

## SUFFOLK'S RECOVERY AT LINCOLN.

H. L. PORTER AND J. G. SLEIGH  
IN FINE FORM.

### EFFECTIVE BOWLING BY H. B. GOUNDRY.

Lincoln, Monday.

The newly-formed Suffolk County side journeyed to Lincoln to-day to fulfil their first engagement in the Minor Counties Championship, and, although fielding a young eleven, they gave a very creditable account of themselves in the opening stage of their match with Lincolnshire on the Lindum ground. Batting first, Suffolk began most disastrously, losing three batsmen before 20 runs had been scored; but Porter and Darvill began a splendid recovery, and the later batsmen followed their example, and helped to run up a substantial total.

It was an easy-paced wicket on which Bailey and Porter opened the Suffolk innings, but the visitors were soon in difficulties. Bennett and Wilson, who began Lincolnshire's attack, are both bowlers who can swing the new ball a lot, and this more than anything else was the cause of the early Suffolk batsmen's discomfort. With only 5 scored, Bailey was brilliantly caught at the wicket off an out-swing from Bennett, and in the next over Powell was l.b.w. to one of Wilson's in-swingers.

#### DISMAL BEGINNING.

Porter took two boundaries off Wilson, one with a lovely off drive, but then lost Bell, who was beaten and bowled by a capital ball from Bennett, which came back rather fast. Three wickets down for 17 runs was a dismal beginning, but Porter and Darvill shaped much more confidently, and brought off several excellent scoring strokes, which suggested that the bowlers might not, after all, have everything their own way. Applying themselves to the task of recovery with spirited determination, they so far retrieved the situation that 77 runs were on the board before Darvill unluckily played on.

Porter found another staunch partner in Sleigh, and a fine fifth wicket partnership ensued between this pair, which more than doubled the score. At the luncheon interval Suffolk's score stood at 89 for 4, and, on resuming, both Porter and Sleigh adopted aggressive methods which brought runs at a lively pace. Once or twice Porter edged the ball dangerously through the slips, but otherwise his batting was as sound as it was enterprising. He exploited his favourite off-drive with fine effect.

#### PORTER OUT TO A GOOD CATCH.

Sleigh, too, found plenty of opportunities for vigorous hitting, frequently going out to the pitch of the ball and indulging in some militant driving. Porter reached his 50 after two hours' batting, and continued with an assurance which suggested that he might celebrate his first Minor Counties match with a century, but, having advanced his score to 83, he had a hard drive well held at cover point. He hit one 5 and seven 4's.

By this time the home bowling had deteriorated somewhat in accuracy, and Kent came in to subject it to further severe punishment. While he hit up 40 in as many minutes in merry style, a mighty straight drive for 6 brought Sleigh his half-century, and at the tea interval Suffolk had the satisfaction of seeing a prosperous looking score-board showing a total of 254 for six wickets.

#### BENNETT'S DEADLY SPELL.

On resuming after tea, the Suffolk innings collapsed abruptly before a deadly spell of bowling by Bennett, who captured the last four wickets in two overs, three of them in four balls. Bowling 23 overs in all, he had the remarkable analysis of 7 for 36. He was the one home bowler who maintained his length and accuracy when Suffolk were scoring freely.

Lincolnshire had a hundred minutes batting, but it was rather a calamitous time for them, half the side being dismissed for 69 runs. Goundry took all the first five wickets at a personal cost of 20 runs. He bowled his slows very brainily, and troubled all the batsmen. When stumps were drawn Lincolnshire had scored 103 for the loss of five wickets.

## SUFFOLK TAKE FIRST INNINGS POINTS.

DRAWN GAME AT LINCOLN.

ANOTHER FINE INNINGS BY H. L. PORTER.

Lincoln, Tuesday.

In taking first innings points from Lincolnshire on the Lindum ground at Lincoln to-day, the Suffolk county cricket team gave a distinctly creditable account of themselves in their first match of the Minor Counties Championship. It was a game of changeable fortunes, but honours were evenly divided when stumps were pulled up, Lincolnshire still needing 39 to win with three wickets in hand. Thus, the inexorable decrees of time prevented the enactment of what had every promise of an exciting finish.

The match was notable for the outstanding performances of a few players. Thus, for Suffolk, H. L. Porter carried off the batting honours, with 83 in the first innings and 66 not out in the second, while, on the Lincolnshire side, M. V. Bennett was the dominating personality, coming out with the fine match record of fourteen wickets for 70 runs.

### AN IMPORTANT DROPPED CATCH.

It is probably true to say that the whole trend of the game was materially altered when, at 12.35 by the clock, Ross, the star batsman of the Lincolnshire team and the undisputed saviour of his side, edged a ball from Catchpole into the slips, and Bailey failed to hold the catch. It is sad to have to record the slip of this opportunity, but "magna est veritas et praevalabit." It was a difficult catch, of course, low and travelling fast, and the snick was so fine that the fieldsmen was probably unsuspected by the wicket-keeper; but then, who has ever heard of the game of cricket being so ordained that easy catches are offered in the moment of crisis?

And it was rather a critical moment when this particular ball went fizzing off the outside edge of Ross's valiant bat. When play began on the second day, the only likely prospect of the match being brought to a definite conclusion seemed to hang on the ability of the Suffolk bowlers to make Lincolnshire sell their five outstanding wickets cheaply. Overnight, in response to the substantial Suffolk total of 279, the home side had scored 103 for the loss of half their wickets, so that they still required 77 to avert the indignity of the follow-on. Ross and Bennett, the two not-outs, started as though the question of Lincolnshire playing two innings in succession had never entered their heads. They played the bowling easily, and scored with a freedom which is not usually apposite to the first fifteen minutes' play. Catchpole and Howard were the opening bowlers—they automatically chose themselves if the ancient shibboleth that one should start with one's quickest bowlers were to be obeyed—but it was Goundry who had been the prickliest thorn in Lincolnshire's side overnight, and it was Goundry who had to be called up again to separate Messrs. Ross and Bennett. Goundry came on at 127, and in his second over he dangled a particularly tempting morsel in front of Bennett's eyes. Bennett duly bit it, but not greedily enough, so he had to depart, caught at deep mid-off. In cricket the next worst thing to taking two bites at a cherry is to take only half a bite.

### BATSMAN WHO BOWLED W. G. GRACE.

Then, at the other end, Catchpole did his side an excellent and timely service by getting two quick wickets. It was a very good ball which broke back and skidded off the edge of Major Wilson's bat on to his wicket, and it was by no means a bad one with which he bowled Worman, the 60-year-old veteran who once upon a time had the distinction of bowling W. G. Grace twice in one match. With eight wickets down for 134, Lincolnshire still had a long way to go to save the follow-on, and Ross, who in the meantime had reached his 50 after batting two hours and 25 minutes, thereupon decided that the time was ripe for him to take the bit between his teeth. For a start he clouted Goundry for a couple of 4s in one over, but at 151 Gillatt provided Goundry with his seventh wicket. To follow on or not to follow on—that was the question, and there was quite an exciting interlude of play, before the matter was finally decided in Lincolnshire's favour. Seeing that Green, the last man in, was capable of playing a virtuously straight bat, Ross went all out for the required 29 runs, and got them with a few to spare. But his heart must have come into his mouth when, with the total at 159, and his own score at 66, he tickled that ball from Catchpole and saw it go into and through first slip's hands. Ross scored 22 more valuable runs after this, so at twenty minutes to one Suffolk had to go in to bat again.

### SUFFOLK'S CALAMITOUS HOUR.

But Suffolk had the satisfaction of knowing that they had a lead of 95 runs in their pocket. And, as events turned out, it was just as well they had, for their second innings was a most inglorious affair. A glance at the scores will suggest that it was a tale of one shining achievement surrounded by dismal failure, and so, in fact, it was—a gem of polished skill in

a slough of despond. Porter's innings was, indeed, a gem of an innings, full of beautiful strokes, discreet opportunism, and abundant vitality. Out of a total of 99, he scored 66—a rather confounding majority! But what shall one say of the others? Bennett was their Lincoln "imp"—although he hails from Gainsborough! But it must be said that the mischief he did—and at one time he had taken seven wickets for the negligible cost of 20 runs—was done by perfectly straight and above-board means. Now and again he showed that he could bring the ball back sharply, but, more generally, it was his pace through the air and his nip off the pitch that caused the batsmen's discomfiture. A detailed history of the innings is hardly necessary. Suffice to say that the start was nothing short of calamitous, the first four wickets tumbling down for 11 runs. Of these, Bennett took three for 3. Porter and Sleigh, who did so much for their side in the first innings, stayed together till the luncheon interval, when the score was 24 for 4, and afterwards advanced the total to 41, but with the departure of Sleigh at this point, collapse set in again, and, when the ninth wicket fell, Suffolk had no more than 69 runs on the board. In a cheery last wicket stand, however, between Porter and Lloyd, 30 more runs were added, and Porter was taking runs almost just where he liked, when Lloyd carried valour a trifle too far up the pitch and was stumped.

### AN INTERESTING PROPOSITION.

Except for the fact that these things have to be recorded in black and white (and four "ducks" in one innings do not make very soul-stirring reading), it really didn't matter very much that Suffolk did not obtain a more ample total, for if they had not been all out, they would soon have had to declare. As it was, Lincolnshire were set quite an interesting proposition. If they wanted to win, they had to score at the approximate rate of 80 runs an hour in order to get the required 195 in the possible two and a half hours left for play. It was soon evident, however, that they deemed victory outside their grasp. In the first half-hour they fell badly behind the clock and lost two wickets in the process. With only six scored, Ross chopped a rising ball from Catchpole on to his wicket, and at 24 the same bowler had Dods leg-before, and cricket was not without its humour when Kent, the Suffolk wicket-keeper, split the air with a scintillating appeal about a second after the umpire's hand had been raised to answer the bowler's question in the affirmative. If only Suffolk could have got rid of Houghton, the Aston Villa footballer, they had until a late hour, a reasonable chance of forcing the issue to victory, but Houghton refused to be dislodged until he had placed his side more or less outside danger of defeat, and when stumps were drawn Lincolnshire had scored 156 for the loss of seven wickets.

## SUFFOLK'S BRILLIANT BATTING.

H. L. PORTER AND R. C. WRIGHT OBTAIN CENTURIES.

SLOW SCORING AT CHELMSFORD.

LEICESTERSHIRE DISMISSED FOR 162.

### Hertfordshire v. Suffolk.

Rain delayed the start of the Hertfordshire v. Suffolk match at Watford till a quarter to twelve, but it was not sufficient to affect the wicket. Suffolk won the toss, and, batting first, opened their innings with Porter, who had such a successful match against Lincolnshire, and Evans, a former Lowestoft cricketer, who now plays for Catford Wanderers, against the bowling of Tarbox and Appleyard.

Suffolk made a disastrous start. Evans played the first over from Tarbox confidently enough, scoring 3 runs, but the second ball from Appleyard, a late inswinger, completely beat and bowled him. Waugh, who has played for Essex, then came in, but was pinned down entirely on the defensive until with only 8 scored, he cocked up the simplest of catches to short leg.

It was uphill work after that, and not until play had been in progress for forty-five minutes did Porter hit the first 4.

Lockett, a Bank of England player, was very subdued, but Porter, gaining in confidence, took two more 4's off successive balls from Appleyard. One was rather a lucky stroke through the slips but the other was a perfectly judged hit to the leg boundary.

There were no cheap runs going, but when the loose ball did come along neither Lockett nor Porter hesitated to take advantage of it. Lockett gave the impression of being a batsman with more strokes than he cared to reveal, and he was batting quite soundly when Roberts, a slow left-handed, bowled him with a ball which straightened out. The score was then 65, and Porter and Wright had ten minutes left to bat till lunch. They survived this awkward period, but not without some discomfort, Porter putting one ball dangerously near to short mid-on.

#### GRIMSDALL INJURED.

On resuming runs came much more freely, but the game had not progressed much further before it was interrupted by a most unfortunate accident. The total had been advanced to 93 without further loss when Hudson sent down to Wright a full-toss on the leg side. Wright hit the ball for 4 with tremendous force, and his bat on the follow through struck Grimsdell right across the face, the wicket-keeper having moved across to leg to take the ball.

