LAST SEASON'S RECORD

LAST SEASON'S RECORD

It is with much pleasure that I turn from finance to cricket. After turning up last year's report I see that the only comment I could allow myself upon the 1990 season was that the darkest hour sometimes preceded the dawn. This optimistic remark appears to have been fully justified, for we succeeded in elevating ourselves from a very ignoble position to a more honourable place in

the centre of the championship table. At one time, after a magnificent opening with our first four away matches, we had hopes of taking a really good place, but a serious set-back followed with the loss of two matches during the Norwich Week. Nevertheless, it was distinctly an encouraging season. The honour of heading the batting averages is taken by D. F. Walker, in his first season for Norfolk, with a figure of 84 for two innings. An average based on two performances is not perhaps in the highest tradition of accountancy, but he must have full credit for making the highest score for Norfolk, of 73 runs not out, in a fine knock against Kent II. B. W. R.-Rought takes second place with a fine average of 32. An indication of the improved form he showed this year is given by comparison with his previous year's average of only 19. A. G. Utting heads the bowling averages with a figure of 8.5, but honours must be divided with R. C. R.-Rought, who took three times as many wickets for an average of 9.4. The "skipper" took fourth place in both averages, a more humble position than he is accustomed to, but we are nevertheless still counting on him to stick by the team—at least until he has brought them to the top of the table. Among the young players D. C. The boundary is, however, a short one, and affords great encouragement to the free hitter. An eyes witness of Hall's innings informs us that the second half of it was better than the first. He offered several catches and there were also neglected chances of stumping; but if Hall reads reports of first class matches he will know that few hundreds are made without a blemish of some kind. During the second part of his innings he hit with greater accouracy and three times hit the ball out of the ground. Hall, who is about 19 years of age and works at Gaymer's, Attleborough, possesses a good eye, is quick on his feet and hits very hard for his inches. A fortnight earlier at Eye he played a different type of innings, helping his rector-captain in a valuable 50 partnership at a time when things were going badly with the side. Hall's first century, and possibly the first big score made for Harling, should give him increased confidence. The finish to the second match was just as thrilling, the Norfolk batting breaking down after a fine partnership between L. K. Jarvis and J. H. M. Hare, and Rye, F. A. Tipple, and E. B. Raikes having to struggle desperately hard to avert defeat. This match with Herts ended in a tie, Mr. Raikes being not out 10 when the last wicket fell. The secretaries, in their review of the season, state that "the spectators' blood was stirred, and all throe players received an ovation."

In those two matches Mr. Raikes took twenty-flve wickets at the small cost of six runs per wicket. He was in wonderful form in the Hertfordshire match, in which he secured eight wickets in the first innings for 47 runs and nine for 44 in the second. No one is within miles of scoring 1000 runs in May this season; but it is good to see young players like Payntor, Keeton, and Bailey coning to the front. The two first named, like Area and Shepherd, won their spurs with the second elevens of their county. Bailey, the Hampshire left-hander who heads the bowling averages, made his mark last season in his first year, chiefly as a batsman. R. H. Brooke, the Bucks and Oxford batsman, stands high in the averages with D. R. Jardine, whom the All-India bowlers pegged down at Lord's, the Surrey captain being at the wickets nearly three hours for 44 and hitting only one boundary. Nayudu's brilliant century provided a sharp contrast to Jardine's innings. R. C. Rought-Rought and K. Farnes have earned places with four other amateurs in the first-clase bowling averages, the Norfolk man's twenty-two wickets having cost him 18 runs apiece. Wazir Ali has played in only three first-class matches, and at Lord's he became a casualty when the game was only a few minutes old, but he has two centuries to his credit and has scored 250 runs for two completed innings.

