### FATALLY INJURED IN FOG

### Personality In Wycombe Manufacturing Circles

### MR. TIMOTHY PIERCE

KNOCKED down by a motor-car last week-end in London Road, High Wycombe, Mr. Timothy George Pierce, of Queen's Road, High Wycombe, died on Tuesday evening at High Wycombe War Memorial Hospital.

Mr. Pierce had wide knowledge and long association with High Wycombe's

staple industry.

Last Friday evening, he was walking home and, while crossing London Road for a newspaper, he failed to notice in the fog an approaching motor-car. He was knocked down and injured.

Mr. Pierce was taken into Mr. Franklin's shop, and later conveyed to High Wycombe Hospital. On Monday he showed signs of internal injuries. He gradually weakened, and died as stated, on Tuesday.

He leaves two sons (a third was killed in the Great War) and four daughters. Mrs. Pierce died on November 13th last.

### A Wycombe Personality

In the staple industry of High Wy combe, "Tim" Pierce was a well-known personality. For years he represented Messrs. R. Howland and Sons, of Denmark Street, and, with the late Mr. Walter Howland and Mr. Ralph Howland, J.P., did much towards developing the trade in the town. Later he became associated with the firm of the late Mr. Ebenezer Gomme (Mrs. E. Gomme was his sister) and (Mrs. E. Gomme was his sister), and up to the time of his retirement a few months ago, he represented that firm He was highly respected by those con-nected with the "trade."

### Sports Enthusiast

"Tim" was a sport. He loved cricket, and very few matches were played on the Wycombe ground without his patronage. He was proud to see the successes of his son (Mr. W. M. Pierce), the captain of the club. He was an excellent bowls player, and his old "brown woods" were looked upon almost as a "landmark" on the Harlow Road and Chestnut Avenue greens. He played in many important games, and deservedly secured county honours. The High Wycombe Bowling Club has lost a valuable member.

Mr. Pierce filled many roles. He was a member of a very old Methodist family, and as such became associated

#### Tribute To Lord Burnham

The toast of "The Club" was proposed by Lieut. Colonel Du Pre who referred to the great loss the club had sustained during the year by the death of Viscount Burnham, who with himself, held the joint presidency of the Beaconsfield C.C. for a number of years. Vis-

count Burnham was concerned in worldwide affairs, and he knew of no man
more devoted to public duty for the welfare of the country, in a greater degree
than was Viscount Burnham.

He had no doubt that his public work
and his devotion to duty shortened his
life. There was another lose to which

Du Pre) was quite a little boy. Mr.
Watson was regarded as a "landmark"
in Beaconsfield and it was difficult to believe that they would no more hear his

In that letter, went on Mr. Franklin, Edwards said he thought his usefulness for Bucks had "It is not for Edwards to tell us that; it is for us to tell Edwards," declared Mr. Franklin, who added amidst loud applause—"That time has not yet arrived."

Stephenson was also missed as a bowler and, together with the loss of form of both Aubrey-Fletcher and Skinner in that department, an enormous amount of work fell on Rutter and Edwards; the chief reason, however, for the falling off of the county this year, was the regrettable lapse from the high standard of fielding which was expected dard of fielding which was expected,

as a matter of course, from Bucks.

"Only about haif-a-dozen members of the side fielded well, and only Baker, A. Powell and Clover-Brown consistently well. It is hoped that there will be a great improvement in 1934. It is good news to hear that W. T. Brindley, the Ceylon all-rounder, will be home on leave and, it is expected, will play regularly, and also Brooke, except for the first two

matches.

"To set against this, Skinner has gone to India for five years. He will e very much missed, as he was a man Bucks could really rely upon when runs were badly needed. His bowling was also very useful at times. Clover-Brown has returned to Ceylon. He showed very good form on his few ap-pearances and thoroughly deserved his

cap.

Bucks played 10 matches, won 3, lost 3, and drew 4."

After detailing matches and the individual performances, Mr. Brockle-hurst said, "Franklin once again captained the side really well. The team threatened to fail to pieces half-way through the season, but his forceful personality pulled the side round to recovery. His wicket-keeping was still first-class, and at times his batting revived memories of the days in the 'twenties. The batting received a tremendous blow on the non-appearance of Brooke and Stephenson, and only of Brooke and Stephenson, and only occasional appearance of Peters and Skinner, but was saved by a wonderful season by A. P. Powell.

