CORNWALL'S BIG LEAD

FEEBLE DISPLAY BY KENT
2nd XI. AT PENZANCE

Cornwall had reason to be pleased with the day's cricket for the opening of their match with Kent 2nd XI, yesterday, at Penzance. Although Kent had first knock on a good wicket, Cornwall bowled with such effect that all the side were out half an hour after lunch for a mere 100. Then from three o'clock to 6.45, Cornwall monopolised the scoring, and with a total of 331, had a splendid lead of 231 for Kent to face to-day. The features of the Cornish batting was the 121 obtained by E. M. Cunnack (Helston), and the 145 which he and G. Holman (Camborne) put on for the fourth wicket. Cornwall had to bring in G. Holman (Camborne) to take the place of K. Hosking (Camborne), who was unable to play. At lunch time Cornwall had done well by getting seven Kent wickets for only 82.

Kent had won the toss and batted on a dry and fast wicket, and fared badly. Kendall, the Truro bowler, meeting with early success to clean bowl the first two batsmen. Although it was a batsman's wicket, the Kent men found the bowling troublesome. Kendall was brought on again just before lunch, and with the last ball before the interval, clean bowled the Kent captain, G. A. Simpson for a "duck." Only half an hour after the resumption was sufficient to finish off the Kent side, Ollerearnshaw bowling to such effect that the last three wickets produced only 18, the whole side being out for exactly 100. Ollerearnshaw got the three wickets for a mere trifle, and came out with three for 21. The Cornish bowling was so good that it took Kent 2½ hours to collect 100.

In contrast to this, Cornwall topped the century mark in just over an hour, and at the tea interval had 112 for three wickets. Holman, who went in first wicket down, was then not out, but early in his innings he was clean bowled with a no ball. Cunnack, when 12, was let off in the slips. Cory played a bright innings for 31, which included five 4's. The Cunnack-Holman partnership proved an invaluable one, putting on 145 for the fourth wicket before Holman was given out l.b.w. Of this, Holman had made 57. Cunnack continued to play fine cricket, and especially on the leg side. He was caught in the slips off a no ball, and went on to make his century with a fine shot to leg. He quickly added 21, when he was taken in the slips. His splendid innings of 121, in which he gave only two chances, included 22 4's and he made his score in 24 hours. With 256 for five wickets, Cornwall were in a strong position. Ollerearnshaw sent up the 300 with a fine drive to the boundary, this number of runs having been obtained in three hours and ten minutes. **EXCELLENT START
BY CORNWALL**

**KENT BOWLING HIT
FREELY**

Cornwall commenced their Minor Counties championship programme yesterday at Penzance, when they met Kent II., and left off last night with the excellent lead of 231 runs on the first innings.

Cornwall disposed of the visitors for the comparatively small total of 100 and then compiled 331, a feature of which was 121 scored by E. M. Cunnack and 57 by G. Holman. The partnership between these yielded 145. Cornwall's rate of scoring was more than twice as fast as that of Kent, 200 being scored in two hours, whereas the visitors took two and a half hours to register their 100.

KENT MASTERED.

PENZANOE, Wednesday.

The weather was fine and the wicket in excellent condition for the Minor Counties championship match between Cornwall and Kent II. at St. Clare, Penzance, this (Wednesday) morning. E. M. Cunnack (Helston), and G. Holman (Camborne) replaced H. Tresawna and Ken Hosking (Oamborne) in the Cornish side. G. A. Simpson, the Kent captain, won the toss, and the visitors batted first. Sunnacks took the first over from Ollerearnshaw, who appealed for lbw. with his second ball. Cornwall were using their best bowlers, for at the other end C. Kendall, of Truro, was put on. The batsmen were none too confident, and after twenty minutes' play, with the score at 6, Anson played on to a good ball from Kendall.

Turner, next man in, raised the rate of scoring somewhat, and in two balls hit six off Kendall, including one good boundary stroke. Then, at 17, Kendall shattered Sunnack's wicket with a fast ball, and A. J. W. Hill joined Turner. Sunnacks had batted just half-an-hour for six runs.

Turner and Hill showed more fight than the preceding batsman, but neither was happy against Kendall, who was keeping a perfect length, and beating the bat time and again. A smart piece of fielding by Harry, the Redruth professional, would have dismissed Turner if he had been a little further out of his crease. Kendall made a confident appeal for lbw. against Hill, but in vain. This batsman was playing stylishly, and made a beautiful glide for two off Kendall. Still, thirty runs in just over three-quarters of an hour was pretty slow going.

Ollerearnshaw went off in favour of J. E. Mill at the bottom end, and Harry took Kendall's place at the top. The fourth appeal for lbw. against Hill, made by Harry, was successful. Hill had 15 to his credit, and the score was now 45 for 3. Cornwall could certainly be satisfied with their first hour's work.

The scoring was rather slow, as might be expected, yet Turner was confident against both Harry and Mill, and Spencer was settling down nicely. Bickford had a good chance to stump him once when he stepped out to flog a ball from Harry, but failed.

Turner's fairly long innings came to an end when he was bowled middlestump by Mill. He had made 31 in an hour and a quarter, and was the only batsman up to now to show any sign of mastery. Four wickets were down for sixty-three, and Cornwall had no reason to feel alarmed. Spencer and Pearce were totting up runs, and Bickford took off Harry and put on Kendall again at the top end.

