# Cricket Notes

DENBIGH'S FAILURES.

Denbigh's concluding games in the Minor County Competition. last week, resulted in each case in an innings defeat.

Batting failures by men who were expected to make runs was the cause of their defeats. Who would have thought that Wilfred Wooller would have been dismissed for four singles in successive innings? Apart from that, he only took one wicket.

Gwyn Evans, E. F. Goodwin, D. L. Hughes, Cyril Rowland and E. A. Barlow were the only batsmen to show their real capabilities. Davies, the Sefton pro., who is, of course, not a batsman, has only scored two singles in eight innings, and his 13 wickets have been gathered at a cost of over 25 each.

On parer, Denbigh had a side out which looked strong enough to win. In the Minor Counties Competition, however, they have two points to their credit as against none last season.

THE FUTURE.

During the match at Wrexham there was a discussion as to the future of the club. Whilst Denbigh play their present opponents they have little chance of winning a game unless the side is strengthened. If there were only two good pros. in the county who were available for every match they would stiffen the side.

The lesson of the present season should be learnt. There need to be more keenness in the field, and a better team spirit should prevail. There has been far too much criticism of each other's play.

The county is to carry on. That is certain. A meeting of the affiliated clubs is to be held at an early date, at which the future policy of the club will be discussed. Outsiders little realise the rivalry which exists between the East and West ends of the county. I have been amazed at the expressions of opinion that have been made on this matter recently.

Cheshire have already made fixtures with Denbighshire for next season. They will meet on four successive days. One game will probably be played at Neston, which club has offered to guarantee the sum of £20 towards the expenses. If only a Welsh club could do the same!

FACTS AND FIGURES.
Denbighshire in 15 innings have scored 1,570 runs for the loss of 143 wickets, averaging 10 a wicket. This is in striking contrast to their opponents, who have scored 1939 runs for the loss of 73 wickets, an average of 26 each.

Denblish have tried 20 bowlers, thirteen of whom took wickets. Only three bowlers have taken more than ien wickets.

EXPENSES CUT.

The county have cut their expenses right down to the minimum. Four away games have been played at a cost of under £10; less than half of what a home match costs. This has been done as a result of Northumberland and Durham paying the hotelills of the side when in the North, and the fact that not a penny has been spent by the county on travelling expenses.

Some players have also paid their own hotel bills. No county in the country can boast of this. Another £20 in subscriptions would have enabled the county to pay its way this season.

Had the gate at Wrexham realised expectations the county would have been in a better financial position. They have a share of the Australian profits to come, and this will enable them to pay off their old debts and carry them through next

# DENBIGHSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

### A REVIEW OF THE SEASON
