

Lincs. Beaten at Fenner's

SMITH AND WHEWELL BOWL WELL

Cambs. gained their third successive ten wickets victory in the Minor Counties' championship on Tuesday, when they defeated Lincolnshire at Fenner's.

There was a good attendance at the opening stage on Monday, when Cambs., winning the toss, batted first, and opened with C. E. Cote and K. R. J. Saxon. Major Wilson opened the bowling from the orchard end, and Saxon took a two to leg off the fifth ball. M. V. Bennett, at the pavilion end, opened with a maiden. Saxon did all the scoring at the beginning, and had made seven before Cote opened his account. After Cote had had an escape from being run out, the fielder was late throwing in, the 10 went up with four boundary wides from Bennett. Next over Cote edged a ball from Wilson and was smartly caught in the slips by Dickinson. The total was 15.

SAXON OUT.

Covill took a two off the first ball he received, but the score progressed slowly, and it was not until half an hour had passed that the 20 went up. Just afterwards Covill drove a four through the covers, and in so doing split his bat in halves! With the score at 25, Saxon was beaten by a deceptive break from Bennett and was caught behind the wicket by Cawkwell. Wilkinson now joined Covill, but it was the latter who did all the scoring with delightful strokes.

With 47 runs on the board after just on an hour's play, the first bowling change was made. D. B. Bell, a fast medium left hander, coming on for Bennett. Off his first ball Wilkinson sent up the 50 with a slightly risky shot through the slips. At 64 Major Wilson was displaced by Dickinson at the orchard end, and with the third ball Covill was clean bowled by a leg-break.

A STEADY STAND.

Ridgeon was next in, but at a quarter to one slight rain began to fall. At 79, Ehrenfreid, another left-hander, replaced Bell at the pavilion end. Ridgeon did not seem too comfortable, but the pair played steadily, although runs came very slowly. At 1.10 a stoppage was caused by the rain. The total was 82, and lunch was taken.

It was possible to resume at 2.15 p.m., and Ridgeon and Wilkinson were opposed by Wilson (orchard end) and Bennett, the opening pair. In Wilson's second over Wilkinson first guided one away for two, and then edged an easy chance to second slip, which was dropped. Off the last ball he sent 90 up with a single through the slips.

After two hours Ridgeon sent the 100 up with a beautiful off-drive that went through a fielder's hands for three. Since lunch he had settled down. Next over Bell replaced Wilson at the orchard end, and the double change was completed when Ehrenfreid was brought on. Bell's second over proved expensive, for 11 runs were scored, including two consecutive fours from Ridgeon. The scoring was now rather quicker, and Dickinson was brought on for Bell at 143. Ridgeon sent up 150, and incidentally his own 50, with a four to leg, after 2 hrs. 35 mins.

A MAGNIFICENT CATCH.

After Ridgeon had twice dispatched Dickinson to the on boundary, he lifted a straight drive off the same bowler and Wilson took a magnificent catch on the edge of the boundary. This was at 162. Parfitt and Wilkinson were associated now and at 178 Wilson came on for Dickinson. An hour and 25 minutes after lunch Wilkinson reached his 50 with a good drive through the covers. Scoring was not so quick now. With 190 up Wilkinson was nearly run out by a misunderstanding, but a fielding mistake gave him a "life." An over later Parfitt had a slip chance. A three from Parfitt sent the 200 up after two hours 25 minutes. Two balls later Wilkinson caused a flutter of excitement by hitting a six to leg.

Both men now opened out, but at 219 Wilkinson lifted one and was caught at mid-off. Smith soon opened his account with a four to leg, but was caught in the gully next over. Tea was then taken.

After the interval Parfitt and Ayres scored with fair pace until the former was clean bowled for 38. Hart and Ayres were together when the 250 went up after 4 hours 15 minutes. The score progressed slowly until Ayres was caught behind the wicket by Cawkwell. Whewell was next in, but only received two balls; he was bowled by the second. Hart sent the 260 up with a three to leg and Cockell, next ball, broke his "duck" with a single. At 5.35 p.m. another halt for 20 minutes was called for rain. The pair stayed together until 280, when Hart was bowled by Wilson.