Stephens was put on for Mill, and from his first ball Ollerearnshaw missed a shoulder-high catch. Spencer hit out, Ollerearnshaw grasped at the ball, but he was facing a blazing sun, and dropped the catch. This was unfortunate, for Spencer was getting set. In his next over, Stephens bowled Pearce, and R. H. Knight came out to the wicket. Kent had made only 79 for the loss of their five best wickets. At 82, Holman brilliantly caught out Spencer off Stephens' bowling. G. A. Simpson, the Kent captain, was bowled by Kendall with the last ball before lunch.

Soon after lunch, Ollerearnshaw hit Knight's off stump when he had made 3. Cole shaped well, and scored a useful 10 before being caught by Ollerearnshaw. Arnold was caught by Geo. Rogers for a duck; Mason was not out. The innings closed for 100.

CORNWALL'S 1st INNINGS.

When Cory and Stephens came out at three o'clock to open the Cornish innings, they did not have a formidable total to face. Their opening was in marked contrast with the Kentish opening; they hit out merrily at the bowling of Cole and Capt. Arnold, and in eight minutes 20 was

on the board. Cory was the more aggressive batsman, hitting several boundaries. At 38, Stephens was bowled by Arnold, having scored 8. Cornwall's score stood at 38 for 1.

Geo. Holman, who joined Cory, played safely enough. Cory gave an easy catch at 45, with his score at 31. Geo. Rogers partnered his club colleague now, and they seemed comfortable enough against Arnold and Cole. But Rogers was beaten by a good ball from Arnold, just when he looked set. Cornwall had scored seventy runs in forty-five minutes.

Arnold, who had been bowling throughout the innings, went on at the bottom end, for Knight to have a spell from the top. E. M. Cunnack and Holman were scoring more slowly, Knight, bowling fast to leg, proving difficult. Twice, however, Cunnack pulled him round to the boundary.

The hundred was raised in sixty-five minutes, an excellent performance, considering that Kent took two hours and a half to make the same amount. Holman and Cunnack were both in superb form, and they hit Knight's deliveries all over the ground.

After tea Cole and Arnold were the bowlers. At five o'clock 100 was on the board, and the partnership of Cunnack and Holman had added exactly a hundred runs. At 170 Knight replaced Cole, and Pearce, a slow bowler, came on for Arnold. Cunnack had scored over sixty, and Holman completed his fifty with a nice nick through the slips.

These two batsmen were giving a wonderful exhibition; the batting was stylish and sometimes forceful, though Cunnack and Holman took no risks. The crowd was excited and jubilant when the telegraph signalled 200. When Holman was leg before to Pearce at 203, he and Cunnack had made a stand of 144. Holman had scored a fine 57.

Capt. Arnold took the place of Pearce, and Ollerearnshaw played him cautiously. The fieldsmen had plenty of work to do, and the bowlers were tiring. Cole sent down several no-balls in a few overs.

A great round of applause went up when Cunnack reached his century by hooking Cole for three. He and Ollerearnshaw took the score merrily on to 250. Then Cunnack tipped up a ball from Arnold into the hands of Anson in the slips. Cunnack had made a brilliant 121, the greater part of which he compiled by 22 fours.

CORNWALL'S FLIGHT

FEEBLE BATTING AGAINST SURREY 2nd XI.

Cornwall found themselves badly placed at the end of the first day's play in the match against Surrey 2nd XI., at the Oval, on Saturday. In roughly six and a half hours' play, an innings six and a half completed, and 166 runs were scored. Cornwall had to begin their second knock needing 227 runs to avert an innings defeat. Within an hour and a quarter from the start, Cornwall were in a losing position. They won the toss—usually a big advantage at the Oval—but the batting broke down so badly on a good run-getting pitch that the total was only 88 when the ninth wicket went down. Rogers (G.), in scoring 31 of the runs, and obtaining 28 of them by boundary strokes, demonstrated that the bowling could be hit, and later this was confirmed by Tresawna and Bickford, who redeemed the Cornwall innings from complete failure by sharing in a last wicket partnership that increased the total by 81 runs. Bickford, 33 (not out), scored 24 in seven strokes—five 4's and two 2's.

Whatever chance Cornwall had of retrieving their batting failure was lost in the first few minutes of the Surrey 2nd XI. going in. The total was 12, and Mobey had scored eight, when he snicked a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and Kendall, at first slip, failed to hold what looked to be an easy catch. Mobey profited by his good fortune to the extent of scoring a century. The Surrey 2nd XI. had two men out for 69, when W. T. Cook, the captain, joined Mobey, and for the next 100 minutes the Cornwall bowlers were hit to all parts of the field, the third wicket partnership producing 164 runs. Mobey, who made four catches behind the wicket while Cornwall were batting, claimed a 6 and 17 4's in his 135. Cooke hit two 6's and five 4's in his 75, and Buss, who occupied only 50 minutes over his 55, had a 6 and seven 4's to his credit.

The Cornish captain to-day changed his batting order in the second innings when Cornwall, who required 227 runs to avoid an innings defeat, batted in disappointing fashion. Cunnack was out to a great catch in the slips by Parker. Splendid bowling performances by J. E. Mill and Capt. Arnold were the outstanding features of yesterday's cricket at Tunbridge Wells, when Kent second eleven and Cornwall draw.

