BETTER FINANCIAL POSITION REPORTED

Col. Sir Hugh Protheroe-Smith (president) presided at the annual meeting of Cornwall County Cricket Club, at Truro, on Thursday, when the treasurer reported a credit balance of £151 17s. 11d., an increase on the previous year. There was a membership of 322, and subscriptions totalled £242 10s. Donations amounted to £24 17s. 6d., and gate receipts £94 6s. 11d. It was stated that 50 new members joined last year, but the club had also lost quite a number.

The report stated that the result of the season's play in the Minor Counties' competition could be considered satisfactory. Rain seriously interfered with the programme. The game with Devon, at Exeter, could not be started, and that with Surrey II, at Penzance, was confined to one day. Other games, both at home and away, were handicapped by the weather conditions. The county were not favoured with any undue share of luck in several cases. First innings points were lost to Dorset by four runs, and the game at the Oval might quite well have been a win instead of a loss. Perhaps the best performances were those against Surrey II. At the Oval the game was exceedingly close, whilst at Penzance Cornwall obtained the first innings points. The latter was largely due to Ollerenshaw's fine all-round form. In addition to a valuable innings of 44, he bowled so well as to get eight wickets for 58 runs. The two games lost were against Berkshire and Surrey II.

The batting records are not so promising as in some seasons, but this was partly accounted for by the absence of fast scoring wickets. Rogers, G., and Cory were the main scorers, whilst Stoneman and Barnicot were establishing themselves as regular members of the side. The bowling was shared by Ollerenshaw, Whitting and J. Mills. The first-named a 40 wickets for an average of 10 runs per wicket was a wonderfully good performance. Ollerenshaw was the outstanding all-round cricketer in the county for 1931, and was engaged by Penzance for the coming season. Whitting and Mill had ably succeeded his efforts. The latter had had his first extended trial for Cornwall, and had done reasonably well. Several young players—Angwin, Havel, Hobann, Stevens, Lawry, and Collins—had had a trial, but had not yet obtained a real footing in county cricket.

The record was: Matches played, eight; won one, lost two, won on first innings, three, lost on first innings, one, no result, one; position on the Minor Counties' table, 17th out of 25, with a percentage of 40.

On the re-constitution of the Finance Committee, it was decided that prices of admission to matches should be 1s. on the first day, and 7s. after lunch on the second day (instead of 6s. because of tax), and car parking should be free to members, and 1s. instead of 2s. for non-members. It was decided by ten votes to eight that members should have the privilege of taking a lady into the enclosure without additional cost.

Mr. J. T. Polglase Redpath was appointed secretary of the Oxford movement. Mr. Beech Williams mentioned that during last year on several clubs, particularly Truro, had taken a great interest in this movement. Mr. B. H. Frayer consented to act as advertising secretary.

Sympathetic reference was made by Mr. Beech Williams to the death of Mr. W. G. Painter, who had been a member of the committee for many years, and a vote of sympathy was passed. It was agreed to place on record Mr. Painter's services to cricket in Cornwall.

The Prince of Wales was re-elected patron, and Sir Hugh Protheroe-Smith (president), with Mr. H. Inshaw and Mr. C. Slaw Baker (captain and vice-captain respectively), Com. Holsted and Mr. P. H. Francis, were added to the committee. Major G. T. Williams and Mr. Beecher Adams were again appointed secretaries, and Messrs. N. Humphrey and J. E. Borden, treasurers.

CAMBORNE CLUBS PROSPECTS

Camborne Cricket Club has created a record in Cornish League cricket by winning the Senior Cup for five years in succession, and this success has been made possible by the splendid "esprit de corps" among the players and the officials. For many years the club has been successfully managed by a strong committee, with an excellent chairman in Mr. J. Carrah Roberts, and an indefatigable secretary in Mr. W. A. Maclean. The latter has now resigned his post as secretary, but will be retained on the committee. His successor is Mr. W. Roberts, of The Crescent, a retired secretary of the Cornwall County Constabulary, who is keen on the game. Mr. Clarence V. Pault, the popular captain, has been re-elected to skipper the side, with Mr. H. J. Holman, a veteran in age, but young in spirit and cricket ability, as his assistant. The ground at Boskear is in good condition. George Rogers is again the club's professional and groundsman.

Since last season the club has lost J. C. Colquhoun, the vice-captain, wicket-keeper, and a sound bat, as well as H. D. Gardener, who has returned to West Africa. With these two exceptions, all last year's team will be available. Will Rogers, the slow bowler, has been in ill-health during the winter, but he has now recovered, and his services will again be available. Of the newcomers, there are two certain in Gordon Holman, a son of the vice-captain, who played last year for Troon, and George Wilson, of the Kolar Gold Fields, who is taking a course at the Mining School. Holman is a steady and reliable bat, who will take the place of Colquhoun as an opening batsman, and should do well with his old club. Wilson is a good batsman and also a slow break bowler, who has shown good form in South India, where Ken Hooking came from.

The batting of the team promises to be strong, whilst the bowling will be shared by J. E. Mill, W. Rogers, W. Hooking, and G. Wilson with R. L. Holman and W. H. Frayn as substitutes. L. Hooker, the most prominent of the Reserves last year, will probably earn his place in the First XI, as he is a good all-rounder. The opening game will be played on Saturday when Penzance will be met on the Boskear ground, in a friendly game.

The Cornish Choughs

Col. Sir Hugh Frothero-Smith presided at the annual meeting of the Cornish Choughs Cricket Club at Truro, on Thursday, when Mr. Noel Humphrys, hon. secretary, reported that bad weather seriously interfered with the Choughs cricket in 1931. The matches with Penzance and district, and the U.S. Barracks, both had to be abandoned without a ball being bowled, owing to rain. Of the remaining seven matches, four were lost and three won. The sides carried a good deal, many well-known Choughs only finding time to play once or twice. Of those who played a great number, W. J. James and J. W. Harrison headed the batting averages, with averages of over 16 apiece. J. W. Harrison amply headed the bowling averages, with 30 wickets at a cost of 19 runs a piece. During the season 13 new members were elected, and the membership now stood at 157. Eight matches had been arranged for the coming season.

Mr. J. L. Dreyfus, hon. treasurer, said the expenditure last year exceeded receipts by £7 5s. 3d., and this was owing to the generous grants of the club. All the schools who applied for grants were assisted, and had been greatly appreciated. One of the boys was lucky enough to win a Jack Hobbs bat through the initiative of the Choughs in starting the schools in cricket. There was a pre-war credit balance of £72 8s. 6d.

Mr. Humphrys hoped that the grants to the elementary schools would be continued this year, as during the past season it had done a lot of good. If youngsters of the age of 11 to 14 could not find time to play with it made a vast difference. He proposed that the club make grants up to an aggregate sum of £10 to elementary schools in the county during the present year. Major J. T. Williams seconded, and it was unanimously agreed.