The recent accidents to George Gunn and Wazir Ali when batting to fast bowling have directed attention to the importance of having sight screens at each end. There is a lack of uniformity in this respect, and also in regard to the height of the screens. Those at Lekenlam have been repainted, and with the disappearance of the trees at the enclosure end the batsmen, and also the fielders, obtain a much better eight of the ball than was previously the case. Many Norfolk cricketers will read with regret the tragedy of "Bert" Tebbutt, of Cambridge. He came into the cricket world at a bound in 1904 by scoring eight centuries for Leys School. His aggregate for the season was 1443, with 154 as his highest score, and he had an average of 60. In the number of his hundreds and the aggregate he is believed to have established a record in Public School cricket for one season. Tebbutt's achievements that year were more talked about at Cambridge than J. B. Hobbs' innings of 92 for his home county against Norfolk at Norwich, an innings which marked the turning point or stepping stone in Hobbs' career, as it led to Surrey putting him straight away in their first eleven the next season. In due course Tebbut appeared for his county, and for a season or so he captained the side. A rapid scorer, a punishing batsnau, and a powerful hitter, he played many fine innings for Cambridgeshire.

It was his score of 87 at Lakenham, made in an hour and three-quarters, which played a big part in Cambridgeshire's four wickets victory in 1907. Four years later Cambridgeshire put together the big score of 468 against Norfolk, Tebbutt's share being 127 not out. In a low scoring match at Cambridge in 1913 he made 48 out of his side's total of 85 after six wickets had fallen for 23. He was also quite a useful bowler. Had he belonged to a more important county he would undoubtedly have made a bigger name in the cricket world.

AYRES' CRICKET COMPANION

Within a comparatively brief period cricket has lost three writers who randered invaluable service to the game by their contributions and researches. For many years Mr. W. R. Weir edited "Ayres' Cricket Companion" from his home in Norfolk, and his successor, Mr. J. N. Pentelow, also had Norfolk associations, Mr. Pentelow's death last July was followed soon by another great authority and prolific writer, Mr. F. S. Ashley-Cooper, Much of their work will survive and take a place among the treasures of cricket literature. To carry on the work the publishers (F. H. Ayres, Ltd., 111, Aldersgate Street, E.C.1), have been fortunate in socuring the assistance of Mr. John Slee, formerly sports editor of Reuter's, who has introduced many new features into the 1932 edition—the 31st of the series. The now editor has aimed at making the "Companion" of special interest to public schoolboys, although there is a general appeal in the instructional articles by Don Bradman, Herbert W. Taylor, C. G. Macartney, and Strudwick. What a great quertet! Valuable new features are the public schools' records and the who's who of world cricketers. Among the latter it is interesting to find two Norfolk players figuring in distinguished company. They are Michael Falcon and Rodney Rought-Rought. The thumbnail sketch of the Norfolk captain is—

## ALL-INDIA CRICKETERS AT NORWICH

#### BOWLERS' DAY AT LAKENHAM

21 WICKETS FALL FOR 200 RUNS

If yesterday's weather can be taken as a fair sample, June will make some atonement for weeping May. About 3000 persons, including many schoolboys, revelled in the sunshine at Lakenham, and although there was a marked change in the temperature during the last hour when the sky changed from blue to grey, the day as a whole was a delightful experience. ## NORFOLK'S GOOD FIGHT WITH ALL-INDIA

#### COUNTY BEATEN JUST BEFORE TIME

#### NISSAR'S BOWLING TRIUMPH

Norfolk made a very gallant show against All-India at Lakenham yesterday, and although

All-India at Lakenham yeaterday, and autougathere was never any real hope of the county pulling the 'mateli round they fought on doggedly until 6.29 in a very good attempt to avert defeat. In the end the margin in favour of the visitors was no more than-183 runs, and bearing in mind the relative strength of the teams the county can be congratulated upon keeping, the game alive for two full days and in getting so near, to saving the match. The weather yesterday provided a chilly contrast to the sunny conditions of the previous day. The metch was almost overbefore the sun made a, fleeting, appearance, and all day spectators were shivering on the benches while the playors sought warmth in extra sweafers.