Kent led an exciting first innings by one run only, and on going in again had added 78 runs to their credit for the loss of one wicket, when stumps were drawn for the day at 5.20.

Kent, who overnight had lost four wickets for 25 runs, did not start the day any too well against the Cornwall attack, which was shared by J. E. Mill and Kendall, and a mere three runs had only been added to the overnight total when Kendall, who on the first day had bowled really well but without much success, got through Hill's defence to bowl him after the Kent batsman had collected 11 out of the 25 runs.

Pearce, who also had been an overnight not out with Hill, spent two uncomfortable overs against Mill, and with the total unchanged Pearce played half-heartedly to a deceptive ball from Mill to present Rogers with an easy catch.

So far Mill had bowled four maiden overs, and he was most unfortunate to see N. S.

Knight's wicket shattered with a no-ball when the Kent batsman had only scored two and the total was 40. Knight, however, with Mason, gradually pulled the game round for Kent, but although Tresawna, the Cornwall captain, made a double change in his bowling by bringing on Ollerearnshaw and Rogers (W.) for Kendall and Mill respectively, Tresawna soon brought back his original bowlers when the Kent score had been taken to 75.

GOOD BOWLING BY MILL.

Mill with a ball that turned quickly to leg caught Mason in two minds, and with a half-hearted stroke he was caught at the wicket by Bickford. This seventh-wicket stand had made a bright feature of the cricket, up to lunch, and had put on 47 runs. Mill was also responsible for getting Foy's wicket, but Tresawna when he gave Harry the ball got Knight caught at the wicket and Arnold caught by Mill in the slips, which brought Kent's innings to a close soon after 12.30 for 97 runs.

Cornwall's work in the field was always of the keenest character, but the honours went to Mill, who had the satisfaction of securing his seven wickets for just over five runs apiece. Harry's short spell of bowling was just as encouraging, for with 23 balls he obtained two wickets for three runs.

CORNWALL'S INNINGS.

Cornwall went in to bat just before 1 o'clock, but before lunch was taken Tresawna had lost G. Holman with only 12 runs on the board. When the game was resumed the Cornwall skipper and Harry faced the bowling of Capt. Arnold and Cole with such confidence that one began to expect the Kent score would quickly be passed. It was not to be, however, for with the total 21 and Tresawna 10 the Cornwall captain was run out in a peculiar manner. Tresawna stepped out to a leg ball from Arnold, and connected, but to his amazement he saw the ball rebound from the wicket-keeper's pads to hit the stump.

Meanwhile Harry, if generally taking a risk, batted spiritedly, but he quickly lost Ollerearnshaw, but Rogers (G.), in a merry knock, in attempting a huge hit was caught in the long field.

EXCITING STRUGGLE.

When came the departure of Harry, who after just missing being bowled by Foy was caught in the slips by Arnold with Foy's next ball. Harry obtained 27 out of 66. With half the side out, Cornwall were in rather a serious position, and with Cunneen leaving before another run had been added, and Rogers (W.) being bowled for four, it was the most critical period during the day's cricket. Kendall and Bickford brought Cornwall to within half a dozen runs of leading the Kent total, but, although Bax was batting confidently when Mill joined him, Bax was bowled by Arnold. Cornwall had therefore got to within one run of Kent's total in a thrilling struggle.

THE SUMMER GAME

CORNWALL'S BIG DEFEAT AT THE OVAL

Cornwall were severely trounced by Surrey 2nd XI, at the Oval, and when the game finished on Monday, the Cornishmen were beaten by an innings and 75 runs.

Cornwall found themselves badly placed at the end of the first day's play, on Saturday. Within an hour and a quarter from the start, Cornwall were in a losing position. They won the toss—usually a big advantage at the Oval—but the batting broke down so badly on a good run-getting pitch that the total was only 88 when the ninth wicket went down. Rogers (G.), in scoring 31 of the runs, and obtaining 28 of them by boundary strokes, demonstrated that the bowling could be hit, and later this was confirmed by Tresawna and Bickford, who redeemed the Cornwall innings from complete failure by sharing in a last wicket partnership that increased the total by 81 runs. Half the Cornwall side were out for 61 when Tresawna went to the crease, and batting with courage and resolution, the Cornwall captain just fogged the bowling. Tresawna's first five scoring strokes were a three and four 4's Bickford, the last man in, adopted the same measures. He began with three successive 4's. Tresawna was last out, and in scoring 31 out of 108, he hit nine 4's and two 3's—a testimony that he attacked the bowling in real earnest. Bickford, 32 (not out), scored 24 in seven strokes—five 4's and two 3's.

Whatever chance Cornwall had of retrieving their batting failure was lost in the first few minutes of the Surrey 2nd XI. The total was 12 and Mober had scored eight, when he snicked a ball from Ollerearnshaw, and Kendall, at first slip, failed to hold what looked to be an easy catch. Mober profited by his good fortune to the extent of scoring a century. The Surrey 2nd XI had two men out for 69, when W. T. Cook, the captain, joined Mober and for the next 100 minutes the Cornwall bowlers were hit to all parts of the field. The third wicket partnership producing 164 runs, Mober made four catches behind the wicket while Cornwall were batting. Mober claimed a 4 and 17 4's in his 135. Cooke hit two 4's and five 4's in his 75, and Buss, who occupied only 50 minutes over his 56, had a 4 and seven 4's to his credit.