QUICK Lincs. WICKETS.

Houghton and Dods went in first for Lincs. in bad light, and Smith (pavilion end) and Wilkinson opened the bowling. Lincs. suffered a quick setback, for Houghton was run out in extraordinary fashion off the first ball of Wilkinson's over. Dods drove the ball to Whewell on the off and the latter put his foot to the ball and it kicked up for Whewell to make a smart return. Houghton was yards down the pitch. Munnings was next in, but the partnership had only added eleven when Dods was lbw to Smith.

Eleven runs were put on before Ehrenfreid was nicely caught by Cote behind the wicket. The first ball Chatterton, next man in, received apparently hit his pad, as a confident appeal for a fine catch on the leg side by Cockell was disallowed. Munnings had half a "life," when he put one into the slips for Wilkinson to gather but not hold a nasty catch. The pair successfully played out time, the score being 27 for 3.

TUESDAY'S PLAY

On the resumption on Tuesday, Smith opened the bowling from the pavilion end, and from his third ball Chatterton broke his "duck" and sent up 30. Wilkinson filled his old berth at the orchard end. The bowlers were on top at the beginning, and Wilkinson soon made a confident appeal for Chatterton leg-before, which was disallowed. Runs came exceptionally slowly, and it was not until half an hour after the start that 40 went up.

At 44 the first bowling change of the innings was made when Covill was brought on for Wilkinson. A good four to leg by Munnings off his last ball sent 50 up. Soon afterwards Chatterton was forced to requisition the services of a runner. With the score in the fifties Covill was brought down to the pavilion end and Whewell went on at the other end.

Covill fielded close in on the leg side to Whewell, and three times had hard luck with exceptionally hard catches. Munnings sent the hundred up in just under two hours when he dispatched a ball from Whewell to the leg boundary. In the next over but one Covill took a good caught and bowled to dismiss Chatterton.

ANOTHER WICKET.

With Hotchkin in, Wilkinson displaced Whewell, and Munnings celebrated the change by reaching his fifty with a four through the covers. The double change was completed when Smith came on at the pavilion end. The latter had Hotchkin in difficulties and he was several times "morally bowled." It was Munnings who went first, however, when Covill held a fine one-handed chance in the slips. His 70 had been compiled in 2 1/2 hours, and had pulled Lincs. out of a nasty hole. The total was 141. Five runs later Hotchkin was caught in the slips by Cote, after a scrappy 13. With but one run added Dickinson was also dismissed by Smith.

After three hours' batting Bennett sent up 150 with a four to square leg. Lunch was taken with the total 151. Bell survived an appeal for lbw from Wilkinson soon after lunch and the pair

saw 170 on the board before Bennett attempted to sweep round a ball from Covill and stepped in front of his wicket. Only three runs had been added when Smith made a fine catch in the slips to dismiss Bell. Six runs were still needed when Cawkwell, last man, came in. A single from Wilson brought Cawkwell opposite Smith, and with his first ball the Cambs. man spreadeagled the stumps. Smith took five wickets for 43 runs.

FOLLOW ON.

Lincs. began their second innings with arrears of 104, at 2.55 p.m., with Houghton and Hotchkin, who were faced by Smith and Covill. The pair were soon off the mark and a couple of singles were smartly stolen. Ten went up after ten minutes. The pace slowed after this, but at 10 Wilkinson came on for Smith and bowled his slower "stuff." No separation was effected, however, until Whewell displaced Covill. With his fifth ball he took Houghton's leg stump. The total was then 31.

Whewell earned applause when he clean bowled Munnings first ball—two balls, two wickets. Dods was next in, but was not called upon to face the bowling. He did not break his duck, however, for he was easily run out when attempting an impossible run.

Ehrenfreid was next in and the pair soon settled down to score steadily. At 44 Whewell was replaced by Smith, but Ehrenfreid sent the 50 up after an hour's play with a nice drive to the off. Covill came on again at the other end, and Ehrenfreid had a chance when Wilkinson touched but could not hold a high shot through the slips. Saxon was brought on at the orchard end for the first time in the match when the total stood at 77. Tea was taken at 87.

