COUNTY CLUB'S SEASON REVIEWED.

Under the capable leadership of F. G. T. Kingsley, a fine cricketer, Hertfordshire's first post-war season in the Minor Counties Cricket Championship was fairly successful. Of eight matches played, three were won, two lost and one drawn, while no decision was owing to bad weather, reached in the remaining two.

The weakness was in batting, where the absence of such stalwarts as L. E. MacLennan, C. B. Fordham, C. W. Ford, F. F. Longton—four first-class batsmen—and others, no longer available, was keenly felt. Kingsley, S. D. Rhodes and E. Roberts were the only really experienced batsmen in the side and the rest, good club cricketers, has yet to gain the experience necessary to deal successfully with the quick-turning and spinning ball met in county cricket.

Kingsley, with 386 runs in 11 completed innings, headed the batting averages with 35.09, followed by S. D. Rhodes, 271 runs in nine innings, average 30.11.

The bowling was, however, always good and the fielding, at times, brilliant. The averages of the bowlers to take ten or more wickets were: R. Watson 13, average 8.15; J. Holt 10—13.0; F. Allen 21—13.85; H. Crownshaw 16—14.93; B. Bodley 13—16.61; E. G. Hawes, 19—20.00; and E. Roberts, 14—22.00.

Nearly a hundred players took part in the twenty-four Gentlemen of Herts and County Club matches, of which nine were won, five lost, seven drawn and three abandoned. M. A. Wiggs made most runs, 265, with an average of 33, and W. Lisimore took most wickets, 19, at a cost of 8.64 runs each. H. Holt was the only other bowler whose victims ran into double figures, his ten wickets costing 7.60 runs each.

COUNTY CRICKET CLUB.

APPOINTMENT OF NEW CAPTAIN.

The annual meeting of the Oxfordshire County Cricket Club was held at the King's Arms Hotel, Holywell, Oxford, on Friday. Canon C. C. Inge, in the unavoidable absence of the president, Lord Bicester, was in the chair:

The chairman asked the meeting to stand in silence as a tribute to their captain, J. Gordon Halliday, who, when on his way home from service abroad, was killed in France in a flying accident.

The secretary (Mr. F. S. Gee) stated that during the forthcoming season the club would play five club and ground matches, eight matches in the Minor Counties' competition and a match against the Bucks Juniors (boys 14 to 18) in September at High Wycombe.

Permits for Clubs.

In regard to the permit for cricket material, he had received applications from 30 clubs, and the allotment was 210 balls, 92 bats, 47 pairs of pads, 72 batting gloves, and 17 pairs of wicket-keeping gloves. No fewer than 1,400 letters had been sent out for the club appeal, authorised at a special meeting last September.

Mr. R. G. Reekie, the treasurer, gave an account of the financial position for the six years of the war, during which quite a number of members paid subscriptions through bankers' orders. With this money, moneys subscribed from the appeal, which so far totalled nearly £200, and investments, there was a satisfactory balance, but expenses were bound to be heavy next season, and much more money was required to put the club in a sound financial position.

Officers elected were: President, Lord Bicester; deputy president, Canon C. C. Inge; hon. treasurer, Mr. P. G. Reekie; hon. secretary, Mr. F. S. Gee; assistant hon. secretary, Mr. L. B. Frewer; match secretary, Mr. E. F. Bowtell; management committee, R. B. Cole, E. Cotton, F. R. Wylie, F. J. Fowler, J. G. Mason and R. J. Northcote-Green, who will co-opt County members. There was a ballot for this committee. Auditors: W. M. Bayliss, Sons and Co.

Subsequently the Management Committee met, and made the following appointments: Captain, W. W. Inge; Selection Committee, the captain, Messrs. E. Cotton, J. G. Mason and L. B. Frewer, with power to co-opt two others.

THE NEW CAPTAIN.

The new captain of the Club, W. W. Inge, is the son of the deputy vice-president, Canon C. C. Inge, and was educated at Rugby, where he is now on the staff, and Oriel College. He was unfortunate when he matriculated to find E. T. Benson already established as wicket-keeper in the 'Varsity XI., but in his last year, 1930, there was keen controversy over the rival merits of Inge and J. F. N. Mayhew. Inge had only one trial and the position was given to Mayhew, who was contemporaneous at Eton with C. K. Hill-Wood, the bowler with the peculiar delivery. As it turned out the choice was unlucky, as Mayhew had a bad match against Cambridge.