Capt. H. Whitford Hawkey, president of St. Columb Cricket Club, wrote that Mr. J. O. Walker, at one time well known among Cornish cricketers, contributed this year his fiftieth year of the office as hon. secretary of the St. Columb Club, and he and Capt. Whitford Hawkey felt that something should be done to mark this event, and to arrange for some recognition of his services to be presented to him this summer. He wrote to know if it would be possible to arrange for an afternoon match between the Choughs and St. Columb on St. Walker's team some time in August, during which a presentation might be made.

It was agreed to arrange a match. Officers elected were—President, Mr. W. N. Rickford-Smith; hon. secretary, Mr. N. Humphrys; hon. treasurer, Mr. J. L. Dreyfus; umpire, Mr. Whiting; hon. secretary, Col. Treffry; Major G. T. Williams; Messrs. H. Trezona, F. B. Lewman, T. Lang, and J. H. Feaver.

CORNWALL IN FRONT

CREDITABLE PERFORMANCE AT TRURO AGAINST KENT 2nd XI

Cornwall put up a creditable show against Kent 2nd XI in the first of their Minor Counties engagements, on the Truro School ground, yesterday, and had reason to be satisfied with their position at the close of the first day's play. The home county led by 23 runs on the first innings, and in their second venture they put on 54 for the loss of two wickets. It was the first visit of Kent to Cornwall since 1910, and they brought a side comprising seven professionals, the majority of them being recruits in training for promotion to higher ranks. A slow left hand bowler, who is 47 years of age, carried off the bowling honours, taking seven wickets for 43 runs.

Cornwall introduced four new players, Fox, Austin, K. Hosking (Lamborne), and H. Kendall. For two last minute changes were made in the side, Hosking and Kendall coming in the places of Ollerenshaw (indisposed) and Bhaw Baker, who was unable to accept his position. Fox performed well behind the stumps, conceding only three byes, and Austin shaped well both with the bat and ball, scoring 17 runs, and claiming five wickets for 43 runs. Hosking gave a free batting display, contributing 31 runs. George Rogers played an invaluable innings for 77. The services of the veteran Whiting were again requisitioned, and he did some useful work. The fluctuation of the fortunes of both sides made the game full of interest. Cornwall made a sound start, putting on 110 for the first three wickets, and six were down for 136, the innings concluding for 174. Kent had an early loss, the first wicket going down with only six runs on the board, but they retrieved the position, sending the score up to 75 for the second wicket, and 120 was reached for the third. This came a turning point in their fortunes, wickets falling cheaply, and the innings yielded 151 runs, leaving Cornwall with a lead of 23 runs. Going in to bat a second time, Cornwall lost a wicket for one run, and had a second reverse at 42, but they played out time without further loss, the score being 54 for two wickets.

Gaining first use of a good wicket, Cornwall opened with Cory and George Rogers, against the bowling of Blunden and Ashwell. When he had scored four, Rogers gave a difficult chance at point, and Cory had a life, Davies dropping him when he was 15. Thirty was reached in 20 minutes, and at 37 Cory was caught by Ashwell, off Blunden, his contribution being 19. Barnicoat filled the vacancy, and succumbed to Blunden off his next delivery. Hosking joined his partner, Rogers, and the pair made a fine stand, carrying the score to 110 before Hosking was smartly caught by Simpson at mid-off for 31, which included four boundaries. Rogers hit Wright out of the ground for six, and soon afterwards he stepped out to Lewis, and was stumped by Fagg after a splendid innings of 77. His hits including eleven boundaries and a six. The score was 132 for four wickets in just over 1 1/2 hours. Fox and Addicot were dismissed for the addition of four runs. The Cornish skipper, Tressawna, and Austin, raised the score to 163 without further loss before lunch, both playing with confidence. Soon after the resumption, with only three runs added, Tressawna fell a victim to Lewis, having made 14. Whiting signalled his appearance by hitting Lewis for a six off the first ball he received, but with the next ball he was bowled. Austin was next bowled at the same total, having batted cautiously for 17. Kendall hit a single and then lost his wicket to Lewis, the innings closing for 174, after two hours and twenty minutes' play.

Kent sent in Fagg and Honey to open their innings, the attack being shared by Mill and Whiting, the latter claiming Honey's wicket in his first over with only six runs registered. There was some smart fielding by the Cornishmen, Cory and Austin being particularly good. Hewson attacked the bowling, hitting two successive boundaries off Whiting, and 40 was reached in 20 minutes. Mill was relieved by Kendall after he had sent down five overs, and when the half-century was reached, Kendall failed to accept a chance given by Hewson. With the score at 70, Austin went on in place of Whiting, and in his first over he broke the Hewson-Fagg partnership. Mill smartly catching Hewson, who had made 41, Kendall, who bowled a good length, but met with no success, was displaced by Mill. Davies was misled by Addicot, when he had scored 22, and also survived a confident appeal for stumping by Fox. At the tea interval Kent reached 122 for four wickets. Shortly after resuming George Rogers brought off a brilliant catch close to the boundary line, and brought about the dismissal of the Kent captain, Simpson, Davies, who went in at the fall of the second wicket, was the eighth to leave, being bowled by Mill for 39. Wright and Blunden put up a stubborn defence and struggled for runs, and at 146 Mill bowled Blunden, and soon afterwards obtained the last wicket by catching Wright off his own delivery. Kent's innings occupied 2 1/2 hours, leaving Cornwall 23 runs ahead.

Cornwall were left with 45 minutes before the close of play, and Cory and Barnicoat were sent out. The Penzance man met a similar fate as in the first innings, losing his wicket in the first ball he received after Cory had registered a single. Addicot and Cory took the score to 42, when Addicot was bowled by Wright for 10. Austin and Cory were together when stumps were drawn, the Redruth man having collected 37 runs. Score:—

CORNWALL v. KENT 2nd XI.

SPLENDID INNINGS BY G. ROGERS.

INTERESTING GAME AT TRURO.

Cornwall opened their campaign in the Minor Counties championship competition at Truro on Wednesday, when they met Kent 2nd XI on the Truro School Ground. Ideal weather conditions prevailed.

There were two changes in the Cornwall side, C. Kendall, the young Truro player, taking the place of Ollereathshaw, the Penzance professional, who is indisposed, and Rogers (W.), was able to turn out, his place being filled by Whiting, of Penzance, the veteran county bowler.

In the Kent side, B. G. W. Davis took the place of T. H. Pearce. The visitors fielded a very young side.

CORNWALL WIN THE TOSS.

Cornwall won the toss and elected to bat first. The pitch favoured the batsmen and the opening pair were Cory and Rogers (C.).