A COLLAPSE.

R. J. Ayres opened the attack after tea and met a quick success, for Ehrenfreid stepped in front of his fourth ball. Whewell, at the other end, dismissed Chatterton, next man, with his first ball. After an hour and 40 minutes Dickinson sent up the 100 with a single to leg. Next over Whewell clean bowled Hotchkin. He had made a valuable 42.

With 109 up Dickinson was bowled by Ayres, and two runs later Bennett also had his stumps scattered by the same bowler. A rather precarious partnership between Bell and Wilson was ended when Whewell bowled the former at 117. The innings closed at 119, Whewell having taken five wickets for 19 runs.

Left with 16 runs to get, Cambs. opened with Covill and Saxon, and the pair soon knocked off the total required.

JACK HOBBS AT CAMBRIDGE

54 Against Combined Police

GAME DRAWN

Jack Hobbs, the famous Surrey and England cricketer, paid a visit to Cambridge yesterday, when he played in a match between Mr. Church's XI. and the combined Police of the Borough, County and Isle of Ely, on Parker's Piece.

When the teams came out to be photographed Hobbs received an ovation from the large crowd and had to autograph a number of books flourished by young enthusiasts.

The Police batted first opening with Sussum and Eagle.

Cousins opened the bowling and his first ball went for three wides, and the second for three byes. The third was placed to leg by Eagle for another three, and Sussum treated the fourth similarly. Altogether 13 accrued from the over. Foot was on at the other end. Cousins was more consistent in his second over and the first two balls gave Eagle some difficulty. It was Foot, however, who separated the pair at 25 when he knocked Eagle's middle-stump back.

ANOTHER WICKET.

The bowling was steadier when Copus joined Sussum and the scoring slower. At 39 a double-change was made, when Whewell displaced Cousins and Taylor went on at the pavilion end for Foot. The change soon had effect for Taylor in his first over clean bowled Sussum. The total was 48. Garner and Copus sent the 50 up after 40 minutes. Ten runs later Copus had a "life" when Foot missed a catch fielding close on the leg side. Whewell was bowling.

QUICKER SCORING.

At 60 Cousins was again brought on, this time at the pavilion end. Garner, by this time, had begun to get his eye in and was hitting the ball with plenty of power. Whewell was the most unfortunate bowler in this respect, and at 83 he was displaced by Hunt, also bowling slow breaks. Garner took two 4's and a single off consecutive balls. At 92 Foot was again brought on for Cousins. After an hour and 25 minutes Copus sent up the 100.

Next over Garner hit three consecutive 4's off Hunt, but on the last hit had what might be termed half a "life." It was a tremendous, lofty hit, and Killick, on the boundary line, was just unable to bring off a fine catch.

At 113 Copus was caught by Whewell in the slips when attempting to pull the ball to leg. Bennett joined Garner, and the latter reached his 50 after 55 minutes at the wicket.

HOBBS ON.

At 122 Hobbs came on at the far end, but Garner treated him with scant respect and drove the last ball to the on-boundary for the first six of the match. A double change was completed when Kerridge came on. Garner continued on his merry way, and hit another six on to Park-terrace off Hobbs in his next over. On the last ball Garner again smashed the ball to the off boundary, where Killick brought off a good catch, but had his feet over the boundary. Garner had started to walk from the wicket, but was, of course, recalled. Next over Kerridge had a caught and bowled chance, but dropped the ball. Hobbs, in his next over, had his reward when Kerridge caught Garner off his bowling. Garner had played an exceptionally bright innings of 91.

FIRST BALL—SIX.

Unwin, another big hitter, took a six off his first ball and a four off the second. At 183 the pair attempted a short run, and Hobbs, to everyone's delight, threw down the wicket with ease, to run out

Bennett. Unwin was now providing the excitement, although he should have been caught in the long field had not another fielder run in front of Killick just as he took the catch.