Grimsdell, who is the former Tottenham Hotspur and England half-back, was taken to hospital and X-rayed, but his face was too swollen for it to be revealed whether or not his nose was broken.

Porter reached his 50 after batting two hours, and Wright followed suit after 75 minutes at the wicket. Wright had always shown the more enterprise, and now as the Hertfordshire bowling deteriorated he became positively devastating. He hit one gigantic 6 over the square-leg boundary off Tarbox, and followed this up with three 4's in one over from Woodbridge. Suffolk cricket was now running on the high tide of prosperity.

For all his versatility Porter was finding it hard to keep pace with Wright, and after the 200 had been registered there ensued an exciting race for priority in century-making. Both entered the 90's together, but Porter put on a spurt and got to three figures first. It was a performance as notable for courage as for skill, and it was primarily instrumental in getting Suffolk out of a very sticky position. Wright wanted one more run for his century when the tea interval arrived at 250 for three.

#### FOURTH WICKET PUTS ON 201.

Wright quickly completed his 100 after tea, but was out soon after. His hard-hit innings, occupying 2 hours 20 minutes, included one 6 and fifteen 4's. So completely had these fourth-wicket batsmen mastered the Hertfordshire bowling that their partnership produced 201 runs, carrying the total from 65 to 266. Porter, hitting out at nearly everything, and enjoying some luck in the process, stayed till 294 before being smartly stumped by Crossman, who had taken Grimsdell's place behind the stumps. Sixteen 4's were Porter's major hits in an innings full of good strokes.

Suffolk's policy now should have been to go out boldly for runs, but, though Powell showed enterprise, there was a good deal of ineffective pattering, which wasted time. The innings closed for 379. Powell hit one 6 and eight 4's.

In capturing half the Suffolk wickets for 102 Roberts bowled very steadily on the kind of wicket that breaks a bowler's heart. At the close of the day Hertfordshire had fifteen minutes' batting, and scored 6 without loss.

## VIGOROUS REVIVAL OF SUFFOLK CRICKET.

HERTFORDSHIRE OUTPLAYED AT WATFORD.

GOOD BOWLING BY NORMAN CATCHPOLE.

SUFFOLK GAIN FIRST INNINGS LEAD OF 264.

Watford, Thursday.

Rain spoiled the second day's play in the Minor Counties Championship match between Suffolk and Hertfordshire, at Watford, to-day, and probably robbed the Suffolk side of a decisive victory. Altogether, only a little more than two hours' play was possible—and that in instalments—but in between the stoppages the Suffolk bowlers made such good use of their opportunities that they were able to dismiss Hertfordshire for the surprisingly small total of 115, despite the handicap of a wet ball. Directly the home team's innings was completed, rain came on heavily and persistently, and at five o'clock the game was abandoned, Suffolk taking the major share of points for their first-innings lead of 264—a rather inadequate reward for such a meritorious performance.

A mere glance at the scores will probably suffice to surprise those sceptics who doubted the wisdom of reviving county cricket in Suffolk. But the scores alone are valid evidence enough to show that Suffolk completely outplayed their opponents. Suffolk's batting showed a remarkable recuperative power, and a performance of the highest merit was represented in the partnership of H. L. Porter and R. C. Wright, who put on 201 for the fourth-wicket stand, after the first two Suffolk wickets had gone down for 8 runs. After Hertfordshire had disposed of these two century-makers, it would probably have paid Suffolk better if their later batsmen had attacked the bowling in the vigorous spirit tacked by the Air Force player, J. Powell, so shown by a declaration at an opportune moment on the first day. Still, 379 was a goodly and handsome total against a county which finished fifth in the championship table last year, winning five matches and once dismissing Norfolk for 54. Then, in dismissing the home county for 115, the Suffolk bowlers made their attack a fitting complement to a fine batting performance. Norman Catchpole bowled particularly well, varying his pace skilfully and making the ball swing and lift.

Arthur Grimsdell, the former England and Tottenham Hotspur footballer, who was injured on Wednesday (as reported in yesterday's issue), did not bat, although he was on the ground and expressed his willingness to do so, if his side should require it. As was feared, a bone in his nose had been fractured, and one eye had closed up.

#### QUICK FALL OF WICKETS.

When play was resumed on Thursday at Watford, in dull weather, Hertfordshire, having scored six overnight, were 372 behind with all their wickets in hand. Tarbox and Roberts were none too comfortable at the start, but they managed to raise the score to 19, when Catchpole did his side an excellent service by taking two quick wickets. Tarbox was the first to go, cocking up the simplest of catches into the capacious hands of Powell at short leg. In the next over, and without addition to the score, Catchpole disposed of Longton in an exactly similar way, but, this time it

was a much more difficult catch Powell having to leap into the air to take the ball going away from him. A change of bowling at the other end was immediately successful, Sleigh relieving Waugh, and having Roberts' leg before, three wickets being down for 21.

Catchpole was bowling well, varying his pace intelligently, and helped by slight damp on the top of the pitch, was making the ball lift. Sleigh's length was a rather uncertain quantity, but it was the Colchester and East Essex bowler who took the next wicket. Brown hit a couple of good 4's, but at 43 he played a too adventurous stroke to one of Sleigh's slows, missed the ball, and was bowled.

Despite the fact that Bousfield might have been caught at first slip by Wright off Catchpole, before he had scored, matters were going surprisingly well for Suffolk, and when a few minutes later Schilling came on and bowled Woodbridge, half the home side had been dismissed for 60 runs. Rain came on at 12.25, and there was no further play before lunch.

### AGGRESSIVE METHODS

The resumption after lunch was only delayed a few minutes, and the question was whether the weather would remain fine long enough to allow Suffolk to gain first innings points. Bousfield and Crossman adopted aggressive methods, but both were inclined to put the ball in the air, and at 95 Crossman was well caught by Evans at cover, after Waugh had just previously made a valiant effort to hold a hard on-drive by the same batsman.

Bousfield, when 34, gave a chance to Bailey at mid-off, but did not profit by his escape, for after making 5 more runs he saw Porter hold a hard cut to bring off a beautiful catch in the gully. With his next ball Catchpole bowled Appleyard, and eight wickets were down for 108. Hudson was caught at square leg 9 runs later, and with Grimsdell unable to bat, Suffolk thus gained a first innings lead of 264. Catchpole bowled with accuracy and incisiveness in taking four for 26, while Sleigh also captured four wickets with his tempting slows.

**SUFFOLK CRICKET AT LOWESTOFT.**

**LINCOLNSHIRE RUN UP BIG TOTAL.**

There was quite an epidemic on the Denes Oval cricket ground at Lowestoft yesterday, when Suffolk met Lincolnshire in the return match in the Minor Counties championship, but it was not a catching epidemic! Partly in consequence of missed chances—someone said that there were fourteen of them all told—Suffolk allowed Lincolnshire to run up the substantial total of 415. Nothing went right for the Suffolk fielders. But cricket is like that sometimes. Another day everything will stick. At the close of the day Suffolk scored 85 for the loss of one wicket, so that altogether one day's play produced an aggregate of 500 runs.

It was a very fast wicket on which Lincolnshire had the privilege of batting first, and Ross and Houghton, the opening pair, made excellent use of their opportunities, by putting on 83 for the first wicket. It was a very useful start to give their side, but once the Suffolk bowlers met with success by breaking up this menacing opening partnership, they followed it up effectively by capturing three more wickets for the addition of only 33 runs. On such a perfect batsman's wicket, Suffolk had good cause for satisfaction in having dismissed four batsmen for 88 runs, but they had to wait a long time before their next success came, for Macdonald and Ehrenfried went on to add over a hundred for the fifth wicket. By lunch time these two had raised the score to 123, and after the adjournment they proceeded to take runs very much as they pleased until, at 190, Macdonald was caught in the slips by Ward. Ehrenfried did not survive him long, being beaten by a good ball from Ward 4 runs later.

**LINCOLNSHIRE BATSMAN'S CENTURY.**

Six wickets were now down for 194, but the Lincolnshire all-rounders proved even more difficult to dislodge than their immediate predecessors. Patsy Bell and Scholey put on nearly a hundred runs for the seventh wicket. Then, after Scholey left Bell was able to carry on to complete his century, while Wilson hit out all round the wicket with cheerful audacity. By the time the tea interval arrived, Bell and Wilson had taken the total to 344 for seven, and, although Suffolk finished off the innings in another half-hour's play, it was an expensive half-hour, which yielded 71 more runs to bring the innings' total up to 415. Bell was batting only two hours and ten minutes for his 128, which included thirteen 4's.

Porter and Dawson, the latter making his first appearance for the county, did not appear to be at all overawed by the size of the total they had to face when they opened the Suffolk innings. Both played confidently, and 50 runs were on the board in thirty-five minutes without loss. Just when it looked as though Suffolk might take up their innings again on Thursday morning with all their wickets intact, Dawson was caught and bowled. Porter and Powell, however, played out time without further loss, though there were one or two anxious moments especially when Porter, at 43, was missed in the slips.

**THRILLING FINISH IN LOWESTOFT MATCH.**

**SUFFOLK ONLY 10 RUNS BEHIND LINCS. TOTAL OF 415.**

**HARD-HIT CENTURY BY H. P. WAUGH.**

The closing stages of the Minor Counties Championship match between Suffolk and Lincolnshire provided as thrilling a finish as one could wish to see. Suffolk made a most gallant reply to the visitors' big total of 415, a century by H. P. Waugh being the outstanding feature of the innings, but, when the ninth wicket fell, the home side were still 60 runs behind. Excitement ran high during a plucky last-wicket stand between Goundry and Catchpole, who produced their best batting in an effort to give Suffolk the lead. So successful was their endeavour that only 11 runs were needed when Lincolnshire broke up their partnership. The visitors thus take three points for their first innings lead.

**PORTER'S SOUND BATTING.**

The formidable size of Lincolnshire's total of 415 did not look quite so huge a proposition after Suffolk had scored 85 in the last hour or so on Wednesday evening for the loss of only one wicket; but even so, the home side still had a very long journey to make, if they wanted to take first innings points, when Porter and Powell resumed the innings at 11 o'clock yesterday morning. These two not-outs started in a style that was full of bright assurance. Obviously, in the absence of a startling collapse, first innings advantage was the only important issue at stake, so there was no need to be in a hurry about run-getting. Neither Porter nor Powell, however, neglected any reasonable scoring opportunity that came their way, and, by sound and steady batting, they took the total to 155 before Powell was bowled. Waugh, who came in next, opened strongly with three 4's and a 3, and his discreetly-applied aggressive methods reminded one of a vigorous century he once made for Essex against Glamorgan. Meanwhile, Porter was progressing confidently enough, to suggest that he was bound for another three-figure innings, but when he had made 85 out of 192, Ross, fielding at short leg, held a hard hit to deny him this distinction. Altogether, Porter had been at the wicket for three hours and twenty minutes, but the moral value of his innings to the side could not be measured by the clock. Seven 4's were his major scoring strokes. By lunch time the total was 226 for 3—certainly a good enough response so far to give the Suffolk side an appetite for mid-day refreshment.

**WAUGH'S SPLENDID CENTURY.**

Ward, the Campsea Ashe cricketer, who has played once or twice for Middlesex II., had batted very attractively before the interval, and when, shortly after the resumption, he was bowled by Wilson, one felt that the promise of a bright innings had been nipped in the bud. He is a quick-footed batsman, who is always on the look-out for runs, and his methods suggested that on some future occasion some bowlers may have to pay a heavy price for the coaching he has received at the hands of "Patsy" Hendren. Ward left at 238, and then Waugh and Bailey became associated in a fifth wicket partnership which put on 80 runs in exhilarating style. Bailey brought off several crisp and well-timed cuts, but for the most part he was content to leave the major share of scoring to Waugh, who fairly revelled in the task. And took runs freely all round the wicket with a fine versatility of skill. At 318, Bailey, failing to hit a full toss with appropriate severity, was caught and bowled, but the position still had favourable possibilities for the home side, seeing that, with only half the side out, no more than 95 runs were required to top the Lincolnshire total. Waugh was still there, and Suffolk still had some good potential batting to come. With a glorious hit to leg for 4, Waugh completed a valiant century in two hours and fifty minutes, but very soon afterwards was bowled when jumping out to Ehrenfried, and then a surprising collapse set in. Waugh left at 352, having hit sixteen 4's, and without addition Ehrenfried dismissed Sleigh in his next over: at 354, Covill was bowled off his pad; and at 355 Kent paid the natural penalty of hitting against the break of a spinning ball from Ehrenfried.

