

LEAVES from my notebook



The Oxfordshire County Cricket Club commence their 1932 season to-morrow with a match against the University "A" team in the Parks and the game will be continued on Monday. They have been faced with unusual difficulties in getting together their team. The need for economy being imperative, they have, reluctantly I am sure, had to leave out certain players of whom they would be glad to avail themselves in ordinary circumstances. It looks, indeed, as if the professional element will have to be kept to the absolute minimum. Nor is this the only problem to be solved. S. C. B. Lee, H. Walker, F. Hartley, R. P. Nelson (the old Marlborough College boy), W. G. Kalaugher and W. W. Lodge, the wicket-keeper, have all sent back word that they cannot play. Out of evil good comes, it is said. The County now have the opportunity to "try out" some young blood and they are including J. Godfrey, the North Oxford player, E. L. C. Turner, of St. Catherine's Society, two Banbury players, C. W. Clarke, a wicket-keeper, and G. Cherry, a bowler, and D. Wynne-Willson, the hockey Blue, who lives at Kidlington. B. J. Henry will, of course, captain the side, and others of last year's players to assist are J. A. Evetts and C. Walters. There is also a probability that an invitation will be sent to F. Thornton, the Morris Motors player. This will be a very good baptism for "bleeding" players and will give them valuable experience.

There are 15 clubs in the First Division of the Oxfordshire Cricket League. Four matches were down to be played last Saturday and the clubs should have registered their players seven days before these games were due to be played. As a matter of fact only four did so. I am afraid there has, in the past, been a great deal of slackness in the conduct of the League, and some clubs have taken advantage of it. The new secretary, Mr. Hall, is naturally perturbed at this laziness on the part of club secretaries and takes the view that rules are made to be carried out and not to be broken. These secretaries who fail to keep themselves up to date with the laws must, in future, expect to be punished, as I am assured, a determined effort is to be made to run the League on business-like lines and

not to overlook, as has been done in the past, offences that can and should be avoided. One is very glad to note that Mr. Hall is taking this firm hand, for there is no excuse for the secretary who deliberately sets the League laws at defiance. I hope this warning will be noted by all whom it may concern.

Mr. P. F. Warner is speaking at Oxford to-day on "The Outlook for English Cricket." Unsettled seems the appropriate and obvious retort, during the present unseasonable weather.

The latest rumour flying round the City—it may be nothing more than a canard, for all I know—is that Christ Church will, in the course of the next year or two, be leaving their ground on the Isley-road and will make a new one in the Meadow. The old Christ Church ground, the story continues, will be taken over by the University Cricket and Hockey Clubs, who would thus be in a position, if they so desired, to charge "gates." This would mean, presumably, the end of free cricket in the Parks, which would then be available all the summer for lawn tennis and croquet. From inquiries I have made it has not been possible to get official confirmation of this interesting story.

OXFORDSHIRE v. ALL-INDIA.

After promising to be a brilliant success, the match between Oxfordshire and All-India, on the Merton College ground on Wednesday and Thursday, was completely spoilt on the latter day owing to an unexpected change in the weather. Wednesday was ideal and the All-Indians, batting on a perfect Merton wicket, ran up the good score of 373. Oxon had half an hour's batting and lost three wickets for 33. Those who hoped the County would make a better fight on Thursday did not reckon with the weather. There was heavy rain in the morning and a big drop in the temperature, Wednesday's sunshine giving place to wet and clouds. It was not possible to resume till after lunch and then Oxford had to bat on a pitch that was obviously in favour of the bowlers. It was one that had been used in another match, play on the original one being out of the question. Three good batting displays enabled Oxfordshire to raise the respectable total of 165. Walters, so often at his best at a crisis, came in when his side had lost five for 49, and saw the score go up to 101 before being cleverly caught. He made some fine strokes against bowling that frequently rose very sharply and on a pitch that was full of venom. After his dismissal it looked as if the end had come, three wickets going down quickly, but Evetts, who had gone in over-night when three were out for 31 and had shown indomitable courage and stubborn patience, found help from an unexpected quarter, Kalaugher helping him to put on 54 for the last wicket, his unorthodox methods succeeding where others failed. Evetts was last out after defying the Indian bowlers for 2½ hours. In the circumstances it was a most praiseworthy innings, and as a purely defensive effort would be hard to beat. It was intended that Oxon, 298 in arrears, should follow on, but rain made further play out of the question.