For the second time in the match at the Oval the Cornish batsmen failed, and dismissing them for 152 shortly after lunch on Monday afternoon, the Surrey 2nd XI gained a decisive victory by an innings and 75 runs.

When play began in the morning, Cornwall, starting their second innings, were set the task of scoring 227 runs to save the innings defeat. On a pitch that still remained fast the batting cracked up badly and the whole side were out in less than three hours. Both Parker and Owen bowled splendidly for Surrey, and they were supported by exceptionally good catching. Parker, at second slip, dismissing Cunnack and Mill with sparkling one-handed efforts.

Cornwall lost wickets so regularly that half the side were out for 75. The total had reached 11, when Rogers (G.) was taken at short leg and after Parker had made his first great catch, Holman attacked the bowling successfully for a time, hitting four 4's a 3, and two 2's in scoring 34. Next in merit was the batting of Paull. He drove with power on both sides of the wicket, and among his figures were a 5 (four from over-throw), and two 4's. Kendall took out his bat for 21, scoring 15 by four strokes—three 4's and a 3. Still, none of the Cornwall batting was impressive. In the match, Parker, a medium-paced bowler took seven (4's) while Owen (slow), had a record of eight for 51. Scores:—

COUNTY BOWLER'S FINE ACHIEVEMENT IN KENT

Cornwall always look forward to their match with Kent 2nd XI. on the picturesque Nevill ground at Tunbridge Wells. Last year the game was restricted to one day, and on Tuesday the teams were almost as unfortunate, for cricket, which took place in three spells, lasted no longer than about 70 minutes. CORNWALL SPARKLE

NEW RECORDS CREATED AGAINST DEVON

Cornwall's sweeping victory over Devon in a Minor Counties' championship match, on the Truro School ground, on Friday and Saturday, will rank as one of the finest performances of the Duchy side. Two remarkably meritorious feats were added to the roll of distinguished records—the third wicket partnership between K. Hosking and S. Stephens which produced 204 runs on the first day, and the capturing of the first three Devon wickets without a run being made when Devon opened their second innings on Saturday, after being compelled to follow on. It was anything but a happy match for Devon at the wickets, as all through both innings they were struggling against adversity. Faced with Cornwall's huge total of 307 runs, Devon lost half their wickets for 128 runs on Friday, and when they resumed on Saturday they needed 80 runs to avert a follow on. They made a courageous effort to achieve this task, but failed by ten runs. Their second venture just before lunch on Saturday, opened disastrously, the first three wickets tumbling without a run being scored. Never in the history of Cornwall county cricket has there been a similar happening, and it is believed that it will rank as a record in the Minor Counties' championship. Devon then had to fight hard to avert an innings defeat, but in this they were unsuccessful, and Cornwall emerged victorious by an innings and 21 runs.

Winning the toss and taking first knock, Cornwall survived two early shocks, but afterwards they gave complete satisfaction by amassing the grand total of 307. Things looked far from hopeful when George Rogers succumbed to a catch by Emmett off Myburgh, with the score at 14, and his club-mate, G. Holman, was sent back at 27. Ken Hosking, another Cambornian, and S. Stephens changed the outlook, and this pair courageously attacked the bowling, Hosking hitting with great power, and the half-century was reached after one hour's play. They were firmly established, and frequent changes were made in the Devon bowling, but it was all to no purpose and the merry knock continued, 130 runs being put on in just over one hour, Hosking making two grand hits for six. Seldon has there been such smart running and backing up in Minor Counties' cricket in Cornwall, and for sheer aggressiveness their partnership would be hard to beat. They gave the Devonians considerable anxiety, and remained together up to the lunch interval, the score then being 177 for two wickets.

Wonderful Innings

When the innings was resumed, Hosking was six short of his century, but with two hits he collected these and received hearty applause from the spectators. Soon the double century was passed, and the score continued to mount up, but at 231 a separation was effected, Stephens falling a victim to Simmons after making a valuable 72, and he was deservedly applauded for his fine effort. This was a record stand for Cornwall, yielding 204 runs—a bigger score than the whole eleven have been capable of producing on many occasions. It will long remain in the memories of those who witnessed this outstanding performance. E. M. Cunnack succeeded Stephens, but he did not stay long, his wicket being captured by Lock for a single. Soon afterwards Hosking's bright venture was terminated by Lock, his contribution being 137, which included 15 boundaries and two 6's, and in unmistakable fashion the crowd expressed their appreciation of his wonderful innings, in which he completely mastered the attack. Hosking had placed his side in a commanding position—243 for five wickets—and even if the remaining batsmen should prove easy prey, Cornwall had no need to despair. Afterwards there was a lull in the proceedings, and the sixth wicket fell at 250, Ollerearnshaw being out for two. But O. E. R. Bax, a former Truro Cathedral School boy, proved an obstacle to the Devon bowlers, and with Tresawna, who was captaining the side for the 25th year, carried the score to

271 before the seventh wicket fell, Tresawna being bowled by Aitkin-Davies for eight. At 282, Kendall gave an easy catch to Carroll behind the wicket, and then Bickford and Bax took the score to the 300 mark before Bickford was sent back. The innings concluded for 307 after four hours, Bax being undefeated for 28. Devon employed seven bowlers in their effort to dispose of the Cornishmen, the most successful being Lock, who claimed six wickets for 84 runs.