**EXCITING FINISH.**

And now the excitement began. When Catchpole, the last man in, joined Goundry, 61 runs were still needed to lead on the first innings. Clearly, there were heavy odds on Lincolnshire taking the major share of the points, so they eventually did, but not before Goundry and Catchpole had put up a most heroic fight. Batting with a cool composure, which belied the fact that this was a critical period in the game, they both dealt with the bowling on its merits, taking a few daring singles off good balls, and boundaries off the loose ones, and when Goundry hit a defiant 6 off Ehrenfried, there was a great outburst of vociferous jubilation from about 200 spectators who were watching the game from the lofty heights of North Parade without paying for the privilege. Gradually the score crept nearer the hoped-for destination. An audacious short

run put up the 400; then Goundry cracked Ehrenfried for 4 to the on; then another single; and then Catchpole put up a catch to mid-off and all was over. Suffolk had failed by 11 runs to achieve their object. But it was a rather glorious failure.

## SUFFOLK AT THE OVAL. INDIFFERENT BATING DISPLAY AGAINST SURREY II. MCMURRAY AND MOBEY BOTH SCORE CENTURIES.

The Oval, Monday.  
For their fourth engagement in the Minor Counties Championship, Suffolk met Surrey II. at the Oval to-day, and put into the field a side which looked strong in batting, but not so formidable in bowling. They did not succeed, however, in maintaining the consistently good batting form they have shown in previous matches, and, although having the advantage of taking first innings on the kind of wicket that is colloquially described as a "batsman's paradise," were dismissed for 176. This unpretentious total was quickly exceeded by Surrey's opening pair, McMurray and Mobey, each of whom scored a century. At the close of play, Surrey, having made 306 for the loss of half their wickets, were 129 ahead, and Suffolk will have to put up a much better show in their second innings if they are to avert their first defeat since they made their entry into county cricket.

### BATING CONTRASTS.

Suffolk started the day well by winning the toss—which was a very sensible thing to do. But then, when they went in to bat on a pitch that should have been a very happy hunting-ground for runs, they sacrificed their first eight wickets for 102—which was a very foolish thing to do. There were some peculiar contrasts in the way the Suffolk batsmen played the Surrey bowling. The innings began brightly enough, with Col. Wyatt and H. L. Porter putting forth the promise of handsome deeds to come, and it ended optimistically enough, with C. C. Bailey, A. S. Kent, and N. Catchpole all giving to their predecessors an object-lesson as to how the Surrey attack ought to be played. But in between the beginning and the end, the innings was sadly lacking in stufing, and from the fall of the third wicket, at 59, till Bailey and Kent came together at 102, the Surrey bowlers were allowed to pin the batsmen down to a state of strokeless impotence. Between half-past twelve and half-past one only 40 runs were scored. The Surrey bowlers must indeed have been flattered!

From the way Col. Wyatt and Porter began, I really thought Suffolk were going to show a proper appreciation of the beautiful stretch of turf that had been prepared for them. From the outset, both batsmen hit the ball with the middle of their blades, and Porter, who made a lovely straight drive for 4 in Gamble's first over, looked as though he was going to continue his sequence of big innings. But it was not to be. With only 18 scored, he turned a ball from Gamble straight into the hands of short leg, and from that point Suffolk were always fighting for runs—rather despondently before lunch, but with a cheerful heart afterwards. H. F. J. Powell was out before he had scored, though there was an element of doubt about the manner of his dismissal. So long as Col. Wyatt remained there was an element of spirit in the Suffolk batting, for he was always using his bat as a weapon of attack, and he brought off several clean and powerful drives on the off-side of the wicket. With the total at 59, however, he failed to get on top of a rising ball from T. A. Maxwell, and was caught in the gully.

### THE "TAIL" SHOWS THE WAY.

It was very slow going after that. C. C. Lockitt appeared full of perplexity during the twenty-five minutes he was at the wicket, and H. P. Waugh never looked like the experienced campaigner who is ever hard up for an opportunity to score. If the bowler does not give him one, he will generally jolly soon make one for himself. But on this occasion, his opportunism seemed to have deserted him, and he had to toll in the sun for an hour for his first 10 runs. Lockitt left at 70, and Waugh at 80, but Wright livened up the proceedings by hitting 10 in one over. It was a pity Wright was not spared longer; his brief innings was so full of chivalric intentions. He was sixth out at 99. And so to lunch.

H. B. Goundry and J. G. Sleigh departed immediately after the resumption, but the brightest batting of the innings was yet to come. Kent walked in with the light of battle in his eyes, and was soon crashing the ball to the boundary with the greatest glee. If only this innings had been staged earlier, it would have done Suffolk a power of moral good. Bailey, who up till now had been a determined defender, followed Kent's example, and also attacked the bowling heartily and often, and the product of this spirited ninth wicket stand was 84 runs, scored in thirty-five minutes. Bailey was batting uncommonly well when he snicked a ball outside his off stump, but Catchpole filled his place very efficiently to help Kent. This partnership, too, had an exhilarating touch of enterprise about it, and incidentally Catchpole showed—as he did against Lincolnshire at Lowestoft, last week—that he is a good enough batsman to be higher than No. 11 in the list.

### SURREY'S FAST SCORING.

The modest total of 176 inevitably had the effect of emphasising Suffolk's admitted bowl-

ing weakness. The limitations of this department were rather ruthlessly exposed when Surrey went in to bat. Suffolk's 176 had taken three and a quarter hours to compile; McMurray and Mobey, Surrey's opening pair, passed that figure in one hour and forty minutes. This plain statement of fact is more than sufficient to show with what scant respect the Suffolk bowlers were treated. McMurray and Mobey, indeed, took runs just how they pleased and when they pleased, 4's flowing from their bats to all parts of the field. It was not until the new ball was handed to Catchpole that Suffolk succeeded in breaking up this prolific opening stand. Then Catchpole again brought his name into prominence by dismissing both batsmen in a couple of overs. McMurray was the first to go, well caught by Powell at long leg. He had just previously reached his century, which included fifteen 4's, and occupied him a little over two hours. This was at 218, and one run later Catchpole bowled Mobey when that batsman was trying to hit the ball into Vauxhall Bridge Road. Mobey, who scored rather faster than his partner, had reached three figures in 100 minutes. Fourteen 4's were the major hits in his chanceless innings.

Suffolk scored three more wickets before the close of play. At 282, W. T. Cook, the Surrey captain, was caught behind the stumps; at 288 Catchpole had Wilson leg-before; and at 305 H. E. Avery was run out. T. A. Maxwell came in for the last few minutes, but there was no further addition to the score before stumps were drawn for the day.

## SUFFOLK'S UNHAPPY DAY AT THE OVAL. SURREY'S OVERWHELMING WIN BY INNINGS AND 230 RUNS.

### AMAZING BOWLING—AND SOME INGLORIOUS BATING.

The Oval, Tuesday.

Suffolk were altogether outplayed at the Oval to-day, and at a quarter to three Surrey II. had gained an overwhelming victory by an innings and 230 runs. The home side raised their overnight score to 477 for six and then declared, but Suffolk, going in a second time with arrears of 301, never looked like saving the game. On the contrary, their second innings was a rather inglorious affair, the whole side being dismissed for 71. K. McCaulis, the fastest bowler in the Surrey team, simply ran through the side, and at the close of the innings he had the astonishing figures of six wickets for 13 runs. Owen had three for one in less than two overs.

### A SPATE OF RUNS.

Overnight, Surrey had established a lead of 129, and as they still had five wickets to play about with, their obvious policy when play was resumed this morning was to go all out for runs. This R. H. Williamson and T. A. Maxwell did with great gusto. So prolific was the scoring that in the course of the first hour's cricket this morning they increased the total by 138 runs. All the Suffolk bowlers came in for merciless punishment, but at least it should be said in their favour that they were very inadequately supported in the field. Three ordinary catches were missed in the course of a couple of overs, and there were others of a more difficult character that one expects to be held in inter-county cricket. Nor was some of the ground fielding anything to write home about.

Williamson was very unlucky to miss his century by three runs. He thoroughly deserved to be the third Surrey batsman to score a hundred, for he had batted regardless of risk in endeavouring to serve the interests of his side by getting runs quickly, and there was much skill and versatile stroke-play behind his fearless hitting. The total had reached 443 when Williamson snicked a ball from Bailey, and Kent snapped it up with avaricious gloved hands. Thirteen 4's were Williamson's principal hits, and he had added 81 to his over-

night score in an hour at the wicket. With Buss in, the fast rate of scoring still continued until, at 12.15, Surrey's innings was declared at the gigantic total of 477 for six.

### A TOTAL ECLIPSE.

This Suffolk entered on their second innings 301 runs in arrears, and this deficit had only been decreased by 30 when the fifth wicket fell immediately before lunch. Suffolk never got over the fact of losing their two opening batsmen almost before the scorers had had time to sharpen their pencils for the third chapter of the match. Col. Wyatt fell in the first over from Gamble, playing a similar kind of stroke to that which cost him his wicket in the first innings, and in the next over from McCaulis Porter was bowled with an exceptionally good ball; 3—2—3 read the score—a puny sum for such a big score-board to display. It was indeed a discouraging sight for the eye to look upon, but it might have looked even more ignominious if two catches which Waugh and Powell gave immediately they came in had been accepted. As it was, they took the score to 22 before McCaulis uprooted Powell's middle stump. At 30, Owen relieved McCaulis, and with his first and third balls, he dismissed Waugh and Wright. And so, with half the side out for 30, Suffolk went in to lunch once again with a score which could hardly be calculated to act as an appetiser.

Of the rest of the innings, least said, soonest mended. Claiming Bailey, Goundry, Lockitt, and Sleigh as his victims, McCaulis, on resuming, took four wickets without conceding a single run, and this on a wicket that was a model of good manners!

## SUFFOLK COLLAPSE AT LOWESTOFT.

H. F. J. POWELL'S VALIANT EFFORT TO RETRIEVE SITUATION.

### CAMBRIDGESHIRE BUILD UP STRONG POSITION.

For their fifth engagement in the Minor Counties Championship Suffolk had Cambridgeshire as their opponents at Denes Oval, Lowestoft, yesterday, the visitors coming straight from their ten wickets victory over Bedfordshire at Bedford on Tuesday. The Suffolk side was by no means as strong as that which met Lincolnshire on the same ground a month ago, and its weakness was soon accentuated when the home side batted. The advantage which C. C. Bailey gained by winning the toss had vanished completely by the end of the first hour's play, when Suffolk had half their side out for 46 runs.

The early loss of H. L. Porter, who had hitherto been the mainstay of the Suffolk batting, served to fill the innings with a foretaste of calamity. He was caught at the wicket with only 10 runs scored, and then the procession began. At 11 J. Bell was taken in the slips; one run later H. F. Waugh suffered a similar fate, and at 18 C. C. Bailey was well and truly bowled. Possibly the wicket was sweating a bit, at all events, the ball showed a tendency to "lift," and this had the batsmen in frequent difficulties.

#### DESPERATE REMEDY.

H. F. J. Powell apparently decided that a desperate situation demanded a desperate remedy, and accordingly the Felixstowe Air Force player hit out with defiant vigour, and with a little defensive help by B. Darvill, the score was advanced to 49 before Darvill was yorked. Powell excelling in powerful hitting to leg, almost monopolised the scoring, and after A. A. Burgess had been caught at 58 it was due to him that the score reached three figures before lunch.

Just before the interval Powell had the distinction of reaching his 50, a well-deserved reward of brave, if not faultless, batting.

#### UNFORTUNATE ENDING TO GOOD STAND.

On resuming, Goundry and Powell continued batting in confident style, with the Lowestoft Town cricketer so dominating the scoring that he claimed 19 out of the next 20 runs scored. Suffolk's chances of making a good recovery now looked quite prosperous, but at 128 a misunderstanding led to Goundry being run out, an unfortunate ending to a partnership which had put on 70 valuable runs in 55 minutes.