Although All-India gained their anticipated victory over Norfolk County, the margin of the County's defeat was much narrower than was generally expected. This was by no means the only encouraging feature of the match. Blessed with the good fortune of two fine days during a period of uncertain weather, the fixture proa period of uncertain we ther, the fixture provided two full days of very keen cricket, with a definite result only obtained ten minutes before time on the second afternoon. The financial side was very gratifying to the committee, who gambled successfully on fine weather, and the loyalty of the members in responding to the gambled successfully on fine weather, and the loyalty of the members in responding to the gambled successfully on fine of the county made a loss of over £300, and with subscriptions reflecting the general depression the County made a loss of over £300, and with subscriptions reflecting the general depression the position called for some special measures. Mr. D. G. Bunton, who has taken over the secretaryship at this critical stage in the affairs of the County, was both grateful and impressed by the way the members ose to the appeal and also by the public support of the match. The gate receipts on Thursday were £138, and if the fixture could have been arranged for August there is no doubt the Indians would have been a greater draw. As it was, in spite of the penetrating wind on Friday, which was a severe test of cricket enthusiasm, the total receipts for the match amounted to £180. Except at Cardiff and Lord's the Indians had not played before a bigger attendance than that at Lakenham on Thursday; but of course the weather has been all against them. They revelled in the sunshine on Thursday, said nice things about the ground and the Lakenham cuckoe, and after the match the captain, a Prince who for the purposes of cricket prefers to be known as plain & S. G. Limbdi expressed the thanks of his team for a pleasant visit. When offering his personal thanks to the two umpires he shook each by the hand and said "very good." He is really the reserve stumper of the party, and among his records are those of dismissing six of A. Gilligan's M.C.C. batsmen in one match and of not allowing a bye in an innings of 428. In Norfolk's first innings 10 runs were scored before a wicket fell, but six were down for 21, and there have probably been few times when so many men failed to survive the first or second ball. Desmond Rought-Rought was short of practice, but he managed to stay in nearly half an hour with Edrich, whose effort was the best thing of the innings. Going in at the fall of the fifth wicket at 21, he obtained 20 of the last 28 runs, and remained in the middle forty minutes. Incidentally, his partnership with the youngest Rought-Rought was disturbed by the tea interval, but it did not appear to affect either of them. It is probable that younger players have appeared for Norfolk at some time or another, but everyone will acknowledge the severe test to which this boy of 18 was put in his first County match and also the splendid way in which he came through it. His nerve was unshaken by the rapid fall of wickets, and if anyone expected him to display any timidity in facing bowlers flushed with success they were probably amazed and delightfully surprised with the splendid note of aggression in his batting. A seasoned, experienced County player could have found satisfaction in making some of the strokes Edrich played, especially on the leg side, and the two fours he obtained off Nasir Ali were glorious shots. His second effort was equally meritorious and it lasted three-quarters of an hour, his partnership with Thisleton-Smith for the sixth wicket, which produced 40 runs, being the best stand for Norfolk in the match. Another member of the over-forty brigade made a little piece of personal history at Southampton in amach which began with one captain putting the others in and ended disastrously for the captain of the other side whos; declaration allowed his opponents sufficient time, as it turned out, to make the required runs. Mead contributed to this happy result for Hampshire with a century—the 125th of his career and his first against Derbyshire. At Liverpool the Indians gave Lancashire an unpleasant shock by compiling 193, theire highest score of the tour, and during the rest of the week there has been such an extraordinary glut of runs and record-smashing achievements that the readers of cricket news have become almost as bewildered as the bowlers. Norfolk begin their Minor Counties championahip matches this week by visiting Lincolnabire, who were among Norfolk's variest opponentr. It is recorded that in the July of 1828 Norfolk played their first inter-county match against Lincolnabire at East Dereham, Norfolk being defeated in a low scoring match by an innings and six runs. Norfolk made only 74 and 80. The occasion of the morel, was marked by much festivity. After the first day's play Lord Suffield and 86 ladies and gontiems dined in the Assembly Hooms, and on the second evening there was a grand ball. Similar festivities were associated with the early Norwich Weeks. Times have changed, County croket clubs went out of existence in both Norfolk and Liscolnabire. The revival begin earlier in Norfolk, but in 1886 Lincolnabire came to Norwich to be beaten by 75 runs and in the following year Norfolk won by the wider margin of an innings and 43 runs. The fixtures between the counties were renswed in the early nineties and ceased again after 1895 till 1909, when Lincolnabire won at Norwich by six wickets. There was the another long break in the matches between the neighbouring counties, and it was not until 1939 that the rivalry was renewed. Of the four matches played in the last two seasons Norfolk won three by an innings margin and Lincolnabire wore successful by four wickets in the matche played at Lincoln during the August heat wave of 1899.