When Devon went to the wickets after tea they suffered an early reverse, losing their captain, F. H. Carroll, with only four runs on the board, before he had opened his account. Bickford snapped up a catch behind the wicket off Mill's bowling. Kendall shared the attack at the other end, and so effective was their bowling, backed up by smart fielding, that the batsmen had great difficulty in getting runs, the first hour yielding only 30. Hoare and Seldon remained together for 80 minutes, offering a dogged resistance before the latter fell a victim to Stephens, the total then being 37. Emmett joined Hoare, but still there was no acceleration in the rate of scoring, and when a single was infrequently registered, the crowd applauded ironically. Of eleven overs sent down by Kendall, seven were maiden, and only seven runs were scored. It took two hours to reach 60, and at 75 the third wicket fell, Kendall catching Emmett off Stephens. After two hours and 20 minutes the century was hoisted, and five runs later Borton was clean bowled by Stephens. In the last over of the day, Ollerearnshaw got Emmett dismissed for obstruction, and Devon had lost five wickets for 128. Hoare kept his wicket intact for 2½ hours to score 48.

Forced to Follow On

Resuming their innings on Saturday morning, having lost five wickets for 128, Devon required 80 runs to save the follow on, and their troubles began early, Myburgh being bowled by Mill in the second over for the addition of a single. Hoare, who was 48 not out overnight, was missed in the slips by Holman, off Kendall's bowling, when he had increased his score by only one. This was a lucky escape for Devon, as this batsman stayed all through the innings, and prevented a complete collapse. With the assistance of Turl, Lock and Watts in turn, Hoare strove hard to get the necessary runs to avert a follow on, but this they failed to do, being ten short when the last wicket fell at 198. Hoare batted valiantly for his side when they were in sore distress, and going in at the fall of the first wicket, he remained undefeated for 74, after being at the wickets for nearly four hours.

Starting their second venture just before lunch, Devon fared disastrously against the bowling of Kendall and Ollerearnshaw, and had the amazing experience of surrendering three wickets without a run being scored. In the first over Seldon was dismissed by Kendall for obstruction, and Borton came in to join Hoare, who had steadfastly kept his wicket intact in the previous innings. It was a great shock to Devon when Hoare had his wicket shattered by the first ball delivered by Ollerearnshaw, and the same bowler sent back Borton, still without a run on the board. After the lunch interval Watts and Emmett temporarily stopped the rot, putting on 24 before the fourth wicket fell, Emmett being smartly caught behind the wicket by Bickford, off Kendall. The Devon captain, F. H. Carroll 14 runs later, was caught by the opposing captain, and half the side were out for 38. Devon's hopes of escaping an innings defeat seemed to vanish, especially as the sixth wicket dropped at the same total. Ollerearnshaw and Kendall were bowling in deadly fashion, but Myburgh played with great courage in an attempt to subdue the bowlers and to save his side from a complete rout. He collected 26 runs before succumbing to a catch by Hosking almost on the boundary line, and the innings closed for 88 runs. The dismissal of Devon for such a small score was a tribute to the effective bowling by Kendall and Ollerearnshaw, backed up by keen fielding. The St. Just pro. claimed six wickets for 46, and the Truro man got four for 28. Scores:

POOR DISPLAY BY CORNWALL

DORSET EARLY SECURE ADVANTAGE

Cornish batsmen made a very poor show at Camborne yesterday in the opening of their Minor Counties match against Dorset. There was no aggressiveness, and runs were scanty.

When Dorset went in to bat in the afternoon it looked as if they were going to repeat Cornwall's failure, for they lost their first wicket without scoring at the end of the first over. But they quickly recovered, thanks to Warren, White, and Tindall. The Cornish field was not so skilfully placed as it might have been, and the visitors scored frequently through unguarded spaces.

At the end of the first day's play Dorset had scored 171 for 4 wickets as compared with Cornwall's 94 all out.

OUTSET DISAPPOINTING.

The outset of the day was very disappointing, for rain made it impossible to begin until within half an hour of lunch time. The home county won the toss, and Cory (W.) and L. Martin opened their innings to the bowling of Tindall and Harrison. These two bowlers remained in action throughout the short innings. Cory found the boundary three times early on, but just before lunch a ball from Tindall glanced off his pad and scattered his wicket.

Bax and Martin settled down to a steady partnership after lunch, but they were very careful, and except for an occasional nice stroke to the boundary play was dull. Bax was eventually clean bowled by Tindall. T. Heath followed Bax in, and enlivened matters with some stylish batting. Martin was missed in the slips once, and he was in for an hour and 25 minutes before Tindall got his wicket.

BATSMEN MASTERED

After this there was no suggestion of a stand. Hosking made a few uncertain strokes and was caught by Elderton behind the wicket from a ball by Harrison, who with his next ball sent Harry back. Rogers found the boundary once, but the next time he tried it White caught him on the line.