Two more wickets fell quickly after this. At 142, A. S. Kent was caught behind the stumps, and at 171 N. Catchpole edged a ball from Wilkinson into the hands of first slip. In the meantime, Powell went on scoring steadily, and adding to his individual distinction. His luck held good again when, having scored 80, he was missed in the slips.

The last wicket did not offer much opposition, and the innings closed in just under three hours for 181. Powell remained unbeaten with 84 to his credit, his main hits being nine 4's.

#### SLOW SCORING.

Cambridgeshire batted very carefully when they went in at 3.15, and their restrained methods unduly flattered the Suffolk bowling, which had no more merits than that of honest steadiness. Sixty-five minutes before tea produced no more than 53 runs, a rate of scoring that was not a very fitting complement to the success their bowlers had just achieved.

However, the visitors were in a very advantageous position when the interval arrived, being only 128 behind, with all their wickets in hand.

The first ball after the interval brought Suffolk their first success, Cooke smacking H. V. Howard's opening delivery, to be caught at the wicket. With Covill in, the batting assumed a livelier interest, for the professional scored with refreshing freedom, and in the process revealed an assured command of a wide variety of strokes. He and Saxon took the score to 97 before the latter but up the simplest of catches to Burgess, but Covill continued in confident style until at 126 he was bowled by a ball from Howard, which might well have beaten any batsman in the world, not excepting Don Bradman. It hardly rose an inch from the ground after pitching, but slid along as stealthily as a snake in the grass.

Five runs later F. W. Wilkinson was caught at slip, and shortly afterwards F. A. Ridgeon was bowled, but thereafter Cambridgeshire went ahead of the Suffolk score without further loss, and F. W. Parritt and Smith were showing excellent form when play closed at 212 for 5. Thus, with half their wickets in hand the visitors are leading by 31 runs.

## SUFFOLK BEATEN BY TEN WICKETS.

BOWLERS REAP A HARVEST AT LOWESTOFT.

### "HAT TRICK" BY N. CATCHPOLE.

#### CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISMISS HOME COUNTY FOR 89.

The second day's play in the match between Suffolk and Cambridgeshire, at Denes Oval, Lowestoft, yesterday, was accompanied by an extraordinary fall of wickets. No fewer than fifteen of them tumbled down for an aggregate of 129 runs in the course of about two and a half hours' play, and as ten of these wickets were Suffolk wickets, it follows that the home county had much the worst of the deal. Actually, Suffolk were beaten by ten wickets, the match being all over soon after half-past-two. This is the second ten wickets' win Cambridgeshire have gained this week—they beat Bedfordshire by exactly the same margin on Tuesday—and their reward is that they now stand at the top of the Minor Counties Championship table with 100 per cent. points.

The performance of the hat trick by Norman Catchpole brought the Cambridgeshire innings to a sensational conclusion when play was continued in cloudy and boisterous weather.

Overnight Cambridgeshire had gained a first innings lead of 41 runs, and as they still had half their wickets in hand there seemed every prospect when play was resumed that their lead would be very substantially increased, especially when it was seen that the wicket was still in excellent condition. In the event, however, the visitors had to be content with a lead of no more than 81 runs, and for this pleasing surprise Suffolk were entirely indebted to Catchpole, who, in the course of seven overs, captured the five outstanding wickets for 19 runs.

#### VICIOUS LEG BREAK.

Catchpole, who made the ball come off the pitch quickly and also turned it from leg, gained his first success when Parritt and Smith, the not outs, had carried the score from 222 to 238. At this point he had Smith, who included a 5 and eight 4's in his 57, caught at the wicket, and 7 runs later he bowled Parritt with a vicious leg break.

Hart, the Cambridgeshire skipper, and Whewell were obviously in at ease, but managed to add 17 before Catchpole had the devastating spell in which he took the last three wickets with three balls. Whewell was the first to go, and then Pask and Cockell were caught in the gully by Porter off the next two balls. Catchpole's figures for the innings were 5 for 77, and Howard also bowled well in taking 3 for 37.

#### SUFFOLK'S PROCESSION.

So Suffolk entered on their second innings at noon—much earlier than they could have dared to anticipate earlier. Cambridgeshire's advantage then may not have seemed to be a very dominant one, but an hour later, when Suffolk had half their side out for 39, the visitors' lead of 81 had every appearance of being a winning one. Suffolk's batting was a most melancholy affair, in which Porter provided the only redeeming feature. With only 14 scored, Smith dismissed Waugh, and off the next ball but one bowled Bell round his legs. Then at 26 two more wickets fell, Powell caught in the gully and Bailey leg before, and so the sorry tale went on.

At 39 Darvill was caught at forward short leg, at 45 Burgess fell in exactly the same way, and at 51 Porter, the sheet-anchor of Suffolk's hopes, was lbw to Wilkinson. The mere fact that he claimed 33 out of these 61 runs was in itself a severe indictment of his colleagues' impotence. At Goundry's dismissal at 64 lunch was taken, with Suffolk still needing 17 runs to save an innings defeat with only two wickets in hand. On resuming, Suffolk lost their ninth wicket without addition, but the last wicket stand between Kent and Howard realised sufficient to save Suffolk the indignity of being beaten by an innings. Suffolk's innings realised 89, which left Cambridgeshire requiring only nine to win, and these were knocked off without loss by Cockell and Pask in a couple of overs.

## SUFFOLK OUTPLAYED AT FELIXSTOWE.

### DOUBLE CENTURY IN HUGE HERTFORDSHIRE SCORE.

#### LONGTON PUNISHES HOME BOWLING RUTHLESSLY.

Suffolk were completely outplayed in the opening stage of their return match with Hertfordshire at Felixstowe yesterday, the visitors running up the mammoth total of 428 for the loss of three wickets before declaring their innings closed. In an hour and a half's batting at the end of the day, Suffolk lost three wickets in scoring 78, so that they still need 251 to avert the indignity of having to follow on.

In the previous encounter at Watford, it will be recalled, Suffolk gained a preponderating advantage on the first innings to the extent of over 200 runs, but rain prevented a definite finish being arrived at. For this Felixstowe match, however, Hertfordshire, who came straight from their drawn match with Norfolk, at Norwich, fielded a much stronger side, which included P. G. T. Kingsley and F. C. de Saram, past and present Oxford University players, whereas the Suffolk side and the appearance of being appreciably weaker. Suffolk made two changes in the side which was defeated by Cambridgeshire at Lowestoft last week, H. C. Wood, the Old Ipswichian, and C. Hurlock, the Campea Aabo bowler, coming into the team in the places of A. A. Burgess and J. Bell.

A beautiful wicket had been prepared for the match by Philip Cooper, the Felixstowe groundsman, and the visitors, having won the toss, had first use of it. They opened with F. P. Longton and G. M. Crossman, against the bowling of N. Catchpole and C. Hurlock, and took things very quietly during the first ten overs, the first 8 runs on the board being all extras, four byes and four leg eyes coming from Hurlock's first over. Subsequently, Crossman edged a ball from Hurlock dangerously through the slips, but as first and second slips were standing rather wide apart, the ball travelled between them to the boundary. Apart from this indifferent stroke, both batsmen played with cool assurance, and the first 45 minutes produced as many runs. R. V. Howard relieved Catchpole, and H. B. Goundry took over from Hurlock, but Herts had 50 on the board in fifty minutes.

The wicket was entirely inimical to the bowlers' hopes of success, and it must be admitted that although Crossman is not usually considered as an opening batsman, the Suffolk attack never looked like securing a wicket, nor was it an encouraging sign when H. F. J. Powell was called upon to try his wicket, in which he mixed a generous number of luscious full-tosses, which were suitably dealt with.

Crossman, who did the bulk of the scoring with clean well timed drives and powerful hits to leg, reached 50 in seventy-five minutes, and shortly afterwards the 100 went up, with the opening batsmen still together. Catchpole and Hurlock were tried again before lunch, but without effect, though Hurlock should have had Longton caught at second slip with the total at 137, Porter falling to take the chance.

#### CROSSMAN'S HIGHEST.

Meanwhile Crossman continued to hit out with increasing vigour, and he exceeded his highest score of 78, which he made on his first appearance for Hertfordshire ten years ago. He looked well set for the distinction of scoring a century before lunch, but it was not to be. At 146 C. C. Bailey tried H. P. Waugh, rather dilatorily one thought, and with his third ball Waugh bowled Crossman. The Hertfordshire skipper had played a real captain's innings of superlative merit, and the vigour of his methods is adequately indicated by the fact that he hit no fewer than fourteen 4's in his 89. He revealed a splendid variety of scoring strokes, his driving in front of the wicket being outstanding. A few minutes after his dismissal the luncheon interval arrived with the score standing at 151 for one wicket.

The weakness of the Suffolk bowling was further exposed when Longton and de Saram continued their partnership after the interval. The Oxford University batsman was soon getting the ball away in confident style, and when Webb came on for Hurlock at 181 he twice put the ball away cleverly to the leg boundary in the Old Ipswichian's first over.

Longton, who had spent two hours over his first 50, also little more than half an hour's freedom, and little more than half an hour's play after the interval saw the 200 registered without further loss.

De Saram was batting well at times, but twice, once in the slips and once at mid-off, he might have been caught if the luck had been with the Suffolk fielders. Longton also been with the Suffolk fielders. Longton also edged one or two balls dangerously into the slips.

**LONGTON'S FIRST CENTURY FOR HERTS.**  
Suffolk secured two more wickets during the afternoon, but by the time they had disposed of de Saram and Kingsley Hertfordshire had built up a practically impregnable position. De Saram left at 243, well caught by Longton. Catchpole at fine short leg, and at 283 Kingsley, whose obvious intention it was

to get runs quickly, gave Webb the opportunity of bringing off another excellent catch at mid-off.

In the meantime, Longton had reached three figures after sticking on the 97 mark for at least twenty minutes, but having completed his first century for Hertfordshire he hit all round the wicket with power and freedom, and with the further aid of some lapses in the field runs continued to come at a great pace. When the tea interval arrived Hertfordshire had 380 on the board for the loss of three wickets.

After the tea interval, Crossman allowed the Hertfordshire innings to continue, until Longton had reached his double century, and then declared at 428 for 3. Thus, of the 48 runs scored after the interval, Longton claimed 36. He showed a vicious aggressiveness to all the bowling, and in the process had some of that good fortune which is said to favour the brave. But, although by no means chanceless, it was an innings of high distinction, especially the second half of it, during which the majority of his runs were obtained by fearless attacking. He revealed a great variety of stroke-play, and some of his square cuts and late cuts were delightful to watch. Altogether, Longton was batting rather more than four and a half hours, and his principal scoring strokes were twenty-two 4's and seven 3's.

#### SUFFOLK'S BAD START.

So Suffolk commenced batting just before half-past five, and they made one of those calamitous starts, which have characterized most of their innings in inter-county cricket this season. Porter had Webb as his partner to face the bowling of Ford and Appleyard, but they did not enjoy each other's company for long. With only 13 runs scored, Webb was caught in Appleyard's leg trap, and three runs later Waugh edged a ball from Ford, to give de Saram the opportunity of bringing off a brilliant right-handed catch at third slip. With the bowlers encouraged by these early successes, Porter and Powell had the greatest difficulty in warding off a collapse, but they succeeded in taking the score to 39 before Powell was bowled, after which Goundry and Porter successfully resisted all the Herts bowlers' attempts to get another wicket before the close of play.

## SUFFOLK SAVE GAME AT FELIXSTOWE.

### HERTS. COMPEL HOME SIDE TO FOLLOW ON.

#### H. L. PORTER'S FINE EFFORT IN SECOND INNINGS.

With three wickets down overnight for 78 against a declared total of 428 for the loss of the same number of visiting batsmen, Suffolk had a long furrow to plough at Felixstowe on Wednesday. Rain delayed the start for just over half-an-hour, but it was at no time very heavy, and when the covers were removed play was possible immediately. H. L. Porter (20) and H. B. Goundry (30) resumed to Roberts and F. Appleyard. Despite the fact that the bowlers made liberal use of the sawdust, neither batsmen could get the ball away, the first boundary hit coming from Porter off C. W. Ford, who had relieved Appleyard at 89, and after play had been in progress twenty-five minutes. Another 4 from Goundry off the same bowler brought the total to 97, but nearly ten minutes more had gone before Goundry sent the hundred up. Seven runs later Appleyard brought off a remarkably clever catch at mid-off to dismiss Porter, the headsman taking a ball knee high and holding it clear, although falling heavily in the effort.