After two hours Unwin sent up the 200 with a two to leg off Hobbs. Six runs later Hobbs clean bowled Blackwell. At 213 Sussum declared the innings closed.

Hobbs and Killick opened for Mr Church's XI. and were opposed by Eagle and Christmas. The Police met with quick success, for Eagle clean bowled Killick in the course of his second over.

QUICK WICKETS.

Baker was, next in, but only stayed long enough to make two. The score was 25 when Whewell joined Hobbs. Eagle had captured both wickets.

There was some amusement when Jack Hobbs kept edging out of his crease as though for impossible runs. At 36 Whewell was also out, when deceived by a straight one from Christmas. Hobbs was scoring with delightful shots all round the wicket, and when joined by Kerridge the pair carried the total to 73 before the latter was out to Stanton, who had just replaced Eagle. "Billy" Cockell was next in, and Hobbs reached his 50 out of 76 after 55 minutes. At 79 Christmas was replaced by Sussum, the Police captain.

HOBBS OUT.

Seven runs later Hobbs was out. He hooked a ball from Stanton to leg and Sussum took a nice shoulder high catch. Hobbs had had a pretty innings of 54, with four fours as the best hits. He received much applause as he walked to the pavilion.

With Hunt and Cockell together Christmas displaced Sussum at the pavilion end and Eagle came on again at the other end. These changes, however, could not prevent runs coming, and the 100 went up after an hour and 20 minutes. Two runs later Christmas clean bowled Hunt.

Taylor and Cockell continued to score steadily, and at 122 Hart replaced Eagle and Grange Christmas. Only four runs had been added, however, when Stanton was brought on again for Grange. At 131 Cockell was caught off Garner, who had just come on. He had made a useful 25. Taylor and Gigney were now together and were unbeaten at time.

CAMBS. GET A POINT.

Cambs. saved a point in their Minor Counties championship match with Norfolk at Norwich on Saturday. Although the home county took the major points for first innings lead, Cambs. were left with the fine percentage of 80 (16 points out of a possible 20). Cambs. score of 253 against last season's championship leaders on Friday was a better one than appeared at one time probable. Coote was the mainstay of the early batting, and although he had a couple of "lives" -- the first when eight -- he was always skaping confidently. When Cambs. had six wickets down for 116 they looked like being out for a very moderate score, but Whewell and Hart laid the foundation of a recovery by putting on 42 in less than half an hour for the seventh partnership. Smith could not get going, but Paak indulged in some fireworks, and with Whewell still batting steadily, 74 were added in 52 minutes. Paak hit a six and six fours in his 45, while Whewell had nine fours in his 63, for which he batted just over an hour and a half.

Cambs. had batted for four hours, and in the remaining time Norfolk scored 160 for the loss of four wickets. B. Rought Rought and Thistleton Smith were out cheaply, but Edrich helped Walker in a big third wicket stand. Walker did the bulk of the scoring, for when he was caught by Covill he was within five of his century and had batted for two hours. He hit 14 fours. Norfolk went for runs quickly on the restart on Saturday, and declared with a lead of 93. Dogged batting by Wilkinson and Rose, a sound innings by Parfitt and rain all contributed to Cambs. saving the game. Norfolk had declared with a lead of 93, and Cambs. lost four wickets before the arrears were wiped out. How grimly Cambs. defended -- and they were barracked for it -- may be gauged from the fact that Rose, usually a free scoring batsman, was at the wickets 22 minutes without scoring.

Wilkinson's batting was even more stolid. It was 36 minutes before he opened his account, and at the end of 70 minutes he had four to his credit. When rain caused a stoppage he had batted 110 minutes for 15 runs, but ten minutes after the restart he was dismissed -- two hours for 16! Unattractive as it may have been to watch, there is no denying its value in saving the game. That Cambs. finished up with 208 for six wickets was mainly due to Parfitt. He did not take the slightest risk, and his first hour at the wickets produced only 22 runs, but as time went on he became more free, and in the next 80 minutes added 57. He was unbeaten when time was called, and the best hits in his 87 were a six and 11 fours. Whewell gave him good support for the sixth wicket.