Scoring was opened by Rogers, who sent the ball away to the off for 2. The Cornish batsmen were facing the bowling of Blunden and Ashwell. The first ball of the second over saw Rogers missed at point when he had scored four runs. It was a very hard chance. Cory settled down early and neatly turned a ball to the leg, which was saved on the boundary for 3, and a moment later hit a boundary from the fast bowling of Blunden. Rogers, too, sent the next one for a past point. Both batsmen had got their eye well in during the opening 20 minutes and were playing excellent cricket.

Cory was missed when he had made 18. The ball came off his bat into the hands of Davis, who dropped it. Cory however, was caught by Ashwell off Blunden when he had scored 19, the Cornwall total then being 37.

S. Barnicoat, the young Penzance player, was next in, but his life was short; the first ball sent down by Blunden shattered his stumps.

K. Hoskin, of Camborne, who was making his first appearance in the county side, was the next man in, and his first ball was sent for a single.

Rogers still continued to bat consistently and 40 runs went up for the loss of two wickets. Hoskin was playing some pretty strokes to the off and through the slips, a forceful hit by Rogers through cover sent the score up to 50, after the game had been in progress for three-quarters of an hour. This was followed by a shot by Hoskin, who played over the turf to the boundary. There had been no change in the bowling up to this time. Hoskin registered another 4 with a drive to the boundary, which had the fielders beaten all over the line.

When Cornwall had scored 60, Ashwell was taken off, and Lewis was put on. He started to send up tricky deliveries, but Rogers snatched his second one for 4 and before the end of the over, Hoskin scored a boundary, lifting the ball over the heads of the fielders.

CORNWALL'S GOOD START.

Cornwall had made a good start, 60 going up in just over the hour.

Blunden was taken off and Wright put on at his end. His, too, were slow deliveries, and it was necessary for the batsmen to be wary. Rogers continued to play a forcing game, and after hitting 14 he was hit by a boundary, with a hit to the boundary. Shortly after, Cornwall's total was 100.

Hoskin alied the ball and Crawford in the country made a great attempt to catch it but dropped the ball which went to the boundary. Hoskin was caught off the next ball by Simpson, the Kent captain, after he had made 31, the total being 110-3-31. Hoskin's innings included five 4's.

W. J. Addicott, the St. Just player, joined Rogers, and opened his score with a single off his first ball. Rogers then sent the ball out of the field for a delivery by Wright. Lewis was sending up some mixed deliveries and at times had the batsmen guessing. Rogers fell to one of these. He stopped out to hit a tricky ball and was stumped off by Fagg whom he had scored 77, and the Telegraph Board read-132-4-77. During his innings Rogers had made eleven 4's and one 6.

Fox, of Truro, another newcomer to the Cornwall ranks, was next in. Before he could get properly settled, Addicott was out. He tried to play a ball from Lewis

breaking from the off and was bowled with only 3 to his credit.

Austin, of Falmouth, joined Fox at the wickets. Fox's innings was also of short duration. He tried to play a nasty one from Lewis and was stumped after making 2.

The Cornwall captain (H. Tresawna) next went in and broke his duck with a single. Four batsmen were playing cautiously, and the field was crouching round the pitch. A 4 by Tresawna saw the home score reach 150. This was followed by two other 4's by the veteran skipper.

CORNWALL COLLAPSE.

Cornwall's tail did not wag after the interval, and all the side were out after 10 hours and 20 minutes' play. Lewis, who was bowling remarkably well during the morning, continued to send down his successful deliveries. Tresawna fell a victim to his wily balls immediately on the resumption without adding to his score. Austin added 4 more to his score, bringing it up to 26 before he was bowled by Blunden. A hitting sent one ball out of the field for 6 and was out from the next ball. Mill did not score any and was not out, and C. Kendall scored a solitary run.

KENT AT FIVE WICKETS.

Fagg and Honey were Kent's opening pair, facing the bowling of Mill and Whiting. Both men scored slowly at the start with nicely placed shots. Whiting obtained his first wicket in his first over, when he got Honey out for 5 after Kent had made 6. R. H. Hewatson joined Fagg and started to score quickly. The Cornwall fielding was keen, and Cory and Austin were prominent with some smart pick-ups. Hewatson was playing strongly and sent the ball to the boundary twice with nice cuts to the off. Fagg was playing steadily.

Kendall went on in place of Mill. This was his first game with the county side, and his first over was very creditable.

Fagg and Hewatson were batting well, and in under half an hour, this couple put on 44 to bring the total up to 52. This partnership was proving very fruitful for Kent and both men, as soon as they had settled down, scored freely. When 70 had been reached, Cornwall made a change in their bowling, and Austin went on in place of Whiting. He took Hewatson's wicket in his first over after the Kent man had made 41.

The next man in was Davis. Fagg was caught out by Mill off Austin when he had scored 37. Davis was joined by Lewis who was out leg before from a ball by Mill after he had scored four. Davis batted well, but was missed in the long field when his score was 22. T. H. Crawford nor G. A. Simpson did not remain in Kent. The former was dismissed for one. The best catch of the day was seen when Rogers caught Simpson on the boundary.

Sunnucks joined Davis, but he was caught by Mill off Austin after he had scored four. Wright quite a youth was next in. Davis was eventually bowled by Mill. He had played well, and contributed a very useful 39 to his side's score.

When Blunden and Wright got together runs came slowly, and Fox, the wicket keeper, missed the latter when he had scored two. With the score at 146, Blunden was bowled by Mill for nine.

Ashwell was the last man in and it was necessary for the last wicket to put on 26 to reach Cornwall's total.

A very fine effort concluded the Kent innings. Mill sent down a ball to Wright, who played forward. The ball came slightly, and Mill ran forward, fell, and caught the batsman, who had scored six.

CORNWALL IN AGAIN.

With the expiration of an hour's more play, Cornwall opened their second innings with Cory and S. Barnicoat. Cornwall had a lead of seven to three on the first innings.

After Cory had scored a couple of runs out in the bowling, but in fact, it was no more kind to run, this time than in his first over. The first delivery by him hit Barnicoat straight into the hands of Blunden, thus restoring his second duck in the same day. And on both occasions being out on the first ball.

Lewis, the 17-year-old trick bowler, was bowling a beautiful one on the wicket. He settled down and he played some well timed strokes. The wicket-keeper, C. Cory, fell, two runs were scored, and the scoring, which had been slow, was on its feet.

Blunden, who had been bowled out, had had some success in his first over, which

led to Cornwall's score of 100. A new ball, the St. Just man was bowled by Wright, with his score at 10.

Austin was not in the mood and started playing with the caution that had characterised his first innings. He sent up a rather soon after he went in, and was just missed by Wright, who made a great attempt to get it, but failed.

THURSDAY'S PLAY.

VICTORY FOR KENT.

The Minor Counties championship game between Cornwall and Kent's second string was continued on the Truro School ground, on Thursday morning.

At the end of the first day's play the Cornishmen were in a favourable position, having a lead on the first innings by 23 runs, and had 64 up for 2 wickets when stumps were drawn.