With H. Darvill in, Goundry reached his 50, in which were six 4's, only to be immediately afterwards sent out to long-on, where he made no mistake with it, the wicket falling at 112, and an hour's play having produced 34 runs for the loss of a couple of wickets. The visitors continued to show smart heading, and against a frequently varied attack, neither

Darvill nor C. C. Bailey found many scoring opportunities, runs coming slowly and chiefly by singles. Bailey had a lie in the slips before reaching double figures, but the pair remained together until the score had reached 108, when from the last ball before lunch Darvill was out to a smart one-handed catch at first slip, 50 having been added to the total in two hours.

After lunch Bailey and Norman Catchpole, by steady, if somewhat subdued batting, had added 13 before Catchpole was leg-before to Ford, and four runs later a swinging " Yorker " beat the Suffolk skipper, who, batting steadily for seventy-five minutes, had seen 63 added during his stay, to which his own contribution was a useful 26. When R. V. Howard was out to a tame stroke at 183, the home side wanted 245 to save the follow-on, with only C. W. Hurlock to join A. S. Kent, who had tackled the situation with his usual courage by twice smashing the ball to the boundary. In his determination to put a better complexion on matters Kent's impetuousness proved his undoing. Attempting a forcing shot against Roberts, he was beaten by the spin of the ball, and adjudged to have his foot out of the crease, the innings closing for 190 at approximately 3 o'clock. Roberts, sixteen of whose thirty-two overs were maidens, claimed seven wickets for 49 runs.

Batting again, 238 runs in arrears, the home skipper accompanied Porter to the wicket himself, but any material hope of improving the situation was at once damped when Bailey was caught in the slips off the second ball he received. Webb and Porter, taking no risks, remained together to the tea adjournment, when the score had reached 44, but no scorer who had batted carefully for his 20, was snapped off by Roberts, and with only half-an-hour to go, Powell was out to a well-judged catch in the long field. Waugh, but after hitting a couple of 4's and two singles he was out to a splendid catch on the boundary from a hit which looked like an inevitable "6". Four wickets for 70 was the state of the game when Goundry joined Porter, but the newcomer did not stay long, a good one from Longton beating him at 73, although he had made a couple of singles. Porter, in difficulties, and when Darvill joined him improved, the pair saved the hundred hoisted before Darvill succumbed to an appeal by the wicket-keeper. With a chance of securing an extra half-an-hour, Kent again at once made his presence felt with three quick boundary hits, but was out to a clever catch in the slips at 128 with still a quarter of an hour to go. Norman Catchpole remained with Porter whilst 18 were added, a dilatory response resulting in his being run out. Seven minutes remained when R. V. Howard arrived, but neither he nor Porter who carried his stumps were drawn with Hertfordshire having to be content with no more than the points for a lead on the first innings.

There is a story of a faithful Boy Scout who, having gone to bed, woke up with a start in the middle of the night and remembered with horror that he had not performed his good deed for the day. So he crept downstairs and gave the canary to the cat.

There is also a story of a faithful supporter of Suffolk cricket who went to Felixstowe yesterday to watch his county play Surrey II. in their return match in the Minor Counties championship. When Suffolk, batting first, had lost their first two wickets for 17, he had to leave the ground, and when he returned after tea and observed that the score-board read 234 for seven, he jumped to the conclusion that the Surrey bowlers had pulverised the Suffolk batsmen and that this was the visitors' score. But it wasn't. It was rehabilitated Suffolk's score. So he gave . . .

But that's another story! In this frivolous preamble lies the story of a remarkable batting recovery. Suffolk did make one of their hectically depressing starts. True enough, 17 for two it was at noon o' the clock, and pessimists had visions of a repetition of the Oval annihilation. But from this unhappy state they extricated themselves most nobly, and at seven o'clock, after rain had several times interrupted their operations, they were able and entitled, with a score of 255 for eight on the board, to breathe in deep draughts of God's good air. Surrey will have to do something spectacular to win this game.

#### A BAD START.

Suffolk made only one change in the side which had the worst of a drawn game with Hertfordshire yesterday, F. H. Lloyd, the Sudbury bowler, appearing in place of N. Catchpole. Surrey included eight professionals in their team, the majority of whom have, at intervals, played for the first-class county side, while their three amateurs included K. McCanlis, the fast bowler, who in the previous fixture at the Oval, took six Suffolk second innings wickets for 13 runs.

There had been a fall of rain in the morning, but it did not seriously affect the wicket, and when C. C. Bailey won the toss for Suffolk, he promptly elected to bat. Once again, however, the home side made a disastrous start against McCanlis and Parker. Waugh once put McCanlis away to the leg boundary in splendid style, but, with only 14 scored, he turned a ball from McCanlis which rose rather abruptly, straight into the hands of short square-leg. Prior to this, Porter had been missed in the slips, but the mistake did not prove expensive, for, at 17, Porter was beaten and bowled by a very good ball from Parker.

These two early reverses naturally had a very sobering effect on the batsmen, and for a time it was slow and laborious going, with Powell and Webb concentrating on defence. Gradually, however, Powell began to take the measure of the bowling, and having played himself in, he scored with some freedom, being very severe on anything in the nature of a loose ball. Webb was quite content to let Powell monopolise the scoring, and, despite several changes of bowling, this form of co-operation prevailed until the score had been taken to 81, at which point Powell, having a fling at a rising off ball, was well caught in the gully. He was in an hour and five minutes for his 43, and it was a rather unnecessary ending to an innings, which had been gaining in merit as it progressed.

#### FIELDING NONE TOO GOOD.

The Surrey fielding had been none too good up to this point, and Webb owed his survival to a bad miss by McMurray at cover point. Goundry followed in after Powell's dismissal, but left without scoring, and four wickets were down for 83. Webb and Darvill, however, managed to last out to the luncheon interval, which was taken with the total standing at 94 for 4.

After the interval Webb and Darvill still further improved Suffolk's recovery. Both batted very carefully, picking out the right ball to hit with admirable discrimination, while to the good length ball they presented an immaculately straight bat. Runs came slowly but steadily, and the 100 was safely passed. Darvill enlivened the proceedings by cracking Crouch to leg with a powerful hit, which only failed to clear the ring by a few inches. Darvill was very efficient in dealing with anything on the leg side, and in the next over he dispatched Whitfield for 4 in the same direction.

#### WEBB'S 60.

Then Webb reached his 60, having been at the wicket altogether for 2 hours 20 minutes, a very valuable, if slow, effort at a critical time.

Both Webb and Darvill were now rapidly gaining in assurance and enterprise. Webb took two 4's off consecutive balls from Whitfield with clean, well-timed, straight drives, and when McCanlis relieved Whitfield, Darvill clipped him to the square leg boundary with one of the best strokes of the innings. This

fifth wicket pair had come together at 83, and they had the satisfaction of doubling the score before parting company, the total having reached 167 before Webb was caught behind the wicket off a short ball from Parker. The Old Ipswichian had five 4's in his 81. As often happens in an extended partnership, Darvill did not survive him long, being bowled by a well pitched ball from Parker 4 runs later.

#### AN ENTERTAINING INTERLUDE.

Play had not been in progress for long after tea before rain caused the first stoppage, but to the last ball before the players came in Bailey played his first bad stroke in an innings that had been full of good ones, and paid a natural penalty when he was caught at backward point. There was no more cricket till twenty minutes to six, and then Kent came in as Hurlock's partner, and treated an almost empty ground to a delightful exhibition of his repetitive strokes. He reminds one of a concert singer who always gives an encore, whether the audience asks for it or not. If he misses a ball, he plays the perfect stroke immediately afterwards while the wicket-keeper is tossing the ball back to the bowler—just to show us how it ought to be done. Just about this time there were heavy clouds rolling across the sky, and the light was bad, and the drizzling rain wetting, but these picturesque and educative shadow strokes added greatly to the gaiety of the cricket, and the climatic gloom was further enlivened when Hurlock, who had just previously been badly dropped at second slip, credited his score with 4 with a most artistic, if unorthodox, drive over slips' heads! Altogether, this was a charming little interlude.

Then Kent sharpened up his tomahawk, so to speak, and got down to business. After a quarter of an hour without scoring, he was making up for lost time with great gusto when rain again intervened. When play again became possible at a quarter to seven, Hurlock was bowled. His sterling innings was the surprise of the day, and he thoroughly justified his promotion in the batting order. Some of his strokes may not have been quite 18-carat, but there were plenty, too, of unexpected merit, especially one cover-drive for 4, so perfectly timed that it sent the ball to the boundary with majestic speed. The close of play came with the score at 255 for 8, but not before the irrepressible Kent had heralded the proximity of the football season with a little dexterous footwork, wherein he apparently kicked the ball to save his wicket after a stroke that didn't come off.

**BATSMAN'S UNUSUAL DISMISSAL AT BURY ST. EDMUND'S.**

As a result of the first day's play in their annual match with the Gentlemen of Suffolk, which was commenced on the Victory ground, Bury St. Edmund's, on Friday, the Foresters, under the leadership of E. W. Lake, were able to declare at the tea interval with a total of 308 for six wickets. Although the innings lasted approximately four hours, only 67 had been scored in the first hour and three-quarters, the other 241 being obtained in two and a quarter hours after lunch for the loss of two further wickets. In the hour and a half remaining the Suffolk side made just as indifferent a commencement, losing their first four batsmen for 50, in an hour, the position being materially reversed, however, when Capt. Beauford joined E. J. Unwin, the pair adding 58 in half-an-hour without further loss.

Batting on a wicket which, after the effect of morning rain had worn off, proved an easy scoring one, the Foresters lost their first two batsmen for 30, and had only 67 on the board for the loss of four wickets in the hour and 45 minutes' play before lunch. H. D. Hake's dismissal was brought about in an unusual way. In making a stroke off G. Unwin he played the ball into the top of his pads, and before he could dislodge it the wicket-keeper ran round to pick it out. Bill West, the well-known Counties umpire, upholding an appeal by the bowler, on the ground that the ball was not dead. After lunch C. V. Gillespie and Capt. Maturin-Baird carried the score along at a much more rapid pace, Baird passing his individual 50, and 84 being added in just over half an hour. Unwin, who was beaten by C. Unwin, his 57 containing seven 4's and four 3's. With Lieut. Cochran in, the second hundred was passed. Gillespie once lifting G. Unwin to the extreme corner of the ground for 6. At 245, Gillespie topped his hundred, and runs continued to come apace. Cochran hitting J. Unwin twice in succession for 5's all run. At 262, Gillespie was out to a well-judged catch at long-on, the fieldman cleverly securing a ball which was going away from him. Batting just over three hours, Gillespie hit a 6, 2, 3 and fourteen 4's. Scoring was just as fast with M. Leveson-Gower and Cochran together, the third hundred being passed after play had been in progress four hours, and eight runs later the innings was declared. Cochran's 58 not out containing two 5's and five 4's.

Capt. Bevan, who opened the Suffolk innings with J. H. Wilson, was low before to M. Gillespie with only 23 on the board, and with only 8 added, the same bowler sent back F. St. G. Unwin. With E. J. Unwin in, Lieut. Cochran, who had sent down seven overs for 10 runs, gave way to another spin bowler in Col. Wilson, but Gillespie got two more wickets quickly, four being down just after the 60 had been telegraphed, after an hour's play. When Capt. **SUFFOLK SAVE GAME AT FELIXSTOWE.**

**HERTS. COMPEL HOME SIDE TO FOLLOW ON.**

**H. L. PORTER'S FINE EFFORT IN SECOND INNINGS.**

With three wickets down overnight for 78 against a declared total of 428 for the loss of the same number of visiting batsmen, Suffolk had a long furrow to plough at Felixstowe on Wednesday. Rain delayed the start for just over half-an-hour, but it was at no time very heavy, and when the covers were removed play was possible immediately. H. L. Porter (20) and H. B. Goundry (30) resuming to Roberts and F. Appleyard. Despite the fact that the bowlers made liberal use of the sawdust, neither batsmen could get the ball away, the first boundary, not coming from Porter off C. W. Ford, who had relieved Appleyard at 89, and after play had been in progress twenty-five minutes. Another 4 from Goundry off the same bowler brought the total to 97, but nearly ten minutes more had gone before Goundry sent the hundred up. Eleven runs later Appleyard brought off a remarkably clever catch at mid-on to dismiss Porter, the batsman taking a full knee high and holding it clear, although falling heavily in the effort.