Baker also had a good season, and proved as he had done before a record.

proved, as he has done before, a very valuable member of the side. Skinner and Peters produced glorious innings and also some rather poor ones. Clover-Brown batted well on the few occasions he was able to play, especially against Norfolk. Of the remainder, Stevens-Davis batted well on occasions and was always a trier. Badham batted very well earlier on, but was handicapped by a bad leg towards the end. Peto showed himself to be a very useful No. 1 when either Baker or Powell were away. Wilmot only appeared twice, and showed great promise. It is to be hoped that he will be able to afford more time for cricket in the future.

Turning to the bowling, except for one or two inspired moments from Badham, the main work devolved upon Rutter and Edwards. Rutter took 67 wickets for 13.44 runs in 370.3 overs. All through the season he bowled magnificently, working tremendously hard, and without him the county would

"Edwards took 57 wickets for 14.75 runs in 395 overs. Although not as successful as formerly, Edwards bowled extremely well most of the season. Besides having to contend with wickets unsuited to his style of bowling, he also suffered greatly from missed catches and mis-fielding generally. Even so, his average comes out very well. ### Mr. W. B. Franklin's Career With Buckinghamshire C.C.

ONE of the luckiest days for Bucks ONE of the luckiest days for Bucks County Cricket Club was when a certain young Cambridge undergraduate named W. B. Franklin accepted an invitation twenty-two years ago, from Mr. E. H. D. Sewell, the club secretary at the time, to play for the county team. Since his first game in 1913, W. B. Franklin has played in every Bucks county game except two, and has been captain of the club for fourteen years—truly a remarkable refourteen years-truly a remarkable record.

It is unnecessary to enlarge on Franklin's merits as a wicket-keeper. Every cricket enthusiast in the neigh-Every cricket entitudies in the state bourhood has probably seen him at some time or

snother in county matches on High Wycombe's picuresque cricket round, where he as stumped or aught out scores the foremost batemen in the country. His lightning co-op-eration with Frank Edwards. the slow bowler, and his agality, in spite of his apparent stiff-

ness, in stopping the cannon-ball deliveries of R. H. Rutter, have for many years been the principal attraction at county games at High Wy. combe.

W. B. Franklin has developed his accomplishment as a wicket-keeper since he was a boy. Born in Surrey, he gained his colours at Repton and at Cambridge he gained his cricket blue and soon acquired prominence in the cricket world for his skill behind the stumps. He joined the M.C.C. and Repton Pilgrims after leaving the university, and played for Buckinghamshire throughout 1913, re-joining the club after the war. One of his first matches after the war. matches after the war was against his own club, M.C.C., Bucks losing by a few runs on the second innings. The few runs on the second innings. The Buckinghamshire team then was—P. S. Fraser, who opened the innings with Franklin, R. N. Hamilton, P. W. Le Gros, F. Whiting, T. R. Kent, W. E. Hazelton, S. L. Trevor, S. Fairbairn, D. A. D. Sewell and J. Whiting.

#### County's Triumph

Franklin has been a familiar figure in almost every county match since. Bucks have won the championship of the Minor Counties five times during his oaptaincy — on the first occasion when they defeated Norfolk by eight runs in a thrilling game, and on the last - two years ago-when they gained their greatest triumph and won all ten matches outright.

W. B. Franklin's strong personality, his knowledge of the game and his ability to make a quick decision (he

is a barrister!) have stood the county side in good stead in many a cricket field crisis. He has seen many wellknown cricketers pass through the county ranks and, with Edwards, he remains the only regular member of the team who was also a member of the pre-war team.

#### Forceful Batting

His forceful batting, as well as his Franklin a place in the Gentlemen's team against the Players in 1923, 1924 and 1925, and he has also played for an English XI against the Australian touring team during the war. For Buckinghamshire, he has often gone in as opening batsman, but when occasion has demanded, he has given exhibitions of vigorous hitting that mark him as of vigorous fitting that him as a particularly adaptable player. His highest score was against Hertfordshire, when he scored 137.

W. B. Franklin's only other sport

is squash rackets, of which he is an enthusiast. He played for the Junior Carlton Club in the Bath Club competition two years ago, and still plays during his leisure.

### A Famed Bucks Cricketer

### How Frank Edwards' Spin Bowling Developed

RUCKINGHAMSHIRE cricket lovers once mourned the death of one of the county's most promising cricketers
-Frank Edwards. That was just after the War. But Edwards is still very much alive after nearly twenty years and his career in cricket has not disappointed those who prophesied unusual success for him. He had been reported killed during the War and it was not until two years later, in 1921, that the Bucks club officials found the report was, happily, false. They invited him to rejoin Bucks as their professional and he has remained with the club ever since.