It is to be feared that those who guaranteed the expenses of the match will be out of pocket, the "gate" on Thursday being very disappointing. Score:—

The 94th cricket match between the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge commences at Lord's on Monday and, D.V. and the weather, will conclude on Wednesday. When the sides assembled in May Oxford were the favourites, as, indeed, they have been up to the past fortnight, since when Cambridge have been getting better and better. In making up his side Melville has omitted the laborious Lindsay for the more mercurial and less certain Evans, and he has decided to do without a fast-medium bowler, for Hart scarcely comes in that category. Otherwise I think it is the best Oxford side, though it may, should the hot weather continue, find the handicap of a fastish bowler too heavy. Cambridge have in Farnes and Rought-Rought two pacey bowlers, should both be chosen, but they have no really good spin bowler, as their captain, Hazelrigg, appears to have developed his batting and lost his bowling. They are two well-matched sides, and in summing up their chances I can imagine one player will be brought into every pro and con argument. It is not too much to say that on Owen-Smith an Oxford victory mainly depends.

I am glad to hear that at last something tangible is being done to get together an Oxford Town Eight for the De-borough Cup for amateur rights in October. Previously Oxford have either tabooed the competition altogether, or sent a club crew, more with a view to the City being represented than to any confident idea of winning. Now, however, the local rowing captains have met, and have decided that the whole of the local clubs shall pool their resources. Practice starts to commence in August, not casually, but on systematic lines, and with this co-operation and the right spirit behind it, Oxford should be able to find a crew capable of holding its own against all comers. For years it has been said by the pessimists that it was impossible to get together a local eight and, by the optimists, that it might happen when the present generation were veterans but to those in the know there was always a few enthusiasts working behind the scenes to bring the matter to fruition, and now that their object has been accomplished I am sure rowing men won't rest till they have been awarded their mode of praise-names please.

The two young Oxford cricketers, Arnold, of Hampshire, and Bakewell, of Northants, have chosen the present week, which coincided with the Test match at Lord's, to keep their names before that large section of the public that is busy nominating the team to go to Australia at the back end of the present season. Arnold made his record score of 227 against Glamorgan and Bakewell exceeded the century against Somerset. Twelve months ago both were tried in a Test match and the powers that be found them wanting

This year they have not been mentioned as even Test possibilities, such are the vagaries of cricket form. I should be surprised, however, if Arnold is not given another chance to rehabilitate himself either at Lord's in the Gentlemen v. Players match on 13 July or in the second Test trial at Cardiff (where he made his big score this week) on 27 July. For the failure of Holmes at Lord's this week suggests that a successor to the one and only Jack Hobbs has not yet been found and Arnold has youth, temperament and ability to recommend him.

There has been some criticism over the constitution of the Oxfordshire side against the All Indians, as, indeed, there was bound to be. Some people want to know how it is that players were included who had no County qualification and why the opportunity was not taken to give young local

players the chance of playing in such an important match. The explanation is that it was not strictly speaking a County fixture and that County funds are not being used. When Capt. Henry was asked to arrange the match a guarantee was desired and though he issued an appeal for funds, the response was negligible. So that, in order that Oxford should not lose such an attractive fixture, and the County, for obvious reasons, could not afford the expenses of the match, Capt. Henry decided to proceed with the fixture and "stand the racket." Instead of criticising Capt. Henry we ought to commend him for his public-spirited action. If anyone is to blame it is the lethargic Oxford sporting public, who, according to custom, are now making all the bother.

At the same time I feel sure that the young Oxford cricketer will get his opportunity later. There are quite a number who may be tried out in the searching test of a county match. Last year Spindler and Guilfoyle, of the Servants, played in quite a number of matches, and Cherry, a left-hand bowler, was invited to play for the County against the University "A." Since then he has been bowling remarkably well. Then, as I mentioned last week, there are the two Wards of the Clarendon Press and the Osborn Works, as well as P. F. Buckingham, of Woodstock. And I would add Thornton, of Cowley St. John, Bowtell and Godfrey, of North Oxford, Miller, of the City Police, Dallas Steven, of the Stevens Sports Club, Heymeson, of Morris Motors, Turner, of South Oxford, one or two of the Witney Grammarian players, and perhaps a few others from the village clubs. While of a still younger generation there are Halliday and Webb, of the City of Oxford School, and Pether, of Magdalen School, and the pick of Mr. Turner's boys. It has been suggested that a match for schoolboys in the Long Vacation would reveal quite unsuspected talent.