G. A. Simpson, the Kent captain, did not field this morning, because he had developed eye trouble through a bit of grit getting in it whilst travelling down in the train. The eye had to be medically attended to, and a substitute fielded for him.

Cory and Austin resumed against the bowling of Blunden and Lewis. With only 1 added to his overnight's score, Austin was caught by Wright off Lewis.

Cory was joined by Rogers (C.), but they were not together long. Blunden, the Kent fast bowler, sent down a ball which had Cory beaten when he had scored 44, and Cornwall's total was 65.

Hoskin joined his substitute at the wicket. The batsmen were failing to score off Lewis, who had only 5 runs scored from his first nine overs, five of them being maidens. Hoskin, who had played well on the previous day with Rogers, did not stand long. After putting on five runs, he hit back a hard one into the hands of Lewis.

Cornwall's score was mounting steadily, and when Fox came in it stood at 67. Rogers was batting well, and sent some of the deliveries to boundary.

When the score had reached 100, Wright went on for Blunden. Another boundary hit by Rogers brought Cornwall's score to 110. The Camborne prod. had now got settled and was scoring rapidly. He had put on 39 just on the half hour, and some of his well-placed shots were delightful to watch. Fox was also playing a good game, and hit a few nice boundaries to the leg.

The game became a little dull for a time, and both batsmen scored slowly. Two or three nice shots by Fox enlivened play, but Rogers was now scoring singles, and gradually approached his half-century.

Kent were changing their attack more frequently than they had done during Cornwall's first innings. Lewis went on, and was responsible for dismissing Rogers when he was within two runs of his 50. The Kent trick bowler sent up a characteristically snappy delivery, which Rogers missed out to and was stumped by Fagg. This partnership between Rogers and Fox had proved very productive, the former having hit eight 4's.

Tresawna did not survive long. Playing forward to a ball, it hit the tip of his bat and went right up and was an easy catch for the wicket keeper.

Whiting was out with the first ball from Ashwell and J. B. Mill was also missed by Ashwell for a duck. The last three men had been out, without scoring off the same bowler.

Fox started to hit out, and twice narrowly missed being caught. He was nearly caught in the country by Wright in reaching his half-century.

With the Cornwall score at 176, Kendall was bowled without scoring.

There was a complete collapse when Rogers left. Neither of the four succeeding batsmen broke their duck, and few singles by Fox. Fox also hit eight 4's. Cornwall's innings occupied 24 hours.

KENT NEEDED 200 TO WIN.

This left Kent with 200 to get to win. Fagg and Honey was the opening pair, facing the bowling of Mill and Hoskin.

Both batsmen played well, sending the ball all round the wicket in fine style, and the half-century went up after they had been batting 30 minutes.

Whiting went on to bowl for the first time this morning. The partnership was going along very well, when it was Kendall. This first wicket stand had produced 79 runs being scored a very promising start.

Hewatson was next in, and soon after, Fagg reached his half-century with a boundary hit. Hewatson's stay at 86, he was bowled by Kendall for 8.

With the dismissal of Davis, after he had scored only two runs, things looked more hopeful for the Cornish side. He cocked up a ball from Kendall which came into Tresawna's hands.

Fagg joined Fagg, who was still batting steadily. Kendall, who had

been bowling well since lunch, had got three of Kent's men out for 16 runs. After the fourth partnership had added 14 runs, Lewis was caught and bowled by Kendall off Whiting, and Fagg, who seemed like going on for ever, was next partnered by T. H. Crawford.

Fagg was playing a remarkably sound game, and, considering he is still under 20, his performance was all the more creditable. He was nearly run out, however, when, apparently through over anxiety, he started to run and was forced to return.

This partnership started to look dangerous, as little by little the 200 runs necessary for victory were approached. Crawford hit a magnificent 6 off one of Austin's slow balls, and a couple of runs more brought the Kent total to 140.

The partnership of Crawford and Fagg was the deciding factor in the game, and as soon as the former had got his eye in, both batsmen started hitting freely all round the wicket and scored quickly. The score board registered 180, when Crawford was stumped by Fox, from a ball by Austin. This partnership produced 78 runs.

Fagg reached his century with a nice boundary, and the stroke was greeted with enthusiasm. The same boundary brought Kent's score to 190.

CORNWALL V. DEVON

CORNWALL'S HEAVY DEFEAT.

There was a soft wicket, caused by the previous day's rain, when the Minor Counties match between Cornwall and Devon, opened at the Restor Ground, Camborne on Friday. The weather was gusty and rain clouds hung in the sky.

CORNWALL WINS TOSS.

Cornwall won the toss and went in first. The opening pair were Cory (W. D.) and H. Tressawna (the Cornwall skipper). Cory started for Cornwall, facing the deliveries of Pain. The first over was a maiden. A single by Tressawna opened the Cornwall score off Jennings. Runs came slowly at first, but both batsmen were playing steadily and cautiously.

The game was held up for a short time when Cory sustained a cut on the cheek from a delivery by Jennings. Cory had to receive attention, and meanwhile Rogers (G.) went in.

Soon after, French relieved Jennings. After batting for 35 minutes, he was hoisted on the board. The Devon men were boding keenly.

There was a change in the bowling again when Jennings went on in the place of Pain.

Rogers had batted carefully, but was out soon after he had hit his first boundary. He was caught and bowled by French, who brought off a brilliant one-handed catch. The board read—28—1—10.

Cory resumed after Rogers' dismissal. His injury did not seem to have perturbed him, and he started playing well on his return. He hit a couple of nice 4s in succession, and from time to time both batsmen played some very pretty shots.

Sir J. Amery, the Devon captain, next went on to bowl at the town end. Tressawna and Cory batted consistently though slowly, and gradually the runs mounted up.

With the score at 66, Falding went on to bowl, and started to send down some tricky deliveries. In his second over, Cory fell a victim to one of these, after he had scored 26. Cornwall had scored 70 at the fall of this wicket.

S. Barnicoat, of Penzance, was next in and broke his duck with a single off Falding, and in the next over he hit a pretty one of Amery. The next over provided Barnicoat's undoing. Falding sent down a ball and appealed for lbw. This was not allowed. From the next ball he again appealed, and this time it was upheld.

Fox then joined Tressawna and opened with a nice drive to the boundary. Cornwall had taken two hours to make 80 runs.

Resuming after lunch, both Tressawna and Fox played some very attractive strokes to leg. The latter was playing Falding's balls very cautiously and waiting for opportunities. These came from time to time and Fox got one or two nice boundaries off him.

With the score at 90, Jennings went on in Falding's stead at the Pavilion end, Pain relieving Amery at the other end.

CORNWALL REACH THE CENTURY.

A hit to the leg for 2 by Tressawna saw Cornwall's score reach 100, half an hour after resumption. The holding of the Devon side was keen.

Tressawna was eventually caught in the slips after he had scored 37. He played forward to a ball which hit the top of his hat and bounced into the hands of Falding.

