was of great value to his side. Jennings, a left-hander, hit briskly for his total of 27 and finished up the innings in good style. The Dorset fielding was of the best possible character.

### DORSET'S POOR START.

With the close of the Devon innings the tea interval was taken, but a thunderstorm delayed a start until 6 p.m., when the Dorset innings was opened by Hunt and Freeman. An exactly similar stroke on the previous ball had been dropped by Hunt. Mr. Awdry had played steadily for two hours, and although he only scored 23 it was a steadiness that was valuable to his side.

Refreshed by lunch Lloyd laboured out and hit three boundaries, but the wily Busk sent down a straight one when Lloyd had added 22 runs to his lunch score in 23 minutes. The century went on the board at a quarter to three, and this for six wickets looked more promising after the bad start of 10 runs for three wickets. With four runs added H. G. Awdry fell to a remarkably fine catch behind the wicket. Friday was evidently the Dorset skipper's lucky day for his wicket-keeping had been almost faultless, and this was his fourth victim. Busk was putting down some good length balls and keeping the batsmen guessing. He tried to stop a hot return from Smith (W.), and evidently got stung, but he took his revenge shortly afterwards, when Smith (W.) hit up to McCall at deep mid-off. As usual Captain Busk made good use of his feet to stop several going well for the boundary, and the spectators cheered when he did so and laughed when he very occasionally used his hands.

**OPENING OF DORSET INNINGS.**

The Dorset innings opened at a quarter to four, and M. B. Elderton, after hitting a nice shot for three off Awdry, fell to the opening ball of J. Smith's second over. Tabor joined Freeman, and put several shots to leg, where the Wilt skipper was fielding, and the crowd bubbled with laughter as he hobbled hopelessly after the ball, which had to be retrieved by others. More in a spirit of fun, the Dorset side gave the Wilt skipper plenty to hobble after. Tabor was completely beaten by a nice length ball by J. Smith, after playing steadily for nearly 80 minutes, but he did not score a boundary. Tovey, on the other hand, hit out with vigour, and scored several boundaries and threes. When joined by McCall, he and his partner continued to hit out at loose balls and gave careful attention to others. Even so, Tovey and McCall ran the limit and more for every shot, and were frequently applauded for their efforts in this direction.

**SATURDAY'S START DELAYED.**

Rain delayed the start on Saturday morning for 25 minutes, and the wicket was slow. J. Smith could not get the ball to come off quick enough. With the score at 64 Tovey tipped one into the slips, but it was misread, and the three runs which resulted was sufficient to carry the score past the Wilt total, and one of the ten spectators present was sufficiently interested to applaud. McCall was nineteen minutes before he scored a single, and Tovey meanwhile had added 20 to his score. He continued to hit out and until the total had reached eighty he did not give a chance. Then he gave a difficult one with a tip to mid-off, but it was not held. In an effort to gather runs he was nearly run out, and he only wanted six for his century when he hit a ball out to J. Smith at extra cover. Eighty runs had been added in 30 minutes, and Tovey's 94 included eight four's and a five. When the two hundred went up the Dorset innings had lasted a trifle over three hours. Carter had batted 18 minutes before he scored for three, and Tovey, fielding for the Wilt skipper at short square leg, splendidly caught Carter. Captain Busk had four fives from dropped catches, but generally he placed his shots remarkably well and played attractively. He was caught in the deep field after a lefty hit just two minutes before lunch, and the Dorset innings closed for 280.

Going in after lunch, Wiltshire made a good start, and with 103 on the board for the loss of two wickets rain came on, and the game was abandoned.

Refreshed by lunch Lloyd lashed out and hit three boundaries, but the wily Busk sent down a straight one when Lloyd had added 23 runs to his lunch score in 23 minutes. The century went on the board at a quarter to three, and this for six wickets looked more promising after the bad start of 10 runs for three wickets. With four runs added H. G. Awdry fell to a remarkably fine catch behind the wicket. Friday was evidently the Dorset skipper's lucky day for his wicket-keeping had been almost faultless, and this was his fourth victim. Busk was putting down some good length balls and keeping the batsmen guessing. He tried to stop a hot return from Smith (W.), and evidently got stung, but he took his revenge shortly afterwards, when Smith (W.) hit up to McCall at deep mid-off. As usual Captain Busk made good use of his feet to stop several going well for the boundary, and the spectators cheered when he did so and laughed when he very occasionally used his hands.