Kendall scored a 4 and a 2 before he fell a victim to Tindall. Bickford tried hitting out, but Eban caught him before his innings was very old. Mill was the last man in, but before he could get a knock Heath was caught behind the wicket, and the innings closed.

STAND FOR DORSET.

Brockway and Warren opened for Dorset, and with the last ball of his first over Kendall took Brockway's wicket. This omen, however, did not materialize. Twice during the afternoon the field had to be abandoned on account of light showers, but when the batsmen were at the wickets they seemed to be immovable. Warren and White made a splendid partnership, batting carefully, and yet scoring with very nice shots. White had 33 to his credit when Harry eventually defeated him. A few minutes later Harry caught Warren from his own ball.

Tovey and Tindall made another stand. Once Tindall put Harry out of the field for a beautiful 6. The bowlers were changed repeatedly, but with little effect. Kendall eventually got Tovey's wicket for 15, but Tindall was not out at 76 when play was adjourned. Dorset passed Cornwall's score at the price of only 3 wickets. Scores:—

CORNWALL FAIL

DEFEATED BY TEN WICKETS

MORE WEAK BATTING AT CAMBORNE

Dorset won their Minor Counties match against Cornwall at Camborne on Saturday by ten wickets. It was one of the dullest matches seen for some time, and was thoroughly disappointing to the spectators. It finished an hour after lunch on Saturday.

Cornwall went within an ace of being defeated by an innings, preventing it by only two runs. Dorset scored these off the first ball in their second innings.

There were heavy showers in the early part of the morning, but these did not delay the resumption of play. Tindall and E. J. Freeman continued their innings for Dorset. CORNWALL SUBDUED

BATTING FAILURES AGAINST DORSET AT CAMBORNE

Cornwall gave a lamentably feeble display in the Minor Counties match with Dorset, at Camborne on Friday and Saturday being defeated by ten wickets and one run. The failure of the leading batsmen in both innings was a sad disappointment, and it will be a surprise if several changes are not made for the concluding engagement with Surrey 2nd XI. at Penzance on Friday and Saturday. Dismissing Cornwall for 94 in the first innings Dorset were 77 runs ahead with six wickets in hand at the close of play, on Friday, but when the game was resumed on Saturday morning the Cornish bowlers rose to the occasion and polished off the remaining six wickets for the addition of only 32 runs. Cornwall were 109 runs in arrears when they took their second knock, and it was hoped that they would atone for their earlier failure, but their second effort was little better than the first, the innings yielding only 110 runs.

Rain delayed the start on Friday morning, only half an hour's play being possible before lunch. Winning the toss, Cornwall took first knock, but the home batsmen gave a dismal display and lacked aggressiveness, the whole side being dismissed for 94 runs. Cory and Martin opened the innings, but runs came at a slow pace, and only 24 was on the board before Cory fell a victim to Tindall. Bax joined Martin and the pair playing cautiously, gradually raised the score to 47, when Bax succumbed to Tindall, his contribution being 10. T. Heath, of St. Buryan, who is captain of Clifton College making his debut for the Duchy, joined Martin, and showed a solid defence, remaining until the last wicket, when he was caught behind the stumps by Elderton of Harrison, for 13. Martin, of St. Austell, again proved his worth as a stout defender, staying at the wickets for 80 minutes to collect his 23 runs, the best individual effort. Tindall, who was bowling with speed and accuracy, claiming his wicket. K. Hosking, of Camborne, was expected to brighten the hopes of the Cornishmen by the vigorous hitting for which he is noted but his stay was short, for after registering a couple of runs, Elderton snapped him up behind the wicket, off Harrison's bowling.

Disaster follows Disaster

Four wickets were down for 61 runs, and disaster followed disaster, Harry being sent back by Harrison without adding to the score, two wickets falling to Harrison off successive balls. G. Rogers hit Harrison to the boundary, but two balls later he was caught almost on the boundary line off the same bowler. The Cornish skipper, H. Tresawna, was next in, but he failed to retrieve the fortunes of his side being out to the first ball he received from Tindall. With seven wickets down for 65, Cornwall were in a sad plight, and after Kendall hit a boundary off Tindall and a two, he had his wicket shattered by Tindall. A stand by Bickford and Heath produced 23 runs before the ninth wicket fell, Bickford hitting with power for his 16, taking the score to six short of the century, when he was caught by Ebans, off Harrison. With the score unaltered, Heath was caught behind the wicket by Elderton and the innings closed for 94. Harrison and Tindall bowled unchanged, the former claiming five wickets for 34, and the latter five for 56. The Dorset fielding was exceptionally good. Tindall, an Oxford Blue, who had the distinction of claiming five for 90 against Australia this season, had five men placed on the leg side. Harrison has been playing for Dorset since 1907.

Dorset made an inauspicious start, losing Brockway before a run was registered. Kendall bowling him with the last ball of his first over. But Warren and White made amends, putting on 55 before White was beaten by Harry for 33. Seven runs later, Warren was smartly caught by Harry, holding a hot return low down. Tindall lived up things by some hearty hitting, twice lifting Harry out of the ground for 6, and the century was soon passed, despite frequent changes in the Cornish attack. Kendall, Mill, Harry and Heath bowling in turn. There was evidence that Cornwall

was suffering through the absence of Oller-carnshaw who was suffering from a pulled muscle in the leg. At 130 Kendall disposed of Tovey for 15, but Tindall and E. J. Freeman remained together until the close of play, the total then being 174, of which Tindall was responsible for 74.