Tressawna had been on leg for just over 2 1/2 hours, during which time he had played with caution and brought off some very nice hits.

Cornwall had now scored 103 for the loss of four wickets.

Austin (H.), of Falmouth, joined Fox,

and, after scoring a solitary run, was bowled by Pain.

K. Hosking, of Camborne, was next man in, and soon started to score.

Fox had got himself well set, and was now hitting more freely than he had done in the morning and just after lunch, while Hosking was driving with vigour. Jennings' deliveries were rising nastily and often had the batsmen in difficulties.

DEVON'S POOR START.

The Devon wickets fell very cheaply at the start. The first man was out for 8, and the second when nine was on the board. The third wicket fell for 16, and the fourth for 24. The bowling honours went to Ollerearnshaw, the Penzance professional, who secured Hoare's wicket when he had scored 7, and shortly afterwards Outram fell a victim to the same bowler with one to his credit. Austin, at the other end, caught and bowled Emmott, when that player had scored 2. Price was easily caught by Austin, in the slips, off Ollerearnshaw. Runs came more quickly when Falding (P. W.) and Miller got together, the latter playing more aggressively than his colleagues had done. A splendid delivery from Ollerearnshaw dismissed Miller when he had scored 10. Falding, who had been batting steadily and adding slowly to his score, was caught by Tressawna off Ollerearnshaw after he had scored 25.

With only 52 for the loss of six wickets things were looking bad for the Devonians, but E. E. Goldie and Sir John Amory got together, and stopped the rot. Goldie added runs slowly, while Amory gave the spectators the first patch of bright cricket seen for the day. He hit strongly all round the wicket, and he scored several fours and a six. At the close of play both men were batting strongly, and the Devon score stood at 118 for the loss of six wickets.

SATURDAY'S PLAY.

CORNWALL'S SENSATIONAL COLLAPSE

Devon resumed on Saturday, having left the game at 118 for six wickets. There was a good attendance for a morning game. Goldie was caught at the wicket by Fox.

With the score at 127 for seven, Jennings joined Amory, and the Devon captain batted well. Austin was hit out of the field for 6 by Jennings.

Rain began to fall at this period, but it was very slight, and did not interrupt play. Jennings was beaten by Austin with the score at 187 for 8, and Amory reached his century with a single off Richards.

Ollerearnshaw bowled in place of Mill, and Payne skied the ball to the Penzance professional, who, however, dropped it. Only a few balls later, George Rogers caught him in the deep field.

French was the last man in, and the Devon captain was bowled after having made 105.

The innings closed for 233, giving Devon a lead of 86.

Cornwall's second innings started very badly, Tressawna being out in the first ball of the innings. Cory was then joined by Rogers (G.), and both batsmen looked like settling down, when Rogers was bowled by French for 21, the score being 28 for 2.

Fox and Barnicoat were quickly out before lunch, when four wickets were down for 35.

After lunch, Austin was out first ball, and Cornwall's score was 35 for five wickets.

The less said about the display of the Cornish batsmen after that the better. It was simply a procession, and the innings closed for 46.

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL'S AMAZING COLLAPSE AGAINST DEVON

Cornwall were skittled out in 70 minutes by Devon, at Roskear, on Saturday, in a Minor Counties' match, for 48 runs, in a most unaccountable manner, and lost the match with Devon at 2.25 p.m. by an innings and 30 runs. The quick ending was most disappointing to spectators who were streaming into the ground after two o'clock, and the failure of the Cornish batsmen was in some measure inexplicable. Many of the batsmen never showed signs of getting runs, although very few stayed long enough to score.

The first day's play, on Friday, was laboriously dull until late in the afternoon, when Devon made a remarkable recovery from what appeared to be a calamitous position. Batting first on a dry wicket, Cornwall had to struggle for runs, occupying just over four hours to collect 153 runs. The home county's batting was patchy and inconsistent, only Tressawna, Fox, and Cory making anything of a show. Devon were soon at tea, their first four wickets tumbling for 23 runs, and six were down for 52. The skipper, Sir J. H. Amory, and Goldie saved the Devonians from a hopeless collapse by a fine fighting effort. Where others showed no heart for attacking the bowling, this pair gallanted the proceedings, adding 66 runs without further loss.

Tressawna and Cory opened Cornwall's innings. After 20 minutes 10 runs were registered, and soon afterwards there was a temporary stoppage through Cory being struck on the face with a rising ball. He received a nasty scar on the cheek and was forced to retire temporarily. George Rogers, going out to partner Tressawna, made a game cut to partner French, who held it with one hand, the score then being 29. Cory resumed his innings, and after one hour a play 40 was reached. Several changes were made in the Devon bowling, but Tressawna and Cory played steadily and took the score to 70 before a separation was effected, Falding taking the fourth man's wicket in his second over. With six runs added Barnicoat wicket fell. Tressawna and Fox played with complete confidence, the Truro professional giving further evidence of his batting abilities, and the century was hoisted soon after the lunch interval, but seven runs later, Tressawna, after playing a miserably innings lasting over 24 hours, was dismissed rather unfortunately, a ball rising awkwardly off his gloves, to be caught by Falding of Jennings. The captain's contribution was 37. Fox was out lb.w. to Amory after a valuable innings for 37, which included six boundaries. Fox was at the wicket for about 80 minutes. The innings closed for 153.

Devon's Bad Start

Devon started their innings shortly before four o'clock, and with three wickets down for 14 runs in just over half an hour, Devon were in an uncomfortable position. Price was caught by Austin off Ollerearnshaw at 23. Miller assisted Falding in taking the score 41 before the fifth wicket dropped, Miller being bowled by the Pensance pro, who was bowling with deadly effect. Falding, who was making a plucky stand to stem the tide, gave an easy catch to Tressawna, off Ollerearnshaw, when he had made 26, being half of the total registered at that stage. Devon would have been in sore straits had it not been for their captain, Amory, and Goldie retrieving a bad start. The Devon batsmen struck out, and the century was hoisted after two hours' play. At the close of the day's play, they were only 35 runs behind, with four wickets in hand.