being parted.
Norfolk went to the wicket the second time with the express intention of getting a sharp 150 runs, which would put them in a strong position. The Lines. attack was none too steady, and when Falcon joined B. Rought-Rought the score went merrily along with a few 6s and clever boundary hits. Theobald, after playing himself nicely in, was run out rather smartly when he was attempting to get back into his crease following a non-accepted call. However, a declaration was made when Low was bowled just before the tea interval, leaving Lines, good time in which to collect 228 runs. The bowling of Lingwood, as in the first innings, was much too good for the home batsmen, and while Utting at the other end was keeping down the scoring, Lingwood was having a merry time capturing wickets. He repeated his first innings performance. acknowledged on a perfect wicket to be a fine acknowledged on a particle which is a chievement. On this occasion he had the same number of wickets for half the runs. His sixteen wickets of the match cost only 76 runs.

Norfolk showed general smartness in the field, and their success, even over a side which was none too strongly represented, was thoroughly merited.

The failure of some of the front rank batsnen ou sun baked pitches has been a surprising feature of recent cricket, and on Saturday me of the counties were struggling for runs ander conditions which seemed to offer little hope of success for the bowlers. Notts showed so much restraint in their batting at Leeds that they occupied the whole of the day in compiling 234 runs, and the distinction of being the chief scorer was reserved for Larwood, who heads the bowling averages. None of the four teams engaged in the week at Lord's possessed a bowler of match-winning class, and as a result the games were both unfinished and the honours went to a few batsmen. The famous cricket clubs series which has been such an interesting cricket feature in the "Observer" this season made particularly interesting reading for Norfolk players when the Harpenden and Bushey Clubs were dealt with. It was for Harpenden that the late Charles Titchmarsh did some of his best performances. Nineteen of his century of centuries were scored for the club, and no Harpenden player has equalled his 1913 record of scoring 1163 runs for them in one season. His last innings for Harpenden was a not out century against Hampstead. Of the many opponents of Norfolk during the last 30 years Charles Titchmarsh was easily the most popular with Norfolk players and with the Lakenham crowd. Norfolk players of his time also had a warm corner in their affections for Charles Titchmarsh's friend, W. H. Marsh, who captained Hertfordshire for many years. "Bill" Marsh's great work, however, has been connected with Harpenden, for which club ho is still the secretary, having held the office since 1898. What a record! On the field Marsh has been no less successful than in his administrative work. He has scored his 1000 rins and taken his 100 wickets in one and the same season. He has taken all ten wickets in an innings, and his club record to date of scoring 14,000 runs and taking well over 3000 wickets is a wonderful record of all-round achievement, which would be very hard to heat. "Bill" is still young at heart and when he comes to see Norfolk at Watford theis week, as he is almost certain to do, we shall be prepared to hear news of further additions to his enormous bag of wickets.

The Bushey club owes much to the Harfords. It was founded by H. M. Harford, whose son Herbert was another captain of Hertfordshire whom Norfolk players will remember. By teatime Norfolk had lost three good wickets in making 45 runs, and with half the side out within an hour for 53, Norfolk had only a draw to play for. F. Cunliffe and R. G. Rought-Rought made a gallant effort to save the side from defeat, the pair-remaining together 40 minutes and adding 34 runs. Young Wright then met with success, and he continued to be so effective with his slow leg spinners that with his last 27 balls he secured the last five Norfolk wickets at the expense of only nine runs. It had been airanged to play till 7.15 on the first day and stop at 5.30 on Saturday, which, with the extra half-hour, gave Kent until six o'clock to force a win. At 5.30 Norfolk had three wickets left, but Wright captured these with his last five balls to give Kent a well-merited victory. ## LOW'S CATCHES AFTER BALLY INJURED

The busiest people Captain Desmond Buxton saw during his four hours' stay on the County Ground at Leicester yesterday, where Norfolk were engaged in their match with the Minor Counties Champions, were the men of the ground staff. Following overnight rain the weather continued so showery that one lost count of the number of times the ground staff were employed in removing and replacing the protecting covers for the wicket. The rainfall was not heavy, but the intervals of fine weather before 8 o'clock were so brief that play down to that time was restricted to just an hour, during which Leicester lost the wicket of Bradshaw, and only 32 runs were scored.