PRESS BEAT SERVANTS.

University Press strengthened their position in the Cambs. Senior League table on Saturday, when they had little difficulty in defeating the College Servants on Trinity New ground. The two points gained give the Press a one point lead over Camden at the moment, and as they are opponents in the last match the Press have but to draw to assure themselves of the title. The match is fixed for to-morrow. The Press batted first, and Hobbs and Flack, the opening pair, found little difficulty in facing a weak attack, as several of the Servants' regular players were absent. The score mounted quickly until the 70 mark was reached, when a stoppage of nearly half an hour was caused by rain.

After this the batsmen were forced to go all out for runs, and at 80 Hobbs was out. He had made an excellent 61, of which no less than 44 came from boundaries. Bryan and Dilley took the total to 14 before the former was out with eight to his credit. Gravestock and Dilley were associated in the biggest partnership of the innings -- one which added 17 runs! At 31 Gravestock was stumped by Tebbit. He had made unlucky 13 -- three fours and a single. Three runs later Robinson and Dilley were both out. The latter was the only other batsman to reach double figures, and his eleven included two fours. The last four wickets were only responsible for the addition of three runs, and the innings closed at 30, leaving the Press winners by over 100 runs.

Hobbs and Goddard bowled unchanged for the Press, and the former completed a fine all round performance by taking seven wickets at the exceptionally low cost of 15 runs. He bowled nine overs, including three wicket maidens. Goddard also bowled well, and captured the remaining wickets for 22 runs in the course of 8.2 overs, including two maidens. Both bowlers were well supported in the field, a welcome keenness being shown all round.

The fall crumpled up badly against Crutchley, the last three wickets all falling at 118. The Mills fared badly, and were all dismissed for 68, Chalk and Vaughan being the only batsmen to run into double figures. Fisher, a young leg-break bowler, proved very effective, taking seven wickets for 21 runs in eight overs. Warren had two for 22 and Daisley one for 20.

Covill's Century Before Lunch

BEDS. SAVE THE GAME

Cambs. took points for first innings lead in the return Minor Counties' Championship match with Bedfordshire on St. John's College ground on Monday and Tuesday.

Cambs. won the toss and batted first. There was a strong wind blowing across the pitch from the pavilion end at roughly the line formed by fine leg and mid-off.

C. W. Rawlins opened the bowling at the pavilion end, and off his fifth ball will opened the scoring with a couple through the slips. Ward was on at the other end, and with his fourth ball clean bowled Coote, who had not broken his "duck." In a temporary absence of Ward in search of studs, Keech came on for the fourth over. All the bowlers were having some difficulty in keeping their feet, and sawdust was eventually put down. Covill sent 10 up with an excellent four to square leg of Rawlins.

COVILL'S FREE SCORING.

Covill was soon at home, scoring all round the wicket. The first half-hour produced just under 30 runs. At 41 Dynes (slow right-arm) came on at the road end for Ward, and opened with a maiden. A double change was effected when Keech came on for Rawlins. With two consecutive fours off Dynes, Covill sent up the 50 in as many minutes. After an hour Covill reached his individual 50 out of 74 with a fine drive to leg for four. This was off Ward, who had replaced Keech.

The pair continued to score steadily, despite more bowling changes, and the 100 went up after an hour and 20 minutes. Half an hour later Covill reached 103 out of 139. He had hit 19 fours in a really fine innings. Lunch was taken at 147.

Covill "went" for the bowling directly after lunch, but at 164 Wilkinson attempted to confuse the fielders with a pretended short run and muddled Covill instead, who was run out. He had batted two hours ten minutes for a chanceless 122, including 22 fours.

Wilkinson was still batting very steadily, and Saxon soon settled down. After an hour and a half at the wicket, Wilkinson reached his 50. The total was 195. The 200 went up after two hours 40 minutes, when Wilkinson despatched Dynes to the square leg boundary.

MORE BIG STANDS.