Inge joined the Oxfordshire side in 1928 and so had 11 full seasons with the Club before the war. He was an obvious choice as wicket-keeper, in which position he has few peers. He is also a dashing batsman and in 1931 recorded his first century, since which he has played many forceful innings. A wicket-keeper captain is always a good choice as he sees so much of the game, a batsman's weaknesses

and a bowler's vagaries. But Inge has much more than that to recommend him, long experience, a care-free personality and the gift of making friends on and off the field. No doubt is felt that he will be a worthy successor to the many fine men and cricketers who have led the County side.

OXFORDSHIRE COUNTY CRICKET.

DETAILED REVIEW OF 1946 SEASON.

PERSONALITIES AND STATISTICS: NEED FOR MORE SUBSCRIBERS.

No Oxfordshire County cricket captain faced a more difficult task than W. W. Inge when he took over for the first season after a lapse of seven years. Of the 1939 side, J. G. Halliday and J. Barmby gave their lives in the war, S. F. Florey and S. Pether were not available owing to war wounds, Dr. A. P. D. Montgomery, Dr. J. P. O'Shea and S. F. Williams had removed from this district, C. Walters and H. Walker retired, and the two Lithgow's were still in the Forces—11 pre-war stalwarts had to be replaced.

The task of rebuilding was enough to dismay even the most stout-hearted skipper, but thanks to discoveries made during the war—J. Mason, A. Taylor, W. Miller, J. Hemmings, L. L. Toynbee and D. G. Woodward come under this category—and the indefatigable match secretary, Eric Bowtell, plus the Club and Ground matches, not always appreciated at their true value, the task of rebuilding was successfully overcome.

J. F. Mendl.

Of the pre-war side, in addition to the captain, J. F. Mendl, M. Wakefield, D. E. Edwards, J. Guilfoyle, E. Senior and W. Haynes not only showed that they had retained their form but, in certain cases, improved on it. Mendl was, in fact, the outstanding batting success. He was already an accomplished player in his Repton days, but a serious skiing accident kept him out of the field for some time. Founded on the soundest principles, Mendl's batting was a model for any young player to copy, and it must have been an education to anyone who stayed in any length of time at the opposite end. Even when the ball is turning his defence is so sound that few balls get beyond his bat, and when attacking there are few batsmen better to watch. So good is his timing that runs come with effortless ease—the sure sign of a good sound batsman. He made 201 against Devon—the highest score for the County since C. Walters' 220 not out against Bedfordshire in 1924—and also 133 v. Cornwall. Woodward, one of the youngest players of the side, proved the most aggressive bat, and when set there are few players better to watch.

Another outstanding player was the Australian Blue, B. H. Travers, who, coming into the side for the last two matches, played an innings of 167 not out against Cornwall of incomparable strength and brilliance, and one of 83 not out against Devon. Edwards, Taylor, Miller and Inge also batted really well, and others played useful innings. Could the same team have been put into the field for each match the batting strength of the side would have been stronger. Twenty-three players had to be used for eight matches, and this was rather a handicap.

Wakefield and Guilfoyle.

In bowling, Wakefield and Guilfoyle, as will be seen from the figures below, were a strong pair. Wakefield lessened his run up and did not attempt to bowl so fast. He was a much better bowler than in 1938-39. He came quickly off the pitch and, when he got his length, was a real attacking bowler. Perhaps his best ball was the one he straightened out. He is said to be going to South Africa this winter, but hopes to return to this country next summer. Guilfoyle had his best season since 1935, when he took 32 wickets for just over 17 a-piece. With pitches mostly in his favour, he took the fullest advantage of his breaks and change of pace and bowled consistently well. Hemmings had one good match, and Merritt, with his good command of length, was often very useful. The pace bowlers, M. Womersley, M. Girling and L. L. Toynbee, were certainly handicapped by the "dead" pitches. They will say they were never favoured with a really fast one.

It is pleasant to refer to the fielding. Here was a really live side, anticipating every move, throwing in accurately and holding most of the catches. So good were the players that it was possible to put quite a number of the team in different positions without the side being handicapped. It would be invidious to mention names. To the captain of the side the best tribute came from one of those who had played under him. "He welded the side into one happy family. No praise is too high for him."

