

OXFORDSHIRE v. UNIVERSITY "A" TEAM.

The County opened their season in the Parks on Monday and Tuesday, when they played a drawn game with the University "A" team. The ex-Magdalen College School boy, Burrell, was given a first trial, and the two ex-Gloucestershire players, Rogers and Haynes, were included.

The University won the toss on an easy-paced wicket, and scored 328. S. C. B. Lee tried six bowlers. Unfortunately neither Rogers, Halliday nor Ferriman could get any life into their deliveries, and though Haynes bowled steadily, the pitch was not fast enough for him. It was left to O'Shea to do the damage, and his analysis of five for 68 was a really good performance. He was very quick off the pitch, making the ball rip through at times, and the one with which he bowled Lee was a particularly fine one.

When the county went in to bat Evetts, Halliday and Inge were soon out, and Lee and Webb made the first stand of note—58. Both were out soon after lunch, and then Haynes and Burrell stayed together in another partnership of 79. Haynes drove well on the off-side, and seemed to get himself out. His batting has greatly improved, and he looks like becoming a very useful member of the side. Burrell is more of a hitter, and scores chiefly by means of on drives. Both he and Haynes are sound fieldsmen. There was no time to complete the game, so stumps were drawn on Tuesday at six. Considering the cold weather and the fact that the whole side lacked match practice, the form was encouraging, but it looks as if the slip fielding will need to be improved. MINOR COUNTIES CHAMPIONSHIP.

DORSETSHIRE V. OXFORDSHIRE.

ATTRACTIVE FIXTURE FOR BANK HOLIDAY.

In their first match of the present season in the Minor Counties Championship at Wimborne on Friday and Saturday last, Oxfordshire compelled their opponents to follow on. Dorsetshire did better at the second attempt and declared, but as they could not get out their opponents a second time, Oxfordshire won the points for the first innings lead.

S. C. B. Lee commenced his captaincy by winning the toss, and so well did his batsmen respond that the total realized 303. Walker was out early, and then followed a long partnership between Halliday and Lee. The captain was unfortunate to be run out, but Haynes provided Halliday with another reliable partner, and though Walters failed, Guilfoyle and Burrell proved that the faith of the selectors in them was justified.

Halliday's First County Century.

Halliday went on to complete his first century for Oxfordshire. When he had settled down he batted like a really first-rate batsman, getting well over the bowling for his defensive strokes and hitting the over-pitched one hard and cleanly. It was an innings on which he can look back with complete satisfaction. Haynes did not suffer in comparison, and when these two young batsmen were well set it looked as if they would never get out. After their departure Guilfoyle struck his local form in County cricket, and Burrell, who seems satiated with confidence, batted nicely for 27.

Having got the runs, it was now the task of the Oxfordshire bowlers to get Dorset out, and they did so on a good wicket for 200 runs. It will be noticed that the wickets were shared by O'Shea, Haynes and Walters. Dorset had to follow on, and this time did better, though had obvious catches to the wicket-keeper not been negatived and had Jarchow been run out before he had scored, the result would have been different.

As it was, Dorset were in a position to declare, and they left Oxfordshire one and a half hours in which to get 160 runs. No attempt was made to obtain them as the pitch was showing signs of wear, and the result was a draw.

The performance must be considered a good one in view of the fact that it was a first game, and that Lee had had little time to get his reins on his team. Cole kept wicket well, and was unlucky to catch one of his judges out of form. The clicks were heard in the pavilion, and at least one batsman started to walk away.

The batting and bowling were satisfactory, and though he did not get a wicket Rogers proved that he is still quite fast. Haynes and O'Shea were the pick of the bowlers, and Walters was not so consistent as usual.

Next Monday's Match

The next County engagement is against Bucks, commencing on Monday on the Merton ground. This is the first time for many years Oxfordshire has had a Bank Holiday fixture at Oxford, and it is to be hoped the public will turn up in good numbers. I hear that Bucks will include a "googly" bowler, who used to assist Nelson when Edwards played for the Club in the Lancashire League. He now assists Ascott, the club run by one of the Rothschild's.