Cricket is life blood to Frank Edwards. It always has been. As a boy

at Merstham, in Surrey, he frequently played truant to watch local cricket matches to play himself, and at 16 he realized his ambition of playing for the Merstham team.

A year or two later he decided later he decided to turn profes-sional and ac cepted an engage-ment with Rei-g at e Priory. Twelve months later he was given a trial with surrev at the Ov

surrey at the Oval, and did so well that he was engaged on the Surrey staff.

It was while he was with Surrey that It was while he was with Surrey that Edwards developed the spin bowling that has gained him so many successes in cricket. Hitherto he had bowled left-hand swingers, but on the advice of the Surrey pros. he cultivated spin bowling, which, combined with flight, proved much more effective.

### Four Years With Surrey

After four years with Surrey, Edwards was one of the unlucky ones during a staff-cutting campaign, and Mr. E. H. D. Sewell, the Surrey coach, who became secretary of the Buckinghamshire club, asked him to play for Bucks. Years later, in 1923, when Edwards was one of the most deadly slow bowlers in England, Surrey asked him to return, but he declined. to return, but he declined

After serving through the War, Edwards was engaged as unpire to Surrey Wanderers and two years later he received an invitation from Bucks to

received an invitation from Bucks to return as a professional.

In 1025, when he took a hundred wickets for less than ten runs apiece, Edwards played for the Players against the Gentlemen and represented the Minor Counties against the Australians. In 1926 he played against the South Africans and last year against the West Indies touring team.

He had to refuse an invitation in

He had to refuse an invitation in 1925 from the M.C.C. to accompany a

touring team to the West Indies betouring team to the West Indies because of a previous engagement in South Africa, where he was coach to the Johannesburg Wanderers in the Transvaal Cricket Union. Vincent, the South African Test cricketer, was among the players Edwards coached.

From 1924 until 1929, Edwards was with Haslingdon, a Lancashire League club, who released him to play for Buckinghamshire, and a couple of seasons ago he was approached by Accrington.

#### Public Schools' Coach

Edwards has been coach at several

Edwards has been coach at several public schools, including Uppingham and Sandham, and at Oxford University. A month or two ago he was asked to renew his engagement at Uppingham.

His suggestion at the annual meeting of Bucks County Cricket Club a few weeks ago that it was time for him to retire was laughingly scotched by the members, who unanimously invited him for another season. There is any amount of cricket in Edwards yet.

### Village Cricket Scheme

Major Pat A'Beckett, who has recently taken over the licence of "Ye Olde Ploughe Inn," at Speen, thinks there is enough cricket talent in the Chiltern villages to run a team quite capable of competing with the minor counties and foremost amateur clubs in the south of England!

He has a plan, moreover, to form a club to be called the " Chiltern Hundreds," which will be the M.C.C. of village cricket in Buckinghamshire.

"Just as the Free Foresters take their players from the public schools," he told me the other day, "I see no reason why a central club should not be formed on the same lines to represent village cricket. I find that in lots of Bucks villages—North Dean, Speen, Loosley Row, Princes Risborough, Hampden and the rest-the people are fearfully keen on cricket. Mr. Frederick Hatt has offered a field for the use of the club, which I should like to call the Chiltern Hundreds, because all the villages I have mentioned are hidden away in the Chilterns.

"There is lots of latent talent in these villages if it is only drawn out and coached properly."

### Champion of Village Cricket

### Stokenchurch Idolises 'Teddy'' Britnell

T. Britnell, the Stokenchurch cricketer and footballer, is a singer who finds a song in the swing of the willow and the flight of the ball.

He has been playing twenty-five years in village cricket, and still enjoys the same exhibaration in the game that he enjoyed as a boy of sixteen, when he scored his first century for his club. "Sport for sport's sake" is Britnell's gospel, a gospel which has benefited Stokenchurch in no small degree.

Son of a Stokenchurch blacksmith, Son of a Stokenchurch blacksmith, he played for the village team at football as soon as he left school, when they played in the Wycombe Combination. Except for short periods with Lane End and, when he lived at Oxford, with Headington, he remained with Stokenchurch until he retired from the game about five years ago. He won every junior football medal except a Berks and Bucks Cup finalist's, first Berks and Bucks Cup finalist's, first as centre-half and later as a full-back.

Britnell first played for Stoken-church at cricket in 1909, at the age of sixteen, and was not long in estabof sixteen, and was not long in estab-lishing himself as a forceful batsman by rattling up 126 not out against a Wycombe Wednesday team. In spite of his consistently fine play during the last twenty-four seasons, in which he has made scores of centuries, he has not yet succeeded in beating that score.