The low rate of scoring suggests that the batting was as dreary as the weather, but as a matter of fact this was due not so much to lack of enterprise on the part of the batsmen as

a matter of fact this was due not so much to lack of enterprise on the part of the batsmen as to the steadiness of the bowling of R. Rought-Rought and Lingwood and the keenness of the Norfolk fielding. The outfield was, of course, slow and the batsmen were obliged to run and be content with two or three for strokes which, under summer conditions, would have fetched the boundary. Brief periods of sunshine and the prevailing high wind helped in drying the ground for play later in the day. At no time was the damp wicket helpful to the bowlers, and during the early stages they were handicapped by the insecure foothold. M. Falcon's unlucky call for the third time in succession gave Leicestershire the advantage of batting first, and at the close of the day the home county had compiled 207 runs for the loss of six wickets as the outcome of three hours and three-quarters' play.

The Leicester side include eight professionals, and as many as half a dozen players who have appeared in the first team. No one did better for them than Riddington, a left-hander, who, going in at the beginning of the innings, took an hour over his first 12 runs, and had a narrow escape of being stumped off Lingwood's bowling, but made no other faulty stroke before completing 50 out of 90 in an hour and three-quarters, when he edged a hall from Lingwood dangerously near the slips. He played all the bowling with confidence and skill and made a large proportion of his runs in front of the wicket, chiefly by off driving. Off the last ball of the day, Low made his third wicket-keeper's catch to get the left-handed Marlow out off Falcon's bowling. Riddington tired towards the close of the day, and after entering the eighties he displayed excessive caution, and at the close needed another run to complete his century.

## NORFOLK FOLLOW-ON AT LEICESTER

## DRAWN GAME WITH MINOR **CHAMPIONS**

## SPLENDID BATTING BY WALKER AND B. ROUGHT-ROUGHT

Norfolk did well to save the game at Leicester on Saturday where the weather conditions were in pleasant contrast with those of the previous day. They had all the ill-luck that was going in this match, not the least of their mistortunes after losing the toss being the injury to Bally which practically deprived the side of the services of their regular wicket-

their mistortunes after losing the toss being the injury to Bally which practically deprived the side of the services of their regular wicket-keeper and batsman after the first hour of the match. Bally was prepared to carry on as usual on Saturday, but except for sending him in to bat last—he has usually been No. 3—his captain took the view that rest was essential. In contrast with the easy conditions when Leicester batted on Friday, Norfolk had to bat for several hours on Saturday when the drying wicket was extremely difficult, and Leicester had an array of elever spin bowlers capable of making the most of their opportunity. B. W. Rought-Rought made a very fine effort by staying in two and a-half hours, and received some assistance from his brother, Walker, and Thompson; but Norfolk just failed to save the follow on, and when they batted again Walker played a great findings, which, with some help from Falcon and Theobald, enabled the visitors to effect a draw. Norfolk batted altogether five and a-half hours on Saturday.

Although Riddington had dwelt an unconscionable time in the eighties and nineties the previous day, the Leic ster captain decided to give him the opportunity of completing his hundred on Saturday morning. Riddington needed only one run, and when this had been obtained Riddington went for the bowling. hit Lingwood for 4, and trying for another in the same over was caught by the bowler off a skyscraping hit. Riddington batted five minutes under four hours for his 104, and had one 6, four 4s, and seven 3s as his principal scoring strokes, off-driving and hooking being the feature of his sound innings. Lingwood obtained another, wicket in his next over. Howley being caught in the gully by Falcon, who secured the ninth wicket. Dickinson venturing out to hit and missing the ball gave Low the opportunity for a piece of stumping. At this stage the innings was declared closed, three wickets having fallen while 16 runs were added in twenty-five minutes. Leicester batted altogether four hours and ten min

off his first eleven overs, but later during a long showl against the strong wind he lost some of his steadiness.

