# RIVAL COLTS IN BATTLE

## Yorkshire Bowling Fails to Impress

The end of a strangely unsatisfactory day's cricket between the second elevens of Yorkshire and Lancashire found Yorkshire 133 runs behind on the first innings, with nine wickets in hand.

On paper, the Yorkshire Colts did well to dismiss their opponents—a strong batting side—for 188 runs, but actually this total should have been a good deal lower. The bowling rarely rose above the mediocre, however, and it was difficult to recognise in the side even a shadow of the power which carried them to the virtual championship of the Minor Counties last summer.

Lancashire were saved from ignominious collapse by three batsmen, who, together scored 154 of the side's 188 runs, and while two of them, H. R. W. Butterworth and Farrimond, were holding the fort, the Yorkshire bowling was made to look depressingly innocuous.

Butterworth, the old Cambridge "Blue," is a delightful bat, with a wide and attractive range of strokes. He went in at a critical period when Lancashire had lost one wicket for nought, and played with the greatest confidence for 80 minutes. He had the misfortune to miss his half century by two runs, being stumped by Buller in over reaching at one of Heaton's shorter balls.

#### Puzzle of Farrimond

Farrimond presents a perpetual puzzle as a batsman, for he can, at times, play so many good shots that his more agricultural movements, indulged in with considerable frequency, seem unnecessary. Yet despite his frequent use of the crossbat, he is tremendously difficult to dislodge, for his defence is sound for all its unorthodoxy. He took severe toll of Hutton's inaccurate spin bowling, and when he skied a ball from Rhodes to Pearson in the deep, he seemed comfortably set for the rest of the day.

Rain had fallen throughout the night, and play before lunch was out of the question. Peter Higson won the toss for the home side, and chose to bat on a very soft wicket.

Yorkshire began in great style, Hall getting F. D. Beattie taken in the gully with the second ball sent down. Washbrook, the prodigy of 1933, was out soon after, and Bennett, the Australian, followed him one run later after playing a rustic shot to a straight ball which made Harry Makepeace quite depressed for a long while.

#### Fourth Wicket Stand

Butterworth and Farrimond then settled down, and the fourth wicket yielded 65 in 55 minutes. Hall had bowled well in his opening spell, but his captain was anxious to try out the newcomers, and, laudable though this intention was, it proved a costly move. J. R. S. Raper, the Bradford player, sent down four overs, mainly consisting of full tosses, and Rhodes did not look really dangerous at any period.

Butterworth left at 84, and Oldfield and Nutter failed to survive until the tea interval, the latter being well caught by Raper in front of the pavilion off a rank long hop to leg. Farrimond proceeded to enjoy himself at the expense of Hutton after tea.

Hutton has shown promise as a leg break bowler, but he must learn to control his length. His seven overs bristled with full tosses, long hops, and half volleys, and 53 runs had been hit off him when he was taken off.

Farrimond found a useful partner in Wilson, and the seventh wicket produced 60 runs before, with his score at 69, he fell to the catch in the deep off Rhodes. Wilson played a useful innings of 37, but the remainder offered little resistance, the last three men all leaving at 188.

Yorkshire had roughly 50 minutes batting, and scored 35 for the loss of Halstead. Hutton, who opened with Halstead, met with a curious accident before he had scored, and he had to retire for attention.

Farrimond took a ball from Bennett on the leg side, and as he threw it up, Hutton turned round. The ball hit him in the face, but, fortunately, the extent of his injury is a bruised cheekbone, and he will be fit to resume his innings to-morrow.

## COLTS' MATCH DRAWN

### Little Satisfaction for Yorkshire

#### LANCASHIRE'S POINTS

OLD TRAFFORD, Tuesday  
The Minor County match between the second elevens of Yorkshire and Lancashire petered out in a tame draw here this evening, Lancashire taking points for their lead of 36 runs on the first innings.

Yorkshire carried their overnight total of 35 for one to 182; Lancashire retaliated disdainfully with 193 for one in their second innings; and then, faced with the impossible task of scoring 170 in three-quarters of an hour, Yorkshire compiled a laborious 28 for the loss of two wickets before stumps were drawn.

#### Promise of Bottomley

Yorkshire can look back on their opening match with little satisfaction, for none of the regular members of the side did anything to enhance their reputations, while the newcomers were disappointing. Bottomley, who is attached to Keighley, has the makings of a useful batsman, and his stay of an hour at a critical period this morning showed him to be the possessor of a good defence. His bowling was not up to the same standard, however, but his all-round form justifies a further trial, for he is smart in the field.

Hargreaves was given a long spell in the Lancashire second innings, but he never looked like troubling either Butterworth or Washbrook. For one with such an admirable action, and lithe run up to the wicket, he is disappointingly lacking in "devil." To-day he never bowled at more than fast medium pace, despite favourable conditions, and his deliveries were so devoid of guile of any sort that they merely served to play the batsmen in.

#### Follow-On Saved by Rhodes

From a Yorkshire viewpoint, the best performance of the match was that of Rhodes, who played a really fine innings of 58 on an awkward wicket. He went in with the score at 45 for four, and it was entirely due to him that the Colts saved the follow-on.

Rhodes is a batsman of proved ability, and his success cannot therefore be considered when taking stock of promise in the team for future seasons. His innings was a masterly effort, however, and a delightful

one to watch, for he never neglected to punish any ball short of a length. He was at the wicket just under two hours, and hit a five, and four fours.

His batting was the only noteworthy feature of the play before lunch, which began with a procession of Yorkshire batsmen to and from the pavilion. Peter Higson tried seven bowlers, the best being Phillipson, who kept up a fine pace and an accurate length; Bennett, the Australian leg-break bowler with the weird but effective action; and Butterworth, a fine all round cricketer who mixes his "spinners" up well, concealing his "wrong-un" better than the average bowler of his type.

The Lancashire second innings showed that Washbrook is a gifted batsman for his age, and that his run of success last year was no flash in the pan. Butterworth made runs just as easily off the mediocre attack, and in face of such a display of bowling ineptitude the Yorkshire captain exercised great self-restraint in refusing to take the ball himself.

Washbrook slashed a series of long hops and full tosses to every part of the field, particularly bombarding the square leg boundary, and Butterworth was unbeaten with an elegant 41.

It was patent that no result would be reached, and Yorkshire's brief and uninteresting second innings merely afforded useful batting practice for those at the top of the order.

Yorkshire Colt's Fine  
Century

WALSALL, Wednesday

The end of an extraordinary day's cricket here has found the Yorkshire second eleven in a strong position in their second Minor Counties match of the season against Staffordshire. Winning the toss the home county somewhat naturally chose to bat on a wicket which looked as if it would play easily all day, but in two hours the whole side were dismissed for 88 runs, of which total the opening batsmen were responsible for 56.

Yorkshire, on the other hand, never seemed troubled by the wicket, and scored at a steady rate for the rest of the day. When stumps were drawn they led by 157 runs with two wickets in hand. Two young members of the Colts' side can look back on the day's play with great satisfaction, for Robinson, a young all-rounder from Denaby Main, who was making his first appearance in Minor County cricket, bowled with devastating effect to take five wickets for 13 runs, and then Bottomley, the Keighley professional, confirmed the promise he showed at Old Trafford by scoring a fine century.

These two did not, however, monopolise the honours, for Hall bowled with great pace and accuracy to hasten the Staffordshire collapse, and later in the day J. R. S. Raper revealed his best batting form in a century partnership with Bottomley for the fourth wicket.

Nine Wickets Fall for 11

From the confident manner in which Crump and Mayer opened the Staffordshire innings it seemed that Yorkshire were in for a trying time. The opening pair put on 38, and then the introduction of Hargreaves—bowling much better than he did against Lancashire—proved the undoing of Mayer, who slashed at a good length ball on the off side to be caught by the Yorkshire captain. Fitton stayed with Crump while nearly 40 runs were added, Crump doing most of the scoring by means of powerful driving and well-timed hooks to leg. At 77 began the most astonishing collapse, nine wickets falling for eleven runs. The bowler chiefly responsible was the newcomer, Robinson, who bowls medium-paced off breaks with an occasional faster ball which he conceals very cleverly. He dismissed Fitton and Wilkie at 77, and Gate and Sydney Barnes with successive balls at 81. Crump left at the same total, having batted extremely well for an hour and a half for his 40. The remaining batsmen failed to cope either with Hall's pace off the pitch or Robinson's well-flighted off spinners. With the last ball before lunch Hall finished off the innings by bowling the Staffordshire captain. His analysis of 4 for 18 was the reward of a magnificent spell of bowling, for he sustained his pace and accuracy with deadly effect.

Bottomley's Masterly Display

The Yorkshire batting in the afternoon was in a very different class. The innings opened with a bright partnership between W. E. Harbord and Halstead, who put on 30 quick runs before the latter was run out in attempting a third run following a series of overthrows. Harbord hit with power and precision in a polished innings of 23, but Barnes took a fine catch off his own bowling to bring about his downfall.

A brief but promising sample of Pearson's skill followed, and then for the rest of the day we watched a masterly display of batting by Bottomley, assisted by a series of partners. With Raper in 109 runs were added for the fourth wicket, the Bradford batsman playing some splendid forcing shots on the off side in his innings of 53. Bottomley was badly missed on the square leg boundary when 30, but this was his only mistake and blending eminently sound defence with commendable aggression when opportunity offered he completed his hundred by sweeping Lawton to long leg for 4.

Staffordshire tried a number of bowlers, but Barnes and the Yorkshireman, Backhouse, were the only two to trouble the batsmen. Backhouse, a left arm spin bowler,

who played for Yorkshire against the Rest of England three years ago, when he was a member of the ground staff at Lord's, is now professional to the Walsall club, and this is his second match with his new county.

BY 7 WICKETS

Douglas's Fine Bowling  
Against Staffs

WALSALL, Thursday  
The Yorkshire Colts gained their first victory of the season here this afternoon, when they defeated Staffordshire by seven wickets. Colonel R. C. Chichester-Constable declared the Yorkshire innings closed at the overnight total of 245 for 8, the Colts leading by 157 runs when Staffordshire began their second innings.

The home county fared better in the two-and-a-half hours before lunch, but another abrupt collapse after the interval left the Colts with 19 runs to get for victory. They lost three wickets in achieving their end, but this must be ascribed to lack of patience rather than lack of skill.

Staffordshire soon lost Crump, their hero of the first innings, when play was continued this morning, but a dogged partnership between Mayer and Gale put on nearly sixty runs. Bowling changes had little effect for the wicket was playing very easily, but when Bottomley came on he quickly disposed of Gale with a vicious in-swinging.

Ellerker's Enterprise

Mayer was only for short of his half century when Douglas beat him, and then, for some fifty minutes before lunch, the small but enthusiastic crowd were treated to a curious mixture of refreshing enterprise and depressing inactivity.

Ellerker, a powerfully built batsman with a wide range of shots which he is not afraid to use, provided the enterprise, for when he was not hooking and driving with delightful assurance, he was engaged in harrying his comatose partner with short singles.

