DEATH OF "LEW" WATSON.

THE PASSING OF A GREAT CRICKETER.

CRICKETER.

With great regret we have to record the death at the early age of 32 of Mr. Lewis Albert Watson, "Lew" to the cricket-loving population of North Hertfordshire, who passed away with startling suddenness on Tuesday evening at Hertford Hospital, where he had been taken that evening.

"Lew," who was the only child of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Watson, of Highstreet, Stevenage, had been suffering from a nervous breakdown since January. On Tuesday morning, however, it was discovered that he had been stricken with pneumonia, and in the evening it was found necessary to take him to Hertford Hospital, where he died very shortly after his arrival. When the news of his death flashed around Stevenage on Wednesday evening, there was a hush in most homes, where his wonderful cricket had made his name a household word. Educated at Alleyne's Grammar School, Stevenage, Watson learnt his first inside lessons of the great game from Mr. Johnson, a great cricketing headmaster, and before he left school the Town XI. would often borrow him to fill

a vacant place in an emergency. In his
last year at school he had the Bradmanlike average of 140. After leaving school
he was always sure of his place in the
Town team. When cricket came back
with peace after the Great War, good
judges like the late Mr. Titchmarsh,
ever realised what real ability lay in
Watson's game, and in 1920 the great
call came to him to play for his county.
He made the county novice's usual debut
with a "blob," but in his second match
against Norfolk, at Norwich, he had
what he always regarded as the best
match of his career; when going in first
againe Falcon's peerless bowling, he
was no th out in the first innings and
was "act out" with Arthur Grimsdell
at close of play in the second innings,
having batted all through. On the way
to the hospital on Tuesday he spoke with
fond regret of an annual match which
was taking place at Luton that day, a
game in which he had taken part regularly for the last fifteen years. There
came a moment when he said, "They
must be playing the last over now," as
he was, all unconsciously, against the
great Bowler that gets the best of us
all in time.

Watson leaves a widow and five young
children. To them and to his father
and mother goes whole-heartedly the
sympathy of our crickel-loving readers.
The funeral will take place on Saturday at 2 p.m., at the Stevenage Parish
Church. Arrangements are being made
for the Stevenage Pirist XI. to be present
in a body. The Wednesday team of
which Wafson was a regular member,

to the relatives of their old comrade.

HERTFORDSHIRE OUTPLAY BEDFORDSHIRE AT ST. ALBANS.

BROWN'S BRILLIANT BATTING.

Hertfordshire recorded their initial victory of the season in the Minor Counties Championship competition at St. Albans, yesterday, when they defeated Bedfordshire by an innings and 35 runs. The game started on Wednesday. Despite the fact that several catches were dropped, Herts held the upper hand throughout.

Rawlins won the toss and Bedfordshire batted first on a wicket that looked good for a large score, but they shaped poorly and were somewhat fortunate to get as many as 164. Bocking was bowled in the first over and Poole smartly caught with only seven on the board.

Cook and Sime carried the score to 52 for the third wicket before Sime, who batted well for 24, was howled by Burton. Davidson was in and out without addition to the total, and when Rawlins was snapped behind the wicket by Grimsdell off Burton, half the side was out for 60. Then Davis, who made a very promising first appearance for Beds, assisted Cook to put on 54 in a steady sixth-wicket partnership.

There are no "boundaries" and every hit is run out, even if the ball is hit into a palm tree and has to be retrieved by climbing fieldsmen. One day, we are told, 52 runs were scored while a tree was being hewn down to recover the ball. Certainly, as the writer remarks, a better sport than the head-hunting and warfare of pre-missionary days in the South Seas!

Batting was, in fact, Herts' chief weakness. The best batsmen at the County's disposal were not able to play frequently, and others who in the ordinary way could be relied on for ordinary way could be relied on for runs failed on the sticky wickets.

Only four players have an average exceeding 20. M. H. de Zoete heads the way with an average of 43.66. C. B. Fordham comes next with the highest aggregate and an average of 37.12, and Brown (S.) compiled 365 in 12 innings

Brown (S.) compiled 365 in 12 innings with an average of 30.41.

The bowling of the side was strengthened by the inclusion of C. V. Tarbox, of Hemel Hempstead, who, before going to Worcestershire, had played for Herts. He secured 44 wickets at a cost of 9.72 each- a fine performance. R. Postill, the fast bowler, was only able to take part in six matches; he captured 22 wickets, with an average of 10.57. Arthur Grimsdell's wicket-keeping was again excellent.

A larger number of players than usual have been given trials. Among them the following showed great promise:—D. G. Oswald (Barnet), R. P. Nelson (Harpenden) and W. L. Clark (Watford Grammar School). The fielding of Clark was of a very high standard.

ST. ALBANS CRICKET.

A RAIN-SPOILT SEASON REVIEWED.

THE AVERAGES.

The cricket season of 1931 cannot be looked back upon, from a players, or even a spectators' point of view, with any degree of delight or satisfaction, as the weather was, in the majority of instances, so adverse. The St. Albans Club arranged a strong and interesting list of fixtures, and the only item required to complete success was good weather, but when mention is made that on five occasions not a ball was bowled, the pitch in each instance being under water, and in elight others play was curtailed to about balf, or even less, it will readily be seen what a disappointing season the club experienced.

In several of the matches, time alone robbed St. Albans of victory, and here special mention should be made of the matches with Winchmore Hill were set to get 222 for victory, but again time was the enemy, as when time was called only 200 runs had been made, with one wicket only to fall. In the return fixture, Winchmore Hill were only set 66 runs to win, but excitement prevalled, when it was noticed that only 12 runs were required and five wickets to fall. Here, however, they had not taken into consideration the St. Albans bowling strength, for W. Clark, the Watford School Captain and County player, took upon himself a bowling feat which brought victory to his side, Winchmore Hill being dismissed for 61 runs.

Only two players—J. G. Bland and D. P. Harding—reached the century mark, the former at that period-being in great form, but, owing to County demands, the club were afterwards deprived of his services, likewise that of W. Clark, who could only play with the side after the school term. Although in several of the matches the ground was in very bad condition, the players showed the "never say die" spirit, the fielding, taken on the whole, being good.

It should be mentioned that this was the twenty-slatch season in which the club have had the assistance of their Captain (C. H. Rabone), and, after this great length of time, the averages show that he is well to the fore with both bat and be all. W. Lismore, the