RAIN INTERVENES AND SPOILS THE MATCH.

The experiment of playing a Bank Holiday fixture in Oxford was quite a success, over 400 paying to see the Oxon and Bucks match on the Merton ground on Monday.

Unfortunately, however, not a ball could be bowled on Tuesday and the game had to be abandoned with Oxon getting points for first innings lead, as they had done in their first game at Wimborne against Dorset.

Monday opened with rain, but it cleared and stumps were pitched at the usual time. It was a bit of a problem to decide to go in, but Lee did not hesitate, probably arguing that in the absence of further rain the pitch would not worsen instead of better, which, actually, it did.

Halliday's Fine Innings.

The start was disastrous, Lee, Haines and Haynes all being out for four runs, while Halliday was missed at the wicket before he had scored. The ball was not turning much, but it was coming off at varying paces and lifting quite a lot. Walters helped Halliday in the first stand by putting on 56, but he and Gullfoyle went the same over and at lunch the score was 64 for five. M. H. Lee then made some good hits and before he was dismissed 50 had been put on, but except Rogers, who played a real hitter's role, the rest did little and the innings closed for 172. Halliday carried his bat for 76. Considering the difficulties of the pitch and the uncertainty of the batting at the other end, it was an innings of great skill. He gave chances and he made false strokes, but it was no mean feat to stay in for nearly four hours and remain undefeated. It is probably the best innings he has ever played for the County.

When Bucks went in they made an equally unpromising start, half the side being out for 64. Badham and Franklin, with the ball turning considerably, took their lives in their hands and scored several boundaries, but keen fielding and good catching kept the score down and Bucks finished up 29 in arrears.

Haynes Best Oxford Bowler.

Haynes seemed the most difficult of the Oxfordshire bowlers and would have been even more so did he bowl his spinner on the wicket. Rogers kept up his pace well and bowled some unplayable balls, but O'Shea was a bit short and also was apt to send down too many half-volleys. He bowled James and Baker with really good balls. M. H. Lee and Rogers made two fine catches and nothing was given away in the field. In the last 20 minutes' play Lee and Halliday scored 27 and so gave Oxfordshire a lead of 56 runs.

Edwards hurt his finger in the Oxfordshire first innings and had to have two stitches put in. He is a doubtful starter for the return game which commences at Wycombe to-day. Score:—

BUCKS V. OXFORDSHIRE.

A RISK WHICH WAS NOT TAKEN.

This game between Bucks and Oxfordshire at High Wycombe on Friday and Saturday was drawn. Bucks took points for first innings lead, but when stumps were drawn after the extra half-hour had been claimed Oxfordshire were in the stronger position—31 to win and four wickets in hand.

A Debateable Point.

It is a moot point whether Oxfordshire should not have attempted to get the runs instead of adopting a safety-first policy. The position was this. Bucks declared their second innings closed just after 3.30 and left Oxon two and a half hours in which to get 199 runs. Probably had the team been instructed to go all out for victory and failed, Lee would have been criticised. He decided that the risk was too great, but even so the team were generally well up with the clock, and had one or two wickets not been thrown away needlessly, Bucks still might have been beaten.

Lee lost the toss for the first time this season, an unfortunate circumstance, as Edwards was not playing and Rutter did not arrive till after lunch. In the circumstances the County did well to dispose of Bucks for 179, and they would have had them out for less had not a storm, when eight were out for 131, made the ball wet for the bowlers. J. Rogers and O'Shea shared the wickets, and the latter with five for 12 showed his best form of the season.

Good Innings by Haynes.

The features of the Oxfordshire batting was an innings of 70 by Haynes and the steadiness of Bowtell. I have never seen Haynes play a better innings. His strokes were made in plenty of time, and he was not at all ruffled by the failure of his colleagues. He looked, indeed, the complete master of the attack, even of Rutter, who, as usual, maintained a fine pace for a long stretch. Bowtell kept up an end for three-quarters of an hour, and did his side yeoman service. Oxfordshire finished up 27 in arrears on the first innings.