Witney Mills scored a convincing win at Witney on Saturday when they defeated Osberton by 88 runs. The Mills batted first and put up a very consistent display, which was marked by a fine innings by B. Room, who in compiling 79 runs hit 11 fours and two sixes. Sharnbrook also displayed good form for his total of 25. Ward (three for 47), Smith (one for 54), Lawrence (two for 35), Sawyer (two for 35) and Collett (two for 18) shared the wickets. Facing the Mills' total of 207, Osberton opened confidently, the opening batsmen, J. Ward and H. Lawrence, scoring 25 and ten respectively. Oxfordshire commence their 1932 Minor Counties Championship programme next week, when on Wednesday and Thursday they oppose Monmouthshire on the St. John's College ground, Woodstock-road. This will also be the venue of the Leicestershire II. match on 19 and 20 August, and the other four home fixtures will be played as usual on the Merton College ground. The "economic blizzard" has caused all sports organisations to economise, and this is the explanation of the absence of some of the players who have done yeoman service for the club in the past. The financial condition of the O.C.C. is, to say the least, precarious, and it will have a hard job to keep the flag flying unless the public are prepared to give it more support. In the circumstances it is perhaps unfortunate that the Monmouth game has to be taken so far afield, as those who have only an hour or two to spare are unlikely to patronise the game.

The County side for the Monmouth match will be B. J. Henry (capt.), H. Walker, S. C. B. Lee, C. Walters, G. C. Cherry, A. F. Allington, D. Wynne-Wilson, F. Crawshay, J. A. Evetts, S. R. Smith and C. E. Kerr. Kalaugher and Inge are unable to accept invitations. Cherry and Crawshay are Banbury players, Wynne-Wilson is the hockey Blue, whose home is at Kidlington, Smith is the Kidlington wicket-keeper, Allington is an ex-captain of the club, and Kerr is a Rhodes Scholar, who is qualified under the same rule as Kalaugher.

A. R. Allen (Oxford City) and J. Rhymes (Cowley St. John) have qualified for the final of the single-handed bowls championship of the County, and I imagine bowlers in their hundreds will assemble to watch this needle match. Both are previous holders of the Cup, Rhymes having won it in 1929 and Allen in 1930. They are recognised as two of the best bowlers in the County, so it is quite fitting that they should cross swords in the final. In the case of Rhymes skill at the game is hereditary. His father won the singles, the pairs and the rink in the period 1924-27, and it was a great blow to the

game when he was compelled to retire through ill-health.

The Airey Cup tie results panned out much as expected. There were no real surprises. Close games, too, were the exception and not the rule. An unusual feature was that in each of the eight matches the side with the advantage of ground won; as also, I believe, did the teams who had first innings. Cowley St. John kept up their reputation as cup-fighters by beating a much-fancied side in the Clarendon Press, to whom this competition has always been a bogey. Other strong cup-fighters to get through were South Oxford, Headington, the College Servants and the Church Army Press, while the two comparatively new sides, Stevens Sports and the Osberton Works, also survive. Picking the winners at this stage is futile. We may be sure that each of the eight teams left in fancied its chances and will not hear of defeat. There is no really outstanding side, and if there was it by no means follows that it would win the trophy. The Airey Cup is, in fact, noted for its habit of providing the unexpected, in which lies half the charm of the game.

Devotees of lawn tennis claim that they have more players than are to be found in any other game. Few will dispute this contention. In any amalgamated club where there are three or four sections lawn tennis players largely out-number the cricketers or bowls players, while there are quite a number of private tennis clubs with large memberships. I do not know whether it is the social or competitive side that appeals most, but young, middle-aged or old people play the game. The fact that there were nearly 600 entries for the *Oxford Times* competitions, which reach their semi-final stages on Saturday week, shows that the competitive side of the game is very strong. Many enter with little idea of winning, but solely through a desire to improve their match play and meet others who otherwise would always be strangers to them. Lawn tennis, of course, has also its amorous side, and many a delightful romance has its origin on the courts.

AIREY CUP—FIRST ROUND.

HOW TEAMS ARE PAIRED ON 23 JULY.

The eight matches in the first round of the Airey Cup were each brought to a conclusion on Saturday, and in each case the side with the advantage of ground was successful. The College Servants and Osberton Works only just scrambled through, and it will be interesting to see what happens when they clash in the next round-to-morrow week. Most of the other teams won by good margins. The Clarendon Press must almost despair of winning the cup. Recognised as one of the best sides in the competition they failed against Cowley St. John, who maintained their high reputation as cup-fighters. MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

OXFORDSHIRE v. MONMOUTH-SHIRE.