Fitton, who was associated with him in this fourth wicket stand, was content to let the ball hit the bat, and at one period Douglas sent down seven overs for one run, while Bottomley's first five overs were maidens.

Staffordshire Collapse

The fourth wicket had added 75 runs when Fitton put a ball from Hall into the willing hands of short-leg, soon after lunch. In an instant the whole aspect of the game altered, and Staffordshire batsmen were passing to and from the pavilion with almost indecent haste. Douglas, bowling from the opposite end to his former spell, tied them all into a series of intricate knots, and spinning the ball with appreciably more effect, he ran through the rest of the side, taking five wickets for six runs. In all, he captured 6 for 28, the innings closing for 175, of which Ellerker made a gallant 58.

This brilliant spell of bowling by Douglas made Yorkshire's task a simple one, but Staffordshire went down fighting. Robinson, who has made such a successful debut in this game, hit one glorious straight 4 off Barnes with all the grace of a Woolley; Pearson was run out, and W. E. Harbord was finely caught close in, while seeking

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# SPORT AT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

## Opening Partnership of 232

Three two-day matches are prominent in the fixture list for the coming week-end, which includes a large number of inter-school matches. Repton conclude their game with Uppingham to-day, when St. Bees begin their match against Giggleswick, Sedbergh are down to play Stonyhurst, and Rossall meet the M.C.C.

The match at Giggleswick should be particularly interesting, for it concerns two sides distinctly above the average. The rival captains—J. A. Boucher (St. Bees) and L. V. Gallagher (Giggleswick)—have a very good all-round record, while several others, notably W. H. Kempston, the St. Bees batsman, and P. N. Crabtree, the Giggleswick bowler, have shown to great advantage in earlier matches.

The leading games to-morrow are between Ampleforth and St. Peter's, York, and Worksop and Mount St. Mary's College. Trent play Oakham, while club fixtures include the visit of an M.C.C. eleven to Oundle, Wrekin versus Cheshire Wayfarers, and Denstone versus the Derby Grass-hoppers.

A report will be found below of the unbroken first-wicket partnership of 232 by N. W. D. Yardley and N. A. Newman at St. Peter's School, York. A correspondent wishes to know whether this is a record for school cricket; as far as the number of runs scored is concerned, it is not a record, for double century partnerships have been fairly numerous in recent years. Last season I. C. Henry (196) and M. H. Bell (95) put on 275 for Uppingham's third wicket at Halleybury, and M. T. N. Jennings (142 not out) and A. F. T. White (115) scored 249 for the same school's first wicket against the Cambridge Old Uppinghamians only last month. It is doubtful, however, whether there have been many cases of unbroken partnerships of over 200, and the writer, personally, has no record of such an achievement.

ST. PETER'S, YORK, beat Weetwood by 94 runs. The feature of the match was an unbroken first wicket partnership by N. W. D. Yardley and N. A. Newman, who set up a new record for the School. They put on 232 runs before Yardley declared with his own score at 145, and Newman's at 74. Weetwood won the toss, and put the School in on a wicket which had some rain overnight. Yardley was never in difficulties, but at 21, Newman was badly misaid in the slips. The School captain soon began to score at a great rate, and in Auty's opening over he hit 6 and four fours. He gave one chance—a catch in the deep when he had made 117—while Newman, although on the slow side, batted very well. Weetwood never looked like breaking up the partnership, although they tried a variety of bowlers. Incidentally, this was the third time in five innings that Newman had scored over 50 runs. Weetwood were dismissed for 138, for R. Firth, a left-hander, could get no one to stay with him. Going in first, he was eighth out for an invaluable 60. Dodds was the best bowler, taking 6 for 66. The fielding of the School was much improved, while the introduction of D. G. Barnby behind the stumps proved a successful move.

GIGGLESWICK drew their return match with Settle, scoring 108 for 3 in reply to the town's 261 for 4 declared. The visitors batted first, and after H. Jones had scored a good 60, a hurricane fourth wicket partnership between D. F. Peacock (108 not out) and A. P. H. Aitken (58 not out) added 165 runs in 55 minutes. Peacock had seven sixes in his hard hit century—all made by straight drives. G. R. Abbs was the most successful bowler, with 3 for 95. Giggleswick had two hours to get the runs, but J. B. Harland (37) and J. P. Wright made no attempt to force the pace, 58 runs being scored for the first wicket in 70 minutes. Both the opening pair batted soundly against a steady attack. The remaining batsmen were content to score at their own pace, and when stumps were drawn, the School were 153 runs behind, with 7 wickets in hand.

ROSSALL forced a draw with Lytham C.C. in most exciting circumstances. In reply to the club side's score of 241 for 2, the School lost nine wickets cheaply; but the

last two men, Beresford and Martin, held the fort for half-an-hour and saved the game. Beresford, who went in at the fall of the fourth wicket, played a capital innings and Martin batted bravely at a critical time. The Rossall attack was not good enough for the club batsmen, though two or three times Beresford was unlucky not to get a wicket. Ainsworth (78 not out) and Preston (80 not out) were the principal scorers.

FELSTED were beaten by the Gentlemen of Essex. H. Ashton and Colonel F. T. D. Wilson put on 143 for the second wicket, Ashton making 82 and Wilson 65. The later batsmen, however, were not so successful, only L. D. Womersley (40) reaching double figures. Matthews took 5 for 72. Felsted started badly, losing three wickets for 11 runs. Matthews and Bullough took the score to 67, when the former was caught by H. Ashton off C. Ashton. Bullough went on to make 59 before he, also, fell a victim to Ashton, and after his dismissal wickets fell quickly, the whole side being out for 133. C. T. Ashton was the best of the visiting attack, taking 7 for 64.

WREKIN beat the King's Shropshire Light Infantry in an exciting and high-scoring game. The visitors batted first, making 214 for 7 before declaring, Hughes-Hallett scoring 103 not out and Careless 71. The School made a bold effort to get the runs, and after some enterprising cricket they succeeded with the last two men at the wicket. Moore (56), Crabtree (36) and Dove (31 not out) were the top scorers for Wrekin, while Haymes took four wickets for 55. Previously the School were narrowly beaten by Sutton Coldfield, the visitors winning by one wicket. The College scored 93, of which Crabtree made 21 and Haymes 17. F. Clark taking 5 for 35, Sutton Coldfield made 117 for 9, Greenhow bowling well to capture 4 for 11, while Haymes took 2 for 10.

STAMFORD gained an easy victory over King's School, Ely, at home. King's School batted first, and scored 116, A. C. Genders making a fine 54, but Stamford School passed this total without any difficulty. C. L. Edgson, their opening batsman, who

has played for Leicestershire, played a sound innings of 66, and was associated in a big first wicket stand with W. G. Wood, who made 32. Other useful scores were contributed by L. A. Clark (46), H. S. McGuigan (29 not out) and P. T. Ashby (25), stumps being drawn at 225 for 8.

ASHVILLE gained an easy victory over Leeds Allerton. Batting first, the School made light of the club attack, and hit up 236 for 2 in 95 minutes before declaring. Mr. White made 111 not out, W. Holdsworth 40 not out, and R. H. Eddon 40. Holdsworth and White then had further success with the ball. Apart from G. Wilson, who played a plucky, painstaking innings of 78, the club batsmen offered little resistance, and Allerton were all out for 117, leaving the School the winners by 119 runs. Holdsworth took 5 wickets for 29 and White 4 for 37.

## YORKSHIRE GENTLEMEN DRAW

The Yorkshire Gentlemen drew their game with the King's Own Yorkshire Light Infantry at Tidworth. After the visitors had been dismissed in their opening innings for 165 runs, the regimental side indulged in some free scoring, declaring their innings closed at 307 for the loss of nine wickets. # THRILLING FINISHES IN YORKSHIRE COUNCIL

## TWO BOWLERS TAKE SEVEN FOR 9

### All-Round Achievement by G. Gill

### RAWMARSH IN STRONG POSITION

A number of exciting and very unusual incidents marked the Yorkshire Council matches on Saturday. There were several extraordinarily close finishes, some phenomenal bowling, and that rare ending, a tie.

Otley were beaten by Earby by one wicket, with what in any event was the last ball. It was a game of big hitting, and only six runs short of 500 were scored. Otley declared at 245 for seven, and Earby set about their big task with vigour. Thanks largely to a fine innings of 94 by T. Crowther and 68 by T. Wear they reached 241 for the loss of seven wickets. Two more wickets fell without addition, but in the last over D. McKenzie managed to hit a couple of boundaries which gave Earby an exciting victory.

The tie was at Burley-in-Wharfedale. Ilkington made 178, and Burley required nine runs to win with three wickets in hand when the last over was reached. J. Clapham, a second team player of 18, was at the batting end. The first two balls flashed past him. The third he played to the boundary for four, and the fourth went to the boundary edge, where it was fielded for two. Clapham was left to score three off the last ball for victory and he tried for a boundary, but skied the ball for two and the game ended in a tie.

### Seven Wickets for 9 Runs

Skipton scored a fine victory at the expense of Slisden, thanks to consistent batting and to a remarkable bowling performance of M. Maroney, who secured seven wickets at a cost of only nine runs. He clean bowled five of his victims with balls that pitched a perfect length and turned sharply. In response to Skipton's total of 208, Slisden could only muster 59.

In the game between Staincliffe and Chickley, at Staincliffe, Arthur Idle (Chickley), a member of the Batley Rugby Union team, also performed the feat of taking seven wickets for nine runs. He bowled eleven overs, of which seven were maidens. At one period he had bowled six maiden overs, taking a wicket in each of the first five overs.

Upton Colliery's fast bowler, E. Humphrey, played an important part in his side's five wickets' victory over Monckton. Humphrey took six wickets for 25 runs in 20 overs, eight of which were maidens.

At Featherstone, G. Gill, of Altofts, made 90, including eleven fours, out of a total of 127 for 3 wickets. The other seven wickets fell for only 22 runs. With a few exceptions the Featherstone batsmen shaped very poorly, and Altofts won by 43 runs. Gill had a great day, for he followed up his batting feat by taking seven wickets for 24 runs, the last two with successive balls.

### The Leaders Do Well

Rawmarsh strengthened their position at the head of the Council by defeating Brodsworth Colliery at Brodsworth; but not before they had had a shock. Their success was due largely to W. Wadsworth, the footballer, who took five wickets for 16 runs, and when the Rawmarsh wickets were falling he rallied the batsmen, and with the aid of J. Pearson, took the score of 26 for five to 70. Still there remained a "kick" in the Brodsworth attack, and at the fall of the seventh Rawmarsh wicket, 28 were wanted, but Cooper and Rodgers made a stand and enabled the side to win by three wickets.

A surprise was the hollow defeat of Doncaster Town, for the second week in succession, by Sheffield United. Their batsmen were unable to deal with the fast

bowling of H. Hargreaves, who followed up his four for 21 of the week before by taking six for 23. Only one Doncaster batsman, B. Innes, reached double figures in a total of 42. Doncaster dismissed three Sheffield batsmen for 22; but R. Howson and J. Holmes made the runs without further loss.

