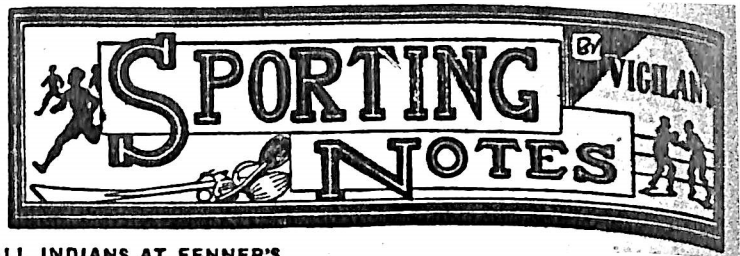

**ALL INDIANS AT FENNER'S.**

Rain ruined many week-end cricket matches, but none caused more disappointment than the hold-up at Fenner's, where the University were entertaining the Light Blues. Only about an hour's play was possible on Saturday, and although there was a full day on Monday, torrential rain prevented a ball being bowled on Tuesday. Saturday's hour provided plenty of incident, with Jahangir Khan the star turn against his Indian compatriots. Between a quarter to four and the tea interval All India lost four wickets for only 37 runs and Jahangir Khan was concerned with the capture of all the wickets, getting three batsmen caught and brilliantly catching another. This catch, which dismissed Palia, was one of the best seen at Fenner's this season. Palia, who had opened the innings and was batting steadily, hit the ball tremendously hard and a boundary seemed certain, but Jahangir Khan, fielding at forward mid-on, thrust out his right hand and the ball "stuck".

Jahangir Khan, who bowled unchanged from the pavilion end, made the ball come quickly off the pitch, and his analysis for the hour's play was 10 overs and five balls, with four maiden overs, and the capture of three wickets at a cost of only 17 runs. Good innings by Wazir Ali and A. F. T. White were the outstanding features of Monday's play. Wazir Ali had a bad finger and was making his first appearance for the Tourists. He scored his 85 out of 124 in two hours, and made a great effort to complete his century before the innings closed.

A. F. T. White, the Senior, got a step nearer to a Blue by another striking innings. A little slow, it is true, possibly a trifle lucky, as he gave a chance behind the wicket when 36. But for all that it was the right sort of cricket for the occasion. He again opened, and was sixth out, having scored his 82 out of 182. He and Nelson put up a big fight against the Indian bowling at its best. Nelson was later awarded his Blue. H. T. Bartlett was bright, his 30 including six fours, while N. W. D. Yardley was unlucky not to reach his 50, but the lower wickets fell rather quickly. The University had first innings lead of 56, and the Indians scored three without loss in the second innings.

**HAVERHILL BEAT CAMDEN.**

Haverhill, in their annual Whit Monday match at home with Camden, won by 46 runs. The meetings of these two sides have often been productive of high scores, with runs coming at a brisk rate, but this was not the case on Monday, when on a rain affected wicket the respective totals were 103 and 57. This gave an aggregate of 160, obtained from 82 overs. The home side, batting first, had five men out for 33, but the next two wickets added 55, the batsmen concerned being J. E. Funnell, with 20, and B. W. Goodin and H. Farrant, each of whom contributed 21. The most successful bowler for the visitors was H. Barrett, who claimed five wickets for 35 runs, in 15 overs (seven maidens). R. J. Ayres had two for 11, Daisley one for nine, Fisher one for 24 and Warren none for 20.

The Camden batsmen were uncertain in their timing of the ball which appeared to come off the pitch at varying paces. Of the first four men dismissed, three were lbw. The only members of the side to reach double figures were W. H. Warren and R. C. Jackson, with 20 and 12 respectively. F. E. Rowlinson had five wickets for 24 runs in 16 overs (five maidens) and B. Poole four for 19. After the match proper each side had a knockabout for 30 minutes, Camden scoring 72 for eight wickets and Haverhill 67 for seven wickets. Bradford accomplishing a hat trick for Camden.

**LEAGUE MATCHES HELD UP.**

Rain played havoc with the Junior League programme on Saturday. In several matches not a ball could be bowled, while in others play was so interrupted that definite results were not possible. In the match with Grantchester, Trumpington rattled up 117 in quick time, only for rain to stop further play. Taylor and Proctor put on 50 for the third wicket and Smith followed with a lively 34. At Longstanton only about half an hour's play was possible, and in this period Chesterton United lost two wickets for 18. The "Derby" game between Bottisham and Lode was also abandoned, after Lode had been given a good start, Pettit and Golding putting on 42 for the first wicket.

**DRAWN GAME AT HISTON**

Rain interfered considerably with the match at Histon on Saturday, when the second eleven were at home to Camba. Mental Hospital. After a delayed start, the Mental Hospital began in brisk fashion, and soon had scored 50 runs off the weakened Histon bowling. At 53, Raines was lbw. to Wilson after scoring 33. Taylor and R. Raines, however, kept up the rate of scoring and the second wicket did not fall until 105, when Taylor was out to a catch at the wicket after making 49. R. Raines was next to leave at 126, after scoring 32, and he was followed by Northrop at 141, who had made 26. The next four wickets fell for 12 runs, and the innings was declared closed at 165 for eight wickets. Histon began none too well, losing Smith and Wilson at 12, and Golding at 24. Rain then stopped play.

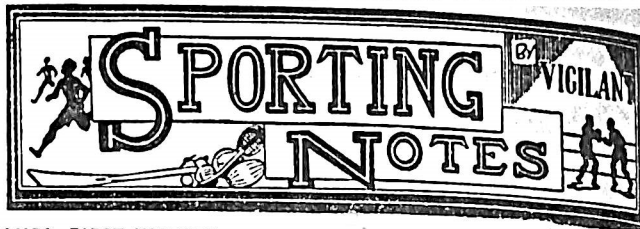

LOW SCORING IN HOLIDAY GAME.

SURPRISE HOME DEFEAT FOR MARCH.

After lunch Brooks refused to be moved, until 85 was reached, when a wonderful catch by J. Shepperson, off Clarke, dismissed him. His score of 23 was a valuable one to his side.

March found run getting just as St. Neots had done, for the latter had a sound attack too, and five out of the first six overs from Sillett and Ayres were maidens. Golden was first out at 11, after St. Neots had changed their attack. Fovargue, T. W. Shepperson and N. Glossop all left quickly, and the score was only 25 for 4. **100 PER CENT. CAMBS.**

After the match with Suffolk at Fenner's on Monday and Tuesday, Cambs. headed the Minor Counties Championship table with a 100 per cent. record. This match, like those earlier in the season with Bedfordshire and Norfolk, was so spoilt by rain that there was no result on the first innings. Consequently it does not count in the table, so that Cambs. victory over Lincs. last week is the only one at present ranking in the championship. As my space is limited and the match is fully dealt with under a separate heading, I am refraining from further comment here.

**Y.M.C.A. AND ST. GILES' IN THRILLING FINISH.**

Y.M.C.A., or perhaps it would be almost more correct to say Rev. U. L. O. Jessop, beat St. Giles' on Saturday after one of the most thrilling finishes possible. Wolf won the toss and elected to bat on a rather sticky, drying wicket. Disaster soon befel St. Giles' for Cooke was caught before a run had been scored, and Covillo and Edwards left at 9. Cambridge, on going in to bat, did not by any means find 76 easy to get. With Prime bowled first ball and Heath back in the pavilion with only six on the board, the Norwich stock looked brighter.