Going in a second time, Bucks made a good start, but half the side were out for 130, and with six wickets down for 171 the innings was declared.

Jack Halliday Again.

As stated there was a possibility of Oxfordshire getting the runs. Bowtell, in view of his good batting in the first innings, opened with Halliday, and the latter was in his most dashing form. Two were out for 29 when Walters joined Halliday, and these two took the score to 87, but L. Rogers failed for the second time when a quarter of an hour of his hotting might have turned the scale. Guilfoyle and the two Lees each made useful contributions, but by this time a draw was inevitable, though the big batting of M. H. Lee made the dying moments of an interesting game anything but dull.

**EXTRAORDINARY BATTING
COLLAPSES ON PERFECT WICKET.**

Oxfordshire gained their second consecutive right win in the Minor Counties Championship, when, on Tuesday and Wednesday on the St. John's ground, they beat Monmouth by ten wickets.

The cricket was of rather an unusual character. Batting first on a pitch full of grass, but in a wind which may have caused the ball to do some thing not discernible from the ring, Monmouth had up 140 for one wicket at lunch on the first day. Resuming, they were all out for 177, the last nine wickets actually falling for 33 runs. The batting, after Allan and Pitchford had been parted, did not look sound, and Walters, Rogers and O'Shea were probably flattered by their analyses.

A. B. Senior's Fine Debut.

The batting successes for Oxfordshire were Walker, Halliday, S. C. B. Lee and Senior. The latter made a most gratifying debut for the County. Not only did he make 100 score, but his fielding at cover was full of life, the ball being picked up cleanly and the return made accurately. When he had been in some time on Tuesday he was inclined to treat the bowling rather contemptuously, but a timely word from his captain proved effective, and he kept up his end, as it was desired he should do. Quick of eye and foot, he always seems to have plenty of time for his strokes, and thus, allied to confidence and good defence, stamps him as a batsman who ought to get a lot of runs in Minor County cricket.

The captain played as he always does, with great watchfulness and patience, and Walker and Halliday showed that if they could play more together they would be the ideal opening pair.

The Oxfordshire Bowling.

The Oxfordshire bowlers did all that was asked of them, and it was a pleasure to find Walters returning an analysis for the match of ten for 88. His bowling in the earlier matches suggested he had lost some of his nip from the pitch and also his consistency of length, but against Monmouth he appeared to be bowling as well as ever.

MINOR COUNTIES COMPETITION.

OXFORDSHIRE'S BRILLIANT WIN OVER BERKSHIRE.

Last week on the Merton College ground, Oxfordshire beat Berkshire in the Minor Counties Competition by 72 runs and thus atoned for their failure at Reading a fortnight earlier.

It will be recalled from our last issue that when the game closed on Thursday night Oxfordshire, with three wickets in hand, were leading by 85 runs, a by no means favourable position.

S. C. B. Lee Sets an example.

West accompanied the captain to the wicket on Friday and stayed there while 53 runs were added—clear indication that Oxfordshire intended to make a fight of it. Ultimately the innings closed for 211, which, considering that six of the side were out for 90, was a wonderfully good achievement. S. C. B. Lee was last out, caught off his gloves—an ominous incident which must have put heart into the Oxfordshire bowlers. Lee played his usual sound and watchful cricket. He came in when the side were in a tight corner, and succeeded in turning the game, as he frequently does, and putting them on the road to victory. He is still, after so many years in the game, the most dependable batsman on the side.

The Oxfordshire Bowlers.

Berkshire were set 139 to win, not an impossible task and some thought a comparatively easy one. There were rumours, however, that the pitch was worn at both ends and that there were 'spots' on it. From Oxfordshire's point of view a great deal—everything, in fact—depended on whether their bowlers could take advantage of this. A quite brilliant catch by West at first slip started Berkshire on the downward path and their wickets continued to fall at regular intervals, and just after lunch the last man was out and the total was only 66—their lowest score and the lowest total for which the Oxfordshire bowlers have dismissed a side this season.

S. C. B. Lee's fighting innings, well backed up by Haynes and M. H. Lee, gave Oxfordshire their first chance. Then West's catch put them on their toes, and Rogers, O'Shea and Walters completed the debacle.