With hard wickets the exception rather than the rule, L. L. Toynbee, M. Womersley and M. Girling, the pace bowlers, were greatly handicapped, but Girling not merely kept an end going at different stages of the innings but often got valuable wickets. The catching was good, except on one occasion, the throwing-in first-class, and Inge at the wicket was as reliable as ever, and I can think of no higher praise.

Good as the season was in a playing sense, a great deal more must be done before perfection can be achieved. More attention must be given to publicity and to the comfort of the spectators. Ground charges, especially for motors, should be higher. But all this needs money, and till the County has more subscribers they are handicapped. All tradesmen and private citizens interested in healthy sport should regard it as a duty to subscribe to their County cricket club.

Club and Ground Matches.

Finally, a word about the Club and Ground matches. Of their value I personally hold decided views—they are a fine forcing ground for the prospective County players, and everyone who receives an invitation to play in them should jump at the

chance. Form is always carefully watched, and the new selection committee went to enormous pains to include every prospective candidate. To Eric Bowtell, the new match secretary, and to Harry Parker, the "maid-of-all-work," the club are greatly indebted for jobs more unseen than seen.

Tribute to Charles Walters.

If last season is Walters' farewell to County cricket, it is a fitting moment to pay a tribute to this very whole-hearted cricketer. Coached by his father, Charles was quick to discover that the game is a hard taskmaster. I remember him as a boy at Littlemore, invariably with a bat in his hand, keen on watching the many players who came to the Hospital, and, like most young boys, a quick learner. When he first came into the County side in 1922 it was as a batsman; his bowling developed later. He set the seal on his fame with a fine innings of 220 not out against Bedfordshire in 1924. He made other good scores, most often when the side was in difficulties.

Then his bowling showed signs of developing, and with his usual industry he became the most consistent slow bowler on the side and in his career took hundreds of wickets. He was perhaps the best all-round player who ever represented Oxfordshire, for, as a mid-off, in his prime he had few equals. It was not merely as a player that he won his reputation. A likeable fellow of quiet humour, he endeared himself to all those with whom he came into contact, friend or foe. Wherever he went, into whatever company, Charles Walters was welcomed. He is one of the few men to whom the much-abused appellation can be attached—a sportsman. His services to Oxfordshire cricket cannot be over-estimated, and though this tribute may suggest that "finis" has been written to his County career, not a few will hope that his name will reappear another season, if only occasionally. F.J.F.

COUNTY CRICKET AGAIN

Strong Team for Opening Match

County cricket will be in full swing again this summer, both the first-class county championship and the minor counties' competition being resumed after the loss of six seasons owing to war. There is good reason to think that the English people will welcome the re-establishment of the most English of all games on its old national basis, and that public interest and support will reach high water mark.

Staffordshire has never been in a position to support first-class cricket, one potent reason being its peculiar geographical lay-out, with the bulk of the population concentrated at its northern and southern extremes. Persistent efforts to secure the interest and co-operation of the south of the county have failed largely because the Black Country is dominated by Birmingham with its first-class cricket and its strong league. But the Staffordshire C.C. Club can, and does, provide interesting cricket of good standard, and has won the championship of its class many more times than any other county.

This year's programme comprises home and away fixtures with Yorkshire 2nd XI, Cheshire, Northumberland, and Durham, and the season opens at Barnsley on May 22 and 23. The home matches are to be played at Knypersley, Porthill, Stoke (Michelin), and Lichfield. Interest in cricket has been on the up-grade in recent years, and the pleasant and quite well-appointed ground is suitable for the experiment of taking the attractive side which Yorkshire will send to Knypersley. I believe it will be the first time county cricket has been played there, and the visit to Lichfield will also be almost like breaking new ground, for it will be the first for over half-a-century.

After so long a lapse of time it is not easy to estimate the prospects of success in the competition this year, but there appear to be sufficient resources to justify an optimistic outlook. R. H. Plant, of Longton, is the new captain, and the choice could not be bettered. Learning his cricket at Leys School and coached at home by Aaron Lockett, he is not only a good bat with a rich repertoire of scoring strokes, but is experienced in captaincy and deservedly popular. Here is the probable team he will lead in the opening match next Wednesday: A. B. Hollowood, R. Smith, T. Stanley, G. Pedley, L. Riley, B. Shardlow, S. Crump, F. Taylor, F. T. Boulton, and E. D. Dennis.