Playing their first match of the 1932 season in the Minor Counties Championship, Oxfordshire drew with Monmouth on the St. John's College ground, the visiting county taking points for first-innings lead. At the close of play Oxfordshire, with eight wickets in hand, required 116 to win. The first day's play on Wednesday went in favour of Monmouth, who, after losing nine wickets for 148, were allowed to reach a total of 193, and they followed this up by dismissing eight of the home county for 115, when rain put a stop to the day's play. On Thursday, Oxfordshire completed their innings for 125, and so were 68 in arrears. Again there was a heavy fall of rain, and for three hours no further play was possible, and then only on a new pitch. Better bowling and fielding for Oxfordshire sent back Monmouth a second time for 88, and left Oxfordshire to get 136 to win, in just over an hour and a half. had the game gone on till 7 o'clock. Monmouth, however, on a sporting wicket, made no effort to force a win, batting very sedately, and Oxfordshire would have been asking for trouble had they gone out for runs, although, after the roller had been put on, the pitch played much better than in the second innings of Monmouth.

Circumstances made it necessary for Oxfordshire to leave out several of their old players, which afforded them the opportunity to introduce new blood. Of those making their County debut, Wynne Willson was a great success. He was practically the only batsman in the first Oxfordshire innings to withstand the bowlers for any period, and though he was given two "lives," his 59 proved him a batsman of merit, and he is also very lively in the field. Smith, of Kidlington, kept wicket very well, Cherry, of Banbury, has possibilities as a left-hand bowler, and Kerr will probably warrant another trial. Of the older hands Walters and Kalaugher again did well, and it looks as if they will be given plenty of work with the ball.

The next match is against Bedfordshire on the Merton College ground next Wednesday and Thursday, and a trial is being given to J. G. Halliday, the City of Oxford schoolboy. The County side will be: B. J. Henry, S. C. B. Lee, C. Walters, W. G. Kalaugher, J. A. Everts, G. C. Cherry, W. Wynne Willson, A. F. Alington, W. W. Inge, J. G. Halliday and F. Thornton.

O.B.L.I. CRICKET WEEK.

MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP

BUCKINGHAMSHIRE v. OXFORDSHIRE.

At High Wycombe on Friday and Saturday last week, Bucks beat Oxfordshire, in the Minor Counties Championship, by an innings and 177 runs, the most severe defeat Oxfordshire have experienced for many years. Bucks, who are hailed as prospective champions, proved superior, collectively, in all branches of the game. Their bowlers, with Edwards and Rutter a splendid foil for one another were able to take advantage of a pitch which was very uncertain at the start, either owing to dampness or over-watering, their fielding was smart and clean and their batting more than equal to the occasion. They can probably be strengthened by the inclusion of another bowler, while it is surprising, unless there is a dearth of young talent in the County, to find two players in the side who are both on the shady side of 50.

Oxon's Redeeming Features.

The redeeming features of Oxfordshire's display were the extraordinarily good wicket-keeping of Inge, the promise of Halliday, the young City of Oxford School boy, and the non-hearted bowling of Walters and Kalaugher, who were, through the exigence of circumstances, compelled to do more than their full share and could not be given the rest they deserved, and which, in the interests of the side, was essential.

Franklin, the Bucks captain, won the toss, but after he had taken out Edwards to inspect the wicket with him, he decided that Oxfordshire should bat. The pitch looked da up and the bowlers were able to get up creditable work on. The side were all out before lunch for 130. The best innings was Halliday's 41. While he often missed Edward's going up the hill ball, he met the other bowlers with plenty of confidence, often driving the fast bowlers and using a strong forcing shot on the on-side. He watches the ball very carefully, his foot work is good and his stance comfortable and correct for getting quickly into position for the stroke. With the experience he will get in the remaining County fixtures he should develop into a good batsman. Wynne Willson stayed in for an hour, but was not at his best. Allowing for the vagaries of the pitch at the start, the batting was disappointing, and it was not a good move to put Walters in first. In his proper position at five or six he would have given that steadiness to the middle for which he is so often responsible.

Two Bucks Centuries.

The Bucks innings lasted from 2.45 on Friday to 11.30 on Saturday morning. The first stand was by Brooke and Baker, who added 115 for the third wicket. Both were missed, both took the fullest advantage of their good fortune. When Brooke left, Rutter who had been billed as No. 10, was put in to force the pace, and he did it to such good purpose that when he left the score board read 336-6-106. Like all hitters he had some luck, but he made some big hits, one, in particular, a straight drive that went some-way over the sight-screen.

The Oxfordshire fielding was none too good. Several catches were dropped and there was rather too much foot-work. One prefers to see a youngster dive for a ball in the "country," even if he misses it, than use his feet.

When Oxfordshire went in a second time, Heymeson was put in first with Lee, and he made a number of good strokes before Rutter bowled him. His fall was the signal for a collapse and

the whole side were out for 64, Edwards taking five wickets for 11 runs. It was a really poor batting display, as the pitch was quite good. As the game was over early it was decided that each side should bat an hour. Bucks made 207 for six and Oxfordshire were all out in three-quarters of an hour for 121. Score:-

Oxfordshire met with their fourth successive defeat in the Minor Counties Competition yesterday, when Bucks beat them by an innings and 165 runs.