On the drying wicket Norfolk fared badly against the clever spin bowling of Leicester's slow left-handers, Marlow and F. Bowley, and in soventy-five minutes the visitors lost their first six wickets in making 41 runs. Twenty-two of these were obtained during Walker's torty minutes' partnership with B. Rought-Rought for the second wicket after Theobald had been bowled in Marlow's opening over. Walker, whose stance at the wicket is much less two shouldered than it was last year, made a dangerous stroke towards point when making his first run, but it did not affect his confidence and his off drives and strokes past cover point were good samples of admirable hatsmanship. His defence was also strong and it came as a surprise when he was caught at mid-on off Coleman, the fast bowler, who was the first of the many changes made by Lanhome captain during Norfolk's innings. Marlow had crossed to the opposite end from which he started bowling when he got Falcon and Edrich caught at first slip off consecutive balls while the score was at 26. #### DEATH OF SIR K. J. KEY

A FORMER SURREY CAPTAIN

Sir Kingsmill James Key, fourth holder of the baronetcy, who after a short illness died at Wittersham, Kent, on Tuesday, was not only actively connected with Surrey cricket for 17 years, but captained the elevan from 1894 to 1899. He followed John Shuter as leader of the team, and was succeeded by D. L. A. Jephaen. Born at Streatham on October 11th, 1864, K. J. Key was educated at Clifton, getting a place in the eleven there in 1881 and keeping it for the next two years. A slow bowler as well as a promising batsman at that time, be in his last year at school played an innings of 90 against Cheltenham and took five wickets. Going up to Oxford, he obtained his Blue as a Freshmun in 1894, and played four times against Cambridge. His great achievement in the University match was in 1896, when he and W. Rashleigh put on 243 for the first wicket, Key's individual score being 143. A year later, when Oxford met Middlesex at Chiswick Park, he made 281 and Hylton Philipson 150, their partnership of 340 for the seventh wicket being at that time the biggest on record in first-class cricket.

In the course of his career he scored 12,928 runs in first-class matches, with an average of 26. He appeared for Gentlemen v. Players between 1885 and 1889, and had as his highest innings in county cricket one of 179 against Kent. He made his name as a young man of 18 in company with W. E. Roller. Surrey were set by Lancashire 294 to make against Crossland, Watson, Barlow, and Nash, and lost seven wickets in putting together a score of 192. Thus the southern county lonked doomed to defeat. At that point Key joined Roller, and those two young cricketers obtained 38 runs before the drawing of stumps. Next day Key and Roller, with 36 runs more still wanted, resumed the task and hit off the remaining runs.

A batsman with a solid defence Key had all sorts of strokes. Furthermera he could force

He played back with a dead straight bat and was never seen to better advantage than in times of difficulty. A man of original mind, he bore the smiles and frowns of fortune on the cricket field with even temper, and as a captain he was imperturbable.

In addition to earning fame as a cricketer Key attained some prominence as a Rugby football player. A man very difficult to stop once he had got into his stride, he was one of the three-quarters in the Oxford fifteen, led by G. C. Lindsay in 1885, and a year later occupied the post of full-back in the team led by Percy Coles.

## DEATH OF MR. W. H. GAME. OF BRANCASTER

## A FAMOUS ALL-ROUND ATHLETE

## MAN WHO HIT SPOFFORTH OUT OF THE OVAL SE &

Mr. William Henry Game, the old Oxford and Surrey orloketer died at Branceter, Norfolk, on Thursday, in his 79th year, after a very short illness. He was a good shot, a fine croquet player and a keen golfer. In later years he took up bowls and often invited members of the village club to take part in matches on his lawn. His many golfing trophies included the King Edward Challenge Cup at Brancaster.

Mr. Game had been a member of the Royal West Norfolk Golf Club for a number of years and at the last annual meeting was elected captain of the club. He was also a vice-president of the Village Golf Club and the Bowls Club, and a generous donor of prizes to both.

He was an active church worker, was Rector's warden at the time of his death, and read the lessons on Sunday mornings. It was greatly due to his generosity that a new organ was installed in the Parish Church some 15 years ago and later he and the late Mrs. Game restored the old vestry. He was a manager for both the boys and girls echools. Mr. Game had a shoot, at Sedgeford for the last 42 years and shot regularly up to the end of last season. He came to live at Brancaster 22 years ago. He leaves two daughters—Miss Muriel Game, who lives at home, and Mrs. Colin Dowson. Mrs. Came died three years ago.