Batsmen had the upper hand in the drawn game between Rossington Main and Firbeck Main, J. Barrett making 61 for Rossington, and J. Hutchinson, the ex-Derbyshire player, 60 not out for Firbeck. Sheffield Collegiate, usually an aggressive batting side, did not accept the challenge by Bentley Colliery to score 202 in two hours and eight minutes. Early Bentley bowlers by their accuracy tied down the rate of scoring, although R. H. G. Carr, who batted through the Collegiate innings, was confident, if slow. His 60 not out included 4 fours. By way of contrast, R. Chambers, in his 63 for Bentley, hit a six and 10 fours.

## DASHING CENTURY IN LEEDS LEAGUE

## BIG HITTING AT PARK AVENUE

### Robinson and Buller Add 103 in an Hour HUTTON IN FORM

BRADFORD, Wednesday  
Staffordshire were 92 runs behind on the first innings, with four wickets in hand, when stumps were drawn here this evening in their Minor County Championship match with Yorkshire Colts. A very fine innings of 67 by Hutton, and some fierce hitting by Robinson, the all-rounder from Denaby Main, who scored 71, were the chief factors in Yorkshire's innings, which realised 222.

Staffordshire made a bad start, losing three wickets for 13 runs, but a fine stand by the captain, H. W. Homer, and S. Crump did a great deal to retrieve their position. They had made 130 for 6 at close of play, five of the wickets falling to Hall, who bowled fast and accurately throughout.

Yorkshire won the toss, and Hutton and Hutchinson made a decorous start to two fast medium bowlers in Reynolds and Hutchinson. It was strange to see a Staffordshire eleven in the field without Sydney Barnes; with the exception of a period of ten years from 1914 to 1924, when he took part in no Minor County cricket, Barnes has been invited for every match played by the county since 1904, but on his form for them in the two previous matches this season he was hardly in the running for a place in to-day's side.

#### A "Different" batsman

In the two hours before lunch Yorkshire lost three wickets in scoring 90 runs, but none of these wickets belonged to Hutton. The latter was a different batsman from the one we have become so accustomed to watching of late, monumental in his inactivity. To-day he blended aggression with reasonable caution, and he rarely allowed a loose ball to escape unscathed. His off-drives and hooks were perfectly timed, and made with refreshing confidence and power. He lost Bottomley at 54—a victim to a fellow Yorkshireman in Backhouse—and J. R. S. Raper shaped well, only to fall to a good catch at the wicket at 70. Pearson edged one into the slips in the last over before lunch, which was taken with Yorkshire in none too good a position.

Fisher seemed anxious that his return to Minor County cricket should be celebrated in no uncertain fashion. He lashed out wildly at the first ball from Backhouse, and was dropped at short fine leg. Shortly after, his off-stump was removed by Reynolds with a really good ball which pitched on the leg stick.

Hutton had been batting in the same admirable strain as he showed before the interval, but when he had been at the wicket for 2 hours 25 minutes, he was beaten three times in one over by Crump. The third time proved fatal, for he went out to smother a leg spinner and was bowled off his pads. His innings of 67 was the best he has played for the Colts for a long time.

#### Unhappy Backhouse!

With half the side out for 113, the situation called for a strong man, and he was forthcoming in Robinson, a left-hand bat, who hits with carefree abandon at almost everything sent down to him. He found the right partner in Buller, and for the next hour the Staffordshire bowling was flogged to every quarter of the ground. Robinson was none too happy facing Reynolds, but he fell upon the unfortunate Backhouse with great relish.

The sixth wicket put on 103 runs in an hour before Buller was bowled by Reynolds for an excellent 39. Robinson reached his 50 in 80 minutes—not a sensational performance, but he had by no means enjoyed a monopoly of the bowling—and he immediately hit Backhouse for 13 in one over. He had made 71 when he eventually skied a ball to Crump in the covers. Fortune had played a big part in his success, but this does not detract from the value of

his innings, which included ten fours. Robinson left at 218, and the remaining batsmen were all back in the pavilion before Douglas had had time to launch his customary assault on the more remote parts of the ground.

Reynolds, who stuck to his work well, maintaining a good pace, was the best of the bowlers, with four for 48, while Backhouse, who took the first three wickets for 23 runs, ultimately had the less gratifying analysis of three for 70.

Staffordshire had 2½ hours batting after tea, and Hall spread consternation in their ranks by dismissing their first three men with only 13 runs scored. He had both Mayer and Heath taken behind the wicket, but Homer and Crump came to the rescue with a brave stand for the fourth wicket.

Homer took some time to settle down, but both he and his partner attacked the bowling with commendable determination. Crump was seen to particular advantage against the fast bowlers, Hall and Hargreaves, using his feet well to hook anything short of a length. He was three short of his half century when Hall bowled him, but Homer went on to complete a gallant 66.

## EXCITING PLAY AT PARK AVENUE

### Colts Win Struggle for Major Points POOR FIELDING

BRADFORD, Thursday

When stumps were drawn here yesterday in Yorkshire's Minor County match with Staffordshire, it seemed that the Colts were heading for a repetition of the victory gained at Walsall two weeks ago, but any hopes of a definite result were speedily dashed by persistent and heavy rain this morning. At one time further play seemed out of the question, but the skies cleared, after lunch, and a belated start was made at 4.15.

The brief period which remained produced some unexpectedly exciting cricket, and in the end Yorkshire just claimed first innings points, with a slender lead of eight runs.

Staffordshire had only four wickets in hand when Smith and Backhouse continued their innings, and they were still 92 runs behind. If catches had been accepted with the Colts' usual efficiency their opponents would have been all out for under 150, but for once the fielding was extremely poor, Douglas and Fisher kept the runs down for the first half-hour, the former keeping an immaculate length. When Douglas was relieved by Robinson at 140 he had sent down five overs for one run, and altogether he bowled no fewer than 13 maidens in his 18 overs.

Backhouse watched the bowling very carefully, but just when he looked like playing a useful innings he was caught at the wicket in Bottomley's first over. Buller has seldom kept wicket so brilliantly as he has done in the last two days. He caught four men in the innings, and came within a fraction of accomplishing a fine piece of stumping off

Hall on the leg side.

Goodway, an improved batsman, kept up his end confidently enough for a few overs, but he was out in an aggravating fashion, hitting his wicket as he played back to Robinson, who was bowling his off-spinners round the wicket to a leg-trap. Smith was then joined by Hutchinson, who curbed his natural impetuosity until tea, which was taken at 170, forty runs having been added in an hour.

#### A Charmed Life

After tea Hutchinson bore a charmed life. He showed an immediate dislike for the fast bowling of Hall, but although he was in constant retreat towards square leg, he managed to make a number of forcing shots, and send up a number of catches which were dropped all round the wicket. Occasionally, too, he would retreat towards point, and Hall hit him twice on the back of the legs without manoeuvring him into the right position for an l.b.w. decision.

Smith, meanwhile, was scoring steadily, making several powerful hooks past square leg, and when he had made 39, he suddenly launched a terrific assault on Hargreaves. He received four balls in the over in question, and after he had smashed two long-hops to the square leg boundary, and out another past point, he drove a half-volley wide of mid-on for his fourth successive 4.

Up to that point, Hargreaves had been bowling with more life than in previous matches, but he is still badly in need of coaching. He robs himself of a great deal of pace by delivering the ball square-chested to the batsman, while he has not yet learnt to follow through.

Hutchinson had made 9 in 45 minutes when one of his wild swipes came to rest in Pearson's hands at mid-on, and Douglas was brought back to claim a richly-deserved wicket at 214, when he had Reynolds caught behind the wicket.

Smith was unbeaten with a valiant 55, for which he had batted just short of two hours. Hall, who bowled so well in his first spell last night, had the best analysis, with 5 for 50.

# BATSMEN ON TOP TO THE FINISH

## Colts Have to be Content with a Draw CENTURY STAND

JESMOND, Tuesday

Yorkshire second eleven's match with Northumberland ended in a draw here this evening, the Colts taking points for their first innings lead of 43. Northumberland were dismissed for 226 and a century partnership between Fisher and Pearson enabled Yorkshire to declare at 133 for 3 in their second innings. Northumberland had only 45 minutes to get 177 runs, and they did well to score 80 for one before stumps were drawn, the extra half hour not being claimed.

Northumberland were not too well placed when Mackay and Dickson continued their innings this morning, and when they lost three more wickets with only 105 on the board there was a distinct possibility that the follow-on might be enforced. Hargreaves, who bowled magnificently yesterday evening, continued his good work, and after getting Dickson leg before, he clean bowled Gillespie.

### Seventh-Wicket Stand

The seventh wicket folled any Yorkshire hopes of a follow-on, for after Mackay had been bowled by Fisher for a patient 48, Atkinson and Robson played well to put on 57. Robson had nine 4's in his first 50, and after losing Atkinson at 162 he went on to make an entertaining 66 before the close of the innings. Hargreaves richly deserved his analysis of 4 for 38, while Fisher also bowled well to take 3 for 70.

Yorkshire met with a rude shock after lunch, losing three wickets for 31. Halstead shaped well before coming up against a "yorker" from Allan, who, encouraged by this success, dismissed Raper and Harrison in consecutive overs.

### Batsmen at Their Ease

After this, an atmosphere of serene calm descended on the ground. Fisher saw no necessity to force the pace, and Pearson badly needed a chance to regain his shattered confidence. Both batsmen were entirely at their ease against an attack which speedily lost its sting, and Pearson, in particular, played some attractive defensive strokes. After tea Fisher completed an excellent half-century, and Pearson was only five short when the innings was declared.

Northumberland faced the impossible task of scoring 177 in roughly 45 minutes, but against a rather unorthodox attack their first two batsmen went for the runs as though they had a thrilling finish in prospect.

Mackay sent in Dickson and Shields, who open the batting for Close House in Northumberland League games, and Dickson gave a most enterprising display of forcing cricket. He almost monopolised the scoring and hit nine fours in his 54—made out of 71 runs from the bat—before Halstead revealed talent in an entirely unsuspected direction by bowling Dickson with a most deceitful leg break. At this point stumps were drawn.

## FINE BATTING BY THE COLTS

### A Halstead Century at Newcastle

#### VIGOROUS FISHER

JESMOND, Monday

The Yorkshire second eleven opened their Northern tour in glorious weather here to-day, and, winning the toss, scored 269 for seven wickets against Northumberland before declaring. The home county had 90 minutes' batting at the end of the day, and had made 75 for three when stumps were drawn.

The colts' opening batsmen both showed good form, Halstead making a century, while Harrison, a newcomer from Wakefield, played a most attractive innings of 41, and, later on, Fisher came in to give a refreshing display of enterprise. Yorkshire had hoped for more than three wickets before the end of the day, but with the pitch beginning to show signs of wear, lost ground may be made up in this direction to-morrow morning.

