The villages count the prestige of their set in local sporting coteries on the result of the game and the position in the tables and in a few other counties does this weekly encounter between the representaives of each little community excite more interest and feeling.

High Wycombe C.C. have four more matches on their fixture list and two of these are vacant. The club has had a successful season, though no outstanding personalities have been revealed. Eleven games have been won up-to-date, four lost, and four left drawn or abandoned.

They started off well by beating four old rivals, Reading, Beaconsfield, Slough, and the Indian Gymkhana, but a break in the weather caused one or two matches to be unfinished and spoilt the record. Several records of the club went by the board in the Brondesbury game when 628 runs were scored in the day's play, Wycombe knocking up 350 for 4 in two and a quarter hours, to gain a surprise win. The matches with Slough and the Indian Gymkhana during Whitsun week ended in thrilling wins for Wycombe by one run and two runs.

The M.C.C. match was perhaps the most exciting struggle of the lot, Wycombe losing after extra time by one run. The biggest win was against South Hampstead, by 125 runs and the most humiliating defeat, unfortunately, was against Slough.

SLOUGH CRICKET CLUB.

Slowly, but with certain surety, the standard of play in the Slough Cricket Club has, in the past few sensons, been improving, and that just concluded vies with any post-war year for the excellence of the cricket played. Favourable weather, an influx of new and useful members, and a splendid esprit-de-corps among everyone contributed to the success of the past season, and although in the case of the 1st XI. not quite so many matches were won as in the previous season, defeats have been more infrequent, while the majority of the drawn matches were left in Slough's favour. In all 27 matches were arranged (including Cricket Week), and of these, nine were won, four lost, two ended in ties, and were won, rour tost, two ended in ties, and the rest (12) were either drawn, abandoned or scratched through rain. Only two Saturday matches were lost, the first boing against Wycombe (by one run), this defeat being amply avenged later in the season, and the second being the remarkable game at Shepherds Bush, when both teams were dismissed for 226 runs the Bushmen being all out for 24 in their second innings. An extra-ordinary feature of the season was the fact that two games resulted in a tie, first game of the season saw both Surbiton and Slough score 35 runs, and the last game of the Cricket Week wound up in a blaze of excitement-Slough having just reached the G.W.R.'s total of 98 when their last two wickets fell. Noteable victories were those against the G.W.R. (away)—made possible by Lloyd's spleudid all-round play and Lund's fine bowling—and against Wycombe at home, when Kent and Wilmet added 151 for the second wicket. Rickmansworth were beaten twice, and in each game a Slough man passed the century mark. Ickenham also suffered twice at Slough's hands, while Ashford were soundly beaten at Slough. Lund's great bowling was again the mainstay of the attack, and perhaps the outstanding feature of the season. To take 77 wickets in only Saturday afternoon cricket against the class of batsmen Slough usually meet is an amazingly fine performance in itself, but more amazing still is the fact that Lund obtained this number at the small cost of 7.4 runs per wicket. He had many great performances to his credit, but his best were undoubtedly his 6 for 12 against the G.W.R., and his 7 for 56 against Homslow. Edwards is at the top of the bowling averages, but his appearances were all too rare. He distinguished himself whenever he played, and his 7 for 40 against the M.C.C. was the result of some against the M.C.C. was the result of some brilliant bowling. Skinner also had some very useful spells with the ball, but Lloyd's final figures do not by any means do him justice. He was far more valuable to the side than his average would suggest. His best performance—and a match-winning one—was against the G.W.B., but he also bowled well when Shepherds Bush visited Slough, well when shepherds Bush visited blough. Leveson's capabilities as a bowler were not discovered until late in July, but, after that, he gave the side valuable assistance in this direction—especially against Ashford. The decline of both Black and Stott as fastish bowlers was most deconcerting, but to counteract this Byass put in some good work towards the end of the season, and his services should be of immense value next year. Apart from a few well remembered occasions, the fielding of the side was excel-lent, and the club were very fortunate to secure the services of J. F. N. Mayhew to to take the place as wicketkeeper vacated by L. G. Staines early in the season. May. hew, who kept wicket for Eton College and Oxford University, proved a decided asset to the side, and it was a distinct pleasure to watch his quiet but very effective wicket-keeping. In dealing with the work of this keeping. team during the season, tribute must be paid to the good done for the club by its captain, Mr. H. M. Naylor. In his first season as captain, Mr. Naylor did remarkably well and made himself extremely popular not only with his own men, but with his opponents. To follow in the footsteps of such a sportsman as Mr. H. Jones was a difficult task, but Mr. Naylor did his job difficult task, but Mr. Naylor did his job splendidly and, as captain, as a cricketer, and as a good sportsman, it is hoped that the Town club will have long use of his services. BUCKS COUNTY CRICKET FEAT CELEBRATED