The funeral will take place at Brancaster on Monday.

The Royal West Norfolk Ladies Summer Meeting, which was in progress, has been postponed owing to the death of Mr. Game.

#### CRICKET CAREER

Educated at Sherborne, where he captained the eleven in 1871, putting together for his school that summer four esparate innings of over a hundred, he went up to Oxford in 1878 and played four times against Cambridge. In his last year, 1878, when he captained the Oxford in so doing registered what was the first hundred ever hit for Oxford against Cambridge, and the fourth inc tred recorded in the University match. Th. poeding three-figure innings were 100 in 1870, and 139 in 1872, by William Yardley, and 105 by W. H. Patterson in 1876, this last score being obtained in the first innings of Cambridge in the same match that Ha also played interestitation.

He also played intermittently for Surrey between 1871 and 1888. When he first assisted the county he was only 17 years of age. In 1878 when appearing for Surrey against the first Australian team, Game enjoyed the distinction of hitting a ball from Spofforth right out of the Oval. He was dismissed without scoring

in the first innings, and in the second made only ten, but that small innings included the famous square-leg hit off Spofforth. He was always a fine free batsman if rather lacking in defence, and a brilliant outfield.

In the Oxford University Sports of 1873, when 19, Game threw the cricket ball 111 yards, 1 foot, 3 inches, and at the Oval in 1875 after throwing the cricket ball 111 yards he immediately afterwards threw it back the same distance.

Game also distinguished himself as a Rugby football player, and in 1873 and the two following seasons when Oxford and Cambridge metat the Oval, he formed one of the Dark Blue team. In the records he is given as one of the two backs in the match contested on February, 1873, as the one three-quarter in that of 1878-74, and as one of three backs in that of 1874-75.

## REFLECTIONS ON THE NORFOLK SEASON

"HROWING THE CRICKET BALL RECORDS
The discrepancies which occurred in the obituary noices of William Honry Game with reference to ore of his many feats on the playing felds has directed attention to the distance a cricke ball has been thrown. "Wisden," to whom Mr. Knyvet Wilson referred, creditt W. G. Grace with the longest throws in this country. That authority says at the Oval in 1808 W. G. made three successive throws of 186, 117, and 118 yards, and then threw back over 100 yards. Charles Arnold, of Cambridge, is mentioned as having once thrown 112 yards with the wind and 103 yards egainst. Grace organic credited with throwing 100 yards one way and back 105, and George Millyard, of Sussex. 108 yards with the wind and 103 yards sout and home. The same atthority says W. H. Game, at the Oval in 1875, threw he ball 111 yards and then back the same distance. William Yardley, while a hoy at laughy, threw 100 yards with his right hand and 78 with his left.

According to "Wisden" all these distances have been beaten in other countries. On the Durban Sands Racecourse in 1864 R. Percival is credited with a throw of 140 yards 2 feet. In 1872 Ross Mackenzis threw 140 yards at Claremont, Queenslar. No one would question the accuracy of any figures given in "Wisden." but it is interesting to mention that Betham's book of Oxford and Cambridge Cricket Scores and Biographies mentions that in the Oxford A.C. sports of 1873 Game threw the cricket ball 127 yards 15 inches, "one of the longest throws on record."

It would be interesting to clear up the mystery and settle all doubts about the impression that the distances given on the medals were 127 vards and 121 yards.

The jate F. S. Ashley-Cooper, whose accuracy where cricket statistics are concerned was rever challenged, records in his "loose strings" in 1899, which appeared in James Lillywhite's Cricket statistics are concerned was first the same year. The distances the cricket ball 120 yards 16 inches at Reble College Sports. Oxford, on February

ranging from 11t yards to 100 yards. Throwing the cricket ball was formerly a regular item in a sports programme, and we remember seeing C. G. Wood successful in this event at the Norwich sports at Newmarket Foad many years ago, though we cannot recall his distance. W. J. Edrich registered a throw of 89 vards at the Bracondale School sports: and T. L. L. Ballance says there is a boy at Uppingham who has done well over 100 yards.
