**By SPECTATOR**

THE success of a sportsman depends upon the physical fitness of his body. After which profound truth we go on to say that it is little wonder that these men wear well. Every sport you can call to mind, and you will find that there is a surprisingly large number if you will sit down and think about them, has a grand old warrior, Warney Cresswell, "Old Man" Rutherford, and many more were playing in first-class football when many men their own ages were deciding that they were getting beyond three or four ends on the club green; George Hesketh, now close on the seventy mark, thinks next to nothing of walking from Nottingham to Birmingham or from London to Brighton while men twenty years his junior regard it as a horrible indictment on civilization if they are called upon to walk half a mile.

**CRICKET VETERANS.**

And when we come to cricket, why, we could pick dozens of men still playing regularly—take their flannels in exchange for regulation corduroys and they might be mistaken for a selection of inmates from a respectable home for the aged. There is dear old Sidney Barnes, sixty-five if he is a day, drawing his six or seven pounds a week from Smethwick, in the Birmingham League, and thoroughly earning it. Patay Hendren, not quite so old, it is true, is another monument to the goddess of fitness. At an age when most men are thinking of retiring to a cottage in the country, he is being talked about as a possible for a trip to the other side of the world in search of the Ashes.

All of which brings me to my real point, the fact that we in Berkshire have an old stager who is not. Bob Relf—the three R's they call him—is 52 years of age, but he has proved this week that far from being a back number he is still most of the brain and a good part of the backbone of Berkshire C.C. His tireless bowling and big hitting was an important factor in Berkshire's unexpected—I think it was that—victory over Glamorgan in the early part of the week.

**TWO BROTHERS.**

Bob was almost to Sussex what Hobbs was to Surrey and Hendren is to Middlesex. He and his brother played for the same county for many years. Both were all-rounders and could be relied upon right up to the close of their careers to do the double—a hundred wickets and a thousand runs. Albert, who is the oldest of the two, is now coach at Wellington and takes very little part in competitive cricket. Bob is showing the younger idea at Charterhouse how it is done in between taking wickets and scoring runs for this team and that.

It was interesting to see Bob playing so well at Kensington Road, for the ground was laid out years ago by his father, who will be remembered by many old sportsmen in Reading. Returning to "R.R.R.," he is a great favourite with local cricket fans. He keeps himself in wonderful condition, and on Monday, and again on Tuesday, he bore the brunt of the attack without turning a hair. At least, he did not appear to do so. I could not be absolutely sure about it, because he bowled with his hat on throughout!

**WEARING WELL.**

Another fine cricketer who shows little signs of the passing years is Dr. Woodburn, who has been skipper of Berkshire for so long that it would be difficult to envisage the club without his name appearing over the list of players. For twenty-seven years he has captained the team and has continued to associate himself with it throughout all its triumphs and tribulations. He is still a useful change bowler and a safe fielder, while it is undisputed that his captaincy rarely invites criticism.

Dr. Woodburn has seen many famous men graduate from Berkshire into bigger cricket, Percy Chapman played under his captaincy, before going on to lead Kent and, later, England. Incidentally, I notice that Chapman, who has been out of county cricket for some time, returned to the Kent team this week. The Human brothers also turned

out for Berkshire, of course, before going on to larger spheres of activity.

**BERKSHIRE'S WEAK BOWLING.**

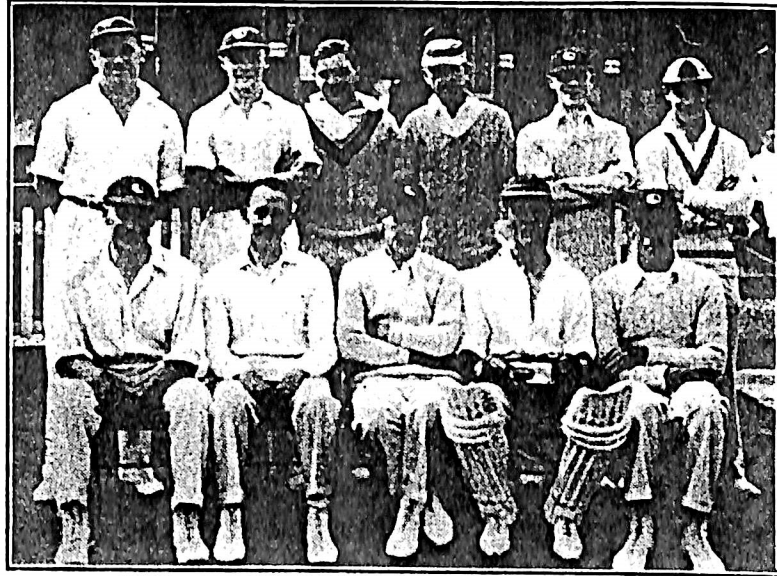
While watching the game with Glamorgan it struck me that the Berkshire bowling was not so strong that we could be sanguine about their chances in the Minor Counties Championship. Lord Remnant and Relf did most of the bowling, and, as it turned out, these two were good enough to account for the visitors. Had it have been otherwise it might have been a different story. R. G. Evans and Dr. Woodburn are useful stand-bys, but they are not the bowlers to take many wickets, while C. W. Mole, like too many fast bowlers, is too erratic to be kept on for long.

Consequently I was surprised to find that Harding, the Reading boy who is qualifying for Kent, was not chosen. I understand that he was approached and that he agreed to play, but that was as far as it went. That Harding is a fine bowler goes without saying, and he is also a useful bat. Berkshire did not miss him against Glamorgan, but, writing before the game with Oxford, I shall not be surprised if his absence is regretted before the end.

**FINEST COUNTY 'KEEPER.**

I was very interested in the personal success of Stokes, the Reading wicket-keeper. He is undoubtedly the best stumper in the county, and this, added to the fact that he is about the best club bat in these parts, should assure him of his place in the team for a long time to come.

Two more interesting facts about the Glamorgan game. One of the umpires was Joe North, formerly of Berks and Middlesex, who also played centre-forward for Reading Football Club years ago. His partner was Cutler, who used to wield a bat very profitably for Lancashire. The gate on Monday was £21, which was about the best they have had for a long, long time.

With the Jesters' bowling being mercilessly knocked off its length, the following batsmen had an easy task, and although three quick wickets fell directly after tea, the footballers were able to declare at 136 for 7. Percy Whittaker was top scorer with 36, but the best innings of the day came from Tait, whose 53, scored in just over 45 minutes, was without a chance.

With Gregory and Robson bowling an immaculate length, the Jesters could not afford to take any risks, and they started slowly. After 40 minutes, and with only eight on the board, Jones was caught at the wicket off Gregory, and then the rot set in. Almost directly after, Gregory clean bowled Lloyd Davies, and then Robson claimed three quick wickets.