#### Hargreaves' Improvement

The bowling in the last hour and a half was excellent, Hargreaves, in particular, showing a vast improvement on previous form. At last he is bowling with the pace and spirit which so fine a build and action lead one to expect.

The Yorkshire batting before lunch was of a curiously contrasting nature, for, although Halstead and Harrison, the opening pair, kept abreast of each other's scores, there was no comparison between their styles. Halstead was getting most of his runs by apologetic snicks behind the wicket in the early stages of his innings, but his partner batted from the start as if he had been used to Minor County bowling for years. He played some magnificent forcing shots on the off-side, and even his defensive strokes were made with a vigour that produced runs.

#### Unlucky Dismissal

Harrison watched the ball carefully, and never neglected an opportunity of scoring, so that it was with no little chagrin that one saw his promising display cut short by the indecision of his partner when he had made 41. Halstead played a ball from Atkinson down the wicket, called for a run, and then stopped half-way up the pitch. Harrison dashed for the other end, but he had no chance to gain his ground.

Halstead reached his 50 after two hours, and Yorkshire lost another wicket before lunch, Raper being leg-before in attempting to turn a ball from Atkinson which kept

unexpectedly low. Pearson has quite failed to find his form with the Colts, but it certainly appeared that he was unlucky in losing his wicket soon after lunch. He hit a ball into the hands of deep extra cover. The fielder, Gillespie, was under the impression that it was a "bump" ball, and although no one appealed Pearson walked out of his own accord.

#### Fisher Hits Out

Here the success of Northumberland was checked by a grand partnership between Halstead and Fisher. With the exception of Robson, who keeps an immaculate length with his slow left-arm spinners, the Northumberland attack lacked character, and, for an hour and a half, their fast-medium bowlers were treated with scant respect by Fisher, while Halstead brightened up to make several good drives through the covers.

Hitting with great power; Fisher had collected 70, and the fourth wicket had added 117, when he was caught at backward point by Bruce. There seemed a good deal of doubt about this catch too, but after a diffident appeal, he was given out. Fisher hit nine 4's.

Halstead did not survive him long, for he reached his century in 34 hours, only to fall to a catch at the wicket one run later. His had been a valuable innings, but he gave the impression that he was almost as unsure of himself at its ends as he was at the start. Robson, for once, failed to hit his customary six. Buller had the misfortune to be finely caught on the leg boundary. With the regulation 90 minutes to go, the Yorkshire innings was declared. Atkinson took 3 for 65, and Ord claimed his two timely wickets for 14 runs.

Northumberland are rarely in a hurry for runs, and any ambitions they may have had in this direction were damped by the loss of their first wicket at 14. Ord, an attractive left-hand bat, made 16, but with his departure, Mackay and Bruce wisely took no liberties with Hall and Hargreaves, whose length and pace commanded respect.

# SLOW SCORING AT SUNDERLAND

## Yorkshire Colts' Struggle for Runs

SUNDERLAND, Wednesday

For the whole of this weary day—with the exception of a refreshing spell of enterprise for Yorkshire's fifth wicket, and a few minutes of bright cricket in the last half-hour by T. K. Dobson, the Durham captain, and Woodhouse—we have watched batsmen scraping for runs in the Minor County match here.

Yorkshire toiled laboriously to score 202 on a good wicket in 4½ hours, and Durham retaliated in kind, finishing up 77 runs behind the Colts' first innings total with seven wickets in hand. A glance at the wicket in the morning was enough to convince any one that the side that won the toss would run up a very large score, but from the first over the Colts were struggling against some accurate fast-medium bowling by Glen and Ellis. Harrison was beaten by Ellis's second ball, for he was unprepared for the extent that this bowler can swing a new ball. Raper collected 12 quick runs in rather unconvincing fashion before steering an out-swinging from Ellis into the hands of second slip, but even the most unconvincing of runs were preferable to the painfully dull play which followed until lunch-time.

### Wearing Down the Attack

Halstead can bat very well at times, but when Pearson joined him the pair decided to wear down the attack by a process of passive resistance. Halstead had made three runs at the end of three-quarters of an hour, but he subsequently warmed to his work, reaching five in 55 minutes and double figures after an hour and a quarter. The partnership added 35 tedious runs in an hour before Halstead was suddenly seized with a desire to hit. He ran out to Elsdon, who bowled his slow spinners very well throughout the innings, and missing the ball was clean bowled. Fisher left before lunch, when the score was 87 for 4.

### Pearson's Sound Defence

Shackleton and Pearson played really good cricket after the interval and 105 runs were added in only 90 minutes. Pearson was eminently sound in defence and made a number of delightful shots, cutting the faster bowlers with force and precision, while Shackleton, undeterred by the negative tactics of his predecessors, hooked and drove in great style. The eighth bowler tried by Durham broke up this entertaining stand. Carter, the Sunderland footballer, is a left-hander, with no particularly formidable asset but a good length, but he had Pearson smartly stumped after scoring a capital 71, and in his next over Shackleton was taken in the slips for an equally good 56, which included six 4's. No one else reached double figures and the innings closed for 202.

Elsdon, who was not afraid to flight the ball up to the batsmen, was the best bowler, taking four for 66, but Carter had the satisfactory analysis of four for 22 in five overs.

The crowd of some 2,000 spectators had been tried enough by Yorkshire's slow scoring, but only loyalty prevented them from being equally bored when Durham began their innings at 4.20. C. L. Adamson and Gibbon were in no hurry for runs, and the 60 was not reached for an hour and a quarter. The Yorkshire bowling, with Hargreaves, Hall and Fisher giving nothing away, was extremely difficult to score from. Gibbon flicked dangerously once or twice at rising balls from Hargreaves on the off side, and eventually he was caught in the slips off the Sheffield bowler when he had made a patient 44. Adamson batted an unconvincing time for 25, but Dobson and Woodhouse showed us in the closing stages that the ball could be hit.

Hargreaves bowled for fully an hour from the pavilion end and maintained his pace and length splendidly. This tour has proved in no uncertain manner that he is a fine fast bowler in the making. Hall worked as untiringly as ever at the other end, and Buller's wide bowling was one of the best features of the day.

# COLTS' BOWLING FLOGGED

## Merciless Hitting by Carr

### SIX 6's: EIGHTEEN 4's

SUNDERLAND, Thursday

The charm of cricket lies in its changing moods. After an opening day of almost unrelieved boredom, spectators of the Minor County match between Yorkshire Colts and Durham were to-day treated to an exhibition of rapid scoring that has seldom been equalled on the ground.

It had been a question when play had been in progress for half an hour as to whether the home county would scrape together enough runs for a first innings lead. They not only accomplished this, but they made Yorkshire fight desperately hard to save the match, which was eventually left drawn.

Everything else in the day was overshadowed by the display given by Jack Carr. Durham had lost six wickets for 148, in reply to the Colts' 202, and were in a precarious position when Carr joined Elsdon, and for the next 84 minutes the score board danced to a riot of scoring.

### 6's Plentiful

Carr has a wonderful eye and a courageous nature, and, with good fortune on his side, he flogged the Yorkshire bowling as it has rarely been flogged before. The faster the bowling the further he landed the ball, and Hargreaves, whom he punished mercilessly, was soon in sore straits to know how to prevent a boundary off every ball he sent down.

Carr hit his first 6 off Hall, pulling him into the crowd on the far side of the square-leg boundary, and he then drove Hargreaves for several straight 4's and a 6. When he had made 37 he was badly dropped in the deep by Halstead, and, to show his relief, he hit Hargreaves for another 6 to the pavilion, reaching his 50 in 37 minutes. Shackleton provided him with his fourth 6, and he completed a whirlwind century in 70 minutes.

Elsdon, who had been batting less spectacularly, but much more soundly, reached his 50, and Carr then hit two more 6's over the square-leg boundary.

### Record Stand

When Carr had scored 134, and the partnership—a record one for the county's seventh wicket—had put on 192 in less than an hour and a half, Carr was bowled by the second ball Robinson sent down to him. He hit 6 sixes and 18 fours—108 of his runs thus coming from boundary strokes alone. Dobson declared at lunch with a lead of 163 runs, Elsdon being unbeaten for an admirable 61.

With the remainder of the day to bat, it was obvious that Yorkshire faced a severe task, and when Harrison left at nine, and Halstead ran himself out at 12, having scored four in 45 minutes, their chances of averting defeat were not exactly bright. Raper batted very well, putting on 30 runs with Pearson, and then was given out leg before to a ball which seemed to pitch well outside the leg stump.

Fisher and Pearson took the score to 74, when the former was caught at mid-on, but the saviours of the first innings then retrieved the situation. Pearson showed a perfect defence for nearly 2½ hours. He was unlucky to miss his half century by two runs, but Shackleton went on unconcerned until the end, which was precipitated by Robinson's confident challenge to a variety of bowling.

## SPORT AT PUBLIC SCHOOLS

### Two Fine Sides at Lord's To-day

In reviewing the Public School matches for the coming week-end, one is justified in forsaking the North on this occasion, and turning to the leading match of the year—Eton v. Harrow—which begins at Lord's to-day.

The two schools have met on 104 occasions, Eton having won 42 matches, and Harrow 35, while the remaining 27 have been drawn. This bare statement conveys an impression that these matches have been fairly level, but few people realise that it is 25 years since Harrow last won at Lord's.

There was evidence last year, however, that Harrow cricket is coming into its own again, for they had much the better of the game, which finished with Eton 105 runs behind, and four of their best men out.

Both sides are strong this year, but Harrow look more competent to force a victory, for they have a fast scoring batting side, and a useful quintet of bowlers. J. H. Pawle, probably the best Public School rackets player since the War, is captain, and he had the solid foundation of seven old flannels to build upon at the start of the term.

Pawle, who made a brilliant 96 against Eton last July, has been batting very consistently throughout the term, and he has received good support from B. D. Carris and E. T. Pelham, who open the innings; W. H. Joynson, a good forcing bat who goes in first wicket down; G. A. Stogdon, P. M. Studd, and M. A. C. P. Kaye. Carris and Pelham scored 150 for the first wicket against the XII. at the start of the season, the former making 120 and his partner 60. Joynson made 60 not out against Winchester. Stogdon—Pawle's rackets partner—is an attractive left hander who scores fast, and Studd and G. C. Hargrove are both sound bats.

#### Strong in Bowling

Eton have enjoyed a successful season under the captaincy of A. N. A. Boyd, a fine batsman whose innings this term include one of 163 against Eton Ramblers, and 111 against Charterhouse. Of the other old choices, Dixon has hardly struck his best form, and Villiers has been handicapped by illness, but Pilkington has steadily improved, and is bowling very well. Fisher has made an admirable successor to Bewicke behind the stumps. The attack is strong, with Rees (right-hand fast), Wild (left-hand medium fast), Campbell and Pilkington (right medium), and Mann—a son of F. T. Mann, the old Middlesex captain—to bowl leg breaks.