O'Shea made the ball lift and break-back quickly, and he occasionally used the one which goes with the arm, while Walters mixed his deliveries cleverly, fighting the ball and varying his pace as he can when he is in his best form.

This was undoubtedly Oxford's best performance of the season, and it was their third successive win in the competition. Score and analysis:—

SOUTH OXFORD'S FIRST WIN FOR 29 YEARS.

The Airey Cup final between Morris Motors H. and South Oxford was played on the Christ Church ground on Friday and Saturday, when South Oxford won by three wickets. This is the first time they have won the cup and medals (presented to them by Mr J. R. F. Turner) since 1905, when their representatives beat Norham by five wickets.

On the opening day South Oxford secured a useful lead of 44 runs. OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET.

STATISTICS OF THE 1934 SEASON.

THE STRONG AND WEAK POINTS OF THE TEAM.

The Oxfordshire County Cricket Club concluded their 1934 season last week.

Playing two more fixtures than last year, when they won two games and lost three, they returned a much better record, winning four outright of their ten matches, against two 12 months ago.

At the commencement of the season Capt. B. J. Henry was obliged to resign the captaincy of the Club, and his decision was regretted as much by his opponents as it was by members of the County Club. His work for Oxfordshire cricket cannot be over-estimated. His retirement set the County Committee more than the problem of finding his successor. The latter task was comparatively simple, S. C. B. Lee being the obvious choice. Other matters, business and financial, faced the reconstructed Management Committee, and were placed on a more business-like footing than had previously been the case.

The Trial Games.

Prior to the commencement of the Minor Counties matches a number of trial games were held, two in Oxford and one each at Witney and Banbury. These trial games enabled the Club to try out no less than 24 players, and some very promising material was unearthed. It is to be hoped that if these games are repeated another year, neither the players who take part in them nor the clubs to whom fixtures are given, will misunderstand their purport. Young players should make every effort to take part in them and if they are really desirous to get on should not mind sacrificing a club game.

Absentee Players.

S. C. B. Lee began his period as captain at Wimborne, where Oxfordshire met Dorset for the first time. Of last year's players it was then known that J. A. Evetts, J. Barnby, W. J. Godfrey and Lieut.-Commander R. J. Shaw would not be able to play at all, and that H. Walker would be available for only a few matches. It was also obvious from the trials that neither B. Ferriman nor E. F. Bowtell, who had bowled so well the previous year, could be regarded as reliable stock bowlers. As off-sets to these losses were the great improvement shown by J. G. Halliday, the increased experience of Dr. J. P. O'Shea, and the return to the County of the two young players who had been on trial with Gloucestershire, J. Rogers and R. W. Haynes. As matters panned out the team was probably a better one than last season. The bowling was certainly stronger, and had either Evetts or Walker been able to play at all regularly, and so provided Halliday with a reliable first-wicket partner, the batting could probably be placed in the same category. The fielding, however, with a few notable exceptions, remained very in and out, and till West came into the side there was no really reliable slip fieldsmen, as, owing to his versatility, it was often found necessary to place Haynes, a really first-class slip, anywhere he was wanted. No young bowler or batsman who is

hoping in the future to get trials in the County XI., can expect to do so unless he can show an efficient record as a fieldsmen.

S. C. B. Lee's Task.

No light task faced the new captain, who first had to know the idiosyncracies of his players, then find out their weakness and strength and, finally—and this with changes to be made in every game—weld them into a side. To such a conscientious and studious cricketer as S. C. B. Lee this meant much hard thinking and perhaps some uneasy moments. Results, however, speak for themselves. The new captain proved equal to the job, as those who knew him personally thought he would.

In regard to the batting it was perhaps not so consistently good as was to be desired. There was no adequate successor to J. A. Evetts to take the sting out of the bowling (except when H. Walker was available) and there was an inconsistency in the middle of the side that often led to a breakdown. Had there been a regular No. 1 and a 5, 6 and 7 who could be depended on for runs, Oxfordshire would have had a much stronger batting side.