It was a case of the weaker side being no match for one incomparably stronger. Bucks had the good fortune to win the toss on a perfect wicket, and they kept in possession till the tea interval, their total being 301. The Oxford bowling seemed stronger on paper than usual this season, and if a catch given by Peters, the chief scorer, half-way through his innings had been held, Bucks might have been dismissed for about 200 runs. Capt. Henry returned to the side, and as S. C. B. Lee had injured himself, Basil Rogers, the North Oxford groundsman, stepped into the breach. Halliday and Kalaugher opened the bowling, and the latter soon met with success, Franklin and Stephenson being quickly back in the pavilion. Then came a stand by Brooke and Peters, the latter of whom is a most aggressive type. Brooke was eventually caught at deep square leg, but Peters found another useful partner in Skinner and these two added 140 before Peters was l.b.w. The remaining batsmen caused little trouble against Rogers and Walters, who between them took the last seven wickets for 48 runs. Rogers returned the fine analysis of five for 90, and once more proved the value of spin bowling.

The Oxfordshire batting broke down before the swinging deliveries of Aubrey-Fletcher and the fast bowling of Rutter, and in the course of the afternoon 14 wickets fell for 86 runs. The majority of the batsmen were at fault in timing the ball and in their defensive strokes. It was a case of the bowling being too good for the batting. The local players who were on trial were afforded proof that there is a vast difference between getting runs in local games and in Minor County cricket. It is experience that they lack. The game was over before lunch, and Rutter and Fletcher bowled unchanged in the two Oxon innings, Rutter taking 11 wickets for 58 runs. Crawsay could not bat yesterday, as on the previous evening he dislocated his shoulder.

LEAVES from my notebook



The Airey Cup final is being played to-day and to-morrow on the Christ Church ground between the winners of 1930 (Morris Motors) and last year's winners (the Church Army Press). As the funds of the Association depend entirely on the "gate," it is to be hoped the public will patronise the game in large numbers. I find that there is a great conflict of opinion as to the probable outcome of the match, and this is as it should be. A good judge of the game expresses the view that the Morris Motors are one of the best Cup-teams of recent years, while all along I personally have had a sneaking regard for the Church Army. Where there is so much doubt we ought to have a really good match.

The feat of H. Wickison, of the North Oxford 2nd XI., in taking all ten wickets against what was virtually the Headington 1st XI., is worthy of notice, if only because Wickison is a very young player. He received his education at Bedford House School and is, I believe, destined for the Air Force. He has a beautifully easy action, quite effortless, and he bowls the ball which comes across with the arm, rather than breaks. He was lucky to get some of his wickets, as the cross-bat was very much in evidence and the Headington pitch does favour the bowlers. In spite of this, good young bowlers are so rare that I hope an eye will be kept on Wickison, and I think it would pay his club to give him all the matches he can get against really good batsmen. There is nothing like experience against good players to teach the young bowler how to improve his art, especially, as is the case with Wickison, where there is natural talent combined with great keenness.

The present precarious position of the Oxfordshire County Cricket Club was the chief topic in local sporting circles over the week-end. While everyone has his remedy for saving the situation, the feeling was general that it would be a tragedy to let the club fall through. As I said last week, now is the time to do something, and I do hope the Management Committee will be called

together, the whole facts placed before them, so that everything can be cut and dried for a general meeting. Everyone seems in the dark as to the financial position and as to the best means of saving the situation. It is imperative that a lead should be given, so that reconstruction, if considered advisable, may be commenced before the cricket season ends. I think that had the present position, which must have been foreseen, been made clearer earlier in the season, and the players taken into the confidence of the officials, there would have been less trouble in getting teams. Some players have shown a regrettable lack of enthusiasm in coming forward to help.

OXFORDSHIRE v. LEICESTERSHIRE II.

On the St. John's College ground on Friday and Saturday last week, Oxfordshire secured their first victory in the Minor Counties' competition by beating Leicestershire 2nd XI. by an innings and two runs. Such an easy conquest was not in any way due to the luck of the game. It was secured by good all-round cricket and the ability of the side to force a win when that possibility first arose about mid-way through the second part of the game. They then bowled and fielded with splendid determination and when, just before six o'clock, their triumph was complete, the small number of spectators gave them a reception which they well deserved.