Harrow are depending chiefly on Kaye, Duveen (who did so well at Lord's last year), Carris, Bond (fast medium), and Stogdon in the bowling line.

Uppingham play their last match, against Notts Amateurs to-morrow, when Sedbergh, Wrekin and Denstone also bring their season to a close. Sedbergh have their most attractive game of the year, against the Oxford University Authentics, who generally include several Blues in their side for the Northern Tour, while Wrekin and Denstone play each other.

Giggleswick are at home to St. Peter's, York, and Trent play Derby Grasshoppers. On Sunday, Ampleforth have their annual match against Sir Archibald White's XI.

Uppingham failed to take a chance of beating Oundle at Uppingham, the match finishing with the home school wanting two runs to win with three wickets in hand. Oundle batted first and made 176 by consistent batting. Gillespie, who bowled very fast and accurately, came out with the splendid figures of 6 for 37.

The Uppingham first-wicket pair put on 63, and when Bell and White added 40 for the third wicket Uppingham seemed almost certain to win. However, the quick fall of

two wickets slackened the scoring rate, and the later batsmen failed to force a victory. Blake (41) and Bell (32) were Uppingham's top scorers, while Stuart took 4 for 39 and Newsholme 2 for 35 for Oundle.

AMPLEFORTH drew with the R.A.F. College at Cranwell. The R.A.F. College batted first, and made 278. At one time their score was 267 for 4, but the last six wickets fell for 11 runs after tea. Waddilove bowled courageously for his figures, of 5 for 68 and Wells had 4 for 61. Brett, who took five wickets for 37. Pitt had 2 for 52 and Ayton 1 for 20. In reply, the school lost seven wickets in scoring 121, the only batsman to play the Falcons' attack with any success being J. E. I. Grey (33) and J. A. Brett (23). Lambert took four wickets for 26 and Pelling 2 for 23 for the Falcons. The first crew lost to Oundle by 2½ lengths at York, but they still lead in the series by 10 wins to 4.

REPTON beat Rugby by three wickets in the first cricket match ever played between these two schools. Rugby won the toss, and were dismissed for 156, despite a fine innings of 42 by A. J. M. Chadwick. P. W. S. Coghill took 7 wickets for 53, six of his victims being caught in the slips. L. A. Barrett and R. M. Bagnall gave Repton a good start, putting on 46 for the first wicket, and they never looked like losing the match afterwards, the batting being very consistent, though R. West, of Rugby, came out with the creditable bowling figures of 4 for 37.

## GOOD WORK BY THE COLTS

### Cheshire in Trouble at Sheffield

A depleted Yorkshire Second eleven acquitted themselves very creditably against Cheshire here to-day, for after compiling an uneventful 197 for the loss of five wickets, they dismissed half of the opposing side for a mere 47 runs.

Cheshire are thus faced with an unenviable task to-morrow, for they continue their innings 150 runs behind, with five of their best batsmen already out.

On a drying wicket, the bowlers have held the upper hand all day, but whereas the Cheshire attack merely hindered the rate of scoring, Hall and Fisher were able to produce more tangible results. In fact, they troubled Cheshire's early batsmen so much that the first hour of the latter's innings saw only 27 runs scored.

Now that Buller is to qualify for Worcestershire, the Yorkshire Committee are looking for another deputy wicket-keeper, and a trial is being given in this match to Crick, of Barnsley, who is making his debut in Minor County cricket, together with Crofts, an all-rounder who has been showing good form in the Bradford League.

#### Happy Kippax

Yorkshire chose to bat first, on winning the toss, and in the two hours before lunch 64 runs were scored by devious methods. Halstead hit his wicket at 12, and made way for that happy cricketer, Kippax—now with Spen Victoria—who was celebrating a welcome return to the side after a year's absence. Kippax has now lost that disconcerting habit of attempting to score off every ball at the start of his innings. With Harrison he added 34 goods runs for the second wicket. Harrison was settling down well when he made an unexpected lapse from grace at 48, playing unnecessarily at a rising ball from Barber on the off side. Edmundson took a very good catch above his head, in the "gully," but no further success came the way of the fielding side before lunch.

The Cheshire bowling was very accurate, Barber, Bartley and Jones all keeping a consistently good length, and although the spectators on the "popular side" began to grow restless at so much inactivity, Kippax and Raper were not to be blamed for exercising caution.

Just before lunch, which was taken at 64 for 2, an unfortunate accident deprived the visitors of their wicket-keeper, R. P. Littler, who was struck over the eye by a ball from Jones which got up unexpectedly. He retired for medical attention, and had a stitch put in. It was thought inadvisable that he should play again to-day, and Cheshire took the field after the interval with J. D. Worthington deputising behind the stumps, and a substitute fielding in the latter's place.

#### Surprise for Batsman

After lunch Kippax used his pads with regrettable frequency, but no little skill. He managed to survive an anxious over from Jones, who appealed very confidently for l.b.w., and then struck him smartly on a less protected part of his leg. Stung by this unfriendly treatment, Kippax promptly gave Dutton a catch at third man off Bartley, but the chance was not accepted.

The third wicket pair put on 69 runs before a cunning piece of captaincy brought about Kippax's downfall. Edmundson was put on for one over at the pavilion end, and his first ball swung so much that, in his excitement, Kippax got his bat entangled in his pads and was out "leg-before."

He had played well for his 48, and the fact that he had taken 2½ hours to make his runs demonstrated that he has acquired

the self control in his batting which has previously been so conspicuous by its absence.

Raper soon followed, having made an extremely useful 37, and Fisher and Pearson held the stage until tea, when the score had been taken to 166 for 4. The pair put on 77 stolid but valuable runs, and on Pearson's ultimate dismissal for 41, Colonel Chichester-Constable declared, leaving his opponents 90 minutes' batting before the close.

What an unhappy hour and a half for Cheshire! Bates was run out at 6; Worthington batted 20 minutes for a single before he turned a ball from Fisher into the leg-trap for Hall to make a neat catch; and in the next over Dartnell brandished his bat vaguely at a fast off-ball from Hall to suffer a similar fate.

An hour's play produced the paltry total of 27, and with only three runs added, Dutton, who had looked acutely uncomfortable for more than 20 minutes, was caught in the slips off Fisher.

Then Cheshire suffered their biggest blow of all, Jones having his off-stump knocked flat by a beautiful ball from Hall at 44. When the visitors' discomfiture was brought to a temporary end at 7 o'clock, Hall had bowled 11 overs for 14 runs, and Fisher had sent down 12 for 17 runs. Crofts, not to be outdone, had five maidens in his seven overs, and deserved more material success.

### Cheshire Escape at Sheffield

#### EXCITING FINISH

Not content with their effective work at Headingley earlier in the week the gods of the weather turned their attentions to Sheffield to-day. Yorkshire Second XI. had an excellent chance of victory in their Minor County match with Cheshire when stumps were drawn yesterday, but rain fell steadily throughout the night, and though the sun shone frequently this morning, rain continued to fall with perverse determination.

Eventually it was possible to make a belated start at 4.15, and in the two hours remaining for play Cheshire batted successfully to prevent their opponents from gaining first innings points.

McEntyre and Shreeve continued the innings to the bowling of Fisher, and Crofts (from the pavilion end), and not a run was scored off the first four overs. The 50 went up when the innings had lasted 1½ hours, and then McEntyre hit Crofts for a most artistic 6, the ball bouncing off the top of the pavilion railings to disturb the contemplation of Bates in the players' dressing room.

#### Weird Tactics

This batsman continued to play with confidence, but Shreeve persisted in the most weird tactics. His enthusiastic attempts to cut balls from Fisher off his middle stump threatened to bring about his downfall at any moment, but, somehow, he managed to survive until the tea interval, when he had batted 70 minutes for six unconventional runs.

Heaton was tried at Crofts' end before tea, and he kept both batsmen quiet with his leg-spinners, although he was fighting the ball further up than usual; in fact he tossed one so far up in his second over that it was caught by the breeze and blown in the direction of point without quite qualifying as a wide.

McEntyre continued to bat well after the interval, watching the ball carefully, and hitting any loose deliveries tremendously hard. He seemed set for his half century, when he was beaten by a splendid ball from Hall, which took his off stump. The sixth wicket had added 48 valuable runs, and the danger of the follow-on had been averted for Cheshire.

A pull to the leg boundary by Shreeve sent up the 100, and then Edmundson faced Fisher, who had come on for Crofts at the pavilion end. He was quite nonplussed by the first three balls of the over, and then in exasperation, he swiped wildly at the fourth—missed it—and was out l.b.w.

#### Hall out of Luck

Shreeve evinced a great dislike for Hall's pace, and the fast bowler beat him repeatedly without hitting the stumps. Fisher claimed his wicket at 103, however, getting him caught by Crick when he had batted nearly two hours for 17, and soon afterwards the same bowler made a ball get up awkwardly to fly off the shoulder of Barber's bat into the hands of Halstead, close in at third man.

The last ten minutes provided plenty of excitement, for Yorkshire needed one wicket to secure their points. Hall and Fisher were both bowling magnificently, but Littler, who is reputed to have batted two hours for two runs in a recent county match, helped Bartley to play out time, Cheshire finishing up 89 runs behind.

Hall came out with a most gratifying analysis for a fast bowler—3 wickets for 30 runs in 20 overs—while Fisher had remarkable figures. He sent down 28 overs for one run apiece and five wickets—eloquent testimony to his unflagging accuracy and skill.

# DURHAM BATSMEN IN TOURISTS HELD TO POOR FORM A DRAW

Durham's batsmen cut a poor figure against the Tourists at Ashbrooke to-day, but that was partly to be expected, as, in their team selection, they had rather sacrificed batting for bowling.

Further, good spin bowling was something new to most of them, and Fleetwood-Smith, flighting the ball well, and getting a lot out of the wicket from his spin after lunch, had the Durham batsmen poking where the ball was not. In all he took seven Durham wickets for 21 runs, but his bowling after lunch was good enough for the following figures:—

Durham's innings lasted two hours and 25 minutes, and it seemed to be upset from the very start by a foolish run by Gibbon when he had played Fleetwood-Smith to square-leg. Adamson had never called him, and Gibbon was half-way down the pitch when he stopped and found his wicket broken. Adamson batted through the hour and a half before lunch, but was out to the second ball on resuming, while Elsdon batted an hour, and was last out after going in fourth wicket down.

Actually seven Durham wickets fell for 28 runs after the luncheon interval, and it seemed as though Dobson was guilty of a tactical error in putting a hard-hitting batsman like Johnson in second wicket down before lunch, when it was defensive play that was wanted.

### Tourists Open Badly

The Tourists opened badly, for Brown made a rank bad stroke to Howell's fourth ball, and Gibbon had a simple catch at square leg. Then the crowd of some 8,000 saw free batting in front of the wicket from Bromley and Darling. They put on 98 in 74 minutes before Darling was nicely caught at point off the Darlington professional.