It is good news that Eernard Hollowood will be available for all the matches. In London he plays for Winchmore Hill. Stanley is well spoken of as a left-hand bat with West Bromwich Dartmouth. The policy of the committee is definitely to give encouragement to young players, and Len Riley, the Bignall End run-getter, will, if he is able to accept the invitation, have his first chance in a higher grade. Boulton, also uncertain at the time of writing, was tried mainly for his bowling in 1939, and he seems to be in form with Leek after long years of war service, which applies equally to George Pedley, Longton's opening batsman, who had some experience with the county before the war. Another player new to county

cricket is E. D. Dennis, Longton's wicket-keeper-batsman.

I like the look of the team on paper. There is batting almost all the way down. Boulton at No. 10 is not negligible as a batsman, and even Fred Taylor can use the long handle with effect sometimes. I have a pleasant recollection of Fred Boulton, with another junior, H. Thornhill, defying the Northumberland attack for the best part of an hour to save the game for Staffs, at Jesmond just before the war. Roy Smith is bang in form, his three first scores for Great Chell being 105, not out, 51 and 46. Stanley Crump had a brilliant season with Rochdale in 1945, scoring 478 runs, average 34.14, and taking 77 wickets, average 6.23. This year he preferred to return to Leyland Motors, with whom he had a successful time before the war. The bowling has variety and merit with Taylor, Crump, Shardlow, Boulton, and Pedley, all but one of whom can justly be termed all-rounders.

Looking ahead, there are satisfactory resources to draw upon. I understand that Eric Perry, the Dartmouth captain, and perhaps the best all-round player in the Birmingham League, is likely to play in some matches, and several young players knocking at the door include V. Jolley, a bowler of pace; V. Burgess, the Bignall End bowler; J. Wilcox, the Longton left-hander; J. F. Smith, of Norton, whose batting shows much promise; and F. Butler, of Knypersley, if he should recover his form of two years ago. Another young player who may command consideration, as he appears to have got his release and has resumed his place in the Cheddleton team, is the left-hander, J. Bailey, whose form just before the war led to his selection for the county. These are a few who have impressed one as worthy of trial as opportunity arises, but the first consideration of the committee will very properly be to secure as nearly as possible a settled team.

Staffordshire Finish in a Blaze of Glory

In the season just ended Staffordshire have been as fortunate in the weather as club cricket has been unlucky. In this unseasonable summer the few bright sunny days have synchronized with Staffs. matches, and in 18 days the only interference by rain was a delay until after lunch for the ground to dry at Oxtou, and a few brief showers on the second afternoon of both matches played at Knypersley. It is probably true to say that the same number of home competition matches has never attracted so many spectators in a season, at least since before the first great war.

And the county team has had a brilliant season, marred only by some weakness in batting in the early matches, which, combined with bad umpiring, probably cost Staffs. another championship. The turn of the tide came at Oxtou, and after a check at Darlington, the team proceeded to a sequence of four handsome victories, culminating in the defeat of Northumberland and Durham, each in a single innings with many runs to spare. Sensational bowling saw these two counties dismissed in consecutive innings for 42, 23, and 39. It was reminiscent of the great days of Sydney Barnes, who, by the bye, was an honoured spectator of the first day's play at Lichfield, when Staffs. scored 296 and captured 12 Durham wickets for 51 runs.

The season's record was five matches won, one lost (by a narrow margin), and two lost on the first innings, representing 32 of a possible 48 points, a percentage of 66.66. But the method of scoring is now to divide the points gained by the number of matches played, which gives Staffs. a figure of 4.00, compared with 2.50 in 1939, when the percentage was 41.66. This will give Staffs. a high place in the table, but will not secure the championship as Yorkshire II, have a rather better figure, and if Yorks. proved to be at the top and Staffs. second no challenge match could be played as the terms have already met. This year's percentage is the highest since 1932, when it was 68.57. Staffordshire's last championship was in 1927, with a percentage of 90.

Staffs. batted 13 times, including two occasions when a few winning runs were scored in half-an-hour or less. They scored 2,220 runs for the loss of 107 wickets, average per wicket 20.74, and opponents batted 18 times, scored 2,069 runs for 148 wickets, and averaged 13.64. The favourable margin of 7.10 is the best for many years. In 1939 it was 1.38, and in 1933 the balance was 2.44 on the other side. The batting average is only about half a run higher than in 1939, but opponents' wickets have been cheaper to the extent of over five runs per wicket.