With the score at 119 for six wickets, Devon resumed their innings on Saturday. Amory and Goldie, 37 and 27 respectively, faced the bowling of Austin and Ollerearnshaw. Amory scored two boundaries off Ollerearnshaw, and Goldie was neatly caught by Fox at the wicket, off Austin, without adding to his overnight score, and seven were down for 127. Jennings joined his captain, who reached his 80 with another boundary off Ollerearnshaw, and was batting with extreme confidence. He lifted Austin over into the adjoining mine. Mill bowled, and Amory survived an appeal for obstruction off his second ball, and his second over to Jennings was a maiden. The Cornish total was passed with seven wickets down, and Barnicoat touched the ball near the boundary off Amory, but failed to hold it, and 170 was hoisted. Jennings was beaten by Austin with the score at 187. C. P. O. Payne came in, and the Devon captain drove Austin to the boundary, sending up the 200. Richards bowled in place of Austin, and Amory returned a hot one to the bowler, who failed to hold it. After lunch Austin was bowled by Jennings with the first ball, and half the side were

out for 15. Ollerearnshaw joined Cory, who was caught by Amory for 12, made by patient batting. Ken Hosking came in, and Ollerearnshaw started on a run, but as the result of a smart throw he was run out. The Cambridge man was bowled a minute later, and eight wickets were down for 39. Dover was caught off Jennings without scoring, and J. E. Mill, the last man in, hit Jennings for two 1's, but was bowled by the fast bowler, and the innings closed for 48. The match ended at 2.25. Devon winning by an innings and 32 runs. The failure of the Cornish team in batting was regrettable. THE PLAY IN DETAIL.

Bickford won the toss, and decided to bat on a wicket which looked like yielding plenty of runs, but the bowlers were on top all day.

Cory and Rogers were Cornwall's opening pair, but Capt. Busk hit the former's off stump with only 16 telegraphed. H. S. Stoneman then joined the Camborne pro, and after a shaky start, offering a difficult chance to Tindall when 7, settled down to play steady cricket. It was lucky for Cornwall he found his form, for Rogers was beaten by a googly just after he reached double figures, and with the comparative failure of the county's two leading batsmen,

the old Boconnoe man saved his side at a most critical period, and laid the foundation of a respectable total. When joined by Sam Stephens, Liskeard's all rounder, the pair added 50 before Stoneman, when one short of his half century, was dismissed by a brilliant catch at fine slip by Tindall, who thus retrieved his earlier error. Lunch was taken with the score 87 for 3, and in the third over after the resumption, Stephens, who brought off some excellent cuts, nicked one into the safe hands of Jarchow. Quite a feature of the early afternoon's cricket was the polished display of Victor Barnes, an 18-year-old youth from Truro College, whose placing and timing were particularly accurate. The remaining batsmen did not offer much resistance. The Dorset fielding was very smart, and when Mill foolishly ran himself out, Cornwall's innings closed at 143, having lasted 2½ hours.

FINE BOWLING.

Wisecracks around the ropes feared the total was not nearly big enough, but they reckoned without two lion-hearted young bowlers—J. E. Mill and C. Kendall. They kept a perfect length, getting plenty of pace into their deliveries, and before being taken off after sending down 40 overs between them, had dismissed eight batsmen for the meagre score of 83 runs. They were greatly helped by the skipper, who performed prodigies behind the wicket, showing he is still the finest keeper in Cornwall. Encouraged by one or two early successes, the fielders were always on their toes, and only a timely innings by Brockway, who played great defensive cricket stopped a rot. A ninth wicket stand between Elderton and Jowett yielded 26 runs, the latter, however, being missed twice in one over. Stoneman, a slow left-hander, being the unfortunate bowler. The innings closed at 6 p.m., Dorset batting 2 hours and 20 minutes for 115.

Cornwall, opening their second innings with a slender lead of 33, did badly. Cory, facing the setting sun, had only obtained 12, when he was finely caught by Jarchow c.f. a bad stroke. A thick mist then rolled up, and in the bad light Stoneman and Barnes, from whom many runs were expected, fell to the same fielder. Stephens and Rogers, however, managed to play out time, but when stumps were drawn for the day Cornwall had lost three valuable wickets for only 34 runs.

Yesterday's play was also favoured with glorious weather, but the attendance was disappointing.

Stephens and Rogers opened briskly for Cornwall, the latter taking too many chances, which eventually led to his being caught by Jarchow when his score stood at 27, a total which included four 4's. He was followed by Hosking, who found Jowett's bowling to his liking, hitting the only 6 of the day. It seemed probable that a strong partnership would result between Stephens and Hosking, especially when they had taken Cornwall's total to 100 after 40 minutes play, but only four more runs had been added when Stephens hit his wicket in an attempt to deal with a tricky ball from Harrison, who bowled unchanged at the road end.

Hosking, who had the satisfaction of making Cornwall's highest second innings score, was out as the result of a remarkable catch by Busk, who was bowling at the opposite end. He delivered a ball which Hosking sent back into his hands at a tremendous pace, everyone gasping when it was realised Busk had retained it. The score stood at 126 for 6, but Choak, who went in next, was out lbw. for the addition of only one run. Bickford had a short but merry innings, hitting three 4's in his total of 16. Lang took the score to 160 before he was caught by Tindall, while Mill and Kendall added 31 runs before Cornwall's innings ended at 191. Mill being stumped.

A BIG PARTNERSHIP.

Dorset lost one wicket before lunch. Kendall dismissing Jowett when only four runs had been scored. Everything seemed to indicate a victory for Cornwall, and even when Dorset had 71 for 4, there seemed no reason to lose hope. When tea was taken, however, Tovey and Morris had carried the score to 152, leaving Dorset only 63 to win. It was a cause for real regret that Tovey did not remain in until the end, his sparkling innings, which included nine 4's, having been a delight to watch. Morris was joined by Oigivy, and between them they quickly secured the 18 runs needed to win, Morris making the winning stroke.

Brockway, who was third man out in Dorset's second innings, had a remarkable escape when a ball from Stoneman lodged between the wickets but failed to dislodge the balls, but strangely enough he was caught by Bickford from the next ball.

Dorset certainly deserved their win for their batting alone, although their fielding was of a high standard. Cornwall did not give such a satisfactory display as on the previous day. Towards the end of the game there was a marked deterioration in their fielding, several catches being missed.

CORNWALL V. SURREY II.

Blazing hot sunshine favoured the match between Cornwall and Surrey II., which began at Penzance on Monday morning.

This match, which is in connection with the Minor Counties' Championship, was one of the attractions of Penzance Carnival Week, and there was an excellent attendance at the commencement of play.

The wicket was in splendid condition, and seemed likely to favour the batsmen. Cornwall won the toss, and elected to bat first on the "plumb" wickets.

Cory and H. S. Stoneman opened the Cornish innings, Sheffield, the Surrey fast bowler, bowling the first over. Cory got one through the slips, and then had to face an even faster bowler in E. A. Watts, but he secured a chance to pull a "long hop" to the leg boundary. A smart throw-in when Stoneman got his first run, hit the wickets, but Cory was in. Runs came slowly, and Cornwall's first wicket fell when only 9 runs were on the board. Cory played straight to a rising ball from Watts, and cocked it up into the bowler's hands. Only 9 runs had been scored in the first quarter of an hour, but Rogers (G.) got a four to the leg boundary off his second ball from Watts.

Rogers did not bat for long, as he was clean bowled by Sheffield, after making 5, and when the score was 16, Rogers seemed completely deceived, as he appeared to try to play the ball to leg, and the ball knocked back his off stump. Stoneman hit a pretty four through slips, off Watts. A couple of balls later K. Hosking opened his shoulders to a straight one from Watts, but was late, and his balls were sent spinning.