Bromley continued to hit freely, and the crowd was expecting his century when he played over the top of a ball from Carr which kept low. So he fell three runs short of his century after batting 125 minutes, during which time he hit one 6 and 11 fours. While he got many good shots on the leg side, most of his runs came from in front of the wicket play.

Kippax reached his 50 with the last ball of the day, his runs having been obtained in 90 minutes' batting.

The receipts, excluding the enclosure, amounted to £591. The Australians announced that they could not play longer than 5.15 to-morrow in order to catch their train to Edinburgh.

## Durham Player's Riotous Over

The game at Ashbrooke ended in a tame draw to-day, for after getting a lead of 241 runs before declaring, the Australians could not dispose of Durham in the three and a quarter hours remaining for play.

The spectators certainly did not like the curtailing of play by three-quarters of an hour to enable the Tourists to catch an early train to Edinburgh, nor the farcical finish of Oldfield, Woodfull and Brown each taking an over to finish the match. That was making too much of a farce of it.

Kippax reached his hundred by one o'clock, and that was the signal for Woodfull to declare. Kippax gave a hard chance to Johnson when in the 80's, but otherwise his innings, which lasted 165 minutes, was without blemish, and included 10 fours.

### Profitable Stand

Durham lost Gibbon with but 27 runs on the board, but Adamson and Hickman added 82 before the latter was bowled after an excellent innings of 66 minutes. Adamson hit out once in his stay of 137 minutes, and he was caught in the leg trap. His play showed extreme caution, but there is no question that Chrales Adamson, when set, takes a lot of getting out. He watched the ball to the bat, and the correctness of his play was always in evidence.

Carr had one merry over from Bromley. This big hitter, who recently knocked the Yorkshire Colts' bowling all over the field, hit Bromley for five 4's and a two in one over, but, in the next, he played on to Darling.

Fleetwood-Smith got nothing like so much work on the ball as yesterday, and was hit very frequently on the leg-side, which suggested it was the name, more than the bowling, that had got Durham out so cheaply in the first innings.

The receipts for the two days totalled just over £850 gross, so that the Australians will receive about £300 as their share.

Teesside sees little cricket of note, and the Middlesbrough club had made preparations for a big crowd at Acklam Park for the return match between the second elevens of Yorkshire and Lancashire here to-day. But a fine week-end merely flattered to deceive, and early this morning rain set in. The weather cleared for a while in mid-day, but just when we were entertaining hopes of play before tea, the rain returned with a vengeance, and it was soon obvious that there was no chance of making a start until to-morrow.

This was particularly unfortunate, for there were indications of the match drawing by far the biggest crowd since these two sides met at Old Trafford on Bank Holiday Monday several years ago. With only the most remote chance of seeing any play, some 500 spectators paid for admission, and a large number waited patiently outside the ground in the rain.

There are no changes in the Yorkshire team, but Peter Higson unexpectedly failed to turn out for Lancashire, who will consequently be captained by the Old Cambridge Blue, H. R. W. Butterworth. Bennett, the Australian "googly" bowler, fills the vacant place in the side.

Colonel Chichester-Constable, the Yorkshire captain, to-day awarded second eleven caps to three colts who have made successful appearances for the county in recent matches. They are Robinson, the Denaby all-rounder, Bottomley, the Keighley player, and Hargreaves, who is to replace Hall for the Colts' match with Durham at Redcar on Wednesday.

### No Result to Colts Match at Middlesbrough

## STUBBORN BATSMEN

MIDDLESBROUGH, Tuesday

A very embittered crowd left Acklam Park at a quarter to six this evening, for they hardly appreciated the situation which faced the Lancashire second eleven in their rain-ruined Minor County match with Yorkshire.

No play was possible yesterday, and the wicket was so saturated that the start was delayed until half-past two this afternoon. Lancashire had scored 80 for three at tea. After the interval wickets fell with such rapidity that it was the obvious policy of the ninth wicket pair to keep their end up until stumps were drawn.

Lancashire are playing Staffordshire at Stoke to-morrow, and as they had to catch a train at 6.15 it was impossible to play after 5.45. In these circumstances a result on the first innings was out of the question, but with rather unreasonable determination the spectators demanded sparkling betting on a very soft wicket, with Fisher bowling at his best.

Washbrook and Hawkwood were the opening batsmen, and with only nine scored Hawkwood was bowled by a good ball from Fisher which kept very low. With the memory of this batsman's monumental innings at Leeds two years ago still fresh in the mind—he took an hour and 20 minutes to reach double figures against the Colts—one felt relieved that he was there no longer to incite the lethargic Washbrook to deeper lethargy.

Beattie left at 23, and then H. R. W. Butterworth came in to play the best cricket of the day. He had 4 fours in his first 20 runs, and, hitting every loose ball with delightful freedom, he scored 33 in 40 minutes, the third wicket putting on 52 runs. He was out to an excellent catch by Hutton.

Tea was taken at 80 for three, and the remaining hour and a quarter produced only 27 runs for the loss of five more wickets. Fisher was bowling magnificently, and the later Lancashire batsmen were always struggling vainly to play the ball wide of an eager circle of fieldsmen—that is, when they played the ball at all.

Washbrook batted nearly two hours for a tedious 35 before he hit a ball straight into Bowman's hands at mid-on with the air of a man tired of his own utility. In the same over Crofts bowled Nutter, and Bennett executed a tribal dance in a desperate attempt to evade a similar fate.

The 100 went up in 2½ hours, and then Farrimond, who had been irritating the crowd by his resolute defence, was brilliantly stumped by Crick, who showed vastly improved form throughout the innings. Greenhalgh was bowled at the same total, and Wilson was caught at deep square-leg by Pearson, but Phillipson and Bennett played out time.

Fisher took five for 40, and Crofts, bowling round the wicket, sent down 13 overs for 14 runs and two wickets.

# CHEAP WICKETS AT REDCAR

## Colts Leading on First Innings

REDCAR, Wednesday

As if to atone for singularly uneventful play on the second afternoon at the Lancashire match at Middlesbrough yesterday, Yorkshire Colts' meeting with Durham here furnished enough incident for the most impatient spectator. No fewer than 24 wickets have fallen in the course of the day, and the reason for this state of affairs must be ascribed to the pitch, and not to superlative bowling, nor indifferent batting.

The wicket was very fast in the morning, and, on winning the toss, Dobson promptly sent the Colts in. At lunch time he had ample justification for his decision, for eight wickets for fallen for 71 runs. Hutton was the only batsman to show any confidence, and even he was dropped twice in his innings of 31.

Bottomley had the misfortune to get the most difficult ball of the morning at the start of his innings; Bainbridge, a Redcar batsman, collected twelve unconvincing runs, and at 48 came the start of a sad collapse, both Kippax and Pearson, leaving at this total.

### Hutton's Downfall

Hutton had been playing a sound defensive innings, but at 56 he yielded to temptation and drove Ellis high to long-on where Weightman held the catch. Fisher and Crofts soon went, but after lunch Robinson and Colonel Chichester Constable put on 23 valuable runs. The Colts captain continued to display characteristic activity with Hargreaves in, but when the fast bowler had hit two good fours he was beaten by a ball which Ellis brought back a great deal.

The innings had realised 107—a small total, but one which was to prove too great for Durham. Robson and Gibbon were among the four batsmen back in the pavilion at tea when 58 runs had been scored, and with the exception of one anxious over after tea, when Carr took 13 runs off Hargreaves, the Colts were always on top, and the last three wickets all fell at 93.

### Brilliant Bowling

Robinson had the splendid figures of 5 for 17. He also fielded very well at backward-point, and Crofts's brilliant catch low down in the slips to dismiss Elsdon also deserved mention.

Hutton and Bottomley gave the Colts a useful start at their second venture, putting on 41 runs, but the last half hour proved disastrous. Hutton again batted extremely well for 34, but Elsdon accounted for Bainbridge and Kippax. When stumps were drawn, the Colts led by 75 runs with six wickets in hand.

# DURHAM WIN A FINE MATCH

## Wicket Turns Against the Colts

### GIBBON BATS WELL

REDCAR, Thursday

Durham won a great match against Yorkshire Second eleven by three wickets here this afternoon. The remaining six Yorkshire wickets realised 90 runs before the second innings closed, and Durham were thus set to get 166 runs for victory.

The wicket, which had been a bowler's paradise in the morning, played a perverse trick on the Colts after lunch, for it dried out astonishingly soon, and was never of the slightest assistance to their attack. Gibbon immediately proved this to his own and Durham's satisfaction, and his aggressive innings of 55 paved the way for a rather unexpected result.

The best feature of the play before lunch was the batting of Fisher, who is, like Cyril Turner, at his best in a crisis. He has made many bigger scores than his 44, but few of such value, and few produced under such trying conditions. The deliveries of Ellis and Howell were rising at varying heights, and Elsdon, who spins the ball prodigiously from the leg, was keeping an accurate length.

Crick gave an unexpectedly competent display; he was content to leave most of the scoring to Fisher, and revealing a stolid defence he helped his partner to add 38 for the eighth wicket. The innings closed for 151, Elsdon taking 5 for 40, and Durham, in the shape of Gibbon and Randle, had half an hour's batting before lunch.

At this period the pitch had not decided to throw in its lot with the visiting county, and although the opening pair scored steadily from the start, the runs, for the most part, came in hastily played singles. Hargreaves was making the ball get up a good deal, and by way of a reminder that the batsmen could not yet treat the Colts' bowling with impunity, Gibbon was struck a resounding blow in the ribs before a welcome adjournment for lunch at 32 for 0.

### Masterful Batsmen

From being rather apologetic, both batsmen suddenly became masterful when the innings was continued, and Gibbon evinced an almost startling urge to punish every ball sent down to him. The sun and a strong wind had done their work with great thoroughness, and the pitch was now playing very easily.

The score was taken to 83 before the stand was broken, Randle being splendidly caught in the covers by Robinson, whose fielding in recent matches has been magnificent, and the game swung round to give the Colts a glimpse of the victory that was to be denied them. Gibbon reached an attractive 50, made out of 88 in only 70 minutes, and then Fisher bowled him. His innings had been marked by excellent footwork and powerful driving.

One noted Hutton's introduction at this stage with grave misgivings—he has always proved so unsuccessfully expensive for the second eleven—but he captured two wickets in successive balls at 100. Crick stumped Hunt very smartly, and then that fine batsman, T. K. Dobson, so far forgot himself as to try to turn a long-hop to leg with half-hearted intent. He was caught and bowled.

Elsdon and Hickman, however, came to the rescue, and after they had put on 34 Carr came in to give his customary turn. For an unashamed exponent of the cross-bat his success in Minor County cricket is amazing. He was badly dropped by Pearson in front of the sight screen off Robinson, and, apparently dissatisfied at the distance

the ball travelled, he immediately repeated the shot. This time it disappeared from the ground at a great rate towards the sea front.

Carr was brilliantly caught by Colonel Chichester-Constable soon after, but by then the match was virtually won.