Big Rally At Wycombe "Championship" Dinner

PRESENTATION TO SKIPPER

ANY distinguished Buckinghamshire people were present at the dinner at High Wycombe Town Hall on Monday to celebrate the winning of the Championship by Bucks County Cricket Club. Bucks won each of the ten matches they played in the English Minor Counties Championship, and though challenged by Berks (the runners-up) Bucks remained unbeaten.

The dinner was held in the main hall, in which realistic decorations added to the cricketing atmosphere. Green and white bunting hung round the walls, and cricket bats of the most unblemished willow were suspended at intervals. A wooden paling along the platform gave the effect of the entrance to the pavilion, and behind it was a screen emblazoned with the words "Champions, 1932." Cricket stumps and pads were plated on either side of the platform.

Lord Cottesloe, Lord Lieutenant of the County, who presided, made a presentation to Mr. W. B. Franklin—who has just completed 21 years as Captain of the Club—of a silver tea service. He said: "It is a great honour and pleasure on this occasion to make a presentation to you on behalf of a large number of friends and admirers in the

county. You have a most distinguished. cricket record. You have played 21 years for Bucks and for the last 13 years you have been captain of the team." (Hear, hear) "The team in that time has gone from strength to strength, and has won the championship four times in the last ten years" (applause) "and as we all know this year in a most magnificent way with a record performance.

IDEAL CAPTAIN

"You are known as a first-class cricketer and a first class wicket keeper, and in Bucks we know you as the ideal captain. If the successes to which I have alluded are due to one cause more than another it is your captaincy and to the qualities which you have brought to bear upon the conduct of the team. I feel that the whole county is in your debt, and in making this presentation on behalf of the subscribers I can only say we all wish you a long continuity of health and active strength, and connection with and responsibility for the

connection with and responsibility for the County cricket team."

Proposing the toast of the Team, the Rev. C. E. Roberts said that it was an unbounded joy to be at a dinner where were so many healthy, virile members of his own sex. There was once a popular song, often whistled by errand boys, "Put me Among the Girls," but much as he admired, and loved and adored and reverenced those creatures—yes, even now he did that, in spite of their cigarettes, their lipstick, their nuismas, their Eton crops—if he were called pyjamas, their Eton crops—if he were called on to give vocal expression regarding his own personal preference, his song would be rather "Put me Among the Boys."

Mr. Roberts praised the individual merits of each of the Bucks team, mentioning, among others, the glorious grace and ease of R. H. J. Brooke's and A. G. Skinner's batting. The former, he felt, must be a lineal descendant of Tennys n's "Brook," for he could go on for ever. Talking of Skinner, he could not help thinking of Skinner, he could not help thinking of that wonderful innings against Berks in September, and having regard to the difficult circumstances under which that innings was played, he thought it would always be remembered as one of the finest exhibitions of pluck, determination, skill, and strength ever seen on the Wycombe cricket ground.

After referring to the other men, Mr. Roberts said "Towering above them all is the marvellous wicket keeping and the inspired leadership of our captain, Mr. W. B. Franklin."