Innings Defeat SAVED

Less than an hour sufficed, on Saturday morning, to dispose of the remaining six Dorset wickets for the addition of only 32 runs. Tindall, who gave such a glorious display on the previous day, failed to add to his overnight score of 76, being caught in the slips by Martin off Mill. Seven runs later D. Freeman was caught by Mill off Kendall and the visiting captain, Elderton, was a short stayer, being caught by Bax off Mill for two. Seven wickets were down for 185 and when the total was one short of the 200 mark Busk was neatly taken in the slips by Martin off Mill for five. At 200 E. J. Freeman, after a stay of over one hour fell a victim to Mill, for a patient innings for 19. Kendall disposed of Harrison for two and the innings concluded for 203.

Starting their second venture 109 runs behind, Cornwall made several changes in the batting order Cory and Rogers being sent in first, and it was hoped that a large portion of the arrears would be wiped off without loss, but again the home supporters were disappointed. Tindall and Harrison each bowled a couple of overs, and then Busk was put 'on'. His first two deliveries were sent to the boundary by Rogers, but the third shattered Rogers' wicket with the total at 18, of which the outgoing batsman made 12. Hosking failed to reproduce his best form, and left after making 12. Brockway catching him in the slips off Harrison, and Cory was caught by Ebans off Harrison, three wickets being down for 36. Martin settled down promisingly, but after making 14 he was out l.b.w. to Tindall. The half-century was hoisted by Bax and Heath, but with only three more added, Heath was bowled by Busk. Harry had the unhappy experience of being twice dismissed without getting a run, and six wickets were down for 56.

Cornwall were then in a hopeless plight, and there was speculation as to whether they would avert an innings defeat. Bax, who had been batting patiently was joined by Tresawna, and this pair made a commendable stand to retrieve the position. After a partnership yielding 40 runs, the captain was caught behind the wicket. Kendall collected a couple of runs and was sent back by Tindall with the total at 98. The century was hoisted with Bax and Blokford together, and the former twice hit Harrison to the boundary, but in the next over Blokford fell a victim to Tindall. When Mill went in for the last wicket, Cornwall still needed one run to escape an innings defeat. Bax notched another couple of runs, but was caught by Brockway off Harrison the innings closing for 110. Bax made a praiseworthy effort by preventing a total collapse, and richly earned the appreciation by the spectators.

Dorset required a single run for victory when they went in a second time, and the match had a tame ending. Tresawna, who has not bowled in county engagements for many seasons, took the ball and sent up a full toss for Harrison to hit for two, and Dorset thus won by ten wickets and one run.

CRICKET

CORNWALL FAIL

DECISIVE WIN BY SURREY
SECONDS AT PENZANCE

Cornwall met Surrey 2nd XI. at Penzance, on Friday and Saturday, in the last of their Minor Counties matches this season, and were decisively beaten by seven wickets—190 and 127 (for three wickets), to 163 and 162. With only one victory gained this season, Cornwall made several changes in the side, but the batting generally was far from a success against the strong Surrey team. L. Martin (St. Austell), V. Barnes (Truro), and F. M. N. Heath (Clifton College) were the most impressive with the bat. Most credit for Surrey's victory goes to W. T. Cook, the veteran captain, who gave a polished display of batting.

Through the inability of E. M. Cunnack (Helston), to play, C. V. Paull (Camborne), was called in to captain the team. Winning the toss, Surrey put Cornwall in to bat, and V. Barnes and L. Martin opened the innings to the bowling of Parker and K. McCanlis. Cornwall started disastrously, and in less than half an hour three batsmen were sent back for niggardly scores. The Surrey fast bowlers were keeping a good length, and after two overs, Barnes, who had collected only two angles, chopped up a simple catch to W. T. Cook, the Surrey captain, at short-leg. This was off the bowling of Parker, who was also responsible for sending O. E. B. Bax back with the total at eight, H. Crouch bringing off a neat catch at second slip. Ken Hosking joined Martin, but his stay was short, for after he survived an appeal for a catch by Mobery, the Surrey wicket-keeper, he had his off stump knocked back by McCanlis. Three good wickets were down for a meagre score of 15, and Cornwall were in a bad plight.

Martin was batting steadily and taking no risk, and, joined by C. V. Paull, the pair made a splendid effort to stop the rot. Changes were made in the bowling, and although the rate of scoring was fairly slow, the Surrey attack was kept at bay. The score gradually mounted, Stephens making some splendid strokes to the leg boundary, and after 40 minutes play Martin sent up the 30. Paull square-cut Owen beautifully. Buss, the Surrey left-hand spin bowler, was brought on and Martin and Paull seemed to be scoring a little faster, but with the total at 42, Paull was beaten by Buss with a leg-break and had his wicket broken. The partnership had produced 27 runs, of which Paull claimed 15. Another profitable stand was made by Martin and Ollerenshaw, in which the latter was content to keep his end up while Martin did the scoring. Another 26 runs were added when Ollerenshaw was bowled by Owen, and half the Cornish side were out for 68. Batting well, Martin was pulling Cornwall out of the mire and when he sent the ball to the boundary and reached his 50, he received a great ovation. After a shaky start, F. M. N. Heath settled down to some good play, and contributed a valuable 18 when he was beaten by a ball from Maxwell. Soon after Martin succumbed to a catch by McCanlis, off Crouch, with the total at 108, of which he had scored 55.