When Leicestershire won the toss on a perfect wicket, the prospects of an Oxfordshire victory seemed remote. Weston and Ball started off at a strong pace against some rather uncertain bowling, but as the innings proceeded the out-cricketer improved and by tea-time Leicestershire were all out for 238, by no means a big total. Lee, who only came into the side to oblige the skipper—he had hurt his hand rather badly—bowled his slows well, and, as usual, Walters was very steady, but Kalaugher could not find his length. Evetts and Godfrey opened for Oxfordshire, and with 50 on the board the latter had to retire owing to a slight sunstroke. Halliday took his place and failed, but Walters and Evetts played out time and by good cricket passed the 100.

The weather was much cooler on Saturday when Walters and Evetts went on with their innings. Both continued to show good form and the score was taken to 162 before Walters was caught in the slips off a mis-hit, while 37 runs later Evetts was well taken, one hand, by Lord. Both batsmen made their highest scores of the season and both played cricket of the highest class. Walters used more strokes than Evetts and when he went out to the ball drove it clear of the fieldsmen. Evetts is, by nature, a slower scorer, but his defence was sound and he showed admirable judgment in choosing the ball to hit. When Walters was out Godfrey resumed his innings and he stayed in to the fall of the seventh wicket, when he was caught in the deep field. He gave one chance just before he got out, the only blemish in an innings that was as stylish as it was effective. Godfrey has been coached by Tom Shepherd and he is a credit to his mentor. His style is admirable, and he is not afraid to go for the over-pitched ball. His driving is hard and well-timed and experience will cure him of one or two strokes that are attended with risk. To make 73 in a debut in a County fixture is a performance upon which Godfrey is entitled to look back with much personal satisfaction. After his dismissal the remaining batsmen rightly went out to get runs quickly and both Gadney and Wynne Willson made some big hits, the former once carrying to the trees in front of the hard tennis courts. The innings closed just after lunch for 361, the highest Oxfordshire total of the season, which gave them a lead of 123 runs.

The Dawn of Victory.

At this stage the most-looked for result was a draw, with Oxfordshire getting points for first innings lead. But from the moment that Henry brought off a good catch to dismiss Ball, and Gadney was responsible for even a better one to dispose of Bradshaw, the chances of an outright win began to dawn on the few spectators. From this point Oxfordshire bowled and fielded like a side that had never known misfortune. Kalaugher found his best form, and Walters backed him

up by keeping a perfect length. The result was that by six o'clock Oxfordshire had won, by sheer merit and dominating performance, their first victory of the season.

Victory!

There was no evidence of an inferiority complex in this result. Though the side had fared badly in each of its previous seven County matches, it did not allow this depressing record to influence it. Their victory was the triumph of mind over matter. Misfortune may threaten to overwhelm them, but at least they have proved that they can fight back, and the success of such young players as Halliday, Thornton, Gadney, Godfrey and Wynne Willson is another encouraging sign.

The return to batting form of Evetts and Walters had also much to do with the result.

**MAGNIFICENT CRICKET AT
EBBW VALE.**

**OXFORDSHIRE FORCE A WIN TWO
MINUTES FROM TIME.**

After their fine victory over Leicestershire, Oxfordshire travelled to Ebbw Vale on Monday for the match on Tuesday and Wednesday against Monmouthshire. Neither W. Wynne Willson, C. Walters nor J. G. Halliday was able to make the journey, and trials were given to E. P. Bowtell, of the North Oxford Club, and W. How, a son of a Fellow of Merton College. At the close of the first day's play Oxfordshire held a big advantage. Mainly owing to the fine bowling of Thornton, they dismissed the home side for 104, and then, with Everts again batting in his old form and Gadney and Inge hitting well, the Oxfordshire reply was 236. Everts has now played two successive innings of over 70, and is making more use of his strokes.

The Oxfordshire bowling was made to feel the absence of Walters in the Monmouth second innings and several of the home batsmen scored freely. Their total reached 492, leaving Oxfordshire 273 to win and about 2½ hours to play. Everts and Godfrey started off fairly briskly and as the score mounted and the batsmen gradually got on top of the bowling, there was an evident desire to force a victory. When Everts left after another meritorious innings, the hitters were put in and two minutes from time Oxfordshire won in sensational fashion by seven wickets, thus securing their second successive victory in the competition. Godfrey, the young North Oxford batsman, carried his bat for 109. It was an innings of the greatest merit and Godfrey never lost a chance to score runs. He was particularly strong on the off-side and made some fine shots through the covers. But well as he batted, the game would not have been won but for the magnificent hitting of Gadney and Inge. Taking every kind of risk, and yet showing nice judgment, the two batsmen flogged the bowling unmercifully. Gadney was caught and Lee came in to lose his wicket in attempting a short run, but then Inge forced the game to such purpose that in the last half-hour runs literally flew off the bat and the winning hit was made with two minutes to spare.