With B. Darvill in, Goundry reached his 50, in which were six 4s, only to immediately afterwards see one to long-on, who made no mistake with it, the fifth wicket falling at 112, and an hour's play having produced 34 runs for the loss of a couple of wickets. The visitors continued to show smart hitting, and against a frequently varied attack, neither Darvill nor C. C. Bailey found many scoring opportunities, runs coming slowly and chiefly by singles. Bailey had a life in the slips before reaching double figures, but the pair remained together until the score had reached 158, when from the last ball before lunch Darvill was out to a smart one-handed catch at first slip, 89 having been added to the total in two hours.

After lunch Bailey and Norman Catchpole, by steady, if somewhat subdued batting, had added 13 before Catchpole was leg-before to Ford, and four runs later a swinging " Yorker " beat the Suffolk skipper, who, batting steadily for seventy-five minutes, had seen 63 added during his stay, to which his own contribution was a useful 26. When R. V. Howard was out to a lame stroke at 183, the home side wanted 245 to save the follow-on, with only C. W. Hurlock to join A. S. Kent, who had tackled the situation with his usual courage by twice smashing the ball to the boundary. In his determination to put a better complexion on matters Kent's impetuosity proved his undoing. Attempting a forcing shot against Roberts, he was beaten by the spin of the ball, and adjudged to have his foot out of the crease, the innings closing for 190 at approximately 3 o'clock. Roberts, sixteen of whose thirty-two overs were maidens, claimed seven wickets for 46 runs.

Batting again, 206 runs in all, the home skipper accompanied Porter to the wicket himself, but any material hope of improving the situation was at once damped when Bailey was caught in the slips off the second ball he received. Webb and Porter taking no risks, remained together to the tea adjournment, when the score had reached 44, but no sooner had the half-century been reached than Webb, who had batted carefully for his 20, was snapped off Roberts, and with only half-a-dozen added. Powell was out to a well-judged catch in the long field. Hopes rested with Waugh, but after hitting a couple of 4s and two singles he was out to a splendid catch on the boundary from a hit which looked like an inevitable "6." Four wickets for 70 was the state of the game when Goundry joined Porter, but the newcomer did not stay long, a good one from Longton beating him at 73, after he had made a couple of singles. Porter, although batting with restraint, never seemed in difficulties, and when Darvill joined him the home county's position was considerably improved, the pair seeing the hundred hoisted before Darvill succumbed to an appeal by the wicket-keeper. With a chance of securing an outright win the game was continued for the extra half-an-hour. Kent again at once made his presence felt with three quick boundary hits, but was out to a clever catch in the slips at 126 with still a quarter of an hour to go. Norman Catchpole remained with Porter whilst 15 were added, a dilatory response resulting in his being run out. Seven minutes remained when R. V. Howard arrived, but neither he nor Porter, who carried his bat through the innings, were dislodged, and stumps were drawn with Hertfordshire having to be content with no more than the points for a lead on the first inn 18

It has been an interesting week for the members of the Felixstowe Town Cricket Club. They had three good games over the week-end, and then later in the week came four days of county cricket. On Saturday the Town entertained Old Ipswichians, and the visitors went in first to score the round 200 for four wickets, where they declared. H. C. Webb, who was skippering the Ipswichians, contributed a wonderfully good 107, a sound innings all the way through, with the exception possibly of a hard chance at 95. The Town replied confidently at the outset with their opening bats, A. N. Gardiner and C. Hobrough, who got 60 and 32 respectively. After this, however, came a rapid decline, and valuable bats were dismissed cheaply, so that when time arrived, and the total stood at 115, six Felixstowe wickets had fallen. The Town were without H. P. Waugh and Dr. J. L. Johnston, each of whom had an injured hand. The doctor received his injury during net practice.

The Stewartby match was, as expected, a very genial affair, in spite of the drizzly rain. The visitors brought their usual contingent of supporters, and some interesting play was witnessed. ## A TRAVESTY OF CRICKET.

### SUFFOLK AND SURREY II. MATCH ENDS IN A FIASCO.

#### BATSMEN WHO REFUSED TO SCORE RUNS.

#### MINOR COUNTIES SYSTEM EXPOSED TO RIDICULE.

The final stage of the Minor Counties' match between Suffolk and Surrey II. at Felixstowe on Saturday provided about as good a fiasco as could possibly be staged on a cricket field, and we had the ludicrous sight of Suffolk bowlers tossing up the most hittable balls they knew how to unloose, and of Surrey batmen refusing point-blank to have anything to do with them.

The situation arose in this way. Suffolk's first innings closed for 263, and Surrey were left with a possible six hours' play in which to gain the first innings' lead—which, as it subsequently transpired, they did not want to gain. By tea time on Saturday, they had made 197 for two, so that at that point they needed only 67 more to lead Suffolk on the first innings, and there were still two hours left for play—if the extra half-hour were to be claimed. On resuming, however, it soon became apparent that the last thing the batsmen wanted to do was to score runs. Long hops, full tosses, and non-volleyed shots were sent down, but they simply turned up their noses at them, so to speak. This strange behaviour naturally provoked some mild barracking from the small crowd present. The solution of the mystery was this. Surrey have 75 per cent. or thereabouts in the Minor Counties Championship table. If they were to win this match on the first innings (and certainly result was possible) they would have secured 3 points out of 6, or, in other words, 50 per cent., and that, of course, would have reduced their percentage in the table. If, on the other hand, they abstained from topping Suffolk's score, the match would be written down as having a "no result" decision, and would not count in the championship. Neither side would get any points, and therefore Surrey would remain where they were.

For this reason was cricket reduced to an utter absurdity. But the Surrey players were not to blame. It is the system which permits such a fantastic travesty of the game which is to blame.

There seemed no prospect of a definite finish being arrived at when the match was resumed on Saturday morning. Rain had cut two chunks out of the day's play on Friday, and Suffolk had certainly not carried over their runs in carrying their total to 265 for 8 when stumps were drawn. They cannot be blamed for this. For one thing, there must have been in their minds an uncomfortable memory of the ruthless defeat they had sustained at the Oval earlier in the season, and their predominant desire was, naturally, to put up a better show in the return fixture. In the second place, Suffolk's batting resources did not contain the skill to make runs quickly off such high-class bowling as Surrey confronted them with. It must be borne in mind that the great majority of the Surrey side have often played for their county's first-class team, and in these circumstances, Suffolk must be considered to have put up a very creditable performance in keeping the visitors in the field all day. There had been a heavy fall of rain overnight, but, in the absence of sun, the wicket played dead easy when the game was resumed this morning.

#### GAMBLE'S FINE CATCH.

Only a few minutes' play were necessary to finish off Suffolk's innings for the addition of 8 runs. At 263, Howard was out in a way on account of which he need never reproach himself. He turned a ball from McCannils to leg, and Gamble, at short square-leg, took it on the run low down with the left hand. This was a brilliant instance of a very difficult catch being made to look childishly easy. One run later, Lloyd was caught at second slip, the innings closing for 263, Kent being unbeaten for a decorative innings of 21. Parker and McCannils were Surrey's two most successful bowlers, the former taking 4 for 59 and the latter 5 for 69.

When Surrey began their innings at half-past eleven, it looked as though the only thing to play for was the first innings lead. If this was Surrey's objective they had plenty of time at their disposal, and Mobby and Fishlock, the opening pair, certainly batted at their leisure during the first hour. Mobby credited 12 to his account with three 4's off no balls from Hurlock, but apart from this there was not a great deal of colour in the batting, and with only 20 runs coming during the first half hour, including the above three boundaries, the Suffolk bowling must have felt that it was being treated with flattering respect.

#### FIELDING BLEMISHES.

For some time little of incident occurred, but runs came quietly and steadily, 80 going up in as many minutes. The Suffolk fielding

was not without its blemishes. Some said that Mobby was dropped in the slips off the first ball of the innings, but from the pavilion it was difficult to see whether it was a chance or not, but there was no doubt about him being missed in the slips by Porter when he had scored 38. This mistake, however, was not expensive, Mobby being leg before to Hurlock a few runs later, with the total at 92. When Wilson joined Fishlock runs came at a quicker pace, and at lunch Surrey had scored 125 for 1.

There was only a few minutes' play after lunch before rain stopped the game, but during that period Surrey lost the wicket of Wilson, who was caught by Lloyd off Hurlock.

Continuous rain prevented a resumption for the best part of an hour, but when Fishlock and W. T. Cook were able to continue their innings the former quickly ran into three figures, though not before he had given a possible chance of stumping. He had been batting 24 hours in scoring 102 out of 178.

#### THE ANTI-CLIMAX.

At tea-time the score stood at 197 for two, and up to this point there had been no indication of the fate that was to come. Of the cricket that took place after tea, the less said the better. After W. T. Cook and Whitfield had been disposed of, McMurray stayed three-quarters of an hour for one solitary run—or rather wick. This was no discredit to him; he was acting under the orders dictated by high diplomacy. Fishlock behaved much the same, but twice he forgot himself, and hit boundaries, causing his captain's heart to come into his mouth. Thus can God's good time be prostituted in England's green and pleasant land! Of course, Suffolk could have defeated Surrey's intention by crediting the visitors' score-sheet with 50 byes—or by bowling endless wides and no-balls—or by kicking the ball over the boundary—or by all lying down and going to sleep! But they did wisely, I think, in resorting to none of these expedients.

**HURRICANE CENTURY BY CAPT. BEVAN.**  
Continuing their innings at Bury St. Edmund's, on Saturday morning, the Suffolk side, who had scored 105 for the loss of four wickets in reply to the Free Foresters' first innings declared total of 308 for six, had no difficulty in avoiding the follow-on, and, although 11 behind their opponents, Capt. Beauford, who led the Suffolk side, also declared when nine wickets were down at the lunch interval. Batting again after a shower, which, although not heavy, had lasted an hour, the Foresters lost three wickets for 37 runs, but a timely effort by A. A. Goodwin enabled H. W. Lake to make third "declaration" in the match, leaving the Gentlemen's side 219 to get to win in just under two hours, a feat which, thanks to a hurricane century by Capt. Bevan, they succeeded in accomplishing with twenty minutes to spare.

E. J. Unwin (39) and Capt. Beauford (20), the overnight not-outs, carried the total to 122, when a catch in the slips by Lieut. Cochrane, off Gillespie, broke the partnership, by sending back the home skipper, and, with half the side out for 122, the situation was none too gratifying, but Charles Wilson rose to the occasion and despite two more catches by Cochrane off Gillespie, who had taken the first seven wickets, the total had reached 260 before Wilson was bowled by Admiral Lake. Having seen 138 added during his stay, "C. S." had four 4's and five 3's in his 87. Included in J. Unwin's sound 57 were half-a-dozen boundary strokes. (The position of the home side was materially strengthened by a steady knock by E. C. Aitken, who was undefeated with 45 to his credit, when, with the total at 264 and nine wickets down, a smart shower caused a cessation of play. Lunch was taken, and during the interval the innings was declared.

Going in a second time, on a wet wicket, but in bright sunshine, the Foresters lost H. D. Hake, Admiral Lake and Col. Wilson for 37 runs, but A. A. Goodwin and Cochrane stopped the rot, 66 being added before the naval officer was sent back. Goodwin and H. Leveson-Gower remained together to increase the score to 166, when Goodwin, who had helped to put on 143, was out to a well-judged catch in front of the screen, following a big off-drive off Aitken. Batting an hour and twenty minutes, the Suffolks' officer had seven 4's in his 73, made by sound and bright cricket. With the total at 174 for five, H. W. Lake made yet another declaration, leaving Capt. Beauford's side 219 to get to win in, roughly, two hours.

J. H. Wilson and Capt. Bevan, who again opened the Suffolk innings, put on 70, of which Bevan's share was 50, in half-an-hour. Wilson was bowled at 89, but, with F. St. G. Unwin and Bevan together, the 100 was telegraphed after half as many minutes' play, and Bevan reached his individual century with the total at 143, having batted just over an hour. At 169 Bevan put up one high to "cover," which Covill fielding as sub., secured with one hand. Batting seventy minutes, Bevan's 117 contained seventeen boundary strokes. The second hundred was reached inside two hours, when E. J. Unwin joined "F. St. G." and the winning hit was made five minutes later, with twenty minutes to spare.