At 310 Whewell came on and clean bowled Ward with his fifth ball. The partnership added 52 runs in half an hour. Twenty-three runs were required to save the follow on when C. W. Rawlins, the last man, came in. Only four runs were still needed when Rawlins hit a ball from Pask into the safe hands of Covill.

None of the bowling analyses were particularly impressive, but Smith was easily the best with six wickets for 97 in 33 overs (8 maidens). Whewell took one for 18 in 12 overs (four maidens), Pask one for 67 in 15 overs (one maiden), Covill one for 30 in nine overs (two maidens), while Wilkinson, Saxon and Coote were all unsuccessful.

The follow on was, of course, enforced,

FIRST INNINGS POINTS FOR CAMBS.

St. John's College Ground was a veritable "batsmen's paradise" on Monday and Tuesday, when Cambs. and Beds. met in a return Minor Counties' championship match. In the two days' play only 29 wickets fell while 938 runs were scored. Cambs. gained a first innings lead of 104 and had to be satisfied with the points thus gained—their percentage now being 86.66. Cambs., with the advantage of first knock, scored so freely that they were able to declare soon after tea on the first day with 435 on the board, and only seven wickets down.

This free scoring came despite the early loss of Coote. Covill was by no means perturbed, and he achieved the enviable feat of completing a century before lunch. Indeed at the interval he had scored 110 out of 143. When a misunderstanding led to his being run out he had made a chanceless 122, including 22 4's. Saxon and Wilkinson carried on the good work, their second wicket stand adding 172, the first 100 of which came in an hour. Wilkinson got within seven of his century, and, like Saxon, who was dismissed soon after 300 had gone up, hit 13 4's. With the bowling "tamed," Ridgson and Wilkinson scored briskly, and the third three-figure stand of the innings was seen, this partnership yielding 109.

Beds. lost two quick wickets on going in to bat, but F. Rawlins and A. B. Pools played out the remaining time on Monday, although both were missed in the slips. These "lives" proved expensive, for on the resumption on Tuesday the pair proceeded to make a stand of 187, which put hopes of a Cambs. victory rather beyond probability. Four quick wickets after lunch altered the position somewhat, but Beds. pulled round and got within four of avoiding the follow-on, thanks to an excellent not out innings by Dynes. History repeated itself to a certain extent in the second innings, for Colling and Milman were both out before 40 were on the board. Dynes, going in first, again batted excellently, and with Southgate added 95 for the third wicket, which, of course, precluded all chances of Cambs. winning. Southgate was eventually bowled by Hart, but Dynes (77) and C. Rawlins were unbeaten at time. Dynes' 77 had been scored steadily, and included only four fours.

CAMDEN WIN SENIOR LEAGUE.

Camden won the Senior League on Saturday, when they defeated University Press on King's and Clare ground by 93 runs. It was a vital match for both teams. Camden had to win outright to secure the title. A drawn game would have meant the championship going to the Press. Batting first, Camden opened with Ayres and Woolston, but the latter was bowled after making 13 out of 15. Ward was caught at the wicket in Goddard's next over with the total at 17.

Ayres and Tabraham sent up 31, but both left at that total. Then came a useful stand, Chapman and Daisley carrying the score to 67. Joined by Myers, Daisley saw 85 up before being caught, but Carter was bowled in Gordon's same over. Abbs was concerned with Myers in an 8th wicket partnership that saw three figures up. Half the side were out for this total, but apart from Baines, no other batsman offered any sustained resistance, and the innings closed for 52. Fisher again exploited his leg breaks effectively, taking five wickets for 23 in 16 overs, six maidens. Daisley took three for 21 and Abbs one for three.

JUNIOR CUP FINAL.

Grantchester established what must definitely be regarded as a commanding position in the Cambs. Junior Cup final on Saturday, when they started the match with Pye Radio. The Radio captain won the toss, but, surprisingly, sent in Grantchester on a perfect batsman's paradise. As it was, Grantchester knocked up 310 and dismissed four of their opponents for 57 runs. The match will be concluded tomorrow on Parker's Piece at 2.30. W. Pawley and W. Wagstaff opened the innings for Grantchester and the pair soon settled down to play delightful cricket—in fact, one of the officials of the Cambs. Cricket Association said it was the best display he had ever seen by a pair of opening batsmen in that particular competition.