## GOOD WORK BY THE COLTS

### Northumberland Put Out in Three Hours for 129

#### HARGREAVES 6 FOR 47

HEADINGLEY, Monday

Rain limited play to three hours in Yorkshire's last home match of the Minor County season, against Northumberland here to-day, but they were three highly satisfactory hours for the Colts. In that period Northumberland were dismissed for 129, Hargreaves bowling splendidly to take six for 47, while Bottomley, the last bowler tried, captured three for 6.

Rain fell steadily all the morning, but it had surprisingly little effect on the wicket. Within half an hour of the skies clearing at three o'clock, it was possible to make a start, and although conditions were cheerless for the rest of the day there was only one brief stoppage for further rain, just before tea.

Northumberland won the toss, and Hargreaves, who opened from the Kirkstall Lane end, struck a swift blow for the fielding side. In his second over he had Fenwick caught in the slips, and that delightful batsman, Ord, made an unavailing expedition from the pavilion to be beaten by his first ball, which went off his pads to dislodge the balls.

#### Batsmen Uncomfortable

Mackay and Lee took the score to 40, but Lee had an anxious time facing Fisher. Towards the end of his innings Hargreaves made him just as uncomfortable, and it was no surprise when he was clean bowled by the latter's last ball before tea.

After tea Mackay, who had been watching the ball very carefully, was accompanied by a new Northumbrian batsman, M. Johnson, whose debut in Minor County cricket was a memorable one. In putting together 32 runs—the highest score of the innings—he gave a truly remarkable display. He started with a few preliminary flourishes of the bat in the direction of square-leg without adding materially to the total, and after some twenty minutes of woeful indecision he suddenly began to hit the ball extremely hard, if not always in the direction he intended.

Robinson had two unhappy overs, in which he was repeatedly cracked with lusty intent high over the heads of mid-off and mid-on; occasionally, just to show that he could gather runs as easily in the opposite direction, Johnson nicked him through the slips with equal success.

Mackay who had batted very patiently in an effort to redeem his side's early set-back was well caught on the leg-side off Hargreaves at 56—Dawson, the Slithwaite wicket-keeper showed most encouraging form in his first match for the Colts—and Gillespie acted as a sleeping partner for the fifth wicket. His was not an untroubled sleep for Hargreaves and Fisher made him stir uneasily on several occasions, but Johnson continued to hit out and he claimed 32 of the 38 runs put on in 40 minutes.

At 92 his good fortune deserted him for when Crofts came on for Robinson at the Pavilion end, he skied the new bowler to deep mid-wicket. Raper lost sight of the ball, and only just managed to get to it, holding the catch one-handed as he rolled over. Johnson hit five 4's.

#### Accurate Crofts

Dickson saw the 100 go up in 90 minutes, and was then yorkeed by Bottomley, who replaced Crofts. The latter is rapidly earning fame for his amazing accuracy. In a League match on Saturday he bowled for an hour and a quarter, conceding only four runs, while to-day he sent down seven maidens in eight overs.

Dickson's dismissal presaged the end of the innings, for Robson was clean bowled by Hargreaves one run later, and Bottomley

beat Gillespie at 115. Gillespie had endeavoured to play a type of game that is foreign to his nature. He has the physique and the inclinations of a forcing batsman, and in his bid for respectability to-day his cautiousness nearly brought about his downfall long before he had completed his laborious 25. The last two wickets added 14 runs, and twenty minutes before stumps were drawn the Colts retired well pleased with their work.

W. E. Harbord and Bottomley had ten minutes batting before the close, and despite Allan's optimistic imitation of O'Reilly, they both escaped unscathed.

## EXCITING VICTORY FOR COLTS

### After Declaring With Lead of Only 17

Set to score 95 runs in the last eighty minutes against Northumberland here to-day Yorkshire Colts accomplished the feat with ten minutes to spare, and thus gained a fine victory by six wickets.

Under the influence of a hot sun the wicket began to dry just before lunch, and with a lead of 17 runs Colonel Chichester-Constable decided to declare and put Northumberland in while the conditions still favoured the bowler. His move was entirely successful, for in their second innings the visiting county were dismissed for 111, Fisher taking four wickets for 26 runs.

W. E. Harbord and Bottomley played invigorating cricket when the Colts' innings was continued this morning, putting on 40 runs in half an hour before Bottomley was bowled by Allan. Harbord time and again in a most attractive innings of 64 put his left foot to the pitch of the ball and cracked it through the covers in entrancing style. Yardley, too, gave a perfect display in miniature.

#### Robinson's "Usual"

Fisher scored 15 quick runs, and then hit across the break of a ball from Robson and was easily caught at forward point. Robinson collected 19 in his usual breathless manner, and when the interval and the declaration came Yorkshire had made 146 for 6.

Northumberland never looked like making many runs in the afternoon, but there was always the danger that they might stay in a little longer than it had been anticipated, particularly when Gillespie and Fenwick were making a stubborn stand for the fifth wicket, during which they added 33 runs.

Johnson was dropped in the slips right at the start; and he brought off one or two well-timed and powerful off drives before he made a fatal lapse from grace at 49.

Fenwick was in for 25 minutes before he made his first run, and altogether he batted for just under an hour for 5 before Bottomley dislodged him. Just before tea Robinson missed a catch off his own bowling

from Paterson, but the mistake was not a costly one after all, for the last two wickets only added 18 runs.

The Colts had two factors to fight against in their race against time for 95 runs—the bowling of their opponents, and bad light. However, the first pair put on 16 in 10 minutes, and they were well ahead of the clock when the third wicket fell at 41. Raper and Pearson considerably improved the situation with an admirable stand which produced 34, their clever running of short singles pushing the score along at a splendid pace.

#### Hectic 10 Minutes

Pearson was out at 75, and then Robinson was the central figure of a hectic 10 minutes. He started with a boundary; then he landed his customary 6—a smashing hit over the square-leg boundary on to the practice shed off Allan—and at 20 minutes past six he finished the match with another full-blooded drive for 4 to the pavilion.

Raper batted admirably, for although he had to contend with the light at its worst, he never slackened in his efforts to force the pace, and his adventurous 28 must rank as his most valuable, if not his highest, innings for the Colts.

# YORKSHIRE COLTS AT CHESHIRE EFFECT A THEIR BEST DRAW

## Brilliant Century by Hutton

## Colts Have to Be Content With Major Points

### NARROW LEAD

NEW BRIGHTON, Thursday

Whatever chance there was of forcing a decision in the Minor Counties match between Cheshire and Yorkshire here to-day was destroyed by a partnership between J. D. Worthington and I. W. Jefferson.

Cheshire overnight had lost K. McEntyre for 74 in response to Yorkshire's declared total of 295 for 4, and although Yorkshire secured the wickets of Dartnell, Hawkins, Barber, G. McEntyre and Dutton for the addition of 140, a couple of stands by McEntyre and Barber, and Worthington and Jefferson, the second of which produced 58 runs in forty minutes, meant that Yorkshire would have to bat a second time.

Jefferson was very severe on the bowlers, especially Hutton, his 65 including 10 fours and two 6's, while he reached his individual 50 in forty minutes. He scored much faster than did Worthington, who, in his 32, had one 6 and four 4's. Once these two were parted the innings was soon over, for Crofts, who came on for the tallenders, secured the wickets of Danson and Bartley, and Yorkshire enjoyed a lead of 10 runs.

Hall was the most expensive bowler, as he failed to get a wicket and had 59 runs knocked off him. Hutton, despite severe punishment, secured four for 90, Fisher three for 72, and Crofts two for 11.

Cheshire momentarily raised the hopes of the spectators of providing a dramatic finish when Yorkshire went in a second time, for Bartley sent back Bottomley and Yardley with only three runs on the board. Yorkshire, however, changed the order of going in. Robinson joined Hutton, and between them the pair put on 47 runs before Robinson was beaten by a ball that got up sharply and spreadeagled his wicket. Robinson's contribution was 32, made up of six 4's, two 2's and four singles, and with his departure tea was taken.

As Yorkshire then only held a lead of 61 with more than an hour left for play, they were forced to play for safety, and during the last half-hour Hutton stonewalled every ball to ironical cheers, and at the drawing of stumps five wickets were down and the match left drawn.

Hutton took four and a half hours to get his century, and hit one six and 12 fours. His batting was marked by great power, and anything in the nature of a loose ball was punished. He was ably backed up by Fisher, who in the latter part of the innings scored the faster of the pair and made his 50 in 78 minutes.

**YORKSHIRE COLTS' SEASON**

**Promising Form of New Players**

**FAST BOWLER FOUND**

*By Our Special Representative*

From a playing standpoint, Yorkshire Second Eleven have had more successful seasons than the one which ended against Cheshire at New Brighton last week, but never has the value of the Colts' team as a training ground for the County eleven been more conclusively demonstrated.

With five Test Matches taking their toll of Yorkshire's leading players, followers of the game in the County have had the opportunity of assessing the merit of several leading members of the Second Eleven in a higher grade of cricket, and the Committee must be gratified at the manner in which they have risen to the occasion.

At the start of the season it was evident that the fine performance of the Colts in the previous year would not be repeated, for only a small minority of the team which defeated Norfolk in the ill-starred Challenge Match was available. Turner, whose magnificent all-round form had played such a considerable part in the success of the team—he scored over 750 runs and took 31 wickets—had been deservedly promoted, together with Davidson, and little was destined to be seen of W. E. Harbord, a very useful batsman who played one splendid innings of 64 against Northumberland at Headingley. On the other hand, Fisher celebrated his return by finishing with a batting average of nearly 50, and the capture of 28 wickets.

**Committee's Policy Rewarded**

The Committee rightly concentrated on new players, and they were rewarded by the promising all-round form of Robinson and Bottomley; the batting of Harrison; and the bowling of Hargreaves and Crofts. Two other young batsmen—Pearson and Kippax—hardly improved on their 1933 form, but there is so much good cricket in both of them that this temporary lack of headway need occasion no anxiety. Pearson has scored many runs for Scarborough in Council cricket, and he batted extremely well in the Northern Tour, but both at the beginning and end of the Colts' season he appeared to lose confidence in himself.

Robinson, a right hand bowler of off-breaks, and a left hand bat, has made one or two successful appearances with the first eleven, but lately his bowling has been disappointing. His batting is always a source of delight—tinged, perhaps, with apprehension—and he showed at Sunderland that he is by no means an indiscriminate slogger, playing a most valuable defensive innings in partnership with Shackleton.

**Successful Opening Batsman**

Bottomley proved his ability as an opening batsman very early in the season, carrying his bat for a masterly 102 against Staffordshire, but his bowling has suffered from a penchant for pitching just short of a length. This is, one fears, a legacy of League cricket, where short bowling which keeps runs down is almost as valuable as a good length attack which secures wickets.