C. V. Paul, who was captaining Cornwall, was next man in, and was bowled first ball, his wicket being taken by Watts. The last two men were thus out to their first ball, Watts claiming both wickets. Cornwall's start was a very poor one, and four wickets had fallen for 21 runs.

V. Barnes started with three nice runs behind the wicket on the leg side, from Sheffield. Although not scoring quickly, Stoneman was the only one so far to stand up against the Surrey bowling. After 45 minutes' batting, 36 runs appeared on the score-board, during Barnes' and Stoneman's partnership. At this point, Lock (H.) took over the bowling from Watts, who went on in place of Sheffield at the other end.

Just when he looked like getting set, Stoneman was caught out after making 16. He tried a cut through slips off Watts, but was out to a beautiful one-handed catch by Stroud, fielding at first slip.

Half of Cornwall's side were dismissed for the small total of 35, and after 8.15 rust was nearly out of his first ball, in the next over from Lock, Barnes was well caught at the wicket by Mobey.

Rust made three and then had his wickets shattered by a good ball from Watts. The seventh wicket fell at 38. Still the procession went on, and before he had scored, J. Madden was bowled by Lock.

Surrey's fielding was very keen, and they gave nothing away, while Watts was still bowling at a fine pace. Rogers (W.) cooked up a short ball from Watts, who did not follow up quite enough to reach it.

At 44 the ninth Cornish wicket went down, J. E. Mill being bowled by Lock, who was bowling very well. Mill was another who failed to score. Cornwall were all out when the next ball went down Lock sending back Kendall and taking two wickets with two balls.

Cornwall's innings closed with the score at 44, after an hour and a half's batting. Rogers was not out with 8.

Lock had the excellent average of four wickets for three runs, while Watts took 5 for 28.

Cornwall were all out at 1 o'clock, and Wilson and Mobey opened Surrey's innings at 1.10. Wilson faced Kendall's first over, and got two off it. J. E. Mill took the ball at the other end, and four byes came off his first over.

In Kendall's second over, he sent up a full toss on the leg side, and Wilson hit it straight into the hands of C. V. Paul. The first wicket fell at 5, Wilson having made 5. Squires (H. F.) joined Mobey, who sent up a ball in slips, but there was no-one to take it. When play was adjourned for lunch, at 1.30, there was a fog coming over the ground.

After lunch, Kendall went on at the end nearest the road, and Rogers (W.) at the other end. After 45 minutes' waiting, Mobey and Squires had taken the score to 20. Rogers was soon taken off, and Mill put on again. Runs still came slowly, and at 26, Squires sent up an easy catch to Barnes, off Mill's bowling. Squires had made 10. W. T. Cook, the Surrey skipper, lifted Mills for four on two occasions, and sent up the 30 with his

second boundary. Mobey had a shot at boundary, and the ball went just over George Rogers' head. Runs were now coming more freely, and the Cornish score was passed after about fifty minutes' batting. The half-century was reached at 2.30 p.m., when Mobey and Cook were still together, getting most of their runs in singles. Cook made 20, and then put his leg in front of a straight one from Mill, and was given out lbw. When Cook left, the score was 52 for 3, and his placing was excellent.

Mill was taken off and Rogers (W.) took his place. Mobey, who had gone in first wicket, was still in, and hitting very well all round the wicket, sending Rogers to the boundary. Kendall had been bowling since the beginning of the innings, and kept a very consistent length, meeting with success when he knocked back Barling's off-stump with a lovely ball. Surrey had made 73 when Barling was dismissed. E. A. Watts was next in, and was very quickly out. In attempting a second run, he got to the other end, but Mobey did not run. Paul threw in to Rogers who knocked the wicket down with Watts a long way out of his crease. Thus half the Surrey side were back in the pavilion with 77 runs on the board.

Kendall met with a further success in the next over, for with a "snorter" he bowled Mobey's middle stump. This was one of the best balls of the day. Mobey batted well for his 34, which took him an hour and 20 minutes to make.

J. E. Merrill sent up 30, with a lovely 6 off Rogers—the first for the day. He tried to do it again with the next ball, but nearly gave a chance to point. Merrill was certainly having a "go" at Rogers.

After Kendall had bowled 16 overs, three of which were "mandans," he gave place to Stoneman, a slow left-hand bowler, while Mill resumed at the other end, but Merrill went out to him, and sent up the century with a four, which Barnes missed on the boundary. Rust missed a good chance of stumping Summers, when he stepped out to Mill. Merrill got another six when he hit a ball from Stoneman out of the field. A few balls later he sent Stoneman through the slips for three. In Mill's next over he fell to a good ball, after making 28. This included two sixes. There were 118 runs for 7 wickets, when E. A. Stroud came in.

J. Madden displaced Stoneman, but the batsmen were stealing short runs, and brought the total to 130, when Summers hit Madden to the off boundary. Summers and Stroud batted confidently, and got runs fairly freely, although Kendall went on for Madden. Kendall was not bowling so well now, and Stroud drove him to the boundary.

Rogers went on at Mills' end, when the score was at 150. Stroud set up 160 with a nice four, and then hit two more boundaries off Kendall in the same over. At the ten interval, the score was 173 for seven.

In the second over after tea, Kendall clean bowled Stroud, who had compiled 52 in fairly quick time, and made five fours.

Sheffield made six before being well caught by Rogers (G.) in deep-field. Surrey declared at the fall of the ninth wicket, when they had scored 189. Summers was still undefeated at the close, with 35 to his credit.

CORNWALL'S SECOND KNOCK.

When Cornwall went in for their second innings they were faced with the formidable task of getting 145 runs to avoid an innings defeat. Rogers and Stoneman started the innings at 6 o'clock, when there was an hour and a half left for play on the first day. Watts and Lock opened the Surrey attack. The batsmen had great difficulty in getting runs, and after a quarter of an hour's play, only 9 runs were on the board. Then Rogers gave Merrill a catch at forward short-leg, the first wicket falling at 9. Only 20 runs had been scored when Stoneman was completely deceived by a ball from Sheffield, and was clean bowled for 6.

Cory was batting well, and in one over from Watts, he hit three fours and a two. Barnes hit Lock to the boundary in the next over, and 40 runs went up. Runs came more freely than in any other part of the day, and from two successive balls from Sheffield, Cory hit two fine boundaries. The half century was reached after 40 minutes' batting, Cory obtaining the greatest part of the runs. After 50 the runs came more slowly, Cory and Barnes batting steadily and cautiously. Merrill brought off another fine catch at forward leg, catching Barnes low down when the latter had made 8. The third wicket fell at 57.