The batting and bowling averages were given last week.

Criticizing umpires is extremely distasteful, but it is only fair to say that the umpiring has generally given dissatisfaction to both sides, and that Staffordshire has been most seriously affected, if only because some mistakes against Staffordshire players have had a vital influence on results.

Though the county has been represented by fewer players than was usual before the war—25 compared with 30 in 1939—the same old difficulty has been encountered in the

inability of some valuable men to spare time for more than one or two matches.

The failure of young batsmen who were given a trial in the early matches to reproduce their club form was handicapped, but the committee and hon. secretary deserve credit for the fact that thereafter a strong, dependable side was placed in the field for each match. Eight averages from 23 upwards speak well for the batting. Roy Smith has retained his place as chief run-getter, and he and Eric Broderick are the two "centurians" of the season. Of the pre-war players, M. C. Harvatt, B. Shardlow, and the skipper, R. H. Plant (the last-named after starting with a most unlucky "pair of spectacles") have scored well, whilst F. Bailey has fully realized the promise he gave just before the war as a left-hand batsman and has been an ideal opener with Smith since he was selected for the northern tour. Two new batsmen from the south of the county, T. H. Stanley and R. M. Pearson, immediately made good, but are unfortunately unable as yet to play in more than a match or two, and P. Charnock, of Leek, in his two games, shaped like a county player of the future.

PHENOMENAL BOWLING

When one comes to the bowling, though the brunt has been well borne by Crump, Shardlow and Taylor, who have shared the wickets very evenly and bowled admirably, the outstanding feature is, of course, the phenomenal debut of S. Norcur, the young Silverdale bowler, still under 20 years of age. The first three innings in which he bowled for the County gave him the following extraordinary analysis—261 overs, 19 maidens, 37 runs, and 16 wickets. No other young bowler has ever done anything approaching it on his first appearance for the county, or, one would think, for any other county. To expect him to live up to that standard would be out of reason, but at a time when young bowlers of merit are hard to find it may be hoped that Staffs. has found one with a great future before him. He seems to possess quite the right temperament, is not over elated by such amazing success, and is not likely to be cast down when less successful. A right arm fast-medium bowler he has good command of length, with power to swing the ball from leg and also to turn it in from the off.

The fielding has been generally satisfactory without often touching the high spots. Both E. D. Dennis and C. Lovatt kept a good wicket.

A few features of the matches may be mentioned. The opening match at Barnsley saw the advent of a left-hand batsman in T. H. Stanley with the equipment of a county player. His 69 against the Yorkshire bowlers in his first innings for the county (ended by a bad decision) created an extremely favourable impression. This mistake and others enabled the home team to scrape a lead for first innings points. In an exciting finish to the return match a great effort by Shardlow, with four wickets for eight runs, to pull the game out of the fire just failed. The innings victory at Oxtou was featured by a timely and vigorous 63 by Shardlow, and the havoc wrought by Eric Perry's fast bowling (9 for 59) and the successful debut of J. R. Fisher, slow left arm (8 for 67). Then came four days' cricket in the north in unbroken sunshine. One unaccountable decision, which gave the Durham captain a second innings and enabled him to add nearly 60 runs, had much to do with the loss of points at Darlington. R. M. Pearson, another S. Staffs. batsman, made good showing with 45 in his first effort for the county, and R. Smith and F. Bailey opened the second innings with a century partnership. The best batting of the season produced a total of 361 at Newcastle, mainly due to a grand recovery by Broderick and Harvatt, who put on

148 after three wickets had gone for 24 on a fast pitch with some broken spots. Both were suffering from injury, and the stand was an amazing one. Plant followed on with the best innings he has ever played for Staffordshire. Broderick was the only one to reach the century, but both the others deserved to do so though a faulty stroke robbed them of the distinction. Crump's six for 44 in the final stage was good bowling, and he followed it with even better in taking eight for 24 against Cheshire at Knypersley, where Shardlow took the limelight in the second innings with six for 20. S. Norcur's wonderful success in the last two matches has been dealt with, but it remains to do justice to Fred Taylor for his worthy share in those memorable feats with 13 wickets for 59 runs in three innings, whilst Crump and Shardlow did the needful when called upon in the last innings of the season.

Lichfield gave a warm welcome to the county team after the long lapse of 63 years, but the repetition of the experiment may well depend upon the response of the people of that district to the appeal for new members.