Bowling changes were ineffective, and the pair sent up three figures. At 119, however, Pawley was caught behind the wicket after making 59 in a little over an hour. His best shots in an excellent innings were three 4's. J. Lambert was next in, and another good partnership ensued. After 55 runs had been added Wagstaff was caught by Heap with the score at 174. Wagstaff had remarkably bad luck, for when out he had made 99. It was noticeable in his last two overs, by the way, that he was getting very tired. Lambert was content to keep his end up and Bass continued Canwell's policy. He made 19 (three 4's) before being run out at 225. Another hitter, Stearn, came in and ran up a quick 23 before leaving at 282. Grantchester had little to worry about now. W. G. R. M. Laurie, the Rowing Blue, was associated in a sixth wicket partnership that added eighteen runs, before sending a catch back to the bowler. G. Wagstaff knocked up 14 (including three fours) and then, at 298, Lambert was out. He had played an excellent innings of 51, combining steadiness with the ability to hit out at loose balls. The last two wickets added a dozen to the total before the innings eventually closed at 310.

It struck me that the Radio captain might have obtained better results if he had changed the bowling a little more frequently earlier in the innings. As it was the first change was made at 38, and by that time the batsmen were feeling able to deal with the "second strings." Hitchings was the most successful bowler with two wickets for 12 runs in 9.5 overs (two maidens). Taylor took two for 73 in 18 overs, Birch one for 62 in 14 overs (two maidens) and Thompson one for 76 in 20 overs (one maiden). Diver and Heap were both unsuccessful at a cost of 40 and 49 runs respectively. A word of special praise must go to Voss, the wicket keeper, who conceded only two byes in the whole innings. Besides this he caught one man and had a hand in the run outs.

Pye Radio suffered quick setbacks when they went in to bat, for with the total at nine Bass dismissed both Voss and Taylor in the same over. Four runs later Bass claimed his third wicket by bowling Birch. Heap and Collier were now associated, but only seven runs had been added when Stearn took his first wicket, by bowling Collier. Heap, meanwhile, was quickly settling down, and when joined by Hitching, took the total to 57 before the close of play.

COUNTY CRICKET RECORD

Season Without a Defeat

BATTING AND BOWLING AVERAGES

Season 1934 will go down in the records as the most successful in the history of the Cambridgeshire County Cricket Club, for in finishing sixth in the Minor Counties championship table they reached a higher position than ever previously. The teams above them were Lancs 11, Surrey 11, Norfolk, Durham and Oxfordshire.

At one time there was a great possibility that they would achieve even greater distinction, and some of the keenest supporters were visualising Cambs. as challengers for the title.

There certainly appeared some justification for this optimism, for, by winning their first three matches—each by 10 wickets—the club made a particularly encouraging start. This trio of successes, however, was the extent of their triumphs for although the remaining five matches were drawn points for first innings lead were lost in four of them.

UNBEATEN RECORD.

Nevertheless, for the first time, the club were able to return an unbeaten certificate—one of the five teams in the championship to do so. The drawn games, however, had the effect of reducing their percentage to 55, which was only equal to that of 1932, when two defeats were sustained.

There is no doubt that the County are adopting the best policy in playing all their championship matches towards the end of the season, for it is only at this period that a really representative side can be fielded.

Although it has been a season which has favoured batsmen, it is questionable whether ever before six of the county side have returned averages of over 30. Coote is at the top of the list, but Covill, who follows closely, has made the most runs.

Wilkinson began the season with some splendid bowling performances, and these enabled him to head the averages. Only Smith, who took the same number of wickets, sent down more overs.

Altogether Cambs. scored 2,753 runs for the loss of 101 wickets, an average of 27.25 per wicket. Opponents made 2,998 runs for 125 wickets, the average in this case being 23.98.