**HURRICANE HITTING BY J. CATCHPOLE.**

**CHEAP M.C.C. WICKETS FOR F. H. LLOYD AT FELIXSTOWE.**

**Suffolk v. M.C.C.**

For this two days' match, which was commenced on a plumb wicket and in sunshiny weather, on the Felixstowe ground, yesterday, the "Club" had four professionals in the side skippered by G. W. Lowther.

There was a good sprinkling of spectators in the morning, and the attendance in the afternoon was particularly gratifying, proving once again the attractiveness of M.C.C. sides in the neighbourhood.

M. Kingsley and Brown (G.), the old Hampshire player, opened the visitors' innings to F. H. Lloyd and C. W. Hurlock. With only five scored, Brown was caught at short leg off Lloyd, and with 18 added Watkins (Middlesex) had his stumps hit by the same bowler, who followed this by getting Compton dismissed "leg before" without any addition to the score. Runs came steadily, however, with M. E. Impey and Kingsley together, and Hurlock was replaced by H. B. Goundry. An over later, Lloyd, who had sent down seven overs for nine runs and three wickets, gave way to J. Catchpole, Kingsley twice edging balls from the latter through the slips. Hurlock came back at 80, and with his first ball got Impey caught at short slip, the fourth wicket falling after just over an hour's play. Kingsley reached his 50 directly after W. C. Caesar arrived, and Lloyd went on again at his old end. Hurlock had seven men behind the wicket, and although runs were kept down for a time the 100 was telegraphed at the end of eighty-five minutes. Thirteen runs later, following a smart throw-in by Lloyd, which hit the stumps, Kingsley was run out, his 72 containing nine 4's. With A. B. Loveridge in, G. W. Hockey, who had throughout been conspicuous at cover, was tried for the first time, and at lunch the score was 129 for five.

Hurlock and Lloyd, who had sent down 13 overs for 19 runs in the morning, bowled when the game was resumed, and in Lloyd's first over, Loveridge was stumped, the sixth wicket falling at 133. At 140, F. C. Bove played on to Hurlock, before he had scored, but Caesar and C. W. Lowther remained to see the total increased by 22, before Caesar, who during a stay of an hour and a quarter had seen 82 added, to which his own contribution was rather more than half, was at length beaten by Lloyd. H. D. Whatman, the old Ipswich and East Suffolk player, was cleverly caught in the gully at 168, but Powell, who had a life off Lloyd, early on remained with the skipper for forty minutes, during which 33 runs were added, the innings, which had lasted just over three hours, closing for 201. Powell was bowled by a good one from Catchpole.

Opening the County innings, H. L. Porter and J. Holt-Wilson faced Caesar and Brown. Batting steadily, the pair had put on 30 in comfortable fashion, when the West Suffolk player was out leg before to the Hampshire professional. H. F. J. Powell seemed at home at once, and following a single, helped himself to three successive 4's, but in attempting another powerful shot from the last ball before tea, was caught in brilliant fashion on the boundary, Compton running yards to secure the ball.

When G. W. Hockey joined Porter runs were obtained in quiet but confident fashion, but with 27 added the old Ipswich School player was beaten by Compton, the third wicket falling at 76. Five runs later R. C. Wright was bowled by Caesar but Porter and C. C. Bailey carried the score past the three figures before the county skipper was completely beaten by Watkins, half the side being out for 113. A better complexion was put on matters with H. B. Goundry and Porter together, 44 being added before the Lowestoft player was smartly stumped in playing forward to Compton. The light had become very indifferent when Jack Catchpole went in with six wickets down for 157, but his advent marked a rapid increase in the rate of scoring, a 6, following five 4's, enabling the home side to top the M.C.C. total in less than a quarter of an hour after his arrival, and with a full half an hour remaining for play 18 coming off one over from Watkins. Catchpole's hurricane hitting continued, the spectators being kept on the qui-vive whilst he hit three 6's and eight 4's in a brief but hectic stay of twenty minutes, to bring the figures to 238 before being caught at mid-wicket. With only three minutes left for play, Porter, who had batted throughout the innings, was bowled. Apart from a chance to silly mid-off when 66, he gave no apparent chance in an invaluable contribution of 87, the steadiness of which was marked by the fact that only five times did he get the ball to the boundary in the course of three hours' play.

**SUFFOLK'S SURPRISING DEFEAT.**

**M.C.C. WIN BY 117 RUNS.**

**LAST SEVEN HOME WICKETS GO DOWN FOR 14 RUNS.**

**Suffolk v. M.C.C.**

After obtaining a first innings' lead of 86, at Felixstowe on Friday, the County, thanks to a number of dropped catches, were kept in the field four hours on Saturday whilst the visitors ran up a total of 340 for four wickets, when Mr. Lowther declared.

Although there was not much likelihood of them getting the 255 necessary to win in the two hours, including extended time, left for play, there were no fears but that the Suffolk batsmen would be able to occupy the wickets for that duration. With 72 on the board when the first batsman left at the end of three-quarters of an hour, defeat seemed out of the question. Another 51 had been added before the fall of the third wicket, but the remaining seven batsmen were scuttled out for no more than a further 14 runs, leaving the M.C.C. side winners by 117.

Only a handful of spectators were present in the morning when Suffolk, 53 runs ahead and with two wickets in hand, continued their first innings, but the attendance, although not so gratifying as on the previous day, improved considerably during the afternoon, despite other attractions in the town.

Less than half-an-hour sufficed for Brown and W. C. Caesar to secure the two remaining wickets for an addition of 33 runs, of which R. S. Greenland claimed 26.

With arrears of 86 to wipe off, M. Kingsley and Brown (G.) again opened the M.C.C. innings, to Hurlock and Lloyd, and with only 15 on the board, the professional who had made a dozen of them, was sent back as the result of a particularly smart catch in the slips by R. C. Wright off Hurlock. Runs came steadily when Watkins joined Kingsley, and J. Catchpole went on at Hurlock's end, Kingsley on-driving the new bowler for a 5, all run. Catchpole only had three overs before being replaced by Hockey, but the separation was effected from the other end, Goundry getting Kingsley neatly caught at mid-off with the total at 65, the innings having then been in progress fifty-five minutes. Compton was next associated with Watkins, the latter with his score at 32 and the total at 70, being badly missed in the slips off Hockey. The arrears were cleared and the 100 went up after eighty-five minutes. At lunch the score was 125 for two.

On resuming, despite frequent bowling changes the batsmen continued to play steady if somewhat leisurely cricket, but Watkins was given another life when in the seventies, mid-on missing a sitter off Goundry. Eighty-six were added in an hour, and when the second hundred went up Watkins wanted a single for his century, which he reached off the next ball from Hurlock. Runs came quicker with Porter and Porter bowling, Compton also topping his hundred, and the score being increased by 70 in half an hour. With the total at 293, Compton was caught at the wicket off Catchpole, having seen 227 added during his stay of two hours and a half, his own 118, made without any palpable mistake, containing eleven 4's. The third hundred was reached with Watkins and M. E. Impey together. Watkins passed his 150, but was again badly missed in the slips off Bailey, only, however, to be leg-before to the next ball, the innings, which had lasted four hours, being declared with the score at 340 for four wickets. Watkins, who had remained the whole time with the exception of the first 15 minutes, hit eighteen 4's, and although his batting was marred by more than one let-off it was characterised generally by sound strokes.

Left with two hours to bat, Suffolk started in promising fashion, H. L. Porter and J. H. Wilson putting on 72 in comfortable style in forty-five minutes, although Porter was twice lucky in not being compelled to leave earlier, before he was caught at the wicket. Only 11 had been added when H. F. J. Powell lost Wilson as the result of a juggling effort on the part of the wicket-keeper, but the hundred was passed with J. Catchpole in, and the total taken to 123 before the third wicket fell, three-quarters of an hour then remaining for play. Powell, who had dismissed all three batsmen, continued his successful bowling, and, with W. C. Caesar taking a hand, the remaining seven wickets fell in half an hour for the addition of but 14 more runs.

## A TRAVESTY OF CRICKET.

### SUFFOLK AND SURREY II. MATCH ENDS IN A FIASCO.

The final stage of the Minor Counties' match between Suffolk and Surrey II. at Felixstowe on Saturday provided about as good a fiasco as could possibly be staged on a cricket field, and we had the ludicrous sight of Suffolk bowlers tossing up the most hittable balls they knew how to unloose, and of Surrey batsmen refusing point-blank to have anything to do with them.

The situation arose in this way. Suffolk's first innings closed for 263, and Surrey were left with a possible six hours' play in which to gain the first innings' lead--which, as it subsequently transpired, they did not want to gain. By tea time on Saturday, they had made 197 for two, so that at that point they needed only 67 more to lead Suffolk on the first innings, and there were still two hours left for play--if the extra half-hour were to be claimed. On resuming, however, it soon became apparent that the last thing the batsmen wanted to do was to score runs. Long hops, full tosses, and half-volleys galore were sent down, but they simply turned up their noses at them, so to speak. This strange behaviour naturally provoked some mild barracking from the small crowd present. The solution of the mystery was this. Surrey have 75 per cent. or thereabouts in the Minor Counties Championship table. If they were to win this match on the first innings (no definite result was possible) they would have secured 3 points out of 5, or, in other words, 60 per cent., and that, of course, would have reduced their percentage in the table. If, on the other hand, they abstained from topping Suffolk's score, the match would be written down as having a "no result" decision, and would not count in the championship. Neither side would get any points, and therefore Surrey would remain where they were.

For this reason was cricket reduced to an utter absurdity. But the Surrey players were not to blame. It is the system which permits such a fantastic travesty of the game which is to blame.

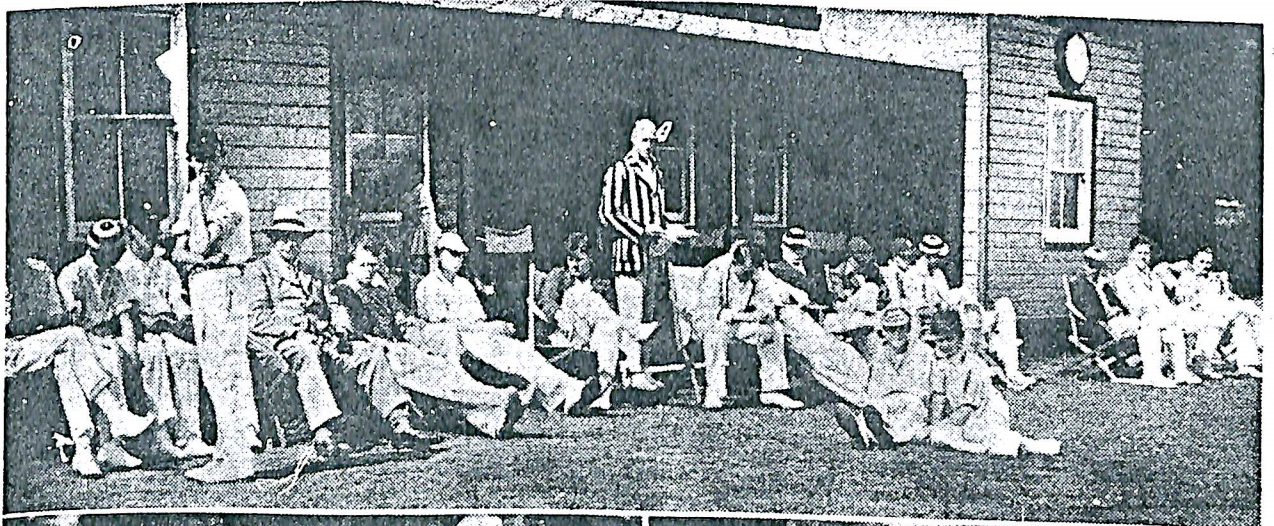

Whilst the fielding of the boys was keen enough, there were, on occasions, lapses which were rather unexpected, but it has to be remembered that they were all strangers to one another, and had to fill positions which were probably not usual to them. Batting themselves, in a bad light and with a strong and variable cross-wind blowing, they did well to total 78 for the loss of four wickets.