With so many players competing for places, it is difficult to give everyone an extended trial, but one would like to have seen more of Harrison, the Wakefield batsman, who made a most impressive debut at Jesmond. Essentially sound in defence, and possessing some attractive shots in front of the wicket—his off drive is particularly powerful and well timed—Harrison has the attributes of a first-class cricketer in embryo, not the least of these being a splendid physique. It is to be hoped that more will be seen of him in Minor County cricket next year.

Two amateur batsmen to be seen to advantage were J. R. S. Raper and N. W. D. Yardley. Raper has such a sound style that

it is surprising that he does not make more runs, but an excellent innings at Walsall afforded evidence of his real ability. When Yardley has learned to curb his innate impetuosity he will surely prove one of the most glorious forcing bats that the County has known. His record in Public School matches at Lord's is unparalleled, and his superb fielding enhances his value to any side.

**Bowling Discoveries**

Turning to the bowlers, the most encouraging discovery was Hargreaves, who has the makings of a really great fast bowler. Those who observed his ideal action, and fine build, were disappointed at his lack of "fire" at the beginning of the season, but he has made a rapid improvement since the Colts' matches in Northumberland and Durham. He has corrected the fatal tendency to deliver the ball square-chested to the batsman, and is steadily developing the stamina so essential to the fast bowler in modern cricket.

Crofts, who came into the side in the latter half of the season, is most difficult to score from, and his 57 overs cost only 78 runs. Of medium pace, he swings the ball appreciably either way, and can apparently maintain his immaculate length indefinitely. It has been suggested by those who have not watched him closely, that he tends to bowl the batsmen in, but this is not the case; rather could such a criticism be applied to Bottomley, whose main asset lies in his occasional ability to make the ball "run away."

After his startling success in 1933, particularly on the "concrete" wicket at Norwich, where "Mike" Falcon was so impressed by him, Heaton, the Dewsbury leg-break bowler, failed to find his form, and only played in two matches.

Hutton has, from time to time, taken wickets for the county, but he is, unfortunately, unable to control his length. At present he sends down far too large a proportion of long hops and full tosses, and until he can acquire more accuracy his ability to flight the ball will be of comparatively little benefit to him.

**High Standard of Fielding**

In recent years, Yorkshire Second Eleven have gained an enviable reputation for fielding, their captain setting a splendid example in this respect, and the high standard has been maintained this summer, with Robinson outstanding in any position. Mention of fielding serves as a reminder of the tremendous improvement of Hutton in this department of the game. One has purposely omitted this brilliant young player in reviewing the batting, for he has played more often for the County than the Colts this season.

It is sufficient to say that he has more than justified the good opinions of those who watched him in his first year with the Second Eleven. His footwork is as near perfection as any first-class batsman; he has proved—notably in his innings of 196 against Worcestershire—that he has a wide variety of strokes; and with his ideal temperament for the big occasion he seems destined to carve out for himself a very prominent place in Yorkshire cricket history of the near future.

Since it was learnt that Buller, who kept wicket exceedingly well in the first half of the Colts' programme, was to seek fame in other fields, trials have been given to two players in this position, and Dawson, of Slaithwaite, created a favourable impression. It is not unlikely, however, that a Bradford League wicket-keeper will also be tried before the final choice is made next season.

**Skilful Leadership**

The importance of skilful and sympathetic leadership of a team of young players cannot be over-estimated, and once again tribute must be paid to the inspiring and efficient captaincy of Col. R. C. Chichester-Constable. No one is more capable of getting the best out of any cricketer, as those who have had the privilege of playing under him will gratefully testify. One trusts that he will find it possible to "skipper" the eleven for several years to come; it is, indeed, difficult to visualise anyone filling this exacting position in Yorkshire cricket with the same conspicuous ability.

The attendances at the principal grounds in the county have again been disappointing, and for next year the Colts' home fixtures have been allocated to smaller centres, such as Wakefield and Castleford. The Committee took a step in the right direction when they reduced the charge for admission this season, and the promising form of members of the Second Eleven in first-class cricket this summer should ensure increased support for Minor County matches in 1935.

# YORKSHIRE CRICKET SEASON REVIEW

## FINE ATTEMPT TO RETAIN TITLE

### Despite Heavy Calls Upon Players FOR TEST MATCHES

That Yorkshire should have been deposed from their proud position as champion county is not so surprising as that they have made so fine a fight for the honour and have been so long in the running. No side can be subject to such calls from the country and remain equally powerful, and of the defeats suffered in 1934 only one was suffered when the team was at full strength.

That was in the match at Leicester on August 8, 9 and 10, when Yorkshire declared with five wickets down in their first innings and then found themselves outplayed in the closing stages. Both the fixtures with Gloucestershire were lost, and lost by inferior all-round cricket, and Sussex won convincingly at Sheffield. The Warwickshire game at Scarborough provided a dramatic finish after sensational cricket on the first day, and Essex won a comfortable victory at Southend.

To set against these there are innings victories over Lancashire and Surrey, and a fight against time at Leeds earned vengeance for a narrow defeat by Middlesex at Lord's. So, all in all, the season has not been without recompense for such disappointments as it brought, and there seems no real danger that Yorkshire are in prospect of losing their position as one of the big attractions in county cricket.

### One Long Passage of Triumph

For many individual players this season will be memorable, and scarcely a cricketer who has played will go through the cold nights of winter without some glowing memories to make sweeter the warmth of the fireside. For Leyland the season has been one long passage of triumph, for in addition to proving himself the mainstay of the England batting he has come to the rescue of his county on more than one occasion and given pleasure to spectators all over the country by the joyousness of his batting.

The financial result of his benefit proved conclusively how popular is the cricketer and the man, and there seems no reason why he should not continue to delight us for many years to come. It is safe to say that he is a better batsman now than at any time during his career, and, granted freedom of illness and injury, Yorkshire may long look to him as one of her great stars.

Butcliffe is commonly supposed to have had a bad season, but figures, if they prove anything at all, prove him to be as successful a batsman as almost any in the country, and because he has not achieved the miracles of consistency and big scores that were his some few years that is not to say that he is not still a great batsman.

There have been occasions when he has seemed in unusual difficulties with the bowling, and more than once he has got

himself out with very un-Butcliffe-like shots, but he has not always enjoyed the best of luck, and the big scores he has made all revealed what amounts to very perfection in modern technique.

### Mitchell's Distinction

Mitchell has done well. He is as near an England cricketer as it is possible to be without actually achieving the distinction, and most of us feel that his solidity, unwearying patience, and unquestionable ability will bring him the highest honours in the end. There have been occasions when his batting has been anything but enjoyable to watch, and we could wish that he would instil a little more of the festival spirit into his everyday work, but Mitchell is a keen student of the game and no doubt proposes to work out his own salvation according to his lights.

He must surely hold one distinction in present-day cricket—that of supremacy in all-round work in the field. I can think of no one who could be placed with such certainty and confidence in any position from first slip to long-on.

Barber began brilliantly, and in comparison faded to mediocrity towards the end of the season. Nothing could have been finer than his work in May and June, but with his wonderful record innings of 245 against Kent at Leeds some of the grace seemed to depart from within him, and he has been struggling for runs ever since. He will come again, for his methods are essentially sound, and at its best his off-side play compares well with any in present-day cricket.

### Captain's Century

Turner has kept his place in the side by consistently good work, and is a much-improved player. It would appear that he will never be amongst the very first flight, but even now he is an asset to any county as a reliable batsman and a change bowler always capable of taking a useful wicket or two. His innings against Warwickshire at Scarborough was a superb display on a really awkward wicket, and will remain a living memory long after many centuries are forgotten.

Sellers improved as the season progressed, and when he gives his natural abilities full play he has achieved several excellent innings. Surrey's batting at Bradford inspired him to follow their hard-hitting lead, and it must be very pleasant for him to look back upon his century against the Australians, an innings as meritorious as it was timely for the county.

Of his captaincy it is difficult to speak, for there are so many factors beyond the knowledge and observation of mere spectators, but of his enthusiasm and personal example in the field there can be no two opinions.

### Verity Disappointing?

It may seem strange to say of a man who was the hero of the country after the second Test match that he has been a little disappointing, but the fact remains that on more than one occasion Verity has not used to the full conditions that were suited to his bowling. He has sometimes given the impression that he was content to leave the initiative to the batsman and wait for something to happen rather than pursue a policy of direct attack.

Possibly, his carefully laid plans have been too subtle for my poor observation, and certainly his reputation is at the moment probably higher than ever it was, but I must confess to a suspicion of a "negative" attack except when the ball was obviously "doing things."

Macaulay returned to the side sufficiently late in the season to have come in for the wickets when they were most unsuited to his spin bowling, but his first game against Middlesex at Leeds was sufficient triumph to earn him an invitation to Manchester for the third Test.

His danger in the later part of the season has proved potential rather than actual, but Yorkshire has still, and, we hope, for years to come, need of the variety he lends to the attack and the amazing vitality he brings to

all his work.

Wood had such a bad patch at one period that, to use his own words, he "wondered which end of the bat to get hold of," but he recovered his form with an admirable effort against the Australians, and has since played a number of useful innings. His work behind the stumps is more consistent than brilliant, but he has no easy task to "take" the Yorkshire bowlers, and the county cannot but feel satisfied and grateful for his work.

### Greatest Match-Winning Bowler

Time and again Bowes has proved himself the greatest match winning bowler in England, and the Yorkshire bowling in his absence never looked so deadly as when he was at work. He has got through an amazing amount of work, and only very rarely has he appeared innocuous, and his pluck and endurance in carrying on when not in the best of health are deserving of high commendation.

Bowes is the type of bowler that is all the more effective for sparing usage, and the county's greatest need is someone of sufficient class to take some of the burden from his willing shoulders. At the moment there are no signs of such a man in the county ranks, for Smalles, successful as he has been in his first full season, lacks the concentrated sting of a really first-class bowler.

Smalles is a very useful bowler for taking an odd wicket or two at the beginning of the innings and, notably at Maidstone, he has returned some creditable analyses, but on the whole really good batsmen have found little difficulty in dealing with him. His batting fell rather between the stools of forcefulness and safety. In attempting safety he neglected his hitting powers, but that he has a really fine drive he showed at Bradford against Northants and at Bournemouth.

Davidson made a thousand runs in his first full season and, more important than that particular achievement, he improved noticeably with the passage of time. At Hull in the Essex match he showed a glimpse of such rare form that he may consider himself safe for an extended stay with the side.

### Promise of Hutton

Of the players who came in during the absence of the Test match representatives, Hutton was a long way outstanding. He has practically all the equipment of a first-class batsman in the way of technique and temperament, and his big innings at Worcester was a wonderful experience for him. In addition to his phenomenal ability as a batsman, he is good in the field and can turn a leg-spinner. There seems to be not the slightest doubt that in this youth there is one who will make a great name in county and international cricket.

At various times Robinson, Bottomley and Hargreaves have played with success and considerable promise, and it would seem a desirable policy that such youngsters should be given encouragement and experience rather than that such older hands as Hall and Douglas should be called up, well as those two have acquitted themselves when pressed into service.