While still in his 'teens, Britnell was chosen Stokenchurch's captain the youngest in the Wycombe League at the time — and he has remained skipper ever since. Both as a wicket-keeper and a batsman, he has maintained a high place in Bucks village cricket.

Almost all Britnell's cricket, too, has been with Stokenchurch. He had one season, in 1913, with Oxford City, and part of a season with High Wycombe. He has had trials with Bucks club and ground on several occasions, and has represented the county once-against Kent II.

But lusty village cricket has always held an irresistible lure. He has led Stokenchurch to success in many a village green epic. He hopes to lead them to many more in the future. Stokenchurch, accordingly, idolises

# A.W. Keen's 32 Years as Cricketer

A. W. Keen, of Bowden Mill, can claim the remarkable distinction in sport of having played for the county at both cricket and football as a young man of twenty, and maintained his form sufficiently to retain his place at each sport for twelve successive years.

Albert Keen was one of the stalwarts of High Wycombe Cricket Club for 32 years. He had two seasons with a local junior side after leaving school, and after one game with Wycombe Reserves, joined the first eleven at the age of 18, under the captaincy of A. J. Thurlow, to begin a connection with J. An accomplished fast-medium bowler with a quick off-break, and a powerful, forcing batsman, Keen won his place in the county side at the age of twenty, and played every year for about sixteen years, with such prominent players as Wright, George Nash, D. C. Para-

vacini and Cobb. Murgatroyd, Samms, Charlie Langley, E. D. Shaw and Horace Browning were among the Wycombe players.

One of Keen's

achievements remains a record for the club. Playing against Ealing once, he captured 9 wick-ets for 7 runs, A. W. Keen. including in a "hat-trick" the wickets

combe Wanderers after a couple of seasons with Wycombe Phoenix, a junior side, and remained one of the foremost members of the first eleven for twelve years, playing for the county as well. ### Doyen of Beaconsfield Cricket

### But Mr. J. G. Montague Preferred Football To Cricket

THIS summer may provide J. G. Montague's "swan song" as far as cricket is concerned. If it does, it will end fourteen years' active association with Beaconsfield Cricket Club. and more than a quarter-of-a-century in Buckinghamshire sport.

Probably many who have admired "J. G.'s" exploits behind the stumps at Wilton Park, do not know that he was formerly an enthusiastic footballer and, indeed, preferred soccer to cricket.

Born 53 years ago at Cheddington, a village near Aylesbury, he was captain and secretary of the village football club as a young man, until 1909, and also skippered a Marsworth and District League team against a West Herts representative side. While at Cheddington he frequently assisted Aylesbury United when Vickerstaffe, Gibbs and Hearn were among the stalwarts, and when the club played in the South-Eastern League.

At cricket, J. G. Montague scored his first—and what has proved to be his only century—so far—while at Ayles-bury Grammar School. He has always

been a wicket-keeper.

He played for the London and North Western Railway third eleven on leaving school, and when he gained his place in the first team, remained a regular member of the side until the outbreak of war. During the war he played in many representative games, including a South of Ireland v. Cork

Garrison match. It was during a match against Mr. Rothschild's eleven at Ascot in 1908. that he was invited to play for Bucks club and ground. He had one game with the county in 1908 and played fairly regularly in 1909, when he was awarded a county cap.

J. G. Montague moved to Beaconsfield in 1914, and after the war he became one of the officers of the reconstructed Beaconsfield Cricket Club. He was the club wicket-keeper continuously until about three years ago, when he retired from the position and was succeeded by Boddy. He played for the second eleven last year, and is again honorary secretary of the club this season.

When E. F. King, the "father" of the new Beaconsfield club, gave up early in the 1923 season, Montague succeeded him as captain. was skipper in 1924, and vice-captain in 1925 and 1926.

"J. G." was a sprinter in his youth.
A member of Finchley Harriers, he won the Earl of Rosebery Cup in the 120 yards event at Leighton Buzzard Sports in Coronation Year, and frequently assisted his club in relay races. For the last six years he has been a judge at the Railway Amateur Ath-Association championships, and he has been elected an officer of the resuscitated Bucks Amateur Athletic Association.

### SPORTS GOSSIP BY ONLOOKER

ALTHOUGH the cricket season does not open "officially" until May 1st, many clubs will be engaged in either practice matches or preliminary fixtures to-morrow.