Batting first, on a fast wicket, the Club and Ground, after losing J. R. Lumley with only 24 scored, were given a sound footing by Col. Wyatt and F. W. Cocks, who remained together until the total lacked only one to make three figures, the Colonel, who had just previously passed his 50, being dismissed by Birks. At lunch, the score had been taken to 117 without further loss, but the first over after

the resumption saw the dismissal of Cocks, who was clean bowled by P. B. Forrest. With only half-a-dozen added, I. G. Mason was beaten by Miller, and when R. L. Johnston left five wickets were down for 157. Quite a different complexion was put on matters, however, when R. G. Dale joined Capt. Nightingale, the pair adding 92 in 65 minutes. After the Campsea Ashe player had left, Nightingale topped his hundred, and the innings, which had lasted just under four hours, was declared at the tea interval with the score at 304 for eight wickets, Capt. Nightingale, 116, including a dozen 4's, P. B. Forrest and J. D. W. Miller, bore the brunt of the bowling, the Ipswich School representative sending down 27 overs for 68 runs and two wickets. J. D. W. Miller, in 18 overs, had four for 57, whilst D. Birks, in five overs less, two for 58.

D. Birks and R. G. Barratt opened the School's innings, against S. E. Lovelock and R. G. Dale, but a change of bowling had to be made before they were separated, Barratt, with the score at 24, being caught at the wicket off F. W. Cocks. Birks, who showed commendable style, remained with Peter Forrest, to see the total reach 70 before being beaten by Cocks, but Forrest was out at the same total, and when H. R. Jaggars gave R. G. Dale his second wicket, the Schools had lost four batsmen for 78.

Play will be resumed at 11.30 this (Thursday) morning.

## SUFFOLK'S EXCELLENT RECOVERY.

FIRST INNINGS REALISES 316 AT CAMBRIDGE.

H. L. PORTER'S SECOND CENTURY FOR COUNTY.

### Cambridgeshire v. Suffolk.

For their final match this season in the Minor Counties' Championship, Suffolk began at Cambridge yesterday, the return fixture with Cambridgeshire, who, it will be remembered, won by ten wickets the previous match at Lowestoft. Suffolk made two changes in the side which drew with Surrey II., Evans and Covill replacing Howard and Darvill.

One of the characteristics of Suffolk cricket this season has been its perverse habit of making a disastrous start in the batting, and this unfortunate custom was faithfully observed again in the morning, when, after winning the toss, and taking first innings, they lost their first wicket without a run scored. Smith and Pask opened the Cambridgeshire bowling, and with the fourth ball of his first over, the latter had Evans caught at third slip. The ball cocked a bit, tis true, but even so, the stroke was a most unworthy one.

#### PORTER'S GOOD FORTUNE.

In Pask's next over, Porter, who had opened the innings with Evans, twice tempted the gods, and found them in a forgiving mood, but the uncomfortable fact remains that he gave two definite chances in the slips when he had scored 2. After these escapes, Porter batted with greater assurance, and with Waugh, gradually settled down, 50 runs coming without further loss.

Shortly after half-past twelve, a heavy down-pour of rain interrupted the cricket, and prevented any further play before lunch, but by that time Suffolk had made a good recovery after their bad start, Porter and Waugh having carried the score to 88.

Not until 3.15 was it possible to resume play, and only then on a new wicket, which, by mutual agreement between the two captains, had been prepared in place of the original one, which was thoroughly saturated at both ends. This appeared to turn out to the advantage of Suffolk, for the new wicket certainly did not behave very treacherously.

#### WAUGH STUNG BY WASP.

Just before Waugh went in again he was stung on the right hand by a wasp, but it did not seem to affect his play, and he made several excellent forcing strokes before he was caught at square leg with the total at 143. Shortly afterwards Porter reached his 50, after 90 minutes' batting, but the luck was with him again when he snicked Smith for 4 between first slip and the wicketkeeper, Suffolk's position was further improved when Powell came in, and quickly got off the mark with some muscular boundaries, and when the tea interval arrived the visitors had 151 on the board for the loss of only two wickets.

After tea the Suffolk score was carried ahead at a fairly brisk pace, Porter and Powell finding plenty of opportunities for run-getting, despite the fact that the bowlers were getting a good deal more help from the wicket than had been the case before the interval. An hour's further batting by this pair produced nearly 100 runs, and also saw Porter reach his second century for Suffolk this season. But a large slice of good fortune attended this effort, which occupied him about 3½ hours.

#### A PROLIFIC STAND.

On reaching three figures Porter began to hit out, and at 242 after being missed again, an attempt to drive Smith failed, and he was bowled. The third wicket partnership had put on 146 in 2½ hours, and, as often happens in a stand of long duration, the other partner, Powell, did not survive long, for, with a single added to the total a catch in the gully ended his virile innings. Powell hit twelve 4's and his wicket fell. When Webb was beaten by a Porter eleven, Suffolk had 274 on the board for only five men out, and they ought to have made an effort to get runs quickly. Instead, although Bailey appreciated the need of the moment, and made some excellent strokes, the scoring was very slow—painfully slow at times.

Careful tactics did not pay, however, and the last five wickets went down for 42, the innings closing just before 7 o'clock.

## SUFFOLK GAIN FIRST INNINGS LEAD.

CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISMISSED FOR 222.

### EFFECTIVE BOWLING BY WAUGH AND COVILL.

Suffolk gained a partial revenge for their 10 wickets' defeat by Cambridgeshire earlier this month when, in the return fixture at Cambridge yesterday, they secured the major share of the points for a lead on the first innings in a drawn game. Thanks to some good bowling by H. P. Waugh and Covill, Cambridgeshire were dismissed for 222, Suffolk thus gaining a lead of 94. The rest of the day's play was spent in the visitors gaining a little practice.

If all the catches offered in this game had been accepted, it is almost certain that neither side would have reached a total of 200, and, as a corollary, it is quite probable that the match might have been carried to a decisive issue. On Thursday, Cambridgeshire had, literally and metaphorically, let an additional number of opportunities slip through their fingers, Porter, Suffolk's highest scorer, being the most generously favoured. Yesterday brought a repetition of similar events, and Suffolk returned kindness for kindness by giving C. E. Coote, Cambridgeshire's top scorer, at least three innings. Just as Porter had been given two "lives" in one over, so was Coote.

There had been some morning rain when the match was resumed, but in the absence of sun the wicket played fairly easily when the home side began their reply to the Suffolk total of 316. Cambridgeshire started with Coote and Covill and by steady cricket this pair gave their side an excellent start by putting on 66 for the first wicket.

They were aided by faulty fielding, for Coote should have been caught at short square leg by Powell when he had scored 11. It was the substitution of Waugh for Covill, who is a brother of the Cambridgeshire professional, which gave Suffolk their first success. Despite a wrist damaged in a fall, on Thursday, Waugh bowled very well and in his third over he beat and bowled Covill. Suffolk's fallibility in the field was further demonstrated when Coote was twice missed in one over from Waugh, first behind the wicket and then in the slips.

#### LEISURELY PROGRESS.

With the match unlikely to produce anything more interesting than a first innings advantage, Cambridgeshire proceeded leisurely on their way, and runs came quietly until, at 93, a Suffolk fielder at last exhibited an ability to hold a catch. Wilkinson deflected a ball from Lloyd into the gully and Goundry fastened on to it. With Parfitt joining Coote there was some acceleration in the rate of scoring, and this pair put on 57 for the third wicket before Parfitt was beaten by a very good ball from Lloyd.

Lloyd had been bowling very well and this gave him his second wicket in eleven overs for 17 runs. Three runs later, at 153, Whewell was smartly stumped by Kent off Waugh, and lunch was taken at this point, with four of the home wickets down for 153.

Shortly after the resumption Suffolk had a run of success which brought into view the possibility of Cambridgeshire having to follow on. Four wickets went down for the addition of 42 runs, and when the eighth wicket fell Cambridgeshire still needed 22 to avert the indignity of being made to bat again.

#### COVILL'S GOOD BOWLING.

Waugh started the sudden collapse by bowling Smith at 171, and 13 runs later Covill took the first of three successive wickets when he had Coote caught at mid-on. At 195 the Bury and West Suffolk professional put in an excellent piece of work when he dismissed both Hart and Taylor in the same over. A little lucky hitting by Pask, however, saved the follow-on, and when the innings closed shortly

after three o'clock Cambridgeshire were 94 in arrears.

Suffolk went in again at a quarter-past three and spent the last two and a half hours in scoring 153 for the loss of half their wickets. It would, perhaps, be probing too inquisitively into the dark chambers of human psychology to inquire why a declaration was not made to give Cambridgeshire a sporting chance, and in vesting the closing stages of the game with some semblance of interest, Suffolk surely might have declared at ten minutes to five, when they had lost four wickets for 83, thereby setting the homesters the intriguing task of trying to get (if they liked to accept the challenge) 178 in an hour and a half. As it was, the match petered out in platitudinous boredom. Suffolk had gained three points out of five, and evidently they were jolly well going to stick to them. But there are two ends to a sausage.

**FORREST AND BARRATT WIN MATCH FOR SCHOOLS.**

When play was resumed, on the Woodbridge School ground, on Thursday morning, the Schools' side had lost four wickets for 71, against their opponents' first innings (declared) total of 304 for eight wickets.

The wicket, after heavy rain overnight, played tricky, but Ormsby, who skippered the Schools, surmounted all difficulties and remained to score 79 in accomplished style, with the result that the Club and Ground could only claim a lead of 66. Batting a second time, the Suffolk side were dismissed in an hour and a half for 127. Peter Forrest, Ipswich School, securing 44 wickets, and in an hour and forty minutes the Schools hit off the 194 necessary to win, thanks to R. G. Barratt and Forrest.

A. M. Ormsby, who had an overnight run to his credit, opened with J. D. W. Millar, 32 being added before the Lancing boy, whose best strokes were a couple of 4's and three 3's, was beaten by a good one from R. G. Dale. Ormsby found further support from P. Brown and M. Dewing, and when he was at length sent back, the Schools' skipper had seen 127 added during his stay of two hours and fifteen minutes, his well-campiled 79 containing seven boundary strokes. Dewing also batted extremely well in making his 20. Dale was the most successful bowler, his six wickets being obtained for 62 runs in thirty overs.

With a lead of 66, but in a bad light and with rain falling, Dr. Johnston and Col. Wyatt opened the Club and Ground's second venture, but after their early dismissal most of the remaining batsmen failed unexpectedly against the bowling of J. Forrest, only Mason and Capt. Nightingale contributing anything substantial, the whole side being out for 127 in just over an hour and a half. Sending down eighteen overs, Forrest had the excellent analysis of seven wickets for 61, the last five being obtained in three overs for eight runs. Nightingale had five 4's in his 44, which had occupied him fifty minutes in making.

Requiring 193 to avoid defeat, in the hour and three-quarters left for play, the Schools lost Birks at 17, but Barratt and Forrest rose to the occasion splendidly. Forrest once driving Lovelock over the boundary for 6, and the score being taken to 100 without further loss, after the innings had been in progress an hour and five minutes. When Barratt was caught at the wicket at 142, the partnership had produced 122 in an hour. In a very sound innings, the Woodbridge School representative, after a judiciously careful opening, displayed commendable freedom to top his half-century in which were half-a-dozen shots which passed particularly aggressive from the start accompanied his lusty six, with nine 4's, and had taken his individual score to 82 when he fell to a clever catch on the deepest boundary on the field. Only 26 were wanted to win when he left, and these were hit off by Millar and Ormsby.

**PROLIFIC SCORING GAME AT FELIXSTOWE.**

Although there has been almost continuous cricket on the ground throughout the season, Phillip Cooper was able to provide a cast-iron wicket at Felixstowe yesterday, for the occasion of a two-days' game against the Gentlemen of Suffolk. So inoperative were the bowlers that, although no fewer than 578 runs were scored in the course of six hours' actual batting, only three batsmen had been dismissed at the end of the day. In the absence of Dr. Johnston, the home side were led by H. P. Waugh, who, having secured the privilege of batting first, took C. G. Russell in with him to open the innings, the pair making such use of the opportunity that, despite the fact that Capt. Spirited hitting by Capt.