Three things, he continued, made their team most remarkable—first, that it included the sons of several of the great cricketers, who in years gone by played for Bucks; secondly that the present team had absolutely no tail—it was a Manx team; and thirdly it was a team with the highest sense of team spirit.

He bowled 300 overs, including 97 maidens, there were 600 runs, and he took 79 wickets, with an average of 7.64.

It was a spirit that had done much to cultivate the co-operation and good work in all relations of life; it was the same spirit that Nelson's captains had, it was the spirit of the troops and officers who were shot in the War.

"We as Englishmen here to-night are proud not only of our county team, but of the fact that they are victorious in an English game. Football is universal in these islands, but it has only just emerged from barbarism into proper organisation."

There was a time when he actually took part in strenuous games, and even now to be in the company of so many nealthy, virile specimens of his own sex was to him an undoubted joy. Some years ago there was a song, supposed to be humorous, and undoubtedly popular, in which the refrain was "rut me among the girls" (Laughter.) Much as he admired and loved and reveronced those adorable creatures—in spite of their gigarettes lip stick and pyjamus (loud laughter)—for his own part, if he was called upon to give vocal expression to his own personal resings regarding his surroundings by singing, the refrain would be "Put me among the boys." There was nothing like a bottle of the "boy" for bucking one up. (Loud laughter.) Their dear little old county of Bucks had once again covered itself with glory. (Hear, hear.) It had reached the proud position of being champion among those 23 counties which, for some extraordinary reason were called "minor" counties. If a Latin term must be used they might as well have called them "minus," but for correct manner, as well as correct grammar, it ought to be "millous." (Hear, hear.) The County had also set up a record by winning every single match outright, thus gaining a hundred per cent. of the points obtainable. It was indeed a very great privilege and an exceedingly high honour that he should have been chosen to act us the mouthpiece of his fellow diners in proposing the toast of their team. AVERAGES OF SUCCESSFUL SEASON.

The season of 1932 will go down in The season of 1932 will go down in the history of Bucks cricket as the most successful ever enjoyed by the county. Bucks won the Minor Counties' Championship for the fifth time, and also created a record by being the first county to be champions with a percentage of 100 (since the present system of scoring was arrived at), the full result being; played 10, won 10. With the exception of the challenge With the exception of the challenge match, the county was blessed with perfect weather and on one occasion a record crowd.

The main strength of the county again lay in the bowling, where Rutter and Edwards got through a tremendous amount of work. They claimed no less than 142 of the 200 wickets captured by Bucks. Aubrey-Fletcher also bowled well, and Skinner and Stephenson took wickets whenever they were wanted.

The county batting improved almost beyond belief. Last year a score of 200 was an exception. This year beyond belief. Last year a score of 200 was an exception. This year Bucks was seidom underneath it. Brooke, the Oxford Blue, was in splendid form. He has developed great scoring powers, but has a powerful defence. Skinner also batted well, although he did not make quite so many runs as expected. He appears to prefer slow wickets. His 72 not out against Berkshire after a bad collapse was a masterpiece of back

to prefer slow wickets. His 72 not out against Berkshire after a bad collapse was a masterpiece of back play on a slow wicket. Peters, who was discovered half-way through the season, proved to be a very fine forcing batsman, very quick on his fæt. Stephenson, Baker, Byass and Rutter also batted well on occasion.

The fielding, after a deplorable start against Bedfordshire, when over ten catches were missed, was good and on occasion, brilliant, Peters and Stephenson especially being very quick. The side was again captained by W. B. Franklin, it being his thirteenth year in that position. There can be very few other counties who are fortunate enough to have a captain who knows his job so well. He has that invaluable faculty of making everybody play just a little above themselves. His wicket-keeping is still first-class, though perhaps not quite so good as in former years. A pleasing outlook for the future is the fact that with the exception of Franklin and Edwards, no other member of the regular side is over 30 years of age.

In reply to questions the TREASTRER said there had been an increase of £77 in the subscriptions, and he had not heard of a single member resigning owing to the subscription being raised from one to one and a half guineas.