It was really a magnificent achievement on the part of the Oxfordshire batsmen to score 273 runs in the last innings. The ground is admittedly small, but most teams would, in the circumstances, have gone out for a draw. Oxfordshire, with the spirit of adventure on them, saw the possibilities of success and their policy came off crumps. Rarely has finer hitting been seen or the sporting spirit of the game been more strongly exemplified. It was cricket at its best, and from a team supposed to be dead out of luck.

The Oxford public have a rare chance to-day to show their appreciation of the heroes of Henry and his gallant men.

Oxfordshire concluded their matches for 1932 in the Minor Counties Competition on the Meriton ground on Thursday and Friday last week, when Berkshire beat them by two wickets.

As this brief statement implies, the game was very close and interesting. Oxfordshire commenced the second day in a favourable position, Berkshire, with two wickets in hand, being 80 in arrears. Kalaugher had, however, strained a tendon in his heel and a heavy dew was a handicap to the fielding side, sawdust having to be used to dry the ball. A. H. Lewis and Relf made the fullest use of their opportunity by putting on 71 before Relf pulled one into his wicket. Oxfordshire had a lead of 13 on the first innings.

When Oxfordshire went in a second time, it was noticed that R. H. Human bowled from the Parks end instead of, as in the first innings, the Holywell end. The reason for this was that there were signs of "spots." Oxfordshire began by losing two wickets cheaply, but Inge and Guilfoyle and then Guilfoyle and Walters batted well and the score eventually reached 147. R. H. Human took six wickets for 55 and bowled really well.

Left with 161 to win, with 3½ hours to get them, and with Kalaugher unable to bowl at his greatest pace, Berkshire appeared to have a comparatively easy task. H. L. Lewis and Dollery started very slowly, however, and in 1½ hours before tea scored only 40 runs. Soon after the resumption Lewis was bowled and with Mole and the two Humans failing, Oxfordshire began to show fight, though they were further handicapped by the fact that Basil Rogers had strained his groin and could not bowl. Dollery and Relf turned the game once more in favour of Berkshire, but Walters bowled Dollery with a good ball and also disposed of Lewis and Woodburn, the seventh wicket falling at 14. Once more, therefore, Oxfordshire had a sporting chance of victory. Stokes, the next man in, appeared to offer a difficult chance of stumping, but he stayed there. Just when everyone was waiting to acclaim a Berkshire victory Walters brought off a sensational catch to dismiss Relf and the excitement was increased—four runs to win, two wickets to fall and seven minutes to go. Cricket does sometimes stage these dramatic moments. Pulley, ninth in, played Walters' first ball carefully, and the second, a loose one to leg, he hit to the boundary and won the match for Berkshire by two wickets, less than five minutes from time. Walters bowled almost unchanged for three hours and kept a fine length. His analysis of six for 62, in 28 overs, was one of his best performances of the season. Though beaten Oxfordshire made a very fine fight and took almost as many honours as the winners. In the course of the game Capt. Henry awarded W. J. Godfrey, the young North Oxford player, his County colours. Score and analysis:—

OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

FACTS AND FIGURES OF THE PAST SEASON.

FUTURE HOPEFUL IF MONEY IS FORTHCOMING.

The Oxfordshire County Cricket Club concluded their Minor Counties Competition matches for 1932 on Saturday. Their record in the competition was:—

This record is not so good as last season's, when one more match was won and only two lost. It is, however, not difficult to find causes for the decline. At the commencement of the season it became obvious that expenses would have to be cut to a minimum, which meant that the services of certain players could not be retained. For this and other reasons, H. Walker, R. P. Thomas, P. M. Nelson, F. Hartley and W. Haynes have not been able to play at all, and L. Rogers in only a few matches. It therefore became necessary to fall back on inexperienced players and to make up the team with youths who had played only in club cricket. It was not to be expected that a side of this nature would carry all before it. Indeed, while this process of transition was going on the side had a very bad time, but from this point their improvement was most marked, and they finished the season with two fine victories over Leicestershire II, and Monmouthshire and by losing to the strong Berkshire side by only two wickets. It has been suggested that the club may not be in existence next season. In view of the bright playing prospects as displayed by the younger generation, it is very much to be hoped that the financial difficulties will be satisfactorily overcome. It is essential that a meeting should be called before cricket is forgotten in the vortex of winter sport.

Run-getters' Belated Form.

The averages do not compare very favourably with last year's, nor is this the least surprising. The difficulty all through the season has been to find two opening batsmen to give the side a good start. This problem was not solved till late in the season. S. C. B. Lee, who has played for the Club since 1905, did his best, but unfortunately neither he, nor W. W. Inge, J. A. Everts and C. Walters, ran into form till very late and then, simultaneously, with confidence returning to the side, they all began to get runs. Had either one or the other found his form earlier, it would have made a great difference.