J. G. Halliday and R. W. Haynes.

It is pleasant to record that two of the batting successes were young cricketers, Halliday and Haynes, of whom Oxfordshire may reasonably expect many years' useful service. To those who recall the unledged Halliday of 1933 and compare him with the almost fully developed player of 1934, the comparison is quite remarkable and he should, with his painstaking turn of mind and tremendous keenness, be an even better player next year. Even the fact that he took on the thankless job of team secretary did not worry him in the least, but only served to emphasise his fitness for the job. Haynes, who had little cricket last season, owing to being twelfth man so often in the Gloucestershire team and could not play regularly till July, was another vastly-improved cricketer, and personally I never wish to see a better innings than that which he played at Wycombe when Rutter was bowling his fastest. As he has only just passed his 21st birthday, and is moreover a very fast and lively fieldsmen, his future seems full of promise, and if he will devote some time to improving his action and getting more bodywork into his bowling, no cricketer of his age could be more sure of going right to the top.

Among the other batsmen, S. C. B. Lee (as usual), F. G. Crawshaw, J. Gullfoyle, H. Walker, J. B. Senior (a newcomer), M. H. Lee, W. W. Inge and Walters all played some good innings, while L. Carter, W. P. Haines and D. E. Edwards are the type of sound batsmen who it is hoped will be available more often next season.

The Strength of the Bowling.

The bowling, in the hands of J. P. O'Shea, J. Rogers, Walters and R. W. Haynes, with Gullfoyle, Crawshaw, Halliday, Bowtell and the skipper to come on occasionally as changes, was the strongest the County has had since the days of Aubrey Bowles.

Dick Thomas and Frank Hartley. The experience which Rogers gained in first-class cricket was most marked. He bowled much more within his strength, took a shorter run and could keep on for longer stretches. If he did not appear so fast through the air, he was quicker off the pitch and in all respects a much better bowler than when he left Oxford two years ago. O'Shea, who made such a promising debut last season, was an even more useful bowler this. He was probably as fast as Rogers and at times his swing and quick break-back were quite devastating. Oxfordshire were, indeed, lucky to have two such fast bowlers to bear the brunt of the campaign. Walters once more returns good figures. There was a period at the beginning of the season when he seemed to have lost his consistent length and his nip from the pitch. Certain County batsmen said he was easier to play and yet, judging him on figures, he was just the same steady stock bowler that every captain desires to have on his side and he should remain so for many years to come.

Haynes, slow left-hand, naturally prefers pitches less like turnpike roads. Even so, he bowled well at times, and he would be even better if he could learn to flight the ball and made more use of his body. His present action is not that of the ideal slow bowler, and in his own interests he would do well to correct it. If he can, I feel sure he will go far, as he has everything else in his favour, temperament, keenness and a most pleasant disposition.

It is an accepted axiom that no captain desires to have more than four bowlers on his side. Often S. C. B. Lee had more and found himself in a predicament, but when the regular bowlers failed to dislodge a troublesome partnership, bowlers such as the skipper himself, Bowtell, Crawshaw and Guilfoyle often did useful work.

The Fielding Criticised.

There remains the fielding. By no stretch of imagination could Oxfordshire be called a good fielding side. There were exceptions, of course, but generally speaking the team did not move to anticipate the stroke, and some of the out-fielding was so slack that it gave the side an untidy look. One is almost tired of harping on this subject. In comparison with other teams, notably Dorsetshire, Oxfordshire were made to look quite poor. Inge, at the wicket, Haynes anywhere, West in the slips and Senior at cover may be specially mentioned as patterns for others to follow. It is estimated that more than 20 catches were missed in the slips off Rogers alone, and this is not merely discouraging to a fast bowler, but a blot on the fielding reputation of the side.

It is to be hoped another year all the players will devote more attention to running quickly, returning the ball smartly and always throwing it back to the bowler and wicket-keeper, either first bounce or full toss.

New County Caps.

Caps were awarded during the season to Dr. J. P. O'Shea, R. W. Haynes and J. Guilfoyle.
