CIVIL SERVICE CRUSADERS' TOUR.

TO VISIT FOLKESTONE.

The Civil Service Crusaders, who are again touring the South Coast this year, playing games at Aldershot, Portsmouth, Bognor, Eastbourne, Folkestone, Shorncliffe and Hythe, can rightly claim to be the premier Civil Service cricket club in England.

The club was founded in 1926 with the particular view of furthering the game in the Civil Service sports centres throughout the country. How well this object has been attained may be judged from the fact that, during annual tours, visits have been made to the majority of Civil Service sports grounds in Great Britain. Further, games have been played against representative Service sides of Ireland, Scotland and Wales.

This year the Crusaders will not only be visiting old friends in the Service at Portsmouth, but will also be renewing acquaintances in the Army at Aldershot and Shorncliffe.

Six members of this year's touring side have received their Civil Service representative caps, and should form the nucleus of a powerful side. S. Dunstone and G. Bush should be capable of giving the side the necessary start so far as runs are concerned, and H. Everett, W. Edwards and G. Harts-horn will, between them, provide sufficient variety of bowling to ensure opponents having to fight for runs.

Tontine Win In Last Over Of Game

ONE up and one down! No, not golf but cricket. Folkestone had two more engagements last week-end—won on their home ground, but failed to the Southern Railway Athletic at Ashford.

The Railway Club triumphed by a margin of four wickets. Folkestone missed too many chances in the field. I hear there was an epidemic of dropped catches. Matches cannot be won that way.

St. Mary's met Folkestone's second string and went down fighting, although they lost by seven wickets.

A. J. S. Clark was lbw under the new rule on Saturday. He is the first Folkestone batsman to get marching orders in this way.

Hythe Turn Over a New Leaf

There was great contrast in Hythe's performance last Saturday as compared with the previous week-end.

The Cinque Ports Club put on 226 for the loss of four wickets before declaring and then had all their opponents. The Royal Scots, back in the pavilion for the modest total of 101.

F. Castle came into his own, scoring 86. His partnership with S. James, who made 83, put on 170 in quick time. Castle afterwards added to The Royal Scots' discomfiture by bowling four of them for just over five runs apiece.

A Close Finish

Not much in it at Brockhill Park last Saturday, but Hythe Green finished just on top of Saltwood.

And this despite a fine all-round performance by F. Ralph for the home club. He made 24—no other player reached double figures—and then captured six wickets for 23 runs.

G. Batten, that Green stalwart, had a share in his side's victory. He dismissed five Saltwood batsmen for 15 runs.

A Hard-hitting Pair

Once again Folkestone C.C. had to be content with one win last week-end. Ashford seems fatal to the town club, for on successive Saturdays they have visited the railway town and returned without a win. This time the Southern Railway Athletic won by four wickets. The game was played on a pitch that had not been used since the football season and the ball played all manner of tricks. Folkestone batted first and were all out for 112. Morgan hit hard for his 53 (10 4's). The only other batsman to get double figures was F. J. Godden. Burt bowled well, his five wickets costing 19 runs.

GREAT GAME AT WITTERSHAM ON SATURDAY

The cricket match at Wittersham on Saturday, when two county cricketers, W. Ashdown, of Kent, and A. F. Wensley, of Sussex, will oppose an eleven of the Isle of Oxney, promises to attract a great crowd. Already nearly a thousand tickets have been sold, and the attendance promises to be as large as the match played on Thursday and Friday, September 4 and 5, 1834. In this match E. G. Wenman and R. Mills, of Benenden, defeated the Isle of Oxney XI. This match was played under double-wicket rules, as the match on Saturday will be played, but it will be under the new l.b.w. rule.

In a report of the 1834 match, it was stated: "So great was the interest existing that, though the scene of action was in a very marshy and thinly-populated district, upwards of 4,000 spectators were assembled to witness this singular contest, which has no parallel in the annals of cricket. Such was the confidence of many present that the Benenden two players were backed to a considerable amount, and many heavy sums changed hands on the occasion. The chances against the two enterprising players were great, the match having been made as follows: The two against the eleven, in every point of the game, they having none to field and their opponents being all in the field, and what was more particularly against them was that when one was out, both were. Thus in reality each had but one innings."

Wenman and Mills, by a brilliant display of hitting, scored 150 before Wenman was out. The Isle of Oxney men played very carefully, but were dismissed twice for 132, out of which were 48 byes.

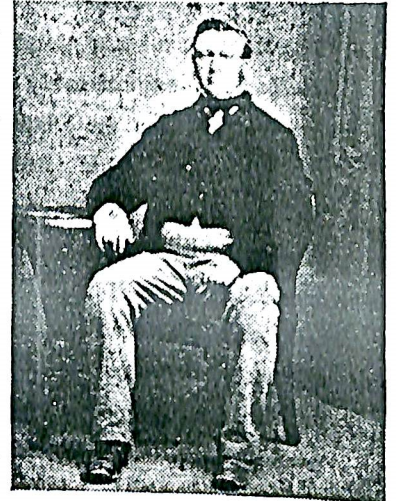

Mrs. H. J. Phillips, of "Wengower," Kennington, a grand-daughter of the late Mr. E. G. Wenman, recalls many interesting facts of her grandfather, the famous Benenden cricketer, who played in many of the great matches between 1825 and 1844.

"He was a man," she informed our representative, "who never boasted, and in regard to the match at Wittersham 102 years ago, he was in no way connected with the wager of £20 on the game."

It was the outcome of the boasting of the Isle of Oxney team, who were winning all their matches, that the landlord of a public house said he could get two men to

beat the lot of them and wagered £20 on their doing so. Mills was approached and persuaded Wenman to partner him. So infuriated were the Oxney players when beaten that they boycotted the public-house with disastrous results to the landlord.

Wenman was very dilatory in answering letters asking him to play in big matches. He was in great demand and in one letter, shown our representative, he was informed he must play in a certain match as his name was worth £100.

Wenman stood just over 6 ft. and weighed 15 stone. He never wore pads or gloves, and kept wicket to the fast bowling of Alfred Mynn.

Mrs. Phillips stated that there is a pad in existence which, it is alleged, he wore, but she believes it was only lent to him on one occasion. He never owned it.

It is interesting to know that two of Wenman's great grandsons will be present at the match in Mr. L. G. Hemmings, of Thames Ditton, and Mr. E. Crampin, of Loose.

Unfortunately, neither Mrs. Phillips nor Mrs. Langley, both grand-daughters, who reside at Kennington, will be able to attend the match, but are keenly interested in it and hope for the success of Ashdown and Wensley, who will uphold the victory of Wenman and Mills.