Brilliant Catch

After lunch Harry and Addicoat brought the score to 139, and both scored from very fine strokes. A brilliant catch by Mobery behind the wicket disposed of Addicoat, and Kendall was sent back without scoring. Mill did not stay, and the innings closed for 163, Harry being unbeaten with 24 runs to his credit.

The Surrey innings was opened by Mobery and McMurray, and the former put plenty of zest into his batting, and scored all the first ten runs. Twice he hit Kendall to the boundary, but with the score at 20, Mobery lost his wicket leg before to Kendall. Parker joined McMurray, and was fortunate to be missed off a couple of poor strokes. One snick in the slips sent the ball just out of Martin's reach, while Parker also cocked up a ball dangerously near to Hosking at short leg. A smart throw in by

Heath saw Parker nearly run out. Ollerenshaw was relieved by Mill, who in his first over, got Parker brilliantly caught in the slips by Martin. W. T. Cook and McMurray put on 20 runs for the third wicket, and the latter, who showed sound defence, was eventually clean bowled by Harry after scoring 31. Cook and H. Crouch were now together, and the pair offered such splendid resistance that no success came Cornwall's way until after the tea interval. Despite frequent changes in the bowling, the score steadily mounted from 87 to 127, when at last a beautiful ball by Harry got Crouch's wicket, after he had scored 30. Cook was batting admirably, combining sound defence with sure hitting. His principal scoring strokes were on the leg side, but soon after he had reached his 50, Harry secured his wicket for obstruction. A splendid catch by Addicoat, behind the wicket off Ollerenshaw's bowling, quickly disposed of J. A. Seward, and six Surrey wickets were down with the total at 148—five runs behind the Cornwall score. Buss knocked a boundary off Harry, but mistimed the next ball in attempting another drive, and was stumped by Addicoat. Seven wickets were now down with the scores level. T. A. Maxwell scored freely, and knocked up 29 runs. The remaining batsmen were cheaply dismissed, and the innings closed for 190 runs. The best bowling analysis was returned by Harry, who claimed four wickets for 37 runs. Kendall bowled fast and accurately, but had no luck, and in 16 overs had 61 runs knocked off for one wicket.

About half an hour's play remained, and during this period Cornwall opened their second innings and obtained 28 runs for the loss of one wicket. Martin and Bax started against the bowling of Parker and Maxwell, but with only five runs on the board, Martin was caught by Mobery behind the wicket. As the light was failing, the Cornish captain sent Kendall in to join Bax, saving the better batsmen for the following day's play.

Promising Start

Resuming on Saturday, Bax and Kendall took the score to 38 before Kendall fell a victim to Owen, being caught by Crouch after scoring 13. Ken Hosking, joining Bax, started in promising style with a boundary, and seemed as if he would be set for a good score, but he gave Seward an easy catch at mid-off off Owen. A fine catch by Mobery sent Bax back after he had contributed 22. With the total at 67 for four wickets, Barnes exercised caution and took no chances. C. V. Paull only remained for one over, Mobery taking a spectacular catch behind the wicket off Maxwell. With Barnes and Ollerenshaw together, runs came at a quicker pace, and Barnes was finding the boundary with some excellent strokes, getting two 4's in succession off Crouch. Ollerenshaw fell to a catch by Buss in the deep, and Heath, who followed, began to liven up matters with two beautiful boundary shots. The score rose to 100, and both batsmen were shaping well. The partnership added 51 runs. With the score at 126, Mobery made his fourth catch of the innings, Barnes being dismissed after batting beautifully for 29 runs. Harry was bowled by Maxwell before he could score, and not long after was followed by Heath, who was taken brilliantly in the slips by McCanlis. Scoring 32, Heath gave a very fine display. Addicoat and Mill were together in a last wicket stand, and the latter knocked up 18 before losing his wicket to Pierpoint. The innings closed for 163, and for Surrey, Maxwell had the excellent bowling analysis of five wickets for 20 runs.

Embarking on their second innings, Surrey required 126 runs for a victory, but were given an early shock when Ollerenshaw shattered Mobery's wicket with only three runs on the board. With the total at 15, McMurray was out leg before to Kendall, and Cornwall's chances now looked brighter. Kendall and Ollerenshaw were keeping the Surrey batsmen quiet, but such hopes as Cornwall had were frustrated by Cook and Crouch, who soon put the issue beyond doubt. Batting confidently, they raised the score from 15 to 81, when Mill held a difficult catch close in at fine leg, to dispose of Crouch, who had collected 34 runs. Parker scored nine in his first over from Mill, who was displaced by Heath, but Cook made two beautiful drives to the boundary, and 100 runs were soon on the board. Heath was proving expensive, and off his bowling, Cook hit the first six for the match. The pair were still together when the Cornwall total was passed, Parker making the winning hit for a two.