The search for new talent meanwhile went on with impartial judgment and a complete disregard for old-fashioned convention. Players who had reputations in local cricket were picked, as also were those who had done well elsewhere. W. J. Godfrey, E. F. Bowtell and J. G. Halliday, of North Oxford, W. Wynne Willson, the hockey Blue, who now resides at Kidlington, B. C. Gadaey, an Oxford boy, who has won an International Rugby cap for England, F. G. Crawshaw and G. C. Cherry, of Banbury, F. Thornton, of Cowley St John, A. Heymeson, of the Morris Motors, and W. Spindler and J. Guilfoyle, of the College Servants, were all presented with the chance to win their spurs.

Three Players of Promise.

Of these players Godfrey, who had been picked for the first match against the University "A" team, but could not play till late in the season, definitely established his reputation, and the same may be said of W. Wynne Willson and Gadaey, and in a lesser degree of F. G. Crawshaw, who unfortunately injured himself just as he appeared to be running into form.

Godfrey had the distinction of making the only century hit by a club member, and in his five innings he scored over 214 runs. As he is also a very good fielder he looks like becoming an indispensable member of the XI. Wynne Willson, tried for the first time, was not very consistent with the bat, but his fielding was always a delight, while Gadaey proved himself a very hard-hitting batsman and also one of the best fielders in the team. In both these cases it is not too much to hope that with more experience these players will do even better another year. Wynne Willson, as well as Godfrey and Crawshaw, won their County Caps.

Advice on Fielding.

Of the other new players Halliday, who is still at school, played one good innings at High Wycombe. The probability is that he was brought into the side too soon; views on this point differ. He is already a good young cricketer, painstaking and willing to learn. He has been coached and will, I think, go to one of the indoor schools during the winter. I hope he will show equal keenness in getting fielding practice, and take every opportunity to improve himself in this rather neglected branch of the game. This remark also applies to other young players, who will never become County cricketers till they learn to be always on their toes, how to throw in, and to anticipate the batsmen's strokes. A fieldsmen, he be good with either bat or ball, handicaps himself by untidiness and slovenliness in the field, and it is an unforgivable sin in a youngster.

Of the other new-comers, Thornton, Heymeson, Bowtell, Cherry and S. R. Smith, the Kidlington player, did fairly well and each has time to improve if he will set himself seriously to the task.

Of the older players, reference has been made to the latent batting power of S. C. B. Lee, J. A. Everts, W. W. Inge and C. Walters. The falling off of Walters as a batsman was a tremendous drawback to the side. He could not get going till the last three matches, and till this period showed little of the consistency as a No. 6 batsman that made the difference between success and failure. The deterioration of Lee, Everts and Inge, judged by figures, was not so conspicuous and each has only a slightly less satisfactory record than last season.

In regard to the bowling a great deal depended, as last season, on Kalaugher and Walters. Twelve months ago they took, between them, 121 wickets. This season, their combined tally is 82 and they have both been more expensive. It is not a case of decline of powers. Both have been called upon to bowl a great deal too much, often having been compelled by force of circumstances to keep an end going. Kalaugher has lost none of his pace or his willingness to bowl for long periods on end. Even then he was quite prepared to go into the out-field and prove how good a fieldsmen he is. The County has had few more enthusiastic or loyal members, and socially his quiet humour and unfailing good nature were a great asset to the team.

Basil Rogers.

Walters was not quite the bowler of twelve months ago. He puts it down to the fact that, since he has gone into

business, he has been compelled to drive a car daily many miles. His decline is not so obvious as to make it doubtful whether he will be getting wickets in county cricket in five years' time. Thornton bowled well on two occasions and the club were greatly indebted to Basil Rogers for coming out of his retirement and giving invaluable help. Neither of the left-hand bowlers, Cherry and Heymeson quite came up to expectations.

Fielding Not Impressive.

The fielding of the side was not impressive. Too many of the players are apt to make too much use of their feet to stop the ball and there was often a fatal slowness in the field that detracted from the look of the side. Notable exceptions were Wynne Willson, Godfrey and Gadaey, and of course Inge, who again proved himself one of the best wicket-keepers in any grade of cricket. He caught eleven batsmen and stumped nine in twelve innings, a very fine record.

In regard to the aggregate of runs in Championship contests, the County scored 2,508 for the loss of 158 wickets, an average of 15.8 per wicket, and their opponents 2,932 for 135 wickets, an average of 21.7.

The highest Oxfordshire score was 361 in the second match against Leicestershire II, and the highest against them the 402 by Monmouth, a match, which, however, they won.