Cory pulled Merrill to the leg boundary, and two balls later was clean bowled by an excellent ball, which kept low. Out of Cornwall's 64, Cory had made 42, batting well for an hour. His

score included seven fours, and saved the Cornish total from seeming very small indeed. Lock bowled Rogers (W.) for a "duck," and half of Cornwall's side were out for 69. Hosking collected a couple of boundaries. Watts took over from Sheffield, but Hosking and Paul saw 90 go up. At 97, Hosking was out very unluckily. Ducking to avoid a bumping ball from Lock, the ball struck his wrist and was caught by Mobey, after making 22. Paul sent up the century, when he hit Watts to the off boundary, but he was very nearly caught and bowled off the next delivery.

No cricket was possible until 12.30 on Tuesday morning, because of rain.

In brilliant weather, and before a large crowd, Cornwall opened their concluding fixture in the Minor Counties' Championship, at Penzance, on Monday, when they met Surrey 2nd XI, over whom they had gained a meritorious victory at the Oval. The Cornwall side was captained by C. V. Paull, of Camborne, who, winning the toss, elected to take first action on what appeared to be a batsman's wicket. Cory and Stoneman were sent in to face the bowling of Sheffield and Watts, and of the first three overs, only one run was scored. The batsmen seemed to play with over-caution and disaster early overtook the home county, and they never recovered, there being a steady procession of batsmen to and from the pavilion.

In 85 minutes the whole side was dismissed for the paltry score of 44 runs, probably the lowest ever recorded by Cornwall. Credit must be given to Surrey for the excellence of their bowling and fielding but Cornwall's miserable failure was not altogether due to these factors. Rank had batting was the main cause and seasoned cricketers were amazed at the feeble way in which some of the batsmen behaved. The chief fault was in playing back to balls which obviously ought to have been played forward to H. Stoneman and V. Barnes were the only two who displayed confidence and ability, and both were unfortunate to be disposed of as the result of smart catches. Stoneman was out to a brilliant catch in the slips by Stroud, off Watts, after he had been at the wicket for about an hour, making a praiseworthy attempt to stop a complete rot. Barnes was taken behind the wicket by Mobery, off Lock, although there seemed to be some doubt as to whether the batsman actually struck the ball, but the Surrey men were confident and loud in their appeal. Cory and G. Rogers, two of the most prolific scorers in club cricket and S. Rust, who was a century-maker on Saturday, mustered only 13 runs between them. Watts and Lock bowled with such deadly effect that they both performed the feat of taking two wickets with successive balls. In five overs, three of which were maiden, Lock captured four wickets for three runs, and Watts had five for 25 in 11 overs.

Surrey batted for 20 minutes before lunch, and lost one wicket for 13 runs, the Truro bowler, Kendall, getting Wilson caught by Paull when only eight runs were on the board.

After lunch W. Rogers went on for a couple of overs in the place of Mill, who later was again brought on and brought about the dismissal of Squires, who was caught by Barnes, the score being 26 for two wickets. Run came slowly until Cook joined Mobery, and the score mounted by well-placed singles and a couple of boundaries. After the Cornwall score was passed, the Surrey skipper was out i.b.w. to Mill at 73. Kendall sent Darling's middle stump flying with a ball which beat the batsman all the way. The Truro bowler repeated his success in the next over, when he took Mobery's middle stump, the outgoing batsman having been in just over an hour making 34. Watts lost his wicket through being run out, and six wickets were down for 77. The biggest hit of the match was by Merrill, who knocked W. Rogers out of the ground for six.

After bowling 16 overs, Kendall was given a deserved rest, but this had the effect of quickening the rate of scoring by Summers and Merrill. Stoneman, a slow left-hand bowler, relieved Kendall and Mill resumed at the other end. Merrill hoisted the century, and Rust soon afterwards missed a chance of stumping Summers. Merrill hit a ball from Stoneman out of the field, but in Mill's next over he succumbed to a good ball after contributing 23, seven runs being down for 112. Summers and Stroud became associated in a bright partnership, and Cornwall were faced with the prospect of being heavily in arrears on the first innings. Kendall again came on, and W. Rogers was tried in place of Mill, but the Surrey pair were still together at the tea interval, when the score was 162. Soon after resuming, Kendall clean bowled Stroud, who had batted splendidly for 42, which included five boundaries. Ten runs later Sheffield was smartly caught by G. Rogers in the deep field, off Kendall, before he opened his account, and the Surrey captain declared with the score at 189 for nine wickets, Summers being not out for 35. Kendall had the highly creditable analysis of five wickets for 54 runs, and Mill claimed three for 68.

Cornwall entered upon their task of wiping out their deficiency of 145 runs at five o'clock, sending in George Rogers and Stoneman, but only nine runs were on the board when Rogers was caught by Verrall, off Lock. Stoneman and Cory settled down confidently, the latter batting with freedom, and hopes were entertained that this pair would remain together until the close of the day's play. Stoneman was out after having stayed for 25 minutes, and Barnes filled the vacancy. Then came the brightest period of Cornish batting, Cory hitting three boundaries off Watts in one over, and the half-century was reached in 40 minutes. At 57 Barnes was cleverly caught low down by Merrill at square leg. Cory fell a victim to Sheffield after compiling 42 runs, and with the score at 69 W. Rogers was bowled by Lock, five wickets being down for 69. Paull and Hosking raised the score to 97 before Hosking was unlucky in being dismissed. A ball from Lock rose awkwardly and in attempting to avoid it Hosking touched it with his hand to be caught by

Mobery. At the close of the day a play Paull and Rust were together, the score being 102 for six wickets.

A steady drizzle of rain held up play on Tuesday morning, and there were doubts as to whether further play would be at all possible. In the hope of getting some more cricket, however, the teams waited on, and close upon one o'clock the rain ceased. Although the outlook was still gloomy, the umpires, after inspecting the wicket, agreed that a start could be made. When C. V. Paull and S. Rust resumed batting for Cornwall there was scarcely a handful of spectators on the ground. With four wickets in hand and 44 runs behind Surrey's first innings total of 189 Cornwall had a chance of avoiding an innings' defeat. The possibility of securing a victory, however, was very remote. The Surrey men eager to secure an innings' victory, were completely on their toes, and in Lock's first over Rust was caught behind the wicket before he had scored. The telegraph then read "101-7-0." Mill joined Paull, and the two Camborne players seemed fairly confident on the tricky and greasy wicket. They seemed content with singles by push strokes to the off, but the partnership, however, proved a brief affair, Paull being brilliantly caught in the slips by Stroud, who just managed to reach the ball with one hand. Mill did not stay for long afterwards Lock knocking back the off stump. Merrill was brought on to bowl in place of Sheffield, but in his first over Maddern obtained nine runs including a boundary. When the total reached 120 Lock broke Maddern's wicket, and the innings closed after about half an hour's play. Surrey winning by an innings and 25 runs. Lock proved the most successful of the Surrey bowlers capturing seven wickets for 23 runs. Sheffield took two for 25, and Merrill one for 30. Scores:-

THE SUMMER GAME