#### OPENING OF DORSET INNINGS.

The Dorset innings opened at a quarter to four, and M. B. Elderton, after hitting a nice shot for three off Awdry, fell to the opening ball of J. Smith's second over. Tabor joined Freeman, and put several shots to leg, where the Wilt skipper was fielding, and the crowd bubbled with laughter as he hobbled hopelessly after the ball, which had to be retrieved by others. More in a spirit of fun, the Dorset side gave the Wilt skipper plenty to hobble after. Tabor was completely beaten by a nice length ball by J. Smith, after playing steadily for nearly 80 minutes, but he did not score a boundary. Tovey, on the other hand, hit out with vigour, and scored several boundaries and threes. When joined by McCall, he and his partner continued to hit out at loose balls and gave careful attention to others. They quickly put the century on the board and made an effort to pass the Wilt total before close of play. The hard hitting made the Wilt fielding even keener and many good shots were stopped. Even so, Tovey and McCall ran the limit and more for every shot, and were frequently applauded for their efforts in this direction.

G. C. Tovey is a son of Dr. C. H. Tovey, headmaster of Shaftesbury Grammar School. He is now at Clifton College. He made 99 recently against Tonbridge School at Lords, and also played for Lords Schools *versus* the Rest.

#### SATURDAY'S START DELAYED.

Rain delayed the start on Saturday morning for 25 minutes, and the wicket was slow. J. Smith could not get the ball to come off quick enough. With the score at 64 Tovey tipped one into the slips, but it was missed, and the three runs which resulted was sufficient to carry the score past the Wilt total, and one of the two spectators present was sufficiently interested to applaud. McCall was nineteen minutes before he scored a single, and Tovey meanwhile had added 20 to his score. He continued to hit out and until the total had reached eighty he did not give a chance. Then he gave a difficult one with a tip to mid-off, but it was not held. In an effort to gather runs he was nearly run out, and he only wanted six for his century when he hit a ball out to J. Smith at extra cover. Eighty runs had been added in 30 minutes, and Tovey's 94 included eight four's and a five. When the two hundred went up the Dorset innings had lasted a trifle over three hours. Carter had batted 18 minutes before he scored for three, and Tovey, fielding for the Wilt skipper at short square leg, splendidly caught Carter. Captain Busk had four lives from dropped catches, but generally he placed

his shots remarkably well and played attractively. He was caught in the deep field after a hefty hit just two minutes before lunch, and the Dorset innings closed for 280.

Going in after lunch, Wiltshire made a good start, and with 103 on the board for the loss of two wickets rain came on, and the game was abandoned.

## DORSET COUNTY CRICKET.

### BUILDING UP A YOUNG SIDE.

#### LAST SEASON'S MATCHES SPOILT BY RAIN.

IN the course of the annual report of the Dorset County Cricket Club, the hon. secretary states:—

The season just past was largely ruined by the very wet summer. In every match rain was experienced and the match against Devon was washed out after Devon had completed an innings.

However, of the matches played the results show a better record than that of 1930. The task of building up a young side has been successful and several members of the team showed good promise for the future.

The experience gained will stand them in good stead in future years. It is to be deplored that the same side cannot play in all the matches so as to provide "team work" which is so important but this has been found to be impracticable.

The county gained a splendid win against Devon at Newton Abbot and took points for a win on the first innings against Wilts at Sherborne. Of the two matches lost against Cornwall and Wilts, it is only fair to say that in both matches the side had to bat on very bad wickets. Rain deprived the county of wins against Monmouth and Cornwall.

Of the individual records, Capt. Busk again showed good all-round form and on several occasions, batted and bowled with his former skill. Brockway made his name in minor county cricket by a splendid 108 not out against Monmouth and 82 against Cornwall. A. M. Harrison bowled with his usual skill and again captured more wickets than any other member of the team. C. J. C. P. Jowett bowled well and his 56 against Cornwall when runs were badly wanted, was a masterly innings. C. L. Tabor also did well.

The position occupied by the county in the Minor Counties Championship was slightly higher than in 1930.
